1975 YOUTH OF UNITY CONFERENCE

The Youth of Unity Conference, A UNIVERSE OF AWARE-NESS—"an inner galactic journey", was held at Unity Village, Missouri, August 17 through the 22nd. There were approximately 348 participants in the program including guests, staff, workshop leaders, chaperoning adults, and registered delegates.

Jacqueline Neal, YOU Coordinator, reports: "Conference '75 was evolved around the idea of communication and throughout the week of Conference each program was designed to be a form of communication. In the process of planning Conference, it was decided by the planning committee that it would be unrealistic to try to get 350 persons to really know each other well in the span of one short week. The question was how to effectively solve the problem.

"What came out of that meeting was a new workshop concept; hence, a new approach to YOU Conference. It can now be said that what transpired during the week of Conference was nine mini-conferences within the one large Conference. Person-wise, the delegates related well to each other because of the proximity

within each Kaleidoscope workshop and the program emphasis.

"Kaleidoscope was a time of awareness which was spurred by the atmosphere of creativity, love, and acceptance initiated by the individual workshop leaders. We are happy to say that these times of learning were mutually enjoyed by the delegates and their leaders. A sense of uniqueness developed within each workshop as a sense of 'community' grew. LETTER FROM OUR AUC PRESIDENT

Dear Fellow Ministers and Teachers.

One of the duties of the new President is the appointing of individuals to serve on our various Committees. At Conference time many of you volunteered your services to serve on Committees. In fact, there were so many offers of help that we could not utilize all the talent and ability for Committee work. It is wonderful to see this great desire to serve our AUC. Your expressions of love are truly appreciated.

It has been the practice in the past for the incoming President to have a theme or project for the year. I would like to suggest that we give a great deal of our time, prayer, and effort to the idea of **EXPANSION**. I believe we have the greatest teaching in the world and that the world needs what Unity has to offer. We are training people in the ministry at an ever-increasing rate. The fact is, we are preparing more ministers than we are ministries. This year we are taking an important step toward changing this pattern.

As many of you already know, Scott Sherman has moved to the Chicago area to begin an AUC project of developing new ministries in this area. There are others who are working on their own or with the help of other Unity ministries in seeking to establish new ministries-Loren Flickinger in Tallahassee, Florida; Marjorie Kass in Texas; Jim Morjan in Northern Colorado and Wyoming. I am sure there are others that I am not aware of. All these individuals need our prayer support.

I remember a number of years ago when at Conference we set a \$25,000 figure as a treasure map idea for expansion. This year the AUC will spend twice that amount in expansion. This is a step in the outer to fulfill that earlier step in faith, and we know that God's love will provide for this growth.

It would seem to me that at the rate we are training new ministers we will need a minimum of fifty percent growth over the next five years. This means the establishment of at least 125 new full-time ministries throughout the country. There are many cities that do not have a Unity ministry and there are some cities that could use two or three more ministries.



C. Berton Coffey reporting for the SOUTHWEST REGION:

TUCSON, ARIZONA — Eastside Unity Church is conducting an exciting program for its Youth Group. Jack Clemenson, minister of this innovative outreach activity of Unity of Tucson, reports: "The members of Eastside Unity in Tucson, Arizona, have an outreach program which supports a mixed-denominational Youth Group program of activities with youngsters mostly from broken homes and mostly from the Mexican-American community.

"This is the basic background behind the fact that Eastside Unity may be unique in the Unity Movement in owning a railroad. The name of our railroad is the 'Crystal River and San Juan Southern' after the historical railroad of that name (we added 'Southern' for our extension), in western Colorado where we headquarter each summer. We have researched this and other historic railroads in Colorado. This is how it came about: One of the main activities of the Youth Group is outings and camping. The vehicles and equipment are situated in various parts of my home's large back yard. One of our good friends has a mining supply company. It occurred to the group that to connect the vehicles and resources with a curve of mining gage track (18 inches between the rails), and a car to run it on, would make an interesting and helpful operation since it would involve less carrying of equipment. This proved to be so successful (and interesting to ride, too -- all railroads need large amounts of track inspection trips!), that the group continued to go to the mountains and recover rails from an old mining area on shares with our friend the owner. Finally, almost three years later, the entire backyard was circled

with track which included a switch leading off to the siding spur. The 'Golden Spike' will soon be driven when the final spiking and ballasting are completed, and the survey crew brings the track up to final grade.

"Two boy-powered flatcars have served the construction era. Now all is ready to go ahead fitting out the locomotive and regular cars. These are all on hand but must be reconstructed from standard gage (4 feet 8½ inches) to 18 inches, no small undertaking! When completed there will be a gasoline powered locomotive, passenger car (with single seats on each side of a center aisle), a caboose, box car, and of course the two flatcars (one of which with chocks converts into a tank car).

"The cars and equipment have come from several commercial sources but the Southern Pacific Railroad also became interested and contributed some of the equipment. Most parts have come from Arizona, but some have come from as far away as Missouri, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico.

"The boys are very happy with their railroad but note that as yet there has been no application for service received from Amtrack."

Catherine Knight reporting for the GREAT LAKES REGION:

DES MOINES, IOWA — The Unity Center of Des Moines, under the leadership of **Bill Hines**, has been using E.E.G. (brain wave machine) biofeedback training for the past year and a half with rewarding and surprising results.

Bill reports, "We started out using the equipment to demonstrate the effect of Alpha training on the students of a meditation class (offered for six weeks at the center by Bill). The class featured various major techniques used throughout the world by Eastern and Western Religions and by meditation groups. The concluding three sessions correlated these major techniques with the seven steps in attaining 'the silence' as described by E.V. Ingraham in his booklet 'The Silence'."

Bev Hines trained 72 out of the class of a hundred or more once a week for 45 minutes each during the six weeks period, keeping careful records of the progress and comments of each student.

Bill and Bev found that though inner awareness through meditation is a very subjective and individual experience, most of the 72 persons expressed "increased awareness," unexpected spiritual or extraordinary revelation and obvious recognition of the relaxed state of Alpha. The unexpected development came in the form of "referrals" of patients by some of the local physicians. In most cases the patients were suffering psychosomatic symptoms of "anxiety or tension." The ministry offered them biofeedback training, meditation, and counseling with good results attained by most.

"It is interesting to note," says Bill, "that the only skeptics of biofeedback that I have met inside or outside of the Unity Movement are the uninformed." He goes on to say, "They believe that the machine does something to the individual. This is not true! It merely trains the person to control the machine, and in so doing, one learns to 'get the feel' of controlling or 'being aware' of his own body functions. Once the 'feel' is obtained, the machine is no longer needed or used except for occasional reminder sessions. We have taken training sessions at Menninger Institute where we learned how to avoid teaching the student dependency." (continued on page 4)

Bill is now using the E.E.G. machine as part of his planned counseling program and is adding the temperature biofeed-back machine to demonstrate the power of the (subconscious) mind on autonomic body processes.

Bev and Bill explain, "Unity and Metaphysicians have for years taught their students that 'you are what you think,' and that 'consciousness is demonstrated in the body and affairs,' and that the 'Power within man (God) is realized and expressed through meditation, prayer, and/or "the silence".' We find that biofeedback is but another of God's infinite ways of bringing us realization or increased Spiritual awareness."

DETROIT, MICHIGAN — On May 8 Jack Boland, minister of Unity of the Infinite Presence in Detroit, was the featured speaker at a General Membership Meeting of the Chrysler Corporation Management Club. Held at the Raleigh House in Detroit, the banquet meeting was attended by some six hundred Chrysler executives.

Jack spoke on the topic "You're The Greatest" and the audience responded with a spontaneous standing ovation. Commenting on the opportunity to share Truth through presenting a confidence-building talk, Jack reports "It was an overwhelming experience. Most of the members present, many of whom are in engineering and auto styling, had never heard a talk of this nature and were unbelievably enthusiastic. I've had many calls at the church from people in the Management Club who are now listening to our Dial-A-Thought as a direct result of my appearance before them at the Raleigh House. What a marvelous feeling to be able to give to so many -- just when they need it the most!"

Jack's appearance before the large group was widely publicized throughout the Chrysler organization. The corporation's newsletter, "Leader", carried an extensive feature article in its May issue on Jack and his ministry. The newsletter also highlighted the ministry's Dial-A-Thought, printing the telephone number. The June issue also carried a very fine report of Jack's talk and printed a summary of the ten main points stressed in the talk.

DETROIT, MICHIGAN — Catherine Knight, associate minister of Detroit Unity Association, has shared a report on "Human Potentials - 1975", which will be presented October 11, 1975, in Cobo Hall in Detroit. Catherine states that Phillip Pierson, co-minister of Christ Unity Church in Sacramento, California, who also serves as the Producer and Moderator of "Human Potentials - 1975" spoke at Detroit Unity Association on July 13 and had lunch with area Unity ministers on the 14th.

Phil discussed the one-day program which is designed to quicken and reinforce an awareness of man's limitless inner potentials. The area ministers responded to Phil's enthusiasm and feel that the opportunity to present "Human Potentials - 1975" to their collective communities will be an exciting experience for all.

DETROIT, MICHIGAN – Recently in Detroit, licensed teacher Bonnie Leimeter received special recognition and awards from Wayne County Community College in Detroit upon her graduation from Wayne this past June.

The Special Recognition Award which Bonnie received is given to those students who have rendered services to the College and to their fellow students outside of their daily citizenship and academic expectations. Recipients of this Award were nominated by the students and faculty and officials of the College.

The Award was presented to Bonnie during Commencement Ceremonies on June 25 by **Dr. Vriend** of Wayne College who stated: "Bonnie is an inspiration and a reminder that the pursuit of knowledge

is a joy that knows no age. In September she will be sixty-nine years young, and Wayne County Community College's oldest graduate. Bonnie has been active with the College paper as writer and feature editor. She also has been active with the Citizens Advisory Council, and has been accepted by Wayne State University's School of Business Administration."

Bonnie also received special recognition in a feature article on her which appeared in the College's newspaper. She was one of the organizers of the newspaper and its first feature writer.

JACKSON, MICHIGAN — One of the outreach activities of Unity of Jackson, Michigan, is the very effective Prison Ministry Program conducted by minister Roy Fox. Roy's classes on Successful Living at Southern Michigan Prison have been received by the residents with great acceptance.

Recently, Roy was featured in an extensive article in the prison newspaper. One resident who attends Roy's class was quoted in the article as saying: "I realize now that there is a great chance of my succeeding, whereas before I felt that I was doomed to failure for the rest of my life...! will be eternally grateful for not only having heard but experiencing the teachings in Rev. Fox's class."

Roy offered the book <u>Psycho-Cybernetics</u> to the class members at cost. He states: "They all bought them, and were thrilled to get them. The class attendance averages 25, and they all come voluntarily. They pay very strict attention, and drink in the Truth like you never saw before! Two of the men, each separately, and each unknown to the other told me: "I'll always be glad I was arrested and brought here where I could come under this teaching, for I know I'd never have heard this "out there".""

Each week Roy has a "drawing" in which the class members put their names on slips of paper and one of them draws a name. The man whose name is drawn receives a book on Truth as a gift from Roy.

SALEM, OREGON — Betty Owers, minister of Unity of Salem, has shared photographs of the Salem ministry and the following report: "Unity of Salem moved to its new home on April 15, 1975, and held its first service there Sunday, April 20, with 100 people attending. Les Saunders, then minister of the Portland Unity Center, joined me in a dialogue based on the title, 'On a Clear Day'.

"Our new home is located on the top of a hill overlooking Mt. Jefferson and

Mt. Hood and on a clear day, we can see 'almost forever'. The house is situated on five acres of beautiful hill-top land and is ideally arranged for our present needs. The 5.500 square feet includes a large living room with fireplace and picture windows, perfect for our sanctuary; church office; minister's office, library; and fully equipped kitchen. To top that off--the main floor is duplicated downstairs so we have Sunday School space and a large fellowship hall with kitchen and fireplace. Everyone says 'It's perfect!' and it is. And when we outgrow this building, we can build a lovely sanctuary on our acreage and use the house as our education building.

"The property became available to us last August and between September and March we were able to raise the downpayment of \$13,500 through gifts of \$8,200 and a generous loan from a friend. For a 'two-year-old Center' with a small membership, we think this was a great demonstration."

SARASOTA, FLORIDA – **Rudy Nan**, minister of First Unity Center of Sarasota, Florida, was recently elected to serve as President of the Sarasota Ministerial Association.



First Unity Center of Sarasota, Florida, has been completely refurbished and parking space added.

Rudy also reported on certain improvements to the ministry's facilities. He stated: "We have doubled our parking space due to our growing attendance. We also have completely refurbished the Center inside and out. We are very

ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA - The 13th Annual Southeast Unity Retreat was held August 4-8 at the Don CeSar Resort Hotel at St. Petersburg Beach, Florida. Paul Barrett, who serves as Chairman of the planning committee for the Retreat reports: "The Retreat has been described as one of the most successful in our history. There were more than 600 Registrants. Unity people occupied the full 300 room facilities of this historic and beautiful hotel on the Gulf of Mexico. The theme of the Retreat was 'Mind: the Master Power,' taken from Charles Roth's book by the same name. Charles was the principle speaker, though the program involved approximately twenty-five other Unity ministers during its four day period.

"It was commonly stated that the spiritual consciousness of the Retreat ran high. Aside from those who were involved from our Region, this was in large measure due to Charles Roth's outstanding evening presentations, and the fabulous musical talents of our organist, Lou Bass, and our piano-vocalist, Clarice Crawford of Montego Bay, Jamaica. The two musicians have been invited to be with us once again in 1976. A choir formed by Lou Bass performed for the Retreat and added greatly to the stature of its programs.

"Next year, the 14th Annual Southeast Unity Retreat will once again be held at the Don CeSar Hotel. The dates are August 9 through 13, 1976. Our goalan even better Retreat '76 in the Southeast."

Serving with Paul on the Retreat Planning Committee for 1975 were Catherine Brooks, Ross and Joan Goodman, David Monument, James Parkinson, and James Sherman. The Committee will be the same for the 1976 Retreat with the addition of Leslie Saunders, replacing James Sherman, who is now in our Toronto ministry. An exceptionally well planned and executed publicity campaign for the Retreat was conducted under the direction and guidance of the Planning Committee. of the program were done contributed greatly to the overall success of the Retreat.

The excellent newspaper coverage of the entire activities was also an indication of fine publicity work. The St. Petersburg Times devoted the cover and two pages of its Saturday, August 9, edition of "Crossroads Magazine of Religion" to the Retreat. The feature length article which included a number of photographs and quotes from people attending the activities was written by Lee Kelly, a St. Petersburg Times staff writer who covered the four day program.

ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA - Paul Barrett also reported that: "We have adopted a new name for our new center building, a rented facility in a local shopping center. The name is THE UNITY CENTER FOR SPIRITUAL ENLIGHT-ENMENT. The center building consists of offices of Unity Christ Church and classroom facilities for midweek activities. Our Worship Service activities are being conducted in a thousand seat hall located in the Senior Citizen's Building on the Bayfront Region in St. Petersburg. Though we are not yet filling the thousand seats in our 21/2 year old ministry, we are moving steadily in that direction and rejoice in our continued growth and expansion.

"It might be of interest to note that our shopping center location has attracted a considerable number of new persons to our ministry, many of them through visiting our lending library and metaphysical book sales room.

"In addition to the regular devotional service conducted on Sunday by me, James Parkinson now conducts a Contemporary Service in the Shopping Center Building at a time which preceeds that of the principle service. This Contemporary Service has grown to such a degree we are now being pressed for space in which to hold it. That, of course, is the kind of expansion we like to have.

"For the first time in its history Unity Christ Church now has a choir. In its first appearance on Sunday, August 17, it consisted of approximately 30 voices. More are expected as time unfolds. Lou Bass, whose credits in the musical field

include appearances with Lawrence Welk, Billy Graham in his Youth For Christ Crusade, and more recently as Concert Organist for Thomas Organ Company, is the new Music Director of Unity Christ Church."

Paul also shared the news that his ministry and Unity Temple of Truth, under the leadership of Catherine Brooks, are going to combine their congregations for one Sunday in October, the 26th. They will have as principle speaker at that time Wildorf E. Goodison-Orr of Kingston, Jamaica. Paul stated: "This will be the first time these two congregations have come together to participate in a Sunday service. How wonderful it is to have unity in Unity."

HUNTINGTON, NEW YORK - Carolyn J. Michael, minister of Unity in Huntington, New York, shares the following report on the weekend Spiritual Healing Retreat recently conducted by the ministry at the Daughters of Wisdom Renewal House in Litchfield, Connecticut: "Fortyfive persons attended the retreat which consisted of the Charles Fillmore Teachings on Spiritual Healing--a work-shop format on Saturday with time for meditation and silence, joy singing, sharing delicious food -- and prayers for the healing prayer requests that were sent to us. It was a success in every way and there is a strong desire for additional retreats of this nature.

The retreatants enjoyed a varied program that included lectures, joy singing, discussions, and small group "serendipity" activities designed to build spiritual awareness and promote in-depth sharing and friendship. A tour of Unity buildings and grounds followed lunch at the new Unity Inn.



In advance, I want to take this opportunity to thank you and bless you for your shared thought. I know how important our Movement and our ministry is to you in every way.

As we move into the fall season of busy activities in our ministries, I personally look forward eagerly to my visits with you at the regional conference level. I've already had the opportunity to meet with our colleagues in the Northwest Region. The Conference was held at Bend, Oregon, and it was tremendous. It was a good attendance and there was a great spirit of harmony and unity among the ministers and teachers there.

During a discussion session, I was asked by one of our ministers why there was any question in anyone's mind as to our combined readiness and ability to meet whatever expense is required to establish new ministries. This was asked in light of the financial report in the June issue of CONTACT that gave us the closing figures for our last fiscal year.

You will recall that it stated that we had an excess of income over expenses of more than \$99,000.00. Although this is a very accurate figure, it is a misleading one. Nearly eight years ago, the Board of Trustees of the AUC made the decision which was ratified by the Conference Body that all non-recurring income should be held and not expended. Non-recurring income is made up of monies received by the AUC as bequests from estates. Approximately \$91,300.00 of the above figure was non-recurring income.

If you look back over the accounts for each of the years that the Association of Unity Churches has been operating, we have done remarkably well. Each year has surpassed the previous year in support received from our ministries. Every ministry that supports our Association in whatevery way it is guided to do so can feel a deep sense of pride in the strength that we are creating in our unity together. It is, of course, through this kind of sharing both spiritually and physically that we can accomplish collectively those things that individual ministries cannot accomplish on their own.

To me it is a source of great encouragement that our Conference Body has chosen to use the assets available in our Partnership account and in our Tithe account to make possible the development of new ministries. This will be an exciting year, one in which we will see great accomplishment, growth, and fulfillment.

I know that you join with us all in a continuing consciousness of faith in the perfect outworking of the Father's will in our AUC. Isn't it wonderful to work together in Truth?

DR. ROCCO A. ERRICO FEATURED IN ACTIVITIES CENTER PROGRAMS

On July 19-22, Unity School of Christianity presented a series of lectures by Dr. Rocco A. Errico, Founder and President of the Aramaic Bible Center, Inc., in San Antonio, Texas. Speaking in the new Activities Center at Unity Village, Dr. Errico's theme for the series was "The Life and Teachings of Jesus in the Light of His Language, People, and Times."

Dr. Errico presented four well attended public lectures beginning at 7:30 p.m. each evening. His topics were "Jesus Teaches a Universal State of Peace and Harmony," "Jesus Teaches the Principle of Light and Law--Hell and Nonresistance," "Jesus Teaches Love and Prayer--Money and Worry," and "How Jesus Taught the Love of God." A question and answer session was included at each lecture.

In addition to the evening series Dr. Errico was the guest speaker at both Sunday Worship services on July 20 at the Unity Village Chapel. At the 9:30 a.m. Worship service Dr. Errico joined J. Sig Paulson, minister of Unity Village Chapel, in a dialogue on "East and West Look at the Bible." The 11:00 a.m. Worship service featured Dr. Errico speaking on "What is God?--A Semitic Viewpoint."

Dr. Errico presented in his programs a Mid-Eastern viewpoint of the Bible, a subject on which he is well qualified to speak. He was personally taught by the outstanding Biblical authority, Dr. George

M. Lamsa, a native Assyrian who translated the Bible from ancient Aramaic (the language of Jesus). Dr. Errico speaks and writes Aramaic, and his keen insight into ancient Eastern culture has made him one of the most sought-after speakers in the nation. He has lectured throughout the United States, the British Isles, Canada, Mexico, Europe, and the Holy Land. He has also appeared on numerous radio and television talk shows throughout the country and has always been well received.

"Looking at the Bible from a Mid-Eastern standpoint is necessary in order to translate accurately," stated Errico. "One must have an understanding of the Aramaic language, the idioms, mysticism, culture, psychology, and symbols of the Middle East. The English Bibles contain about 1,000 idioms which have been translated literally," he continued, "and these are very misleading. In our own language we have many idioms--such as 'in a stew' or 'in a pickle'. Likewise," Errico said, "the Aramaic language has idioms which are expressive to persons who speak the language but meaningless when translated into another lanquage."

In commenting on the differences in translations of the Bible, Dr. Errico stated, "There are about 12,000 differences between the translations of the Bible by Western scholars and the translation from the Aramaic."

Dr. Errico previously visited Unity Village in early May to conduct a seminar for Unity's School for Ministerial and Religious Studies. In addition he gave two public lectures, including a Sunday Worship service at Unity Village Chapel on Mother's Day, when he spoke on "What the Bible Really Teaches About Women." The creation story in Genesis was an example cited by Dr. Errico of an Eastern idiom taken literally. In his talk, Dr. Errico stated, "The whole story of the woman tempting the man comes from a Mid-Eastern custom, in which the woman must protect her man. As a result, if the man does something wrong she takes the blame."

Due to the many requests for additional information on the Eastern view-point following Dr. Errico's lectures in May, this July return engagement was scheduled.

PATTERNS FOR SELF-UNFOLDMENT BY RANDOLPH & LEDDY SCHMELIG

Patterns for Self-Unfoldment, by Randolph and Leddy Schmelig, which has been appearing in serial form in UNITY Magazine, is now brought together under one cover as a new Unity Book. The book contains twenty "how to" lessons for spiritual development and was a Unity Book Club selection for June, 1975.

The following are excerpts from the review by Hugh R. 

DECISION RENDERED BY FCC REGARDING RELIGIOUS BROADCASTING

In the July/August 1975 issue of CONTACT a report was shared regarding a petition being considered by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. The petition, known as the Lansman-Milam Petition (Rule Making 2493) requested the FCC to freeze all applications filed by religious organizations to obtain certain specially reserved channels and frequencies designated by the FCC for educational use.

As reported in the previous issue of our newsletter, our legislative counsel advised the AUC office that RM 2493 had absolutely nothing to do with the type of religious broadcasts being conducted by Unity ministries over regular commercial broadcasting frequencies or channels

The FCC has now rejected the Lansman-Milam Petition and will continue to allow educational television licenses and FM channels to be utilized by religious groups. The FCC decision was reported in a recent newspaper article written by **Stephen M. Aug**, Staff Writer for The Washington Star.

The portion of Mr. Aug's article pertaining to this decision is reprinted below by permission from The Washington Star, Copyright 1975: "RELIGIOUS GROUPS ALLOWED EDUCATIONAL TV LICENSES — The Federal Communications Commission has rejected a pro-

posal by two California men that religious organizations not be given new educational television or FM channels...

"In the religious organization case, the FCC ruled unanimously that any 'religiously affiliated educational organization...may become an educational broadcast licensee.'

"It said a ruling sought by Jeremy D. Lansman and Lorenzo W. Milam, Los Gatos, Calif., broadcast consultants, would discriminate against educational institutions owned by religious organizations.

"THE LANSMAN-MILAM case has produced the largest number of public comments in commission history — more than 700,000, many of them form letters prompted by religious organizations. In its order, however, the FCC said many of the comments incorrectly felt that the petition proposed to ban all religious broadcasting.

"Lansman and Milam, who do not like most religious programming, asked the FCC to investigate whether religious, 'Bible' and 'Christian' schools and institutes were violating the FCC's Fairness Doctrine by presenting religious programs.

"The Fairness Doctrine required broadcasters to air all sides of important controversial issues.

"The filing also asked that the FCC prohibit further noncommercial licenses for religious stations and that it revise rules that now permit a single owner to

own more than one noncommercial radio or TV station in the same area . . ."

As in legislative matters such as the Lansman-Milam Petition, one of the ways your AUC office assists member ministries is by functioning as a research center. Any member ministry having a need to obtain information regarding federal or state legislation is encouraged to contact the AUC office.

SILENT PRAYER MINISTRY

their local newspaper.

Milly Collins has shared the following idea whereby Unity of Livonia, Michigan, proves the livingness of prayer: "The livingness of prayer and the lovingness of a Center-family has been more fully experienced by Unity of Livonia since the initiation of a new prayer ministry program. The program features a special new service, with a group called The Silent Prayer Ministry responding to requests for prayer with personalized letters and affirmations to individuals in need.

"The Silent Prayer Ministry consists of a nucleus of Unity of Livonia members, rich in prayer consciousness but anonymous to the congregation, who meet once a week on Mondays from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The Silent Prayer Ministry activity begins with sorting the telephone and mail requests for prayer. All requests are included in the blessing of an opening prayer, and then are moved for individual attention and answering to members of the group, who include suitable pamphlets and/or affirmations in each letter. Before mailing, all letters are

additionally blessed in a circle of prayer-with all hands touching the answered prayer-letters. Once a month, a list of all those requesting prayers is forwarded to Silent Unity at Unity Village for its added prayer support.

"Hardly a week passes without letters reporting marvelous results of God-consciousness doing Its healing work... like the miraculous recovery of a soldier near death because of a fall from a five story building, or the terminal cancer patient whose operation yielded absolutely no evidence of cancerous growth or malignancy.

"A special form (reproduced below) is used to note the nature of the prayer requests. All Unity pamphlets are in the process of being categorized according to specific topics like 'Guidance', 'Peace,' etc., to make possible more efficient and effective letter inclosures.

Gene Sorensen, minister of Unity of Livonia, who implemented the founding of The Silent Prayer Ministry expresses his reasons for moving into this expanded prayer activity in this way: "For many years we have had a Silent Prayer Panel which met faithfully to pray for the needs of others. In expanding this, we involve our dedicated people in writing-giving assurance of our prayers in a personal way. As I was deeply enriched through my Silent Unity experience, it is this same warmth that we seek to radiate to those seeking help from Unity of Livonia."

Gene also points out that one of the assets of The Silent Prayer Ministry is that: "You can have a going prayer ministry even without the availability of an associate minister or of people with secretarial experience to handle the activity. Letters can be handwritten and thus project, even more fully, the warm, personal touch which characterizes this prayer ministry work. The program permits using Center members whose rich prayer consciousness and creativity can be effectively utilized. This can include licensed teachers, UICE students and those whose faithful prayer panel attendance indicates an aptitude for such service."
