The Executive Committee of your Board of Trustees met at Unity Village during the week of April 12 and the tremendous consciousness of commitment and dedication on the part of your Executive Committee made this a joyous and growing time for

all of AUC. Your Executive Committee meets four times a year. In January they meet while the other Committees are meeting during the Mid-Year Council of Commit-They meet in April. They meet during Pre-Conference week when the other Committees are meeting and they meet again in October each year.

PRE-CONFERENCE

Every Program Committee seeks most sincerely to do a number of things -- to come up with a program that is interesting, that is 1971 challenging, that is the same, that is different, that doesn't rock the boat, that keeps within the budget, that uses the people that are available, that goes outside to tap untouched resources of other people and each Committee seriously courts success and favor in your response to their program at Conference or Pre-Conference. The Program Committee this year certainly seemed to have done the Our Pre-Conference Program was, first, greatly enhanced by the fact that no Committee Meetings were conducted during the Pre-Conference program. This necessitated the Committees to arrive two days early in order to conduct the business of their Committees. This necessitated the Board of Trustees to meet from early morning until well into the night on the Saturday between Pre-Conference and Conference this year. Though, perhaps, there were hardships, it certainly proved to be the best method that we have found yet. The business of AUC was conducted in an orderly, effective and efficient manner by all of the active Committees and everyone was free to participate in the Pre-Conference program.

Each day of Pre-Conference, meditation time was 8:15 in the morning in the Silent Unity Visitors' Chapel. The fine consciousness of truth that was maintained throughout the Pre-Conference activities could be directly related to this prayer consciousness.

Dr. Bruce Rahtjen presented an intensive on the Intertestamental Bible period to which everyone responded most positively. Many notes were taken, much inspiration was shared and our ministry will be strengthened as a result.

Dan Perin presented a Teaching Methods Intensive on the Thursday. The response to this was overwhelmingly positive and appreciative. Many of our ministers and teachers have returned home with new tools with which more effectively to conduct their ministry.

On the Friday, Bill Fischer presented a Great Teachers Intensive and offered the result of many prayerful hours of research and study that is regularly shared with our student ministers. Here, again, our ministers and teachers participating went away with a much greater appreciation of the stature, not only of the man but of the message that he shares on our behalf with our student ministers.

A large portion of Pre-Conference time, all afternoon Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, was given to small group discussion on important subjects. There was not only a great deal of input into our movement as a whole by those participating, but clear guidelines were defined for our strengthening our outreach of the great message of Truth that we offer to the world. The group leaders had the unenviable task of sharing the meaty substance of their group discussion with the body as a whole each day.

Good discussion was entered into on the Wednesday evening under the title "Diversified Views on the Great Debate." Not only was there real value in the shared experience but there was fun, too. A highlight of the Pre-Conference activity was the lecture and visual demonstration by Charles Lelly given on Thursday evening. We are richly blessed to have a man of Charles' caliber and spiritual insight to share in our program and to be so instrumental in a forward movement of our editorial activities at Unity Village. On Friday evening, Jim Freeman shared his vision for Silent Unity and led all who participated in a wonderful, spiritual experience of real meaningful unity within Silent Unity, the unity that each one of us shares. To say the very least, it was a beautiful, moving experience.

More than twice as many ministers and teachers participated in this Pre-Conference program than ever before.

A NEW LOOK--A NEW VENUE--BUT A REAL

As a result of the tremendous enthusiasm on the part of Unity ministers and teachers all over the country to the enthusiasm and faith and love of our committed lay people, our AUC Con-UNITY CONFERENCE ference this year was held at Glenwood Manor, a motor hotel complex in Overland Park, Kansas. The Conference was held there

simply because of the limitations of accommodation at Unity Village for more than the normally anticipated number of ministers and teachers. There were 416 ministers, teachers and lay delegates registered at the hotel for Conference. In addition, there were those additional ministers, teachers and delegates who participated in the Conference activities but were not resident at Glenwood Manor. All of the responses were most glowing and positive. The accommodation was luxurious. The food was more than ample. The service was outstanding. The theater seats were remarkably comfortable, making long business sessions far more interesting.

Charles King, magnificient tenor, wonderful truth student and beloved friend of us all, began the Conference in Glenwood Hall with a Charles King Concert.

At his invitation, a brief message that keynoted his purpose in the Concert and the overall purpose of our Conference was covered by Sue Sikking of Santa Monica, California. The concert, with its deeply spiritual overtones, set the high consciousness for a tremendous spiritual experience.





During the course of the business meeting, the various standing Committee reports were made and ratification of action taken was moved. A great deal of discussion ensued on the matter of timing for Pre-Conference, Conference and forthcoming Convention activities. It was the almost unanimous decision of the Conference body that if details can be worked out to fit in with other Unity Village activities, it would be to our great advantage to have our major gatherings after school has let out around the country. As we increasingly involve our lay delegates, participation at Conference so often can be a part of vacation plans, enabling families to attend. Your Executive Office is working closely with the folks at Unity School to work out satisfactory dates for Pre-Conference and Conference, 1972.

It was the decision of the Board of Trustees, ratified enthusiastically by the Conference body that we should proceed with plans for an International Convention, 1973. The dates for our 1973 International Convention, to be held in Kansas City, will be July 19 through the 23rd. Arrival date will be July 18th and the 24th is clear for move out time, as necessary. Our telescoped Pre-Conference activities will immediately precede the Convention in Kansas City.

Angelo Giordani and members of his Unity work in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, made a most impressive audio-visual appeal to the Conference body to commit ourselves to an International Convention in Philadelphia in 1976. Philadelphia, the cradle of democracy, will be in that year host city for the World's Fair and the Bi-Centennial celebrations of our nation. The decision of the Conference body was almost unanimous in support of this proposition.



Not only did the lay delegates who participated in such much larger numbers in our Conference this year make a great contribution, but as always Unity School was well represented and was a source of inspiration and blessing to us all. Tables were set up in the lobby of the theater where our major meetings were held. These were manned by representatives of Unity School. Charles Fillmore had set the pace by his special blessing to the Conference body and his real spirit of commitment to Unity as a movement. It was announced, after Charlie's word of welcome, a recent proposal that has been made by Unity School to the Association to establish the practice of returning to AUC 40% of all tuition money paid by the students in SMRS. This tremendous expression of cooperation and the practical material assistance that it renders to us in the training of our student ministers was and is deeply appreciated by all who are a part of AUC.


At the tables in the foyer of the theater, Unity School's cassette program was available for consideration by ministers, teachers and lay delegates. The Retreat Department was represented, as was the Editorial Department. The OMEGA Center with brochures of their various programs and staff members to answer questions, were a big help in our better understanding this part of Unity School's activity.

The Outreach Department of Unity School, which has been conducting multi-media shows and developing skills and talents for the use of the expanding technology of our time was of special and particular interest to many of our ministers, teachers and delegates. The Fillmore Foundation and Silent Unity and the Justus Credit Union were all represented and their loving cooperation was deeply appreciated.

Ralph and Rosemary Rhea had a part in the program and shared some of the most recent television productions of "The Word."

On Tuesday afternoon of Conference, the Conference body was divided into smaller groups and participated in "Communication Workshops." This was an opportunity for ministers, teachers and lay delegates to talk together in small groups about the issues that were before the Conference body. It was in the Communication Workshops that a number of important guidelines were defined for us as a field movement. One of these was the matter of the direction that would be given to the use of our tithe substance as the AUC. Every year the matter of our tithe has been discussed at length either on the Board or on the Conference floor. It was the decision of the Conference body, at the recommendation of the Board of Trustees, and with the overwhelming support of prayerful discussions within the Communication Workshops that it be recognized as a matter of principle that our tithe substance in AUC be directed into the expansion and extension of the whole of our Unity work. Action was taken by the Board of Trustees to assure that such tithe substance should not be used in any way in the operating expenses of AUC, but only in its support of the activities and outreach of Unity School and AUC expansion in the field.

The Banquet Committee this year made arrangements for a very lavish banquet program in the form of a Luau. Almost without exception, the ministers, teachers and lay delegates came prepared. Though the waiting time to get to the banquet tables was a bit too lengthy, the fare was sumptuous. The tables were set up all around the swimming pool and the colorful dress of all who participated added to the real joy of the experience. There was a very lengthy program of Hawaiian entertainers and Polynesian dancers. The opportunity for dancing at poolside was a part that was enjoyed by all. The Banquet Committee this year included as a part of its program a segment called "In The Spotlight." Nomination ballots had gone out to the entire membership earlier in the spring in order that the Conference body might spotlight the person that had made an outstanding contribution to the Association of Unity Churches in 1970, over and above his own successful ministry; the ministry that

Phil Stovin was spotlighted for his outreach into the community in the form of his Psycho-cybernetics classes in local universities and adult education programs. Phil was not in attendance at the Conference but his wife, Mary, accepted the trophy on his behalf. The funniest story of the year award went to Stan Hampson of Honolulu, Hawaii. Everybody enjoyed the story but he was even able to top it in the acceptance of his trophy.

After breakfast on the Thursday of Conference the ministers, teachers and lay delegates were bussed to Unity Village where in the Unity Village Chapel we held our final business meeting.

Phillip Pierson, President, handed over the gavel to Glenn Mosley, our incoming President and on behalf of the Conference body, Robert Sikking presented Phil Pierson with a plaque of appreciation.



A great blessing of gratitude and love was poured out upon Phil for his untiring efforts during his year as President of the AUC and for the growth that we have experienced as a movement. The business session was followed by a Silent Unity Healing Service with all of the Silent Unity workers in attendance. ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Kay Arndt of Bellevue, Washington was elected in her region as Regional Representative to the Board of Trustees. She and Jim Lewis, the newly elected representative from the South Central area were acknowledged and blessed by the Conference body as new

members to the Board. Jim Lewis conducts his work in Denver, Colorado. Glenn Mosley of Detroit, Michigan; Hal Rosencrans of West Palm Beach, Florida; and Eric Butterworth of New York, New York were elected to the Board of Trustees by the Board. The membership in Conference session elected Ida Bowles of New York, New York and Lillian Matthews of Buffalo, New York, to the Board of Trustees. All of these new Board members and re-elected Board members will serve for three years. Each one will deeply appreciate your prayer consciousness in support of their efforts on behalf of our movement.

What is Unity? Unity is a way of life based upon the Bible and primarily upon the teachings of Jesus the Christ. Unity stresses the applicability of all that He taught, said, and did within the framework of today.

We believe you can find fulfillment in Unity if you are looking for a teaching that:

- 1 Offers an approach that is scientifically sound, psychologically healthy, intellectually challenging, and spiritually satisfying.
- 2. Gives you freedom to grow spiritually at your own pace and evolve your own working philosophy of ideas and beliefs.
- 3. Has no creedal requirements; never asks you to profess something you may not be-
- 4. Does not impose any financial burden on its adherents; is supported by freewill offerings, and looks upon tithing and other forms of giving as the joyous response of a generous, Spirit-filled soul.
