In this activity，you will go out to LaGuardia＇s Spring Fest（https：／／t－nagano．com／projects／JapanClub／\＃current）on Wednes－ day，March 27， 2024 （1：00pm－4：00 pm＠E－Building，E－Atrium，Poolside Cafe \＆Cobblestone Courtyard）and find as many bilingual speakers as possible there．

You will need to ask bilingual speakers three typical things（objects，cultural traditions，ideas，people，locations etc）that are typically associated with spring in their language．Ask them to write down three words in their language in the table below．For example，in Japanese，spring is often associated with cherry trees，new school year（Japanese academic calendar begins in April），and picnic（many people in Japan do picnic to see cherry trees）．You can only ask one person for each language（e．g．， you cannot ask two Spanish speakers－only one from each language counts）．For each person（i．e．，language），the group will receive one bonus point．The maximum bonus points of this activity is 30 points．
