or the last 18 years, Bill Maher has set the boundaries of where funny, political talk can go on American television. First on "Politically Incorrect" (Comedy Central, ABC, 1993-2002), and for the last seven years on HBO's "Real Time," Maher's combination of unflinching honesty and big laughs have garnered him 21 Emmy nominations. In October of 2008, this same combination was on display in Maher's uproarious and unprecedented swipe at organized religion, "Religulous," directed by Larry Charles ("Borat"). The documentary has gone on to become the 7th Highest Grossing Documentary ever.

In addition to his television program – which has featured such regular visitors as John Edwards, Ben Affleck, Robin Williams, Arianna Huffington, Alec Baldwin and Michael Moore – Maher has written four bestsellers: "True Story," "Does Anybody Have a Problem with That? Politically Incorrect's Greatest Hits," "When You Ride Alone, You Ride with Bin Laden" and most recently, "New Rules: Polite Musings from a Timid Observer.

Maher started his career as a stand-up comedian in 1979, and still performs at least 50 dates a year in Las Vegas and in sold-out theaters all across the country. Two of his eight stand-up specials for HBO – 2007's "The Decider" and 2005's "I'm Swiss" – have been nominated for Emmy awards.

Maher was born in New York City, raised in River Vale, N.J. and went to Cornell University. He now resides in Los Angeles.

Rain comes together

Feb. 9, 1964. A Sunday night that would change the course of popular music, popular culture - and history, forever! Millions of Americans tuned into *The Ed Sullivan Show* to watch a group of four mop-topped Englishmen in dark suits who called themselves The Beatles. What they witnessed was a new and exciting brand of melodic, guitar-and-harmonies-driven rock 'n' roll that was as infectious as it was original and unique.


Little did the members of RAIN know that they would themselves come together in a band, forging a career that would keep them together longer than The Beatles!

The members of RAIN are extraordinarily talented musicians in their own right and this becomes more evident with each show they perform. RAIN audiences experience their own personal journey back to a time when Peace and Love was everyone's mantra.

The story of RAIN begins in the mid 1970s, at a time when "tribute bands" were non-existent. Playing The Beatles music note-for-note, they rode an enormous wave of nostalgia for the band that had broken up in 1970. A big break came for RAIN when Dick Clark hired them to record the music for the 1979 made-for-TV movie *Birth of The Beatles*.

For RAIN band members Joey Curatolo (vocals, bass, guitar, piano), Joe Bithorn (vocals, lead guitar, guitar synthesizer), Ralph Castelli (vocals, drums, percussion), Steve Landes (vocals, guitar, piano, harmonica), and Mark Lewis, RAIN's founding member (keyboards, percussion), the music is first and foremost. All the music is performed live, with no pre-recorded tapes or sequences. They have worked hard for many years, studying each song, each note, movement and nuance... both vocally and musically. Today, they have a repertoire of over 200 Beatles songs.

New National Initiative

These are the five Metro Nashville Davidson County Public Schools participating in the first pilot project of Disney Musicals in Schools outside of Nashville.

Rehearsals have begun.

Public performances will be presented at all of the schools this spring.

On May 17, a student share event at TPAC will feature one musical number from each group.





"TPAC is the pilot project. It's the first time that the educational arm of Disney Theatrical is offering this opportunity to schools outside of New York," said Roberta Ciuffo West, TPAC's executive vice president for education and outreach. "We're honored to have been chosen for the initiative and we're incredibly excited about a collaboration that expands the work we already do in the schools. The very name Disney – the brand, the artistic reputation, the history and cultural contributions of many decades – is just the best that exists, from the people who dream, create and perform on Broadway to the people who are now inspiring the same work (and play!) in the schools.

"Like Disney, TPAC Education's professional development program specially trains their teaching artist faculty to work in partnership with educators in classrooms. We're a great partner for the project because, in many ways, our educational and operational approaches are similar. Disney's goal in New York City schools has been to develop a culture of theater performances, to serve and inspire children, teachers, families, and the larger school community," she said.

At no cost to them, five elementary schools have received a performance license to the Disney KIDS musical of their choice, comprehensive resource materials, and in-school support from two TPAC teaching artists for 15 weeks.

"We could not have dreamed that the first five schools to participate in Disney Musicals in Schools would be so diverse, representing a cross-section of Nashville.

It's incredible – Montessori and STEM magnet schools, one enhanced-option school, one suburban and one with a high percentage of English Language Learners," said Ciuffo-West. "Although individual methods vary, each school is a great match for the goals of Disney Musicals in Schools, involving music, art, physical education, and classroom teachers, along with librarians, principals, parents, and other faculty. That's a reflection of how arts education engages children across all subjects and serves students from all backgrounds and neighborhoods. The arts cross cultural and academic borders. The arts strengthen communities."

Steve Fickinger, vice president, Creative Development of Disney Theatrical Group said, "I am thrilled that Tennessee Performing Arts Center is joining us as our national partner in bringing Disney Musicals in Schools outside of New York City for the first time ever. TPAC is an organization whose impressive efforts with community and school outreach closely align with our own commitment to providing first-rate arts-education programs to young people who might not otherwise have the opportunity to participate in the performing arts."

Over three decades, the Tennessee Performing Arts Center has welcomed more than 11 million audience members and served more than 1.5 million students and educators since 1983 with performances at TPAC, resources for teachers, classroom residencies, and enrichment programs for adults.
