REGIONAL NEWS

Angelo Giordani reporting for the EASTERN REGION:



MANCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE — Richard T. Dawson, a 1974 SMRS graduate and ordinand, is pioneering a new Unity work in Manchester, New Hampshire. Richard conducted the first Sunday Worship Service of this unfolding ministry on December 1, 1974. At the present time, the services are held in the YWCA building in Manchester. We know that each member of the Association of Unity Churches gives thanks for and blesses Richard for his willingness and dedication to expand the Unity Movement through the development of a viable ministry.

Paul Barrett reporting for the SOUTHEASTERN REGION:

CHATTANOOGA, TENNESSEE — On Saturday, February 1, a very successful Southeastern Sub-Regional Board/Minister meeting was conducted at Unity Center of Practical Christianity, Chattanooga, Tennessee. Dana Voght, minister in Chattanooga, reports: "Everyone who attended the meeting expressed feelings of satisfaction with the day's program and appreciation for the time provided for sharing of thoughts and ideas. Thirty-two persons were present, representing Unity ministries in Atlanta, Chattanooga, and Nashville. Representatives from Unity Study Group in Augusta, Georgia, were also in attendance. The meeting was informative and inspirational, and enthusiasm was so great that we are planning another meeting for area Board members and ministers in the late summer or early fall. The representatives of the individual ministries involved have now been drawn into a closer bond and feeling of oneness with each other and with the Association of Unity Churches. Such spiritual oneness is vital and much appreciated in the northern portion of the Southeastern Region where Unity ministries are geographically so far apart."

Berton C. Coffey reporting for the SOUTHWEST REGION:

SOUTHWEST REGIONAL UNITY MINISTERS AND TEACHERS CONFERENCE

The Southwest Regional Unity Ministers and Teachers Conference (U.M.T.C.) was conducted in Şan Diego, California, on

January 27-28, 1975. Christ Church Unity in San Diego, where AUC President Robert L.

Stevens serves as minister, hosted the Conference. Approximately 60 ministers, licensed teachers, and their spouses convened in Christ Church Unity for two days of prayer, study, discussion, and fellowship. There were 40 registrants for the Post Graduate Program conducted by Sue Sikking, minister of Unity-By-The-Sea in Santa Monica, and Philip Nicola, minister of Unity Church of Truth in Santa Ana. The Conference body gave ovations of appreciation to outgoing Regional President Arthur Hammons, minister of Christ Church Unity in El Cajon, and to Regional Prayer Chairman Truddie Liddell, minister of Christ Unity Center in Los Angeles. Patrick Berryhill, minister of South Bay Unity Church in Redondo Beach, was appointed to the U.M.T.C. Board to succeed Barry Montgomery, who resigned for personal reasons. Newly elected U.M.T.C. officers are: President, Jeannette Hedge, minister of Unity Christ Church in Pasadena; Vice-President, Philip Nicola; Treasurer, Edna LeSage, minister of Unity Church of Christianity in Whittier; Secretary, Dorothy Armstrong, minister of Unity Church of Newport Beach. Berton C. Coffey, minister of Unity Truth Church in Vista, continues to serve as Regional Representative.

LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA — Unity Church of Antelope Valley, where Eve Powers serves as minister, accepted custody of its own funds at a ceremony conducted during the Southwest Unity Ministers and Teachers Conference (U.M.T.C.) in San Diego. The Lancaster ministry, which was sponsored by the U.M.T.C., has recently been incorporated thereby enabling the ministry to receive funds in its own name. We know that Unity ministries in the other regions joins with those of us in the Southwest in blessing Eve and the members and friends of Unity Church of Antelope Valley. This ministry, though new in a legal sense, has been rendering a fine service to the Lancaster community for several years.

James Lewis reporting for the SOUTH CENTRAL REGION:

DALLAS, TEXAS — Unity Church of Dallas is expanding its outreach program. Donald Curtis, senior minister of Unity Church of Dallas, reports that four study groups have now been established. The first study group to be organized was in Tyler, Texas, where services are held every Tuesday night by Marjorie Kass, associate minister of Unity Church of Dallas. Following the services, discussion and credit classes are offered. Next to be organized were Unity study groups in Arlington and Denton, Texas. The groups in these two nearby communities are led by Donald. Recently, another enthusiastic group was organized in Wichita Falls, Texas, with the first service being conducted on January 12. Afternoon Worship Services will be conducted in this newest Unity group every other Sunday by Marjorie Kass. A discussion time will follow the service. We bless the ministers, members, and friends of Unity Church of Dallas for their vision of expanding the spread of Truth and for their efforts which are now manifesting that vision.

FT. COLLINS, COLORADO — James Morgan, associate minister of Unity Church of Denver, Colorado, together with his wife, Audre, have been successfully conducting a unique style of ministry. The Morgans purchased a 22 foot Revcon Motor Home this past October and are utilizing the vehicle to conduct services and study classes in Cheyenne, Wyoming, and in Ft. Collins, Ft. Morgan, and Greeley, Colorado. With "UNITY — A Fulfilling Way Of Life" painted on the motor home in a most beautiful and professional manner, the Morgans travel approximately 3000 miles a month in the performance of their ministry. Each Tuesday evening Jim conducts classes in Unity Church of Denver and then travels to Ft. Collins for a Wednesday evening meeting, continuing on to Cheyenne on Thursday, and Ft. Morgan on Friday. Jim, whose permanent residence is in Ft. Collins, is also now conducting a Worship Service each Sunday in Ft. Collins.

MISSION, KANSAS — One of the newest Unity ministries is Unity Church of Living Truth in Mission, Kansas, which was incorporated in January of this year. Dona Unfried, formerly associate minister of Unity Village Chapel, established this new work. Dona now serves as minister in Mission and is conducting a full-time ministry. The establishment of Unity Church of Living Truth coincided with the decision of Jean Beggs to relocate in Santa Fe, New Mexico, thereby allowing the new ministry to embrace a Unity study group which Jean had been conducting for three years in Overland Park, Kansas. Originally meeting in a Rodeway Inn for Sunday evening services, Unity Church of Living Truth held their first Sunday morning Worship Service on February 2, 1975, in their newly rented facilities at the Johnson County Community Center in Mission. There were 86 persons in attendance at the February 2nd service, including 24 in Sunday School. The new facilities will accommodate approximately 400 persons. Dona reports that the ministry is blessed with a volunteer office staff who donate their time five days a week. In addition, Dona stated, the ministry is assisted by dedicated Sunday School teachers and an exceptionally talented soloist. Currently the ministry is offering Thursday morning and evening classes in Truth as well as Sunday morning Worship Services and a Sunday evening healing service. Dona also conducts an afternoon Worship Service on the first Sunday of each month at a nearby life care center for senior citizens.

Dona recently appeared as a guest on a local cable television talk show whose programs are oriented toward metaphysics and parapsychology. Dona was the only guest that evening on the one hour show. She feels that the air time provided an excellent audio-visual means of apprising people in her community of the new Unity ministry. Dona asks her fellow members of our Association to, "Please send us your blessings and prayers as together we see the Father's plan at work here in the great 'Sunflower' state of Kansas."

Charles Korfhage reporting for the NORTHERN CALIFORNIA REGION:

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA MINISTERS CONFERENCE — On January 7—9, 1975, twenty-seven of the thirty-two registered ministerial members of the Northern California Ministers Conference (N.C.M.C.), together with their spouses, attended the Regional Conference conducted at Pajaro Dunes on the Monterey coast and beach near Watsonville, California. The following new N.C.M.C. officers were elected: President — Ken Brabeau, minister of Unity Church of Merced; Vice-President — Carol Knox, minister of Unity Center of Walnut Creek; Secretary — Don Gates, minister of San Leandro Unity Church; Treasurer — Dorothy Roberts, minister of Unity Church of Truth of San Mateo; Memberat-large — Ernie Milleur, minister of Unity Church of Fresno. Charles Korfhage's term as Regional Representative continues for another year.

A Post Graduate Program on "Effective Presentation of Christian Healing" was conducted during the Conference by Dorothy Pierson, co-minister of Christ Unity Church in Sacramento, and David Williamson, minister of Unity Church of Richmond. Dorothy and Dave presented a well prepared agenda for this day long program and, with the assembled ministers and licensed teachers, brought forth excellent points and ideas on the teachings of this Unity book and course. Charles Korfhage also advises that there was, along with the serious study and business meetings, a great camaraderie among those participating in the Conference. In addition, all shared in the great food and singing and joy, as well as enjoying the bonus of walking along the beautiful Pacific Ocean beach.

The next N.C.M.C. meeting is scheduled for May 6-8, 1975, in Walnut Creek, California, with Unity Center of Walnut Creek functioning as host. The next Board/Minister meeting

for our region will be held on April 11-12, 1975, in Sacramento with Christ Unity Church functioning as host. This Board/Minister meeting will commence on a Friday in order that there may be more time for fellowship and a longer business session.

RENO, NEVADA — Last month, Unity Ministry of Reno reported the establishment of an outreach work in Tahoe City, California. This progressive Nevada ministry has now established another outreach work, making a triad of Unity organizations in the Reno area. The newest group is Unity of Carson City, Nevada. This group meets every Tuesday morning for a Truth class taught for credit by Carlton and Jacklyn Buboltz, ministers of Unity Ministry of Reno. Carlton and Jackie, who team teach in their classes, also report that Unity of Lake Tahoe is well underway with a Truth class being conducted each Sunday evening.

WALNUT CREEK, CALIFORNIA — A month long symposium entitled "Varieties of Religious Experience Today," was conducted this past October by Diablo Valley College in Pleasant Hill, California. Carol Knox, minister of Unity Center of Walnut Creek, participated in this symposium and presented an evening lecture on "A Scientific Approach to Spiritual Healing." The symposium's program was developed by the Committee on Arts and Lectures at Diablo Valley College and included lectures, panel discussions, films, art exhibits, and music and dance performances. Carol stated that the symposium was centered around man's search for a coherent, joyful life-style; i.e., religion's attempt to make human experience authentic, deep, loving, happy, and peaceful. Unity Center of Walnut Creek and the Unity Movement in general received a considerable amount of publicity as a result of Carol's participation in the symposium. For example, both the front and back covers of the symposium's program included numerous references to Unity and the Association of Unity Churches. The cover also carried a reproduction of a portion of an article which appeared in a San Francisco newspaper wherein James Dillet Freeman, Director of Silent Unity, was quoted on the subject of healing.

Margaret Cain reporting for the GREAT LAKES REGION:



DETROIT, MICHIGAN — On the evening of December 18, 1974, Unity of the Infinite Presence, Detroit, presented a performance of Handel's "Messiah" at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. The program featured professional soloists from the Detroit area, members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and a chorus which has been recognized as one of Detroit's finest ensembles. Over 500 persons attended the special program. The idea of the ministry sponsoring this performance, conducted by an all professional cast, was conceived by Jack Boland, minister of this creative and dynamic Michigan ministry, and Robert Angus, professional tenor soloist who also serves as soloist for the ministry. Regarding the performance, Jack stated "This was an all time great presentation of the Messiah. It not only introduced Unity to many people but introduced Unity in a manner in keeping with the excellence that is Unity's hallmark. As a result of this presentation,

more people are attending our services and classes. This was our first concert series and we are planning another in the summer and then again next winter. Indicative of the wonderful way in which the standing room only audience received the performance was the fact that many of the soloists and members of the symphony orchestra stated that they had never sung or played to an audience as attentative and appreciative as the one present at the performance." Contributing greatly to the success of the performance was the thoroughly professional caliber of the publicity given to the performance by the ministry.

JACKSON, MICHIGAN - At their Annual Membership Meeting, held on January 19, 1975, the congregation of Unity of Jackson, Michigan, voted unanimously to purchase a building which is to be used as the new home of the ministry. Roy Fox, minister of this expanding Michigan ministry, advises that the property is situated on the corner of two of the busiest streets in Jackson thereby giving the ministry maximum visibility. On the new property is a large, newly painted white frame two story house, with four large stately pillars on the front porch. Inside, the facility is carpeted throughout, both upstairs and downstairs. Upstairs there are five large rooms which will be utilized for the ministry's Sunday School. Also upstairs is a large space which will be utilized as a library and reading room. There are restroom facilities on both floors. The first floor of the facility has areas which will be used to conduct services and classes, and separate areas for book room, minister's office, foyer, and kitchen. The facility also has two fireplaces and an outside fireplace which will be used for barbecues and other fellowship gatherings. The property has spacious grounds and a large lot which, when cleared and paved, will be utilized for off-street-parking. Roy also advised that the ministry plans to add a 200 seat sanctuary to the facility at sometime in the future. We bless Roy and each member and friend of Unity of Jackson for their wonderful demonstration of consciousness and we see the ministry expanding and unfolding in even greater expressions of service.



LIVONIA, MICHIGAN — Unity Church of Livonia (shown above), where Eugene Sorensen serves as minister, was recently highlighted in an extensive feature article on local architecture in the Livonia area by the Observer & Eccentric newspaper. The article was highly complimentary of the church facilities and stressed the ministry's architectural ability to set a scene that is conducive to worship. The article stated that Unity of Livonia is a church that stresses community feeling among its members and, accordingly, the 250 seats in the Sanctuary are placed so that all members of the congregation are seated within 25 feet of the lectern.

OAK PARK, ILLINOIS — Unity of Oak Park, where Richard Dale Billings serves as minister, celebrated in December the completion of the ministry's new Youth Center. Richard advises that the ministry's Youth of Unity Chapter was able to move into their own quarters before the Christmas season. We all rejoice and give thanks for the continuing evidence of expansion and growth of our Unity ministries throughout the world and especially bless Richard and the staff and members of Unity of Oak Park for the important part they take in the unfoldment of our Movement.

IN MEMORIAM

The AUC office has been advised of the transitions of five of our fellow members of the Association of Unity Churches. We know that each member of our Association joins in extending special blessings of love and God-speed to Fannie A. Baldwin, Helen M. Crombie, Edna M. Drebert, Mary J. Fales, and Ruth Hacking as they continue in their eternal, spiritual ongoing.

Fannie A. Baldwin, Minister Emeritus, made her transition on February 4, 1975. Ordained in 1944, Fannie began her career in the ministry at Unity School by working in the Correspondence School Department. She served ministries in Kansas City and Springfield, Missouri, and in Lincoln, Nebraska. She was the original minister of Unity Center of Independence in Missouri during its pioneer days. Fannie had retired from active ministerial duties in 1964.

Helen M. Crombie made her transition on January 28, 1975. Ordained in 1965, Helen served Newark Unity Church where she had been affiliated for 51 years.

Edna M. Drebert made her transition in October 1974. An ordained Unity minister, Edna founded South Gate Unity in California.

Mary J. Fales, a licensed teacher, made her transition on January 27, 1975. Mary served in several ministries in Florida and for many years preceding her transition served as a teacher in Unity Center of Practical Christianity in Miami, Florida.

Ruth Hacking made her transition on February 15, 1975. Ruth, along with Mr. Parker Drake, developed our Unity work in London, England, just prior to and during World War II. Ordained in 1949, Ruth maintained the work at Unity House until her retirement in 1958.

Any Unity minister who is interested in participating in a movement-wide expansion program conducted by our Association of Unity Churches should complete the form in detail and send it to the AUC office as soon as possible. For the ministers receiving this form, you will note on the reverse side a question regarding your thoughts about the development of a new ministry. The New Ministry Development Committee will be very eager to have your thoughts and ideas and suggestions for, as in all things, we want to create the greatest base for the flow of ideas and suggestions in order to assure that the guidance of Spirit expresses through and manifests in our collective efforts.

Please be sure to include this outreach effort by our Movement as a whole in your daily prayers. The program has exciting possibilities that need your consciousness of prayer support. Thank you.

MIDYEAR COUNCIL OF COMMITTEES

The Midyear Council of Committees met at Unity Village January 20–21, 1975, and your AUC Board of Trustees convened January 22–24. The reports of the various Committees to the Board are summarized as follows:

Banquet Committee – Loren Flickinger, Chairman. The Banquet Committee has planned an exciting Dinner Dance program for the first AUC Banquet in the new Unity Inn. The theme is "Dreams Come True." The Dinner Dance is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday evening, June 18, 1975, and the cost will be \$10.00 per person. Additional information regarding the Banquet will be included in CONTACT.

Bylaws Committee — Mary Rowe, Chairman. The decision was made that the Bylaws Committee should postpone meeting in January until the AUC Board had an opportunity to review suggestions and comments regarding the Proposed Bylaw changes. It was the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Trustees that, pending other input from the forthcoming survey by Barton Associates, the recommended changes to the Bylaws remain tabled indefinitely and the Board withdraw any endorsements pertaining to the Bylaw changes.

Executive Committee — Glenn Mosley, Chairman. The Youth of Unity Conference Body unanimously recommended to the AUC Board of Trustees that the Proposed Y.O.U. Bylaws be approved, and the recommendation received unanimous approval by the Board. Laura Ruffins has been serving under special dispensation since 1969 as a licensed teacher in charge of Unity Truth Center in Chicago. Recommendation was made by the Executive Committee to the Board, and ratified by the L & O Committee, that Laura be ordained. The Board approved and on January 26, 1975, Robert L. Stevens, AUC President, conducted a special ordination service for Laura with her congregation in Chicago. Luis Perez, licensed teacher in charge of Unity Panamericano in New York, met with the Board of Unity Instituto in Puerto Rico and received their unanimous recommendation for ordination. The application to the AUC Board was approved and an ordination service for Luis will take place as soon as feasible.

Finance & Budget Committee – Charles Neal, Chairman. The Finance & Budget Committee submitted a proposed budget of \$396,366 for the 1975–76 year. This amount represents an approximate 3% increase over last year's budget. The proposed budget

will be printed in detail in the 1975 Conference Program booklet, a copy of which you will receive prior to Conference. The Committee expressed appreciation to the Executive Office for their fine efforts in economizing and for their prudent purchasing practices. Although it appears that the actual income for 1974–75 will fall short of the total income budgeted, the Executive Office has kept expenses within the actual income. Accordingly, a surplus in income over expenses should be realized at the end of this fiscal year.

Licensing & Ordination Committee — Larry Swartz, Chairman. The L & O Committee now consists of 22 members who function in three separate committees due to the large number of SMRS students. Les Saunders, Joel Baehr, and Mary Stovin serve as co-chairpersons. The Committee met with and recommended Clair Rank of Kansas City for licensed teacher recognition. The Board of Trustees unanimously approved the recommendation for Mr. Rank. The Committee also recommended that each application for ordination pursuant to paragraph 5 of the L & O Policies be submitted to the Board for determination whether or not an exception should be made. Should the Board consider the applicant for ordination under paragraph 5, then all correspondence relative to such applicant would be submitted to the chairman and co-chairpersons of the L & O Committee for further evaluation. Upon the Committee's recommendation, the applicant would then be informed as to whether or not they would be invited to appear before the next regularly scheduled L & O Committee meeting for final determination.

Ministerial Education Advisory Committee — Jack Barker, Chairman. The Ministerial Education Advisory Committee met with the ministerial students and reported that the students have definite positive and enthusiastic attitudes about the SMRS faculty, the curriculum, and themselves as students. The Committee also met with the staff of U.I.C.E. to discuss Extension Course intensives on the Regional level. Such intensives have been conducted in the Northwest Region and in the St. Louis, Missouri, area. Plans for new Extensive Course classes are now being finalized.

Post Graduate Committee — Jack Barker, Chairman. During AUC Pre-Conference this year, two additional Post Graduate Courses will be offered. On Wednesday, June 11, Martha Giudici will present a workshop on "The World of Meditation." Martha's SMRS class in meditation has received high acclaim from the ministerial students and Martha has agreed to condense this trimester course into a five-hour workshop for all ministers and teachers. On Thursday, June 12, Bill Dale will present a practical workshop on "Public Relations — What, Why, and How." Bill is preparing material on public relations which will be distributed to all attending the program. News media representatives of the Kansas City newspapers and radio and television stations will participate in a panel discussion on public relations. On Friday, June 13, "Effective Presentation of Christian Healing" will be presented for those who did not have an opportunity to participate in this program in their region. The Board has approved a total fee of \$10.00 for one or more of the Post Graduate Courses presented during Pre-Conference.

Program Committee — William Hines, Chairman. The Program Committee has planned a well balanced program for our 1975 AUC Conference. With the theme "The Healing Feeling," the Conference will be held in the new Activities Center. Commencing with this issue (see pages 17 and 18), CONTACT will include each month until Conference a special two-page informational section on the Conference program and banquet.

Thy Tab and Thy Fresca, they comfort me.



The photograph to the right, which was taken a bit earlier, shows some of the workmen installing the large glass panes in one of the side corriders leading to the auditorium. In the foreground are some of the stands for the 1,100 comfortable and beautifully upholstered seats.





Among the many other beautifully designed and functional aspects of the Activities Center are the three sets of massive double doors which provide access to the lobby of the building. The doors, as shown in the photograph to the left, were manufactured in a "Heroic Sunburst" design executed in bonded bronze. Book Rack

A NEW BOOK BY DONALD CURTIS: "THE WAY OF THE CHRIST" The Way of the Christ by Donald Curtis is published by Unity and will doubtless have a wide readership among students of Truth. The following are excerpts from the review of Don's book by Hugh R. Horne

which appeared in the February issue of UNITY Magazine:

"Prolific writer and dynamic lecturer Donald Curtis has written a book that is not only informative and instructive but inspirational as well. He deals with basics, and his subject matter is presented in well-delineated form; four sections set forth his premises with a lucidity that is often lacking in contemporary treatises that attempt to discuss such ponderous themes.

"The first section discusses the birth of the Christ in you, the Christ consciousness, the gifts of Spirit, the living essence of everything, and the secret of Spirit force. Section II asks the question 'Who Am I?' This theme is developed by asking five other questions, to which the author gives understandable and satisfying answers that competently unfold the true meaning of self and God's purpose in and for us. These questions include: 'Why am I here? Where did I come from? How are universal laws at work in my life? What is my destiny? When will I know God?'

"In the section on 'The Path of Fulfillment,' the author discusses such subjects as the light and thrust of Spirit, the union of love, and the path of discipleship. The concluding section on 'The Entry of the Christ' deals with the resurrected Christ, Christ teaching, and Christ, the new age man, among others.

"'How do I become great? By keeping eternally at it. Each of us, each day of our life, must work to bring ourselves into focus with the true Self. We live forever, one day at a time. We are natives of eternity, children of the light, and we ascend eternally into the Infinite. We are immortal now, we live an eternal life, and yet each of us has a job to do during this very lifetime.' One of our great purposes in life, the author says, is to help people. Jesus came to witness to the Truth, and we are to follow His example. 'Actually, it is the purpose of each of us to bear witness to the Truth by finding this Truth within ourself and expressing it in our life. We need first to seek the inner kingdom and let the great surging, unfolding creative power of life flow through us'

"Those who follow the way of the Christ become keepers of the flame, so to speak; they are good stewards, and the fruits to be gained from such stewardship are promised by Jesus as set forth in the Beatitudes. This book will no doubt enjoy a wide readership simply because its contents are basic, fundamental, very needful."

DETERMINATION OF DATE FOR EASTER

Charles Roth, minister of Unity Truth Center in Indianapolis, Indiana, shared with us an article from the Indianapolis Star regarding the determination of

the date for Easter. The article stated that it is usually said that Easter comes on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox. Many persons have noted that in 1974 the first full moon after the spring equinox was listed in the almanacs as on Saturday, April 6. "How come," they ask "Easter wasn't on Sunday, April 7?" Dr. Frank Edmondson, Chairman of the Indiana University Astronomy Department, explains that the rule for the date of Easter is usually mis-stated slightly. It should be, Easter is the first Sunday after the 14th day of the ecclesiastical moon which occurs on or immediately after March 21. This 14th day of the ecclesiastical moon is also known as the Paschal (Passover) full moon. It is nearly the same as the astronomical, or real, full moon, but they can occur on different dates, as they did in 1974, when the astronomical full moon was at 4 p.m. on April 6, but the Paschal full moon was on April 7. When the Paschal full moon falls on a Sunday, the following Sunday is Easter. Usually, this difference in the Paschal and actual full moons makes no difference in the date of Easter, but when, as in 1974, the actual full moon falls on Saturday and the Paschal full moon on Sunday, the difference is apparent. The dating of the Paschal moon follows complicated calendar rules having their origin in the old Jewish lunar calendar calculations. Under these rules, the date of the Paschal moon depends on the 'Golden Number' of the year. The Golden Number can be found by dividing the given year by 19 and adding one to the remainder. Thus, 1974 divided by 19 gives 103, with a remainder of 17, which plus 1 gives 18, the Golden Number for 1974. A table of Paschal moons, such as can be found in the World Almanac, gives April 7 as the Paschal moon date in a year whose Golden Number is 18. The early Christians were divided as to when Easter should be observed, some favoring a day just following Passover feast, with which Jesus' death and resurrection were associated, and others favoring a related Sunday. The present rules were established at the first Council of the Christian Churches at Nicaea, in Asia Minor, in 325 A.D. The Golden Number for 1975 is 19 and the World Almanac gives March 27 as the Paschal moon date. Therefore, this year Easter Sunday will be celebrated on March 30.

Unity Village Chapel, where Sig and Jane Paulson serves as co-MEN OF UNITY ministers, is blessed with a very active and dedicated group of men who have joined in fellowship for the purpose of being of service to the ministry. Organized under the name "Men of Unity," this group gathers the first Saturday of each month for a continental breakfast prior to their time of meeting. The meetings are kept informal and include a time for discussion and sharing of ideas. Alton K. Blosser, chairman of the Men of Unity for Unity Village Chapel, states: "We are interested in any project that will help our center in the spreading of Truth. Projects that we will be involved in will be the placing of free Unity literature at public places. We also plan to help in any way we can to man the new Unity World Headquarters Activities Center now under construction at Unity Village. Our organization has only a chairman and he calls on other members for any help needed. We have no dues, but we do have a plate at the coffee table where anyone who so desires may make a donation. Our meetings usually last about an hour and a half and we close with a prayer. It is my opinion that a men's group at Unity centers is a must. It does not have to be a large group but it brings people together of one universal mind and enables them to get acquainted." For information contact Alton K.
