
AUC PRE-CONFERENCE 1974

The activities of Pre-Conference week, June 10-14, at Unity Village commenced with the convening of the AUC Committees. The Committees met on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Their reports to the Conference Body are summarized in this issue.

The Pre-Conference Post-Graduate Program consisted of three different seminars. An entire day was allowed for each seminar. On Wednesday, Kay Arndt and Jack Barker presented the "Teaching Technique" course to one hundred twenty-two (122) ordained ministers, teachers, and student ministers. This course was a repeat of the one given on a regional level this past year.

Two hundred thirty (230) members of the AUC took advantage of the opportunity to share in the consciousness of Ed Rabel on Thursday by attending the course on "Audio-Visual Presentation in Bible Interpretation." In the morning session Ed presented his unique insight into significant portions of the Old Testament, offering keys, examples, and illustrations on how to interpret the Biblical writings in a deeper sense. Ed utilized a series of visual aids designed to assist ministers and teachers in making more graphic presentations to the lay students in their respective ministries. The afternoon session was devoted to an interpretative study of the Gospels. Once again, Ed effectively utilized audio-visual aids. A transcript of Ed's presentation and copies of the transparencies used are available as a salable item from the AUC office. See the report on the Post-Graduate Program on page 10 of this issue for additional information.

Wilfred Harricharan, Ph.D., conducted on Friday the seminar entitled "Organization and Operation of a Unity Ministry – A New Look." Dr. Harricharan, a member of the Laymen's Professional Counsel, is a university professor of business administration and is President of the Board of the Unity ministry in Brooklyn, New York. Two hundred sixteen (216) ministers, teachers, and ministerial students benefited from Wilf's orderly and thorough presentation of the course. Included were such relevant subjects as: profile of the ministerial organization, and the consequences of the ingredients of the profile; functions of the leader of a ministry (planning, organizing, and controlling); motivation of workers and congregation; morale; theories and styles of leadership; behavorial conduct of effective leaders; and communication, groups, and handling change. A limited number of cassette recordings of this course are available as a salable item from the AUC office. In attendance at this year's Ministers/Teachers Conference, conducted at Unity Village June 16 through 20, 1974, was the largest number of AUC members ever assembled

for an annual Conference in the history of the Association of Unity Churches. A total of three hundred sixty-seven (367) ordained Unity ministers, Licensed Teachers, student ministers, and their spouses were present for the Conference. The record attendance was certainly visible evidence of the fine, cooperative spirit which has blessed the AUC membership body this past fiscal year.

SUPPORT has truly been the word for the membership of AUC during 1973–1974. Each of you in the field ministries has indeed been a very important member of the "working team" of the Association of Unity Churches. We recognize, bless, and give thanks for your individual consciousness of Truth and for the special part each of you is taking in the unfolding and expanding work of Spirit manifesting in and through the AUC.

The theme for Conference 1974 was "IDENTITY '74" and was subtitled "Issues and Answers - A Time for Caring and for Sharing the Christ in You." Mary Rowe and the other members of the Program Committee are to be congratulated for their untiring efforts in putting together an exceptional Conference program. We bless each one of these members of our AUC family who gave so generously of their time and inspiration to developing for us a well-balanced, instructive, and productive Conference. Commencing with a wonderful time of fellowship during the Open House and Registration on Sunday, June 16, the Conference program progressed easily and quickly throughout the next four days. Our special thanks to the spouses of the SMRS students who so efficiently and beautifully hosted the Open House at the Fellowship Lounge. The abundance of excellent food, beverage, and enthusiasm contributed greatly to the successful start of our Conference.

The morning sessions were devoted to business meetings and in the afternoons educational workshops were conducted on such subjects as: Meaningful Meditation, led by W. E. Goodison-Orr, Hal and Flo Dibblee, and Charles Roth; Applied Truth in Current Issues, led by Mary Stovin and William Cameron; Expanding Horizons, led by Wallace Tooke, William Kozy, and William Hines; Center Administration and Participation, led by Les Saunders and Ruth Mosley; Publicity Outreach in Ministry led by Arthur Hammons; Specialized Ministerial Needs led by Phillip Pierson; and Creative Writing led by Mary Rowe.

On Monday evening, June 17, Doctors Carl and Millie Cleveland of the Cleveland Chiropractic College in Kansas City, Missouri, gave a presentation entitled "Innate Intelligence Within." Carol Knox, Izear Wiggins, and Jeannette Hedge also presented programs on healing.

"Identify With The Fillmores" was the subject on Tuesday evening. Charles Neal moderated panel discussions on identifying with the teachings and ideas of the Fillmores, Sharing their recollections and memories of the Fillmores were Otto Arni, Clyde Corn, Charles R. Fillmore, Rosalind Grace, S. Rickert Grace, Connie Fillmore McCarty, Jane Paulson, Rosemary Rhea, Barney Ricketts, and May Rowland.

Wednesday evening the site changed and some three hundred seventy-five (375) AUC members and friends joined in enjoying a "Roaring 20's" Dinner Dance at the Alameda Plaza Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri. Following a superb dinner, those in

attendance were treated to fine dance music by Tony DiPardo (Mr. Music of Kansas City) and his band, and to a program of professional entertainment. Starring were Charles King, who led the Sing-Along; Soloists Jack and Mary Beth Olson and organist Faye Roswell Peters from Unity Church of Denver, Colorado; and Connie Haines. Harry Newman and Miki Bowen moderated Flicks and Flashbacks of Unity in the 20's. This slide and motion picture presentation was edited by George Rieger. Our appreciation and thanks to Miki and the other members of the Banquet Committee for the fine job they did in arranging one of the most enjoyable and entertaining socials ever offered to the Conference Body.

RECOMMENDED CHANGES IN THE AUC BYLAWS

During the years since the creation of the Association of Unity Churches in 1966, some weaknesses in our Bylaw structure have been evidenced by difficulties

that have arisen within the family of our movement. For the past 3 years the AUC Bylaws Committee, and the Executive Committee, and the Board of Trustees have endeavored to consider ways in which we might strengthen our Bylaws, thus adding stature to our movement and protection for our ministries, our ministers, and our AUC. In January 1974 during the meeting of the Board of Trustees at Unity Village, a unanimous recommendation of the Bylaws Committee that certain changes be proposed to the Conference Body for consideration was presented unanimously by the Executive Committee to the Board of Trustees. These changes, with a covering letter, were mailed to the entire membership of the Association of Unity Churches on March 25, 1974.

This year the largest minister/teacher registration ever at an AUC Conference indicated a keen interest on the part of our membership regarding the suggested changes. The Board of Trustees recognized during Pre-Conference week that there was not only keen interest, but some serious concern. It was determined by the Board of Trustees that, because of the interest and the concern, the matter of the recommended changes in the Bylaws be dealt with at the first membership business meeting during Conference rather than at a later meeting. A concise presentation of the reasons behind the recommended changes was made to the Conference Body and the Body was invited to meet in regional groups for in depth discussion of the changes.

Following the group meetings, the Regional Representatives reported to the Board of Trustees that two of our seven regions wished to proceed and vote for the recommended Bylaw changes. The other five regions either wished to alter or to table for another year the consideration of the changes. It was the recommendation of the Board of Trustees that such being the majority of opinion, the chair would entertain a motion to table the matter. The motion to table was made and passed by the Conference Body.

Dorothy Pierson, President of the AUC, urged the membership to give prayerful consideration to the matter of the Bylaw changes and to discuss further any desired changes or alterations between now and the end of December. She encouraged the membership to provide, either individually and/or collectively through regions, the Bylaw Committee with information necessary to enable the Committee to draft changes that would fulfill the evident needs and satisfy the majority of the membership.

Our continued prayer consciousness for divine guidance in this regard is essential. We are moving forward collectively from strength to strength, and whatever is best for our service to God through those whom we serve in the Unity ministry, shall be made manifest.

MEMBERSHIP Immediately prior to and during Pre-Conference week this year, your Board of Trustees received letters from six of our ministries withdrawing their membership from the Association of Unity Churches. Much prayerful consideration was given by the Board of Trustees to the significance of these withdrawals. It was the decision of the Board that we would have no alternative but accept the withdrawals since they were confirmed by their ministers, their Board of Directors, and their congregations at special membership meetings. The ministries and ministers concerned are:

We love and bless these co-workers in Christ knowing that as they move forward following their guidance, their blessings will be assured.

ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS AND OFFICERS

The Conference Body elected Doris Caldwell and Bernard Dozier to serve on the Board of Trustees for three years. Doris is minister

of South Side Unity Center of Christianity in Chicago, Illinois, and Bernard is cominister with his wife, Polly, of Unity Church of Wichita, Kansas. Elected by the Board to serve for three years were Ida Bowles, minister of Unity Center of Hempstead, New York; Francisca Mendez, minister of Associacion Cristianismo Practico de Puerto Rico, Santurce, Puerto Rico; and Glenn Mosley, minister of Detroit Unity Association, Detroit, Michigan. Marjorie Hartzell of Cincinnati, Ohio, having resigned from the Board, Eugene Sorensen, minister of Unity of West Suburia, Livonia, Michigan, was elected to fill Marjorie's unexpired term. Marjorie, a member of the Board since the formation of the AUC in 1966, has contributed greatly to the effectiveness of the Association of Unity Churches.

Hal Rosencrans of West Palm Beach, Florida, choose not to be reelected to the Board and retired from the Executive Committee and the Board upon the expiration of his term of office. Hal is immediate past Chairman of the Executive Committee and has served as a Board and Executive Committee member since the formation of the AUC.

We give thanks for Marjorie and Hal and bless them for their years of dedicated service to the unfolding and expansion of the AUC.

The Board elected the following ministers to the Executive Committee: Paul Barrett of Unity Christ Church, St. Petersburg, Florida; Stan Hampson of Unity Church of Hawaii, Honolulu, Hawaii; and Dorothy Pierson of Christ Unity Church, Sacramento, California. Robert L. Stevens, minister of Christ Church Unity, San Diego, California, Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the AUC; and William L. Fischer, Director of Ministerial Education for the AUC will serve on the Executive Committee as Ex-officio members.

The Board elected Robert L. Stevens President of the Association for the coming year and James Lewis as the Vice-President. Pursuant to policy established by Conference Body action, Jim, minister of Unity Church of Denver, Colorado, becomes President-Elect and will be our next President.

A complete roster of the Board of Trustees, Executive Committee, and AUC officers is printed on page 12 of this issue.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS IN PROGRESS

Prayerful consideration is being given by Robert L. Stevens, President of the AUC, in the performance of his responsibility as President to fill vacancies

and appoint new members to the AUC Committees for 1974–1975. Appointments to the various committees are now in process and the reorganization of some committees are being made. For example, an additional five members are to be appointed to the Licensing and Ordination Committee bringing the total number of members to 22. Also, in keeping with our existing AUC Bylaws, the Board of Trustees has made the necessary appointments to the Finance and Budget Committee. A complete list of the Committees and their members will be published in CONTACT as soon as the appointments are completed and confirmations received.

EXPANDED RESPONSIBILITIES FOR REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES

The wonderful growth experienced by the AUC in the past few years has made necessary a corresponding growth in the

responsibilities of those serving the Association. At the request of Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the AUC, the seven regional representatives of the AUC have been called on to accept the responsibility for representing the Association at their respective regional conferences. Accordingly, Bob will not be traveling to each regional conference as in the past but will be totally supportive of the regional representatives and provide them with information usually shared with the region by the Executive Director.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF THE AUC

During Conference Robert P. Sikking shared an audio-visual presentation of the growth of the financial support of the AUC by our member ministries. One example sighted as

evidence of the growth was the 81% increase in the average love offering per ministry from 1968 to 1974. The presentation also showed that 209 of our 248 member ministries contributed support through love offerings during Fiscal Year 1974. A chart presentation of such support reflected 50% of the love offerings came from

30 ministries and that 9 of those ministries contributed 25% of the total love offerings received by the AUC. In response to the many requests of member ministries for statistical data regarding their individual financial support, the AUC office developed a financial data card for each member ministry. This card shows the total love offering for fiscal 1974 received from the ministry and indicates the ranking and percent of the offering both in relation to the total membership of the AUC and to the ministry's respective region. The cards were made available during the Conference on an individual, confidential basis to the ministers. The ministers who did not have an opportunity to pick up their card and wish to receive it may do so simply by writing the AUC office.

FINANCE AND BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance and Budget Committee, Charles Neal, Chairman, reported a \$46,649 increase in AUC income for the Fiscal Year ended March 31, 1974. crease represents a 14% increase in contributions from member ministries during the Total income for Fiscal Year 1974 surpassed budget expectations by \$7,792. However, this increase was unfortunately wiped out by inflationary conditions over which the Association has no control. The Committee congratulated the Executive office of the AUC on having held down expenses to the extent that the net operating loss was limited to \$9,312 or only 2.1% of the gross expenses. The Committee is confident that the approved budget of \$384,000 (the budget in detail is shown on page 26 of this issue) will be met through the loving and generous

LICENSING AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Licensing and Ordination Committee, Larry Swartz, Chairman, has recommended, and the Board of Trustees has approved such re-

commendations, that 28 second year SMRS students receive ordination on August 9, 1974, subject to their successful completion of the requirements for graduation from the School for Ministerial and Religious Studies. The Board also approved the Committee's recommendation that James E. Parkinson III, a 1973 SMRS gradulate who has served as a Licensed Teacher during this past year, and Peter Wenzel, leader of the Unity work in Germany, receive ordination in a special Ordination Service in June (see page 13 of this issue). The L & O Committee met with and recommended three applicants for licensed teacher recognition. The Board of Trustees approved such recognitions for: Sue Page, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Geneva Seivertson, Sacramento, California; and Theodore Speers, Seattle, Washington.

support of the members of the Association. Adequate support of this budget will

enable the AUC to continue expanding the services offered to its members.

EXPANSION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Expansion Committee, Jean Grover, Chairman, took as their theme for the year "Unity in the Community." Believing that the key word in Unity is caring, it was

the consensus of the committee that expansion efforts should be directed to supporting and giving impetus to existing ministries. A few of the many, excellent ideas for expansion are: increased outreach in foreign languages; establishment of individual "Unity in the Community Funds" to assist in getting Unity involved in the local

community; conducting local public meetings on "What Is Unity?"; increased number of informal and formal study groups; and increased and more dynamic utilization on a local level of the Unity television program "The Word." The Committee recommends that progress reports on the implementation of such ideas be made at each regional conference thereby allowing the Expansion Committee to function as a clearinghouse in reporting results to the Board of Trustees and the Conference Body.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

Ministerial Education Advisory Committee, Jack Barker. Co-Chairman, met with the ministerial students and with the staff of

SMRS. Due to the increased number of students in SMRS and the corresponding time demands made on the faculty, the Committee recommends that the Admissions Committee be encouraged to continue to take great care in selecting only those students having the greatest potential to become Unity ministers. The Committee was pleased to report that the progressive testing program recently instituted in SMRS is being conducted very satisfactorily. The results of such tests in conjunction with the reports of the L & O Committee and progress counselors provides a very definite view as to the satisfactory or unsatisfactory performance of our students.

ETHICS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Ethics Committee, Larry Kendrick, acting Chairman, has recommended that certain "Key Ideas" contained in the Code of Ethics should either be underlined or written in

bold print in the 1975 printing of the Association of Unity Churches' Yearbook. The purpose of the Committee in making this recommendation was to more readily reveal the essence of each statement in the Code of Ethics in a more meaningful way.

YOUNG ADULTS RESEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Young Adults Research Committee, Elvina Hausmann Lee, Chairman, recommended that each region consider the value of having a Youth

Director appointed for each region and financially supported by the ministries in the region. The Committee also recommended the appointment of a head coordinator for the Young Adults at the AUC level, such person to be assisted by a volunteer coordinator from the SMRS student body. Responding to this recommendation, Martha Giudici of the AUC staff has been appointed to serve as head coordinator for the YAU. A Young Adults Retreat at Unity Village is scheduled for the summer of 1975 and will be hosted by the Young Adults of the Great Lakes Region.

MUSIC COMMITTEE REPORT

The Music Committee, Warren Meyer, Chairman, has compiled our new songbook "UNITY IN SONG" and is now in the process of submitting the songbook pages to the printer.

The collections of songs include material determined by surveys answered by Unity ministers, current songs (where copyrights permit) and new songs submitted by writers from the Unity ministries. A number of our familiar melodies with new Truth words are also included. The songs have been carefully edited and transcribed into singable keys.

In order to determine the initial quantity to be printed of each edition, the Committee has requested that a survey form be provided to our membership. Accordingly, each ministry will receive included in this issue of CONTACT a separate songbook survey sheet which when completed and returned to the AUC office will indicate the number of hardback editions and paperback editions desired by our AUC members. The survey sheet is not an order form. Each ministry is encouraged to cooperate in this endeavor by promptly filling in this survey sheet and returning it to the AUC office in order that the printing of the songbook may proceed.

REPORT

Phillip Pierson, Chairman of Healing Rally '74 recently conducted in San Francisco, California, reported that the Rally was very successful financially and realized its attendance goal. The profits derived from the Rally are to be used as "Seed Money" for preparation for another Healing Rally tentatively scheduled to be held in San Diego, California, in early January 1975. Where as the San Francisco Rally was primarily directed toward Unity students nationwide, the next Rally will be solely directed toward the general public in the San Diego area. The effectiveness of the San Francisco Healing Rally was such that this type of program could be a very excellent means of introducing people in the area to Unity.

POST-GRADUATE A total of 222 ministers and licensed teachers attended the PROGRAM REPORT Post-Graduate Program on "Teaching Techniques" at our seven regional conferences this past year. In addition, a total of 122 ministers, licensed teachers, and student ministers, attended the "Teaching Techniques" seminar presented during Pre-Conference. The Pre-Conference presentations were obviously a great success—for 230 of our AUC members attended the program on "Audio-Visual Presentation in Bible Interpretation" and 216 attended the program on "Organization and Operation of a Unity Ministry—A New Look."

This year the Post-Graduate Program offered at the regional conferences will be on "Effective Presentation of Christian Healing." The Program which is open to ordained ministers, licensed teachers, student ministers, and spouses, will this year require a ten dollar (\$10.00) registration fee for each person receiving credit.

UNITY MINISTERS' The special one-day Unity Ministers' Spouses Seminar conducted SPOUSES SEMINAR during Conference on Wednesday, June 19, 1974, was a tremendous success and enjoyed by all those attending. Leading the Seminar was the Reverend Donald J. Hillerich, Assistant to the Vice-President and Treasurer of Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio. A special segment of the Seminar was set aside for wives and husbands of professional people to share their thoughts on the life styles demanded by their spouses' professions.

OLD LYME, CONNECTICUT — Stella Wrenn, minister of the newly opened Unity Prayer Center in Old Lyme, was the subject of a feature article recently in The Day, a New London, Connecticut newspaper. The article reported that Stella is enthusiastic about her new undertaking which she is pioneering in Connecticut. Stella, who has founded Unity centers in Greenwich Village in New York City, and in Valley Stream, Long Island, introduced this new

work by hosting a picnic on the grounds of the Bee and Thistle Inn in Old Lyme. Well known in the Unity Movement for her "Hour Glass Series," a symbolic representation of the continuity of life and God's purpose, Stella is eagerly looking forward to the expanding growth of this new opportunity of service.

Margaret Cain reporting for the GREAT LAKES REGION:

Please remember to continue to hold our regional prayer thought for the calendar quarter ending August 31, 1974: "The Great Lakes Regional Conference and all of its ministries stand on a solid foundation of Truth, and all is well." (This certainly would be a blessing for every region.)

CINCINNATI, OHIO — Ginny Hinners, minister of Unity-by-the-Side-of-the-Road, reports fine progress being made by the college campus Unity student group which this Cincinnati ministry sponsors on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. The student organization is called "A Community in Unity" and recently conducted a very successful presentation on campus of the Phenomenon of Man film strip series. The majority of college students attending this campus group are members of Unity-by-the-Side-of-the-Road. Ginny also conducts services in Methodist churches, Catholic seminaries, Presbyterian chapels, etc., through an affiliation with Southeastern Ecumenical Ministries, an organization made up of 27 churches of various religious groups.

DECATUR, ILLINOIS — Prior to conducting their regular Easter Sunday Service, this past April, Unity Church of Decatur joined with three other Decatur area ministries in celebrating a Sunrise Service. Bill Cameron, minister of Unity Church of Decatur, reported that the combined service with the First Lutheran Church, St. Peter's A.M.E. Church, and St. Paul's United Mothodist Church was very successful and did much to create good will among the area churches. A combined church choir under the direction of Hugh Butler, member of Unity Church of Decatur, was featured during the service. A pancake breakfast was served by the youth of the churches, including the Youth of Unity in Decatur. Each of the four ministers conducted a portion of the Sunrise Service. The individual congregations expressed their desire that such a program be scheduled for Easter 1975.

DETROIT, MICHIGAN - Detroit Unity Temple, where

Glenn Mosley serves as senior minister, is effectively putting into action its commitment to help reform the lives of youths labeled by society as delinquents. Detroit ministry has for the past two summers conducted a two week canoe trip program whereby youth members of the Temple join with other youths who have been referred by juvenile courts in a sharing experience in the wilderness of Northern Minnesota and Canada. Detroit Unity Temple is one of the first church groups to initiate this "shared camping" concept in cooperation with the outdoor rehabilitation efforts of the Lutheran-related Wilderness Canoe Base (WCB). The concept was welcomed by WCB Director Jim Cherry as an example of how churches can begin to view camping with a sense of social responsibility. Elmer Schmidt, associate minister

of Detroit Unity Temple, functioned as leader of the outings and shared the following report of this year's wilderness experience: "Our group was composed of 21 youth (15 boys - 6 girls) ages 14-16 and 3 adult sponsors. Two-thirds of the vouth had been referred by juvenile courts. We traveled by air to Duluth, Minnesota, then 170 miles by bus to the camp. The wilderness camp is on two islands, Fishhook and Dominion, in the Boundary Waters Canoe Area in the Lake Superior National Forest region on the Canadian border in northeast Minnesota. Our total group divided into three teams of seven youths, an adult sponsor, and two counselors from WCB. Each ten person team was outfitted with canoes, tents, dry food packets, clothing, etc. upon arrival at camp. This year, each of the other teams used four two-man canoes. My team had one 26-foot, 400-pound 'Voyageur' canoe patterned after the vehicle used to transport fur trade in the early days of our country, The rugged physical, mental, and emotional discipline required creates a unique atmosphere within the individual and causes the person to view himself in a totally new light. Worthwhile accomplishment is the keynote. Time and distance oriented goals are set thereby developing a sense of individual worth and self-respect. The teams set camp each evening - break camp the succeeding morning, and continually move. Layover days are permitted if the progressive schedule is met.'

These trips have received extensive newspaper coverage in the Detroit Free Press. The following quotes about the project are from the newspaper: ". . .it allows the kids to be proud of what they have accomplished, rather than ashamed of where they have been, . . angry young boys who camped together recently in the Minnesota wilderness learned most of all how to share, and that's exactly what their sponsor—the Unity Temple of Detroit—had in mind." The newspaper also quoted one young camper who said: "The change with me has been like between night and day. I found people who cared and I have come to love people. And I don't need drugs. There is a natural high here."

Elmer Schmidt advises that follow up functions with the youth throughout the winter are being designed and continuity of relationships is encouraged along with planning of future canoe trips.

FORT WAYNE, INDIANA — This year, Jean Bould, minister of Unity Church of Fort Wayne, has been given special recognition by two Fort Wayne newspapers through separate feature articles about her and the Unity ministry in Fort Wayne. In January, the Fort Wayne Journal—Gazette printed an extensive and very comprehensive article about Jean and the Unity Movement as a whole. This May, the Fort Wayne News—Sentinel gave special recognition to Unity Church of Fort Wayne on its 35th anniversary. Jean states that although the ministry was not formally established until 1954, the first meetings were held in 1939. She feels that the very fine newspaper coverage received recently has contributed greatly to the growth of the ministry. The articles provided an excellent introduction to Unity, its history, scope, and local background.

JACKSON, MICHIGAN — Unity of Jackson has now added a Prison Ministry to its long list of community services. Roy Fox, minister of this expanding Michigan ministry, requested and received permission to conduct a class for the residents of the Southern Michigan Prison. Following Roy's very successful initial class, the Reverend William Saunders, senior chaplain at the prison, extended an invitation to Roy to lead a similar class every Wednesday at the prison. Roy enthusiastically accepted the invitation and reports that the attendance has been very good and that the men are exceptionally attentive and receptive to the messages.

Jim Lewis reporting for the SOUTH CENTRAL REGION:

DALLAS, TEXAS — Donald Curtis, senior minister of Unity Church of Dallas, Texas, and current Texas District President of the International New Thought Alliance, reports that on the evenings of May 30 and 31, 1974, Unity Church of Dallas hosted a New Thought Rally. The theme of the two evenings was "The New Age of New Thought." Doctor Raymond N. Holliwell, International President of INTA, was the keynote speaker each evening. Talks were also given by Unity, Religious Science, and independent New Thought ministers and leaders from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Oklahoma. Marjorie Kass, associate minister of Unity Church of Dallas, was chairperson for the program and conducted the opening meditation. Other Unity ministers who participated in the program were Tom Vivens, minister of Unity Center of Truth, Houston; John Rankin, minister of Unity Church of Christianity, Houston; Marie Paben, minister of Unity of Irving; and Jack Hamilton, minister of Unity Way Church, Dallas.

IRVING, TEXAS — The outreach programs of Unity of Irving are expanding and unfolding in a most beautiful manner. Marie Paben, minister of this Irving, Texas, ministry, is currently conducting classes in transactional analysis at El Centro College; for the staff of Parkland Hospital; at meetings of Parents without Partners; and in the schools of the Irving Public School District. Incorporating Truth teachings and particularly the message of Unity into her classes, Marie believes that these classes

are an excellent introduction to the Unity way of life. She has also beein invited to to do many other speaking engagements for such groups as The Real Estate Association, and to lead meditations in the local banks. She reports that many of her students from such classes, and persons attending the speaking engagements, have asked for Unity literature and ultimately become members of Unity. Concerning the outreach program, Marie stated: "These activities are an excellent way for people to know more about Unity who would not, perhaps, otherwise avail themselves of the opportunity."

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI — Izear Wiggins, minister of Unity Southeast Church, Kansas City, Missouri, reports that their church building was formally dedicated on June 2, 1974. Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the AUC, was the guest speaker and a special musical program entitled "Jubilee Songfest" was presented in the afternoon. The Songfest blended music and narration into a program whereby the history of Unity Southeast Church was presented in a most informative and entertaining way. Participating in the program were choirs and musical groups from the local area. Conrad Stahl, senior ministerial student in SMRS, was one of the soloists.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA - Carol Marie Guental, retired Unity minister now residing in Oklahoma City, was one of the persons recently seen on nationwide network television when Xerox Corporation aired on NBC May 30 their 60 minute special documentary titled "Pursuit of Youth." The documentary featured the Oscar Rose Junior College in Oklahoma City where Marie is currently serving as an instructor for senior adults. The college students appearing on a segment of the film were not "typical" for they ranged in age from 60 to 85 years and are enrolled in the senior adult educational services program of the college. Their participation in the film demonstrated opportunities for retired persons who wished to continue to be active. The college program, funded through a Title I Higher Education Act grant, is tuition free for the senior adults. The purpose of the program is to develop a continuing education program that serves the needs of the area's senior adults to get back into the mainstream of life following retirement, and to create The main objective of the program is social interaction with adults their own age. the constructive use of leisure time for the some 300 senior adults who attend classes at the college everyday. Rejoicing in the program, Marie states: "This is the greatest thing that ever happened to retired senior adults. Because I think people often die soon after retirement if they do not become active in something hopefully something to expand their minds and keep their bodies supple."

Paul Barrett reporting for the SOUTHEASTERN REGION:

ATLANTA, GEORGIA — Jay Dishman, minister of Unity Church of Christianity in Atlanta, shares the following on the ministry's recent biofeedback activities: "At the present time we are still in the learning experimental states of Dr. Elmer Green's relaxation techniques that he developed at the Menninger Clinic." Hal Rosencrans, who, with great success, is teaching relaxation through biofeedback in the West Palm Beach area, conducted a training program in Atlanta last October. This program

engendered such enthusiasm that a sufficient number of enrollments were met to purchase the necessary training equipment in Atlanta. This group is now in the midst of the training session, and a new program is planned for the near future. Jay believes the biofeedback training to be most beneficial and reinforcing to Charles Fillmore's concept in terms of mind control over physical function.

CLEARWATER, FLORIDA — On March 30, 1974, the Suncoast Unity Churches Minister/Board meeting was conducted in Clearwater. Howard Bradford, minister, and the members of Unity of Clearwater hosted the meeting. Paul Barrett, Southeastern Regional Representative, shares the following report: "It was tremendous! Great excitement, interest, and joy were generated among the people attending the meetings as they broke up into individual discussion groups and took up such questions as 'What is an ideal Unity Minister?' and 'What is an ideal Unity Board?'" Representatives from 11 Unity centers and churches in Florida attended this meeting. A total of 109 ministers and board members were present. The wonderful workers of Unity of Clearwater prepared lunch for all those attending. It was planned that such meetings would be held bi-yearly and hosted by the various churches and centers of the Suncoast area. The Suncoast area in Florida extends from Lakeland to Naples and embraces all of the Tampa Bay area. The next meeting will be held in the early fall.

FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA — Another wonderful demonstration of prosperity has manifested in the affairs of Unity of Fort Pierce. Crystal Leonard, minister of this growing Florida ministry, recently reported that the mortgage on the ministry has now been paid off and that the members and friends of Unity of Fort Pierce are moving ahead as prayed for and expected.

LAKELAND, FLORIDA — David Monument, minister of Unity Christ Church in Lakeland, reports that a new Unity group has been started at Fedhaven, Florida, an adult retirement community about 12 miles east of Lake Wales. Some thirty persons are attending this group and are studying "Lessons in Truth." David also reports that plans are under way to expand the library facilities and improve the office arrangement of Unity Christ Church. As evidence of the fine growth in Lakeland's Youth Education Program, David shares the following: "When I arrived here, there were three teachers, one of whom was the YOU Sponsor. Now we have two new YOU Sponsors, five ladies to work in the nursery on a rotational basis, and six other teachers, two of whom are part-time. But with this response, we certainly anticipate an increase in our Sunday School and YOU."

MONTEGO BAY, JAMAICA — Unity of Montego Bay, affiliated with Unity of Jamaica, where Wildorf E. Goodison-Orr (Goodi) is the minister, is in the process of purchasing a new church facility. The following glowing report was received from the membership in Montego Bay: "HERE IS WONDERFUL NEWS! Unity of Montego Bay has found a new, wonderful, beautiful home. Green Briar, 8 Coke Avenue, Brandon Hill, is God's home for Unity of Montego Bay. This place, set on 3 acres of land with a breath-taking view, quiet nooks for meditation, plenty of space for parking, and a wide scope for expansion is, we feel, divine selection for this new home from which Truth will be disseminated to bless the friendly city of Montego Bay and all who visit here. The building is a spacious, reconditioned 19th century residence. There is a tennis court, and beautiful lawns and hedges

enhance the tranquility of the surroundings. Indeed, it can be a miniature Unity Village and has the potential to be the Unity Retreat Centre of the Caribbean. We visualize the number of Unity students who will come from abroad to join us in fellowship and enjoy Green Briar."

PORT-OF-SPAIN, TRINIDAD — Mary Kupferle, minister of Unity of Delray Beach, Florida, reports that 11 of the members and friends of Unity of Delray Beach, including the ministry's soloist, Elaine Roberts, and pianist, Betty Funck, joined with Mary in attending a Healing Seminar in Port-of-Spain January 26 through 30, 1974, at Unity of Trinidad and Tobago. Violet Assam, minister in Port-of-Spain, greeted the Florida group along with 100 of her people singing "U-N-I-T-Y" as Mary and her party disembarked from the airplane. The Healing Seminar was based on "God Never Fails" and the meetings were attended by some 2,000 joyous, loving people. Mary visited with the Governor-General of Trinidad and the Mayor of Port-of-Spain, both of whom expressed a deep interest in the Unity teachings. At the last meeting, hundreds of people came forward to request healing. Prayers were given and many good reports of healing have since been received. Every moment of the week long seminar was filled with music, food, fellowship, and love. "None of us will ever forget this glorious experience," said Mary.

SANTURCE, PUERTO RICO — The 1974 Summer Session of the Instituto Unity de Cristianismo was held July 1-13 in Santurce, Puerto Rico. The Instituto offered courses, equivalent to those offered in UICE, to students from Latin-America, who because of the language barrier, cannot study in English at Unity School in Missouri. Courses were offered to first, second, and third year students. The ministers of Spanish speaking ministries did the teaching with the assistance of two other teachers who were in charge of subjects such as Speech and Christian Thought. Francisca Mendez, minister of Associacion Cristianismo Practico de Puerto Rico, is the Academic Director. This year more than 100 students, the largest number ever enrolled, attended the Instituto. Francisca reports that the Instituto has organized a publication department. Last year "Teach Us to Pray" was translated in Spanish. Already over 1800 copies of this book have been sold. "Effectual Prayer" is at the printers now and "Christian Healing" is being translated. The Instituto expects to publish at least one book a year.

WEST PALM BEACH, FLORIDA — A week of intensive Bible Study on the Old Testament prophets and their prophecies was conducted during the week of February 24-March 1, 1974, at Unity of the Palm Beaches. Rocco Errico, who studied with George Lamsa, conducted the classes. Hal Rosencrans, minister of Unity of the Palm Beaches, reports that the classes were well received and arrangements have been made for Rocco to return to conduct another week of intensive study in November. Another special activity conducted recently in this Florida ministry was a mini-seminar on "The Miracle of Creative Meditation." J. Sig and Jane Paulson, co-ministers of Unity Village Chapel, led this innovative one day program on April 1, 1974. The seminar was structured to allow periods of practice in the art of meditation to follow the discussion of the philosophical and spiritual nature of meditation. Times of fellowhsip were shared during the coffee hour and the luncheon which was served as part of the program.

Berton Coffey reporting for the SOUTHWEST REGION:

COMPTON, CALIFORNIA — Margaret Butterworth, minister of Compton Unity Church has accepted the responsibilities of YOU Coordinator for the Southwest Region. Margaret replaces Berton Coffey who resigned in order to direct more time to his recently expanded responsibilities as the AUC Regional Representative for the Southwest. Margaret will serve until the end of the year and has agreed to form a committee of YOU Sponsors to assist in coordinating the Youth of Unity activities in the region.

LA CRESCENTA, CALIFORNIA — Unity Church of the Valley, where Barry Montgomery is minister, hosted on July 8, 1974, the quarterly meeting of the Southwest Ministers and Teachers Conference. This meeting was devoted to sharing of views on the AUC, its purpose, and the proposed AUC bylaws. Though serious in content, the conversation sparkled with as much light and joy as is reflected in the newly decorated sanctuary of the La Crescenta ministry. The results of the discussions will be summarized and presented to the AUC Bylaws Committee in an orderly, loving, and positive way.



The Braille edition is sent free of charge to sightless persons the world over.

Much of the success of DAILY WORD is attributed to Silent Unity. From its very beginning, the Unity Movement has emphasized the beneficial results of positive, constructive thoughts and prayers. DAILY WORD magazine grew out of this belief. In the early 1920's Frank B. Whitney, then dean of Unity's correspondence school, suggested publishing an inspirational booklet people could carry with them. He became DAILY WORD'S first editor and under his direction the magazine attained worldwide circulation. Charles Fillmore, co-founder of the Unity Movement, characterized Whitney as "a meteor flashing against the dark blue of the night; a ship of silver floating in the sunlight for a moment; a brilliant soul shedding his rays in our midst."



REPRINT OF FIRST DAILY WORD AVAILABLE

As a memento for our 'Roaring 20's" Dinner Dance, the AUC office reprinted the original July 1924 issue of DAILY WORD and placed copies on the banquet tables as souvenirs of the evening. Unity School graciously permitted the AUC to prepare printing plates of the first issue from an original in the Heritage Room. Bound in a brown cover to match the original, the reprint is approximately the same size and contains the full 36 pages of Volume 1, Number 1.

CHARLES FILLMORE'S OFFERING SERVICE

Prior to Conference this year the AUC office received a note from Ernest Wilson, minister of Unity on the Plaza in Kansas City, Missouri, together with the original of

Charles Fillmore's suggested Offering Service. A portion of Ernest's note read: "Recently, I found in my files a 'suggestion' in Charles Fillmore's famous handwriting, evidently passed on to me instead of Lowell at the time Lowell asked me to replace him as Chairman Sunday mornings. I would estimate this as being in 1928 or '29."

Believing the "suggestion" to be of interest to each of you, and in cooperation with Ernest's desire to share this material, the text of the handwritten Offering Service was printed and distributed by the AUC during Conference. In response to the requests of many of our ministers and teachers that the AUC stock this item, we have printed a supply of these 5½" by 8½" booklets and bound them in a green cover on which a portion of the Service is shown in Charles Fillmore's handwriting. The Offering Service is now available on a love offering basis from your AUC office.



UNITY WORLD HEADQUARTERS ACTIVITIES CENTER

Viewing the construction area from the Tower, the progress of the work can be measured by comparing the similar view printed in previous issues of CONTACT. The auditorium will have comfortable theater-type seating, excellent acoustics, a sound system with spearate controls for auditorium and conference areas, backstage dressing rooms, elaborate lighting and



projection capabilities, and other features designed to provide ideal surroundings for worship, study, and entertainment.



Work is progressing on schedule for the new Unity Inn. This view from the east shows the arches and the completed roof decking. The new Inn will seat approximately four hundred and seventy five (475) diners in air-conditioned comfort and will feature the "scatter serving system," an innovative style of service. This modern system has been designed to greatly

faciliate serving, and will significantly reduce the time necessary for diners to obtain their choice of food and beverage. Divider walls will provide space for three private banquet rooms. Outside, the Inn will harmonize architecturally with other Village buildings. The present Unity Inn facilities in the Administration Building eventually will be converted for use as Sunday-school and youth activity rooms, offices, and administrative facilities. A snack bar will be constructed to serve the existing patio areas. The unfinished east end of the Administration Building will be refaced to present a harmonious whole.

SCHOOL FOR MINISTERIAL AND RELIGIOUS STUDIES

SPOUSES GROUP Learning to cope with the opportunities that come with being wives or husbands of ministers-in-training has brought about the formation of a unique group called Spouses of Students (SOS). Just as the SMRS students learn to function within certain criteria, their families also must learn their individual roles and how the ministry affects them. The SOS group is supportative of all in the ministerial program; however, special emphasis is placed on the needs, responsibilities, and opportunities related to the spouse in his/her own unique situation.

To date SOS activities have included two covered dish dinners, followed by discussions with special guests, a Saturday luncheon/organizational meeting, two coffees, and a style show. A program is being planned for spouses of incoming and returning students to be held during student orientation week in August. Friendly faces, facilities nearby, activities at Unity Village, emergency phone numbers, a list of baby-sitters, and lots of love and understanding will be discussed and/or provided at this time.

A congratulatory letter offering assistance in relocating in the Lee's Summit area is mailed by the SOS group to each person as he or she is accepted into the SMRS program. A follow-up packet with maps, public school information, names of people to contact upon arrival, and both general and specific helpful information was prepared and mailed in July to those persons accepted for September 1974 matriculation.

SOS offers a place and an opportunity for spouses of students to become acquainted, to serve, to grow. Together they can solve little problems so they have no chance to become big problems while the ministers-in-training are prefecting the techniques of being ministers.

INTEGRATIVE
SEMINARS
Seminars. These are held for a two-hour period each week and are for the express purpose of affording exposure to places and persons of interest which are related to the Unity ministry and its mission in the world.

In planning these seminars a special effort is always made to keep students informed about current developments in areas pertaining to the ministerial profession. This is accomplished by taking field trips and by bringing stimulating, and often challenging, speakers to present and discuss their views.

In attempting to fulfill the purpose for which these seminars are conducted, the following programs, among others, were held during this school year. Seminars were conducted on narcotics; alcoholic counseling; working with people on probation; and death, dying, and the funeral ceremony. Field trips were taken to a chiropractic college and to a funeral home. Instruction in leading group singing was given and the Phenomenon of Man filmstrip was shown and discussed. One integrative seminar period each month was held open for a student body business meeting. Periodically, meetings were designated for informal rap sessions between students and faculty. Also, meetings with Robert P. Sikking were scheduled at regular intervals in order to keep the students informed of AUC activities and to help them feel more a part of the organization with which they are affiliated.

One very important aspect of the Prison Ministry is supplying the residents with a good selection and quantity of greeting cards for the residents to use in communicating with their families and friends. Numerous letters and cards expressing appreciation for this function have been received by the SMRS students from residents of the two prisons. However, the need for cards has exceeded the supply. Many of our AUC members have indicated their desire to assist in meeting and fulfilling this need. Accordingly, a Prison Fund has now been established by the student body of SMRS to further this very worthwhile activity of service. 

The Association of Unity Churches joins with Unity School in blessing Vera for her years of service and her continuing dedication and enthusiasm in helping others on the path of Truth.




GWEN NORMENT JOINS STAFF OF UNITY SCHOOL
