THE GOAL OF RELIGION.

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Unity School of Christianity 917 Tracy Ave., Kansas City, No. Above all other objectives the great goal of religion is to develop in man the glory of Christ. "The mystery which hath been hid for ages and generations; but now hath it been manifested to his saints which is Christ in you, the hope of glory". Col. 1:26.

Paul goes on to say in the same scripture, "Whom we proclaim, admonishing every man and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ."

That this is the fundamental work of religion is plain to anyone who is quickened in the Spirit and beholds the universal truth, that as we all have the mind of Christ as the implanted seed of the perfect man created by God, our prime object in living should be to follow the Master in making that ideal real.

God has done his part in imaging his perfection in his Son, or Word of promise, described in the Gospel of John as the Logos, in which is implanted all glory and power for man, when he complies with the divine law. Let it be emphasized that this glory of man was not the exclusive privilege of Jesus of Nazareth, but is open to all men who follow him in the regeneration. (Read Matt. 19: 28) "Verily I say unto you, that ye who have followed me in the regeneration, when the Son of Man shall sit on the throne of his glory, ye also shall sit upon twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel".

although Christianity has for nearly two thousand years been trying to reveal him. This revelation by the followers of Jesus has not always been an easy matter because we have exalted the personality of the Master beyond the renge of human companionship: we have made him all divine and ourselves all human. Yet we are taught, and it appeals to our reason, that God is no respecter of persons. It must therefore be true as stated in the scriptures, that we all have the same essential attributes developed or undeveloped. If Jesus was the son of God, we also are Sons of God, the difference being that Jesus unveiled the mystery of man's inherent glory and found himself.

This revelation, that we are all Sons of God on the way to a consciousness of that mighty truth, does not belittle Jesus, but does exalt man. The revelation that all of the divine powers that Jesus expressed exist as potentialities in all of us, gives us a new hope and stirs in us the ambition to attain, at least in a measure, the perfection that he attained.

However, if Jesus demonstrated his Sonship through suffering, we shall not wholly escape the same soul surgery, although we have faith in his vicarious atonement for our sins. Jesus taught the law and opened the

door to the forgiving love of the Father, and we must follow him. To follow Jesus is to do the works that he did, and "even greater works" as was his prophecy.

Through his marvelous insight and understanding of divine law, Jesus forged far ahead of our race consciousness, so far in fact, that in our limited concept of man and his powers, we have looked upon Jesus as very God and men as worms of the dust.

The Jews wanted to stone Jesus because, being a man, he made himself God. Jesus answered them, "Is it not written in your law, I said ye are Gods?" He then explained that those to whom the word of God came, were God's sons and that it was not blasphemy for him to say "I am the Son of God".

The Son of God is God's perfect, ideal pattern of man, to whom we all have access and through whom we come to the Father. There is no other way. Whoever tries to climb up some other way is a thief and a robber. When the Christ in Jesus made this proclamation it was not from the personal but universal Christ Mind. So we should make the proper distinction in reading the scriptures; sometimes it was Christ, the Son of God talking, and sometimes Jesus, the Son of Man. In the end, however, the Son of Man was swallowed up by the Son of God.

To fully understand and practically apply the saving grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, it is very helpful to understand man in his mind and brain structure. Modern science in philosophy, medicine and psychology, is revealing laws in body structure that shed light upon the teaching of Jesus. Both John the Baptist and Jesus emphasized a change of mind as essential to salvation. Their slogan was "Repent ye ! Repent ye !", which means a change of mind. Modern mental science makes a sharp distinction between the thought processes centering in the head and those in the solar plexus or heart. Those functioning through the heart are emotional and much more pronounced in their action upon the nervous system, than those in the head. "And Jesus, knowing their thoughts, said. "Wherefore think ye evil in your hearts?" (Matt.9:4) He indicated that the thoughts of the heart were virtually equal to the overt act. Progressive physicians tell us that our heart thoughts, or emotions, are responsible for about half our bodily ills.

Dr. William Brady, who conducts a syndicated health column in the daily press, recently declared, "Worry, anxiety, fear, retard or inhibit the digestive process. It does nt matter much whether you worry about meeting the interest on your mortgage or about the dire effects you will suffer from autointoxication, Anger, hatred, jealousy, malevolence, all have a marked inhibiting action. These unpleasant emotions

throw the brakes on normal processes of digestion. That is how a little flare-up of anger or jealousy just before dinner, drives away appetite.

At a gathering of the American College of Physicians, Doctor Edward Weiss of Philadelphia, read a paper on diseases of the heart. He cited the journal of John Wesley, written in 1759, where he told of the case of a certain woman with a continuous pain in her stomach, for which doctors prescribed drugs without avail. Wesley wrote that he found the pain resulted from fretting over the death of her son", and that when she was comforted, her physical disorder left. "Why then", asks Wesley, "do not all physicians consider how bodily disorders are caused or influenced by the mind?"

After 175 years of medical darkness we are emerging into
the light as to the source of about fifty per cent of
humanity's ills,- a state of mind." The doctor further said
that many persons had undergone operations to get rid
of pain or discomfort which was entirely due to some
emotional trouble. He cited the instance of one young
woman who underwent four such operations, when her
trouble was brought on by the fact that all her sisters
were married while she seemed doomed to remain a lonely
spinster. Fear, worry and the like, he said, caused such
conditions.

In these discoveries in the dynamics of the mind we have the revelation of the cause of a legion of human ills, but no soverign remedy is offered. Business men have "Dont Worry" mottoes—on their office walls and resolve tonquit worrying, but gomright on in the same old anxious thought. Religion, when made a part of ones is practical every day life, not only shows how to dissolve the mob of anxious thoughts that beset us in the highway of mind, but it introduces us to a law that will work for us night and day.

The Christian religion as taught by Jesus and interpreted by his followers offers a remedy for every human ill, and if it were applied, as Jesus applied it, sin, sickness, poverty, ignorance and insanity would soon disappear from the earth. But we must not look for material remedies in the pharmacopoeia of Jesus. He doalt with ideas, the source of everything. He warned against the unbridled anxious thoughts that run amuck when there is no restraining of the mind and climaxed his lesson by stabilizing the whole consciousness in God, as the unfailing supply and support of man's every need. The sixth and seventh chapters of Matthew

ter of the atom and cosmic space are remarkable in their correborations of the Bible. Science has completely reversed its former estimate of space as empty void. It is now regarded as the source of light, heat, mass, power; in fact, everything visible and invisible have their origin in the cosmic ether. Professor William Millikan says, "The atom has revealed

that it possesses functions so varied and mysterious that science has concluded that it is mind, rather than the old mechanical matter."

Sir James Jeans, the eminent English scientist, says in his book, "The Mysterious Universe":

"For aught we know, or for aught that the new science can say to the contrary, the gods which play the part of fate to the atoms of our brains may be our own minds. Through these atoms our minds may perchance effect the motions of our bodies and so the state of the world around us."

The promise of eternal life after death is often interpreted as the goal of those who follow Jesus, but a careful study of His words and works reveals that victory over death was one of the evidences that the disciple had attained eternal life. Death came into the world as the wages of sin, and the effacement of sin must atomatically restore one to original life. Paul says plainly in Romans 5 that death reigned until Jesus, who overcame death, and that we should reign through him in eternal life

In 1 Cor. 15: 55, Paul says that the body must be saved from death, "For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality". "Then shall come to pass the saying that is written, "Death is swallowed up

in victory, 0 death, where is thy victory? 0 death, where is thy sting?" We thus see that the death which Jesus conquered, by restoring life to His body after it was killed, was bodily death. We know very little about the death of the soul, but are made tragically acquainted daily with the death of the body. So instead of accepting the death of the body as in some way under divine law, let us follow Jesus in redeeming our bodies from this Satanic disorder.

The human family devotes the never ending efforts of its wisest men, with billions and billions of their hard earned money, to the overcoming of disease, that they may save their bodies from the tomb. They bring to bear every human device to this goal yet meet defeat in the end. Then they submit to what is taught as the inevitable end of man-and call it the will of God. But Jesus the Conquerer said, "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall never see death."

The popular religious teachers of Christianity have virtually thrown up their hands in the face of the seeming insurmountable difficulties in following Jesus to the final goal of his doctrine, the attainment of eternal life. Having failed to solve the simpler problems of the cause and cure of the death of the body, they tell us that our great concern should be the salvation of our souls. Although God is emipresent and all-powerful, the conclusion is that He cannot do much for us until after we are dead. Jesus proclaimed to the Jews, who taught a future resurrection," God is not the God of the dead, but of the living." (Hatt. 22:32).

The great majority of both the secular and religious world today admit that Jesus has given us the soundest doctrine of morals ever propounded by man. Not only the moralist but the economist and scientist are quoting Jesus as the teacher of the highest principales in their special fields. Professors Eddington and Russel, both eminent scientists, are quoted by the press as saying that when we study Jesus' teaching from the viewpoint of science we become convinced that he understood light, energy, motion and space.

Tesus not only understood these finer forces of mind and body as science understands them, mechanically, but he developed his spiritual mind to a point where he could control them. The popular thought about Jesus' teaching is that it is a negative factor in the present world, and the rewards are to follow in a spiritual world. But authority for such a conclusion is not borne out by the gospels. Jesus claimed all power in heaven and in earth, and authorized his followers to go forth in his name and cast out demons, heal the sick and raise the dead. The scripture says that they did these works, and that he was with them, as he promised, "Lo, I am with you always".

The need of those who claim to represent Jesus Christ, is a greater realization of his presence and power in the world today. We talk too much about the mighty works he did in the first century and too little about what he is doing in the twentieth century. The dynamic power of the Holy Spirit imparted at Pentecost can be had by Christians everywhere if they will only follow the example of those earlithdisciples of the Master. We need more steadfastness and continuity of faith in our prayers.

The Spiritual ethers are vibrant with energies, that properly released, would give abundant life and health to all God's people. The one and only outlet for these all-potential, electronic, life-imparting vitamins existing in the billions of atoms in the cells of our bodies, is our minds. Cocalized on the Christ Mind, in prayer. Pray, believing that ye have received, and ye shall receive, is the promise of Jesus. All things for our good are already provided in the heavens, or higher real sof the mind, awaiting our realization. "Seek first the Kingdom of God and his right-cousness, and all these things shall be added unto you".

He expected those he healed to do something themselves, especially to believe that he could do it. When the two blind men came to him he said unto them, "Believe ye that I am able to do this?" They say unto him, "Yea Lord". Then touched he their eyes, saying, "According to your faith be it done unto you." And their eyes were opened. (Matt. 9: 28) To the woman who suffered for twelve years and was healed by stellthily touching the hem of his gament, he assuringly exclaimed, "Daughter, thy faith hath made thee whole". (Mk. 5:34)

Jesus exalted faith to an original creative place in man, as it is in God. Even God must have had faith in the power of his word before the universe was created. In the eleventh chapter of Hebrews we read, "By faith we understand that the worlds have been framed by the Word of God."

So we see that religion, and especially Christianity, tremendously enlarges the natural ability of man. His faith and trust in the goodness and truth of men must be broadened and deepened until he can look with the eye of faith into invisible nothingness and see it vibrant with mightiness: "have faith in God".

But religion does not rest with the development of faith alone, for beyond the scope of the natural man it opens the mind to the understanding of creative principles. Christ opened the understanding of his disciples, and all those who seek him in faith find that they are spiritually quickened, according to their capacity to receive.
