

AUC PRESIDENT'S LETTER


Dear Fellow Association Members,

During this year of 1976, our Bicentennial Year, a great deal of thought will be given to the beginnings of our nation and to the founding fathers and those others who put forth so much time, effort, prayer, and dedication to help make this nation what it is today. Some would say it is not perfect. That is true. But it is wonderful to know we do not have to be perfect in order to be great. We are enjoying today the fruits of our forefathers' labor. It is good for us to remind ourselves of this so that we may appreciate all the more the many advantages we are enjoying now.

This might be a good year for us to reflect upon the beginnings of our own Unity Movement, and to think of those who have put forth so much effort, prayer, and dedication to make this Movement the dynamic influence it is in the world today. Charles and Myrtle Fillmore caught a great vision. They inspired others to join them in working to make that vision manifest in the world. 

REGIONAL NEWS

Catherine Knight reporting for the GREAT LAKES REGION:

AKRON, OHIO — Recently a special feature article on tape recorded spiritual messages was published in the Sunday magazine supplement of the <u>Beacon</u>, an Akron, Ohio, newspaper. Entitled "Putting Your Faith On The Line, A guide to instant spiritual satisfaction," the article described the "Dial-A-Prayer" programs presented by the four Akron churches offering tape recorded spiritual messages over the telephone.

Akron Unity Center received the most positive and constructive comments by the author of the article. Glenn Mosley, ur minister in Akron, stated that the response to the article has been good and that the number of telephone calls to the ministry's recorded message has increased.

One of the most significant items of comparison between the Dial-A-Prayer programs reported on was the absence of fund raising or proselyting tactics in Unity's message. The newspaper article emphasized that those who call Unity's Dial-A-Prayer are not cajoled to attend the church or to make financial contribution. The article cited examples of the pleas for such action which the other tape recorded messages contained.

BATTLE CREEK, MICHIGAN — Unity of Battle Creek, Michigan, hosted a very successful all-day Truth seminar with Richard Billings on November 15. The presentation by Richard, minister of Unity Church of Oak Park, Illinois, was enthusiastically received by the some 50 people attending the seminar.

Amalie Frank, who is serving in Unity Battle Creek, has shared reports of the growth and activity of this unfolding and expanding Michigan work. Amalie also serves as a volunteer worker in a special community service program en-

titled FISH. This program, has as its motto the words "celebrate life" shaped into the early Christian design of a fish. Those participating in the program provide emergency transportation and function as a volunteer action and information and referral service operating on a 24-hour basis in meeting the needs in the Battle Creek community. The volunteers also serve in close cooperation with area doctors, nurses, psychologists, social workers, and ministers.

Unity of Battle Creek also actively supports the Social Service Department of the Battle Creek Community Hospital.

CHICAGO, ILLINOIS — South Side Unity Center of Christianity in Chicago, Illinois, where **Doris Caldwell** serves as minister, celebrated its eighth anniversary during the month of November with special programs and activities. A highlight of the celebration festivities was a program featuring **R. Scott Sherman**, Outreach Director of the Association of Unity Churches, as special guest speaker.

During the past eight years, this dynamic ministry has remodeled its sanctuary and exterior, installed a sound system, and largely increased its membership.

We give thanks for Doris and her ministry of service and look forward with them to many more years of progress.

DETROIT, MICHIGAN - Over 650 persons attended the Christmas Concert presented on December 12 by Unity of the Infinite Presence in Detroit, Michigan. The program was a memorable evening of fine food and beautiful music and was held in the Great Lakes Ballroom of the Michigan Inn. The concert was another in the series of professional musical presentations sponsored by Unity of the Infinite Presence and featured soloists Christina Lypeckyi, Bob Angus, and Joan Tallman. In addition to the delicious dinner and the music of the three outstanding vocalists, the audience danced to the musical stylings of the Bernard Katz Orchestra. Jack Boland, minister of this Michigan ministry, stated that nine other Unity ministers and a large number of members of their respective congregations attended and enjoyed the concert.

Jack also shared some interesting information regarding the ministry's bylaws. Membership in Unity of the Infinite Presence is on an annual basis. That is, the last Sunday in October is Membership

Sunday and is designated as the time of reaffirmation of membership. All members who desire to continue their membership are required to submit their written request on a form provided for this purpose. All who do not re-submit their application are automatically dropped from the membership roll. New members will be accepted throughout the year at designated times, but membership must be renewed the last Sunday in October.

Jack feels this policy has a positive and constructive effect in that each member realizes that membership is a matter of consciousness and active involvement in the ministry. The annual reaffirmation of membership allows each member to experience a process of rethinking, recommitment, and renewal.

"SUSANNAH," the famous Dallas landmark considered by many to be the truest example of a Greek Revival Colonial Mansion in the South, along with its six and a half acres of beautiful grounds, has been acquired and rechristened "CHRISTHAVEN" by the Unity Church of Dallas, Texas, to make possible its Building Expansion Program.

DALLAS, TEXAS - Unity Church of Dallas recently acquired a beautiful antebellum style mansion adjoining the present church property in order to proceed with the ministry's Building Expansion Program. To be known as "CHRIST-HAVEN," this magnificent facility will serve as the New Age Teaching Center of the Unity Church of Dallas New Age Center of Light. In addition to adult classrooms, there will be a New Age Book and Gift Shop, a New Age Health Kitchen and Food Store, reference and circulating libraries, art galleries, and arts and crafts workshops. The spacious outdoor balconies and patios will be used for dramatic. musical, and dance presentations. Yoga and meditation classes will be taught, and experimental Modern Dance and Sufi dancing groups will be centered here.

Classes in many other New Age subjects will be scheduled, as well as the Sunday morning Adult Classes. The entire third floor of the mansion has been converted into the Youth of Unity Center where all classes and activities of Y.O.U. will be held. Facilities include a Y.O.U. office and chapel.

Meetings and activities of the various groups within the Unity Church: Women of Unity, Men of Unity, Singles of Unity, Young Adults of Unity, Couples of Unity, and Seniors of Unity will be held at CHRISTHAVEN. There will be media

and tape-listening rooms, and discussion groups and spiritual workshop groups will meet in both day and evening sessions. The Healing Ministry of Prayer Visitors Chapel will be open to the public.

The Master Plan for the ministry's expansion calls for the construction of a sanctuary seating 1,000, a New Age School of Light for accredited elementary instruction, an activities center, motel accommodations for visiting students and those who come for spiritual healing. Ample parking space will be developed.

Donald Curtis, senior minister of Unity Church of Dallas, stated: "The opportunity to obtain full ownership of CHRISTHAVEN so that we may have ample space for our long-range Building Program is a great demonstration for our Church and for all of us. This project gives us the opportunity to build our spiritual, organizational, and financial strength as a CHURCH FAMILY. We have entered into a lease-purchase agreement for CHRISTHAVEN to materialize within a period of three years. In the meantime we have complete use of all lands and facilities. The monthly cost is well within our budget, and the three-year time element will give flexibility in developing our building and financing plans." The capital expenditure necessary to acquire CHRISTHAVEN is in an amount of several hundred thousand dollars.

UNITY VILLAGE, MISSOURI – Thousands more persons are now able to hear the weekly message from Unity Village Chapel. Beginning Sunday, January 18, the 11:00 a.m. Worship Service at Unity Village is being taped in its entirety for broadcast the following Sunday from 8–9 a.m. over Kansas City radio station KMBR-FM. J. Sig Paulson, co-minister of Unity Village Chapel, advised that the program has been entitled "The Unity Way" for radio broadcast purposes.

Officials of the radio station said that when the hour long time slot became available they immediately thought of Unity Village. They consider Unity as being the best qualified to provide a religious worship service program which would appeal to the largest number of radio listeners. The radio officials further stated that the station could have obtained a "canned" religious service from one of the many religious program distributors, but they wanted to have a local production which would be more meaningful to area listeners. The Unity Village service is structured and presented in such a way that it would encourage the listener to feel as if he or she were actually present at the service. Accordingly, the station offered Unity Village Chapel the full 60 minute programing time free of charge.

"We see this as an opportunity to serve more people, to help more people become conscious of their own potential," said Sig. Approximately 2000 persons now attend the two Sunday morning services of Unity Village Chapel.

BOZEMAN, MONTANA — Our minister of Bozeman Unity Truth Center, Jeannie Horton, is also serving as minister of Unity Church of Missoula, Montana. This pioneer work has rented facilities which provide a meeting room, office, and living quarters for the minister. Jeannie states the work is experiencing growth both spiritually and in numbers.

An interview with Jeannie and photographs published by a local Missoula newspaper have greatly added to the promotion of this new center and Jeannie is scheduled to be interviewed by the television and radio media. (continued on page 5)

SPOKANE, WASHINGTON — A recent aerial photograph taken of Unity Church of Truth in Spokane, Washington, where **David McClure** serves as minister, has been incorporated in a sketch for use on the church bulletins, in newspaper advertising, and also for a unique embossed design on the church stationery and ministerial business cards. This view presents an intriguing and more comprehensive perspective of the church exterior than the conventional angles and is exceptionally illustrated.

In the Spokane Prayer Center of Unity Church of Truth, a volunteer staff of more than 40 dedicated individuals responds to requests for prayer help from the Northwest area of the United States. The Prayer Center is open daily from 8:00 a.m. until midnight and is totally supported by love offerings. In 1975, over 5,500 calls and letters were received and over 14,000 letters, affirmations, and inspirational pamphlets were mailed out.

The church hosted two candlelighting services on Christmas Eve in order to accommodate the tremendous attendance experienced. The early service featured some of the Unity children in a metaphysical Christmas play and the 11:00 .m. service included special music, lighting of the disciple candles by the YOUers, and a midnight reception afterwards. David reports, "The actual candlelighting

portion of the services took only about two minutes to complete for several hundred participants. This was accomplished by giving each individual a clear plastic glass half-filled with salt and containing a candle with a blessing. When the time for the candlelighting approached, ushers lit their candles from the Christ candle on the platform, then moved to light candles of persons sitting at the ends of each row. Everyone, in turn, lighted their candle from that of the person seated next to them. The lights were held aloft while all sang 'Silent Night' and the sanctuary took on the appearance of a star filled sky. In addition to the inspirational experience, each person was able to take their candle home to light it during the remainder of the holiday season as a reminder of their own Christ light."

Loren Flickinger reporting for the SOUTHEASTERN REGION:

CHATTANOOGA, TENNESSEE – A sixweek pilot project aimed at training clergy to deal more effectively with alcoholism was recently concluded at the Alcoholism Rehabilitation Program (ARP) in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Among those taking part in the program was **Dana Voght**, minister of Unity Center of Prac-

tical Christianity in Chattanooga.

The free ARP program, offered for the first time, was an attempt to make ministers aware that alcoholism is an illness, and trained them to deal with family problems that are alcohol related. The primary purpose of the program was to assist ministers in helping families to cope with the reality of the situation and to help them recognize the symptoms in individuals or their own family members.

HOLLY HILL, FLORIDA — Approximately fifty members and friends of the Unity Center of Christ in Holly Hill, Florida, participated in ground breaking ceremonies January 11, 1976, at the site of the new building to be constructed on the church's present property. The ceremony was conducted by J. Scott Thornton, minister, immediately following the regular Sunday Devotional Service.

The new facility will be situated adjacent to the building which presently houses all services, classes, and other activities, and should be ready for occupancy by Easter according to the building contractors in charge.

Including a main sanctuary with a seating capacity of approximately 200, the new building will also house the minister's study, a library, a kitchen, and other facilities. Construction plans also call for a parking area which will hold approximately 100 cars and the remodeling of the existing building to be used for Sunday School, classrooms, and offices.

In addition to the many and varied activities of this fine ministry, its minister, J. Scott Thornton, was one of several metaphysical leaders chosen to be a featured speaker at the International New Thought Alliance (INTA) seminar held in Melbourne, Florida, February 6-8.

NAPLES, FLORIDA – Members and friends of Unity of Naples attended ground breaking ceremonies at a 10 acre lakeside site for the first building of Unity of Naples' new church facilities.

Jack Kern, our minister in Naples, was assisted in turning the initial shovelful of earth by Mrs. Wanda Edmonds, a charter member of Unity of Naples.

The new facility, known as the Activities Building, will house offices, a library, Sunday School rooms, and a meeting room for more than 200 people. Future plans call for the construction of a main sanctuary, a day school, a manse, and a retreat center. "We hope to make this ten acres a garden spot of beauty and quiet," said Jack Kern in speaking of future plans. "We want to keep it as natural and unspoiled as possible, and to make it a place where people of all faiths will want to come for quietness and meditation. Jesus taught that the Kingdom of God and the Father are within, so a place conducive to inner stillness is an important part of Unity."

The Activities Building is to be built around a landscaped patio which overlooks a ten acre lake to the south. The project has been partially financed by the ministry through the conducting of a unique World of Serendipity Festival which added \$6,000 to the building fund.

Marlowe Kline reporting for the EAST-ERN REGION:

BALTIMORE, MARYLAND - John Tant, minister of Unity Center of Christianity, Baltimore, presented a highly successful Thanksgiving Festival at this Maryland ministry November 22 and 23. Included in the well-planned seminar were sections entitled, "The Sound of the Universe", "The Cloth of Spirit", and "The Spoken Word." All helped bring out the theme of the seminar, "The Source of the Spoken Word." A special hymn, "The Law," and overhead projector transparencies brought the material to life. John stated, "It was indeed a Thanksgiving Festival as the seminar was given to a seating capacity of nearly 100 people." Following the Sunday session, refreshments and a social hour were enjoyed in the ministry's Fellowship Hall.

MONTCLAIR, NEW JERSEY — Marlowe Kline, minister of Monclair Unity Church, recently served as hostess and moderator for Board members, committee chairpersons, youth education leaders, and representatives of the Northwest New Jersey study class at a YMCA camp north of Blairstown, New Jersey. Three different sessions during the day were devoted to getting acquainted, discussing church situations, better communications, and church expansion. A date has been set for another seminar to be held at the camp in September.

VIRGINIA BEACH, VIRGINIA - Recently featured as "Church of the Week" in a comprehensive article appearing in the Virginia Beach newspaper was Unity Church of Tidewater. Joyce Kramer, minister, said Unity Church of Tidewater received acclaim as "a prayer, Truth practicing, teaching ministry of service." In addition to outlining Unity principles, the article gave a brief history of Unity Church of Tidewater and told about its many and varied activities. The article also included the ministry's successful Dial-A-Blessing and dynamic weekly radio message. The church plans to begin the construction of a unique, modern building on its 11% acre property sometime in 1976.

TORONTO, CANADA — The new year is bringing a new look to Unity Church of Truth in Toronto, where James Sherman serves as minister. "Project Unity," as the renovation process is called, includes the construction of new offices, new classrooms for Sunday School and adult use, library facilities with display-space for over 500 different Truth-oriented books, as well as the addition of new carpeting, drapes, greenery, and lighting for the auditorium of the church. The renovative process will take about three months to complete and cost approximately \$112,000.

VALLEY STREAM, NEW YORK – Emma (Pat) Filiault, minister of Unity Church of Christianity, was recently elected President of the Religious Council of Valley Stream. The Religious Council, through its ecumenical and benevolent activities, seeks to promote a better understanding among the various religious denominations.

C. Berton Coffey reporting for the SOUTHWEST REGION:

TUCSON, ARIZONA - Unity of Tucson, served by ministers Larry and Mary Ellen Swartz, has just completed ground breaking for a three story prayer tower which will serve the Tucson community on a 24 hour basis. The Tower is scheduled for completion sometime in May. Larry stated, "The Tower will be cylindrical in shape and its third floor will contain a meditation chapel as well as the enclosed area in which a trained prayer representative will be serving -- visual but soundproof connection between the two areas will allow someone who is using the Meditation Chapel to feel close to the person actually speaking on the telephone. The third floor will have large, ten foot windows overlooking the mountains just to the north of Tucson and will provide an atmosphere of upliftment and prayer.

"The second floor will probably be a classroom and otherwise a multipurpose area. The ground floor will contain our Metaphysical Book Shop (the listing we carry in the Yellow Pages) getting this area out of the main Church and letting us use the existing foyer as an actual foyer. Each floor will contain the possibility for two-way closed circuit television, connected with the main system in the Church; audio from the Sanctuary is also provided.

"The Prayer Tower is located within 10 feet of the southwest corner of Unity of Tucson and is connected by an arched, covered arcade. New restroom facilities are also part of the building project."

Unity of Tucson has also recently purchased an IBM Memory Typewriter. Larry reports, "This new piece of church office equipment is being utilized to produce offering acknowledgment letters, visitor letters, 'miss you' letters, and many others which can be developed in a form style yet which can be made applicable to the individual by virtue of the capabilities of the typewriter. We also see expanded use of the typewriter as our Prayer Ministry becomes active--we plan to answer every prayer request with a letter. The purchase of this typewriter has saved us employing a secretary and even though the initial price is just slightly under \$6000.00 this amount would be spent quickly with the hiring of an additional employee."

MID-YEAR COUNCIL OF COMMITTEES

The Mid-Year Council of Committees met at Unity Village January 5-9, 1976, and although it was one of the coldest weeks in Missouri this year, a great deal of warmth was generated by the love and fellowship shared by all. On January 7, 8, and 9 the AUC Board of Trustees convened. The reports of the various Committees to the Board and actions taken by the Board are summarized as follows:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - JAMES C. LEWIS, CHAIRMAN

James C. Lewis, newly elected Chairman of the Executive Committee, expressed on behalf of the Committee regrets for the resignation of Dorothy Pierson and Glenn Mosley as members of the Executive Committee, however, Glenn expressed a willingness to fulfill his term as a member of the Board of Trustees. Both Dorothy and Glenn felt at this time that their ministries were requiring more of their attention and it was their decision to resign. The Board of Trustees expressed deep appreciation for the years of dedicated service that both Dorothy and Glenn have offered to the growth of the AUC and look forward to their continued participation in AUC activities.

The Board ratified the action of the Executive Committee to hire Lani Jones to coordinate the re-writing of the Youth Education material to make it more Bible and children oriented. Lani has contacted other re-write authors to assist her and is working toward the goal of having new material available for fall classes. A Committee was appointed by the President to review the material and to assist Lani in any way possible with this project.

In the initial order of <u>Unity in Song</u> the decision was made to offer the book both in the gold and blue binding. There has been considerable more demand for the gold binding and that stock is exhausted. It was the recommendation of the Committee, ratified by the Board, that for an additional six months, the wholesale price for <u>Unity in Song</u> remain at \$2.50 each.

FINANCE & BUDGET - MICHAEL MURPHY, CHAIRMAN

The Finance and Budget Committee submitted a proposed budget of \$448,957 for the 1976-77 year. This amount represents an approximate 7% increase over last year's budget. The proposed budget will be printed in detail for Conference, a copy of which will be mailed to each AUC member.

LICENSING & ORDINATION - MARY STOVIN, CHAIRMAN

The Licensing and Ordination Committee stated that they were very impressed with the progress evidenced by the second year SMRS students and the caliber of the members of both classes. The Committee met with **Dorothy Breese** of Huntington, New York, and **Williams** of Oak Park, Illinois, and it was the Committee's unanimous recommendation that they be granted licensed teacher recognition. The Board of Trustees unanimously approved such recommendation.

Although our 1976 Conference will be held in Philadelphia in July, the Licensing and Ordination Committee must of necessity meet at Unity Village for the purpose of making ordination recommendations for second year SMRS students and progress evaluations for first year students. A date has been set for representation of this Committee to meet at Unity Village during the week of June 14, 1976.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION - JACK BARKER, CHAIRMAN

In conjunction with working with the faculty of U.I.C.E., the Ministerial Education Advisory Committee recommended that a person who is working toward licensed teacher recognition be encouraged to take some of the Extension Courses given by the minister of the center in which that person is involved. It was also the recommendation of the Committee that the minister be informed by U.I.C.E. when a person attending the classes expresses a desire or interest to have licensed teacher recognition. The Committee further recommended that consideration be given to developing a course in Youth Education Instruction, which would be offered in U.I.C.E. based upon the material that is currently being developed by the AUC.

OUTREACH - V. STANFORD HAMPSON, CHAIRMAN

The Outreach Committee shared with the Board the progress being made in the Chicago outreach program conducted by R. Scott Sherman. The Committee recommended, and received ratification by the Board, that a permanent minister be placed in the newly developed work in St. Charles, Illinois, in order that Scott might continue in other areas of expansion.

The decision was also reached that all requests for expansion fund monies and assistance in any form be channeled to the Outreach Committee for their research and recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

POST GRADUATE DEVELOPMENT – JACK BARKER, CHAIRMAN

The Post Graduate Development Committee announced that the material on <u>Christian Healing</u> would soon be available for distribution to our ministers. **Ed Rabel** has prepared annotations which will be used in conjunction with this course. The Committee reported that the next Post Graduate Course to be presented on the regional level would be based upon prosperity. After the prosperity course is developed, it will form the basis of a new U.I.C.E. course to be taught in the local ministries.

YOUNG ADULT RESEARCH – ALAN ROWBOTHAM, CHAIRMAN

The Young Adult Research Committee reported that two Young Adults participated in their meetings which presented an opportunity for the Committee to have greater insight into the needs of the Young Adults. The participation by the Young Adults also served as an opportunity for the young people to become more aware of AUC's desire to serve them. The Committee recommended, and received ratification by the Board, that a Young Adult Camp-out Retreat be offered in the regions alternating with the national retreat held at Unity Village. It was recommended that a minister in each region be invited to be available to serve in an advisory capacity to work with the Young Adult Coordinators. It was also the Committee's recommendation that a member of the Young Adult Growth Committee be invited as a delegate to their respective regional ministers' conference to report on current Young Adult activities.

OTHER BOARD ACTION

Barton Associates Report — A letter was shared with the Board of Trustees from Barton Associates stating that there has only been a fair majority of response to the survey and, therefore, this had caused delay in an analysis being presented. This analysis should be completed (Mid-Year Council continued on page 8)

Unity-in-the-Valley; St. Charles, Illinois: Beginning early in February, Edd Dawson will serve in this expansion ministry. Located just forty miles due west of Chicago's Loop, Unity-in-the-Valley held its first Sunday meetings in late October, 1975, after a guest lecture by James Dillet Freeman. In addition to his responsibilities at the newly-organizing church, Edd will work with my wife, Judy, and me in the other "fledgling" ministries just starting in Chicago-land.

Edd has served in the Vancouver and New Westminster ministries in British Columbia. Subsequently he served in Medford, Oregon, and on a part-time associate basis in Spokane, Washington. A native of Columbus, Ohio, Edd's earliest interests in Unity stemmed from his desire to work in expansion ministries. He moves to the St. Charles area with his wife, Lynn, and two young sons.

Crystal Lake, Illinois: A meditation class stressing the practice of depth meditation began during the last week of January in this study group. Also a part of the AUC Outreach Program, the Crystal Lake Group meets in the clubhouse of the Four Colonies Condominium Development. The class, although sponsored by Unity, has attracted an unusually large group of local residents as it has been included as a regular activity in the community newsletters. In this way over 300 people not normally reached by Unity are exposed to our planned classes. (Note: Use of large apartment or condominium development clubhouses can draw interested local people to be served by Unity ministries. As in this case, the Activities Director of the Development is often very grateful for such classes as it makes his job easier.)

"Unity West;" Lombard-Downers Grove-Hinsdale, Illinois: A post-card survey of all Outreach Program addresses in the western Chicago suburbs was initiated in late January. The survey is intended to provide us with the preferences for our early development activities in this area. The Unity addressees are asked if their interests lie mainly in church or class activities or if they are adequately being served by another church in the area.

(Note: We are trying for the first time a post-card which is stamped with a post-age stamp to encourage return. Some direct-mail professionals suggest that on small mailings this greatly increases the response to far above unstamped or even "Business Reply" mailers.)

Anchorage, Alaska: Sparked by the determination of a handful of "displaced" Unity students in Anchorage, Puget Sound Unity ministers weekly fly in for Sunday services and classes there. Grover Thornsberry of Seattle began the early three-hour flights after his Sunday services several months ago and is now sharing the 1,300 mile trip with other ministers in the area.

Regular attendance in a rented church averages 40 adults and 20 children each Sunday. The group, proving its high prosperity consciousness, is already paying airfare, accommodations and the church rental. Robert E. Barth of Bremerton reports that the group is talking seriously of requesting placement of a full-time minister in Anchorage soon.

Raleigh, North Carolina: A Christmas candlelighting service consecrated the start of another potential Unity ministry in this capitol city. With the assistance of Joyce Kramer (Virginia Beach, Virginia) a group of 52 gathered to prepare themselves for Christmas and a new year filled with Unity. Joyce reports nearly 60 families on her mailing list from Raleigh are interested. Beginning January 11 regular Sunday evening meetings began at the clubhouse of a large apartment complex.

Leadership will alternate between teachers from the local group and the Virginia Beach ministry on successive Sundays. Even though the distance is nearly 200 miles, enthusiasm is high both in Virginia Beach and Raleigh as these distant neighbors help serve the Raleigh area.

Augusta and Athens, Georgia: Robert Means, newly assigned as minister in Atlanta, is moving forward with a request

for an associate minister to serve in at least two new Georgia expansion ministries. The groups in Augusta and Athens were started by **Jay Dishman**, former Atlanta minister. The newly-requested expansion minister will serve as associate in Atlanta until the ministries are fully developed.

One final comment: During the Mid-Year Committees meetings at Unity Village in January I was extremely impressed by the many expansion ideas and groups reported on there. If you have a potential ministry or a good idea "cooking," please dash off a note to me so I can share with everyone. Thanks.

about the middle of February and will be mailed directly to all member ministries. It is the recommendation of the Board of Trustees that the Regional Representatives be encouraged to conduct sub-regional and regional meetings in order that the membership can discuss this survey in greater detail. Recommendations will then be compiled by the Regional Representative and shared with the Board of Trustees for implementation.

New Members of Finance and Budget Committee — Charles Roth and R. Scott Sherman resigned as members of the Finance and Budget Committee due to other demands on their time. The Board of Trustees elected Charles Korfhage and C. Berton Coffey to fill these vacancies.

Licensed Teacher Recognition — Ada Lopez deMiles had appeared before the Ad-Hoc Licensing and Ordination Committee in August. Ada is from Malaga, Spain, and conducts a study class there. She had completed her U.I.C.E. training and has recently completed her teaching experience through the ministry in Puerto Rico under the direction of Francisca Mendez. It was the decision of the Board of Trustees to grant Ada Lopez deMiles licensed teacher recognition.

New AUC Members — It was the pleasure of the Board of Trustees to officially accept the ministries in Hemet, California, and Peoria, Illinois, as members of the Association of Unity Churches. Pierre Gallardo has accepted responsibility for the ministry in Hemet, and the Placement Committee is working with the Board in Peoria in regard to succession of leadership for that ministry.

UNITY CELEBRATION - 1976



PERSON TO PERSON

During the last several months, you've read a great deal in CONTACT about the efforts of the Outreach Committee of AUC in its expansion project in the Chicago area. During the recent Mid-Year Council of Committees meetings here at the Village, one of our ministers quite seriously asked why Scott Sherman and his expansion efforts were getting so much publicity.

I think it's important to point out that this project in the Chicagoland area is not Scott's, but rather yours and mine. It is the unified activity of the AUC in its first concerted effort to expend funds and utilize energies and skills to specifically create new ministries. As this project continues to unfold, we will be continuing to share information with you in regard to it.

It is equally important, however, that all of us should be aware of the tremendous movement of growth and expansion and development that can be detected throughout the Unity field. When you can step back and sense the expansion and growth that is occuring, it becomes exciting. In Fairbanks, Alaska, there is a regular group that meets each week and by mid summer, should be well enough along to become a full-time Unity ministry, Grover Thornsberry and the other Puget Sound ministers have given richly of their consciousness to this group. In Northern Florida, Loren Flickinger has stirred up a great deal of enthusiastic interest in the development of ministries in Tallahassee and nearby communities. We have just received, in the Executive Office, an application for a full-time minister for a study group that has been strengthened and blessed by Marge Kass in the McAllen, Texas, area. In the outlying districts around Atlanta, Georgia, there are several study group ctivities for which we have already received applications for leadership, and Joyce Kramer shares with us a wonderful spirit of enthusiasm regarding a great group in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Expansion is occurring on every hand. During the past few months, we have accepted and welcomed into fellowship in the Association of Unity Churches, or are in the process of doing so, long time Truth ministries. Among these are Hemet, California; Peoria, Illinois; and Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. It is a tremendous joy to feel the excitement and growth not only in consciousness, but also in ministries, in numbers, and in services rendered.

In the early days of our efforts out of the Executive Office of AUC, a very sizeable proportion of my time was involved in what we have come to call "liaison work." When internal difficulties occur in a ministry or between ministries, the service of mediation by AUC has often proved necessary and helpful. From time to time, this service continues to be called for.

Much more, however, of the time that I spend is in feeling the excitement and joy and satisfaction, growth and accomplishment. It's the positive side of my being your Executive Director. It involves happy, productive times of growth and gratitude. It involves meetings of ministers and boards on a regional or sub-regional level in which good, positive, constructive work can be done to strengthen our ministry by the exposure of our board members to their counterparts from other ministries. It involves being able to represent you, the Movement, at a dedication service or an anniversary celebration. Since the Mid-Year Council of Committees meetings, I've spent a good time on the go in just this way. On January the 18th, I was privileged to be a part of the dedication service for the new church in Olympia, Washington. Millie Perdue is our minister there and she has taken that ministry, in three years, from just a handful of folks to a full congregation in a brand new building that is a joy to behold.

On January the 25th, I was again privileged to be involved in a dedication service, this time in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Bill Kozy is our minister there and, in the three years that he has been in Kalamazoo, he has taken a study group, developed it into a full-time ministry, and they have purchased an existing church building in Kalamazoo. Here again, the excitement of accomplishment and growth is a wonderful experience! I went from Kalamazoo to Tucson, Arizona, where I attended the Southwest Unity

Ministers Conference and there is a wonderful, lovely spirit among our co-workers there. The efficiency and order, the harmony and love that was shared were indeed a joy.

On February the 1st, I had the opportunity to accept an invitation from Jim Lewis, our minister in Denver, Colorado, to be a guest speaker on the occasion of their 25th anniversary of our ministry in Denver. The growth and development of that work is little short of phenomenal. The beautiful facilities of Unity Church of Denver were filled to overflowing and a great joy was shared. Mary Rowe is now working full-time with Jim as an associate in the church there.

On February the 21st, the ministers and board members from the ministries in the Greater Kansas City area gathered together at Unity Village for a Board/ Minister meeting and on the 28th, we had a Sub-Regional Board/Minister meeting in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Each time our folks get together in this exciting kind of way, there is a level of togetherness that adds mightily to the strength of our Movement. On February the 29th, I was privileged to be guest speaker at the dedication service for the new facilities in Albuquerque, New Mexico. In our ministry there, under the leadership of Bob Wasner, the new facilities have opened a whole new era of growth and development not only for Christ Unity Church but for the inter-relationship of our ministries from that part of the country.

There is so much about our Unity Movement that is wonderful, and it seems to me that it's important that we be conscious of these, for in that consciousness lies the strength of our unity.

UNITY STUDY GROUPS

The AUC office receives each month a significant number of requests inquiring as to the location of Unity activities. The cooperation of each minister in keeping the AUC office informed of the status of affiliated study groups enables such inquiries to be promptly and appropriately answered.

Nowhere will you better recapture that "Spirit of '76" than in the city of Philadelphia, birthplace of a nation and of an ideal which is the very essence of man himself: FREEDOM. Since the time of William Penn, Philadelphia's founder, it has been called the "Holy Experiment", the "City of Brotherly Love", and now the "Bicentennial City". As Philadelphia celebrates the two hundredth anniversary of Independence, it will be the focus of attention throughout the United States and the world. And you can be here!

The focal point for those important '76 events is Independence Historical Park. Here within one square mile are more historical attractions than in any other place in the United States. The area around Independence Hall is replete with peerless buildings whose beauty has endured and grown with the years and now stand as objects of pilgrimage, as the very symbols of two hundred years of freedom.

The buildings on Independence Square itself have housed the Provincial Assembly, the Council, the Supreme Court, the Second Continental Congress, the Senate, and the House or Representatives. Independence was declared here; the Articles of Confederation were drafted and ratified; the first Bank of the United States and the United States Mint were established; Vermont, Kentucky, and Tennessee were admitted into the Union; Washington took the oath of office for his second term here and John Adams his as second president.

And not far away that most brilliant of all 18th century Americans, Benjamin Franklin, lived and worked at Franklin Court. Franklin, George and Martha Washington, Betsy Ross, and other notables of the time, attended Christ Church nearby.


It is truly an awesome feeling to view the Liberty Bell. The Bell was moved January 1, 1976, from Independence Hall to its new home in the near-by newly constructed Liberty Bell pavilion. Ordered in 1752 from England to mark the 50th anniversary of Penn's Charter of Privileges, the bell was prophetically inscribed with these words from Leviticus 25:10, "Proclaim liberty throughout the land, unto all the inhabitants thereof." When

the British entered Philadelphia it was safely removed to a spot near Allentown, Pennsylvania, to re-emerge for its most famous ring on July 8, 1776, when it summoned the citizens of Philadelphia to the State House Yard to hear the Declaration of Independence read by Colonel John Nixon.

At Independence Square the Assembly Room itself is set up just as it was that day on July 4, with quill pens, snuff boxes, and canes lying atop the signers' desks. The room's most famous and arresting treasure is George Washington's chair. Benjamin Franklin named it the "Rising Sun Chair" for the emblem affixed to its back. It is said that he often wondered if it were a setting sun or a rising sun amidst the often heated debate surrounding the signing of the Declaration of Independence. He was soon to see his dream come true, however, as many of you will, too, upon reliving this most precious time in our history as a nation.

For a bit of fun, walk across Independence Park to the Todd House and stand on the sidewalk that, according to legend, held the most romantic patch of ice in American History. It was here that John Todd's young widow, Dolley, came out of the house with her escort, Aaron Burr. She slipped on the ice and a young Virginia Congressman helped prevent her from falling. It was then that Burr made his historical introduction: "Dolley, I'd like you to meet Mr. Madison,"

ON DEATH AND DYING BY ELIZABETH KUBLER-ROSS

Our AUC Book Review Committee has recommended the book On Death and Dying by Elizabeth Kubler-Ross.

The Committee reports: "Death is a part of life. The majority of us give lipservice to this inexorable fact but few of us ever consciously face this challenge, come to terms with our human finiteness. Someone has said, 'No man is free to live life fully till he has accepted his death as inevitable.' Only as we realize that our earthly life span is limited do we become fully nonresistant to life, give ourselves to life and the living of it wholeheartedly, zestfully. Only then are we able to live each day sensitively, perceptively, appreciatively to the best of our capabilities.

"Until we honestly face and dissolve our own fears and phobias regarding death, we are inadequate to serve those who are experiencing critical or terminal illness, to help them to meet their passing in peace and dignity.

"In years gone by, one spent his last days at home . . . in familiar surroundings, with loved ones close by. Today, most spend the final hours in hospitals. Dr. Ross writes, 'Today the patient is suffering more-not physically, perhaps, but emotionally. Today's advanced technology and science often work to depersonalize the patient.' Such leads to resentment, frustration, anger.



SUFI BLESSING — During the Mid-Year Council of Committees meetings, the SMRS student body hosted a delicious potluck supper for the visiting ministers. The ministers also enjoyed musical programs presented by the students. A unique closing blessing was led by members of the student "Share and Care Group". Many ministers have requested a copy of the blessing and in response, **Jeff Shumsky**, student minister who introduced the blessing to the student prayer group, has graciously shared the above copy.

Jeff advises that during the blessing those present form a circle, then divide into pairs, facing each other. As the music begins, (1) each person surrounds his partner with "light" by raising their

hands above them and slowly lowering them so that by step (2) hands are at sides, the pair joining hands. At (3) the hands are moved upward on the word "presence" and on "illuminate your heart" the right hand is placed on partner's heart, left hand covering partner's right hand. At (4) and on "now and forever more" hands are placed in prayer attitude, each person bowing to partner, then moving forward to next partner. The conclusion of the blessing, after each person has been individually blessed, is executed by everyone moving back into a large circle, arms on shoulders, and singing the blessing for the final time. Leader closes with Amen.

OVERSEAS REPORT by Foster C. McClellan

Last October I had the privilege for the first time of visiting Holland and our Unity people in that wonderful country. Holland was indeed just as I had imagined it -- spotlessy clean and neat and beautiful with its dikes and windmills and quaint old towns and buildings and its canals and waterways. The most pleasant surprise of all was, however, that I discovered the people of Holland are some of the nicest people in the world, or perhaps I should say that the people of Unity in Holland are the niecest people in the world. I am not sure which is true, but in either case it's quite a statement to make, for Unity people everywhere are pretty hard to beat.

The headquarters of "Unity —Nederland" is actually located in two places in Rotterdam. The office is on the ground level in the home of Suus Breijer, who is the Secretary of Unity—Nederland, and the library is in the home of Jeanne Streng-Sonneveld, who is the active head of the movement in Holland. These two delightful ladies are carrying on the wonderful work which was started by Jan Faber, who for many years prior to his death last year was the leader in that country.

Jeanne and Suus are responsible for the distribution of "Dagelijks Woord" (Daily Word) to over 1,300 subscribers in Holland. They are also conducting a letter prayer ministry for the people who write

to them for help in their time of need.

The Dagelijks Woord is a beautifully prepared edition of the Daily Word with a message for each day exactly the same as our English edition. It's good to know that each day people in Holland are reading in their own language the very same message that we are reading that particular day. There are also Unity study groups in The Hague, Amsterdam, and Rotterdam.

The Chairman of Unity – Nederland is **Daniel van Zuilekom** who lives with his lovely wife **Mieke** in the ancient town of Rhenen which is located on the Rhine

River. Daniel is a well-known scholar in his country. He is a mathematician and a linguist, a translator and an expert on education for the Netherland government. He is responsible for the translation of Dagelijks Woord from English to Dutch and for the supervision of all the work in Holland. He is assisted by a lovely lady whose name I cannot remember who lives in the nearby town. Daniel is very modest about his role. He claims he has such wonderful assistants that there is little for him to do, even in translation.

Daniel lives in a beautiful home with the Rhine River running right through his garden. He has collected many priceless original paintings and authentic antique period-pieces of furniture. He is a remarkable man. He is an authority on art, furniture, and history. He also collects rare books and manuscripts. During World War II Daniel and his wife were for seven years the prisoners of the Japanese in Java. He has been devoted to Unity, particularly to Daily Word, most of his life.

Sometimes I think we take a little for granted the work, the loyalty, and the devotion of our friends overseas. In many countries they carry on year after year with very little recognition. Theirs is indeed really a labor of love but yet we know that they derive great joy and satisfaction as do we all from being of service to others. All of us here at Unity School take great pleasure in this opportunity to share with our friends in CONTACT something about our wonderful co-workers in the Netherlands.

is actually six years old, but it doesn't make that much difference after the play begins. It seems that composer-adapter Clark Gesner has succeeded in opening up the end of Charles Schulz' comic strip and letting the little people out to a wooden stage floor complete with teeter-totter equipment and a certain quality which makes the lovable characters more real than ever."

The Great Day Acting Company, a theatre troupe comprised of area talent from the Greater Kansas City Metropolitan Area, has just completed a summer tour of the musical "Godspell", which was presented in the Activities Center at Unity Village in August and September. Due to the response "Godspell" received, Unity School of Christianity invited the group to return with their new production of "Charlie Brown."

"A Musical Impression of Lee's Summit," featured Pat Metheny, a native of Lee's Summit, who has gained international recognition as a jazz guitarist and composer. All of the music for the concert was composed and arranged by Mr. Metheny as a tribute to Lee's Summit. In commenting on the concert, he stated, "This program is an experiment for me as a composer. Usually when I write tunes, I write them without much thought directed to where they come from. For this project I decided I would think of specific events and places dealing with Lee's Summit and write the first musical impressions that came to mind,"

Mr. Metheny was the featured soloist during the first half of the concert. He performed on twelve-string, six-string, and accoustical guitars. The second half of the concert featured a jazz combo and duets performed by Mr. Metheny and his guests: Mike Metheny, Trumpet; Barbara Davis, Flute; Kevin Clements, Bass; John McKee, Piano; and Tommy Ruskin, Drums. All of the guest artists are from the Lee's Summit area and have played in local bands.

Mr. Metheny has been featured at jazz festivals since he was sixteen and has taught guitar at Berklee College of Music in Boston. He has performed with Paul Bley, Ira Sullivan, Clark Terry, and has been a featured musican with the Gary Burton Quintet, twice Grammy Award winners in the jazz category.

"Dear Friends: The time is drawing near for me to 'go to press' with the first quarter of the new Sunday School materials, which will be available beginning next September. HOW TO CHECK OUT A CHARITY

Often our AUC ministries are contacted regarding the validity of various charities. The following article published last year in the National Observer (copyright 1975, Dow Jones and Co., Inc.) may be of some help in responding to such inquiries:

HOW TO CHECK OUT A CHARITY There are several ways to learn more about a charity...and to receive copies of its financial reports. These include:

- The Better Business Bureau. Both local offices and the Council of Better Business Bureaus, the bureaus' head-quarters group, maintain files on about 600 charities soliciting funds. Though not ratings, these files list finances, program, officers, and whether the charity meets the council's general standards. Individuals may obtain reports on up to three charities by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to their local office or to the Council of Better Business Bureaus, 1150 17th St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.
- The National Information Bureau. This nonprofit, independent agency monitors about 500 charities and issues detailed reports stating whether the charity meets eight bureau standards. Reports are limited to bureau members; membership costs a minimum of \$15 a year for individuals, \$25 for businesses. Address: 305 E. 45th St., New York, N.Y. 10017.
- ◆ Local and state agencies. Offices vary, but information usually can be found in the state's attorney general's, secretary of state's, licensing, or consumer-affairs offices. Some states—including New York, Pennsylvania, Florida, Illinois, and Ohio—maintain extensive files and can report whether a charity is registered to solicit funds or whether any charges are pending against it.
- Charities themselves. Many charities will send on request their annual report or financial statement. If the information is obscure, charity-monitoring officials suggest, write again and ask for specific cost breakdowns for fund-raising, administration, and programs

One test of validity, charities watchers say, is whether the plan for aid is explicit and sounds worth-while. Another whether donations are tax-deductible, some groups aren't tax-exempt, an indication that charity may not be their only concern.

WHO'S WHO AT UNITY SCHOOL

Foster C. McClellan, Director of the Overseas and Retreats Department of Unity School, is an ordained Unity minister who had a distinguished military career with the Royal Canadian Air Force prior to entering the ministry. Foster is a world traveler and lecturer and in his current position is responsible for the outreach of Unity to countries outside the United States, and for all retreat activities at Unity Village, which hosts approximately two thousand people each year. Foster has just completed his first book, Thoughts for a Friend, published by Unity School.

Paula McClellan is a regular member of the Retreat staff at Unity School. She is a licensed teacher having been graduated from the Correspondence Course and U.I.C.E.
