
#### **AUC PRESIDENT'S LETTER**

IRVING, TEXAS - Following three years of active participation in the Dallas Chapter of Parents Without Partners (PWP), Marie Paben, minister of Unity of Irving, Texas, has been elected viceesident in charge of research and education. An installation dinner dance was held on March 13 in Dallas, Marie's activities in the PWP have included conducting orientation classes once a month, holding regular meetings with teenagers, and taking charge of a counseling group. There are some 1,600 members in the PWP organization, which is but one of Marie's outreach activities. SPOKANE, WASHINGTON — In March, 470 adults and children from Unity of Spokane attended three private showings of the classic film: Jonathan Livingston Seagull. A local alternative theater made their facilities available without charge to the ministry. The film was presented on a love offering basis and after paying for the film and projectionist (\$100) the ministry's general funds were blessed with \$364.

David McClure, minister of Unity of Spokane, stated "The Spokane Men of Unity have also been viewing a series of films at their monthly meetings. Created by ROA Films, 1696 N. Astor Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53202 (free catalog available on request), these visual experiences are personal, provocative and keyed to contemporary life. For instance, pride and principle -- motivations and consequences was covered by 'The Bridge on the River Kwai' with Alec Guiness. The individual's search for meaningful human relationships and love was the theme of 'Five Easy Pieces' with Jack Nicholson. And attitudes toward hunting and killing for pleasure was discussed after viewing 'Bless the Beasts and Children.' Each film is approximately 15 minutes and the rental is \$25.00 each."

Unity of Spokane recently hosted a sub-regional Biofeedback Training Seminar presented by Hal Rosencrans, minister of Unity of the Palm Beaches, West Palm Beach, Florida. Seventeen Unity ministers and Board members attended the seminar which provided 18 hours of intensive training in theory and practice on a wide variety of biofeedback equipment. David reports, "As a result of this outstanding seminar each individual who attended was given a basic foundation in this new area so that they could determine whether or not biofeedback would become part of their church program."

DETROIT, MICHIGAN – Unity of the Infinite Presence, our Detroit ministry served by Jack Boland, is receiving

tremendous positive response from their promotional activities utilizing the Daily Word. In cooperation with Unity School, the ministry is purchasing at a special promotional price quantities of current issues of Daily Word, ranging in number from 500 per month to 1,000. The ministry offers a free copy of the magazine as an outreach activity of their Dial-A-Thought recorded telephone messages. Jack reports a considerable increase in the number of persons calling the recorded mesage number and feels that the promotional project has also greatly benefited attendance and support at the ministry's classes and worship services. Jack also stated, "We have received extensive newspaper coverage regarding our recorded message. Also, a member of the Mayor's Office staff called and asked us for 20 copies of the Daily Word. The person calling said they used the 'Dial-A-Thought' every day as a part of their office procedure."

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

The following Unity ministers serve on the AUC Board of Regents: Ernest C. Wilson, Chairperson; Hal Rosencrans; Sue Sikking; Robert Stevens; and Grover Thornsberry. The following report was submitted by our Board of Regents:

"We, the Board of Regents, appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Association of Unity Churches, met April 26 and 27, 1976, to evaluate the conferring of the degree of Doctor of Divinity on certain members of our Movement. As we deliberated over the recommendations and applications, we felt a deep sense of appreciation for the privilege we shared in seeing many of our fellow ministers in a way that had not always been apparent before. We were deeply moved to read of the variety of ways in which our members have acted from their own inner guidance to prepare themselves and to give of themselves in ways that strengthen them, their ministry and the movement of which we are all a part. It gave us a real sense of our Unity of Spirit to share in the constructive achievements and experiences of so many of our member ministers. Whether we rejoiced in the pleasure of saying 'yea' or reluctantly and carefully fulfilled our duty by saying 'nay', it was with a deep sense of appreciation to the candidate.

"Because we are convinced more deeply than ever of the value of such a program, we are motivated to share some of our thoughts with you so that the whole program will have a deeper meaning and serve a greater purpose.

"1. We would recommend that you read again the proposal presented by Charles Neal at the last Conference. If you have not read the proposal it is available through the Association of Unity Churches office. It was approved by a clear cut two-thirds vote.

"2. The Doctoral Degree is conferred in many fields to indicate that the recipient is highly skilled in his particular area of service. Lately this practice has been broadened so that individuals may earn the title through fields of service rather than in an academic setting only. There is nothing in our Unity tradition, as we see it, that would preclude this recognition of excellence in our Movement. Jesus was referred to as 'Rabbi' by some

of his closest followers . . . a degree not easily earned in his day or in ours. Charles and Myrtle Fillmore accepted and conferred ordination as it became apparent that this would communicate in the best possible way that the teachers of Unity had earned and fulfilled a certain position of service.

"3. The Doctor of Divinity degree is by tradition an honorary degree. It is not meant to imply academic excellence only but proclaims that the individual has been honored by his organization as one who has earned respect and appreciation for excellence demonstrated and service rendered. Not by the book but by the deed is he measured. By the criteria with which we evaluated our candidates it was plain to see that a Ph.D. might well be more easily earned in terms of time and effort. We need not be self-conscious about the 'value' or 'meaning' of the Doctorate degree conferred by the Association of Unity Churches!

"4. It became clear to us as we went over the criteria again and again with each candidate's record before us, that these areas of preparation and service would not only measure our fellows' excellence but also serve as guidelines and goals for those who aspire to grow in 'wisdom and in stature', (Luke 2:52), through service, Certainly, the criteria will be improved upon as time goes on, (we are even now in the process of seeking approval for certain clarifications and improvements), but as they exist now the criteria do a good job of pointing the way to the one who would contribute to his ministry and to the Unity Movement.

"5. The degree of Doctor of Divinity clearly indicates that the recipient is not a doctor who recognizes what is wrong—(wrong with the body or the thought and emotions of the person), but one whose excellence is directed toward recognizing what is right in man—his Divinity.

"We dealt with thirty-eight (38) applications of which twenty-two (22) were approved to receive the Doctorate degree at this time. These will be conferred Friday, July 16, during the Celebration.

"We are making recommendations to the Board of Trustees for clarifying and improving the criteria. If you have any suggestions, we would appreciate receiving them."

### SPIRIT OF '76 ..... by Suzanne Cameron

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary or a people to have an enlightened, enjoyable spiritual and historical experience, then, by all means, a people should attend Unity Celebration — 1976 in Philadelphia this July! And after becoming uplifted and inspired by the talks of some of Unity's most dynamic speakers during the Celebration's morning sessions, you will be ready and eager to carry forth this feeling of increased awareness into the city of Philadelphia. Upon exploring the city you will discover then what an important part it has played and does still play in the national consciousness. "To Freedom With Love," our own Bicentennial theme, has become the Truth theme here for people from all over the world.

Two attractions midway between our Celebration hotels which capture the essence of the city are City Hall and the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. City Hall is really Philadelphia's centerpiece and it may remind you of some of the ornate buildings you could see on a visit to Europe. Alexander Calder, grandfather of the famous modern mobile maker, executed hundreds of pieces of sculpture and bas relief for the exterior and interior of the building, including the famed statue of William Penn atop the edifice. There is an unwritten law in Philadelphia that no building can exceed the top of Billy Penn's hat, and that is indeed the case. An elevator will take you right to his feet for an excellent view of the city. A masterpiece of Victorian architecture, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts is immensely important to the history of American art. Founded in 1805 by painter Charles Willson Peale, it housed the first museum in America and a school that turned out such luminaries as Mary Cassatt, Thomas Eakins, John Marin and John Sloan. A Bicentennial exhibit featuring these American artists and many others will be on display.

The reasons that made Philadelphia an attractive location to William Penn in 1689 still apply, and the easiest way for you to understand those reasons is to hop on the city's Cultural Loop Bus. The rest of this article will be devoted to this magnificent tour. Philadelphia is filled with treasures and pleasures, and the bus will take you to almost everything worth seeing, from the historical area around Independence Mall to the city's more current attractions along the Benjamin Franklin Parkway. The Cultural Loop Bus is inexpensive. A \$1.00 ticket acquired as you board is good for unlimited on-and-offs all day. The ticket also gives you discounts to most stops along the way, so that by the end of the day, the ticket has paid for itself in reduced admission fees. Best of all, the bus is easy to find as it can be boarded every block and a half along its route. And what a treat for tired feet! The bus stops are painted red, white, and blue, and the bus runs every 20 minutes from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. every day. For those of you staying at the Sheraton or Holiday Inn Penn Center hotels, you can board the bus just a block or two away at the city's Tourist Center, 1525 John F. Kennedy Blvd. If you're staying at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel, hop on at Chestnut St., practically in front of the hotel.

All aboard! You're heading up the Ben Franklin Parkway, often called the Champs Elysees of Philadelphia. One of the stops, the Free Library of Philadelphia was actually modeled after buildings at the Place de la Concorde in Paris. The Library is one of the largest in the world, containing more than one million books, films and other items. Prizes of the collection include some of Edgar

Allen Poe's manuscripts and Charles Dicken's desk. Next stop is the Franklin Institute, featuring a multi-media salute to the multitalents of Ben Franklin, "The Man Who Chased the Whirlwinds." Other Bicentennial offerings here include "Mirrors of America," which traces art, music, and historical artifacts over 200 years of technological growth in America; "Whales," with art, photographs, models, and even whale music; and "Futures," a look at where America will be 200 years from now, with walk-in environments and computer games. The Institute also houses the Fels Planetarium, and one block away stands The Academy of Natural Sciences.

The Cultural Loop is well-named as the bus moves on to the Rodin Museum, a small French Renaissance gem housing the second largest collection of his sculptures and drawings, and then on to the mammoth Philadelphia Museum of Art. This museum's Bicentennial exhibit, "Philadelphia: Three Centuries of American Art," takes up an entire wing, and houses a survey of paintings, furniture, costumes, photos, textiles, sculpture, silver, and porcelain. In other wings you can see a Gothic Chapel, a Spanish Cloister, a Buddhist Temple, and famous works from medieval times to Picasso. And now, good news for those empty stomachs! The Museum cafeteria and restaurant serve some of the best food in Philadelphia, and would provide a good rest stop.

Back on board, the bus crosses the Schuykill River, with views of scullers and lovely Victorian boathouses and rowing clubs.

The Philadelphia Zoological Gardens is on the way, and if time is becoming limited, head straight for the Hummingbird House, which is a veritable paradise of lush tropical plants, waterfalls, and bright-hued birds.

Concluding your tour, you arrive at Fairmount Park, the largest municipal park in the world (8,000 acres) and site of the nation's Centennial Exposition and World's Fair in 1876. On hand were President Ulysses S. Grant and Dom Pedro, the Emperor of Brazil, to preside over some 10 million visitors. Two of those 200 buildings remain, as well as many beautiful examples of 18th and 19th century mansions built as summer homes for Philadelphia's "aristocracy." Several are open for viewing and are well worth seeing. Tennis courts, golf courses, and bicycle trails, as well as an operating authentic Japanese Tea House, and countless statuary and sculptures fill the Park. Hop back on the bus and loop your way back to headquarters. The Cultural Loop Bus Tour — a very fine way to see Bicentennial Philadelphia and recapture the Spirit of '76.

And so . . . "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men . . . are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness." Indeed, nothing is quite so powerful as an idea whose time has come.

### NEW YOUTH EDUCATION MATERIALS

Lani Jones, Curriculum Coordinator for Youth Education, has shared the following report:

"The Image for Living curriculum has been rewritten to meet the needs consistently shared by you. The material has been simplified and reorganized to present background information for the teacher and suggestions for lesson presentation in a clear, practical format.

"Every new Image for Living lesson is part of a unified Bible study plan for Nursery through Junior High age students. Each quarter is based on a Bible Study Theme geared to the developmental needs of the children at each age level. Each lesson within the quarter focuses on some aspect, story, or event within that overall theme.

"A Life Application of the Bible lesson is suggested each week to make the

lessons attitude and action oriented. The new lessons result in a more unified program of spiritual education.

"The entire 12-year Bible Study Overview provides for literal, historical, and metaphysical consideration of the Bible.

"Student Take-Home Lessons will be provided each week with the new material. The Take-Home Lesson includes stories, activities, projects, and a Bible lesson designed to stimulate individual follow-through and application during the week.

"The stories and activities in the Take-Home Lesson are designed for use by the teacher in class presentation, to simplify collection and preparation of lesson materials.

"A Teacher's Guide has been prepared to assist the Teacher to develop meaningful classroom activities from the Take-Home Lesson, and thus avoid the pitfalls of having students simply read their Take-Home Lesson in class."

"I have received enough loving, blessing letters of rejection of articles that I have submitted to Unity publications to paper a wall." How many times have you heard Unity ministers make a statement similar to that? It's probably true that twenty-five or thirty years ago I contributed several articles for publication to the Unity periodicals only to have them returned with a loving blessing from the editors. If the truth were known, my letters of rejection probably wouldn't go up one side of the doorway let alone paper a whole wall. It only takes but a few rejections to do sufficient damage to one's ego, to cause him no longer to submit material. In the early days, my ego was pretty sensitive and except for perhaps a half dozen articles accepted for publication in Weekly Unity over the years, I have made no real effort to "get published." That's unfortunate because I really do believe that I have something to say. I have always hesitated to submit material that was the product of Sunday lessons gather together under one general title, and so I've used the excuse of being too busy with other demands upon my time to sit down and write a book.

In our Movement, we're moving into an area of expansion and growth that will require the assistance of many more "published people" than we now have. A person with one or more books in print can be a very valuable asset to an expansion program because by virtue of his or her having been published, more people are likely to attend special lectures involved in the expansion of new ministries. That's not reason enough for you to give serious thought to writing a book because I know that as a minister, you have more demands upon your time than you can now meet. Far more important than your capacity to draw greater crowds at a special meeting, I believe that in our Movement there are those of you who really have something to say and it ought to be said. Most of us do a pretty creditable job of speaking the Truth, but our audience is limited to those who can be seated in our sanctuary or those relatively few others who have access to our message through tapes. There is an untouched resource for most of us of eager, hungry souls who are ready to read the Truth that our inspiration would share.

As you know, my job requires that I

travel a good deal. In the process of those travels, I spend a staggering amount of time on airplanes, in airport lounges and gate areas, and in motel rooms after my work is done. I decided last October to quit spending that time on working crossword puzzles and watching the race of man go by. I took a pad of paper with me and by Christmas, I had completed a manuscript for a book. I started with a very simple idea as the theme and it runs all the way through. The manuscript has been accepted for publication by Unity School and will soon be available. To say I'm thrilled is a masterpiece of understatement and I sincerely hope and pray that it will be a source of inspiration to those who read it. I really believe that there are many of you in our field who could produce some outstanding inspirational and textbook material for our Movement. I know for a fact that our Editorial Department is eager to have the opportunity to consider any manuscripts for publication.

I'd like to encourage you to establish an additional pattern of discipline that could produce, in printed form, the inspiration that is uniquely yours. Our Movement has need of the light that can shine as you. I know that **Jim Decker** and all of the members of the Editorial Staff of Unity School will be open and receptive to what you have to offer.

Most important item in the development of the Expansion Program is the activities at Unity Church of Chicago. This ministry is now meeting regularly each Sunday at the Ambassador West Hotel in Chicago's near North Side. Recent activities have featured Dr. Marcus Bach, who spoke there on the subject of, "Will The Real You Please Stand." Additionally, this North Side Chicago ministry has formed a new prayer group using as key members those individuals who have been involved in Unity for long periods of time . . . among them are Barbara McCullough, who has taken extensive training in the UICE courses at Unity Village. Future plans include bi-monthly Saturday seminars and workshops featuring Unity's most important principles and concepts.

Another area of development in the Chicago area is Unity West. This group is currently meeting at the Oak Brook Terrace Holiday Inn, which is located in the western suburbs of Chicago. This group has begun its studies with a meditation workshop and a follow-on series of classes on meditation. Individuals from key communities surrounding the Oak Brook area are helping to start this particular group and hopefully build it into a full-time Unity ministry.

The Crystal Lake Study Group has completed its first phase of classes and is now studying Eric Butterworth's Discover the Power Within You. The course taught for credit has been attended by approximately 40 persons. The Crystal Lake group continues to be a surprise to all as it has simply grown out of the interest of a few and has now over 80 families involved in one way or another.

Recently I visited Unity Church of Philadelphia at the request of Bill Cameron to provide some guidance to two study groups that have begun in areas near there and have hopes of someday becoming full-time Unity ministries. These ministries in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, and Haddonfield, New Jersey, have been meeting under Bill's direction now for some time. Representatives of the Bryn Mawr group

were especially enthusiastic about their activities and are looking forward to creating the consciousness and the environment for the growth of a full-tim Unity group there.

During this same trip I had the opportunity to talk with Eric Butterworth about development of Unity ministries in large metropolitan areas. Based upon his work we hope to improve our service to Chicago metropolitan area Unity students.



### OVERSEAS REPORT by Foster C. McClellan

The Unity Movement in England has been firmly established over a long period of time. It's always been blessed with very able leaders who are well known to Unity ministers. People like Robert P. Sikking, Executive Director of the Association of Unity Churches; David Davenport, who is presently minister of Unity of Fairfax; Douglas Morton, who recently retired as Director of Unity of Great Britain; and Ruth Hacking. Ruth Hacking was a very gracious English lady who started the work. She had been living in retirement for over the past 10 years prior to her transition early last year. These wonderful people have all contributed greatly to the success of the Movement in England. Norman Slade, the present Associate Director and his lovely wife Marjorie, have been carrying on as leaders since the retirement of Douglas Morton.



Unity House in Bourne End Buckinghamshire, England

At the present time the headquarters of the Unity Movement of Great Britain is located at Unity House in Bourne End, Buckinghamshire. Bourne End is a lovely little town in the Thames Valley 30 miles east of London near Windsor. Unity House is a delightful old mansion that was once the residence of Edgar Wallace, the mystery writer. From Unity House each month 7,000 <u>Daily Words</u> are distributed and a Silent Unity Healing-Prayer Ministry is conducted. Weekend retreats which are called Renewals and classes and regular

weekly meetings are also held. In addition, they maintain a close liaison with Unity groups called Fellowships scattered throughout the country.

England is always such a beautiful country to visit and Unity House is ideally situated close to many places of historical interest such as Windsor Castle, Runnymeade, Ascot Downs, Hampton Court, and Marlborough Castle, where Churchill was born. There is always a warm welcome for Unity people at Unity House. Unity ministers planning a trip abroad are encouraged to contact Norman Slade (Unity House, Blind Lane, Bourne End, Bucks) to see if their visit would coincide with a weekend Renewal. If not, the Fellowships are always eager to have ministers from the United States give a talk or just drop in for a visit. In the past few years several Unity ministers have joined our good friends in England and this is always greatly appreciated by everyone.

### WHO'S WHO AT UNITY SCHOOL

People who visit Unity School of Christianity find themselves drawn, at one time or another, to one of its busiest departments-the Unity Inn. "We specialize in good home-cooked food," says Lou McGough, manager of the Inn.

Lou has been with Unity Inn for thirteen years, and has served as manager since 1967. She and her husband, **Thomas**, formerly lived in Lee's Summit but moved to Unity Village in April. They have one daughter, **Patty**, and a granddaughter, **Kim**.

Managing the Inn is no small task. Approximately 500 employees work at Unity School, and it is primarily for them--and for those ministers, teachers, and lay persons who temporarily reside at Unity Village while attending conferences, retreats, or seminars--that the Inn was established many years ago. The original Unity Inn was located at 9th and Tracy Streets, in Kansas City, Missouri.

The Inn is operated cafeteria style, and according to Lou, an average of 850-900 meals are served each day. During an average Sunday, between 11:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., the Inn will serve approximately 1,200 people! This speaks tremendously for the efficiency of the Inn facilities and staff.

Lou attributes much of the efficiency and success of the Inn to her excellent staff. "Everyone does his or her share of the work in a spirit of team effort," she remarked. Presently the Inn operates with a staff of 42 people, with 15-20 working full time. Extra people are called to work during special events.

Lou is a vital and dynamic woman whose enthusiasm and dedication are immediately obvious as you watch her work or talk to her. Her job involves planning, organizing, and coordinating the many functions of the Inn. Everything is prepared from "scratch," with the exception of a few frozen entrees. Basically, the Inn uses frozen vegetables because with such a small staff they cannot devote the time required to prepare fresh produce. However, certain

vegetables are produced in the fields of Unity Village, such as sweet corn and tomatoes, which the Inn uses in season.

The pies served in the Inn, whether apple, lemon, or the famous peanut butter, are prepared in small quantities to maintain the "homemade" flavor. Lou feels that by greatly increasing the proportions of a recipe, quality and flavor are weakened.

Service clubs in the Lee's Summit area regularly use the Inn facilities. Lou and her staff prepare weekly meals for the Optimist, Rotary, Kiwanis, and Lions Clubs. Dinners are served for the American Business Women's Association and breakfasts for the department heads of the city of Lee's Summit. The Inn accomodates the Lee's Summit Chamber of Commerce frequently, and is also available to prepare rehearsal dinners for weddings on an appointment basis.

AUC expresses love and appreciation to Lou and the Inn staff for the wonderful job each performs, and for all the wonderful meals prepared at the Unity Inn.
