

DALLAS, TEXAS — Unity takes to the open road! Unique in modern Unity ministry is the Dallas based Church of the Open Road, which is spreading its Light today throughout the Southwest.

Church of the Open Road, sanctioned and blessed by the Association of Unity Churches, was at first an outreach activity of the Unity Church of Dallas, Texas. It is the inspiration of Marjorie Kass, formerly associate minister of the Dallas

church. Today it is a full-fledged Church of Unity incorporated as a nonprofit institution under the laws of Texas.

We know that many cities and towns in Texas which do not have Unity ministries have a large number of persons interested in Unity. Providing capable leadership and guidance to Unity students in these communities is the project of the Church of the Open Road. Within the past few months Marge has formed (continued on page 3)

groups, and is now actively serving such groups, in McAllen, Harlingen, and Brownsville in the Rio Grande Valley; and in Wichita Falls, Longview, Tyler, and the Denison-Sherman area.

Marge travels to these centers by air and by camper, often spending the night literally on the "open road." Her objective is simple—if strenuous—to organize these smaller groups, to serve them until they are able to function alone, then to touch base with them from time to time thereafter. She brings to this work a combination of tremendous enthusiasm, the ability to present Truth in a simple but forceful way, and the activity of joysongs, many times using her own songs.

IRVING, TEXAS - Unity of Irving, Texas, where Marie Paben serves as minister, now has a new facility for its services. Sid and Ruth Ann Hawkins, members of Unity of Irving, recently completed the construction of a new home. With Unity of Irving in mind, the Hawkins included in the construction plans an enormous den complete with kitchen and allowed for ample parking space on the property. Marie reports that the den area is more than ample to seat the present congregation and stated: "We are to dedicate it on Thanksgiving Sunday, November 23, with all our Unity family eating and sharing together that day, There is an enclosed patio that is also large enough for our group. On good days, and those are many here, we will meet on the patio. The structure is such that this patio feels like a small chapel. If any visiting Unity people are in our area at this time, we want you to come share all this good with us."

Active in various outreach programs, Marie has received an Outstanding Achievement Recognition award from the National Council of Jewish Women, Inc., and Dallas County Child Welfare Unit for Operation of Volunteer Project. Marie is very interested in the projects of this group and see them doing an excellent job in the Dallas area. The activities of the group are focused upon training volunteers for protective services to children in the community. Earlier this year Marie and a local psychiatrist were asked to contribute their time and ex-

pertise in working with the group for one day each week over a three month period. Marie states: "We helped them with referrals, how to handle trouble situations and with their own personal growth. I am following up with the entire group once every month. They go out on their cases and we work on how better they might handle the families they are assigned."

Commenting on the ministry's outreach programs, Marie said: "Another community project which I feel is most valuable is Parents Without Partners. Families torn apart by divorce end up with many wounds. I did a four-week seminar for this group in June (four Monday nights), and have just finished another on the four Sunday afternoons of September. There were 100 to 125 persons who attended this seminar and I received considerable positive feedback. Many are now interested in Unity. Some are coming for groups and counseling. Some have started attending on Sundays." In addition to the services and classes offered in the ministry, Marie also incorporates Truth principles in the classes which she has been teaching for five years at a local college.

HEMPSTEAD, NEW YORK — Ida Bowles, our minister in Hempstead, New York, has shared a newspaper clipping from the August 10, 1975, edition of the SUNDAY NEWS, which reports on Ida's selection as Executive Director and President of a New York area philanthropic organization. We bless Ida for her willingness and dedication to serve others in this additional capacity. The fine feature length article by writer Hugh Wyatt explaining the purpose and structure of the organization is reprinted below:

WOMAN CLERIC HEADS FIRST BLACK FOUNDATION

A Long Island woman minister has been selected by a wealthy black family to head what is believed to be the first black-owned and operated foundation in the country. The foundation will award scholarships and provide other "self-help" programs to the needy.

The minister, the Rev. Ida Bowles of the Unity Center, Hempstead, will be the executive director and president of the George Rich Memorial Foundation. It is searching for an entire building to house its operations.

Rev. Bowles was selected by the family because of the respect that the late Mr. Rich had for her ability to manage and supervise social action programs. She heads a center with more than 100 members.

Rich, a real estate developer who died last Jan. 17 at the age of 72, was known in Harlem as a wealthy, well-respected and generous philanthropist who helped hundreds of poor people.

One of the recipients was Thomas Williams, 27, whose parents died 20 years ago. He was raised by his aunt, Delilah Watkins, in a Harlem tenement.

When Rich and Williams met, the boy not only acquired a new father, but about \$10,000 for schooling. Williams has just graduated from Rutgers Law School in Newark, N.J.

"Our goal is not only to preserve the memory of Mr. Rich, but to provide the basis from which people can help themselves," explained Rev. Bowles.

She recalled that Rich, in his last years, had come to the realization that he had spent some of his money "unwisely."

Rev. Bowles pointed out that the wealthy philanthropist gave away thousands of dollars without any supervision, and regretted it because he felt he could have helped far more people than he did.

"Had Mr. Rich had a program, he would have served far more good than by giving so freely," she asserted.

She illustrated her statement by saying: "If you give a man a fish, you feed him for a day. But if you teach the man how to fish, the man can feed himself forever."

Rev. Bowles said that she was referring to the failure of blacks and other poor groups to become a part of the mainstream even though they have been the recipients of millions of dollars from various philanthropists and other charities.

She said she hopes to be in a permanent headquarters within a few months. Once there, scholarships and other social-action programs will be initiated to help hundreds of Harlem and other poor youngsters throughout the city, Long Island (continued on page 4)

(continued from page 3) and Westchester, she said.

Thomas Frazier, an executive assistant to Rev. Bowles, said that programs also will be set up to help the parents of the youngsters, and that the emphasis will be on self-help.

He contented that the effort is the first such attempt by a black group to set up a philanthropic organization.

"This will be an example to show the world that blacks are as concerned with helping other blacks," he said, adding, "it is no longer a question of asking for governmental financial assistance."

Loren Flickinger reporting for the SOUTHEASTERN REGION:

CHATTANOOGA, TENNESSEE – Dana Voght, minister of Unity Center of Practical Christianity, Chattanooga, Tennessee, reports that a very successful Board/Minister meeting was conducted in Chattanooga on September 27th. A total of 21 persons including key lay people attended from our ministries in Nashville, Tennessee; Birmingham and Huntsville, Alabama; and Chattanooga. Clem Thrift, minister in Birmingham; Gene Connors, minister in Nashville; and Dana formed a panel and discussed and answered questions from the floor regarding the functions, duties, and qualifications of Board members; the relationship of the Board and the minister; interviewing prospective ministers for a center; financial responsibility of the Board and the minister; and Youth Education.

Dana reports: "We are all so pleased with this workshop as a time of sharing and loving and strengthening one another in the Unity way, we plan to meet again in Nashville in April."

SAN FERNANDO, TRINIDAD, WEST INDIES — Unity of Trinidad and Tobago in the West Indies, dedicated their first church facility building at San Fernando on September 27. Violet Assam, Unity minister in Trinidad and Tobago, states: "The Silent Unity Centre of Prayer, San Fernando, is not a new building. It was the house of a medical doctor which we bought and renovated, but this is a great step forward during these challenging times."

Officiating at the ribbon cutting ceremony was William L. Fischer, Director of Ministerial Education for the AUC. Also participating in the service were Sylvia Chevalier, minister in San Fernando; the local Mayor, Councillor George Durity; and various members of the Board of Unity of Trinidad and Tobago. The Saturday afternoon dedication ceremony was attended by approximately 700 persons.

ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA — Leslie D. Saunders, minister of First Unity Church of St. Petersburg, Florida, has shared the good news of the ministry's expansion program. Les writes: "I am happy to announce that we have had our groundbreaking ceremonies for our new church facility. The new sanctuary will be an octagonal shape. There will be offices and classrooms with a large fellowship area for social gatherings.

"The total square footage of the new facility is 9,900 square feet. The unique feature of the new facility will be a 'whisper sound system.' This is a special sound system built into the hymnal racks. It means that no person will be more than four feet from a speaker. The total structure including the land will cost \$411,000. We anticipate construction to be completed by the first of June 1976. The financing has been done through local lending institutions."

Les also advised that James C. Lewis, our AUC President, was special guest speaker for the ministry on October 26. Another special program is Wally Minto and the Alpha Awareness program, scheduled at this St. Petersburg ministry the first week in November. We bless Les and First Unity Church for their ever increasing dedication, and also recognize and bless Nicholas Griffin, former minister under whose leadership this expansion program was initiated.

The Northwest Unity Ministers' Regional Conference met for three busy and productive days, August 25, 26, and 27, at the Inn Of The Seventh Mountain, near Bend, Oregon. Unity Center of Portland served as host for the Conference, Thirty-three ordained ministers, licensed teachers, and their spouses attended. Also attending and lending their spiritual consciousness to the Conference were Mary Wessel and Katharine Bosworth, retired ministers, and Joseph and Helen Stiegler, semi-retired.

Of particular interest in the items of business was a report by Max Lafser. minister of Unity Centre of Practical Christianity, Vancouver, B.C., Canada, on the experimental U.I.C.E. classes conducted on a local basis in Spokane and Seattle, Max reported that the program shows signs of being practical and worth further scheduling in the Region. A total of 53 students took advantage of the opportunity to earn credits in the U.I.C.E. program given in two-week sessions in their own community. Ministers and teachers of the Northwest Region are excited about the possibilities of reaching many more potential students with this outreach program.

Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the AUC, gave a "State of the AUC" report, fielding many questions, and creating a better understanding between the AUC office and the field ministries. Everyone present heartily agreed that Bob's presence at the Regional meetings is vitally important and worthwhile.

Many have already been attending study groups established by Richard Billings of Oak Park, This nucleus of Unity people are already working with us to bring the dynamic Unity way of life to their communities.

This is your Expansion Program and we want to insure its success in reaching thousands of Unity students who are not yet served by the personal ministry of a Unity center. July 15, 16, and 17, 1976, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, we will be gathering together as Unity ministers, teachers, students, and friends in the Unity Celebration — 1976. We had our convention in Kansas City in 1970 followed by a convention in 1973 also in Kansas City. These were tremendously successful in that, to everyone who attended, they were inspirational, moving, and in every way effective. For our Movement, they served to provide for us some national publicity.

Because of the expense involved for those participating, the Board of Trustees did exploratory work in the creation of regional healing rallies. With the good services of Phil Pierson, there was a healing rally held in San Francisco in 1974 and then another in Seattle in 1975. These, too, were tremendously successful though perhaps one of our great objectives was not obtained--that of reaching a large number of people not already acquainted with Unity.

Back at our Conference in 1971, the Conference body made the decision to lay plans for an international convention to be held in Philadelphia in 1976 to coincide with the Bicentennial celebrations. In 1973 and 1974 at our AUC Conferences, the proposition of having an activity in Philadelphia was again presented for confirmation. It was the decision of the Conference body that we should follow through with these plans. In the light of the lessons learned from our previous experiences, the Board has determined that participation in Unity

Celebration — 1976 shall be limited to under 2500 people. The program will be structured in such a way that adequate time will be provided for participation in the Bicentennial activities as well as in the Unity activities. Because of the heavy booking of all accommodations in Philadelphia during the summer of '76, it will be necessary for all reservations for our Unity Celebration — 1976 to be in and confirmed by June the 14th, 1976. Available space, both in the meeting accommodation as well as the living accommodation will be dealt with on a first come, first served basis.

All of us will want to give considerable prayer attention to the successful outworking of Unity Celebration – 1976. We will need your prayer support and your cooperation as we move forward to "rejoice in the perfect Truth that Unity Celebration – 1976 is a total success for all mankind." IN MEMORIAM

George M. Lamsa, a long-time friend of Unity who was dearly beloved and greatly respected by our worldwide family, made his transition on September 22 in California.


Dr. Lamsa served for a time as a resident faculty member of SMRS at Unity Village and was a popular and well received guest speaker in many of our Unity ministries throughout the country.

Dr. Lamsa was a native of the ancient Garden of Eden area in Northern Iraq, a renowned scholar of the Scriptures and theologian, a lecturer and author, and the translator of the Holy Bible from the ancient Aramaic Peshitta manuscripts into modern English. He was honored for his monumental work with the title of Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts, London.

He grew up in an isolated mountainous community in Kurdistan whose language, customs, and manners were almost identical to those prevalent at the time of Jesus. No other Englishspeaking Bible translator has had this distinctive qualification for interpreting and translating the Scriptures. Dr. Lamsa's translation, his books, and his commentaries now make it possible for us to bridge almost 4,000 years of antiquity, enabling us to "see the Scriptures through the eyes of the Middle East."

We know each member of the Association of Unity Churches joins in thought and prayer as we bless Dr. Lamsa in his spiritual ongoing.

in your Unity ministry as a part of the extension program. We have just added Study of the Old Testament, Parts I and II, to give more variety to the extension program. This makes the total number of credits offered in Unity ministries 56, but you may take only 48 of these for UICE credit. We have also replaced the course, 'Teach Us to Pray' with the course 'Life of Prayer,' which is the same course we teach here at UICE.

"You may earn up to, but no more than, 85 credits here at UICE in any one year and up to, but no more than, 25 credits in any one session. The total credits required to graduate from UICE must be earned in no more than 10 years. Classes that were taken more than 10 years ago will have to be repeated for credit. Book reports are fun and you will write 12 of them before you graduate from UICE. In your last session at UICE, just before you graduate, you will take a non-credit course entitled, 'Licensed Teacher Orientation.' A special time will be set aside for this class."



DR. MARCUS BACH FEATURED IN ACTIVITIES CENTER PROGRAMS

Unity School of Christianity presented a lecture series by Dr. Marcus Bach, world traveler, author, and renown authority on world religions, in the Activities Center at Unity Village October 3, through Sunday, October 5. The theme of the series was "The Total Health of the Total Person."

Dr. Bach lectured on "Meditative Practices Around the World" on Friday evening, October 3. The lecture was open to the public on a free will offering basis.

Saturday, October 4, Dr. Bach conducted an all day workshop. In commenting on the workshop, Dr. Bach stated, "A totally integrated person is comprised of one who is healthy in mind, soul, and body." The workshop stressed total health,

The morning session of the workshop covered "You and Your Body," including techniques for physical health such as nutrition and exercise. Subjects for the afternoon session were, "You and Your Mind," with techniques for mental alertness, and "You and Your Soul," featuring concepts in the field of meditation as well as the attainment of the integrative self-physical, mental, and spiritual oneness. The session concluded with a question and answer period. The workshop was open to the public for a regis-

tration fee of S10.

Dr. Bach was also the guest speaker at both the 9:30 a.m. and the 11 a.m. Sunday worship services at Unity Village Chapel on October 5.

Marcus Bach, a long time friend of Unity, holds a Ph.D. in religious science from the University of Iowa and four honorary degrees from other universities. He taught at the University of Iowa's School of Religion for many years and is listed as an authority in religious movements in "Who Knows and What" and "Who's Who in America,"

Dr. Bach has made in-depth studies of forty-five religions by participating in the respective religious communities for periods of two months to a year and a half. These studies have taken him around the world and have included the study of religious practices in such places as Haiti, Japan, Taiwan, and Southeast Asia, He has personally interviewed Dr. Albert Schweitzer, Pope John XXIII, and other world renown religious leaders.

"I always knew I would someday write about religion," said Dr. Bach, "not in the theological or doctrinal sense, but about what religion is and what it does in the lives of people. I have discovered that people are more alike than they are different, and that religions have more in common than they have in conflict." He has authored some twenty books, hundreds of magazine articles, and an award-winning play about the Trappist monks. One of his books is The Unity Way of Life, published by Unity School.

Dr. Bach has served the State Department on two occasions as a specialist under the International Educational Exchange Program in Southeast Asia, India, Pakistan, Korea, and Japan. He is also Founder and Director of The Fellowship for Spiritual Understanding (FSU) in Palos Verdes Estates, California. FSU is devoted to stimulating understanding and harmony within the individual and to promoting understanding and harmony among world religions, philosophies, and cultures.

Foster McClellan, Program Planning Chairman for the Activities Center, stated, "Dr. Bach is a respected authority on world cultures and religions as well as a prominent lecturer. We were indeed privileged to be able to present him in this lecture series."

RETURN PERFORMANCE OF "GODSPELL"

Unity School of Christianity presented the Great Day Acting Company in a successful return performance of "Godspell," September 27 in the Activities Center at Unity Village, Foster McClellan, Program Planning Chairman for the Activities Center stated, "The response to our first production of 'Godspell' in August was overwhelming, Requests for a repeat performance had come in steadily since that time. The Great Day Acting Company agreed to do another performance on the 27th for all those who were unable to attend the first time as well as those who wanted to see it again."

"Godspell" is a modern interpretation of the Gospel according to St. Matthew. It breaks the bounds of traditional stage productions by including the audience. A great deal of the action takes place in and through the audience, making them an integral part of the show. The musical score for "Godspell" is one of the most popular in the theatre today. Our AUC Book Review Committee has reviewed Power You Can Use Today! by J. Paul Featherstone and Bert G. Whitchurch and wish to recommend it to our membership. Published by the authors, this 108 page book is distributed in paper-back by DE VORSS & CO.

The Committee reports that the book is comprised of fifty two-page stories, each containing an effective mini lesson. One reviewer stated: "The authors quote Truth writers Charles Fillmore, Emmet Fox, and Ernest Holmes. I am glad to have the book in my library and I will refer to it from time to time for ideas. It would make a good gift. Those who stock other truth literature may find a use for it in their bookstore."

HIGHER CONSCIOUSNESS, THE EVOLUTIONARY THRUST OF KUNDALINI

The AUC Book Review Committee has also recommended <u>Higher Consciousness</u>, The Evolutionary Thrust of Kundalini by Gopi Krishna.

One reviewer states: "Krishna feels that modern scientific research methods should be applied to the study of bioenergy as he considers the yogi concept of Kundalini. The book is mainly his argument that wholesale research should be undertaken. To really understand this book the reader should have a fair understanding of raga-yoga and its practice. Krishna discusses the physical aspects of higher consciousness. He explains how to distinguish true altered states of consciousness (as from meditation) from delusion states induced by drugs, hypnosis, or other means. He has a very interesting third chapter dealing with religion and evolution but seems to me to shortchange the benefits man has derived from his spiritual progress.

"This book is well written and is interesting and easy to read. Personally I feel the author is perhaps too taken with 'scientific measurement' with 'proof' and places too much emphasis on the intellect as the means of solving problems. He does, however, not completely neglect the spiritual. One facet he emphasizes several times (often neglected in present day 'popular' trends) is the necessity for physical and moral preparation and continual work along these lines for maximum advancement in efforts to achieve growth in consciousness.

"I believe this is a book that a number of our Unity ministers will want to read and think about."

Another of our reviewers shared the following comments regarding this book: "This book is well worth reading and studying. It makes clear that 'higher consciousness' is to be gained only through the progressive unfoldment of our inherent divinity. There are no short cuts! Of particular note to us in Unity is the emphasis on the essential oneness of Spirit-soul-body, Divine Mind uses the physical body-brain-nervous system as the instrument through which It expresses, Therefore in addition to prayer, right thinking and acting and responding, the adherence to the laws of physical and mental well-being is a basic requirement. As Gopi emphasizes, 'The active participation of the brain and body is essential for transpersonal manifestations of consciousness,' There is a definite relationship between the quality of intelligence and the state of consciousness: not only psychological but physiological metamorphasis has to be effected.

"Kundalini (life energy), as the evolutionary impulse in the race is perennially active. When through the normal activity of the evolutionary mechanism, the brain and nervous system have reached a certain state of maturity then a higher state of consciousness is attained. Kundalini the evolutionary energy in man is the biological lever responsible for success in every form of spiritual exercise. Mind or consciousness is ever in charge, evermoving man through the activity of Its evolutionary urge to the transformation of every man.

"Self-willed man is now an active partner in the evolutionary activity of his organism. In order to allow the activity to continue he must learn to shape his own mode of life and behavior to assist the evolutionary drive: conform his life with spiritual ideals and principles. The surest way to achieve higher consciousness is to develop the characteristics of higher consciousness!

"Man's destiny is to realize the Kingdom of God on earth in the organic frame of man: the sublime state of beatitude Scripture promises!"

HISTORY OF THE "PEACE SONG"

The song "Let There Be Peace on Earth" has become a very meaningful part of the activities and services of many of our Unity ministries throughout the world. We thought perhaps our membership would be interested in the following article on how the song came into being. The article is printed in entirety as it appeared in the October 1975 issue of TRUTHWAY, a monthly publication of Unity Church of Dallas, Texas, where Donald Curtis serves as senior minister.

"LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH"

(Let It Begin With Me) By Sy Miller and Jill Jackson

Let there be peace on earth And let it begin with me; Let there be peace on earth, The peace that was meant to be.

With God as our Father, Brothers all are we. Let me walk with my brother In perfect harmony.

Let peace begin with me, Let this be the moment now. With ev'ry step I take, Let this be my solemn vow:

To take each moment and live each moment
In peace eternally.
Let there be peace on earth
And let it begin with me.

One summer evening in 1955, a group of 180 teenagers of all races and religions, meeting at a workshop high in the California mountains locked arms, formed a circle and sang a song of peace. They felt that singing the song, with its simple basic sentiment—"Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me," helped to create a climate for world peace and understanding.

When they came down from the mountain, these inspired young people brought the song with them and started sharing it. And, as though on wings, "Let There Be Peace On Earth" began an amazing journey around the globe. It traveled first, of course with the young campers back to their homes and schools, churches and

clubs. Then the circle started by the teenagers began to grow. Soon the song was being shared in all fifty states — at school graduations and at PTA meetings, at Christmas and Easter gatherings and as part of the celebration of Brotherhood Week. It was a theme for Veteran's Day, Human Rights Day and U.N. Day, 4H Clubs and the United Auto Workers began singing it. So did the American Legion, the B'nai B'rith, the Kiwanis Clubs and CORE. It was taped, recorded, copied, printed in song books, and passed by word of mouth.

The song spread overseas to Holland, England, France, Germany, Lebanon. To South America, Asia and Australia. The Maoris in New Zealand sang it — even the Zulus in Africa sang it.

Professional singers took it up. Among them, Ernie Ford, Andy Williams, Danny Kaye, Nat Cole, the Smothers Brothers, Roy Rogers, Dale Evans, Eddie Albert, Edie Adams, John Gary, Pearl Bailey, Roberta Shore, Champ Butler, the King Sisters, Mary Tyler Moore, John Raitt, Robie Lester, Liberace, Bob Crosby, the International Childrens' Choir, Jack Halloran, Gisele MacKenzie, Richard Summers, Lloyd Bridges, Patti Page, Angela Cartwright, the Young Americans, Carole Wells, Jack Smith, Pat Boone, Johnny Mathis, Rhonda Flemming, Stan Melton, Norman Luboff, the Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, Lorne Green and Ted Mack TV Shows and Father Keller's Christopher TV Series.

The song began to win awards. "Let There Be Peace On Earth" was awarded the George Washington Honor Medal by the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for "Outstanding achievement in helping to bring about a better understanding of the American Way of Life." It also received a Brotherhood Award from the National Conference of Christians and

This simple thought, "Let There Be Peace On Earth, and Let it Begin With Me" first born on a mountain top in the voices of youth, continues to travel heart to heart — gathering in people everywhere who wish to become a note in a song of understanding and peace — peace for all mankind.

Just as this issue of CONTACT was being finalized, the AUC office received the following additional news item:

PORT ANGELES, WASHINGTON — Donald Jennings, minister in Port Angeles, has reported that the ministry is in the process of purchasing a private residence which will be converted into the new building facilities for Unity in the Olympics. The residence is approximately ten years old and is situated two miles east of Port Angeles on a plot of land equal in size to several city lots. Accordingly, ample parking space can easily be provided for the ministry.


Don stated: "The facility at present is a single story six bedroom home of ranch style construction. One wing of the house has four bedrooms and two bathrooms which will be utilized as our Sunday School facilities. The living room and dining room will be converted into our Sanctuary, the family room will be renovated and our library will be situated there. The kitchen, of course, will provide the necessary food preparation facilities for fellowship programs. The other two bedrooms will be utilized as church office and workroom space. There is a four car carport attached to the house which will be later enclosed and converted into a Fellowship Hall. The house, exclusive of the carport space, has approximately 2,600 square feet under roof and has a wood siding

"The total initial cost to purchase the house and land and to make the changes required by local building codes to convert the house into a ministry is \$40,000. Since September 1, 1975, the ministry has raised \$8,500 of the \$12,500 needed to close the transaction."

Don further advised that a significant portion of the monies received to date was a result of a project whereby the ministry, in cooperation with a local professional photographer, gave certificates entitling a family to have an 8 x 10 color portrait made.

The balance of the down payment and closing cost is being fiananced through Faith Notes issued by the ministry. Unity in the Olympics is issuing the notes in three terms of maturity: five years, bearing interest at the rate of 6%; seven years at 6%%; and ten years at 6%%.

The tentative date for the ministry's first service in their new facilities has been set for Thanksgiving Day of this year. Anyone wishing to assist this growing ministry in expanding its ability to serve the spiritual needs of the people in its community is encouraged and invited to contact Don Jennings at Unity in the Olympics.
