
AUC PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Fellow Association Members,

Have you made your reservations to the "Celebration and Conference" in Philadelphia? If you are planning to travel by air it would be advisable to make your reservations early. Also, encourage those members of your congregation who are planning to attend to make their hotel and air reservations as soon as possible.

As soon as the February issue of <u>UNITY</u> <u>Magazine</u> was delivered we began getting inquiries from people about our "Celebration." They expressed their excitement about it even before they had received the brochure of the program. I don't like to talk about limitations but we are limited to the number of reservations we can accept due to the facilities available. So, now is the time to act and to get your people to act.

By the time you receive this April issue of CONTACT you will have also received the results of the Barton Survey. I would like to suggest that you read and study these and share with us the results of your creative and prayerful thought. SPOKANE, WASHINGTON — A positive, outstanding feature film on the Prayer Center of our Spokane ministry was shown three times on KREM-TV news on January 21 and 22. Mark St. John, news analyst for the television station, interviewed Barby McClure, Prayer Center Director, for the segment of news "Inland Empire People." David McClure, minister of this Washington ministry, reports, "Calls and mail to the Prayer Center increased considerably as a result of this credible coverage."

David and Barby also reported that, "Eleven members of the church Board of Directors, seven spouses, and four staff members joined David in a 24-hour retreat during January at Snoblaze, a ski resort located on the slopes of Mt. Spokane. Following small group get-acquainted workshops, everyone actively shared in discussing questions regarding the ministry's facilities, programs, and activities as well as individual commitments and responsibilities to the ministry on the part of the staff and Board."

The expenses for this retreat were paid for by the ministry and David states, "The resulting ideas, rapport, and esprit de corps outmeasured the cost by far."

Charles Korfhage reporting for the NORTHERN CALIFORNIA REGION:

SAN JOSE, CALIFORNIA — The latest outreach service of Christ Church Unity in San Jose, California, where Warren and Marguerite Meyer serve as ministers, is its Dial-A-Wee-Wisdom Story. In the short time that these telephone stories for children, ages two through nine, have been available, the story telephone number has become the busiest at the Church.

The telephone number for the "A-Wee-Wisdom-Story" spells out the letters A W STORY. The number is now listed in the white and yellow pages of the local telephone directory and is found in the special Church yellow page advertisement.

The Church received permission from the editor of Wee Wisdom magazine to cut down any of its stories or revise them to fit into the three and a half minute recording. Some of the presentations are originals from the consciousness of Warren Meyer. At present, Warren is read-

ing a new story every seven days. The Church plans to add a staff of story writers and readers in the near future.

PALM DESERT, CALIFORNIA — Unity Church Worldwide in Palm Desert, California, received considerable recognition and positive publicity recently during the 1976 Bob Hope Desert Classic. Catherine Ponder, minister of Unity Church Worldwide, reports that the publicity was obtained as a result of their participation as Sponsors for the Classic, which is the largest charity event in the California Desert area. The classic raises about a half million dollars annually for the Eisenhower Hospital in Palm Desert as well as contributes to other charities.

PERSON TO PERSON



with bob sikking

I don't know whether I'm about to articulate any great discovery of Truth, but I observe in our Movement that we draw a series of similar experiences to us. Almost invaribly when someone in our Movement, a minister or a teacher, makes his or her transition, there are others who pass too. Then we go long periods of time and no one from among our ranks seems to move on. I've noticed that, though our percentage of broken marriages and divorces is below the national average, such incidences come also in spurts. When there is one such experience, it generally is followed by several others. Then there are again long periods of time in which there is not this kind of experience among us.

I've noticed that in a similar way, we can go long periods of time when there is little in the way of ministers dropping out of their ministries because of internal difficulties and then, all at once, we will appear to have a series of these. Often, there are those of us who indicate a curiosity as to whether, collectively, there is anything that we can do about this phenomenon in our Movement.

There is something that we can do. There is something that we should be doing every day of every week of our involvement and participation in Unity. Our ministries are made up of opportunities to do prayer work for individuals who are passing through the experience that we call death and for the members of their family. Our ministry of service regularly affords us the opportunity to enfold those who are making the adjustment in their personal lives that may include separation or divorce. We have no difficulty whatsoever in being able to respond to this kind of challenge in the lives of those whom we are privileged to serve. All of us can relate demonstrations of the blessings of answered prayer that have resulted in the lives of those drawn to us in this way.

When we become aware of a colleague in our Movement who is meeting the kind of challenges that might cause him or her to temporarily or finally abdicate his responsibilities in the ministry, we are, in reality and in Truth, being called upon

to do our prayer work. It is not, at that point, our responsibility to, in any way, be judgmental any more than we would do so upon the occasion of the passing of a member of our congregation. We have a responsibility in consciousness to embrace, to support, to lovingly understand one another.

There is a fluidity on the professional level in a ministry such as ours which makes possible the opening of doors that can and will permit the activity of Spirit to work though us in ways of which we have never conceived. Every issue of CONTACT brings to you the bare facts of changing circumstances within our Movement. How do you respond to those facts? Do you accept the opportunity to take upon yourself the responsibility for prayer work that can heal and strengthen and bless?

Our Movement, our ministries within the Movement, and all of us as individuals are not self-existent. We are the outpicturing, the manifestation of individual and collective consciousness. Each one of us has contact with the self-existent mind of God that can make possible the accomplishment of goals that we are only just barely becoming aware of. It's going to be exciting to see what our unity will accomplish through our Unity!

TheReligious PublicRelations Revolution of '76


"Public Relations II," a Post Graduate Course on public relations will be presented by William B. Dale, Public Relations Director, on Saturday, July 10, at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

This course has been scheduled in order to respond to the many requests from AUC members needing additional Post Graduate credits for teaching extension classes for credit in U.I.C.E.

In keeping with the ideas and concepts being expressed during our nation's Bicentennial, the course is structured to motivate individual ministries to initiate and conduct their own public relations revolution. The course is designed to provide materials, resources, and programs to help ministries improve their public relations at the congregational level.

A film strip recently produced by the Religious Public Relations Council, Inc. (RPRC), will be shown during the course. Entitled, "The Church at Jackrabbit Junction," this 65-frame sound, color filmstrip exposes leaders of congregations to some basics of religious public relationsand motivates them to act. A humorous allegory, it tells the story of a church on the 19th century western frontier.





Each person attending the Post Graduate Course will receive a copy of the Religious Public Relations Handbook just released by the RPRC. This 64-page illustrated manual contains 13 chapters by au-

thorities in their fields. It offers ideas and how-to-do-it information in news, broadcasting, advertising, direct mail, printing, audio-visuals, displays, photography, media selection, community relations, parish publications, and organizing for PR.

A list of printed materials and audiovisual resources has been compiled and will also be distributed.



Connie Fillmore McCarty, great-granddaughter of Charles and Myrtle Fillmore, is a lifetime member of Unity Village Chapel. She was graduated cum laude by Pomona College in Claremont, California, where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology. She joined the staff of Unity School's Editorial Department in 1971 as copy editor for <u>UNITY Magazine</u>, and continues to serve in this capacity as a student minister. Her husband, **Gary**, is on the executive staff of Unity School.

Brendan O'Keefe is from Michigan and attended Detroit Unity Temple. He is a graduate of the Pallottine College in Thurles, Tipperary, Ireland, where he received a Bachelor of Divinity degree in Theology. Ordained to the priesthood in 1967, Brendan served both Catholic and Orthodox Parishes in the United States and Canada. Prior to his decision to enter the Unity ministry, he served as Director of Youth Activities for the Catholic Archdiocese of Galilee in Haifa, Israel. Brendan is single.

Barry Knowles is a native of the state of Washington. She has been active in Truth for over 20 years and served Unity Church of Christianity in Seattle (Burien) as soloist and platform chairperson. She is a graduate of Seattle Pacific College, where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology and a Teaching Certificate. Prior to entering the ministry Barry was a public school teacher in the state of Washington, serving in the Headstart Program.

SMRS SINGING GROUP

The Unity Village Singers is a group of SMRS students who share their musical talents in various programs at Unity Village and area Unity ministries. This multi-talented singing group presents a harmonious blend of inspirational music and show tunes. Organized last September by second-year student **Shirley Byrns**, the Unity Village Singers made their debut by participating in an evening of musical entertainment at the Liebe Freunde Retreat last November. Since then they have provided the music for the Annual SMRS Christmas Program; performed at a dinner honoring the visiting ministers who were at Unity Village for the Mid-Year Council of Committees meetings in January; and have sung at area ministries.

The group has an international flavor in that its members come from three foreign countries and nine different states across America. The director of the group, Shirley Byrns, came to Unity Village from Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, and had a varied and successful musical career before entering the ministry. Shirley, as a ballet dancer, toured both the United States and Canada with the National Ballet Company of Canada. As a soloist, Shirley has sung at many different night clubs, working with such celebrities as Ed Ames and Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong. She had the honor of singing and dancing for the late President John F. Kennedy at statehood ceremonies in Anchorage, Alaska, and performed at the Hawijan statehood celebration in Honolulu. She also has been a member of the "Sweet Adelines" and once owned a school of dance for the ballet. Presently, besides directing the Unity Village Singers, Shirley is the soloist at Unity Northeast Church in Kansas City, Missouri.

Accompanying the group are Bill Provost on piano and Glenn Robinson on drums. Bill is the husband of Barbara Provost, a lirst-year ministerial student. Bill has had a successful musical career as a composer and a Supper Club entertainer. His credits include serving as Musical Director for Orson Wells in Hollywood. In New York, Bill wrote and played for summer stock, composed for Victor Records, and played at various clubs including The

Blue Angel. He has also played in supper clubs and hotels in Hollywood, Palm Springs, Miami Beach, Key West, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, and spent nine years playing and composing in the Virgin Islands. He wrote and produced, with Dan Eckley of the St. Louis Municipal Opera, a musical based on Rumpelstiltskin. Much of the inspirational music sung by The Unity Village Singers is composed by Bill.

Glenn Robinson studied and received his degree in music at the Cincinnati Conservatory for Music. It's the year he and his wife, Marguerite, realized a dream come true and moved to Unity Village (then known as Unity Farm). For three years, Clyde and Marguerite had visited the Farm and often exclaimed over the natural beauty so lavishly displayed, and discussed between themselves what a wonderful place it would be to live.

Clyde's assignment was to work in the orchards and vineyards, and included activities in production, harvesting, processing, storing, and marketing the products grown on the Farm.

Clyde and Marguerite have two children: a son, Roy Arlan, and a daughter, Elinor Ann. They also have three grandchildren. Clyde was a member of Dr. Carl Frangkiser's Unity Concert Band for twenty-four years, and Marguerite is currently serving as one of the organists for Unity Village Chapel.

A vital and industrious man, Clyde leads a busy life. He feels strongly about the community in which he lives. He says, "It's a part of my life and I'm a part of the community life." Clyde serves in the community in many capacities. He is an advisory member to the Unity Village Board of Trustees; a member of the Advisory Committee of the Lee's Summit School District; a member and past president of Justus Credit Union; a member of the University of Missouri Jackson County Extension Council, the Missouri State Horticultural Society, Jackson County Fruit Growers' Association, Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, and the University of Missouri Jackson County Bicentennial Committee.

But the orchards are Clyde's first love. It's a busy job, a demanding position, and a tremendously rewarding and fulfilling joy. The business of operating the orchards and vineyard requires careful planning, good equipment, and many workers-expecially at harvest time. Peaches begin to ripen the first week in July and continue into mid-September, and then it's applegathering time.

Unity orchards produce more than fifteen varieties of peaches and seven varities of apples. Bee colonies produce large quantities of honey, and do double duty by pollinating the trees when they bloom in the spring. "There's no place like the orchards in the spring," says Clyde with a smile. "The delicate fragrance and rainbow-hued flowers, the hum of bees busily at work, and the melodious bird songs bring us to joyous recognition of God's presence. I wish everyone could see and feel this beauty!"

Also produced under Clyde's supervision are hundreds of jars of apple and peach butter and various jellies. These delicacies are made available in the Tower for sale to visitors.

Clyde and Marguerite Corn are a vital and meaningful part of Unity Village, and Clyde expresses deep feeling when he talks about his joy at being a member of the family of Unity workers. He looks forward to conference times each year and talking with the attending ministers, many of whom he knew when they were here as students.

When Clyde looks at you and says how great it is to see the Unity Movement expand to help mankind in so many ways, and to be able to enjoy the good God has in store, you know you've met a man who has found his place in life.

Perhaps nowhere in the world has the Unity Movement shown more steady growth than in Nigeria. It never fails to amaze me when I think of how Unity was first started in the home of Charles and Myrtle Fillmore and then to realize that now in this rather remote country on the west coast of Africa there are so many thousands of people whose lives were literally changed by the exciting message of the Fillmores.

Nigeria, as you know, had recently been ravaged by civil war. In fact, there had been many Unity followers on both sides of the war, and many of the people of the Ibo tribe who lived in (continued on page 10)

that part of Nigeria that was known at the time as Biafra were Unity people. Newspaper reports everywhere told of the incredible suffering to which these fine Ibo people were subjected. But the was is over now and the rapid reconstruction of the country has been most dramatic in every way.

Our Unity leader in Nigeria for many years was Awa Njoku, an ordained Unity minister. He was a great man who was loved and revered by everyone. He was known in his country as Njoku The Good. Njoku unfortunately fell victim to the war and the leadership of the Unity Movement Nigeria passed for a time to another minister, Samuel Uba Oti. Both Njoku and Uba Oti were trained at Unity School and much of the growth of the work in Nigeria can be directly attributed to their inspired leadership.

Recently J.U. Eke has been elected President of the Unity Movement Nigeria. President Eke has been a Unity leader for many, many years and he well deserves the distinction of being elected president for everyone recognizes in him great spiritual strength, integrity, sincerity, and dedication to Truth and Unity. Under his fine leadership we feel the Unity Movement Nigeria is poised and ready for an exciting new thrust.

The Unity headquarters at Uzuakoli was severely damaged during the civil war. President Eke writes that the Unity Movement Nigeria is now embarking on a project for the reconstruction of the headquarters. The new headquarters is scheduled to cost sixty thousand Naira (\$64,800.00 American dollars) and that at the Annual General Conference held on October 25 a total of 2,293.80 Naira was realized on the spot. President Eke says that the students of the Unity Movement Nigeria are showing great interest in this project.

During the October conference it was unanimously resolved that the first Sunday of every January would be observed and celebrated as Njoku's Day. It is to be a National Day for the Unity Movement Nigeria. It will be observed in remembrance of the great work of the late Awa Njoku, Founder and life President of the Unity Movement Nigeria.

I know that you will enjoy the photograph of President Eke and the ministers and teachers gathered for the General Conference held last October at Uzuakoli. I know too that you will want to join us in sending our love and blessings to our friends and coworkers in the Unity Movement Nigeria and that you will want to remember them in your prayers each year on Njoku's Day, the first Sunday in January.

SPIRIT OF '76 by Suzanne Cameron

The UNITY CELEBRATION — 1976 program theme, "Treedom With Love," might have originally been coined by William-Penn, the very founder of the city of Philadelphia in the seventeenth century! For this was the "Holy Experiment" he sought to attempt here in America, offering his prospective colonists religious and personal freedom and asylum from oppression—a New World. We might take these freedoms for granted today, but they were indeed innovations at that time, and no wonder men of genius and imagination responded to this general climate in Philadelphia.

One such man was Benjamin Franklin. Within walking distance of our Celebration site, at Independence Historical Park, is **Franklin Court**, a representation of Franklin's own home amid five houses owned and designed by him. It was here that he lived before being sent to France to help gain support for the American Independence cause. An underground museum and auditorium featuring a lively multi-media display on Franklin's life and personality are open for viewing, as well as a post office and printing press.

Two blocks from Franklin Court is the site of one of America's most revered and historic shrines, **Christ Church**. Built between 1727 and 1754, Washington, Jefferson, Franklin, and Betsy Ross all worshipped here, and several Signers of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution are buried in the churchyard and the cemetery. It is possible to sit in the very pews where Washington and Franklin sat, and indeed to "worship in Spirit and in Truth" through history and through our own increased awareness of that potential of greatness in us through freedom! The font where William Penn was baptized, the chandelier brought from England in 1744, and the "wineglass" pulpit, made in Philadelphia in 1770, are still in use, and there are other important features you will not want to miss.

While following the Freedom Trail, you might like to stop for refreshment along the way at City Tavern. This "most genteel tavern in America," as it was called by its famous Revolutionary War patrons, quickly became the social center of Philadelphia after its construction in 1773. The colonists gathered here to dine and drink, discuss business and politics. The Continental and Federal Congresses held receptions here, and you, too, may now partake in an authentic eighteenth century meal as City Tavern has been rebuilt for Bicentennial America.

Philadelphia was a handsome, sophisticated city in the late 1700's as the capital of the United States, and modern Philadelphia remains equally as exciting. There is something here for everyone to see and do, and nowhere does there exist a better place to get that "overview" of the city than from atop Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company's Observation Deck and Visitor Center. Costing \$2.5 million and located directly across from Independence Hall, not only does it command an impressive view of the city's famous historic area, but "on a clear day you can see forever," and on a cloudy one, almost that far! Visitors are taken on a journey into past and present Philadelphia through a combination of two theatre shows and special walk-through exhibits. (You will be able to check on the fees, if any, upon arrival.)

We will be talking more about the sights of "Freedom City," modern Philadelphia, and how best to see it, in future articles. For now, Franklin Court — Christ Church — Old City Tavern — Penn Mutual's Tower — all excellent reasons to come to Philadelphia in July and recapture the "Spirit of '76"!
