3 4 5	A RESOLUTION introduced by Mayor Harry Felker recognizing Harry W. Colmery and establishing June 22 as Harry W. Colmery Day in Topeka, Kansas.
6	WHEREAS, the life of Harry W. Colmery of Topeka, Kansas, was marked by
7	service to his country and its citizens; and
8	WHEREAS, Harry Colmery earned a degree in law in 1916 from the University of
9	Pittsburgh and, through his practice of law, contributed to the Nation, notably by
10	successfully arguing two significant cases before the United States Supreme Court, one
11	criminal, the other an environmental legal dispute; and
12	WHEREAS, during World War I, Harry Colmery joined the Army Air Service, serving
13	as a first lieutenant at a time when military aviation was in its infancy; and
14	WHEREAS, after World War I, Harry Colmery actively contributed to the growth of
15	the newly formed American Legion and went on to hold several offices in the Legion and
16	was elected National Commander in 1936; and
17	WHEREAS, in 1943, the United States faced the return from World War II of what
18	was to become an active duty force of 15,000,000 soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, Harry Colmery, recognizing the potential effect of the return of such a
21	large number of veterans to civilian life, set out to craft legislation seeking to ensure that
22	these Americans who had fought for the democratic ideals of the Nation and to preserve
23	freedom would be able to fully participate in all of the opportunities the Nation provided;
24	and

25	WHEREAS, in December 1943, Harry Colmery crafted the initial draft of the
26	legislation that became the Serviceman's Readjustment Act of 1944, also known as the GI
27	Bill of Rights; and
28	WHEREAS, the GI Bill of Rights is credited by veterans' service organizations,
29	economists, and historians as the engine that transformed postwar America into a more
30	egalitarian, prosperous, and enlightened Nation poised to lead the world in the 21st
31	century; and
32	WHEREAS, since its enactment, the GI Bill of Rights has provided education or
33	training for approximately 7,800,000 men and women, including 2,200,000 in college,
34	3,400,000 in other schools, 1,400,000 in vocational education, and 690,000 in farm
35	training; and
36	WHEREAS, as a result of the benefits available to veterans through the initial GI
37	Bill, the Nation gained over 800,000 professionals as the GI Bill transformed these
38	veterans into 450,000 engineers, 238,000 teachers, 91,000 scientists, 67,000 doctors,
39	and 22,000 dentists; and
40	WHEREAS, 2,100,000 World War II veterans purchased homes through the GI Bill.
41	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
42	TOPEKA, KANSAS that June 22 of each year is hereby established within the City of
43	Topeka, Kansas as Harry W. Colmery Day in recognition of the many contributions of
44	Harry W. Colmery to the City of Topeka, the United States and to the many veterans who
45	have fought for this country.
