AUC President's Letter

Dear Friends,

I have recently been converted. Naturally, I would like to evangalize a bit so let me tell you how my conversion happened.

The first step began a few years ago when Andy Lucas, with a politician's fervor, started a campaign for Unity ministers to "stay put" and not move around so much. At that point his comments seemed to be falling on deaf ears, including my own. When Stan became Director of Field Services, he tried to help us see the value of staying in our ministries for longer periods of time. But again, I am not sure too many of us heard or wanted to hear Stan, and last fall I voted unenthusiastically for the policy of authorizing Stan to ask ministers who want to move more than once in a twoyear period to appear before the Placement Committee. The third step in my conversion was when I came across a statement of Dr. Robert Schuller to the effect that churches are weakened by transient ministers who do not stay in one church long enough to plan and achieve long-range goals. Dr. Schuller was greatly influenced by a teacher in a seminar who advised against accepting a church unless one could see it as a long-range assignment.

Mobility, the freedom to move from church to church, has been very important to us Unity ministers. There was a great sigh of relief when placement policy

was changed so that a minister could apply to any church needing a minister. I wonder if we haven't been guided and motivated by the "Plum Principle." According to the "Plum Principle," there is a handful of plums and that is desirable, prestigious, well-paying Unity churches around the country. Then there are many more medium sized churches with more modest facilities, staff, payrolls, etc. Then we have a considerable number of churches that are small and struggling. At times it must appear that most Unity ministers are standing in line waiting for the plum. The plums fall into fortunate hands and there is a ripple effect as minister after minister moves up the ladder of success.

I think it is time that we see Unity

ministers cultivating their own plum in stead of waiting for a plum to ripen on a higher limb. In the past I have moved several times. I have enjoyed serving at different churches. I have championed our mobility, but I am beginning to see our movement non-flourish with so many of us moving every two, three, or five years. So the other day I met with my Board, and we made a covenant to move toward some long-range goals together because this church and every church could benefit from stability and the direction provided by developing and implementing five, ten, and twenty year growth plans. Remember how Rick Fillmore many years ago drew up a master plan for the campus of Unity School and how close the actuality is to his vision? Our churches need this kind of long-range architecturing. Not only in terms of buildings, but in terms of spiritual service. The church where you are can be blessed to this vision and your commitment. Wouldn't it be great to see 300 plums instead of a hand-

THE MINISTER'S

"WHEN IS

For most Christians, Sabbath is on Sunday. This is to be a day of rest. Obviously for ministers it is one of our hardest working days. Therefore, it is sometimes easy for ministers to forget the Sabbath. However we may interpret the ancient instructions, it is still necessary for ministers to take time off. If not on Sunday, then another day should be the Sabbath for the minister.

Most Unity ministers have one day a week off, and it seems that most of them have chosen Friday or Monday. There are many, however, who never observe the Sabbath. If they are not in the office, they are making hospital calls, performing weddings or funerals, or they may spend the day preparing a sermon.

The Sabbath means a time of rest. A minister should get away from his normal activities and do something else. Recently I came across a delightful chapter on this subject in a book entitled "How To Save Time In The Ministry" by Leslie B. Flynn. I would like to quote a number of excerpts from this fine article.

"Dr. Paul E. Adolph, medical examiner for several missionary societies and former medical instructor at Moody Bible Institute, tells of a minister who came to his office in nervous exhaustion, boasting that he had taken no vacation for ten years.

"He labored under the conviction that his work was of such importance that he could take no time off. But he had come to the place where he could neither relax nor sleep. Though modern treatment was prescribed, it took him almost a year (equivalent of a month's vacation for ten years) before he could actively participate in his work again.

"Because a person engages in the Lord's work doesn't grant immunity from the laws of health. Every minister should plan periods of relaxation. . . .

"This frenetic pace of our society today has permeated Christian work. One theological professor said, 'The communion of saints has become the commotion of saints, and Saint Peter has given way to Saint Vitus.' Meetings are multiplied ad infinitum. When someone remarked to a minister sentimentally that there would be no partings in heaven, he quickly replied that he hoped there would be no meetings.

"An anonymous piece asked, 'What Does A Pastor Do?' Then came the answer.

The pastor teaches, though he must solicit his own classes. He heals, though without pills or knife. He is sometimes a lawyer, often a social worker, something of

an editor, a bit of philosopher and entertainer, a salesman, a decorative piece for public functions, and he is supposed to be a scholar. He visits the sick, marries people, buries the dead, labors to console those who sorrow, and to admonish those who sin, and tries to stay sweet when chided for not doing his duty. He plans programs, appoints committees when he can get them; spends considerable time in keeping people out of each other's hair; between times he prepares a sermon and preaches it on Sunday to those who don't happen to have any other engagement. Then on Monday he smiles when some jovial chap roars, 'What a job--one day a week!'

"Some ministers who never take a vacation point out that Satan never rests. Since when do we make Satan our example? Rather we should look to Jesus Christ who one day said to his busy disciples, 'Come ye yourselves apart into a desert place, and rest a while: for there were many coming and going, and they had no leisure so much as to eat' (Mark 6:31). Someone commented on this command, 'It's either come apart and rest awhile, or rest awhile or you'll come apart'.

"C. H. Spurgeon points out,

Fishermen must mend their nets, and we must every now and then repair our mental waste and set our machinery in order for future service. To tug the oar from day to day, like a galley slave who knows no holidays, suits not mortal men. Millstreams go on and on for ever, but we must have our pauses and our intervals. Who can help being out of breath when the race is continued without intermission? Even beasts of burden must be turned out to grass occasionally; the very sea pauses at ebb and flood; earth keeps the sabbath of the wintry months; and man, even when exalted to be God's ambassador, must rest or faint; must trim his lamp or let it burn low; must recruit his vigor or grow prematurely old ("Lectures To My Students").

"A painting in the Louvre shows a plowman kneeling in the sod. Behind the praying workman is an angel at the plow. Our plowing never suffers from time spent with Him. Did it ever occur to you that the recurrence of mealtime three times daily might be nature's way of giving a break from your work? . . . Lying down for a few minutes after lunch gives recuperative refreshment. One preacher has rested after the noon meal for over twenty five years. . . . The perennial problem with clergymen is how to find time for their families. Partial answer would be to devote a period after the evening meal to children, which would also furnish welcome diversion before resuming the responsibilities of the evening.

"Spurgeon adds,

It is wisdom to take occasional furlough. In the long run, we shall do more by sometimes doing less. On, on, on, forever, without recreation, may suit spirits emancipated from the 'heavy clay', but while we are in this tabernacle, we must every now and then cry halt, and serve the Lord by holy inaction and consecreated leisure. Let no tender conscience doubt the lawfulness of going out of harness for a while, but learn from the experience of others the necessity and duty of taking timely rest.

"Every preacher should loaf one day a week. Most rest (Continued on page 4)

Monday after the hectic duties of the previous day. Some store up energy for Sunday by taking off Saturday, which also enables them to spend time with the children who are out of school. Others take a half-Saturday and a half-Monday. The busier a pastor is the more imperative this weekly change becomes.

"Some pastors try to take off an extra day or two every few months. Doctors tell us that to get full value out of time off we need a minimum of two days, for it takes the first day to unwind. Pastors rarely get two days in a row, so they should arrange for periodic breaks. A doctor told a nervous pastor 'Arrange to get away to a convention every now and then'. A minister who hadn't bothered to attend annual national conventions or semiannual state meetings found his dizziness and high blood pressure appreciably lessened by attendance at these functions. In fact, some ministers do not take their full month vacation at once in summer, but divide it into three parts, two weeks in the summer, then one in the fall, and one in the winter or spring.

"A lawyer who later became a supreme court justice was a tireless worker. Taking a few days off before an important trial, he was chided by a collegue for loafing at a crucial time. Replied the lawyer, 'I need the rest. I find that I can do a year's work in eleven months, but I can't do it in twelve.'

"When Leonardo da Vinci was doing his famous painting, The Last Supper, observers were critical of the long periods he would just sit in the cloister and meditate. When they remonstrated about his failure to be about his work, he replied, "When I pause the longest, I make the most telling strokes."

"Pauses for intensive periods of hard work will refresh, cultivate radiance, help us laugh at self, free us from oversensitivity, fill us with gratitude, renew us for our daily work, and enable us to make our most telling strokes."

This is to acknowledge receipt of your (Lari Todd) letter of July 4 with the copies of "The Star Spangled Blooper."

I too love the Peace song and my people do too. We sing it every Sunday morning, and if in the interests of time it is necessary to omit it, we hear about it! I also agree that we need a new National Anthem, but in my view the most suitable candidate would be AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL. I realize that I am not likely to dissuade you from your very laudable project, so I will not press this view.

However, if you really and sincerely want to enlist wide-spread national support in your crusade, I believe you will find it necessary to reword your pamphlet. There are a number of references that I am confident many socalled red blooded Americans will find offensive. The Star Spangled Banner did serve a purpose as you state—a very valuable purpose. Then be generous in your references to it and to its place in our history. But to refer to it as a "tired, worn out old battle hymn" and as a "blooper" runs a risk of it being regarded by patriotic groups as the American Legion and the Daughters of the American

Revolution as being insulting expressions of a subversive nature, masking a desire to overthrow the Republic. This will automatically align these and other powerful groups against your proposal. I doubt whether many will read on to discover the admirable reasons you advance for making a change. I believe you will stand a better chance of attaining your objective by remaining consistently positive and not knooking the cherished ideas of others. For these reasons I do not feel I can support your campaign as it now stands.

Since the pamphlet bears the name of the Unity Church, I am sending a copy of this to CONTACT as an open letter for publication.

I enjoyed reading the article in the October 1977 UNITY Magazine by Phil Smedstad, "The First Year." Phil's thoughts cast me back to my pleasantly active days in S.M.R.S. It is the recollection of my preparation for the ministry and an eye to the future that is the motivation for this article.

I recall being told that S.M.R.S. was not training me but preparing me, that the training would come from actual experience. Of course, nobody learns to swim until they jump in and get wet but a good swimming coach teaches water accustomation and that is what the ministerial program needs to provide. Therefore, this philosophy is not totally consistent with a student minister's needs.

Ministers are leaders, leaders of their own lives and leaders of other people who are devoting their energies to the practice of Truth and to the growth of Unity. A leader in the ministry is not just a teacher, not just a counselor, not just a Board member and not just an administrator. A leader in the ministry is not just the sum of these duties added together. A leader is responsible, totally responsible, for the direction of consciousness in his life, in the Board, and in the ministry he or she serves. If our duties, routine or not, do not relate to this purpose they serve no constructive purpose.

You may say, "So what. What's so new about this?" Look at it from this point of view. If attendance is dropping off, it income is low, if there are problems in obtaining volunteers, if there are Board difficulties, what will save you--your particular knowledge in a specific area? No. Your identity, your God-consciousness, your powerful acceptance of the Truth,"I AM a leader" applied to your knowledge. This means that you see the road ahead, you have a vision of your ministry's direction, you see the full scope of the ministry and the interrelationship of all its facets, and you express empathy to those who may be stuck in their vision of things and at the same time you encourage them to grow.

Let's consider one aspect of leadership that is vital: planning. A minister must be a knowledgeable and capable planner in terms of time, money, energy, and other resources. The word "professional" is used in terms of the way ministers desire to function and desire to see themselves and to be seen by others. Professional does not mean "expert" but simply planned and (Continued on page 8)

EASTERN REGIONAL NEWS with Alan Rowbotham:

Unity of Cape Cod, West Harwich, Massachusetts, held their Dedication Service on November 20, 1977. Pictured below are Hugh Farrington, acting president of the Advisory Board of Trustees, who acted as platform assistant, Reverend Grace Dickhaut, retired Unity minister, who lead the meditation and conducted the dedication ceremony, and Reverend Robert Preston, minister, who gave the Thanksgiving inaugural lesson for Unity of Cape Cod.



Printed invitations and a news story drew more than fifty friends and well-wishers to the self-sponsoring study group's initial service at St. Barnabas Chapel, Falmouth.

In addition to Sunday services, continuing activities have included covereddish dinner/discussions on biblical passages and Richard Bach's "Illusions," Saturday organizational development retreat/seminars, a candlelight dinner, a Sunday

service and picnic with opportunities for swimming, tennis, and canoeing at a lake-side facility, generously provided by the President of the Cape Cod Synagogue. The Unity group has developed an extensive lending library at its office in West Harwich and is issuing its first bookstore catalog with approximately 200 personal growth and New Thought titles.

In June the group moved its services to the new Seventh Day Adventist Church complex in Osterville, closer to the Cape's population center. Time of services was established at 10 a.m. beginning July 2. Cape Cod encompasses 400 square miles and 125,000 residents, and hosts several hundred thousand visitors yearly.

A unique logo design with the silhouette of Cape Cod and Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard Islands was Hugh Farrington's conception and was executed by a personal friend of Bob's who heads the graphic arts department of a major Boston computer firm. The design is used on all advertising, stationery, and service programs. Monthly newsletters were begun in the spring, and news articles are distributed regularly to the Cape's several village newspapers.

Bob reports that summer midweek classes at the Church will be augmented by social activities geared to meet the needs and interests of "native" and guest alike. An Indian Summer weekend retreat is being planned for the end of September utilizing the theme of Gail Sheehy's "Passages."

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA REGIONAL NEWS with Miki Bowen:

John Wingfield, minister of Unity Christ Church in San Luis Obispo reports that they recently received a most welcome bequest of \$21,500, part of which will be applied toward the existing mortgage and part invested for future expansion.

To follow up on the recommendations and suggestions made by the Research Committee on Regional Representatives in June, 1977, the regional board is conducting a pilot program of funding my activities as regional rep in order to greatly expand our services and assistance in the region. Serving as an associate minister in

Warren Meyer's church in San Jose allows me free time to work with other ministers who want to avail themselves of my experience and expertise, and to serve on the various regional committees. We also plan to publish a quarterly newsletter, appropriately titled "Miki's Love Notes," to draw our region closer together.

At a recent meeting the regional board voted to give a gift of \$4,000 to "The Best is yet to Be," the TV program that is presented and financed by Christ Unity Church in Sacramento. This is an excellent half-hour Sunday service that is reaching thousands of persons with the Unity message whom we could not possibly serve in any other way. The Piersons receive heartwarming letters every day from people whose lives are touched and enriched by this outstanding presentation of Truth. It is the hope of our region that this program may eventually be broadcast nationally, but it does take much financing, even in the area it now covers! 
coordinated effort toward achieving a desired goal. The minister who plans takes command of his consciousness. This is prayer. The minister who plans and determines specific objectives and remains open and receptive to intuitive guidance is carrying out Jesus' words, "I work, and my Father is working still." The minister who prays in this way is a leader and attracts to him or herself all the resources required to accomplish the desired results.

As you do, I have a special interest in the quality of our ministerial program. S.M.R.S. does not guarantee ministers of quality; that is a commitment and a dedication that comes from the individual, ordained or not, but S.M.R.S. can provide the right framework in which that continuing commitment can be made.

S.M.R.S. has produced people who are good public speakers, effective teachers and counselors, and efficient administrators, but these skills do not guarantee that the person is a leader. Leadership provides the right motive for doing what we do with excellence and provides the motive for developing an interest in those areas of the ministry in which our skills are weakest.

This article was written late last year when I was very concerned about the philosophy and direction of S.M.R.S. For various reasons printing of this was delayed, but I submit it now as an affirmation of the activity of Spirit. Let us reinforce Spirit's work by supporting and aiding our new Director, Paul Barrett, with constructive thinking.

Using the interpretation that God's good can be found in everything, the opening prayer can be, "I know God's good is everywhere. Have a secret box (a decorated shoe box) in the classroom

to get the children's attention. The children will be curious about what is inside. Later in the lesson, maybe after a Bible story, you can tell them God is in the box. They will want to look inside. Ask the children to keep the secret of what they see. (The box contains a

mirror.) The point, of course, is that they see themselves and God's good in themselves.

When preparing this lesson, gather pictures, poems, and articles to go along with the lesson idea. Discuss with the (Continued on page 12)

Responsive, capable, and dedicated people conduct the efficient computer center at Unity School. Two of these are James (Jim) Sproul, Data Processing manager, and Virginia Wilson, Data Entry superintendent.

"The objective of the computer programs at Unity School," says Jim, "is to provide better and faster service for more than two million individuals whose names and addresses comprise eleven reels of magnetic tape. With the assistance of the IBM 370-135 computer system, response to requests takes just a day or two.

"The need for an automatic electronic system for clerical functions and record keeping became apparent in the late 1960's when the number of people requesting information or literature grew rapidly. The computer allowed this increased volume to be handled efficiently," states Jim.

Jim came to Unity School during the summer of 1967 as a systems analyst to help design the present system. He says programs are reviewed and modified periodically for increased efficiency and changing need. Two recent changes are on line data entry (direct input to the computer) and

installation of an optical character reader (OCR).

Jim and his wife Gay have raised two sons and a daughter and recently moved to a new home in Lee's Summit. They are avid golfers on Unity's golf course when they can spare time between home projects. Jim likes fishing but admits he has not been able to schedule hook-and-line time lately. Jim and Gay are interested in dog shows because Gay is a dog-obedience trainer.

To show how the computer works, let us follow placement of a new UNITY Magazine subscription request into the computer. The names and addresses of all subscribers to Unity periodicals are on magnetic tape. We begin as the name and address reach the Data Entry department, the area supervised by Virginia Wilson.

Virginia Wilson has conscientiously served in this area since 1968, although she first came to work at Unity in 1951. She and her husband **Tom** are residents of Lee's Summit, and have two sons and a daughter. When she can spare the time she likes sewing, tole painting, and playing or listening to classical music. Virginia just completed a sewing project, a double wedding ring quilt for her second son's recent wedding.

The example UNITY Magazine subscription request would enter the system through one of twenty CRT (cathode ray tube) machines in Virginia's department. Coded information is keyed, or fed into these machines (which look like television sets with typewriter keyboards) by data entry operators. The subscription, now translated into machine language, becomes part of a program.

Computer room operators set up the computers for each program run and load programs into the Central Processing Unit. The CPU is the heart of the system; all information processed must first go through the CPU where it can be modified if need be, and routed to one of the output devices attached to the computer. These output devices include the magnetic tape unit on which our example subscription is now included. The new subscriber will automatically receive the magazine the next time that particular program is run once the name and address become part of the record system.

As it is directed by Jim and Virginia and their staffs, this massive rapid clerical and record keeping system is a great benefit to Unity School and the two and a half million people who rely on communication from Unity.

children how Jeff felt his freckles were a problem and how he found the good in them. Encourage the children to talk about what they might think is a problem and what good can be found for them in their situation.

Use a Bible story in which something seemed bad but turned out good such as the story of Joseph being sold into slavery by his brothers. Perhaps you can present the story with cutout figures on a flannel

board. The Bible verse could be Genesis: 50:20, "As for you, you meant evil agains me; but God meant it for good..."

After the Bible story is an appropriate time to introduce the secret box. The children will see themselves in the mirror and God's good in themselves in a new way. A good take-home project would be pictures of the children drawn or pasted on paper with what they thought were their problems written down and the good they now find, such as, "freckles--friend spots." The closing prayer can be, "Thank

you, God, for helping me always find Your good."

Subjects often come up in a class situation that have nothing to do with the lesson, such as the death of a family member or friend. Many teachers collect stories from WEE WISDOM for a classroom file on major life events such as death, a new baby, moving, etc. Sometimes it is more important to move from the planned lesson into the unexpected problem and stories collected from WEE WISDOM can help.
