# Thanksgiving and Praise

from the writings of

CHARLES FILLMORE

SPIRITUAL FORCES work through exalted thoughts. When we give thanks to God for our blessings we naturally look up, which takes our thoughts away from the narrow self, thus opening an avenue through which the soul finds a larger field of expression. Giving thanks to God for our good, giving thanks for the joys of life, marshals the lethargic ideas, and there is a stirring to action of the whole man.

Therefore we increase our good tremendously by blessing and giving thanks in spirit. To bring about this good efficiently we must understand the law that bestows upon us this quickening spiritual power of multiplication.

Gratitude even on the mental plane is a great magnet, and when gratitude is expressed from the spiritual standpoint it is powerfully augmented. The custom of saying grace at the table has its origin in man's attempt to use this power of increase.

A woman who had been left with a large family and no visible means of support related in an "experience" meeting how wonderfully this law had worked in providing food for her children. In her extremity she had asked the advice of one who understood the law, and she had been told to thank God silently for abundant supply upon her table, regardless of appearances. She and her children began doing this, and in a short time the increase of food was so great at times that it astonished them. Her grocer's bill was met promptly, and in most marvelous ways the family were supplied with food. Never after that time did they lack.

In Spirit all things are fulfilled now. The moment a concept enters the mind, the thing conceived is consummated through the law that governs the action of ideas. The inventor mentally sees his machine doing the work designed, though he may be years short of making it do that work. The spiritual-minded take advantage of this law and affirm the completeness of this ideal, regardless of outer appearances. This stimulates the energy in the thought process and gives it power beyond estimate. This is the step that Jesus took when He lifted up His eyes and said: "Father, I thank thee that thou heardest me. And I knew that thou hearest me always." The sleeping youth (Lazarus) does not at once respond, but the prayer of thanksgiving that is now in action gives the assurance that calls it at the next step to the surface—"Lazarus, come forth."

One of the offices of spirituality is to aggregate

divine ideas. Through this action man draws absolutely true ideas from the universal Mind. Thus prayer is cumulative. It accumulates spiritual substance, life, intelligence; it accumulates everything necessary to man's highest expression. When we pray in spiritual understanding, this highest realm of man's mind contacts universal, impersonal Mind; the very mind of God is joined to the mind of man. God answers our prayers in ideas, thoughts, words; these are translated into the outer realms, in time and condition. It is therefore important that we pray with understanding of the law, important that we always give thanks that our prayers have been answered and fulfilled, regardless of appearances. Thus, the necessity of Jesus' giving thanks when He multiplied the loaves and fishes. With understanding and realization of the relation between the idea and the fulfillment of the idea, He quickened the slow processes of nature, and the loaves and fishes were increased quickly. We may not be able to attain at once such speedy operation of the law, but we shall approximate it, and we shall accelerate natural processes as we hold our ideas nearer to the perfection of the realm of divine ideas.

Jesus recognized order as a fundamental factor in the law of increase. When He fed the multitude He made them sit down in companies. If you study the story carefully you will see that there was a great deal of preliminary preparation before the demonstration was made. There was a recognition of the seed ideas, the five loaves and two fishes. Before He broke and miraculously multiplied the loaves and fishes, He looked up to heaven and gave thanks. All

this preceded the actual appearing and appropriation of the supply. Every demonstration is based on the same law and goes through the same orderly steps.

Jesus and His disciples were on a mountain wher this great increase of substance took place, which indicates a high state of consciousness. An eminent British scientist, Sir James Jeans, says that it may be that the gods that determine our fates are our owr minds acting on our brain cells and through them on the world about us. Here is stated a profounce truth that, accepted and tested, will demonstrate supply to meet every need. Science says that we live in an invisible ether pregnant with the essence of al visible things, that this essence is wrapped up in the atom, and that it awaits an as yet undiscovered law to set it free. Jesus knew the law and through Him we may know it. In World War II science used thi power in the destructive atom bomb. Jesus used i constructively in feeding the five thousand.

In individual consciousness in all its work the AM (represented by Jesus Christ) uses the facultie of the mind. The I AM is Spirit, and it cannot move directly upon substance or formed states of consciousness. It uses the spiritual faculties as its agents The name Philip means "power," and Jesus appealed to Philip to know how these hungry "thoughts" opeople were to be fed. Jesus did this to "prove him." [See John 6:5-13.] This means that power is still under the limitations of sense. It looks upon the visible supply and judges its capacity from that viewpoint. Andrew (strength), brother of Pete (faith), has a slight perception of true supply on the seven-sense plane of consciousness (represented a

the lad with five loaves and two fishes). This is a good beginning for the I AM. If you have a consciousness of the capacity that is involved in the natural man's sevenfold nature, you have a good foundation upon which to build the twelvefold or spiritual man.

Having quickened your idea of power and strength in universal Spirit, you "sit down" or center your forces within you and begin to bless and give hanks. In divine order you make connection with the universal mother or vital energy of Being and fill your whole consciousness with vitality. The surplus energy settles back into the various centers as reserve force (the twelve baskets that remained over). Thus you learn to live by "the living bread which came down out of heaven," the very flesh or substance of eternal life.

Praise is closely related to prayer; it is one of the avenues through which spirituality expresses itself. Through an inherent law of mind, we increase whatever we praise. The whole creation responds to praise, and is glad. Animal trainers pet and reward their charges with delicacies for acts of obedience; thildren glow with joy and gladness when they are praised. Even vegetation grows best for those who praise it. We can praise our own ability, and our very brain cells will expand and increase in capacity and intelligence when we speak words of encouragement and appreciation to them.

"What is seen hath not been made out of things which appear." There is this invisible thought-stuff on which the mind acts, making things through the operation of a law not yet fully understood by man.

Every thought moves upon this invisible substance in increasing or diminishing degree. When we praise and give thanks for the richness and opulence of our God, this thought-stuff is tremendously increased in our mental atmosphere; it reflects into everything that our mind and our hands touch. When common things are impregnated with our consciousness of divine substance, they are transformed according to our ideals. Through persistent application of the Judah faculty, a failing business can be praised into a successful one. Even inanimate things seem to receive the word of praise, responding in orderly obedience when before they have seemed unmanageable.

Turn the power of praise upon whatever you wish to increase. Give thanks that it is now fulfilling your idea. The faithful law, faithfully observed, will reward you. You can praise yourself from weakness into strength, from ignorance into intelligence, from poverty into affluence, from sickness into health.

In the demonstration of abundance charge your mind with statements that express plenty. No particular affirmation will raise anyone from poverty to affluence, yet all affirmations that carry ideas of abundance will lead one into the consciousness that fulfills the law. Deny that lack has any place or reality in your thought or your affairs and affirm plenty as the only appearance. Praise and give thanks for what you have, be it ever so little, and insist that it is constantly growing larger.

Do not concentrate on debts or spoil your prayers by constantly thinking of debts. Think of that which you want to demonstrate, not that from which you seek freedom. When you pray, thank the Father for His care and guidance, for His provision and plenty, for His love and wisdom, for His infinite abundance

and your privilege to enjoy it.

You should expect prosperity when you keep the prosperity law. Therefore be thankful for every blessing that you gain and as deeply grateful for every demonstration as for an unexpected treasure dropped into your lap. This will keep your heart fresh; for true thanksgiving may be likened to rain falling upon ready soil, refreshing it and increasing its productiveness. Remember when Jesus had only a small supply He gave thanks for the little He had. This increased that little into abundance. Blessing has not lost its power since the time Jesus used it. Try it and you will prove its efficacy. The same power of multiplication is in it today. Praise and thanksgiving impart the quickening spiritual power that produces growth and increase in all things.

The prophets of old knew the power of increase inherent in thanksgiving. "Praise ye Jehovah" is repeated again and again in the Psalms, because the Psalmist knew that praise and thanksgiving divinely directed tap the mighty reservoirs of infinite Mind.

I give thanks for the Christ life and substance now apparent in my mind, body, and affairs.

It is an easy matter to give thanks for what we have already received, but it is not so easy to give thanks for what we expect to receive. However giving thanks in advance brings to pass a present expectation. Call to mind often what Jesus said about one's mental attitude in demonstrating spirituality: "All things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive." This may be rephrased in

this wise: Pray believing that you have received, and

you shall receive.

Christians who have discovered the hidden laws of the mind make it a practice to give thanks for health, for peace of mind, for all things that they desire, believing that God has given in Spirit that which is to appear in the visible.

# "If I Be Lifted Up"

ALL OF Us who sincerely try to follow the teachings of Truth, to rise above negative appearances, have times when we are overwhelmed by the magnitude of the changes required within us and the seeming impossibility of the manifestation of all the wonderful things we are told are possible to them that love God.

These times are divine opportunities for greater awakening to our true being, our Christ self, times that we can turn to advantage by turning our thoughts from appearance to eternal spiritual reality, from human habit to the acceptance of important divine truths. At the very first small sign of doubt or dismay the most essential thing we have to do is lift ourselves up in consciousness to a point where our every thought is focused on our heavenly Father and His kingdom. Even as we begin to heed the admonition "Be still, and know that I am God" we acknowledge the power that will in ways we "know not of" perfect and bless and heal.

The beloved Way-Shower gave to His followers no formula, no magical abracadabra, for finding the way to health, happiness, and abundance. Instead He taught a simple way of living, of thinking, speaking, and doing, a way that anyone who desires may follow. He tells us through the Scriptures today to know the heavenly Father, who is the source of every good thing. He tells us that health is, abundance is, joy is

because God is; that since all good has existed since the beginning of time we do not have to create it now; that this is the nature of the kingdom, which is already within us, that we need only seek it in consciousness to find it and bring it into visibility.

How did Jesus so surely know and understand this? Because He continually stayed His thoughts on God, because He lifted "his eyes to heaven," because He went up "into the mountain" to pray, because He lifted up His thoughts above all negative appearances. He rose in consciousness to that state of being where He knew that He was the Son of God, where He could actually see the kingdom as it exists and appropriate its substance sufficiently to bring it into outer manifestation.

At one time the Master asked Simon Peter, "Who say ye that I am?" and Peter answered, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." In that moment Peter beheld through uplifted faith the true identity of his teacher. This was the identity Jesus constantly claimed, not alone for Himself but for all men.

In spite of our constant tendency to claim an embodiment and environment of sickness, trouble, and unhappiness we need vigorously and persistently to affirm the real Truth concerning our nature. We need to affirm daily and hourly: "I am the Christ of God, victorious, splendid, radiant with my Father's life, the inheritor of His kingdom!"

Again and again Jesus asks us to rise in our consciousness to the realization that we are the beloved son of the Most High and to accept the sonship, which will enable us to see all the wonderful things

that are our rightful heritage: eternal life, love, joy, abundance, and well-being. When He called to the palsied man, "Arise!" He saw this man's individual consciousness lifted up to a natural state of wholeness; the man beheld his true self, his own Christ nature, and in a twinkling he received his inheritance.

When Jesus called Matthew to join Him as a disciple Matthew "arose" to the consciousness of the work he was to do as a blessed and illumined child of God. "Looking up to heaven," accepting the consciousness of the Christ, Jesus fed the five thousand with five loaves and two fishes. When He went up "into the mountain" He healed multitudes of lame, blind, dumb, and maimed. When He "departed into the mountain to pray" He received through the affirmation of His divine sonship all the wisdom and courage He needed to carry on His appointed work.

Among the Master's most often repeated instructions was "Seek ye . . . his kingdom"! In addition He tells us this kingdom is "within" and that He (the Christ) is the "door" by which we may enter. It is evident then that before we attempt to secure anything—be it health or well-being or success or happiness—we must seek the kingdom by means of a lifting up of our own individual consciousness, a finding of our inherent Christ nature. Only then will all the glorious things be visibly added. Only then shall we truly recognize the omnipotence and omnipresence of the heavenly kingdom. Having put on the sonship, all that is good will, according to the divine law, automatically and substantially be manifested as ours in every way.

We have all known times of conscious uplift-

ment, times when we recognized and accepted a part of the divine nature of All-Good, God, as an actual reality within our life; when the very sunlight and air filled us with a fresh, new fullness of life; when our surroundings inspired us by their seeming new beauty and deeper meaning; when we seemed blessed with an assurance of infinite supply and security; when a glance of peace or understanding or compassion in another person's eyes filled our heart with love, a knowledge of the nearness of the one infinite Presence.

These precious moments are not hard to find if we will but take a little time to contemplate the nature of the Father, and of the beloved Son, who said, "These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be made full." The more willing we become to give up excessive talking and acting the more willing we become to accept simply and trustingly the promises of the Master, the more we listen for the spirit of His words, the more often and more clearly we shall hear the wonderful message of the Christ and be lifted up within our own consciousness.

We know little about the lives of the apostles before they were called by the Master, but they must have been aware of similar moments of inspiration, and within their hearts there must have existed a burning desire to know more of the nature of the heavenly Father and the true nature of His children. They must have rejoiced in their recognition of the Christ within the man Jesus and in giving up all to follow Him, in spending days and months learning at His side, in attending hour by hour to His words of

wisdom. Yet in spite of their great enthusiasm and earnestness, in spite of their witnessing the performance of miracle upon miracle, their faith and love occasionally faltered and failed. Therefore we of today can take heart and know that regardless of false appearance, of trials and setbacks, of periods of discouragement and bewilderment, again and again the beloved Way-Shower will beckon us on, helping us to keep going onward and upward, revealing more and more of His wisdom and love until we come into a full realization not only of His bright Christ spirit but of that which already dwells within our very own being.

Jesus was often asked "Who art thou?" by those who could not find it in their heart to believe that He was the Son of God. To the Pharisees He replied, "When ye have lifted up the Son of man, then shall ye know that I am he," and thereupon "many believed on him." Just as He asked His followers of that day to lift up the Christ in man, so He asks us today, if we would believe and follow Him, to lift up our thoughts to the spiritual consciousness where we see and recognize and accept the Truth of Being, the heavenly kingdom, which is man's divine inheritance. At that time we shall "see him even as he is," we shall see the same Christ within ourselves, and we shall behold it within all men.

In ways we know not of we begin to be transformed by the acceptance of this spiritual nature. When Jesus blessed the woman accused of adultery no one recognized her as the one they had a few moments before wanted to condemn and stone. As we "put on the new man," accept our divine identity, all

false, undesirable appearances heretofore accepted as real begin to fade and disappear in the light of divine reality.

When Jesus restored the sight of the beggar blind since birth the people found it difficult to recognize the beggar as the same man they had known, and they asked among themselves, "Is not this he that sat and begged? Others said, It is he: others said, No, but he is like him." The Pharisees tried repeatedly to discover the secret of this transforming power. Persistently they asked: "How then were thine eyes opened?" "Where is he?" "What sayest thou of him, in that he opened thine eyes?" "Is this your son . . . how then doth he now see?" "What did he to thee? how opened he thine eyes?"

All these questions brought the Pharisees only greater confusion and a greater desire to condemn Jesus for His ability to perform such miracles. The only way they could find the answer to the questions was to look within their own heart, to discover their own individual Christ nature, and no amount of outer seeking could acquaint them with the Truth they desired to know. So it is necessary for us today only to acquaint ourselves with the Christ within, to follow simply in the footsteps of the Master, to be willing to listen to Him, to learn from Him. "Thou art the life within me, O Christ. Thou art Thyself the answer to all my questions."

We are told that just before the Crucifixion Jesus took Peter and James and John with Him "up into a high mountain apart" (into a state of oneness with His Father) and there He was "transfigured before them; and his face did shine as the sun, and his gar-

ments became white as the light. And behold, there appeared unto them Moses and Elijah talking with him."

Impetuous Peter, believing it the greatest and highest tribute he and his friends could pay to the Father, eagerly suggested that three tabernacles be built: "one for thee [Jesus], and one for Moses, and one for Elijah." Imagine his consternation when an immediate and unexpected reply came as he was "yet speaking," saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him."

It is not important in what manner the "voice" spoke to the apostles nor that it came forth "out of the cloud," but the message itself was vitally important, and the three apostles must have recognized it as such, for "they fell on their face, and were sore afraid." Only when Jesus reassured them, "Arise, and be not afraid," did their courage return, "and lifting up their eyes, they saw no one, save Jesus only."

This then was the message direct from the Father to Peter, James, and John (faith, judgment, and love): "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him." Above all else, above every other thing in all the world, above every other person or teaching, above every other word or act or appearance "hear ye him"! This is the consciousness into which we are called now. "Awake, thou that sleepest . . . and Christ shall shine upon thee." This is the consciousness to which we must arise, the state of being into which we must be lifted up in thought in order that we may behold the kingdom.

The Christ consciousness exists within you and me awaiting our ascending into the "mountain," the

high consciousness of prayer and thanksgiving. Like Peter and James and John, we too in moments of fear and discouragement may hear the Master's voice saying, "Arise, and be not afraid," and lifting our eyes we shall see only Him. He is the only way, the only Truth, and the only life; and it is a joyful, vibrant, and abundant way, Truth, and life, one of constantly awakening wisdom and happiness.

Let us turn from all human questioning, all outer confusion, to the quiet and calm assurance of the Christ self within, the self that from the very beginning has existed within as our true being, forever courageous, joyous, wise, and loving. Here we shall find divine reality, the heavenly kingdom; and while our attention is on it all things shall be made new, all negation dissolved, all perfection made visible.

"And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw

all men unto myself."

# Prayer and Patience

THE AUTHOR knows of a small boy who is inclined to be somewhat impatient, and when he asks his generous and loving parents for something he sometimes appends to his request the words "And I want it right now!" But he does not always have his childish requests promptly acceded to by his father or mother; they gently advise him to have patience; and if his request has been a reasonable one, he eventually gets what he asked for or is told why it could not be given him.

"Pray and be patient" was a wise bit of advice given me by a minister some years ago. I have tried to follow that excellent bit of advice and have been made happy by the results. Yet at times our prayers have been answered with almost startling promptness. However our Father knows what is best for us, and He will answer our prayers in His own good time, and according to His wise and benevolent judgment. And perhaps in an unexpected manner. But we must work as well as pray for the grati-

But we must work as well as pray for the gratification of our needs, using our God-given talents for that purpose. In the Epistle of James we find recorded these wise words: "Yea, a man will say, Thou hast faith, and I have works: show me thy faith apart from thy works, and I by my works will show thee my faith." A small but religious and energetic neighbor of ours, engaged in clearing the lot back of his new cottage, came upon a huge boulder,

and a friend said to him: "How do you propose to get rid of that big thing? It is too big for you to tackle." The little man smilingly replied, "I'll get rid of it by prayer and faith and hard work." With a sledge and a stonecuttter's chisel he then set to work to break up the boulder. Seeing him swing the heavy sledge, friends of his came to his assistance, and soon the huge rock was in fragments. A new neighbor, building a cellar and seeing the rock, bought it and had it removed to his own property. Had the little man said, "I will ask God to take the boulder away," and then expected God to work a miracle on his behalf, he may have been disappointed. But in faith he prayed and worked; the difficult job was done, and now grass grows where the boulder once stood.

Most of the Master's miracles of healing were almost instantaneous, but when He gave sight to the blind beggar, the miracle did not take place immediately. First Jesus anointed the poor man's eyes with clay, and then He said to him, "Go, wash in the Pool of Siloam." The man did so, and he came back with his sight. Not all prayers for healing are immediately answered. Neither are prayers for other things always met with an immediate response. We all must learn to pray and have patience; God is not to be hurried; He will answer our prayers of faith in His own good time, when we work for the consummation of our good desires.

The Christian farmer prays that he may have good crops, but he must work toward that end. The Christian businessman prays that his business may prosper, but he must work toward that end. The

Christian physician prays as well as works for the recovery of his patients. In due time the crops will come to maturity, the business will flourish, and the patients will recover.

The Psalmist wrote of Jehovah, "No good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly." We walk uprightly in the sight of God when we walk as Christ, our great teacher, instructed us to walk, loving one another and serving one another, even as He loved and served. God responds to the prayers of all such Christians.

God gave certain gifts or talents to each one of us. There is not a child of God that has not some talent, and God expects us with His aid to make use of those talents to bring our prayers to fruition. If He helped the shiftless and indolent He would be putting a premium on laziness. We must work and pray and have faith if we would have our prayers answered, and we must patiently await the answer to our prayers.

Not always are our prayers answered in the manner we expect them to be answered.

"God moves in a mysterious way

His wonders to perform."

The English essayist Joseph Addison wrote, "Our real blessings often appear to us in the shape of pains, losses, and disappointments; but let us have patience, and we soon shall see them in their proper figures." Even so it is with God's answers to our prayers; for at times He supplies us with something that better serves the end or purpose we would advance than the actual thing for which we prayed. We must industriously use that which God sends us even

though we do not immediately comprehend its value and purpose, and we must patiently await its development. On this we may depend: if we have prayed in faith for that which is good, our prayer will be granted in one way or another, although perhaps not in the way we had anticipated.

In faith we sow the seeds of prayer in the everfertile medium or element of Spirit, and in due time we shall see those seeds grow and bear fruit. In the 6th chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Galatians we find these words: "For he that soweth unto his own flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth unto the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap eternal life. And let us not be weary in well-doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." So let us sow our prayer seeds and look to God for their growth and fruitage, exercising patience, and then we shall reap the reward.

In faith we pray for material prosperity, and in faith we work for it, and sooner or later it comes our way. Again in faith we pray for renewed health and strength, and if we work spiritually and physically to keep our body fit, living a temperate and sober and useful life, an increase of health and strength will flow into our being in due time.

Jesus healed a man who had been sick of an infirmity for many years. He lay with many others near the Pool of Bethesda, where many went for healing. Jesus said to this man: "Wouldest thou be made whole? The sick man answered him, Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool: but while I am coming, another steppeth down before me. Jesus saith unto him, Arise, take up thy

bed, and walk. And straightway the man was made whole, and took up his bed and walked." A short time thereafter Jesus again met the man in the temple, and He said to him, "Behold, thou art made whole: sin no more, lest a worse thing befall thee."

Now we do not know what sin it was that had laid the sick man on his back, but Jesus knew. So when we pray for deliverance from an evil that is the result of a sin, be it the sin of intemperance or of gluttony or of lustful living, we must refrain from indulgence in these things, we must work with God to effect our own cure or else abide by the consequences.

We will work as well as pray for what we want; we will do only that which is good; then our prayers of faith will be answered by the All-Father, who withholds nothing that is good from His children, if they will but be patient.

God teach us to pray. God help us to work. God help us to have patience.

# Discovering New Blessings

HILE COUNTING our blessings this Thanksgiving season it would be interesting to consider the debt of gratitude that we owe to discoverers, those intrepid ones who step out of the rut of precedence in pursuit of truth, not only in the realm of nature but also in the mental and spiritual realms.

We owe a great debt of gratitude to Christopher Columbus who was among the foremost in the ranks of those who were willing to make sacrifices in order to prove a scientific theory. He talked of a short route to India and wanted to prove that the earth is round. The idea of a flat earth was bred of superstition and ignorance. Columbus weakened the idea and so freed men's minds from the fears and limitations attendant upon it. Many others, like Columbus, have penetrated the realm of natural law and delivered innumerable blessings to us through discovering the laws governing electricity, gravitation, buoyancy, sound, light, and other natural phenomena too numerous to mention here. Let us give thanks for them!

Today many discoverers are working in the mental realm. One of them has said: "Every man has within himself a continent of undiscovered riches. Happy is he who acts as Columbus to his own soul!" For centuries philosophers and, more recently, psychologists have been revealing the marvels of the mental realm. They have proved that it operates under definite laws that are closely correlated with the laws governing the physical realm. These discoverers have proved beyond the shadow of a doubt the influence of mind over matter. Even medical science has developed a branch known as psychosomatics. The word explains itself: psyche is Greek for soul or mind and soma is Greek for body. In the practice of psychosomatics various physical ailments are traced to mental causes and the endeavor is made to cure the condition in mind. What metaphysics has always known medical science is now beginning to admit. Through the work of these discoverers we have a better understanding of the influence of the mind over the body; we see more plainly why prayer produces results and our faith is deepened.

Our most heartfelt thanks goes to all discoverers in the spiritual realm. Throughout the ages these spiritually illumined souls have been the greatest benefactors mankind has known. While science was still in the dark ages, philosophy halting and oftentimes badly warped, and psychology (as a science) still unknown, these discoverers in the spiritual realm brought to man the high vision that gave him hope, courage, and steadfastness in the right; they kept faith in God and goodness alive in the heart of man.

Jesus was the greatest of all discoverers in the spiritual realm. He had discovered God and His own divinity. He had discovered that God is life itself and that the only workable law of life is love. He brought this discovery to us over nineteen hundred years ago, and we are only just beginning to understand it; only just beginning to show evidences of being willing to act upon it. In the turmoil in the world today we are

seeing the usual procedure when any tremendous change in world consciousness is taking place. The old never passes away without a struggle; the new has to struggle valiantly for its very existence. Once recognized, it has a longer struggle ahead to make its influence appreciably felt. The Golden Rule, revealed as the only workable law of life, has at last been accepted by enough right-thinking people to become recognized by the world at large. Now the great struggle is on to make it an important influence in world affairs. The Golden Rule and other spiritual revelations are the hope of the world. Let us give thanks for all discoverers in the realm of spirit!

Discoveries in all three realms—physical, mental, and spiritual—are interrelated. Acceptance of a spiritual Truth without understanding how to operate in accordance with it breeds trouble mentally and difficulty in the realm of everyday affairs. For instance, we accept the spiritual discovery that God is life, but if we do not know how to operate in harmony with it mentally we do not benefit by it. If we keep on thinking and talking about disease and symptoms of disease, bemoaning our ill-health and relating our symptoms, we shall keep on having physical difficulties even though we have accepted the discovery that God is life. We must act mentally in harmony with this spiritual Truth if we would have physical results.

If we accept the spiritual discovery that God is love, but continue to think ugly thoughts about our family, our friends, and people in general, we shall see ugliness outpictured in some form or other in our circumstances. In order to benefit in our daily life by

any of these spiritual Truths we must make use of the discovery that whatever is held in mind must eventually become manifest in the realm of form. The spiritual idea avails us little unless we are willing to keep our thoughts in line with it. The spiritual idea held in thought becomes a part of our physical existence: Spirit, thought, matter is the logical sequence of bringing our good from the invisible realm of mind into the visible realm of form.

Jesus also revealed to us a great discoverer that dwells within every one of us, the Spirit of truth, which He said would call to our remembrance all the wonders that He revealed. When we are receptive to this great discoverer within us we find spiritual joy in homely, simple things; we become thankful for much that is ordinarily taken for granted.

"Thank Thee for love and light and air,
For children's faces, keenly fair;
For the wonderful joy of perfect rest
When the sun's wick lowers in the West.
For huddling hills in gowns of snow
Warming themselves in the afterglow;
For Thy mighty wings that are never furled,
Bearing onward the rushing world,
Thank Thee, O Giver of Life, O God!"

The potency of praise is another spiritual discovery. Praise is the key that unlocks the door of consciousness to the invisible Presence that can save us from any worldly difficulty. The story of Paul and Silas in jail in Macedonia is a striking illustration of the way a praiseful state of mind can triumph over environmental conditions. They had been lashed, chained, and thrown into jail, yet they sang hymns of

praise! Spite had jailed them and bitterness and revenge in their own hearts would have kept them there. But praise, inner joy bred of faith in God and Jesus Christ, liberated them.

Both Paul and Silas had a mental conception of inner divinity, Christ in them, their hope of glory. To this clear vision they added their heartfelt praise and so were in a state of consciousness where both mind and heart acknowledged the presence of God as the Christ glory within them and all around them. They were feeling the joy of spirit that brings an inner peace and calms all outer storms: "in thy presence is the fulness of joy." They had attained a spiritual height and were able to hold it successfully against the enemies of fear, hate, and suffering. They were in authority over their thoughts; they lifted them praisefully to the truth that they lived and moved and had their being in God's protecting presence; and the presence in which they placed their faith moved in strange and awesome ways to deliver them. God works for us today just as powerfully and sometimes as mysteriously as He worked for Paul and Silas.

The discovery of being needed is another spiritual blessing. One of the saddest things in the world is to feel that nobody needs us. Emerson says that we need to be needed! Thankfulness for being needed can transmute a man's burden of providing for his family or a woman's burden of endless housekeeping details into precious responsibilities—proofs of being needed. Today, as never before, we are all needed in this work of rehabilitation which is going on all over the world. This is our divine opportunity to use all the new blessings we have discovered in behalf of those

who need our help. Our own Thanksgiving will be enriched as we bring cause for thankfulness into other lives.

"Thank Thee because I may my brother feed,

Thus, for my own and for my brother's sake—
Thank Thee I am awake!"

By using faith we make it a living part of ourselves. As we see more and more how our faith works we are eager to apply it to every situation. His faith was so firm and steadfast that even before He uttered the word of prayer the desired good came into manifestation.

## Dignity in Daily Living

He has made everything beautiful in its time. Behold, this only have I found: that God made man upright; but they have sought out many inventions.

NE OF THE most noticeable things about Jesus was the great dignity and graciousness He showed in His daily living. Every picture we have of Him is one of calm assurance, serenity, tenderness, compassion, selflessness, consideration for "the other fellow," courage, and strength. He never lost sight of the dignity and purpose of life. One cannot imagine Jesus ever being hurried, confused, irritated, impatient, or befuddled by indecision or mental conflict. Even in the only recorded display of His anger, when driving the money-changers out of the Temple, we get a picture of His majesty and the feeling of a great cleansing and purifying of the atmosphere around Him. At another time, when Jesus knew in His heart that His friend Lazarus was dead, He did not hurry or become upset, but we read that "he abode at that time two days in the place where he was." His confidence and faith in the Father's power never deserted Him. This was the secret of His strength and serenity.

How much we may learn from Him of the dignity and graciousness of daily living! Too many human beings live a mentally cluttered, confused, tense life, filled with petty trifles and a straining after false values. If on taking time off for a little self-analysis you find that you are in danger of becoming one of these persons, just pause and ask yourself if it was for this that the Father of Jesus, your Father, created you. Jesus had much more reason to become confused, irritated, tense, and depressed than either you or I can ever have. Thousands of sick, importuning, hungry people followed Him wherever He went. His time was never His own. In addition to this the scribes and the Pharisees were ever at His elbow with their condemnation and their trap-setting. Even His beloved apostles, whom He patiently taught day by day, disappointed Him at times and were not able to live up to His teachings. Yet He walked—not ran!—through the days with love and graciousness.

We are all familiar with the Biblical story of the two sisters Martha and Mary. We remember how Martha was "cumbered about much serving," when Jesus was visiting them one time, but Mary sat at the feet of Jesus drinking in His words. Martha expostulated with the Master, asking Him to send Mary in to help her with the work, but Jesus answered her, "Martha, Martha, thou art anxious and troubled about many things: but one thing is needful: and Mary hath chosen the good part, which shall not be taken away from her." Surely by "the good part" Jesus meant a deep desire for spiritual growth, for an understanding of spiritual and eternal values, a desire to live each day at its highest and best.

God created man "a little lower than the angels"; He has given him the gift of life to mold in any way he chooses. Life may be lived insignificantly, hurriedly, in confusion, the days filled with unimportant trifles, unsatisfying pleasures, and work that is unproductive of real and lasting value. Man may run from one appointment to another, one party to another; he may become irritated and impatient and tire himself out with useless fretting and become exhausted with what he calls the "strain" of living. However when a man does this it is time for him to draw back and take a look at himself.

Why is it that an artist will step back from his easel to take a fresh look at his painting, a man will climb a tree to get his bearings when lost in the woods? Because he needs to get a better perspective, a truer picture of what he is doing, of where he is going. Many people's new-year resolutions do the same thing for them when the resolutions are made in earnest. They step back and take a look at themselves and at what they have accomplished or failed to accomplish in the old year, and from this they draw up a fresh blueprint, as it were, resolving to do better in the new year at hand. Each day, each moment may be a new beginning in spiritual growth. Spiritual man is not concerned with man-made calendars, for he has all eternity in which to learn.

In his essay "Spiritual Laws" Emerson writes this deep truth: "Real action is in silent moments. The epochs of our life are not in the visible facts of our choice of a calling, our marriage, our acquisition of an office, and the like, but in a silent thought by the way-side as we walk; in a thought which revises our entire manner of life and says, "Thus hast thou done, but it were better thus." . . . This revisal or correction is a constant force, which, as a tendency, reaches through our life-time."

Each time we say to ourselves, "Thus hast thou done, but it were better thus," exchanging a bad habit for a good one, a negative attitude for a positive one, an inclination to be impatient and irritable for a determination to be patient and loving and understanding; each time we replace our hurried, confused thoughts with the serene, peace-filled thoughts of the Christ mind, ever waiting to express poise and serenity through us; each time we raise our sense of values, measuring them not by the yardstick of the world, of the "Joneses," but by the yardstick of Spirit and of infinite wisdom and intelligence; each time we do this we are dignifying and glorifying our daily living, and we are following the example of the Master.

Life lived hand in hand with God can never be cluttered, hurried, or confused. An awareness of the presence of God and a remembrance of the promise of the Christ, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world," will smooth out the rough places, put dignity into the most commonplace tasks, and will shine through that moment of irritation or anger, that fit of depression, that mental conflict. Let God's healing peace flow through every moment of every day. The first thing every morning promise yourself: "This day I will not be hurried or confused. This day I will live hand in hand with God in dignity and graciousness. I claim the peace and serenity of the Christ within. This peace is now established in my consciousness. I give myself time to look for and see God's purpose for me, and I consciously co-operate with this purpose. 'Greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world."

Balzac long ago wrote, "To live in the presence

of great truths and eternal laws—that is what keeps a man patient when the world ignores him and calm and unspoiled when the world praises him." And Glenn Clark, a contemporary writer, declares: "Happy is he who can carry great quiet spaces with him wherever he goes. These quiet spaces are the best shock absorbers in times of hurry and bustle and confusion. They are reservoirs of power in the dreary deserts of life. . . . They are little spots of heaven that carry a glory and radiance with one all day long."

So right now, this day, let us determine to live life graciously and with dignity, not with the pompous dignity of the world but with the peace-filled dignity of Spirit. Let us test our standards of living and our sense of values and see if they will stand the searching, radiant light of the ever-present Christ. Then let us surrender these standards of living and these values and all the hurried moments to the Spirit of peace to be raised and purified and calmed and dig-

nified.

Dear Father, I now turn all the hurry, bustle, and confusion in my life over to Thee. I surrender all the little irritations, the petty trifles, the foolish worries. Fill my mind and heart with Thy peace and serenity, Thy dignity and graciousness, now and evermore, in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

Habakkuk is you and I struggling against the seeming odds of fate, beholding God as All-Good, but unable to incorporate All-Good into our life. The circumstances in which we find ourselves enmeshed are too much for our finite understanding, and certainly too difficult for us to solve triumphantly alone.

What shall we do about it? What did Habakkuk do? "I will stand upon my watch, and set me upon the tower, and will look forth to see what he will speak with me, and what I shall answer concerning

my complaint."

The tower is the high place of consciousness. The watch is meditation and the silence. Habakkuk saw the futility of the graven image—man's human, limited concept of God—and declared: "Jehovah is in his holy temple: let all the earth keep silence before him." This is the Lord of our own being, who dwells forever within our spiritual self. It is the earth that is to keep silence, the temporal things of sense.

If I wait until I am worthy and ready for this communion, I shall never have it. In the midst of the turmoil, when everything looks dark and I am utterly defeated, I am to go aside and seek the quiet place, and I am to know in spite of all the seeming that there is only the one Presence and one Power. I shall cleanse my consciousness by denying the reality of the appearance of evil, and I shall affirm only that which is pure and perfect. Then I shall wait in the silence for the "still small voice."

The answer will probably not burst upon me all at once in a vision of dazzling whiteness, such as struck Saul blind upon the road to Damascus, but it will give me the key that will unlock one by one the doors to the inner sanctuary, and one by one the mysteries will be revealed to me as I unfold in understanding.

Yes, the vision is for an appointed time. Not that God arbitrarily sets a time when He will reveal Himself to man, but that the vision will come when man is ready to receive it. Man determines the appointed time. God is ever ready and waiting. He even pushes gently at the door of our heart, but we mostly misinterpret the divine urge. "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me."

The "appointed time" is both now and the moment of realization. All that God is through all eternity is concentrated in the everlasting here and now, the solution to our problems, manifestation of our good to the degree of our recognition. God never tarries. But man's consciousness lags behind even his intellectual knowing. It is realization that is manifestation, and that is usually not instantaneous. It generally takes time for us to realize deep within our consciousness (out of which are the issues of life) that the spiritual essence, the idea, is itself the fulfillment.

Realization is the vision. "And Jehovah said unto Abram . . . Lift up now thine eyes, and look from the place where thou art, northward and southward and eastward and westward: for all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed for ever."
We may have whatever we have the capacity to visualize.

The "appointed time" is renewed from moment to moment throughout our sojourn in the realm of time and space. We are spiritual beings. Like the prodigal son, we came from the Father's house. We can catch a vision of what the Father's house is like, because we used to dwell there, and we have the remembrance of it deep within us. Our journey is back to the Father's house. It has been said that the entire teaching of Jesus has to do with the mental and spiritual evolution of man by which he is gradually weaned away from his animal state and gradually established in the state of the spiritual being that he is in reality. In other words, the journey back to the Father's house is a journey of recognition of that which eternally is.

Man is not destined to remain the kind of creature he now appears to be. Our evolution is not yet complete. We are predestined and foreordained for a vastly different form of existence than that in which we now find ourselves. The names by which we generally call it are "cosmic consciousness" or "fourth-dimensional living." We have a continuous rendezvous with destiny and at the "appointed time" we experience the vision of that which we are in reality!

In the meantime, while the vision seems to tarry, what shall we do? Wait for it in the sure knowing that it will come. This is faith, and faith is the very substance of the thing hoped for, the evidence of the thing as yet not visible.

What a glorious privilege is the silence, during

which we discipline the mind to hold the vision in faith. Habakkuk states it thus:

"Jehovah, the Lord, is my strength;
And he maketh my feet like hinds' feet,

And will make me to walk upon my high places."
Just as the hind places his two rear feet in the exact tracks made by his two front feet, and thus reaches the mountain heights in safety, so we shall reach the spiritual heights that are our destiny by dedicating our mind to the holding of divine ideas.

### The Power of Imagination

AN YOU IMAGINE THAT! Yes, our mind can imagine whatever we desire it to imagine. It can imagine the bad as well as the good, the ugly as well as the beautiful, poverty as well as prosperity, sickness as well as health.

The imagination is forever focusing an image upon the screen of the mind. An image is a picture

held in the mind.

What kind of images are you holding? Look well at the ones within your own mind, and you will know the kind of a life you are building. You can picture yourself as prince or pauper, as a beautiful princess or a poor little Cinderella. You can live in a palace or a hovel. Via the imagination you can travel to California and be home in time for lunch. Via the imagination you can soar to the heights of great achievement.

The imagination is one of the most important powers of man. Through this faculty we have the power to image the good into our life. The imagination must be used in a constructive way to create the good only. God intended this faculty of the mind to create the good, but man has used it to create evil too. "No man can serve two masters"; that is, hold thoughts of good and evil at the same time and expect good to come forth.

Every good and perfect idea comes from the

one Mind. God has given us access to its perfect ideas. We have only to tap this infinite Mind to obtain all the ideas we need; attune our mind to it and enter into perfect harmony with it. Many times we misinterpret or wrongly combine ideas and get an imperfect image. We must form our image according to the perfect pattern if we want a perfect creation.

The imagination embodies ideas in shape and substance. We might have the most perfect ideas, but without the creative power of the imagination nothing can be brought forth into manifestation. Suppose the idea of a new type of house comes into your mind. It is a perfect idea, but unless you take it and focus your faculty of imagination upon it you will never get far. No one can build or create anything without an image or plan to go by.

We are made in the image and likeness of God. Through the imagination we are able to grasp the true pattern of our divine self. Hold fast to this ideal pattern, for what you behold, that you will eventually become. See yourself as a true and perfect child of God, and you will become one. Every picture you form should be in the image and likeness of God.

Let me cite the case of a girl who was crippled but who constantly held in mind a perfect picture of herself as well and strong. While her body was deformed and she wore a heavy cast and brace, she refused to hold this picture of herself in her mind. Instead of visualizing herself as sitting in a wheel chair for the rest of her life, she pictured herself walking, running, jumping, dancing, swimming, playing ball, tennis, and golf. She studied books

and magazines on sports, exercise, and physical culture. She made a "treasure map," pasting on it pictures of all that she wanted to be and do. She affirmed the truth of her God self. Ultimately her body outpictured the health that she imaged for it, and today she is active in Truth work.

Go to the Father in silent prayer in the recesses of your own soul, and let Him reveal to you the ideas that are for you to use. Then turn on the power of imagination and create a perfect picture of that which you desire to see made manifest. Keep this image before you until it brings forth the ideal creation.

"Thou shalt not make unto thee a graven image." I wonder how many of us realize that every time we hold a mental picture of sin, sickness, poverty, hate, fear, or other negative condition we are making for ourselves a "graven image," worshiping a false god. Of course none of us want these negative conditions in our life. Therefore we must change our thinking and hold perfect images.

How much better it is to image yourself as well, strong, and youthful than as sickly and getting old. How much better it is to image yourself as successful and prosperous, with plenty of money to pay all your bills, than as poor and worried about paying the landlord when he comes for the rent. It is much better to image yourself as living in love and surrounded by harmonious conditions than as surrounded by discord and hate. It takes no more energy to picture the good, and you will get a great deal more enjoyment out of life by thinking of the good things that you know are coming your way.

We are masters of our fate when we hold steadfastly to the ideal image of the good we desire to see come forth. Hold this image of the good in your mind until it becomes an established fact throughout your whole being.

Fear, worry, and anxiety have no place in a well-balanced life. When we allow the imagination to run riot it often conjures up all kinds of fearful images. These negative images must be cast out. When an image has become fixed in the subconscious mind it is hard to get rid of. Destroy the imperfect image. Deny that it has any power over you. No negative mental image can have power over you unless you give it power.

There are people who imagine that they have all sorts of ailments, from measles to cancer. I know a doctor who said that "imaginitis" is all that ails these patients. As long as they continue to hold before them these images of sickness and disease and imperfection they can never expect to have perfect health. Whatever we hold in the mind will sooner or later become manifest for us. So why not hold the kind of pictures that we want to see exemplified in our life? I have known of diseases and infirmities that have been harbored over years, when a new thought image would have erased the old negative condition from the body!

We often install false images into the minds of children. How many times have we heard parents say, "Be careful or you'll fall," "Watch your step or you'll hurt yourself," and very often the child images the suggestion and hurts himself. We expect our children to have the measles and all the other

diseases, and they do. Our mental images of fear and sickness are impressed upon the mind of the child, and he takes on the condition we see him in. I know a child brought up on fear who lived a miserable young life. Years later through the study of Truth she was able to free herself from the bonds of negative fear images formed in childhood.

Much time is wasted when we allow the mind to wander from one image to another. Idle day-dreaming is not using the imagination in a constructive way. Everyone should have a purpose in life and then hold steadfastly to the perfect idea of this purpose. No person can get very far if one day he pictures himself as a lawyer and the next day as an artist.

I know a woman who had little material wealth, but she desired the better things of life, so she imaged them. She pictured herself as being the best-dressed woman, living in a beautiful modern home, traveling over the country in airplanes and deluxe trains, owning her own car, and doing work that she knew she was best fitted for. Everything that she pictured finally came into her life, because she was true and faithful in holding to the perfect image of what she wanted.

Imagination is able to build character, for the right image held in mind will erase any bad habit. The thief who will hold a picture of himself as an honest man cannot help but become honest. The liar who holds the image of truth before him will become truthful. The lazy person who holds in mind a picture of success will become successful.

Do you picture yourself as getting old, feeble,

and bent over, or do you picture yourself as young, vital, and energetic, filled with the zest for living? Many times we find ourselves in the company of people who are always expressing some negative idea, which if we are not on the alert will instill in our mind a picture that we do not want to entertain. Are you living with a person who every time he gets up out of a chair says, "Oh, I'm so stiff and lame, I must be getting old"? Watch your thinking and see that you do not form images that represent your body as lame and stiff.

The body is being constantly renewed and should never grow old. It never will grow old if we hold the right thought images. But instead of beholding a perfect image of a perfect body filled with youth and vigor we imagine that we are getting old, because we have passed the half-century mark in years, we think it is about time we took on weakness and old age. Our body is a willing servant, but we must feed it with nutritious thoughts of life and health and youth.

In his book Christian Healing Charles Fillmore says, "What a man imagines he can do, that he can do." Nothing is impossible to the man of imagination. Whatever we wish to do we must first image. The man who desires to build a house must first image it, first mentally draw the plans. The artist must first image the picture he is about to paint. The man who desires to be a success in business must first image himself as successful.

Every negative image can be erased from the mind by putting in its place a positive, constructive one. If you have been holding the image of sickness

and old age in your mind you must change that image by affirming, "I am well and strong and youthful." If you have been holding the thought that you are poor and a failure you must change this by affirming, "I am rich and successful in all that I do."

"Be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind." Through developing a new mental image and holding it steadily and unwaveringly before our mind we renew our mind. As we behold this new image the old false thoughts will fade away

into nothingness.

"Have this mind in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." Jesus held in His mind the perfect image of Himself as the Son of God. He thought Godlike thoughts, casting out of His mind all false images. If Jesus had not kept before Himself the idea of the perfect God self He never could have accomplished what He did. We too can do the same things and even "greater works than these" if we keep our mind filled with the perfect image of good.

## A Prayer Answered

SPLENDID article by R. H. Grenville in Weekly Unity of February 6, 1949, reminded me very I forcibly of my own experience when I began the study of Unity. Mrs. Grenville states:

"When we pray for guidance we are really asking for directions, for instruction, for a formula. Our very asking implies that we mean to do something ourselves. Then how is it that we so often overlook the very first essential, that of listening to what God has to say?"

My experience attests to the truth of that statement and the glorious reward that comes from not only listening but—in my case—from promptly act-

ing upon what God has to say.

Some years ago a situation arose that seemed to indicate that we had outgrown our living quarters. Besides, what had been a quiet, homelike environment had become almost overnight a seething, noisy business center.

We were renting, and with the ever-increasing activities and hubbub, I could not stifle my longing for a little place we could call our own, where we could live—and sleep!—undisturbed. But no matter how I approached the problem it seemed impossible of fulfillment. While our income was sufficient to cover our ordinary needs it did not permit of purchasing a home or even of a down payment on one.

As I look back now I can see so clearly that my

energy was consumed in worrying about rather than in listening for the solution of the problem.

One morning while I was in the midst of a frenzied flurry of cleaning my apartment this realization came to me. I felt prompted to put away my vacuum sweeper and dust cloths. Without my usual qualms about work unfinished I settled quietly in a chair, affirming, "God guides me in all that I think and do." Completely relaxed, I then closed my eyes and remained for some time "listening."

When I arose I could not say that I had an answer to my problem. On the contrary I did a seemingly irrelevant thing. I decided to telephone to a girlhood friend. I had not kept in touch with her and could not even recall her married name. I had heard it once, but it was an unusual foreign name, so I resumed my work and dismissed from my mind the idea of telephoning. When I had given up all effort to remember it the name literally flashed into my consciousness!

The impulse to telephone became very strong again, so I immediately went to the telephone and reached my friend. In the course of our conversation I mentioned our need, made more urgent because of the illness in our home. She told me that a house near her had just been repossessed by the bank; but she knew none of the particulars. This seemed beyond my wildest hopes, because she lived in a beautiful residential section of the city.

The need for immediate action goaded me on once more. I told her I would check into the matter without delay. I hastened to the bank and learned that the key had been turned in about two hours previously.

I explained to the bank representative our great need and asked if I might take the key to look at the bungalow and show it to my husband. He told me quite frankly that the purpose of the bank was to sell all the houses on which they had foreclosed the mortgage; that the bank had never rented such properties, nor did they have the desire or facilities for handling rentals. Besides, he stated, he had already ordered painters to get to work immediately and put the property in condition for sale. He said I might have the key to inspect the property but asked me to return it immediately if upon reaching the place the painters had begun their work.

To hold the key in my hand at all seemed wonderful! I lost no time in getting out to the bungalow with my husband, whom I picked up at his office.

Oh, the wonder of that little house, its sleepy, sunny garden redolent of the perfume of flowers. It had then and still has a real personality. I saw its effect on my husband as he said, "It is wonderful."

When I returned to the bank I told the representative how we loved the little place and that, if permitted to rent it, we would restore it to as perfect condition as our combined efforts could achieve. "Just think," I said. "You can forget the painters, who have not yet begun their work; we will paint it. Forget the tangled garden and shrubs; we will prune and care for them. Forget the broken plaster; we will fix it: oh, I simply cannot return the key."

Strangely enough, while promising all this I did not ask for any protection against a possible purchaser when our work should be completed. My faith

seemed to tell me everything would be all right.

Well, it took some effort on the part of the bank representative to convince other board members that it was a feasible transaction. But he did. He stated that it would be profitable to be relieved of timeconsuming conferences about materials and labor and such matters and that the deal looked all right.

We were given a verbal lease until such time as we could talk of buying. Not a paper was prepared for us to sign. We gave our word. The bank gave theirs. After all, is there anything more binding than one's word? And in tribute to that bank let me say that they more than kept their bargain.

As the property took on its original beauty, and as houses became more scarce, real-estate agents would importune the bank to sell to one of their many applicants. Apparently all realtors had lists from the various banks of homes on which mortgages had been foreclosed. But we were assured by the bank that we should not be disturbed; nor were we.

Finally the point was reached where ours was practically the last unsold foreclosure. We went to the bank with our small down payment—we had not been able to save the customary initial payment; and if it had not proved adequate we had intended to release the bank from the entire transaction.

But they increased our inner stature immeasurably by explaining to us that actually our proffered down payment represented much more than the amount tendered, since it had not been necessary to deal through a real-estate agency. Therefore we might consider the item of commission as increasing the total of our payment. Also they stated that the work we had done would have cost the bank many times more

than it had cost us to do it personally. Best of all, they stated that they now had a sound, rehabilitated security for their loan on the property, which loan they permitted us to assume in connection with our installment purchase.

INTERNATIONAL SUBJECT—God Comforts His People.—Isa. 40:27-31; 41:10-13; 61:1-3.

27. Why sayest thou, O Jacob, and speakest, O Israel, My way is hid from Jehovah, and the justice due to me is

passed away from my God?

28. Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard? The everlasting God, Jehovah, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary; there is no searching of his understanding.

29. He giveth power to the faint; and to him that hath

no might he increaseth strength.

30. Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the

young men shall utterly fall:

- 31. But they that wait for Jehovah shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; they shall walk, and not faint.

SILENT PRAYER—I wait upon God, and the strength that I confidently expect rises within me unabated.

That we do not always receive from God the help that we expect is due to our misconception of the nature of God and of spiritual help. Our relation to God is not that of one person to another, nor is the help that God gives comparable to the help that we may receive from a friend or neighbor. God's help is an inner enabling, and God's presence is an inner quickening of all our faculties and powers to the point of ready accomplishing on our part. God within me is my God, and no other can save me or

do me justice. "The Creator of the ends of the earth" creates within me a clean heart, and renews a right spirit within me, and this creation recreates me in the divine image and likeness, so that I become a son of God and heir of all Godlike qualities.

My way is "hid from Jehovah" only as my thoughts and actions are ungodlike. The right way lies clear and open before us. As we wait upon God for guidance, we may recall the words of the prophet Zechariah: "These are the things that ye shall do: Speak ye every man the truth with his neighbor; execute the judgment of truth and peace in your gates; and let none of you devise evil in your hearts against his neighbor; and love no false oath . . . therefore love truth and peace." Truth is emphasized, and the first duty we have is to be true in ourselves. We are to root out all deceit, all false thinking and speaking, deny all habits that involve plotting and insincerity. We are to wait upon the God of Truth. Our strength is in truthfulness and sincerity, and not otherwise. Lacking this quality "even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall." It takes character and a foundation of integrity to enable anyone to stand upright regardless of circumstances. Given these, we renew our strength, and we rise in thought to God, as the eagle rises on mighty wings into the upper air.

The God-directed person is not weary of well-doing and does not become discouraged. His daily way of life shows no sign of weakened faith, for he ever sustains himself by resting quietly in thought on "the everlasting God, Jehovah." The Infinite is not exhausted by probing. "There is no searching

of his understanding."

We cannot define God in limited terms, but we can trust the limitless, the undefined. This attitude is our open-sesame to the Infinite. Until we trust we make no headway. Trustfulness starts us upward toward the heights. It infuses the Spirit of Jehovah in us, so that we can do the works of God in the measure of our strength and intelligence. Whether it is the work of preaching good tidings, of binding up the brokenhearted, of proclaiming liberty to the captives or opening the prison to the bound, of proclaiming the acceptable time of God's working, of comforting those who mourn by turning their mourning into joy and gladness, praise and thanksgiving, we can inspire others with new life ("trees of righteousness"), that they may unfold and develop along lines of Truth and righteousness in a way that will glorify God. We take courage in the thought of our unobstructed access to God.

# INTERNATIONAL SUBJECT—Perfected through Sufering.—Isa. 53:1-12.

1. Who hath believed our message? and to whom

hath the arm of Jehovah been revealed?

2. For he grew up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground: he hath no form nor comeliness; and when we see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him.

3. He was despised, and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and as one from whom men hide their face he was despised; and we esteemed him

not.

4. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows; yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted.

5. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; the chastisement of our peace

was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed.

6. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and Jehovah hath laid on him

the iniquity of us all.

7. He was oppressed, yet when he was afflicted he opened not his mouth; as a lamb is led to the slaughter, and as a sheep that before its shearers is dumb, so he opened not his mouth.

8. By oppression and judgment he was taken away; and as for his generation, who among them considered that he was cut off out of the land of the living for the transgression of my people to whom the stroke was due?

9. And they made his grave with the wicked, and with a rich man in his death; although he had done no

violence, neither was any deceit in his mouth.

10. Yet it pleased Jehovah to bruise him; he hath put him to grief: when thou shalt make his soul an offering for sin, he shall see *bis* seed, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of Jehovah shall prosper in his hand.

11. He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied: by the knowledge of himself shall my righteous servant justify many; and he shall bear their iniquities.

12. Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out his soul unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors: yet he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

GOLDEN TEXT—Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows.—Isa. 53:4.

SILENT PRAYER—I am strong in the thought and purpose of God, and in that thought and purpose I stand fast.

The power of God ("the arm of Jehovah") is revealed to those who are able to endure and to go forward regardless of the efforts of the personal or race man to deter them. The Christ grows up in the consciousness "as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground," without especial cultivation or encouragement. The Christ is an idealized growth existing in mind and character rather than in the external lineaments ("He hath no form nor comeliness").

The validity of suffering has always been questioned, and men have rebelled against its seeming necessity. The explanation is to be found in the struggle to develop from an unconscious natural being to a conscious spiritual being, or to manifest in mind, body, and affairs the divine attributes bestowed upon man in the beginning when he was conceived as an ideal in universal Mind. To achieve this development and express his innate perfection man employs the universal substance, which he molds according to his own conceptions. God made spiritual man after His image and likeness, and this man is Christ. The body of Christ is the "man of sorrows."

The body of Christ is knit together of spiritual qualities, "a heart of compassion," then kindness, meekness, lowliness, forbearance, forgiveness, love, thankfulness. Until our inner eye is opened to behold the beauty of ideal wholeness, we see the universal body as an abstraction only. The qualities that go to the composition of the Christ body are developed through suffering. The "man of sorrows" is the man of compassion and understanding. Love and forgiveness likewise grow out of suffering, as do meekness and lowliness.

The mystery of change is always before us. The presence of both good and seeming evil in our world forms another mystery on which we may expend much time and thought. We live in cosmic man as fishes live in the sea or as the natural man lives in the air. Without the cosmic substance we should be incapable of both thought and action. We do not understand its nature, and we project false ideas and mistaken conceptions out of it.

The natural man rejects the thought of the spiritual body as a reality. "He was despised, and rejected of men." He prefers to dismiss it as a figment of the imagination not worthy of his attention. This failure to recognize the truth leads in manifestation to a diminution of the Christ substance instead of an increase, which is the opposite of the divine plan. "He must increase, but I [the intellect] must decrease."

The universal body makes no protest. It is subject to the race thought just as our body is subject to our thoughts. "He was oppressed, yet when he was afflicted he opened not his mouth." Our body

silently obeys our will even when that will is adverse and causes it to disintegrate. In like manner the cosmic or Christ body is "cut off out of the land of the living." The adjustment of the will to constructive thinking is the remedy for this condition.

The final lesson of suffering brings understanding and a sense of satisfaction with the knowledge of self that is gained through it. "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied." Satisfaction is heightened by the realization that self-dominion reacts to the benefit of all, not only to that of the sufferer. "By the knowledge of himself shall my righteous servant justify many." The universal body has power to receive and harmonize all error thoughts, and in time it will work out the great redemptive plan of Divine Mind for man. Jesus played the major part in re-educating man out of wrong thinking into constructive mental habits. In His name we can overcome as He overcame.

SILENT PRAYER—I accept the Christ consciousness as God's free gift to me, and abide in it.

Water is one of life's chief necessities. Even in a physical sense it is essential to life, since the content of the body is largely fluid. In desert countries water is a symbol of life, for without it life does not long continue. The "water of life" is a figure designating that which gives life and which keeps it expressing itself according to the law of each kind or species.

"Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat." The water of life, as also wine and milk, is the Christ consciousness. It sustains life (as water), it stimulates life (as wine), and it nourishes life (as milk). We may choose according to our need. We may work for these rich gifts of Spirit substance and possess ourselves of them without money and without price, but by our labor.

Men are prone to desire material things and to spend themselves in quest of that which neither nourishes nor sustains their inner nature. They spend their money "for that which is not bread." Labor for temporal things with no thought beyond their temporal value is wasted effort, for no real satisfaction comes from possessing what is temporal or in setting the heart on it. Full satisfaction is found only in Christ. "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall not hunger, and he that believeth on me shall never thirst."

To "hearken diligently unto me" is to hold fast to the Christ way of life and obey the principles of the Christ. The soul qualities are thus developed, and true satisfaction is realized in the life. "Eat ye that which is good, and let your soul delight itself in fatness." As we realize and express the love that is within us, our consciousness of love increases. David represents love and is a type of the Christ. "The sure mercies of David" are the sure rewards of expressing love in our daily life.

Love is a witness of the Christ to the peoples, for everyone understands it, believes in it, and responds to it when it is genuine and without ulterior motives. Love is the real "leader and commander to the peo-

ples."

A nation represents an aggregation of thoughts in mind. "A nation that thou knowest not" is such an aggregation of thoughts on a subject that is new to us. The avowed aim of science is to discover truth, and to do this in full measure science must come to the Christ or its knowledge will remain piecemeal. It must "run unto thee, because of Jehovah thy God." Science may well be that nation, but so far it is not greatly influenced by considerations of religious faith.

We find God only as we have an earnest desire to make contact with the divine. If we neglect to develop our spiritual faculties the time comes when we no longer desire to know God consciously. Apathy displaces desire, and we drift in the stream of the race consciousness. To avoid this fate we are to "call . . . upon him while he is near." Then our thoughts easily become "his thoughts," as we listen

for the divine voice within ourselves and realize our nearness to the divine in all life.

The thoughts of divine love are higher than the thoughts of personal consciousness. In fact there is no parallel between them. They are of an entirely different order. The thoughts of God are of good, and their effect is good. The thoughts of personal consciousness are selfish, self-centered, and evil, and bring evil in their wake. The unrighteous man can change his ways of thinking, can rise to the plane of high thinking, turn from evil to good, and enter into spiritual consciousness and express the spiritual content of life. Thought habits are cumulative, and the longer and more faithfully we persist in thinking constructively the stronger the habit becomes and the more fruitful of good. Right speech builds up a great structure of good, just as rain brings growth followed by seedtime and harvest. Both take effect under law, the one no less surely than the other.

SILENT PRAYER—I express my heartfelt conviction in deeds as well as in thoughts and words.

Jeremiah ("exaltation of Jehovah") represents spiritual faith demanding that all religious thoughts be faithful in observance of divine law. Faith is that in us which intuitively discerns the divine law and seeks to impress it on the will in effectual measure. No conviction is stronger than that which is based on intuitive perception, for this cannot be nullified by external opinion. When we know a thing within ourselves the knowledge is forever part of us.

Sense consciousness is subject to cause and effect. Jeremiah understood the connection between these two, and his work was based on this understanding. He himself spoke from spiritual consciousness in warning the children of Israel to change their habits of thinking and obey the divine law. Jehovah touched his lips with conviction, and he need no longer speak as a child. He spoke with authority. "Jehovah put forth his hand, and touched my mouth; and Jehovah said unto me, Behold, I have put my words in thy mouth."

To be set over the nations and over the kingdoms, to tear down and rebuild, is a high commission. Few statesmen of modern or ancient times have had such power. Jeremiah's power derived from the fact that he interpreted the divine law and that Jehovah stood back of him. He saw clearly what would come, and he declared his vision fearlessly. Unless conviction is reinforced with courage it has no force. "I have made thee this day a fortified city, and an iron pillar, and brazen walls, against the whole land." To realize strength in this measure is to be indomitable. As we conceive a mission of such magnitude backed by such authority we too become powerful influences for good, each in our particular niche or place. Jeremiah was to hold firm against kings, princes, priests, and people. He was not to quail before any of them, and his honesty and integrity were to be his adequate defense against all injury at their hands. He was incorruptible, so that they feared him even while they disliked him, because he told them unpalatable truths. "They shall fight against thee; but they shall not prevail against thee: for I am with thee, saith Jehovah, to deliver thee."

The word of Jehovah is no cabalistic utterance, no dark saying. It is plain and clear enough for anyone to read aright. "Execute ye justice and righteousness, and deliver him that is robbed out of the hand of the oppressor; and do no wrong, do no violence, to the sojourner, the fatherless, nor the widow; neither shed innocent blood in this place." No mystery attaches to these commandments. They read like a modern volume of the law of the land. They can be interpreted or applied literally as well as

metaphysically. In the latter sense they include just and right thinking of ourselves as well as of others, a watch over the self, and the development of selflessness and consideration for qualities that are above mere sense perceptions.

No abiding structure can be built on a dishonest foundation. "Woe unto him that buildeth his house by unrighteousness, and his chambers by injustice; that useth his neighbor's service without wages, and

giveth him not his hire."

Spiritual faith that hews to the line regardless of fear or favor, and that always speaks the truth is unpopular with sense consciousness. "The princes were wroth with Jeremiah, and smote him, and put him in prison." To have to repress our convictions is fatal to free expression. The will can overcome repression and free us from negative states of mind. Zedekiah the king brought Jeremiah out of the prison in order to inquire of him whether there was any word from Jehovah. However self-will does not set free permanently. Although the faith that is in us fearlessly states the truth in the face of negation, such candor does not advance our cause.

Often we chide ourselves unnecessarily for our mistakes and to a great extent hinder God's work in us. Forgive yourself, dear friend, even as God has lovingly forgiven you. Through self-criticism and shame we often unwittingly prevent ourselves from being the wise and helpful persons we wish to be. Everyone has done something that perhaps was unwise and may carry the burden of such a mistake much too long. Forgiveness on your part helps to bring peace, and God can work well only in a peaceful heart.
