OBJECTIVES AND I Aggressive behaviour will consider English-language manuscripts in the fields of animal behaviour, anthropology, ethology, psychiatry, psychobiology, psychology and sociology that relate to excessive or implicit conflict behaviour. The works relating to underlying mechanisms or that influence behaviour generally considered aggressive and the physiological and/or behavioural consequences of being subject to this behaviour are within the scope of the journal. We mainly publish articles describing empirical studies. When considering revisions, preference will be given to meta-analysis by synthesizing a substantial number of studies on a subject of theoretical importance. Comments and discussion papers are not usually considered, except when these concern an important question raised by an earlier article published in the journal. 3. HANDWRITTEN CATEGORIES AND REQUIREMENTS Aggressive behavior publishes the following types of contribution: Research articles Review Articles Commentary Editorials 1) Abstract research articles, Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results and Discussion sections are necessary. Literature review must be succinct. Complete research papers should be as concise as possible, without sacrificing the documentation of the results, and be limited to 30 pages, including the title page, summary, text, references, tables and figures. In exceptional circumstances, for example, multi-study work, longitudinal studies or meta-analysis will be considered. In these cases, it should be noted in the accompanying letter. If authors are worried about fitting their work into these guidelines, they should look primarily at the Introduction and Discussion sections. 2) Reviewing articles As indicated in the objectives and scope, preference will be given to the meta-analysis of a substantial number of empirical studies. For these, the same sections as for research articles are required. Narrative reviews will be taken into account in exceptional circumstances, when a meta-analysis is not appropriate. 3) Commentary comments provide views focusing on specific topics raised by an earlier article published in the journal. They must be written as continuous text without sublayers. These articles must be 1,500 words (excluding a summary of 150 words, references, figures and tables). 4) Publishers These are written at the invitation of guest editors of a special issue. Main text The text must be presented in the following order: Introduction; Methods; Results; Discussion (including limitations and implications). The journal uses U.S. spelling. Authors can submit using any form of English, as the spelling of accepted documents becomes U.S. English during the production process. References References should be prepared in accordance with the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (6th edition). This means that text quotations must follow the author date method by which the author's surname and the year the source is published must appear in the text, for example (Jones, 1998). They must be numbered in the list and refer to text with consecutive superscript Arabic numbers. Keep footnotes short; they should only contain tangent short comments in the main argument of the document and should not include references. Figure Legends Legends must be concise but complete: the figure and its legend must be understandable without reference to the text. Include definitions of any symbol used and define/explain all abbreviations and units of measurement. 2) Table tables must be autonomous and complement, but not duplicate, the information contained in the text. They must be numbered in order of occurrence in the text, and presented in numeric order. Each table must be identified by number and must have a (e.g., table 1. Percentage of cells retrogradely labeled in each place that contained enkephalin immunoreactivity). Must be supplied as editable word editable files, not pasted as images. Captions must be concise but complete: the table, legend, and footnotes must be understandable without reference to the text. All abbreviations must be set at the bottom of the page. Footnote symbols: lowercase superscript letters (a, b, c) etc... must be used and *, **, *** must be reserved for P values. 3) Figure File(s) Aggressive behavior is known for the high quality of its figure reproduction. To maintain this level of quality, you need to make sure that the images are acquired and processed at every step with that goal in mind. Illustrations should be planned with the proportions of the magazine page, i.a. 8.5 inches by 11 inches. Although authors are encouraged to send the highest possible quality figures, for expert review purposes, a wide variety of formats, sizes and resolutions are accepted. File types and resolution figures must be numbered in a consecutive series using Arabic numerals, in the order in which they are quoted in the text, and presented in this order after the text of the document. Each file must contain a single figure and be named figure number (i.e. Figure 1, Figure 2, etc.), and must be in TIFF(.tif) or EPS (.eps) format at a resolution of 300 dpi. Text within a figure For figures of multiple panels, individual panels must be lettered consecutively (uppercase). Letters should not have free effects such as highlighting, three-dimensional edges, shading, etc. The text within a figure should be kept to a minimum, with details preferably placed in the figure legend. The letters for panel designators must be uppercase (i.e. A, B, etc.) and 6 mm in height, and labeling within a figure 4 mm high. Larger letters are unnecessary and appear disordered; smaller letters may not be readable on a computer screen. A healthy serif font (e.g. Arial) is preferred, and the same font and type sizes should be used constantly throughout. Microscopy For all photomicrographs, a scale bar must be included in the figure and defined in the figure legend. The tradition of identifying zoom factors (e.g. 250x enlargement) should be avoided, as digital images can be played at any arbitrary size. You do not need to include the scale bar size in the figure if included in the figure caption. Photomicrographs must be framed and cropped to show the material to its best advantage. The brightness, contrast, sharpness and inclusion of the lighting can be adjusted, although this must be indicated in the Materials and Methods section of the manuscript or in the legend of the figure. Color should be used in photomicrographs when scientifically necessary, but plates containing only monochromatic images should be reproduced in black and white. The use of color can be used to differentiate specific characteristics of a drawing, but it must be scientifically necessary (i.e. necessary to differentiate the different parts of the image, such as different lines from a chart or different labels assigned in a specific section). The figures presented in color can be reproduced for free in color online. In this case, the figure legend should be applied equally well to the color or black and white version of the figure (i.e. it does not mention the colors). Note that line figures (e.g. graphics and graphics) are supplied in black and white to be readable if they are printed by a black and white reader. Aggressive Behavior resource identification initiative supports the Resource Identification Initiative, which aims to promote the identification, discovery and reuse of research resources. This initiative, led by the Neuroscience Information Framework and the Oregon Health & Science University Library provides unique identifiers for antibodies, model organisms, cell lines, and tools such as software and databases. These identifiers, called Research Resource Identifiers (RRIDs), are machine-readable and can therefore be used to search for all articles in which a particular resource was used and increase access to critical data to help researchers identify appropriate reagents and tools. Authors are asked to use RRIDs to cite the resources used in their research if applicable in the text, similar to a regular citation or GenBank's membership number. For antibodies, authors are asked to include in the citation the seller, the catalog number and rid in both the text and the first mention in the Methods section. For software tools and databases, authors must provide the resource name followed by the resource website if available, and RRID. For model organisms, RRID is only enough. Authors are also asked to include RRIDs in the list of keywords associated with the manuscript. To obtain research resources (RRIDs): authors must use the Resource Identification Portal, created by the Resource Identification Initiative Working Group. Authors should search for the research resource (for more information, see the section in its titled Features and Search Tips). Authors must click on Quote button to get the quote and insert the citation into the handwritten text. If a resource is not found on the Portal, authors are encouraged to register the resource with the appropriate resource authority. EDITORIAL POLICIES AND ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS The acceptance criteria for all articles are the quality and originality of the research, and its importance to the readers of the journal. Manuscripts are reviewed to a single blind man. The authors of the articles submitted to aggressive behavior are also expected to adhere to the Ethical Standards of Research and Publication of the American Psychological Association (see Section 8 of the Ethics Standards from 2002 to www.apa.org/ethics/code/index.aspx) including the specified standards for the ethical treatment of human and animal participants (e.g., informed consent for human participants, humane treatment of animals). Jobs will only be sent for review if the Editor-in-Chief determines that the document meets the appropriate quality and relevance requirements. Aggressive behavior encourages data sharing whenever possible, unless this is prevented by ethical, privacy or confidentiality issues. PUBLICATION PROCESS AFTER ACCEPTANCE When an accepted article is received by the Wiley production team, you will receive an email asking them to log in or register with Wiley Author Services. They will be asked to sign a publishing license at this point. Aggressive behavior offers Wiley Wiley accepted for all manuscripts accepted for publication. This service ensures that accepted manuscripts 'in the press' are published online shortly after acceptance, before copying or typographical. Accepted articles are published online a few days after final acceptance, appear only in PDF format, are given a Digital Object Identifier (DOI), which allows them to be cited and crawled, and are indexed by PubMed. After the publication of the article of the final version (the version of the registry), the DOI remains valid and can continue to be used to cite and access the article. Supported articles are indexed by PubMed; Therefore, the sending of authors must carefully check the names and affiliations of all authors provided on the cover of the manuscript to make it correct for indexing. Subsequently, the final articles edited and tested will appear in a number at the Wiley Online Library; the link to the article in PubMed will be updated automatically. Note to NIH Grantees: In accordance with the NIH mandate, Wiley-Blackwell will publish the accepted version of contributions written by NIH fellows to PubMed Central after acceptance. Once the document has been written, the author will receive an email notification from the URL from which to download the page tests of the article in PDF format; associated forms and complete instructions on how to correct and return the file are also provided. The authors are responsible for all statements made in their work, including changes made during the editorial process and therefore the tests should be carefully checked. Please note that tests must be returned within 48 hours of receipt. Aggressive behavior offers quick posting through the Wiley Early View service. Early View articles (the first online version of the registry) are published in the Wiley Online Library prior to their inclusion in a topic of aggressive behavior. Note that there may be a delay after receiving corrections before the article appears online, as tests are carefully reviewed. Once the article is published in Early View, no further changes to the article are possible. The Early View article is fully citable using the Digital Object ID (DOI) and carries an online publication date. There are no mandatory charges for perpetrators who post on aggressive behavior. Authors can choose to publish in an open access format through OnlineOpen, which carries a fee (see Author Licenses section). Color numbers can be posted online for free; However, the magazine charges for publishing figures in color on paper. If the author provides color figures to early view publishing, they will be invited to complete a color loading agreement on RightsLink for Author Services. The author will have the option to pay immediately with a credit or card, or they can request an invoice. If the author decides not to buy color printing, the figures will be converted to black and white for the magazine's print issue. 8. PUBLISH PUBLICATION Access and participation When an article is published online: The author will receive an email alert (if requested). Authors can share a link to their article posted via social media. Authors have free access to your article (after accepting the Terms and Conditions of Use, you can see the article). The corresponding author and co-author can nominate up to ten colleagues to receive a free online posting and access alert in their article.
