AUC President's Letter


Dear Friends,

REORGANIZATION COMMITTEE REPORT - by Charles Roth, Chairman

December 1, 1977, the count of Questionnaires received was 145. This represents a response of 47%. Following is a breakdown according to the 7 Regions.

Each Regional Committee member turned in a list of the voting ministers in his/her Region. On November 15th, I informed each Regional Committee member of those in his/her Region who have not returned a questionnaire, so that they might contact them.

In addition to this we have sent out a post card reminder

to all members. This mailing took place about December 6, 1977.

The Conference voted this Reorganization Committee intelleging last June. We are taking the directive of the Conference seriously and giving much time and prayer-oriented thought to the job you asked us to do.

Whether you were at the Conference or not, and whether you voted for the establishment of the Committee or not, it would be but a small token of your love and loyalty to the Unity Movement through the AUC to return your Questionnaire, or send a note saying something to the effect that you are with us in spirit but don't feel led to fill out the Questionnaire.

There are some who, because of illness or other extenuating circumstances, cannot return a questionnaire; however, I still hope to see a 95% return by January 1st of the new year.



CHECKLIST
FOR
A
CANDIDATE"

When you are a candidate for being the minister of a church, there are not only many things that the congregation wants to know about you; you also want to know about the congregation. Some of your questions could be answered before ever going to guest speak. Other ideas you will need to find out by your visit. Here is a checklist of things to know about your next church:

- 1. General type of people making up the congregation--lower class, middle class, or upper class
- 2. The general cultural and educational background of the congregation
- 3. The type of neighborhood in which the church is located; this often indicates a church's potential and program
- 4. The average attendance at the various services
- Statistics showing decrease or increase of church membership, attendance, and finances over the past few years
- 6. The present financial condition of the church, including any indebtedness
- 7. The immediate or future building plans
- 8. The church's bylaws
- The policy of the church concerning paid musicians such as soloist, choir director, and organist
- 10. The provision for secretaries, assistant ministers, and other church staff; what are their duties? To whom are they responsible?
- 11. The provision of a manse
- 12. The esteem (or lack of it) for the previous minister, and his/her reasons for leaving
- 13. Is the church integrated, or is there evidence of racial prejudice?
- 14. Is there potential for future growth and room for expansion?
- 15. Is there evidence that the church is run by one person or by a strong dictatorial board or group of members?
- 16. Does the church tithe?
- 17. Is there an adequate church study for the minister?
- 18. Is the manse suitable for the minister's family?
- 19. Is the church in good repair, or is it in need of much interior decorating and modernizing?
- 20. How is the heating system, air-conditioning, ventilation, and lighting of the present church building?
- 21. Are the Youth Education facilities adequate?
- 22. What is the quality of work done by the church staff, such as the secretary? The neatness of the church bulletin is often an indication here.

- 23. Is there an atmosphere of friendliness? Were the greeters at the door acting mechanically, or was there a genuine attitude of welcome?
- 24. What musical ability is evident? Is this a strong, weak, or sore point to the church? Is the musical staff adequate?
- 25. Is the Sunday School up to date in its methods? Are the teachers trained? Is there adequate space and equipment?
- 26. Does the church provide a nursery?
- 27. What youth meetings and program does the church have?
- 28. What are the programs for young couples, college age, and adults?
- 29. What is the church's policy towards the use of the church building for weddings and funerals of nonmembers?
- 30. What is the church's attitude toward building usage: renting to other groups, drinking, smoking, dancing, church bazaars, bingo, and potluck suppers?
- 31. What is the provision for the annual vacation of the minister. How long?
- 32. Is there any provision for the minister's car expenses?
- 33. Is there a provision in the salary agreement for annual costof-living adjustments?
- 34. Does the church provide health and medical insurance?
- 35. Does the church pay the social security payments and provide other retirement benefits?
- 36. Does the church encourage the minister to take off one day a week?
- 37. How much time per year is granted to the minister to be away for special meetings and speaking engagements in addition to national and regional conferences?
- 38. What allowance in time and/or money is provided for educational opportunities?
- 39. With the exception of emergencies, is it acceptable that the minister designate hours explicitely for study?
- 40. What duties are expected of the minister's spouse?

When you are a candidate, you will surely find this checklist a valuable tool to begin your discussion with a prospective Board. Church Board members could benefit from reviewing the checklist even when no change is anticipated, so they can be aware of what thinking will be necessary if they should be seeking a minister. Additionally, an improved situation now may well eliminate the need for a change of leadership. May this checklist help in several ways.

The Field Speaks

In the November issue of CONTACT an article authored by Larry Swartz, minister of Unity of Tucson, caught my attention. While I was in ministerial training at the Village, Larry was chairman of the Licensing & Ordination Committee. With these credentials I was interested to hear his opinion on ordination procedures as practiced by the Association of Unity Churches.

His first paragraph established his continuing support of our two year residency program in SMRS. Exceptional exceptions should be considered.

What has prompted my desire to communicate my opinion in this matter was his next statement. "However, I have done just about a 180 degree turn." Now how can this be? Larry goes on to say he was greatly impressed with some of the speakers at the INTA conference who were not Unity ministers. He referred specifically to one Religious Science minister who hinted broadly he would have preferred to be ordained by Unity "except that it was just not possible for him to take two years and enter our SMRS program." It isn't easy for anyone.

I have been in the field exactly 15 months so my two years experience at the Village remains vivid in my mind. Here in the Twin Cities I have a wonderful relationship with the Divine Science minister, Dr. Vernon Shields, and the Religious Science minister, The Rev. Glenn Chaffin. These two gentlemen are wonderful Truth teachers. The three of us have a mutual respect, but I am the only Unity minister in the Twin Cities. What I gained at SMRS those two gentlemen have not experienced and for me I needed the two years. (If in doubt ask my instructors if that is correct). Rev David King, a classmate of

mine, gave the best discription of SMRS when he called the experience "Spiritual Bootcamp". Being a minister is morthan just saying, "I wish to be a minister." It takes time and a degree of conditioning to not only think as a minister but to also feel as a minister.

Religious Science has its program; Divine Science has its program. Unity has its program. Each serves its unique purpose in training those who have Divine Appointment to serve where they are attracted.

We are printing this unsolicited letter received here in early December as it shows how, when we work together, we can truly be of help to one another. This ministry was established just over one year ago.

Dear Scott.

On behalf of everyone in "Unity of San Angelo" I want to thank you for setting up the Silent Unity Mailing and also for contacting Dr. Ernest Wilson on our behalf.

As you know Dr. Wilson was our first guest speaker at our new facilities. We scheduled Ernest for two sessions Saturday evening (Nov. 19) and the Sunday Morning worship service, which was followed by a question and answer period and an early Thanksgiving Banquet. All but 10 or 15 of the 150 seats were taken and that is a large crowd for us

whose average Sunday attendance is 60 people.

Dr. Wilson's visit was a tremendous success, not only in numbers but in affect. You see, our main concern was how to introduce Unity to the San Angelo Community, where everyone, with few exceptions, attends a more traditional church each Sunday. Not that we haven't advertised until now, but our congregation placed all resources into finding our own facilities rather than the Ramada Inn.

Anyway, our prayer and purpose, led to the marvelous church facility we have at 333 West Avenue C. It once was a Shrine Temple and the sanctuary seats comfortably 200 people. The building also has several Sunday School rooms, a large fellowship hall, small kitchen, bookstore and Minister's office.

As I said, our main objective was to introduce Unity to the San Angelo Community and we couldn't have found a more gently loving representative than Ernest. He is what this fair-minded Texas Community needed and his message touched hearts and minds alike.

It's difficult to evaluate just which factors were the most responsible for our success with Ernest Wilson's visit. Besides the Silent Unity mailing we also did some extensive advertising on radio, T.V., and in the newspaper. Ernest Wilson is easy to

promote because of his credentials. So its difficult to say why it all worked out. But if I had to guess I would say word of mouth was still the biggest contributing factor. In the end it really doesn't matter, as long as the Word gets out.

We arranged to give everyone attending the service a copy of October <u>UNITY</u> <u>Magazine</u> thanks to our man in the home office, Frank Giudici. It happened that the October issue had an article by Ernest Wilson and one by Jack Groverland (that's me). With the magazine we enclosed our monthly newsletter and a pamphlet "The Adventure Called Unity." Besides all of the free literature our bookstore did a large volume of business, the best seller being Dr. Wilson's book <u>The Emerging Self</u>.

Perhaps the biggest blessing of all was the enthusiasm generated within our fellowship. Almost every single member had a hand in making it all happen, from the parking lot attendants and greeters at the doors Saturday night, to the cleanup crew following the Sunday Thanksgiving Banquet.

You know, Scott, that's what Unity really is...people doing good things together. Our heartfelt thanks to you and all of those who helped us put it all together in San Angelo.

WHAT TO DO WITH LEFT-OVERS! SUNDAY SCHOOL MATERIAL

The following appears in the Introduction section of the Sunday School curriculum for the quarter beginning December 1. It is possible that ministers will want to discuss these various uses of left-over Take-Home lessons with their Youth Education staffs.

Using the Take-Home Lessons

Many churches have expressed concern that there are odd numbers of various Youth Education Take-Home Lessons left over at the end of every quarter. It can provide a problem with storage and to some people represents a "waste" of resources.

The only way to avoid having "left-overs" is to be sure the students receive all of the lessons for each quarter in which they are registered in your Sunday School. It is always wise to order one or two extra sets of Take-Home Lessons for visitors to class. But used effectively, the Take-Home Lesson can help build a more consistent attendance among your regular and semi-regular students.

Following are suggestions to help you reduce your collection of left-over Take-Home Lessons, and increase consistent attendance in your classes. If you have found other effective ways to use the Take-Home Lesson, please share your ideas.

——Give each student an inexpensive notebook or folder for his Take-Home Lessons the first Sunday of the quarter. Let the student decorate the notebook, and encourage him to bring it to class each week. Make a special activity of inserting the Take-Home Lesson into the folder each week. Encourage the student to feel pride as he makes his own book. Soon, students will not want to miss lessons!

——Use the Take-Home Lesson in class, but always save something to be done at home. Then, each week, follow up on the previous lesson by having students show you their completed Take-Home Lessons from the week before. Give stars, or make a chart to mark each student's completion of the Take-Home Lesson. Show that you feel it is important, and the student will not want to miss one.

——Send a student his Take-Home Lesson each time he is absent from class. Share a little note, telling him what the class has done during his absence and encourage him to complete one or two of the fun activities on the Take-Home Lesson to show you when he returns to class. It will further the student's spiritual education even when he is now able to attend Sunday School, and it will show the student and his parents that you feel these lessons are very important.

——Send home occasional suggestions for use of the Take-Home Lesson during family worship times. One idea which has been used in some Sunday Schools, is to have the family decorate a box and place it in a prominent place at home. All children in the family will deposit their Take-Home Lessons there each week. Then, the families will gather several evenings a week to discuss the ideas in the lessons. Children can teach parents, and their siblings. Parents can help the children with projects and lead family Bible study. Possibilities are unlimited.

——Left-over Take-Home Lessons from previous quarters can also be used for various promotional activities. Place them on the free literature tables in the church—with an invitation for people to share them with young friends. Or, send them out in welcome letters to visiting or new families that sign the church guest book. There is no need to hide Truth under a bushel basket, or in a Sunday School storage room—reach out to the children in your community and GROW!

——Finally, if you do end up with left-over lessons, just save them for a year. The IMAGE for LIVING Curriculum will be re-used every two years. Share your odds and ends at that time with guests to the Sunday School classes. Or, cut out, color and mount illustrations from Take-Home Lessons for visual aids.

Pastor's Perspective Unity: A Christian Organization

What Is Unity?

This is a question that has been asked of me re-

cently. Let me explain.

Unity is a worldwide Christian organization nearly a century old. Because of similarity in names, Unity has on occasion been confused with other organizations. However there is no connection between Unity and Unitarianism or the Unification Church.

Millions of people have been introduced to Unity through its periodicals Daily Word, Unity Magazine and Wee Wisdom, published at Unity World Headquarters in Lees Sumit, Mo. Millions of others are familiar with Unity through its prayer ministry, known as Silent Unity which has maintained a round-the-clock vigilance of prayer for more than 80 years. Thousands of people around the world call Silent Unity via the toll free number (800-821-2935) and receive prayer help.

Obviously, one cannot cover the whole of the Unity teachings in a single article; however, here are some

particulars regarding Unity:

Unity is an extremely positive approach to life, seeking to accent the good in people and all of life. God is seen as having many attributes, but most important that God is LOYE. Unity stresses that God is not a physical man in the sky, for this limits Him. God 's Spirit, everywhere present, the one and only Spirit behind, in and through all things, visible and invisible.

Unity denies the existence of any power or presence opposed to God. It sees that there are evil appearances and suffering in the world, but ascribes these to man's ignorance and erroneous use of God's

Unity proclaims the divinity of Jesus, but goes further and assures that you, too, are a child of God and therefore divine in nature. Jesus expressed his divine potential and sought to show man how to express his as

well. Salvation is then the expanding understanding of one's innate divinity and perfectibility through living the life demonstrated by Jesus.

Unity explains the mind as your connecting link with God or Divine Mind and shows how the action of your mind affects your body and circumstances. Much emphasis is placed on the effective power that every thought, feeling, word, and act has upon your life.

Prayer is not seen as a technique for changing God, but for expanding and transforming your mind, and thus chang-

ing you.

Unity seeks to relate religion to daily needs, affirming that for every need there is God's perfect answer. Its main textbook is the Bible and it relates its

lessons to your life and everyday experiences. UNITY DOES break from tradition some in that it has no creedal requirements, dogma, ritual or ecclesiastical garb. Unity chooses to believe that there is good in every religion. Different religions are like spokes on a wheel with the hub being God. They may be set apart by a variance of beliefs and approaches, but they are all seeking the one God at the hub of all life. Consequently, Unity does not deny anyone the right to have their own beliefs.

Unity sees worship as serving God by uplifting and glorifying God's spirit in man, in positive, joyous ways. It seeks not to emphasize one's sins of the past, but instead give attention to the good that exists in every person and what can be done with the now to transform one's self and his life.

Its main concern is not so much with a "future life" but with teaching people how to live fully in the present, seeing the good in all things. Unity also believes in eternal life and views the present moment as part of eternal life.

Unity does not impose any financial burdens or

pressure on its adherents. It believes the desire for giving should be initiated from within the giver to reap the joys of sharing. Consequently, all support is by freewill offerings.

Unity is non-denominational and welcomes in dignity and love, people of all races, colors, religions, so-

cial background and economic levels.

In summation, Unity emphasizes the divine potential within every child of God and teaches that through a practical understanding and application of what Jesus taught, every person can realize and express their divine potential for a happier, fuller and more successful life.
