

AUC PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friend,

As a result of our Association of Unity Churches 1976 Conference in Philadelphia, decisions were made by the Conference Body to create new committees to examine objectively the duties, responsibilities and activities of the regional representatives, executive committee, executive director and executive office. Such objectivity will undoubtedly provide us with insight that will enable us to function more orderly, efficiently and harmoniously, all of which is essential if we are to meet the need of the times and move with the progressive movement of Spirit.

In view of all this taking place, it seems not only appropriate, but mandatory that we, as individual ministers and teachers, do some self-examination and self-evaluation. Just as world peace is dependent upon peace beginning in the individual, so does progress as a movement begin with progress within each of its spokesmen.

Since my first exposure to Unity in October of 1963, there has been a question in my mind that I have been unable to resolve. Since I know that you are interested in the growth in effectiveness of Unity, and the Unity teaching, I would like to share this with you and have you do some thinking along with me.

With the dynamic, life-changing message of Unity, why have we not spread throughout the world? If the message of Truth as taught by Unity is helpful as I believe it to be, why do we not have thousands of churches instead of less

than 300? We especially need to consider this since we are an association of churches, serving to minister to the needs of people in a very unique way.

Personally, I do not agree with the usual excuses. We have claimed that "people are not ready". I don't believe it. I believe that it is we who are not ready to fulfill their needs. Another thought indicates that "it was not the original intent of Unity to build or promote churches". So what? Do we not claim to be a progressive movement? I have a deep respect and admiration for that undaunted, dynamic Spirit that expressed through Charles Fillmore but I cannot permit myself the luxury of limiting my perception for today and its needs by his perception for his day. The two are not the same. Charles Fillmore was a minister, and he ministered through a church. The movement of Spirit through Unity will continue to blossom and expand only if we are willing and able to respond to it and move with it.

Through observation, through active involvement on the Board of Trustees of the Association of Unity Churches, and by listening to comments of non-Unity as well as Unity people, I have come to the conclusion that we must do some self-examination if we are to fulfill our potentialities for service to humanity. Our purpose is great; we must become great in order to respond to it.

One criticism that has been directed toward us is that we refuse to be objective. There is a tendency to avoid dealing with situations directly. We become side-tracked in sentimentality, confusing it with spirituality. It is doubtful that any one of us would attempt to wax our floors without first disposing of the existing dirt. Unless we are willing to face existant facts and deal with them through guidance of Spirit, we are not likely to make any permanent growth.

Next month, I will share with you what I believe are some present deterent to the advancement of Unity through the medium of its churches. You are encouraged to give prayerful thought to this matter, and to share your thoughts with me.

An old-fashioned July 4th pot-luck picnic attended by 350 adults and children was held in nearby Comstock Park at 1:00 p.m. Horseshoes, tug-of-war, relay races, sack races, egg throwing, and penny scrambles were of the many delightful games played.

THE INSTITUTO UNITY IN SANTURCE, PUERTO RICO

In 1972, the Association of Unity Churches took an important step to meet the spiritual needs of Spanish-speaking Unity students, and to meet the need for Spanish-speaking leadership in the Movement. This was the establishment of the Instituto Unity De Cristianismo Practico, incorporated in Puerto Rico, and headquartered in Santurce.


The Instituto was established to spread Truth among Spanish-speaking Unity students in the United States, the West Indies, Spain, Mexico, Central and South America. All classes are conducted in Spanish by ministers and teachers who have completed their training and academic requirements at Unity School in English. During the first two-week session in June 1972 there were 90 students enrolled. Five courses were taught and five teachers were used and at the fifth session which ended in July there was an attendance of 125 students and 21 courses were offered by 11 teachers. Up to the present they have held one two-week session each summer, thus requiring six yearly sessions each summer in order to become a qualified Unity teacher with a total of 150 academic credits.

At the present time a study is well under way in an endeavor to have more sessions during every year. The study includes the possible use of the Instituto as a "mobile unit" in addition to its present functions. This "mobile unit" would be in a position to move to the Dominican Republic, Miami, New York City, Mexico or Venezuela, or wherever the need arises to take care of special groups of students with the view in mind of facilitating their training. On the basis of the present system, however, it is estimated that it will have an average of 10 to 15 graduates every summer.

The Instituto Unity is governed by a Board of Directors and has its own constitution and by-laws. This board is composed of Unity ministers, teachers, and two very prominent lawyers at this time. Robert P. Sikking and William L. Fischer are also members of the Board. Both of them were very instrumental in the organization and inauguration of the Instituto and their advice and assistance in all phases of the work have been very beneficial to the work.

The Rev. Panchita Mendez, minister in charge of the Asociacion de Cristianismo Practico center in Santurce, had been performing the duties of Academic Director of the Instituto since it inauguration in 1972 up to the end of the 1975 session, at which time she resigned because of her multiple and demanding duties at her everexpanding ministry in Santurce. Panchita is still a member of the Board and serves as a regular teacher during the summer sessions. Maria Molinary was named Academic Director upon Panchita's resignation. Luis, her husband, is also a member of the Instituto Board and he assists Maria in all phases of the work.

It is truly wonderful to see how Unity is reaching the minds and hearts of people everywhere. I know that as you read this article you will be sending your thoughts and prayers to our friends in the Instituto. It is such a joy to be co-workers with such inspiring people in this ministry of Truth and love.

UNITY IN THE VALLEY, St., Charles, III.

This month, formal chartering activities will be completed for Unity in the Valley, St. Charles. After a visit by Robert P. Sikking early in the month, a formal chartering procedure was completed and the first charter members were accepted into the newly formed church. The minister. Edd Dawson, is enthused about his new group and is negotiating, along with his Board of Directors, to purchase a lovely memorial chapel in the southern Fox River Valley area near Batavia. The church extends to all of those who supported it through its early growth through prayers and gifts, a grateful "thank you."

UNITY CHURCH OF CHICAGO, III.

This near northside ministry is rapidly moving toward full-time status also. A steering committee has been formed in August consisting of nine of the most interested and qualified persons. The church meetings are held in the beautiful Ambassador Hotel on Chicago's near northside. Budgetary goals, established during the AUC Conference in Philadelphia, were met in the month of August so the group is now able to seriously consider hiring a full-time minister. A request for placement has been made to Stan Hampson, Field Services Coordinator, and we are now accepting applications for a minister to serve at Unity Church of Chicago and also to be of some assistance, as time permits, in the other outreach activities in this area. HAMILTON, ONTARIO, CANADA

We've been working in cooperation with Jim Sherman, minister of the Toronto church, to provide assistance in developing the Hamilton, Ontario study group into a full-time ministry. The recent approval by the Toronto Board of Directors for Floyd Howard, a recent SMRS ordinand, to lead the Hamilton work and serve for a time as associate in Toronto has been approved. The formation of the church, along with a mailing including the 35th anniversary of the Toronto church, will be made with the help of Unity School. This mailing will announce the formation of the Hamilton ministry and invite interested Toronto and Hamilton people who have corresponded with Unity to the varying meetings which will be held throughout the month of November. In this way, we hope to provide an excellent start for the new work while celebrating with thanks the success of the existing Toronto ministry.

The ability of the outreach program to help newly forming ministries, whether they be directly affiliated with a Chicago area cluster or whether they be a satellite work of some other existing ministry, is an outstanding new service that has grown through the assistance and support of Unity School. Naturally, any request for such a mailing must be carefully considered but thus far, cooperation has been excellent and we are expecting good results here and in the middle Atlantic states where several other new ministries held meetings during the month of October. As of this writing, outreach is working directly with five Chicago area groups, one central Illinois group, and five others in varying states and Canada. The enthusiasm of our field ministers for expansion and the cooperation of Unity School and the AUC staff have enabled us to provide even more services than we had envisaged.

Our thanks for your continuing prayer support for these activities goes to each of you. If you have a need for support or an idea for expansion, please share it with me.

The Unity Cassette Club Quarterly news-letter will be coming out about the same time as this issue with news of two cassette programs from Unity School. "Prosperity" by Jack Boland consisting of twelve tapes and retailing for \$48.00. Martha Giudici presents "The World of Meditation," a three-cassette series that retails for \$12. Your center price is as always, 40% discount.

Jack Boland's cassette program explores all types of prosperity and how the listener can go about making them come forth in life. Jack is a Unity minister in Detroit, Michigan, where his work has grown from one hundred seventy-five people each Sunday to six hundred in four years. Some of his titles on this 12-lesson program are, "Faith causes events to happen," "Preparation is our job," "Change your expectancy," and "Accept your desires."

Martha's series "The World of Meditation" takes the listener step-by-step through the entire meditation process. On each side of the cassette tape there is a "guided" meditation exercise that can be used in daily meditations. Martha develops the twelve powers, explores how symbols, colors, and music can be used in meditation, and applies meditation to healing. Martha Giudici could be called "a teacher of teachers." She is currently serving as an instructor for our School for Ministerial and Religious Studies. She has served as a Unity minister in New Jersey, New York, Arizona, Pennsylvania, and Missouri.

Change is the order of the day in your AUC Executive Office. One of the first things Stan Hampson observed in joining the staff was that one needs the capacity to change hats very frequently and very suddenly. One can be dealing with the expression of prayer support for a minister or a ministry going through difficulties and immediately jump to resolving a snag in the filing procedures within the office, then immediately to deal with a placement inquiry from a Board member out in the field, and then to have waiting for you a student minister needing personal and specific counseling only to have to delay him because of an Admissions Committee meeting or a Teacher Training Committee Meeting. It's an exciting kind of work and it constantly exemplifies a readiness and willingness and ability to change.

Stan Hampson has undertaken, along

with his family, a tremendous change in his own personal life by accepting the position as Field Services Coordinator in our Executive Office. His area of responsibility will primarily be that of placement and in that area he will be working directly with, and under the direction of, the Board of Trustees. The Regional Representatives, collectively, will be meeting with Stan in January and June and at other times if necessary. Our capacity to render service directly to our ministers and ministries will be greatly increased by this change.

Upon our return from Philadelphia, Bill Dale shared with me his letter of resignation. He had been in consultation with the executives of Unity School regarding the possibility of accepting full time responsibility for Unity School's Public Relations Department. This is certainly very much in divine order since Bill's considerable skills can be used most effectively in a proper public relations structure. This will be a big change for Bill and I know that we all join in blessing him as he goes forth to be a tremendous blessing to Unity School.

During the past year, a tremendous part of Bill's responsibility has been the preparation and final execution of the Celebration in Philadelphia. He did an outstanding job and that big project went off with fewer hitches than in the

past. The other big area of responsibility that fell to Bill was the overseeing of the production of CONTACT. During his years of involvement in this area, this publication has gained a maturity and dignity that is most fitting for our field Movement. We're deeply grateful to Bill for the mark that he has left on this communication. We're undertaking, at least during these fall months, to handle the CONTACT within the existing staff. If additional staff is required, we will share that information with the Board of Trustees for appropriate action.

All of these changes are a part of the growth process that leads us unerringly toward the fulfillment of the Father's will in our ministry of service. The increased services that come as a result of the willingness to change give you an opportunity to employ that same activity in your continuing and expanding support of your AUC.

The one thing that has never changed is that you are the AUC and your Executive Office is the instrument of service of the AUC to you as a minister or teacher or Board member in a member ministry. We who are privileged to serve you in this area are ever grateful for your expanding consciousness of support and love and cooperation.

Naturally, when you know of an opening that interests you, be sure and let me know so I can send your resume too. Most centers seem interested in inviting several ministers as candidates and then they make the final selection of minister from those they have met and heard. After only these few weeks on the job, you can be sure I am already amazed at the time consumed in all of these arrangements.

Just before I began work here I was able to meet with the Southwestern Region in California to brainstorm ideas to facilitate our placement activities. We evolved several important concepts that already I can see increasing urgency to implement.

Many ministers have found that upon taking over a ministry, they have nothing to go on from their successor. Sometimes it can be worked out for the two ministers to get together and transfer the details of background to the incoming minister.

That is ideal. But since that is often impractical, when you leave a center, it would certainly help your successor if you would at least be sure you leave samples of letters, procedural guidelines, and other ideas to make the transition go smoothly.

Another important idea that evolved out of our meeting in California was the need for better resumes on candidates. Boards of Directors often express frustration at having to make selections of candidates from so limited information. Everyone confirmed the concept that when a minister requests placement, that minister send in a resume along with the application. Would it facilitate the activity of Spirit in placement if each minister wrote his own resume? It would keep this activity free of partiality and allow each candidate to put his own best foot forward. What is your thought about this or other aspects of placement? Please share your ideas with me. Together, we can create an ever-increasing flow of Spirit in this activity of placement.





"INSPIRATION BREAK" CARD

Unity of Independence, Missouri, utilizes a very artistic and colorful card (reproduced at left in black and white), as a handout item to promote the ministry's recorded inspirational messages.

George and Marilyn Rieger, co-ministers of Unity of Independence, report that the cards, which are printed in blue type on white grained cardstock, are sent out with the monthly bulletins or may be obtained at the ministry after the Sunday service.

The telephone messages are recorded by Marilyn and are changed daily. Marilyn advised, "The Saturday message is dedicated to youngsters and structured to motivate them into thinking for themselves. I try to tell a story or something I feel is interesting to children. In the one to two minute message I usually have a little Truth message for them too." Marilyn added, "The self-image program presents these six ideas: You can do almost anything you want to do; You're something special; Set daily goals and you'll feel great; You don't make any more mistakes than anyone else; When you are friendly to others they will be friendly to you; and You can be just as happy as you want to be."

The cards have been instrumental in increasing the number of telephone calls to the ministry's recorded message.
