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AUC President's Letter

Dear Friend -

Most of us who attended the AUC Conference at Unity Village in June were pleased with the changes we experienced, and we came away feeling it had been the most stimulating, fulfilling and rewarding Conference in many years. Purposeful change that is well planned and organized is exhilarating and exciting, especially when that change is designed to bring forth an unfulfilled potential.

Now that we are back in action in our own churches and centers, we may find ourselves safely ensconced in the status quo--the comfort zones with which we have surrounded ourselves and into which we have tended to settle. Nothing has really changed after all. For example, in your mind, quickly examine your personal situation and then project it over approximately 300 other churches, and you will see that our Movement goes on much as it did before. A better Conference does not a better Movement make, especially a Conference that was attended by only slightly more than 50 per cent of our ministers and ministries. A better Conference can be an important starting point, but our Movement cannot really change until there is a ground swell of dynamic, new, enthusiastic action that permeates the majority of our centers.

Unity celebrated its 90th Anniversary in June, but this was really the anniversary of Unity School of Christianity. The Association of Unity Churches has just become a teen-ager and is only now reaching puberty, that marvelous period in the life of an individual or entity when it begins to assume personal responsibility for its actions. Growing up is always painful, but it is always worth the effort.

Unity School of Christianity continues to be a light that shines brightly, and its growth continues to be nothing less than phenomenal with new goals established and achieved on a regular and continuing basis. We can be very proud of our parent organization and grateful for the supportive consciousness that has made these early years of the AUC as easy as they have been -- or maybe even possible.

But we must not confuse or mistake the success of Unity School with what is happening in that area of the Unity Movement in which we have been given a spiritual responsibility. Somehow, we

members of the AUC seem to have caused ourselves to believe we are doing quite well, when in fact we are not doing very well at all. We could be doing well, but we are not. We can and we will get on with the fulfillment of our responsibilities, but so far, we are a movement that is not yet in motion.

We have been given the assignment to carry the Jesus Christ message out into the world in a special way. We must prove that this system of Practical Christianity works by demonstrating its effectiveness in our personal lives and in our churches and centers. Are you aware that, collectively, we may have spent more time and energy in these last twelve years mind-wrestling over our By-laws and a few other emotional issues than we have in exploring ways to create dynamic, successful centers which truly reflect the Christ Consciousness? The time has come for us to get on with the business for which we were caused to come into being.

I believe in Unity, and I know you do, too. I believe in the Association of Unity Churches, and I believe that what we can accomplish in the world and in people's lives can be absolutely amazing. I believe we can become the bright new star that rises above the horizon of the religious and spiritual world in these last 20 years of the 20th century. But I also believe that, in order for this miracle to happen, we must come together and stop being a house divided against itself, looking back over its shoulder with hurt feelings. The time has come for us to let our centers

and churches become living proof that what we teach is true. I believe that in order for this to happen, we (that's all of us) must become willing to be changed, willing and eager to learn how to carry our message more effectively to the people who need us.

The Daily Word frequently includes "Begin Again" as its word and message for one day of the month. As the incoming President of the Association of Unity Churches, I am asking you-personally -- to do just that. Please! Please, let's begin again. Let's put aside all the things that have happened to us in the past--all the hurts and blame, all the disappointments, all disillusionment and frustration. Especially, let's put aside all the failure-mechanisms we have adopted which stand in the way of our progress. Remember, all this has been a necessary part of the painful birth of our Association and its unsophisticated childhood. Now that we are becoming mature, we must put away these childish things. If each one of us who reads this letter will pause and rededicate his or her life as a living channel of the love and activity of God, and if in that moment, we all realign ourselves with the AUC, our spiritual power will be brought into focus in one great surge of creative energy that will work for the advantage of each of us and all of us.

The Executive Staff of the AUC, the Board of Trustees and all of your Committee Chairmen are already planning an even greater Conference for June of 1980 and, even though it is a year away, I hope you will make a personal commitment at this moment to attend and to be involved. We need each other--we ministries and ministers. Our autonomy is our great strength, but it also becomes our greatest weakness if we try to go off and function by ourselves alone.

As a matter of fact, let's not wait until Conference time to get together. If you have been attending your Regional Conference, you know that is where a lot of the action really takes place and where we share our experiences, strengths and hopes with each other. I will be at your Conference because I have a number of ideas about possible changes which can create a new vitality and new growth (Continued on page 3)

in our individual centers. I am not suggesting you will want to adopt these ideas, but I believe if you will attend your next Regional Conference, you will get so turned on that your ministry and your church will never be the same again! After all, if you and I aren't excited about what we are doing--can anyone else be?

I hope to see you at your Regional Conference. In the meantime, if you have an idea that can make our Association or our centers stronger and more effective, please let me hear from you.

Together, in Unity, we can move forward into that glorious destiny for which we were given birth.

I LOVE
THE SOUNDS
OF
DEMOCRACY
by Stan Hampson



Some famous person is credited with the statement, "I love the sounds of democracy." This idea captured my imagination some time ago, and it once again came to my mind in relationship to our annual Conference.

This year's Conference was exceptional. We were able to accomplish all our work and still keep the emphasis on inspiration and faith—where it truly belonged. And oh, those glorious sounds of democracy!

How marvelous it is that we have an organization in which we can have and express our differing opinions. As one who is a vitally interested and at the same time a non-voting member, I found myself becoming so excited about how the vote was going to go following the various points of view which were expressed in so many different manners and different ways. Sounds of democracy are noisy and not always are they expressive of a high degree of efficiency, but the sharing of ideas which evolve from these animated discussions is a joy to experience.

I feel that the synthesis of ideas is true creation. It happens within us, individually, whenever we create a really good sermon. And it happens among us when we create the kind of Conference which we just experienced. Some of us used to think of God as a kind of dictator who created any way He chose, but we need to remember that the words say that He created in a plural image, which would well-reflect the synergy of a democracy. Shared ideas evolve into something good, and very good.

At this time of year we are involved in the normal placement procedure, plus the extra excitement of placing our Ordinands. It is a busy kind of democracy--watching the Ordinands choose where they want their resumes sent, sending the resumes out, and then finding which ones generate the most interest in the various churches. Frequently I have the feeling that I could do a much better job if I were making all the decisions, rather than letting consciousness sound out its own democracy. In fact, I sometimes get the suggestion (almost framed as a criticism) that I should do more to help in the placement process than I do--like telling people where

they should go and telling churches which candidates they should take. But the few times I have come even close to doing that, I have found that the people involved usually ignore my sage advice and proceed to do exactly what they feel guided to do! Strong leadership in placement might indeed be more efficient and might even avoid some "mistakes" which occasionally appear to be made. But how productive are the sounds of democracy!

Church Boards sometimes move quickly and appear to choose a minister who is seemingly inapppropriate for them. But what is "inappropriate"? What is a "mistake"? If everyone involved is truly open and receptive to the activity of Spirit, even though the action taken may result in a short-term ministry, it will be a meaningful, growing experience for each person involved.

Sometimes Church Boards move so slowly that all the Ordinands are placed before they can come to the decision to listen to any of them. And then, if they represent a small church or center, it gives them no alternative except to wait another whole year until more ministers are available. Sometimes ministers seeking their right place keep delaying their placement by putting off the acceptance of invitations to speak. But then such delays can be so helpful. I have seen ministers who stalled for several years before finally taking a church. But when they did they had learned the things they needed to learn and were really ready. Other times it seemed that some churches were stalling too long and then that they had to wait an extra-long time--but, somehow, when they were really serious about finding a minister they did so and many times they were, additionally, healed of some disharmonies out of their own past.

We all tend, from time to time, to get too specific about our good. Sometimes churches will say they don't want an Ordinand under any circumstances; others say they don't want a minister from the field under any circumstancesthey only want an Ordinand. It does seem to me, at times, that they are passing over the logical choices for themselves. Then I try to suggest; I cajole. I pray a lot. And sometimes I cry--yes, and then I laugh. And I try again to suggest. And oh, it is inefficient, it is expensive, it is noisy, it is grand. Somehow, through it all, placement occurs and it is *good!* Spirit draws congregations to ministers out of a positive or out of a negative, and they grow and learn and prosper and we continue to move forward.

God is in the still small voice. God is also in the earthquake, wind and fire. Give thanks for the sounds—the noisy sounds of democracy that take place in you and rejoice in these same sounds in your ministry and in our AUC activities. Include in your times of silence a rejoicing in the correctness of Spirit as it goes about its noisy business of drawing each minister into his/her perfect place. Love the sounds of democracy! ++



A new era for UMS has begun to unfold. With joy in our hearts and great expectation of good for the future of our ministerial training school, we welcome it. The era began with the adoption of the Education Review Committee report to the AUC Conference Body on June 18. The following is the report presented by the Educational Review Committee Chairman, Joyce Kramer:

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE EDUCATIONAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

- THAT a Council of Education be formed to insure that the quality of the Unity Ministerial School be consistent with the training of well-qualified, dedicated and effective Unity ministers.
- THAT the Council of Education shall be responsible to the AUC Board of Trustees for developing and implementing goals and maintaining an overview of the Unity Ministerial School.
- 3. THAT the Council of Education, in cooperation with the Director of Ministerial Education and subject to the approval of the AUC Board of Trustees, shall:
 - a. Implement an overall curriculum plan for UMS.
 - b. Establish a course of study for each course in the curriculum.
 - c. Formulate and implement policies for UMS.
 - d. Create scholarship programs.
 - e. Develop an annual budget in cooperation with the Finance and Budget Committee.
 - f. Determine standards for graduation from UMS.
 - g. Appoint members of all education-related committees, with the exception of the Licensing and Ordination Committee.
 - h. Set standards and oversee conduct of all matters relating to admission to UMS.
 - Prepare job descriptions for the Director, faculty and staff of UMS.
 - Develop and implement an evaluation program for UMS faculty members.
 - k. Determine the structure, qualifications and selection procedures for members of the Council of Education, with the approval of the Conference Body.
 - I. Establish levels of student enrollment.

THAT in its initial year the members of the Council of Education whall consist of the members of the Educational Review Committee who were elected by the Conference Body and Board of 1978.

I had the pleasure of rising on the floor of the Conference business meeting and speaking in support of this proposal. In my opinion, the proposal presents a practical and viable way in which UMS can be proficiently upgraded in serving the needs of the Unity Movement by drawing more fully upon the talent, experience and knowledge of our ministers in the field. I thank and commend the Educational Review Committee for the submission of this report, the AUC Board for the support of it and, most of all, the Conference Body for adopting it in a spirit of faith, love and great expectation. The staff of UMS eagerly stands ready to cooperate with the new Council of Education and the AUC Board in evolving the best plans possible to train the finest ministers of Truth.

It might interest you to know that beginning with the 1979-80 UMS school year, we will have the largest enrollment in our ministerial school history. There will be 41 MIT's (ministers-in-training) in the second year class and 47 MIT's in the first year class, making a total of 88. This represents a 52% increase over the present school year enrollment.

The full-time AUC faculty of UMS now consists of Gary Jones, Hypatia Hasbrouck and Kathryn Rowbotham, in addition to myself as Director of the school. Also we will draw upon the talents of supplementary faculty members who are on the staff of AUC and Unity School—namely Scott Sherman, Stan Hampson, Alan Rowbotham, all of AUC, and Phil White, Frank Giudici and Martha Giudici of the Unity School staff. We are deeply appreciative that the talents of these latter-named people are being made available to us.

There is much more I could address myself to in this column, but I will close with a few remarks about ADMISSIONS PROCEDURE FOR THE 1980-81 SCHOOL YEAR:

First of all, I bring to your attention that the 1980-81 school year will begin July 21, 1980. It is planned that application forms for that year will be available by the end of summer or early fall. Anyone desiring to apply is free to write the Office of the Director of UMS and request to be put on the mailing list to receive the newly-revised and updated application at such time as it is available.

I hasten to add that there are certain criteria that all prospective applicants must be able to meet in order to be qualified to apply. These criteria, as adopted by the Council of Education and approved by the Board, are as follows:

- Completion of course work in Lessons in Truth, Foundations of Unity, Part I and II, and one other basic credit Unity course.
- 2. Minimum age of 21.
- Active participation in a Unity church (center) for a minimum of one year in such activities as teaching classes, leading meditations, Sunday school teaching, platform chairman, speaker, board member.
- 4. Minimum educational background AA degree, or equivalent time invested, including courses in:
 - a. English composition
 - b. Speech
 - c. Liberal arts/humanities

this past year as Association Liaison Representatives. There are approximately 5 of these men and women currently in each of our 7 regions. They are there to help centers in times of need or, hopefully, before a situation becomes difficult. Many of them are not only trained innegotiation for the challenging periods of a center's experience, but also for times when some friendly advice or experience in areas such as building, faith bonds, or publicity might be of help. The names and backgrounds of these individuals will be published soon so that you may call upon them in time of need. Their special skills are being recorded here in the Association Liaison Representative Resource Bank which we are programing into our new Mini-Computer. In this way, if there is help needed in some special area, we can find just the right person to be of assistance to you. We, therefore, encourage you for any special need to get in touch with me here at our Association Offices. We can then provide you with the kind of assistance that will be helpful to you and to your center.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

Now that approval by the Board of Trustees has been given to increase the size of our UMS classes, we are looking forward once again to encouraging developing centers who may be seeking a minister by June of 1981. One of the more recent additions to our outreach program appears to be the potential that exists in the GreenBay/Appleton/Oshkosh area of Wisconsin. This beautiful part of the world boasts a population of well over 500,000 people, including nearly 6,000 families who receive Unity literature. Since the nearest Unity works are Sheboygan (75 miles) and Milwaukee (110 miles), it seems an ideal place for a new ministry to take root and grow. Study groups have flourished there in the past, and we are anticipating successful activities there which will tell us if this is indeed a site for a future Unity center. ++

- 6. Evidence of effective, continuous work experience.

The Council of Education will be meeting at Unity Village with the Director of UMS September 24-25. At that time, admissions procedures applicable to the 1980-81 school year will be set forth for all interested in applying. Information about these procedures will be released after this time.

AUC ACQUIRES COMPUTER

On May 15th AUC World Headquarters at Unity Village placed in operation a new microcomputer system. This system will handle all accounting functions for AUC. Additional programs acquired give the system the capability of maintaining membership lists and sorting them by name, address, city, state, zip code or any combination of the above and any of thirty other identifying characteristics. The computer also has one of the most technologically advanced word-processing capabilities available enabling it to interface with the membership list program. This gives the user the ability to produce, edit and store communications to selected groups. Many attendees at the June AUC Conference were able to view a dem-

stration of this versatile equipment.

The computer, a Model PCC 2000, is a product of Pertec Computer Corpolation and utilizes a NEC Spinwriter for high quality print-outs. Pertec was founded in 1967 and today is listed on the New York Stock Exchange indicating recognition of its size, revenues, current earning capacity and stability. Through six divisions, the company designs, develops, manufactures, markets and services computer hardware and software products.

Major emphasis at PCC is in small business systems, distributed data processing, data entry, peripheral equipment and service. Service centers are located in 83 cities in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico. Pertec also maintains service capability in Europe and the Far East through affiliated distributors.

In 1977, Pertec acquired MITS, Inc., originators of the microcomputer, which made computers for smaller organizations a

reality and an economically viable data and communications processing tool. The PCC 2000 is a fourth generation highly advanced version of the MITS/Altair 8800, the original microcomputer.

AUC's acquisition of the PCC 2000 microcomputer and the software programs was made through Advanced Micro Systems, Inc., 5209 West 94th Terrace, Prairie Village, Kansas 66207, (913-648-0600). Davi Veitch of Advanced Micro Systems will be pleased to discuss computer applications for Unity

SPARKPLUGS

The August issue of UNITY Magazine contains an article by Kenneth T. Rose entitled, "The Discipline of Delay" which deals with the seeming blockage to the fulfillment of people's desires and wants. The insights in this article may help Unity ministers and teachers in counseling, sermons, or lessons.

Author Rose reported he spend many hours meditating upon the meaning of Jesus' words in the Sermon on the Mount:

"Ask, and it will be given you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For every one who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened."

He reported that even with using what he thought was Truth he kept slipping farther away from his hoped-for fulfillment. In an interview he conducted with a Unity minister he received some insight into his seeming unfulfillment. The minister said, "I don't think a desire arises within us for which there is no fulfillment," and she explained that "our desires always find fulfillment, but very often that fulfillment arrives in an unexpected manner: it comes first in the form of delay."

His conclusion was that through the discipline of delay the desire-clogged heart will be emptied of the lesser desires or human whims leaving the path open to spiritual fulfillment which is the height of fulfillment.

Stated another way he says, ". . .the one who gives top priority to spiritual realization finds the lesser needs taken care of with one important qualification: these needs are met in such a way that their fulfillment does not interfere with the seeking for 'the kingdom."'

"Positive thinking which neglects this and occupies itself solely with the materializing of benefits to enhance its selfcenteredness is, in reality, a subtle form of negative thinking." As Jesus said in Matthew 6:33, "But seek first his kingdom, and his righteousness, and all these things will be yours as well."


YOUTH SERVICES COORDINATOR REPORT...

Are you ready?

Myrtle Fillmore heard--loud and clear--a still small voice within her asking, "Who will take care of the children?" The answer followed from within. "You are to take care of the children."

How many have been asked this question from deep within their souls?



Many in Unity have heard this calling and responded. We are fortunate to have so many fine teachers in Unity centers who realize the joy and enlightenment that comes from sharing with children. They have searched their understanding and asked, "Am I ready?" Faith and divine ideas have accompanied their affirmative answer for meeting the challenges of today's youth ministry.

Who's qualified enough to work with youth? Do you need an education degree or ministerial ordination? No. You need simply to ask, as did Myrtle. If we are directed to be involved with youth, God will guide us and give us the skill we need as we face each new challenge.

One of our greatest qualifications is the fact that we have all been children. We can ask for the guidance to relate to children, to regain our own child-like qualities, and to increase our love and acceptance of young people as each learns to express the truth of his own being. The commitment of working with children is a commitment and joy in discovering the child within ourselves.

Are you aware of the people in your church who have said yes to this commitment to youth ministry? Often these people and the youth activities they serve are less visible than other Unity functions. Youth education programs take place during regular service hours. Special activities happen on weekends or on week nights. There are quiet conversations on phones as youth education students counsel with their teachers about their own spiritual unfoldment. Teachers' meetings are held monthly; prayer panels for youth education are a constant vigil. Workers in youth education give up personal time to attend training sessions. Although some youth activities in Unity are not highly visible, you can be assured that this is a vibrant, expanding ministry.

Why do we need to provide for the youth? It is our *privilege*. Jesus said, "Except that you become as little children you cannot enter the kingdom of heaven." The special qualities of faith and love in children are great teachers for all ages.

Those of us who have been blessed with this great opportunity know that these children of the new age are coming into our lives with great truth and wisdom. We are not only sharing with children, we are learning from them.

In truth we know that all wisdom lies within the understanding of each child. It is our task with youth not so much to pour our ideas into them, as to provide a supportive atmosphere that will enable each child to explore and discover the

awareness of God in his/her life.

Many people come into my office and ask, "What is Unity doing for Children?" I can tell them about our many successful youth education programs, Sunday School materials, Teachers' seminars and consultations, day care centers and Wee Wisdom school, Youth of Unity Conferences and workshops, Wee Wisdom magazine, youth education newsletter, NEWS*NOTES, Pathway, reSPONSE, and AGAPE, and ministers and congregations that have made a firm commitment to youth and worked miracles.

But what is more important, I must reply, you are Unity. What are you doing for youth?

The materials and support system of Youth Services in Unity are vital, thriving functions of our Truth consciousness. But our primary service is our daily interaction with all young people—our attitudes, our acceptance, our love, our recognition of the wealth of Truth within each individual expression of youth. What can you do to support the youth in their quest for finding themselves and expanding their awareness of God? First, ask yourself these questions.

- How can I be more aware of and supportive of young people right where I am?
- 2. What is my attitude toward youth as they face the challenges of their unfoldment?
- 3. What unique gift do I have to share?

Am I ready? What can I do?

- Pray with our Unity Youth Education world-wide for the support of youth.
- Be aware of young people who come into your life each day--at work, at church, at home, in the community. Look for ways that you can nuture their search for God-in whatever form they are choosing.
- 3. Think of the unique gift that is especially yours to give. This might be your time to be a leader in a Youth Education department, teach a class, be a substitute teacher, a youth sponsor, provide transportation, be a guest speaker, provide materials, help renovate YE classrooms, share your experience of Truth or just observe and show an interest in spiritual youtn education.

1979 has been declared the International Year of the Child by UNICEF. This is a time of global awareness of the beauty and the challenge of growing up on this planet in the 20th century

In a recent article James Dillet Freeman wrote, "Easter means life and even more, means life not ending in death, but starting up again, more alive and beautiful, more charged with potentiality than it was before. Is there anything that stands for this more than children?"

It would be in divine order for us to realize the full measure of this truth. The day will come when we will wait, with great anticipation, our turn to share with the youth in our centers—a time when each member finds that niche where he or she feels ready to serve and to offer help, no matter how much or how little. I envision this for our consciousness of Unity.

When we reach the point of realizing our part of the youth movement, we embark on a road of increased awareness as well as of service. It is a special gift to receive the blessing of the children. There is a "you" in youth and there is also that spirit of youth within you. Are you ready? ++

HAVE YOU EVER BEEN LONELY? By Helen Hampson



Conference time is a delightful time for us all to be together at the Village. We experience the feeling of coming home again. . .we see so many people we enjoy. . .we have fun talking and sharing happenings which have taken place in our lives and in our churches since last we met.

One day during Conference I had lunch with a friend who is the wife

of one of our truly successful ministers. She is an outgoing person-involved with her church in many ways. She shared with me many of her feelings about this Conference, some of which were, admittedly, pretty negative. While she considered the Conference meetings valuable, she found herself experiencing feelings of depression and loneliness. She had expected to come back to Conference for a time of warmth and sharing with old friends, but her expectations were not being fulfilled. After a warm "hello" and ". . .so good to see you!"--nothing. That was all she could say to her friends. And so she had begun to wonder: is that all there is to friendship? The loneliness crowded in; she felt alienated, hurt, confused. She wanted to be part of some of the good happenings; instead, she felt left out and unable to turn the tide. With her approval and consent, I shared some of her feelings with other spouses as the week went on, and this sharing developed into a new awareness. She discovered that she was not the only one experiencing these feelings. Others, too, felt left out, lonely, lacking confidence to initiate activities or conversations.

When we find ourselves feeling like misfits, we are rarely in the state of mind to perceive that others are in the same boat, that they, too, feel excluded from the center of the social whirl. They see others going to lunch, sitting with special friends at the banquet, chatting with still other friends in the rose garden. The feeling of isolation grows.

Every person has a shy streak. Our own always seems larger than anyone else's, perhaps from closeness and familiarity. Conference is a high-energy time, which increases tensions. Also, we spouses and ministers are in an entirely different element from our churches, where we feel secure. Our insecurities are easily activated in this Conference involvement. If you, too, have had the feeling of being an "outsider," you may find consolation in the knowledge that you are part of a good club—others are feeling the same way.

Which brings up this question: what are you willing to do to rid yourself of these feelings? If attending Conference brings them out, is it possible that you may have these same feelings in other situations in your life? You may want to deal with this idea, recalling other times when you reacted in this

same way. Away from church? In large groups? Is there a pattern?

One of the ways to deal with these feelings is to recognize the problem. Then remember that others have them, too-you are not alone. Even those who appear to exude an abundance of self-confidence may, secretly, feel the same way you do. They may only appear different. Or perhaps they are simply taking these same feelings and doing something more constructive with them. Feelings of inadequacy need not make us strangers; indeed, they may tie us closer to others and bring us more comfortably into the family of man.

Certainly we can use our teachings in these situations, too. Tell yourself, for example, that you are bright, attractive, outgoing and fun to be with. Arm yourself with positive thoughts so that you may prepare to take positive action. Initiate some activities—lunch, a tennis match, shopping on the Plaza, or just a walk in the rose garden. Remove your attention from your own feelings and focus in on others who may feel even more insecure than you do. Take them under your wing. Help them out. Introduce them to others. Give them your special attention and interest.

Isn't it ironic that here we have a very special, exciting group of people, many of who are feeling lonely and left out? Because we do have so much in common, we really can create our own fun. The problem is ours. The solution is also ours!

I sincerely believe that the feeling of being "left out" is a very strong one which crops up at Conference time. This belief is based on conversations with many other spouses. We need to give this some thought, for our own individual growth and for that of others, too. If you'd like to share some thoughts on this subject, make some comments (with or without signing your name), or if you would like to write an article to share with others, write to me in care of the AUC Office.

MINISTERIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES CONCERNING THE LICENSED TEACHER PROGRAM

Since January, 1979, the Ministerial Advisory Committee has conducted a study of the Licensed Teacher Program and the existing conditions pertaining to Licensed Teachers and field ministries. A set of resolutions assigned to this Committee has been sent to more than a dozen respected and experienced field ministers, asking for their experiences, comments and recommendations. Talks were held with both Licensed Teachers in the field and with present UICE students. Rather than discuss each resolution, point by point, the Committee instead directed its attention to specific problem areas concerning Licensed Teachers which also focus attention on specific resolutions, allowing a grasp of the total picture instead of just isolated incidents.

The Committee's recommendations, therefore, include all the thoughtful ideas and suggestions of the field ministers, the joint AUC-Unity School Teacher Training Committee as well as its own.

The Association Office is frequently involved in field problems concerning the Licensed Teachers, which raises a concern about the ethics of some Licensed Teachers. Specifically, these are teachers who attempt to usurp the rights and responsibilities of ministers (old or new.) Included are some teachers who have tried (sometimes successfully, sometimes not) to cause divisions within a church, urging the members to choose sides between the minister and the teacher. When a change of leadership occurs in a ministry, some Licensed Teachers have prevented ordained ministers from being invited to serve that ministry.

It is well to remember that ethics cannot simply be enforced by the passing of more or stricter rules, regulations or bylaws. The present "Ethical Code" (pp. 65-66 in the Yearbook) spells out clearly the standards and ethics required of the Licensed Teacher; if followed, most--if not all---of the problems would be nonexistant.

Basically, the handling of all ethical problems involving Licensed Teachers is the responsibility of the minister. The Licensed Teacher works for the minister and for the ministry. Their relationship should be based on an understanding of this distinction. Any question about the deviation of the Licensed Teacher from his/her own responsibilities in thought, motivation or activity, should immediately be confronted and questioned by the minister in charge. This has several important ramifications, including the entire attitudinal philosophy of the teacher. For example: when the church is between ministers, the AUC office may write to any Licensed Teacher working in that church or center and advise him or her that a new minister will be taking over shortly. (This is really no different from the situation where a business changes managers.) The teacher will be expected to work for the new manager--in this case, the new minister--and it will be entirely at the discretion of the new minister whether or not the teacher will be kept on. This is not intended to frighten the teacher but it merely to reemphasize the basic, fundamental relationship between the teacher and the minister, regardless of who that minister may be. In addition, the departing minister should counsel with his teachers and the Board of Directors as to

what their relationship with each other shall be; if such minister does not feel that he is in a position to take this action at this time, the Regional Representative or an AUC representative should do so.

There appears to be an idea prevelant in the field among Licensed Teachers that they have their own domain within the church itself. This must be corrected. If, after talking with the Licensed Teacher in the face of such adverse circumstances, the minister feels that the situation has not been resolved, he (she) should advise the teacher that there is distinct possibility that his/her license may not be renewed, since such annual renewal requires the recommendation of the minister. Any grievance felt by the teacher after the revocation of a license should then follow the established organizational procedure. It appears that the AUC does have the authority and responsibility to decide whether a license shall be renewed or revoked, but this has not been exercised to any measurable degree. The Committee, therefore, recommends that this authority be used by the reporting minister in either recommending or not recommending the renewal of a license, and that it be followed up by the AUC office. This should place the responsibility where it properly belongs--with the minister, and not with the AUC headquarters.

It is further recommended by the Committee that channels for communication be kept open between the Licensed Teacher and the minister, as well as between the Licensed Teacher and the AUC. This certainly would help avoid and eliminate many of the ethical poblems which have arisen in the past. In many cases, the Licensed Teacher simply does not feel a part of the whole, or experiences a sense of segregation because of a lack of communication with either the minister or the AUC.

The Committee, therefore, recommends the following:

- 1. Reeducation of the field ministers regarding their relationship with the Licensed Teacher. The Licensed Teacher works for the minister in the various activities of the church. The minister is the supervisor, and is in charge of all church activities.
- Field ministers should be made aware that the renewal of the Licensed Teacher's license is issued on the basis of their recommendation, and is not the sole responsibility of the AUC office.
- It should be made known to all Licensed Teacher that, if they are refused a renewal of their license, there is a grievance procedure they may follow.
- 4. Licensed Teachers should also be advised that there is a special segment of the Regional Meetings devoted to Licensed Teacher—Minister relations, including the responsibility that each minister has to direct the work activities of his/her Licensed Teacher(s).
- Continued and stronger emphasis should be given to SDS people by the Field Representative of the Division of Ministry Services concerning relationships, ethics, etc.

The Committee further addressed the question: what is a Licensed Teacher? The answer is that a Licensed Teacher is a resource person for the minister whose role should extend beyond that of merely "teaching a class." If the need arises, the Licensed Teacher should be prepared to organize--or assist in the organization of -- a Youth Education Department. for example. (In this regard, emphasis on the UICE Youth Education Seminars should be encouraged or even made mandatory.) Conceivably, the Licensed Teacher could also be asked to work in the office or anywhere else where the minister has need for qualified help in the operation of his ministry. The Licensed Teacher is definitely a "member of the team" and should be in the position of strong-right-arm to the minister when the right working relationship has been established. Both a "leader" and a "follower," the Licensed Teacher shall fulfill whatever requirements are established as necessary and desirable by the minister.

Becoming a Licensed Teacher is not a short-cut to ordination. Ordination requires nearly five times the number of hours of class study presently required by the Licensed Teacher program. In addition, with the exception of the 24-hours of practice-teaching called for in the program, the training is entirely theoretical, without practical experience in such things as center operations. At present, Licensed Teachers are simply not trained to be ministers. With improved ministerteacher relationships in all areas, the goal of the Licensed Teacher need not be "ordination-by-exception" but rather a growing toward added professionalism and dignity in overall abilities and accomplishments in being of increasingly greater service to the minister and to the entire ministry. It is, therefore, the recommendation of the Committee that Licensed Teachers not be ordained. Should an extraordinary exception occur, the Committee would be willing to consider this case on its individual merits.

The UICE training program is an ever-growing and developing system, benefiting from a healthy self-examination by its faculty bolstered by input from students and graduates of the

program. For example, a recent change has been the requirement that a student declare himself/herself a definite candidate for licensing upon completion of 100 hours of credit. Following this declaration, specific and personal counseling may then be given and added control and direction fixed. Additionally, certain skills courses which had been taken out of the UICE program are being put back because of needs discovered during SDS evaluations.

Recent SDS graduates have proposed that Licensed Teacher might get together and form an organization to share mutual interests and information and enhance their professional standing. The title "Association of Unity Teachers" has been suggested and has been used, on occasion, in various communications. It is a matter of concern that, under the terms of its charter and bylaws, the Association of Unity Churches already has the responsibility and authority to provide control of Licensed Teacher activities and that there is, therefore, no need to form an "organization within an organization." The Committee does, however, believe that the Licensed Teachers should meet in groups to upgrade their professionalism through common concerns, conference programs, or seminars suited to their interests. In addition, this Committee feels that such a group could accomplish a great deal in maintaining standards and ethics and keeping open the lines of communication between the Licensed Teachers and the AUC.

In the interest of consistency with local church organizational policies, the grievance procedures open to Licensed Teachers are designed for the solution of problems on the local level. Since it has been established that licenses are to be maintained at the discretion of the minister, it is appropriate that the minister and the Licensed Teacher resolve any differences between them. If no resolution can be reached, the Licensed Teacher may appeal to the Regional Representative and through him/her go on to the AUC office.

It is also the feeling of the Committee that the overall direction of the Licensed Teacher program and its various ramifications are so complex and so vast that they deserve a special Committee which could devote its entire attention to this subject. All recommendations herein stated are the unanimous decisions of those serving on this Committee.++

EXCLUSION OF WOMEN FROM THE MINISTRY GOES AGAINST THE BIBLE...

REPORT ON REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES by Miki Bowen

In June 1977, the AUC Conference body approved the REPORT OF THE RESEARCH COMMITTEE OF REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES, of which I had served as a member with Gary Jones, Alan Rowbotham, and Charles Neal, chairman of the committee. In considering my activities of the past year as regional representative, I discovered that I have been performing most of the recommended duties and responsibilities as outlined in that report. I list them as follows:

1. RESPONSIBILITIES

- (1) Corporate responsibility as a trustee of the AUC.
- (2) Act as liaison officer between the Board of Trustees and my region.
- (3) Represent the interest of the region in all corporate matters.
- (4) Advise the Director of Ministry Services on matters of placement in my region.
- (5) Render assistance to center ministers and ministries in my region, as a result of consultation with or communication from the DMS.

2. DUTIES

- (1) As a member of the AUC Board of Trustees to place first in my thinking the best interests of the Association as a whole.
- (2) To represent the region by presenting to the Board of Trustees matters relating to my region and stating the recommendations of my region.
- (3) To advise the DMS on matters relating to placement and any other concerns vital to the success of the Unity Movement in my region.
- (4) To be alert to areas in my region with the most potential for the establishment of new ministries, and to advise the Outreach Director.
- (5) To carry out any liaison assignments between ministers and center boards when requested to do so by the DMS or by the local center.
- (6) To actively encourage the moral and financial support of the AUC and its programs and activities among ministers in my region.
- (7) To encourage ministers in my region to furnish the Association Office of the personnel, attendance and financial information requested in the Annual Report form. (I have not been doing this. Have you?)

- (8) To ensure that copies of minutes of regional meetings are forwarded promptly to the Association Office. (I have not been doing this. Have you?)
- (9) To keep the Association Office informed of dates of important regional and subregional events, as retreats and meetings in my region.
- (10) To be available to meet with the DMS at the January and June meetings and to advise on matters in my region.
- (11) To the best of my ability and insofar as time and circumstances permit, to maintain close contact with the ministers in my region, to help and advise them on request, but in no way to interfere with the conduct of a ministry.
- (12) To be available at the request of a minister to explain to a ministry board or congregation Association policies (e.g. salaries, pension plans, moving costs, vacations, bylaws, tithes, etc.)
- (13) To establish contact with and to welcome all newly assigned ministers and licensed teachers in my region.
- (14) To keep ministers informed by letter or bulletin on matters relating to the Association Office and regional activities.
- (15) To be, when possible, a clearinghouse of information relating to speakers and organizations desiring to speak on Unity platforms. (Not being done.)
- (16) When possible, initiate and plan, or cause to be planned itineraries for guest lecturers within my region.

3. QUALIFICATIONS

- (1) Has a commitment and loyalty to Association and regional organization and programs.
- (2) Has several years of successful experience in the field ministry.
- (3) Is possessed of tact, diplomacy and is conciliatory.
- (4) Is free from hostility, bias and prejudice.
- (5) is self-controlled and not easily ruffled in the face of opposition.
- (6) Is adept at handling people and situations.
- (7) Is able to take a strong stand for principle.
- (8) Is familiar with Parliamentary Law. (I am, somewhat.)
 Are you?)
- (9) Has the time, freedom and willingness to carry out the duties listed above.
