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AUC PRESIDENT'S LETTER

ear Friends,

This has been a year of change. In my opinion, it has been a time of growth, for we have taken an honest look at where we were, and as a result broken out of the mold in which we had allowed ourselves to be confined. Now we are ready to move ahead.

Much prayer, interest, thought, time and energy has been given to our Association by the Review Committee, the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees. Dozens of others have shared, by phone and letter, their concerns, thoughts and ideas. The increased love offerings to our Association is helping us get on a much sounder financial basis.

Through our establishment of three departments, we have broadened our base of operation as any dynamic organization does as it expands. As we seek to restore actual authority for the functioning of the AUC to the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee, there are numerous matters to be given serious consideration.

Since we ought to operate under the very best principles and precepts of business procedure and management, people elected to the Board should have busi-

ness acumen and know-how. Not all ministers are business oriented; nor do they have the experience to cope with the type of responsibilities that are faced.

One of the most serious problems that we, as Unity leaders, face in the maintenance of a vital, dynamic and effectively functioning organization is our unresolved relationship between wisdom and love. In our desire to see the Christ in others, and to go the extra mile, we make personal rather than im-

personal judgments. Thus we become so tied up in the emotions connected with personality that reason, logic, and good judgment are set aside. Idealism overwhelms facts and matters cannot be handled competently. Our ability to say "no" is just as important as our ability to say "yes."

Undoubtedly, I became president because I had served for the longest period of time of anyone on the Executive Committee. This is not a very good reason but unless we make some changes, this practice is likely to continue. A president should have to meet certain personal qualifications, have proven leadership ability, have stability in the ministry, and be someone whom the Conference body trusts and is able to relate to freely and openly. Recommendations of the Review Committee regarding the presidency should be given serious, prayerful consideration.

As we come together in June, let us know that we are no longer bound by past ways of thinking and operating; instead we are open and receptive to the dynamic movement of Truth.

The group has been meeting on Sunday evenings until Palm Sunday, April 3, when over 60 persons attended its first morning services. Easter brought over 90 into the tiny church office building and increased a stir for larger quarters. Mike also reports that their Dial-A-Prayer, provided by Charles Roth's Indiana ministry, received over 1,500 calls in its first week of operation. Mike credits the results primarily to a "personals" column ad in the local newspapers. They are intending to purchase a second Dial-A- Prayer machine. Unity School has recently approved a mailing to correspondents in the area to announce Bill Fischer's lectures there on June 26.

VANCOUVER, WASHINGTON

EVANSVILLE, INDIANA



"CHANGING THE ODDS"

A little over fifty years ago a Johns Hopkins professor gave a group of graduate students this assignment: Go to the slums. Take 200 boys, between the ages of 12 and 16, and investigate their background and environment. Then predict their chances for the future.

The students, after consulting social statistics, talking to the boys and compiling as much data as they could, concluded that 90 percent of the boys would spend some time in jail.

Twenty-five years later another group of graduate students was given the job of testing the prediction. They went back to the slum area. Some of the boys—now men—were still there, a few had died, some had moved away, but they got in touch with 180 of the original 200. They found that only four of the

group had ever been sent to jail.


Why was it that these men, who had lived in a breeding place of crime, had such a surprisingly good record? The researchers were continually told: "Well, there was a teacher..."

They pressed further, and found that in 75 percent of the cases it was the same woman. The researchers went to this teacher, now living in a home for retired teachers. How had she exerted this remarkable influence over a group of slum children? Could she give them any reason why these boys should have remembered her?

"No," she said, "no, she really couldn't." And then, thinking back over the years, she said musingly, more to herself than to her questioners: "I loved those boys..."

"ACTIVITY **OF** SPIRIT" Stan Hampson **Field Services** Coordinator

Placement is the activity of Spirit. I believe this and certainly you do, too. We teach that all life is a matter of consciousness. However, we may not always be aware that this activity has usually occured within a certain cultural and racial milieu when it comes to placement. As in America in general, we in Unity are predominantly Anglo-Saxon. We haven't tried to make it that way. It's just evolved that way. Unity people are not prejudiced people--to be so would be a violation of everything we believe and teach. Yet, all of us tend to gravitate toward similarities. People tend to be comfortable with persons of the same racial background, the same age, even the same sex.

Observe people in your neighborhood; in your community walking down the street. There is a group of blacks; there, some Italians, there, Polish, Venezuelans, Puerto Ricans, Haitians, Canadians. There is a group of young people, there are some elderly, there is a group of men speaking, there is a handful of ladies together. We tend to group ourselves in similarities. People aren't as locked into social strata as they were in the past. We in Unity are undoubtedly more open than people in general.

So how does the activity of Spirit work in the placement of an ordained minister who speaks only Spanish or French or is black or Oriental, or speaks English with an accent unfamiliar to your area? Would your congregation be prepared or comfortable to have such a minister as it's own?

Recently several ministries have been

so creative as to embrace and prosper under the leadership of a minister very different from their previous stero-type image of a minister. It's exciting to see some of our Unity congregations confirm a minister of completely different race. cultural background, or sex than they have had before.

Is it time for us to consider pioneer work of reaching new groups of people? Could our outreach be amplified to serve communities of Truth students that have not been reached by us?

The first step in positive growth is defining a situation. I think we can begin to make better steps forward as we simply realize certain, capable individuals fit into a different activity of Spirit. Then, as we give serious thought and prayer to possible directions, we will find those next steps.

Let us pray together and think together to expand our horizons. Certainly the activity of Spirit can be bigger and more exciting than we have ever before thought.

Pictured here are eight students who have their roots in other countries. Representing our rapidly-expanding Unity Movement in Australia are **Graeme Johnson**, a second-year student, and **Ngaire Thomson**, a first-year student. Graeme was a self-employed businessman before coming to SMRS. Ngaire has had a career as a radio actress and in teaching dramatics. Upon graduation

and ordination, they will join Elva Holcombe and Margaret Berkman in expanding Unity's work in Australia.

There are also two representatives from Great Britain in the student body. Ralph Seelig was a businessman with a long association with Unity in Great Britain. Alec Evason has an employment background in computers, where he worked as a programme and a systems analyst. His association with Unity has been through the ministry in London.

We recognize, appreciate, and give thanks for Mary and bless her for her willingness and dedication to serve our world-wide ministries through her expressions of service in the AUC office.


UICE CHANGES FOR 1978

The Education Department is planning to upgrade their licensed teacher training in 1978. In a meeting about the future of their Unity teacher training program, the joint Teacher Training Committee decided to develop the training of Unity teachers in UICE so that the following goals may be achieved:

- Closer involvement of faculty and teacher candidates.
- More personalized attention to each student in order to maximize the student's opportunities to develop teaching skills.
- 3. Better and fairer evaluation of candidates' abilities.

To achieve these goals we will involve the licensed teacher candidates in an entirely different format for the last part of their training.

The committee is recommending that licensed teacher candidates be required to complete certain skill development seminars, which will be offered at a special time during the year. These would be in addition to the presently required 150 credits, and would be required only of licensed teacher candidates. The additional time beyond 150 credits is anticipated to be from one to two weeks of involvement. The student will be



required to complete the seminars, not accumulate credits. Emphasis will be on skill development and experiential learning. Subject matter will include generally: teaching methods, historical and metaphysical review, speech development, fundamentals, and Bible review.

The form that this training will take is still in the planning stages. However,

for those of you who are planning to finish your teacher training, you may want to decide now whether you will complete your training under the present format, which will end in 1977, or whether you wish to go ahead and complete your training under the new program, which will begin in Session 1 of 1978.

A PROJECT WORTH PARTICIPATING IN!

An exciting suggestion was made in January, which was then presented to the Board of Trustees of the Association of Unity Churches. The Board concurred with the suggestion, so now we are presenting it to you, so that you may know about it and participate in it.

It was suggested that we give the field ministries an opportunity to provide the Dickson Analytical Bibles which are presented to the graduating ordinands each year. This year there will be twenty-four (24) of these Bibles presented. If you are interested in participating, please send a check for \$50.00 to the SMRS office. Make the check payable to the Association, and note that it is for the Ordination Bible Project.

The inscription in the front of the Bible will note that it is being presented by your ministry. Also, if you would like your Bible to go to a particular student (perhaps one who originally came through your ministry), please let us know and it will be handled in that way, if at all possible.

I've often said--maybe sometime you've heard me say it-that I thought Norma Knight Jones was the best woman speaker I'd ever heard.

A friend one time challenged me on that statement. "You're only saying that because you love her and because you chose her to work with you in your Los Angeles ministry." I love her for many reasons besides her speaking ability. But it's not because I chose her to work with me that I say she is a fine speaker and minister. I chose her to work with me because of those abilities I saw in her.

Her discourses made you a part of the picture she painted with words. When she talked to a huge Bible class about Biblical characters, you could almost see them walking down the aisles. She brought you into the picture.

She had trouble with certain words, even in her prime. She referred to "libary" and "Febuary." When she was to announce my subject for a healing service, found the typed subject difficult to discern, lifted a lorgnette to aid her vision, and triumphantly announced, "Treatment for the eyes!" There was laughter from the congregation in which she joined and commented, "I think I'll come!"

Such little gaffes were a part--even a winsome part--of her personality. But when in the Christmas season she referred to the cross and resurrection, and in a pre-Easter service alluded to the star of Bethlehem I felt she was marring the bright image that thousands held of her. Those of us closest to her could not hear to see this happening. Something should be done. It was up to me to do it, and I had to do a lot of praying to face that responsibility. She herself opened the way as she was approaching her 80th birthday.

"Ernest, I'm so old. Maybe I should retire," she ventured.
"That's not your problem, Norma," I was able to say. "You are young, ageless really, but your physical organism just can't keep up with you. I don't believe in 'retiring,' but I think this may be the time to enter into a new and perhaps less demanding way of life, catch up on some of the things you have always wanted to do, but didn't find time for," and so on.

I know I hurt her, but a little hurt from a close and loving friend would be a lesser hurt than presenting to her host of admirers a disheartening image of the great teacher they so admired.

It was then that I first strongly thought about the challenge of retirement in relation to myself. For though we know this applies to others, we tend to feel that it will never come to us.

Someone has said that the one changeless thing in life is change itself. That, like most aphorisms, is an over-simplification. But it is something we all should consider. When things are pleasing to us we don't (we think) want them to change. But while change does not always mean growth, growth always

involves change. To that we must adjust if we are to live a well-ordered life. And there is some blessing, something to learn, something of good to discover in every change that we must meet.

When I myself began to see signs of change that might lead to relinquishing to the pattern of life that I have followed for so many years I found that I could do so with a degree of equanimity. There is a Knower in each of us that will guide us if we are receptive. I found that without my scarcely realizing this, I was provided with inner resources that helped me to welcome "retirement." One need was to correct that unpleasant word. I would not retire. I would become a "minister at large."

I would devote myself to things I'd always wanted to do-or more accurately to do more of--than time and the demands of my responsibilities would permit. Here are some of the things that helped:

"What will people say?" That's no big problem with me People have always been kinder to me in my human frailties than I have been of myself. I've seldom been very pleased about any sermon or lesson I've ever given. Often after a big, enthusiastic meeting in which I've been the speaker, and I've left the crowds and gone to my quiet home, a part of me would be saying, "Why did you say that? Why didn't you say this? Why did you allow yourself to become taken off balance in an unfamiliar situation?" I have had to take myself firmly in hand. "I will try to do better. I will try to learn from each human encounter, but I will not beat myself over the back. I will just be grateful that I receive as good a response to my efforts as I do. As one great speaker once said to me, "Dare to be a fool for the kingdom of heaven's sake," and to myself I say, "Get yourself out of the picture. If you can help people, that is more important than ego satisfaction. What is done is done. No door closes but others open." As long as I am in this plane there are things to do, lessons to learn and teach; joys to be received and shared and given again. Life is a progress, not a station.

Money--how will I be sustained? Have I not always been sustained? Shall I not always be? Through most of my years of ministry there was no retirement plan for people like me. I had to depend on invisible resources; God in me. Knowing this I have tried to be a good steward; to prepare not "for rainy days" but for opportunities and expansion. Nowadays, as I have found in trying to help people who were retired from gainful employment, this is much easier than when, sixty years ago I started out, as Myrtle Fillmore used to admonish, "without script or purse" and trust for God to open ways where there seemed to be none.

When you feel the need of people send out a silent call; you will get an answer. It's an aspect of Truth that really works. "The good I seek is seeking me. Friends I seek are seeking me. Opportunities I enjoy open before me."

Day by day. As never before when you become a minister at large you can indulge yourself in doing good for its own sake, with nothoughtof return; go out of your way to help in a smaller or more intimate area than you were able to do when you were on a time schedule. You can find the fascinating delight of living for the day that is at hand, coming to know better than ever before, what a wonderful world this is, right where you are; that you live and love and serve as by divine appointment; that people are wonderful; you too, wonderful in your own very special, unique way.

What and Where Now? In trying to find a suitable retirement facility for some friends I, by divine direction I believe, found an attractive penthouse apartment in a handsome high-rise retirement complex in the heart of Kansas City. I am writing, traveling, lecturing, enjoying each day. I hope you'll come and see me sometime.

Retirement is as much of life as is childhood, adolescence, and maturity. It should be approached without apprehension. Our Father does not desert us because we have reached "three-score and ten"!

There are two questions that must be answered as we face the advisability of retirement. One is, "Have I sufficient income to live on?" and the other, "What will I do with my time?" The first of these should have been taken care of during the years of our ministry. Not only should every minister put aside a portion of his income for investments but should take advantage of one of the retirement plans now offered through the AUC. No such plan was available until the last two years of my ministry, but I discovered the great truth that if we use what we have wisely and thankfully, the Lord opens ways where there seem to be no way.

One of those ways leads us into the second deterrent for retiring, i.e., "What will I do with my time?" After almost eleven years of official retirement I am still as active in the ministry as I have the strength to be. I have lectured, substituted for Sunday services, taught classes, done counselling, and still have had time for a number of nice trips. There is great need for those who will serve as interim minister, for those who will substitute for regular ministers when they are on vacation, etc. There is need for those who will take a small church and help it grow until it can support a full-time minister. There is quite often opportunity for a qualified teacher in a nearby church. The Lord always has work for willing hearts and hands.

When should you retire? The bell is ringing when you realize that any phase of the ministry is becoming a burden. In my own experience I was moving along happily and enjoying our beautiful new church less than two years old. Retirement in the near future was the furthest thing from my mind. But I began to notice warning signs, such as weariness after night meetings, a hesitancy to add an additional service or class though the need of such was becoming apparent. The deciding factor came with the realization that the Sunday School and Youth of Unity were becoming burdensome. I got the message. God was whispering, "The day has come." At first this sounded like a death knell, but as I listened I understood it was chiming my freedom to go forth into a new land that had already been prepared for me.

PLAN AHEAD NOW...

Two fine plans for financial security in a minister's future are available through your AUC office. Ministers and Boards should familiarlize themselves with these plans with an eye to establishing either or both in their ministry.

BANKER'S LIFE

This plan is referred to as a money purchase tax sheltered Group Annuity which provides for a retirement income payable at age 70. Any employee of the Employer is entitled to participate in the Contractholder's Pension Plan for ordained ministers as determined by the Contractholder.

The Contractholder makes monthly contributions to a fund held by the Banker's Life for each active participant. Each participant's share of the fund, after expenses, is credited with interest at the guaranteed rate of 3½% per annum by the Company each year. In addition each participant, active or inactive, shares in the dividend declared for this pension which is calculated on the overall experience of the fund. Such dividend is allocated to each participant on the ratio of his accumulation value as of the current anniversary date of the plan to the total accumulation value for all participants. Thus each participant's account is credited with interest at a rate greater than the guaranteed rate. The accumulation value is used to purchase a retirement annuity at the participant's annuity commencement date. For complete details contact your AUC office.

MONEY PURCHASE PENSION PLAN

This is a pension plan in which the Employer's contributions are fixed, (in this case by reference to a percentage of each Participant's earnings), and the amount of the pension benefits to be paid will vary depending upon such factors as the length of time the Employee has participated and the amount earned by trust investments.

Eligibility is open to full-time employees, licensed teachers, or ordained ministers who are over 24 years of age and who have completed one (1) year of continuous service with: A. The Association of Unity Churches, Inc.; B. Any member church; C. Unity School of Christianity; or D. Any combination of such employment.

The Association of Unity Churches will, upon request, provide eligible employees with application forms and complete details.

The office of **Richard Hutchcraft**, Farm Manager of Unity Village, is on the seventh floor of the Tower. This office is the one once used by W. Rickert Fillmore, son of the founders of Unity, and architect and designer of Unity buildings and grounds.

"The first thing visitors see when they come to Unity Village is the physical grounds. The grounds are the initial image of Unity and that is why their appearance is so important," says Richard.

His title of Farm Manager is a bit misleading for Richard's supervision and responsibilities are varied. He oversees operations of the golf course, landscaping, farm and garden areas (including the fruit stand), outside building maintenance (including the swimming pool, the residences, motel and cottage buildings), power, gas, and sewer lines, the water treatment plant, and road and vehicle maintenance. Richard is also the postmaster here.

He is quick to give credit to the supervisors who work with him. He cites Clyde Corn (Orchards), Bill Evans (Landscape), Max Yost (Golf Course), Hollis Spainhower (Outside Contruction), Gilbert Long and L.J. Sanders (Gas, Electrical, Sewer, and Water Systems), and Clyde Gill (Roads and Vehicles), saying: "We have a crew of approximately fifty workers, which grows to about seventy in the summer. With such a large staff, and such wide-ranging responsibilities, I find the work of my supervisors invaluable. These men are all thoroughly knowledgeable and capable about their areas."

Richard joined Unity School in April 1972 as manager of the golf course. He accepted the responsibility of Farm Manager in December 1974. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in biology from Ottawa University. Before joining the staff of Unity School, he was a biologist with Midwest Research Institute in Kansas City. Richard and his wife, Alice, are parents of three daughters; two year old Heidi, and newborn twins, Holly and Robyn.


SOUTH CENTRAL REGIONAL NEWS with James C. Lewis:
