

Welcome to the Tennessee Performing Arts Center. In the midst of our 2009-2010 season, I hope you're having a great time here with your family, friends, and the distinguished artists on stage.

I'm happy to report some positive economic indicators at TPAC after the struggles we've all experienced over the past year. Broadway season ticket sales already have surpassed last year's final figure. We attribute some of that to *Wicked*, but a surprising number of packages continue to sell long after that show came and went. We're cautiously optimistic that we'll meet ticket income goals this year.

Wicked was a sensation, setting new attendance and income records for TPAC, with an estimated \$8 million impact on the local economy, including important local and state government revenues.

(If you couldn't get tickets to the musical in September, watch for the announcement of the mega-hit's return within the next couple of years.)

We're proud of our total, annual economic impact of more than \$30 million, but did you know that selling tickets is just one element of our non-profit organization? We present Broadway tours and special engagements to earn the revenue (after substantial artist fees are paid) it takes to operate this facility. Other sources of earned income include concessions and renting our spaces for comedy acts, concerts, meetings, weddings

Our fundraising efforts support our mission to serve Tennessee families, children, and educators. Each year, thousands of students attend performances with teachers who receive free curriculum-based resources for their classrooms, TPAC Education teaching artists visit classrooms, from Head Start to high school, where the arts improve academic achievement across the board. Families enjoy "Field Trips" to TPAC with fun, free activities before the Saturday afternoon performances. Adults take part in an annual series of discussions, previews and workshops. Learn more!





Sones de México Ensemble made its first public appearance in 1994 at an art gallery in Chicago's Pilsen neighborhood, commemorating the death of Mexican land-rights revolution hero Emiliano Zapata. Chicago, with its well-known patronage for the arts, a one-hundred-year-old history of Mexican immigration and the second-largest Mexican immigrant population in the U.S., was fertile ground for the ensemble's development. Through the years, the ensemble has amassed a large collection of folk musical instruments representative of Mexico's diverse local cultures and a team of multi-instrumentalist musicians. Their diverse repertoire, rich in colors, textures and rhythms demonstrates that there is more to Mexican music than mariachi. Their concerts entertain the senses and illustrate the mind. The ensemble has toured extensively, and through its own non-profit organization has taught thousands of school children and adults across the nation about the riches of Mexican music, dance and culture.

This year, the group celebrates its 15th anniversary. Recently, the group released its third compact disc entitled Esta Tierra Es Tuya (This Land Is Your Land). The album received many accolades, including a GRAMMY Nomination for Best Mexican-American Album, and a Latin GRAMMY Nomination for Best Folk Album. The band is currently working on Fiesta Mexicana a new, dual-language double-album for children. For updates, visit www.sonesdemexico.com.

guitars and vocals – co-founder and award-winning composer, was born in Mexico City and has been a bandleader for over 25 years. His training in Mexican folk music has spanned most of his life, learning orally, first-hand from master artists in Mexico's various musical regions, and academically with a degree in music composition from Columbia College.

Juan Díes, executive director

bass and vocals – is a co-founder and life-long musician (bass, guitarrón, guitars, vocals). Raised in San Luis Potosí, Mexico, he migrated to the U.S. and earned an MA in folklore/ethnomusicology from Indiana University and a BA in music and anthropology from Earlham College.

Lorena Iñiguez

dancer – has danced on stage from the age of six and now is an active dance and music teacher. She teaches in schools, academies, arts residencies, workshops and special events. She studied communications at Northeastern Illinois University with a dance scholarship.

Juan Rivera


fiddle, requinto, and vocals – was born in Michoacán, Mexico, and studied violin at Casa de la Música Mexicana, where he later became an instructor. He studied the huasteco style of violin with Rolando "Quecho" Hernández. In 2001, Juan relocated to Chicago where he now performs with Sones de Mexico Ensemble. He teaches violin privately and in groups.

Zacbé Pichardo

harp, mallets and percussion – was introduced to Mexican traditional music from birth by his father, Victor, and by the community of musicians who frequented their household. Zacbé has traveled extensively throughout México. He is currently pursuing a degree in music composition at Columbia College.

Javier Saume

drums and percussion – was originally from Caracas, Venezuela, and began playing percussion at the age of eight. Javier has performed with the Gran Mariscal de Ayacucho Orchestra, Ensamble Gurrufio and OGMA, and Miranda States Orchestra in Venezuela. He has a BA in percussion from Roosevelt University.

La ciudad de Chicago, conocida por su apoyo al arte, con más de 100 años de inmigración Mexicana, la cual la han convertido en la segunda ciudad en los Estados Unidos con la población mas grande de Mexicanos, sirvió como el lugar perfecto para el desarrollo del grupo Sones de México. A través de los años, el grupo ha acumulado una colección de instrumentos musicales utilizados en la música folclórica, representativos de la diversa cultura Mexicana. El repertorio musical del grupo con su diversidad de instrumentos, colores, texturas y ritmos nos demuestra que hay mucho más en México que la música mariachi. Los conciertos de Sones de México son un espectáculo que entretiene los sentidos y la mente. El grupo viaja constantemente y a través de su organización sin fines de lucro enseña a grandes y a niños la riqueza de la música y la danza de la cultura mexicana.

Este año, el grupo celebra sus 15 años de aniversario. Recientemente, el grupo lanzo su tercera producción disquera, llamada *Esta Tierra Es Tuya*. Esta producción ha recibido varias menciones y ha sido nominada a un premio GRAMMY bajo la categoría de Mejor Álbum Mexicano-Americano y otra nominación bajo la categoría, Mejor Álbum Folclórico. 

affiliated program that utilizes the disciplines of music, dance, theatre, and puppetry as powerful tools for educating pre-school children. Professional performing artists partner with early childhood educators and create activities that target curriculum and developmental goals for 3-to-5 year olds, including emerging literacy skills, social interaction and self-expression. Wolf Trap residencies and workshops provide training for teachers in arts-based instruction techniques they can employ in their classrooms.
