In the developing of any organization



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1975 Pre-Conference and Conference

The Association of Unity Churches is growing! Evidence of this was shown during this year's Pre-Conference and Conference programs which were well attended by ministers, licensed teachers, and SMRS students. Reports on the many activities conducted during these productive and successful assemblages, and summaries of the reports of the various Committees to the Conference Body are included in this issue of CONTACT.

The Pre-Conference activities began Monday, June 9, with a brief general assembly of the AUC Council of Committees. The individual Committees then convened in their assigned locations to begin their two days of Committee meetings.

The Pre-Conference Post Graduate Courses consisted of three different seminars. An entire day was allowed for each seminar. On Wednesday, June 11, Martha Giudici, faculty member of SMRS, presented "The World of Meditation." A total of two hundred-three (203) ordained ministers, licensed teachers, and student ministers attended this course on comparative meditation. Martha effectively utilized visual aids in presenting a study of some of the different forms of meditation. The morning and afternoon sessions were devoted to times of lecture interposed with experience in the varied forms of meditation being explored.

On Thursday, June 12, the Post Graduate Course on "Public Relations - What, Why, and How" was presented by Bill Dale, Public Relations Director for AUC and Unity School. The morning session covered basic principles, practices, and processes of ministry public relations. Practical application of PR tools and techniques was emphasized. In the afternoon session a panel of newspaper, radio, and television media representatives from the Greater Kansas City Metropolitan area shared their expertise with those attending the seminar. Each of the two hundred thirty-three (233) members of the AUC who attended the public relations seminar received a manual of ministry public relations.

Jack Barker, minister of New Thought Unity Center in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Catherine Knight, associate minister of Detroit Unity Association, Detroit, Michigan, presented the final Post Graduate Course on Friday, June 13. Entitled "Effective Presentation of Christian Healing," this course was a repeat of the course on Christian Healing which has been conducted in the various regions

throughout the past year. One hundred sixty-three (163) of our ministers, licensed teachers, and ministerial students availed themselves of this opportunity to improve the effectiveness of their individual presentations of Christian Healing. Jack and Catherine presented chapter nine of Christian Healing utilizing outline, overhead transparencies, and hand-out materials. Participants then had the opportunity to work creatively on chapter seven in small groups.

In attendance at this year's Ministers/Teachers Conference conducted in the new Unity World Headquarters Activities Center, June 15–19, 1975, was a total of four hundred-three (403) ordained Unity ministers, licensed teachers, ministerial students, delegates, and their spouses. We give thanks for the tremendous consciousness present at this year's Conference.

The theme for Conference 1975 was "The Healing Feeling" and was subtitled "I Am A Whole Being Now." Bill Hines, minister of Unity Church of Des Moines, Iowa, who served as Chairman of the Program Committee, and the other members of the Committee are certainly to be congratulated and blessed for their dedication and willingness to share their time and inspiration in the development of a fine Conference program.

On Sunday, June 15, James C. Lewis, minister of Unity Church of Denver, Colorado, and 1975 Vice-President of the AUC, conducted the 9:30 a.m. Worship Service at Unity Village Chapel. Robert L. Stevens, minister of Christ Church, Unity, San Diego, California, and 1975 AUC President, conducted the 11:00 a.m. Worship Service.

Conference registration and open house were held Sunday afternoon and evening and proved to be a grand time of fellowship.

The "God Speaking Through Man" awards program was conducted Sunday evening by Unity School of Christianity. A full report on this activity is included in this issue starting on page 15.

Conference was officially opened on Monday morning, June 16, by the entire body of Silent Unity workers led by James Dillet Freeman, Director of Silent Unity, joining the Conference Body in meditation and a special blessing.

Following the Silent Unity blessing, Charles R. Fillmore, President of Unity School, and Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the AUC, welcomed the Conference Body.

In lieu of the scheduled business and regional meetings on Monday, the entire day's program was devoted to the survey being conducted for AUC by Barton Associates of Akron, Ohio. The program was conducted by Ms. Elisabeth S. Buehl, Vice President of Barton Associates. Ms. Buehl distributed a very comprehensive Survey Workbook and gave a most helpful and thorough explanation (continued on page 3)

On Monday evening, June 16, Evarts G. Loomis, M.D., F.A.C.S., presented his program "Healing the Whole Man." Dr. Loomis spoke on the meaning of the whole person and in dialogue with J. Sig Paulson, co-minister of Unity Village Chapel, discussed natural healing techniques through art, exercise, and nutrition. As a part of his presentation, Dr. Loomis showed a motion picture film which he recently made in Europe. The film featured other renowned persons in the fields of science and medicine who share Dr. Loomis' ideas on treating the whole person.

On Tuesday morning, June 17, the business meeting sessions commenced. That afternoon, Bernard Haldane of Washington, D.C., conducted his workshop entitled "Everyone Can Win." Thoroughly conversant with the teachings of Unity, Mr. Haldane, through use of visual aids and the distribution of work sheets, led the Conference Body through the exercise of determining skills and abilities with the goal of making a habit of success.

Mr. Haldane also made copies of his book How To Make a Habit of Success available to those attending the workshop. This book has been reviewed by the AUC Book Review Committee and unanimously recommended to the members of the AUC (see review in Book Rack section of the June issue of CONTACT).

The business sessions continued on Wednsday morning and reconvened in the afternoon following the very fine and helpful program conducted by Robert Owens, Accounting Consultant to the AUC. Mr. Owens and members of his staff answered many questions of the Conference Body during this program entitled "Estate and Will Planning for Ministers and Spouses."

Also contributing to the overall consciousness of our 1975 Conference were Billie Freeman of Silent Unity; Martha Smock, Editor of Daily Word; and Paula McClellan of the Retreat Department, who led the morning meditations on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, respectively. Our daily times of singing during the morning sessions were led by Mrs. Shirley Byrns, a first-year ministerial student,

Wednesday evening, June 18, the new Unity Inn was filled to capacity with AUC members and friends who enjoyed the "Dreams Come True" Dinner Dance. A wonderful dinner was prepared and served by the staff of Unity Inn under the direction of Lou McGough, Manager of the Inn. Following dinner, an entertaining and well produced program was given by members of the SMRS student body. Providing the musical portion of the program were the "Soul Survivors" a singing group comprised of SMRS students led by Connie Haines. The "Soul Survivors" also provided brief musical programs prior to both the Monday and Tuesday evening lecture programs during Conference. Dance music during the Wednesday evening program was provided by "The Brady Bunch," a professional band from the Kansas City Metropolitan area.

A special plaque expressing the appreciation of the entire AUC was presented on Thursday morning, June 19, to retiring AUC President, Robert L. Stevens. We know that each member of the AUC joins in blessing Bob for his dedication in serving and for his willingness to share his time, talent, and consciousness.

Also receiving special recognition on Thursday was Marguerite Corn, who received a plaque expressing the AUC's appreciation for her many years of sharing her musical talents as organist for AUC assemblages.

Unity School, in recognition and appreciation of the love and support and substance shared with Unity School by our AUC ministries, graciously donated a supply of these commemorative paperweights to the AUC for distribution during this special program.

Under the direction of Betty Sikking of Vancouver, British Columbia, who served as Chairman, the Spouses of Ministers Association (SOMA) planned, developed, and implemented a tremendous Spouses Program for our 1975 Conference. The Spouses Program included a presentation by **Billie Freeman** on Monday, June 16, entitled "What Do You Do Until the Minister Gets There."

On Tuesday the spouses' business meeting was conducted. "Entertaining" was the discussion topic for the Wednesday morning session. On Wednesday afternoon the spouses joined the Conference Body for the program "Estate and Will Planning for Ministers and Spouses" presented by Robert Owens.

ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS AND OFFICERS

The Conference Body elected Larry Swartz and Miki Bowen to serve on the Board of Trustees for the next three years. Larry is co-minister with his wife, Mary Ellen, of Unity of Tucson, Arizona. Miki is minister of Unity Church of San Luis Obispo, California.

Scott Sherman has tendered his resignation as a member of the Board in order to accept, effective September 1, 1975, his new responsibilities as Expansion Director for the AUC (see report of the New Ministries Development Committee in this issue of CONTACT). George Stone, minister of Unity Center of Christianity in Washington, D.C., was elected to fill Scott's unexpired term.

Elected by the Board to serve for three years were Paul Barrett, minister of Unity Christ Church, St. Petersburg, Florida; Robert L. Stevens, minister of Christ Church, Unity in San Diego, California; and Charles Neal, minister of Unity Center of Practical Christianity, Miami, Florida.

Jay Dishman, minister of Unity — San Diego, California, and Charles Neal were elected to serve on the Executive Committee.

The Board elected **James C. Lewis** as President of the Association for the coming year and **Joyce Kramer** as the Vice-President. Pursuant to policy established by Conference Body action, Joyce, minister of Unity Church of Tidewater, Virginia Beach, Virginia, becomes President-elect and will be our next President.

HONORARY DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF DIVINITY

A proposal to establish a method by which the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity (D.D.) may be conferred on Unity ministers by the Association of Unity Churches was passed by a majority vote of the Conference Body.

This proposal was based upon research performed jointly by Charles Neal, minister of Unity Center of Practical Christianity, Miami, Florida; Glenn Mosley, minister of Akron Unity Center of Truth, Akron, Ohio; and Hal Rosencrans, minister of Unity of the Palm Beaches, West Palm Beach, Florida.

Charles Neal introduced the proposal to the AUC Executive Committee who submitted it to the full Board of Trustees. The proposal received a majority vote of the Board, however, since the vote was not unanimous, the Board recommended that the entire proposal be presented to the Conference Body.

As stated, the proposal to confer the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity did receive an affirmative vote by a majority of the Conference Body. The proposal as it was submitted to the Conference Body has been reprinted in entirety in this issue beginning on page 26.

The proposal is now in the process of being implemented and the Board of Trustees has appointed five persons to serve as a committee to implement the criteria of the doctorate and report back to the Board in January 1976. Those appointed are Charles Neal, Chairman; Hal Rosencrans, Glenn Mosley, Paul Barrett, and Joyce Kramer.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS IN PROGRESS

Appointments are now being made by James C. Lewis, President of the AUC, to fill vacancies and appoint new members to the various AUC Committees for 1975–1976. A complete list of the Committees and their members will be published in CONTACT as soon as the appointments are completed and confirmations received.

LOS ANGELES COURT CASE

The Conference Body was apprised of the current status of the court case regarding Christ Church Unity in Los Angeles, California. The case is now in the process of being presented to the California State Appellate Court. It was the Board of Trustees' recommendation to the Conference Body that the AUC continue to support, both financially and spiritually, the Action Committee who are the plaintiffs in the court case until such time as a decision is rendered by the Appellate Court.

YOUTH OF UNITY COORDINATOR

Jacqueline Neal, who has served for the past two and a half years as our Youth of Unity Coordinator, has applied for placement in the field. Jackie was graduated in August, 1974, by SMRS and received ordination at that time. She will be releasing her responsibilities as YOU Coordinator following this year's Y.O.U. Conference. John Strickland, a first-year ministerial student from Atlanta, Georgia, has been employed to serve for the next year as Youth of Unity Coordinator. He will be working with Jackie during the 1975 Conference.

FINANCE AND BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance and Budget Committee, **Charles Neal**, Chairman, reported a \$35,358 increase in AUC income for the Fiscal Year ended March 31, 1975, over the prior year. This figure represents a 10% increase in contributions from member ministries during the year. Total income for Fiscal Year 1975 fell short of the budget expectation by \$22,730. However, due to the Executive Office of the AUC utilizing stringent economy measures the total income received did exceed total expenses by \$6,180.

The proposed budget prepared by the Committee in January and published in the 1975 Conference Program was adjusted to make provision for additional items. The decision was made to proceed with the survey to be conducted by Barton Associates, which may cost between \$10,000 and \$15,000. Therefore, Research & Development under General Office was increased to a total of \$13,000.

The Committee recommended that the AUC purchase the IBM Electronic Composer rather than continue on a lease program. This piece of equipment, which now enables CONTACT to be published in its new format, increased Office Equipment under Captial Outlay to a total of \$9,700. The Committee also recommended, and received ratification by the Conference Body, that the monthly payments to the annuitants of the Emeritus Program fund be increased by \$10 a month.

The addition of the aforementioned items resulted in our tithe being increased to a total of \$38,145. The total recommended AUC budget for Fiscal Year 1976 is \$419,601. Such budget represents an increase of approximately 9% over last year's budget and was approved by the Conference Body. The approved budget is shown at right.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee, **Glenn Mosley**, Chairman, reported on its meetings held in April in San Diego, California, and on its meetings held at Unity Village in June. **Dorothy Pierson**, cominister of Christ Unity Church, Sacramento, California, had been requested by the Committee to review all available Sunday School material and report her findings to the Executive Committee in June. Based upon Dorothy's research, a recommendation was made that a Coordinator be hired by the Association. The Coordinator would gather additional and more detailed information on all available Sunday School material and work toward producing more simplified and student oriented material.

Lani Jones, wife of Gary Jones, minister of Unity West in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, has been employed by the AUC and will serve as Coordinator. Lani has already begun her work and each AUC member ministry should have received a questionnaire from Lani that will provide initial information for this project.

NEW MINISTRIES DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The New Ministries Development Committee, **Stan Hampson**, Chairman, met with and presented to the Board of Trustees recommendations for the development of several new ministries within various geographical areas. A specific recommendation by the Committee was that the Metropolitan Chicago area be selected as the location for this project's first pilot ministry. The Board ratified the selection of the Chicago area.

The Conference Body ratified the Committee's recommendation that **Scott Sherman**, minister of Unity Church of Truth in Spokane, Washington, be hired by the AUC to serve as Expansion Director. Scott will officially assume his new responsibilities effective September 1, 1975.

The proposed annual budget for the New Ministries Development project will average from \$65,000, to \$75,000. The annual salary range of the Expansion Director is from \$25,000 to \$35,000, plus one year's operational expenses at \$3,000 per month.

All love offerings received in the new ministry will be returned to the AUC until the new ministry incorporates and receives a permanent minister. This income will be utilized to reduce expenses of the project.

Funding of the New Ministries Development project will be provided through the Partnership for Ministerial Development and the AUC Expansion Fund tithe account.

The Expansion Director will be responsible to the AUC Board of Trustees through a Committee of three persons. This Committee will be entitled the Expansion Assistance and Support Committee and will be comprised of the Regional Representative in the area, a minister appointed by the Board of Trustees, and the Executive Director of the AUC.

LICENSING AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Licensing and Ordination Committee, Larry Swartz, Chairman, has recommended, and the Board of Trustees has approved such recommendations, that the

following 27 SMRS students receive ordination upon their graduation August 15, 1975: Richard Ammons, Margaret Berkman, Mary Alice Brown, Susan Colombero, William B. Dale, Elayne Decker, Ardath Dixon, William Esslinger, Connie Haines, Duane Hardy, Elva Holcombe, Jeannie Horton, Jane Hungerford, Daniel Kellerstrass, Lucille Knebel, Diana MacDonald, Larry Miller, Ed Myler, Robert Preston, Lila Proby, Gary Redfern, Marilyn Rieger, Mayola SaltPaw, Jim Sims, Rod Tally, Scott Thornton, and Clem Thrift.

It was the unanimous recommendation of the Licensing and Ordination Committee that the status of Licensed Minister be implemented. Ths would allow the Committee to upgrade the ordination policies and to have an alternative other than licensed teacher recognition to confer on students graduated by SMRS.

The Board also approved the Committee's recommendation that the following four SMRS students receive licensed minister recognition upon their graduation on August 15: Rowland Jenkins, John Kelley, Mark Smith, and Joseph Stover.

The Licensing and Ordination Committee met with and recommended four applicants for licensed teacher recognition. The Board of Trustees approved such recognitions for Josephine Kuipers, Kansas City, Missouri; Thomas Lockery, East Orange, New Jersey; Nicholas Sidovar, Austin, Texas; and Lela Stahl, North Hollywood, California.

The Board also ratified the recommendation of the Executive Committee that the sixth requirement under the AUC's Licensing and Ordination Policies (see page 107 of the 1975 Yearbook) be amended to read as follows: "No person shall be ordained unless he is committed to enter a field ministry authorized by the Association of Unity Churches. For purposes of this paragraph, the term 'field ministry' shall be deemed to include any student who intends to become a full time employee of the Unity School of Christianity."

BYLAWS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Bylaws Committee, Mary Rowe, Chairman, presented a new recommended Bylaws for Unity Ministries a copy of which will be mailed to each ministry.

POST-GRADUATE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Post-Graduate Committee, Jack Barker, Chairman, recommended a revision of the annual membership card issued to ministers and licensed teachers. Such revision includes listing on the reverse side of the card the Post-Graduate credits received by the member during the past two years. This recommendation was approved and such revision will appear on the 1976 membership cards.

The Committee called attention to the requirement that each minister and licensed teacher who wishes to teach Extension Course classes for credit will be required to have ten Post-Graduate credits by the end of 1976.

"Twelve Powers of Man" will be the Post-Graduate Course presented in the regions during 1975-76. Two teams of two persons each will conduct the courses. Phillip M. Pierson, co-minister of Christ Unity Church, Sacramento, California, and Marguerite Meyer, co-minister of Christ Church, Unity in San Jose, California, will conduct the courses for those AUC Regions on the west coast.

Jack Barker, minister of New Thought Unity Center, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Catherine Knight, associate minister of Detroit Unity Association, Detroit, Michigan, will conduct the courses for those AUC Regions on the east coast.

Due to our 1976 AUC Conference being held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, there will be no Post-Graduate Courses presented during next year's Ministers/ Teachers Conference. Those of our members who have not received a total of ten Post-Graduate credits are encouraged to attend the "Twelve Powers of Man" Course during their Regional Conference.


MINISTERIAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT



UICE INFORMATION

Gwen Norment, Program-Director for the Unity Institute for Continuing Education (UICE), has shared the following information regarding UICE: "Our first session in March was a complete success. We look forward to repeating this opportunity next year for those of you who missed it. Also, Sessions II and III conducted this summer at Unity Village were great successes. Each session was attended by 200 persons. We are now utilizing the new Activities Center, which gives us additional space and more pleasing classroom accommodations.

"Session V in October looks to be exciting. Like Session I in March, parts 1 and 2 of most classes will be offered. The October classes will probably be smaller than those given during the summer, which will allow for more student-teacher interaction.

"UICE classes are designed for both those individuals who want a deeper understanding of Truth for their own growth, and for those who are interested in becoming Unity teachers. Some who come here to study for their own growth turn out to be Unity teachers. Whichever you are, we are looking forward to seeing you at Unity Village for UICE.

"The Requirements for UICE Graduation are:

1. Satisfactory completion of 150 credits, including required courses.

- Reading and completing satisfactory reports on twelve books from a selected list.
- Personal recommendations from faculty members who will interview you during your training at the Institute.
- Passing a comprehensive test after having completed UICE requirements as stated above.

"The UICE graduate is awarded a certificate which indicates that he has satisfactorily completed all requirements. The recommendation of the faculty is necessary for the granting of the certificate.

"The Additional Requirements for Licensed Teacher Recognition are:

- During last session at UICE you will be required to take a non-credit course entitled 'Licensed Teacher Orientation.' This course consists of two-hour classes.
- You are required to teach not less than twenty-four adult classroom lessons in a Unity ministry and be recommended by the minister with whom you are working.
- You must make application for licensing through your minister to the AUC office.
- 4. You must present a ten-minute talk to the Licensing and Ordination Committee of the Association of Unity Churches, and be interviewed by the members of said committee."




WEDDING BELLS

SAN JOSE, CALIFORNIA — Warren and Marguerite Meyer, ministers of Christ Church Unity in San Jose, have shared the following article and the photograph shown above regarding the ministry's youth education programs: "The Christ Church Unity policy in San Jose is to have an all-day seminar every three months for faculty members of its Youth Education Departments. Recently, Gerald (Jerry) Melin of the ministry, presented a very unique program for its educators.

"As soon as the opening prayer was concluded, Jerry appeared in the garb of a way-out scientific professor. Under his arm was a special box on which were blinking lights. The inventing professor united the teachers with a vital cord which passed through their hands and on into the illumined box, 'Inventor' Melin then led the group into meditation during

this period of connection. After this was completed he showed that the special wire was connected to the bottom of the blinking box where the large letters were printed: IDEAS.

"After this entertaining kick-off the seminar's theme of INVENTION was ready to be experienced. From then on, the teachers were led into a series of excellent educational invention experiences. They invented a game. Five of them invented a group-poem. Another set of teachers invented a song. At one point the teachers designed paper-bag puppets and then they were divided into smaller groups to invent a Truth story with their different character-puppets.

"The eighteen who attended this unusual seminar saw how easily they could get their classes into an invention-consciousness to help make their youth education hours more effective. Their students are invited to unfold their own ideas during the lesson periods. Truly, all departments of this phase of the Christ Church Unity ministry are expanding."



Jim Lewis reported that approximately 1,250 persons attended the Mini-Congress and some 350 were present at the Banquet on the 19th.





out the ministry's beautiful and spacious grounds, which were festooned with balloons and red, white, and blue streamers. Some 260 persons were served a delicious barbequed chicken dinner.

The inadequate structure from which the ministry moved had been at one time a small neighborhood grocery store. It consisted of only one room on the first floor which was used as the sanctuary. The basement provided the only office and Sunday School space.

Realizing they needed more space, the Jackson ministry inspected a number of prospective facilities before deciding on their present home. Roy reports that the ministry needed approximately \$21,000.00 to close the transaction of purchasing the new facilities and that the congregation lovingly came forward with exactly that amount in less than one hour and a half after the need was expressed.

The ministry's new facilities consist of a large white stately mansion which is a landmark in Jackson. It has four twostory white pillars of Gothic architecture on the front porch.

The entrance opens into a large foyer which faces a beautifully curving staircase which makes a full 90 degree turn. The former dining room of the mansion has been converted into a book store and the former livingroom provides an excellent sanctuary. Indirect lighting controlled by a rheostat and a speaker system has been installed in the sanctuary, with speakers located throughout the facilities.

The local newspaper in Jackson recently printed a one and a half page news story about the ministry. Roy reports that the local Historical Society is presently considering naming the ministry's facilities a historical landmark.

Hal's program in the school system generated a great deal of public interest and received a considerable amount of feature story publicity in both the Miami Herald and the Palm Beach Post-Times.

UNITY SCHOOL PRESENTS "GOD SPEAKING THROUGH MAN" AWARDS

On the evening of Sunday, June 15, the Unity World Headquarters Activities Center in Unity Village was filled to near capacity for the presentation of the "God Speaking Through Man" awards by Unity School of Christianity. The award is presented to individuals who have given of their time and talent in serving God through service to their fellowman. This year's recipients were Dr. Karl Menninger of the Menninger Foundation, Topeka, Kansas; Mrs. Lillian Lane Bristow, Salem, Oregon; and Mr. Johnnie C. Harris, Seattle, Washington.

Ralph Rhea, Co-director of the Radio and Television Department of Unity School, who serves as Chairman of the Awards Committee, stated, "The God Speaking Through Man award is presented in recognition of outstanding contributions by individuals who have helped people understand themselves, their fellows, and their relationship to God. The award is presented to persons active in the fields of religion, education, communications, science, government, medicine, entertainment, community relations, and business and industry. This year's recipients have made significant contributions in the fields of mental health, education, and rehabilitation."

Dr. Karl Menninger, with his father and brother, founded the world renown psychiatric center in Topeka, Kansas. He serves as Chairman of the Board of the Menninger Foundation and belongs to a score of national psychiatric and

humanistic organizations, several of which he founded. He is also Chairman of the Board of The Villages, Inc., a non-profit organization founded in 1964 for the purpose of providing permanent homes for homeless, neglected, deserted children between the ages of 10 and 16.

The Villages consist of cottage homes where children live with their "cottage parents." Every effort is made to treat the youngsters as if they were the couple's own children--they go to neighborhood schools, receive weekly allowances, help with the dishes, cut the grass and go out on dates. The cottage families provide the permanence and security of a true home. The children in the homes generally come from state welfare agencies. Dr. Menninger has received national recognition and praise for this innovative program in youth care.

A prolific author, Dr. Menninger's books include: The Human Mind. Man Against Himself, Love Against Hate, A Guide to Psychiatric Books. Manual for Psychiatric Case Study, Theory of Psychoanalytic Technique, A Psychiatrist's World, and The Vital Balance.

Dr. Menninger is deeply interested in reform and renovation of the penal system in the United States. His book, The Crime of Punishment, is credited with being one of the major spurs to the recent wave of penal reform. In his most recent book, Whatever Became of Sin?, Dr. Menninger tells how he has come to consider moral values an essential

aspect of psychiatry...mental health and moral health are synonymous. In America, the name Karl Menninger and mental health are synonymous. Dr. Menninger was nominated for the award by the Award Committee.

Mrs. Lillian Lane Bristow has devoted over fifty years to serving people. An educator, with a Master's degree in social service and education, Mrs. Bristow worked for twenty-two years as a teacher in the public school system; four of those years were spent as Principal of a Junior/Senior High School. Continuing as an educator, Mrs. Bristow served as supervisor for a government funded Adult Education Program in northwest Arkansas which served thrity-three centers.

In addition to the training and guidance she has given young people and adults, Mrs. Bristow has helped to enrich and bring dignity into the lives of those labeled "handicapped." In twenty-two years of service at Fairview Hospital and Training Center for the retarded in Salem, Oregon, she taught the handicapped, was responsible for job placement and provided an understanding, sympathetic ear as a social service counselor. She retired from her full-time career in this state job in 1969 (nearing age 70) only to continue serving others through volunteer work. For the last three years, she has been a member of a council on aging in the Salem area whose purpose is to identify the total needs of the senior (continued on page 16)

population in a tri-county area. She has spent endless hours in meetings, given lectures, and made personal appearances to gain support and implement programs for the elderly. In 1971, the Volunteer Bureau of the Salem Area recognized her outstanding contribution by naming her Volunteer of the Year. Mrs. Bristow was nominated for the award by Betty Owers, minister of Unity of Salem, Oregon.

Johnnie C. Harris believes that before anyone can expect help from others, he or she must put forth effort to help themselves. Mr. Harris is a veteran of the Korean War and the recipient of the Silver Star and three bronze metals. He was also the recipient of four prison sentences and spent twenty years serving those sentences. Mr. Harris stated, "I was an habitual criminal with one of the worst records in Walla Walla. I finally had to take a look at myself and decided if I wanted to stay in the penitentiary the rest of my life or get myself together and do something to change a penal system which I knew from experience desperately needed reform, I made my decision and took the first step toward liking myself,"

After making this decision, Mr. Harris discovered other penal residents had made the same decision. When racial tensions were erupting in prisons all over the country, he was actively engaged in establishing the Race Relations Committee to handle racial tensions in Walla Walla. The committee's function was to help the various races live together in unity and harmony through love and understanding for mankind, Mr. Harris served as the first Chairman of the Resident Government Council at Walla Walla when penal reform made it possible for imprisoned persons to legally form a representative group and assume responsibility for governing themselves. He was elected President of the council for two consecutive terms.

When Mr. Harris was released on parole in 1973, he began implementing an organization called the Washingthon 101's, a non-profit organization whose primary objective is to work through the state and federal governments to bring about changes in the penal system and to work with the ex-offender to assist with changes in attitudes and self-image. In commenting

on the organization, Harris stated, "Through this program, the ex-offender and the community can learn to understand each other. It is only proper that every person, regardless of past difficulties, be permitted the opportunity to return to society and demonstrate themselves deserving of community respect." That he has personally achieved this objective is evidenced by the fact that Mr. Harris is now a respected citizen in Seattle who devotes his time to managing a 180-unity apartment complex. Johnnie Harris was nominated for the award by Max Lafser, associate minister of Unity Church of Truth, Seattle, Washington.

The "God Speaking Through Man" awards were presented by members of the Executive Committee of Unity School. After the presentation, each recipient shared with the audience some of his or her experiences, interests, and expectations regarding their work.

Past recipents of the award are: Author, songwriter, commedian, Steve Allen and his wife, Jayne Meadows; actor, Greg Morris, star of the television series Mission Impossible; and Bonita Granville Wrather, who was instrumental in the production of the family television series Lassie.

On the first floor of the Administration Building at Unity School of Christianity, you can walk down the east corridor and pass row after row of shelves with neatly packaged and organized books, magazine back issues, pamphlets, leaflets, cards, booklets, and cassettes. This area is another of Unity's many "hearts," for it is from here that most of Unity's printed materials are distributed. It is an area of great activity, of carts moving up and down aisles and workers gathering the materials that have been requested, wrapping them, and shipping them out.

In the midst of all this activity is the desk of **Eve Shaft**, head of the Shipping Department. Any order for printed materials (other than magazine subscriptions) placed with the Sales Department at Unity School eventually ends up on Eve's desk. From an inventory of approximately one million pieces, her department sends out about seven hundred parcels a month. These packages may contain just one book or a large assortment of books, pamphlets, and other materials.

In addition to labeling and shipping, the department handles some other unusual tasks. For instance, books which make up the new FOUNDATIONS OF UNITY series were placed in their slip-

cases by Shipping Department workers. The Christmas and Easter Greeting Booklets, of which more than a million are printed, are counted and boxed by these workers, ready to be mailed out to centers and individuals on request at the appropriate season.

The Shipping Department also has the responsibility of air-cargoing overseas shipments of DAILY WORD and its Spanish version, LA PALABRA. Because the delivery of surface mail to foreign countries can take such a long time, air-cargoing is done to insure that this important little magazine is at its destination at the proper time.

Eve is in charge of inventory control and keeps track of all the various materials that stock her department. One of the requirements of this position is to reorder printed materials to insure supplies sufficient to meet demands for each item. She orders and maintains inventories of business forms used by the departments at Unity School, and also maintains and distributes office supplies to these same departments.

Eve has been at Unity School for 32 years, and laughingly says that she "is probably one of the few workers who is still in the same department that I began in."

For relaxation Eve likes to travel, her

most recent trip being to Sanibel Island, near Fort Myers, Florida. She plans to make her next vacation trip again to the Gulf area, which she very much enjoys. Eve is an accomplished seamstress. She has one granddaughter, **Debbie Shaft**, who lives in nearby Independence, Missouri, with Eve's son and daughter-in-law.



SPECIAL HANDLING OF DAILY WORD SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEW ZEALAND

For some time the Sales Department of Unity School has been aware that copies of DAILY WORD magazine going to New Zealand often are not reaching subscribers by the first of the month. Although Unity School keeps their mailing schedules up to the minute, they have to cope with the same problems that face every publisher: there are fewer trains moving the mail and fewer ships crossing the oceans.

Unity School has consulted with Unity of New Zealand and together they have arrived at a method of providing better service. They have transferred the DAILY WORD subscription records for New Zealand subscribers to Unity of New Zealand and beginning with the September 1975 issue, Unity of New Zealand will be purchasing copies of the DAILY WORD magazine printed in Australia from Unity of Australia and remailing the magazine to individuals in New Zealand. By this means, copies of DAILY WORD going to subscribers in New Zealand will be delivered on or before the first of the month.

FCC PETITION REGARDING RELIGIOUS BROADCASTING

The AUC office has recently received several inquiries from member ministries requesting information and advice regarding a petition now being considered by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. Our members were concerned that, from the information they had received from others, this particular petition sought to ban religious broadcasting on radio and television.

The ministries were prepared to circulate and submit petitions of their own which would support religious broadcasting.

The AUC office has researched the matter and finds that on January 5, 1975, a petition known as the Lansman-Milam Petition (Rule Making 2493) was filed with the Federal Communications Commission. The petition is asking the FCC to freeze all applications filed by religious organizations to obtain certain specially reserved channels and frequencies designated by the FCC for educational use.

Some years ago, FCC set aside a certain number of radio and television frequencies and channels for exclusive use for educational purposes. In the last

few years, certain religious organizations acquired some of these specially reserved frequencies and channels and began using them for purely religious broadcasts. The persons filing RM 2493 have asked the FCC to take restrictive action designed to protect the interests of purely educational organizations in obtaining and utilizing these reserved frequencies and channels.

Our legislative counsel has advised the AUC office that our membership need not be concerned about RM 2493 since the petition has absolutely nothing to do with the religious broadcasts being conducted by Unity ministries over regular commercial broadcasting frequencies or channels.

Our counsel also recommended that Unity ministries refrain from submitting letters or petitions regarding RM 2493 to the FCC since the matter does not affect the type of broadcastings done by the ministries. In any case, the deadline for comments to the FCC regarding RM 2493 has already passed and an FCC decision is expected within the next few weeks. It is reasonable to expect that the FCC will make a public announcement regarding this decision which the newspapers will publish.

A REPORT FROM JACQUELINE NEAL, YOU COORDINATOR

This year's YOU Conference is a very special happening. Those of us who have a part in the planning are finding that a sense of vitality, joy, and enthusiasm are spurring us on as the planning reaches the final stage. The Conference dates are August 17–22 and will be held at Unity Village, Missouri.

In an earlier issue of CONTACT, I mentioned the names of the members of the conference Planning Committee.

Spiritual Diary — Has a non-structured format including Daily Word lessons and exercises for self awareness and communion.

"Hi, How Are You?" — Consists of three little booklets containing a communication exercise to develop communication beyond the superficial stage of "Hi, How Are You?"

Tell it like it is — THE UNGAME — This nonthreatening "game like" communication aid was designed to enhance open and honest communication between people. It helps draw out the participants true thoughts, ideas and feelings. Subjects covered are interests, hopes, joys, sorrows, ambitions, personal philosophies, and beliefs. All of this is accomplished through a game board, pawns, a die, and decks of uniquely stated questions.

KALEIDOSCOPE Notebook — Resource material gathered from various sources to serve the workshop leader. Information includes material on group dynamics, research ideas, discussion quotes and exercises for depth unfoldment, group process, self image and the like.

The following films are also included:

"Why Man Creates" — An Academy Award winning film fast paced, and animated, examines the nature of creativity in a series of provocative episodes and comments on the premise that all human beings are by nature creative and the ability to create is not limited to a gifted few. This is a Saul Bass Creation.

"The Point" — An enchanting animated fantasy about an unusual kingdom in which everything and everybody is pointed — except for a young man named Oblio. From his adventures Oblio learns that it is not at all necessary to be pointed to have a point in life. This production features lively songs composed and performed by Harry Nilsson, who also wrote the story. Educators on every level have already acclaimed "The Point" as an excellent film for discussion and instruction as well as for general entertainment.

Another aspect of the Kaleidoscope workshop is that the Conference Sponsors will be included. **Gwen Norment** is the workshop leader for the adults. We feel that this opportunity would be of significant benefit to the sponsors as a personal resource and aid for identifying with the young people present and each other.

IN BRIEF, a proposal to establish a method by which the HONORARY DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF DIVINITY (D.D.) may be conferred on UNITY MINISTERS

REASONS FOR THIS PROPOSAL

With the ordination of ministers and the establishment of local Unity centers and churches, Mr. Fillmore clearly went beyond his original intention of limiting his ministry to (a) the supply of written and devotional aids to individuals complementing the work of churches of every denomination, and (b) the establishment of a centralized prayer ministry. He countenanced taking Unity teachings to the people, with the result some other local religious leaders saw Unity as a threat.

The Unity minister often finds himself at a disadvantage when seeking to take Truth principles to his community.

- * He does not have the support of a large and wealthy central organization able to spend large sums on missionary work.
- * He is deprived of the backing of a prestigious and timehonored traditional denomination, possibly claiming Apostolic succession.
- * He is regarded by many as espousing a teaching that is offbeat and without authority; some see him as part of an unimportant sect.
- * The minister who faithfully follows Unity's convention does not even employ the title "reverend" which would mark him as being a person who has followed special religious studies

and is an ordained minister of religion.

* Most of all the Unity minister is at a disadvantage when contact with ministers of other organizations, many of who use the title "doctor."

Most of these doctorates are not "earned" in that they have not been bestowed in recognition of years of academic work at an accredited university (that is study for Bachelor's, then Master's and finally the writing of a demanding thesis for Ph.D.) Most usually these are honorary doctorates (D.D. — Doctor of Divinity) awarded by universities or colleges in recognition of service or achievement.

On the other hand, most of the doctorates in the metaphysical field are awarded merely in return for a fee and the completion of a few courses in Bible or related studies. These obviously are not reflective of academic study but nevertheless are impressive in eyes of the community which generally is not fully aware of all the circumstances.

Clearly the Unity minister is placed at a disadvantage when appearing on programs with other ministers, and in his own center advertising and in newspaper stories. Often other ministers are given the title "doctor" whereas the Unity minister, often better informed, bears no title, not even "reverend." In comparison with other clerics he may be regarded by the community as being less well educated and undistinguished.

The award of a doctorate is the accepted way of communicating to the public at large and to congregations that the minister is a person of worth, honor, stature, authority and learning. I reveals to the community that the minister's worth has been recognized by his peers. The award would therefore upgrade both the minister and the Unity movement in the eyes of the community.

Many Unity ministers of reputation and standing are gratuitously addressed as "doctor" by members of their congregation and the community at large who have quite naturally come to expect that so distinguished a member of their community would have been awarded a doctorate. The Unity minister is then faced with the embarrassing dilemma: Should he disclaim the title? Or should he feel faintly dishonest by allowing it to pass uncorrected?

A number of Unity ministers have partially resolved this conflict by obtaining doctorates by completing nominal courses at one of a number of metaphysical schools that exist for that purpose. This has allowed them to stand on equal terms with other ministers in their own locality. However, generally they have been reluctant to use the title "doctor" in their dealings with other Unity ministers, the A.U.C. or Unity School. The award of honorary doctorates by the A.U.C. for well-defined and clearly outlined service and achievement would relieve our ministers of the temptation to take a step that might later cause them inner conflict.

The Unity School of Christianity and the Association of Unity Churches are now firmly established as institutions of repute and stability, allowing us to confer honorary doctorates of integrity and meaning. The title "doctor" is expected of distinguished members of the clergy and Unity ministers suffer a disadvantage when deprived of this recognition.

CHARLES FILLMORE'S ATTITUDE

It is recognized that during his lifetime neither Mr. Fillmore nor Unity School conferred doctorates. We also understand that he did not favor use of the prefix "reverend." However, it should be remembered that Mr. Fillmore did allow himself to be ordained on two occasions. The first time was in 1890 when he was ordained by the Christian Science Theological Seminary. Later, in 1906 he was ordained by the President of the Unity Society of Practical Christianity.

Mr. Fillmore was an acknowledged experimenter who tried many things, not all of which were successful. At first he did not envisage a ministry in the field, yet when circumstances clearly demanded the establishment of Unity centers in cities in many states, he countenanced and then encouraged such local ministries and ordained ministers to conduct these.

On his retirement as minister of the Unity Society of Practical Christianity in Kansas City, it is not without significance that his chosen successor was a distinguished Unity minister who habitually uses the title of doctor obtained from another metaphysical school.

CRITERIA

The following qualifications are offered as the basis for determining to whom awards should be made.

- Service The candidate shall have served after ordination a minimum of ten years in a Unity ministry, in the A.U.C., or the Unity movement at large. However, in cases of extreme merit as shown in other qualifications, this term may be waived.
 - In addition, a candidate shall be rated on a scale of points from 1 to 10 on each of the categories that follow. A minimum of (say) 50 points shall be required.
- Education One point for every year of higher education in any accredited college or university.
- Unity Education Program Credit shall be given for any contribution made to the growth of the Unity Education program by way of teaching for S.M.R.S., U.I.C.E., Unity School Retreats, A.U.C. Post graduate courses, Regional and sub-regional Retreats & the provision of teaching outlines and study guides.
- Inter-center activity Credit may be given for the interest and cooperation with other Unity centers as guest speaker, conduct of programs and workshops, and liaison work for the A.U.C. Executive office.
- Post Graduate Course Points may be awarded for credits gained (at a minimum to be decided on) by attendance of A.U.C. post-graduate courses.
- Organization service Points may be awarded for service on A.U.C. committees, Board of Trustees, Executive Committee and offices held.
- 7. Authorship Points may be awarded for articles and poems published in Unity publications, for Truth books written and published by any publisher.
- Ministry Development Points may be awarded for significant increase in attendance, finances and property of a local center and of influence in the community.

- Community Points may be awarded for significant contributions made by a Unity minister to his community, for example, election to office in a local ministerial alliance, office or recipient of honors awarded by local civic groups or service in local government.
- Stability of Consciousness Evidence of a stable consciousness as shown by the steady and stable growth of a local Unity center under the prolonged leadership of a minister, even if that growth is not phenomenal.
- Support of A.U.C. Points may be awarded for the strong support of A.U.C. programs and finances by the minister or the center under the direction of the minister.
- 12. Synthesis Points may be awarded for the minister who shows an understanding of other teachings and approaches and is able to adapt these to Unity programs.
- Regional Organization Recognition should be given to those ministers who have been active in the organization of regional and sub-regional activities as tours, retreats, workshops, rallies, etc.

CANDIDATES

Any ordained Unity minister whether still in active service, retired or engaged in the wider aspects of the Unity movement may be regarded as a candidate, provided the conditions outlined above are met.

APPLICATIONS

Applications shall be made through the A.U.C. office to the Conferring body, and may be made by:

- (1) an individual minister on his own behalf,
- (2) a minister on behalf of another minister,
- (3) the Board of Trustees of a minister's center or church,
- (4) the Conferring body,
- (5) the Board of Trustees of the A.U.C.,
- (6) the Executive Committee of the A.U.C.,
- (7) the Board of Directors of the Unity School of Christianity.

CONFERRING BODY

Initially this to comprise the entire Board of Trustees of the A.U.C. which would then select the most obviously qualified persons to receive the degree of honorary Doctor of Divinity.

The Board of Trustees then to appoint a separate permanent Conferring Body that might well include some or all of those ministers to whom doctorates have already been conferred.

ADVANTAGES

The award of honorary doctorate degrees by the A.U.C. can have a number of very real advantages to the movement which include:

- (1) The encouragement of ministers to:
 - * be of greater service to the movement
 - * work for the wider goals of the A.U.C.
 - * become involved in committee activity of the A.U.C.
 - * contribute financially to the A.U.C.
 - * become involved in community action

- * write for Unity and other publications
- * seek to serve other Unity ministries
- * evaluate their continuing education
- * support the post-graduate courses
- * build consciousness
- * make Truth teachings work in their own lives
- * maintain high ethical standards
- (2) provide helpful guidelines for newly ordained ministers to set up goals
- (3) the provision of a healthier way of obtaining recognition than seeking degrees of questionable worth.

MUSIC COMMITTEE REPORT

The Music Committee, Warren Meyer, Chairman, was very pleased to report to the Conference Body that the new songbook "UNITY IN SONG" was completed. Each AUC member minister will receive a complimentary copy of the songbook together with an order blank. The songbooks, available in either blue or gold binding, will be offered until January 31, 1976, at the wholesale price of \$2.50 each, after that time the books will be priced at \$3,00. The retail price has been established at \$3.95. Special appreciation was expressed to Warren Meyer by the Conference Body for the tremendous amount of work that he has performed in order to complete this project.

YOUNG ADULT RESEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Young Adult Research Committee, David Monument, acting Chairman, recommended that a Young Adult Coordinator be employed by the AUC to assist with the Young Adult Retreat held at Unity Village. The Committee also stated that the Coordinator could work with the Committee in surveying current Young Adult activities both within and without the Unity Movement which would provide a stimulus for future development. The Conference Body ratified the appointment of John Strickland, a first-year ministerial student, to serve as the Young Adult Coordinator. John will also serve as the Youth of Unity Coordinator for the Association of Unity Churches succeeding Jacqueline Neal.

EXPANSION COMMITTEE REPORT

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The Expansion Committee, Jean Grover, Chairman, reported that they had received the past reports of the Expansion Committee and noted that the following ideas have been implemented for the growth and development of Unity ministries:

- 1. Round the Clock Prayer Program (1970)
- 2. Establishment of new centers from a nucleus of interested people who would guarantee \$500 per month for ministers salary. (1970)
- Satellite program for future ministries (1970)
- 4. Post-Graduate studies for ministers (1971)
- 5. Partnership plan now supported by regions (1973)
- 6. Unity on the campus (1973)
- 7. Unity Heritage Anniversary Sunday (December 7, 1973)
- 8. Unity for Foreign Language Groups in the United States and Canada (classes and services - 1974)

Recommendations were made by the Expansion Committee which are now in the process of being considered.

Pre-Conference and Conference will be held at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel in Philadelphia. The AUC Committees will meet July 8–9 and the Board of Trustees will meet July 10–11. There will not be any Post-Graduate Courses offered during our Pre-Conference activities in Philadelphia. Our 1976 Ministers/ Teachers Conference will be held July 12–14.

July 15–17, 1976, the AUC will sponsor and conduct a series of special programs entitled "Unity Celebration – 1976." The Sheraton Hotel was selected as the site of Unity Celebration – 1976 because of its excellent meeting room facilities which will allow 2,200 persons to register for the program.

Suzanne will function in Philadelphia as a local contact and assist the AUC office at Unity Village in the many details of planning, organizing, and implementing Unity Celebration — 1976.

The AUC Executive Committee will be meeting in Philadelphia in September to finalize the program and additional information including registration forms and publicity material will be distributed shortly thereafter.

SUGAR BOWL SUNDAY

Earlier this year Christ Church Unity, Kansas City North, Missouri, where **George Hilbert** serves as minister, designated a particular Sunday as "Sugar Bowl Sunday." George utilized Mark 11: 20–23 as the scripture reading for his lesson that day.

The idea for this special Sunday was provided by the following passage taken from the book Valley of Decision by Betsy Patterson: "One morning the Lord gave me this simple method in which to do this committing. Since women like action, the Lord told me to write my request on a piece of paper, to get that unused sugar bowl down from the top shelf of my cabinet. Please dump out the sugar. Ours are always full, Grandma sees to that. Place my request inside the bowl, put on the lid, put it back on the shelf, and say, 'There it is, Lord. You may have it.' Try this method of committal. He will honor it. If at any time in the future you are tempted to take it to the Lord again, stop and say, 'Lord, you have it. Thank you for what you are doing'."

Our members have requested that information be shared through this section of CONTACT regarding cassette equipment which is reasonably priced, easy to operate, and possessing good fidelity.

Research was initiated in response to these requests and two units appear to meet these requirements. One is the 3M Wollensak 2770AV cassette duplicator, which duplicates two cassettes from a cassette master, and is priced around \$1300.00. The other unit is manufactured by the Voice of Music, model 791 AV, which produces one cassette from a cassette master, and is priced around \$400.00.

Both of the aforementioned units have the capability to add on auxiliary "slave" duplicators which will produce more cassettes.

For more specific information on either or both of these units, write to the AUC office. You are also encouraged to submit any comments or questions you have concerning cassettes or the duplication of cassette tapes.

In future issues of CONTACT we will answer these questions and print information on such subjects as how to make a master tape; which cassette tapes are best; and the procedure for cleaning cassette tape players. Also, information will be published on how professional cassette tape duplication can be utilized in your ministry and the projected costs involved.
