AUC President's Letter

Dear Friend,


With the turning of the gavel over to the new President in June, my Presidential term and my terms of service on the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee will expire. In positive awareness I look forward to great years ahead for our Association, it's members, and Unity in general. How can it be otherwise with Spirit in charge?

As I move toward the end of this era of service, I invite your consideration of another proposal in addition to the one I presented in my letter last month. This one has to do with the ordination of ministers. I propose the following:

- That all graduates of SMRS receive Licensed Minister recognition for one year upon graduation.
- 2) That all graduates of SMRS be required to have a minimum of eight months active, full time service in an AUC member ministry, or the recognized equivalent of such service, before being considered for ordination.
- 3) That a Board of Regents be formed to annually qualify candidates for ordination by (a) reviewing each candidate's credentials and record of field ministry service, and (b) making recommendations to the Board of Trustees as to whether or not the candidate be invited for ordination. Personal interviews with the Board of Regents would be required for all candidates whose records are questionable.
- 4) That ordinations be conferred at the annual AUC Conference (usually held in June).

Ordination is always conferred by invitation. To me, it is the most cherished recognition and honor AUC can bestow. Once given, it cannot be rescinded. Ordination carries with it a lifetime privilege of recognition as a Unity Minister. The ordination bespeaks to others that the one upon whom it has been conferred is representative of what Unity is as a teaching movement, a church, and/or a way of life.

There is one thing ordination does not do. I see this as the principle reason why it is given by invitation. It does not guarantee that all upon whom it is conferred will live up to the higher ideals of

Unity, both in their ministries and in their private lives as ministers. True, the large majority do, and they well deserve the recognition of ordination and all things attendant to it. But unfortunately, the testing and screening process incorporated into our ministerial program does not detect all who likely will not make the grade as a Unity minister. Thus, and speaking very frankly on the subject, on occasion we are confronted with incompetancy in some who are ordained.

A flaw in our system is that ordination is conferred upon graduate candidates without giving them a reasonable opportunity to establish their credentials as a full time working Unity minister in the field. It is not illogical to me to think that a period of intership, or work in the field, should be a post-graduate requirement in order to be considered for ordination. To the best of my recollection, we had such a requirement in the old Unity School Ministerial Training Program before 1966.

Having served for several years on the Board and Executive Committee of AUC, I have observed that, among those whom we ordain upon graduation, there is usually a small percentage who end up being unplaceable in our ministries for one reason or another. For the most part those reasons are evidenced to some degree during their first few months in the field.

Some actual examples of things that make a minister ultimately unplaceable are as follows: violations of the Unity standards as required by the AUC Bylaws and Code of Standards and Ethics; an inability to develop harmonious working relationships with Boards and congregations; a lack of dedication to serve the ministerial needs of the people; problems of immorality; emphasizing other teaching approaches to the virtual exclusion of what Unity teaches (such as pentacostalism); the inability to communicate appropriately the Unity message; etc. We must be honest enough to recognize that there are some who become ordained that prove to be ineffective, and they reflect upon the Unity movement as such.

Referring to my proposal stated earlier, I do not see it as a panacea for all of the above stated ills and the many more that could be named, but I believe it, or a similar plan, will strengthen our movement and our field image in the public eye. The proposal allows for all graduates to function with the full authority of an ordained minister immediately upon placement. It allows for at least a two month placement period beyond graduation in August and still give time to serve the required eight months in the field to be eligible for ordination at Conference the following June.


I do not propose that the above requirements be mandatory for any student currently enrolled in SMRS, but that they be put into effect next fall with the new SMRS class, and that all new students be informed of this plan when, and if adopted.

Surely any ministry truly dedicated to serving in the way our Unity standards and ideals dictate will not find this action prohibitive. I believe this plan will not only add stature to the gift of ordination, but it will serve as a means to help us upgrade the overall quality of our ministers and ministries.

Should you be lead to write me on this proposal, either pro or con, I would be delighted to have your thoughts. I will ensure them a fair hearing, if Spirit leads me to bring this proposal before our Board in June. My address is 707 West 47th Street, Kansas City, Missouri 64112.

"FIRST

IMPRESSIONS"

don't need to start at a new ministry to begin establishing new first impressions of authenticity and greater caring. In fact, an amplified expression of those important qualities might proclude the necessity of starting anew someplace. Right whyou are smile more, relax, be yourself--your God-self. In your eyes, from your face, with your gestures show forth your love. Make those lasting impressions first in your ministry!

It's an old Truth: first impressions are often lasting. We can force ourselves to establish a new opinion about someone or something; not always do we put forth the effort. Likewise, other people often see you through the "eyes" of their first impression; and they may never put forth the effort to change it

In the matter of placement of ministers, first impressions are of most importance. Since the congregation sees the minister only on certain occasions—not always every Sunday even—the first impression people receive of a new minister can often last for years! In a research on chaplaincy "start-ups" with the U.S. Army Chaplain's Board of both Fort Knox and Fort Bragg, some very clear evidence emerged that ministers need to take seriously the first impressions that their congregations have of them.

A large number of people came to some firm conclusions about their minister based on the way they perceived her/him conducting his/her first worship service. It seemed that the way a minister looked the person in the eye, the firmness of the handshake, the cut of the clothes, the sincerity of the smile, the use of Bible, the skill of public speaking--all of these contributed to give a first and frequently lasting impression. When Chaplains were interviewed it was found that most of them were unaware of how short a length of time it took people to form a definite opinion of them.

This same study of Army Chaplains would indicate there are two prime things that people look for in a minister. 1) they are looking to see whether their new minister is genuinely interested in them. 2) they are looking for authenticity--is the new minister an authentic person?

"Are you authentic?" and "Do you care?" are the two basic questions the people of your new congregation will ask. They won't necessarily use those questions, but they will be looking and thinking, maybe unconsciously, toward the answers of those two questions. Whatever things they say they want in a minister, whatever kinds of labels and definitions seem important, the real importance emerges basically as to your ability to impress others that you are a real, sincere, warm human being in addition to having basic skills.

Whenever you take on the opportunity of being a candidate speaker or becoming a new minister, obviously it will be important for you to think in terms of conveying those qualities which you are. Be yourself and show your love. In fact, it might be a good idea for all of us as ministers to commit ourselves to those two important dynamics wherever we are. We

PLACEMENT

THE NEW PLACEMENT COMMITTEE

During the past year or so, we have made many changes in our Association. One important change is in the function of the Placement Committee. You have only to compare the Placement Committee Policies as printed on Pages 165-166 of the Yearbook, with the current Placement Procedures printed in CONTACT (November, 1977, issue) and available separately through the Field Services Coordinator's Office to see how different things are today than they were a few years ago. The Placement Committee no longer initiates placement since the ministers do that through their own responses to the regular placement report sent out by the Field Services Coor nator. Each minister has equal opportunity to apply for eve opening. However, the new Placement Procedures involve th Placement Committee in unique and important responsibilities. The current Placement Committee amplifies the expertise of the Field Services Coordinator by virtue of diversity of persons and their background in the field.

Currently there are ten positions on the Placement Committee. Seldom are all ten able to be there, but the wide range of input from that number of people is a great help to the Field Services Coordinator. The involvement of the faculty is an important dimension of understanding the background of recent candidates whom the Field Services Coordinator may not know. Other individuals from Unity School, the staff, and area ministers have had personal contact at one time or another with most of the ministers and ministries involved in placement.

The Placement Committee serves as a resource of ideas to insure that the Field Services Coordinator is impartial as possible in the placement procedure. Several new policies have evolved from the Board that utilize the Placement Committee as an important resource for counselling ministers who may be having professional or personal challenges. The larger committee is most valuable for the objectivity of these purposes.

The Placement Committee currently meets every two weeks. While it has been limited to ten members, we have no policy on the number for a quorum, nor is there any provision for terms of office. Perhaps a quorum of 7 could be established, and the maximum number of members on the Placement Committee could be expanded to include the (continued on page 7)

WIGGIN CREDITS UNITY FOR HIS OUTLOOK ON LIFE By Karen Brockmeyer, Lifestyles Editor

Sooner or later most of us must deal with the agony of defeat or the thrill of victory. However, probably no where is that thrill or agony felt so often as in sports. After each game someone must suffer defeat.

Kansas City fans watched this past season as their own Chiefs came up on the losing end and as coaches Paul Wiggin and Tom Bettis lost their jobs.

For Paul Wiggin, former head coach, however, there are no regrets about his decision to come to Kansas City. "I've learned a lot about life from Kansas City and the Chiefs," he said, speaking last Saturday to the Men of Unity at Unity Village.

"If someone asked me 'If you had it to do all over, would you?' I'd say 'Yes.' It has been the greatest experience of my life."

Probably the best thing that Kansas City has offered him, Wiggin said, is the chance to get involved with Unity and with Sig Paulson, minister at Unity Village Chapel. "This involvement," Wiggin said, "has transformed my thinking."

"I've really gotten close to Sig," Wiggin said later in an interview. "It's amazing. He and Unity are so ahead of their time. Everything with them is a plus. You get knocked off your feet in almost anything you do. I don't think anyone has the total control to handle all adversity. But that's where Unity comes in. When the dust clears, you can look back on it.

"About 10 weeks ago, a real shocker (his firing from the Chiefs) hit me. I thought my world was coming to an end. For a day I went toally away from everything I believe. But now I think it is all for the best."

Wiggin is not new to the thinking of Unity. His wife's mother is a minister in a church with very similiar beliefs as Unity. "I've been involved with it all my married life," he said. That involvement is obvious in many of his personal beliefs or as he calls them "Wigginisms."

Unity teaches that we must all have a belief in ourselves, think of yourself in a positive way. Wiggin does. "Some of the things Paul Wiggin did in Kansas City

for the Chiefs," Wiggin said, "are good. I believe that. I'm not walking away with my head down."

However, Wiggin said, "the syndrome of failure" is still there a little. "I've considered going into other areas of work, but I need to coach. I believe I can coach."

Wiggin, also in line with Unity thinking, goes into life assuming people are good. Because of this he sees good that most people pass up. "I've learned a lot from our players," he said, "so many people think the pro players are killers, but the really great players have a capacity for gentleness.

"In my opinion, Jack Rudnay is one of the best players on the Kansas City Chiefs. He's a fierce competitor. He won't come off of the field no matter how badly he's hurt. But off the football field you see him rushing to pick up people who can't get up."

Wiggin also sees something in Kansas City, that most of us pass up. "There's a quality of life here, that you don't realize," he said. "You all live in a paradise here."

Leaving that paradise isn't going to be an easy task. "The next step in our (my family and I) life will probably be leaving Kansas City," Wiggin said, "that won't be easy."

As a coach, Wiggin senses trouble in professional sports. "The value structure," he said, "is getting all out of focus. Many of our players have a god of money. They chase things that don't mean anything." Speaking of the high salaries being demanded by many players, he said, "what we have here is a false god. People are getting away from where it's at. Life is experience--experience with people. You can't put life in terms of dollars."

He revealed yet another Wigginism when discussing the popularity of football. "It's a diversion from the routine of life," he said. "The players lay it on the line, everything they've got. People identify with you giving your all.

"That's really what it's all about. It's not whether you get your paycheck Monday, but whether you did something special on Sunday."

LICENSED TEACHER NEWS

SKILL DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR COMING IN NOVEMBER ONLY

This seminar is ONLY for those students who complete the regular UICE program, and who wish to apply for licensing as a Unity teacher. The seminar will be conducted Monday, November 13, through Saturday noon, November 18. Therefore students should arrive Saturday or Sunday, November 11, or 12, and arrange to depart Saturday afternoon, November 18.

The 7 nights lodging will be in shared cottage rooms only, because of the incoming retreatants for the Thanksgiving Retreat on November 18, and the other accommodations will be held in readiness for them. Meals will begin with the Saturday evening meal, November 11, and end with the lunch on Saturday, November 18. The rate will be \$77 for meals and lodging, and \$13 for the registration fee, for a total of \$90 for the seminar.

Students who wish to attend the SDS must be recommended by the UICE faculty, and:

- Must have completed the regular UICE program of 150 credits and graduated.
- 2. Must have passed the written test.
- Must have taught 24 adult classroom hours in a Unity ministry. We require that the student teach these courses from Unity books on material from a selected list which is available from the Association of Unity Churches.
- Must have been recommended by the minister with whom he is working, and make application for licensing through his Unity ministry to the Association of Unity Churches.

If you have completed the above requirements, and wish to make arrangements to attend the Skill Development Seminar, your written request must be in the UICE office no later than October 1, 1978. Please get your letter in early. A maximum of 30 students will be accepted. Late applicants will be scheduled for the SDS in 1979. Those of you who will be attending Sessions V and VI in 1978 should be aware that acceptance in the Skill Development Seminar will be contingent on your successfully completing UICE and passing the test with a satisfactory grade level.

The sponsor's decision in this matter is always difficult to make, as all YOUers want to go. Help them-let them feel your support--assist them as you recognize their need for it. aware of what goes on in our world of Unity than in other people's worlds. We therefore wonder why we see evidence of frequent divorce. Divorce is a common concern with ministers' marriages of every faith, even as it occurs within all marriges.

An article of interest in the February. 1978, issue of Metro/Mica, monthly newsletter of the Kansas City Metropolitan Church Agency, suggests however, that the ministry as a whole is a high-risk area for marital problems.

In the article, Metro/Mica Editor Teri Buchanan interviewed three divorced clergymen and the former spouse of a Protestant minister, who point to two major causes of divorce among ministers: stress, and lack of fulfillment for the spouse.

A retired rabbi cited the 24-hour duty involved in the ministry, as well as seductive counselees, the dependence of the congregation on the minister to provide answers to their problems, and the subtle

All of us in Unity are naturally more but powerful pressure on the minister and family to maintain an "image."

> "Among problems a minister can experience (though not all experience every one) are pressure on the wife and children to be models of decorum, virtue, scholarship, thrift, and congregational service," the article pointed out. A Protestant minister cited the many evenings a week he had to spend away from home, but said the real problem he and his wife had was "that we both grew up. The contract we made earlier, even why we chose each other...15 years later those reasons and agreements didn't have much to do with the people we had become."

> Of course most ministers find a great deal of fulfillment from their jobs, as do most professional persons. But those interviewed in the article said they now realize that the spouse cannot be expected to be fulfilled through the husband's job, and eventually will look elsewhere if some adjustments are not made within the marriage.

IN MEMORIAM

K.O. Schmidt made his transition on December 21, 1977, in Reutlingen, Germany. K.O. Schmidt, or K.O.S. as he was affectionately known to countless of readers, was one of th most highly respected and certainly one of the most prolific contributors to the Truth movement.

Mr. Schmidt was the recognized New Thought leader in the European area. During the war in fact he was put into a concentration camp for two to three years because of his activities in the New Thought movement. He was a fine writer producing countless articles and more than 100 books which sold over two million copies. Some of his works were translated into French, Japanese, Dutch and English. One of his books, "A New Life for the Old," was published by Unity School in 1968.

Mr. Schmidt was Editor of JA Magazine, a Unity digest magazine which is published in German and is distributed with Daily Word in Germany and Switzerland. At the time of his death, he was considered the most widely read thority in the field of dynamic psychology New Thought philosophy Germany.

The Unity movement in Germany will certainly miss K.O. Schmidt and Unity followers everywhere will express their gratitude in tribute to the great contribution of this good friend of Unity.

Hassall Self, active minister of Whitehaven Unity Church, Memphis, Tennessee stepped into the next dimension on February 19, 1978. She continues on the eternal path with the love of many.

Hassall found Unity in 1932 when her husband became an invalid. Later as a licensed teacher she led the only Unity work in Memphis to great accomplishments. She was ordained in 1954 and served in Jackson, Mississippi, and Shreveport, Louisiana. In 1968, she founded Whitehaven Unity creating the third fine ministry in Memphis. God bless you, "Good Lady," on your way in love and life!

Martha Cole, licensed teacher, made her transition on March 23, while she and George were home in Tacoma. Martha has been such a blessing recently to the Unity work in Missoula while it has been seeking a minister. She had two B.A. (continued on page 13)


BILL FISCHER TO LEAVE SMRS

William L. (Bill) Fischer, Director of Unity's School for Ministerial and Religious Studies since 1968, has resigned his position effective around the time of the 1978 AUC Annual Conference.

Bill first became associated professionally with Unity in 1948, when he entered the ministerial training for Unity and at the same time became the Executive Secretary of the International Youth of Unity. (This was when Unity head-quarters was still located at 917 Tracy in Kansas City.

During the period of 1948 through 1951, while in training, he also served as a part-time assistant minister at Unity Temple in Kansas City. After graduation, he went to Detroit, Michigan, where he served as assistant minister for one year. He then went to Des Moines, Iowa, to serve the ministry there for two and a half years. He moved on to Akron, Ohio, where he remained as minister for fourteen years. In 1968, he came to the Association of Unity Churches as Director of Ministerial Education.

Bill served twelve years on the boards of the Unity Ministers' Association and the Association of Unity Churches as an elected member. From time to time since then he has been an ex-officio member

of the AUC board by virtue of his position. He also served as an elected member of the Executive Committee.

Bill was the last full-term president of the Unity Ministers' Association. He is also a past president of the Great Lakes Unity Regional Conference.

He has written extensively for the Unity publications, and his book THE MASTER CRAFT OF LIVING has been well-received by Unity readers. He has also done two cassette albums for Unity School.

Bill is now looking forward to serving once again as a Unity field minister.

The former rabbi said he is surprised that the divorce rate among clergymen is so low. The number of those "who would like to divorce but are afraid of the damage it would do professionally" is the real phenomenon, he said.

A former minister's wife said she had never considered divorce as a possibility, but once the idea occurred to her a great door was opened. She also cited the changing value toward personal growth and away from mere survival as contributing toward the rising divorce rate in the world as a whole.

"We have the time and energy to explore our inward selves. We then want to come up with answers that are best for us personally." She added that if there is no room in the marriage for these answers, then the marriage will soon be swept away.

In Unity, where we actively encourage self-growth as the goal of Practical Christianity, it would seem that making sure that goal is equally attainable by all members of a family, and not just the minister, is necessary. This would appear to be an on-going responsibility of every minister, his/her family, and the congregation. We all have much to learn. Important to that learning is the perspective that divorce is a national concern and increasingly evident in every faith. (Quotes used by permission, Teri Buchanan, Editor, Metro/Mica)

REORGANIZATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee has completed the work of translating the suggestions of the membership as given in the Reorganization Questionnaire into proposed alternate Bylaw changes. The Bylaw proposals and also other changes suggested by the membership that do not involve a Bylaw change will be sent first class mail to the membership in May.

The following are areas in the Bylaws that the Committee, in its delving and research, felt needed to be brought to the attention of the membership:

- 1. It has been the practice of the Board to amend, change, and sometimes delete parts of a Standing Committee's report. A Standing Committee's full and original report is meant for the Conference Body as well as the Board. However, the Board may validly want to make changes or amendments or deletions to the report. Therefore it is suggested that under section 7.03, OTHER COMMITTEES, the following be stated:
 - "The Conference Body shall be given the Standing Committee's original report in addition to any amendments, changes, or deletions suggested by the Board of Trustees."
- 2. Although the Bylaws call for the Board of Trustees to appoint committees, in practice the President appoints the committees. This is a holdover from the UMA when the Field Department would help the President in selecting committees. If this practice, which has merit, is to be continued the Bylaws should be changed to give the President that authority.
- Present Bylaws call for only four of the Standing Committees to report to the Board: Bylaws, Finance and Budget, Executive Committee, and the L and O Committee. Suggested Bylaw addition to Section 7:
 - "The duties and powers of all standing Committees be specified and published in the AUC Yearbook, and all Standing Committees report to the Board as well as the Conference Body."
- 4. Under SPECIAL INFORMATION, Placement Policies (page 165) it is suggested that the PLACEMENT COM-MITTEE described in the words, "The other is a working committee made up almost entirely of ordained Unity ministers who are residents here at Unity School in the AUC and nearby Unity ministries. The President of Unity School and Director of Silent Unity are also members of this placement committee."...be changed to PLACEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

In the course of looking into Placement procedures, it was found that this committee's actual duties and real help were in an advisory capacity, rather than a committee that investigates, considers, and approves every placement.

Field Services Coordinator, four full-time faculty positions from SMRS faculty, the Director of Silent Unity, the two or three other Executive Staff members (including the Director of SMRS), and three area ministers. The area ministers could be on three-year terms, one to expire annually, with the need to be off for one full year before renewed, with the idea to have new input each year. Naturally as our faculty increases then it would be necessary to rotate them also. It may be appropriate to have the chairman to be someone other than the Field Services Coordinator, appointed by the President every other year. Committee appointments could be made by the President to take effect June 30 annually.

WHO'S WHO AT UNITY SCHOOL

When the Unity Country Club swimming pool was constructed in 1922, it consisted of a concrete dam across a creek. That first summer, water was scarce, and a writer for the old Unity News declared that the pool was "muddy as Gable's coffee." (Francis J. Gable was a well-known Unity lecturer and editor of Unity's Good Business magazine.) Today, the concrete-lined pool is filled with filtered, treated water, and during the summer is a favorite attraction for the almost 500 members of Unity Country Club and their guests.

The Country Club was established in 1921, "to provide clean constructive amusements such as parties, dances, baseball, golf, tennis, hiking parties, nature study for the workers of Unity School of Christianity and their friends."

Along with Unity School workers and their families, members of local Unity centers and churches, ministerial students and employees of the AUC Office are eligible to join the Country Club, according to rules set by the Country Club Committee. UICE students and retreatants may swim free while residing at Unity Village, and can play golf by paying the \$2 greens free.

Doris Rush, Country Club secretary, handles the paperwork involved in applying for membership. Doris has worked for Unity School eleven years, and has been Country Club secretary since 1975. She encourages workers and visitors alike to make use of the fine recreational facilities offered.

The Country Club actually has two clubhouses: one is the golf clubhouse; the other is the pool clubhouse. The golf clubhouse is operated by Linda Pomeroy, and her husband, Greg, who also teaches junior high school nine months out of the year. Golf balls and other small equipment are available for sale, and clubs, golf carts, and tennis rackets for rent.

The nine-hole course began with two holes in 1921, and has expanded to include a variety of terrain and hazards. Greens keeper Max Yost stays busy throughout the year preparing and maintaining the fairways and greens at their best for maximum use during fair-weather months. He describes the longer holes as "not-too-hard," but says the three par-3 holes are considered difficult by even experienced golfers. Max is a 1975 Kansas

State University graduate in landscape horticulture, and knows his job well. His constant aim is to improve the course, and he is constantly on the lookout for ways to make it more interesting, such as planting groups of trees at strategic points. Max supervises a crew of four in their tasks of watering, mowing, and fertilizing.

The pool clubhouse, situated near the swimming pool, is a meeting place for worker, student, and Village Chapel organizations, as well as a place for private parties. According to clubhouse manager Helen Davis, there are an average of three functions a week at the clubhouse, except during the holiday season, when the facility is in almost constant demand.

Helen has an apartment in the pool clubhouse, and tries to make the whole facility as homey as possible. She has decorated the rooms, and with the help and donations from the Village Chapel Ladies Auxiliary, provides almost complete kitchen facilities for parties and dinners.

The picnic area offers tables, benches, gas stoves for cooking food, and running water. Individual members or groups of up to several hundred can be accommodated for outdoor meals here. The picnic area is the scene of retreat picnics in the spring and summer, and families often come to eat a picnic lunch after swimming on weekends. Helen is also responsible for issuing permits for use of the picnic grounds.

Workers, students, Unity ministers, and guests at Unity Village are all invited and encouraged to make use of the fine Country Club facilities. As an acticle in Unity News, printed in December, 1921, said: "The Club is to use--let's use it."

Marilyn Blessing (Hungerford). Marilyn is married to Bob Hungerford, our Unity minister serving in Topeka, Kansas. She came to SMRS from the ministry in Indianapolis, Indiana, where Charles Roth is minister. She has taken some work at both Butler University and Indiana University. Marilyn has three children. While in Indianapolis, she served in many capacities in the ministry. She also taught the outreach group in Yorktown, Indiana.

DEGREE PROGRAM AVAILABLE TO SMRS STUDENTS

It is now possible for SMRS students to earn a Bachelors Degree in Liberal Arts during the time they are enrolled as ministerial students in Unity's School for Ministerial and Religious Studies. An arrangement has been made through Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kansas, to make this possible.

Ottawa University is an accredited university which is affiliated with the American Baptist Churches, Inc. of the United States. It has established a College Without Campus in Kansas City, Missouri. It is through the College Without Campus that the program for SMRS students is made possible.

Dr. Polly Jaben-Meineke, Dean of the Kansas City activity, and another of her representatives met with **William L. Fischer** of SMRS. After examining our School and the nature of our program, it is decided that seventy of the ninety credits offered in SMRS would be transcripted as Ottawa University credits.

It takes one hundred and twenty-eight credits to earn the Bachelors Degree. Ottawa University requires taking the "Proseminar" and "Learning Contract" courses up front. This earns twenty-four credits. Added to this are seventy credits from SMRS upon graduation from our ministerial school. There remains thirty-four credits to be earned. These may be transferred from another university, or they may be earned at Ottawa University at the same time a student is attending SMRS.

Also, to the advantage of this program, is the fact that the Ottawa University classes can be conducted right at Unity Village. This is made possible through the "College Without Campus" status.

Although it will probably be next year before the full effect of this program is felt on the student body of SMRS, some students have already made application for the program. We anticipate that in future years this will be an asset to SMRS students, who desire to get an undergraduate degree while in training for the Unity ministry.

Idea Exchange

Gary Redfern, Modesto, California, has started using a special building fund offering envelope which he says brought in \$220 the first week. On the front of the envelope are the name and address of the church; the words "Building Fund" above a picture of a church; and the affirmation: "The Unity Church is a magnet of love, helping to meet the Spiritual needs of this Community. Thank You, Father, for all that we have received." Then there is a seven-day calendar where the contributor writes in the amount contributed each day, and a space for his or her name. The weekly contribution is then placed in the envelope and turned in on Sunday.

Another prosperity idea, from Duane E. Hardy, minister of Unity of Madison, Wisconsin, uses the Prosperity Bank concept. The five-week plan uses a new drill and new affirmations every five weeks. A sample program began with a letter from Duane:

"Dear Friend, Unity has for many years used the Prosperity Bank Program to help its members and friends come to a deeper understanding of the prospering truth that is within the individual. This concept is awakened through the use of the Prosperity Bank because the mind is quickened by the Daily Affirmation and the giving of substance. Many have used it to build a consciousness of God's supply, healing, and harmonizing power and have experienced excellent results.

"Do you know and believe that you have within you the power to overcome and bring into perfect harmony every situation you experience? You do! It is not always easy to uncover... to remove the layers of negative concepts, beliefs and opinions that have accumulated.

"Consciously and consistently working with this drill each day will release and bring into activity God's perfect power of good within you."

Each plan is well written and would be valuable. Feel free to contact Duane direct for sample copies. Duane says: "Since initiating this program, active praticipation has increased 300 percent. Rather than our emphasis being on the income to the church, although that has increased, the emphasis has been placed on the attaining of personal goals and overcoming. This is one of the best consciousness-expanding tools available. Reports of answered prayer from participants have been most dramatic."

Bob Barth in McAllen, Texas, recently sent this letter to his congregation. It might give you an enjoyable prosperity idea:

"Dear Friend,

Have you ever gone out into a garden and planted seeds? Prior to the planting you first made the decision on what to plant and where. Then you prepared the ground; turning it over with your shovel, mixing in the nutrients, and then leveling the dirt out for good drainage. Phil Smedstad, minister of Unity of New Port Richey, Florida, wishes to share a Valentine Sunday idea used for getting people to become better acquainted and to express love. "On the Sunday before Valentine's Day, we ask each person to print his or her name on a slip of paper. Then we pass the slips in; at the end of the service we ask each person to pick a name out of the offering bag. This is his/her Valentine. Sometime during that week we express love to that person in some way--send a card or flowers, give a gift, take him or her to lunch, etc.

"It has gone over so well the last two years. Many new friendships developed out of this project." (Editor's note: Why wait till Valentine's Day?)

Bob Hungerford, minister of Unity Church of Christianity in Topeka, Kansas, has found that peel-off, stick-on labels with the name of the church and the "Moment of Inspiration" telephone number, make a great outreach tool. The labels are to be stuck to the receiver of the telephones, and Bob says he has found one on a pay phone recently. The cost is not high; he pays \$17 per 1,000.

From Ginny Hinners, minister of Unity By The Side Of The Road, Cincinnati, Ohio: "I use a visual aid called the 'Take Apart Adam,' which effectively illustrates the various phases of man so that many can understand about spirit-soul-body. It can be made very large for classroom use, and consists of a series of human shapes, each larger than the previous one. The smallest shape is colored a dark shade to represent the visible man as we see him. The next size is a lighter color, and so on to represent the expanding self, which is on a background of the same color. It can be used for the four horseman of the Apocalypse; for superconscious, conscious, subconscious; physical, mental, emotional, spiritual, etc.

"It helps to show how by 'the kingdom of heaven is within you,' we don't mean contained within the dense physical form but an expanding self. Of course I always add that the light body is in and through all the others, with illustrations such as; smog or muddy waters still have within them the water or the *(continued on page 12)*

air or the light as the case may be. Then there is the steam-water-ice way of compressing the expanded into the denser, tangible thing. Also I use this for talking about vibration from slow to fast...too fast to see, etc.

"It also helps me to show that the mind (conscious-subconscious) stands between the invisible and the visible side of being. I also use it to show that 'My thoughts are not your thoughts' sayeth the Lord, meaning that Christ Consciousness versus mental concepts are two different levels of the thought realm.

"Another thing we use is the simple funnel with the small end being the circumscribed view and the sloping wide circle the ever-expanding horizons of Truth." ++
