

### AUC President's Letter

Dear Friend-

A wonderful idea just came to me!

No, it wasn't an idea I thought of. It came to me from someone else. This must be one of those powerful ideas whose time has come because it came four different times in two days from four Unity ministers scattered across the country. This idea is so exciting and stimulating to me that I knew I had to share it with you to see what your reaction would be.

The dynamic power of this idea first struck me on a Tuesday morning when I opened a letter from a fellow minister who is so excited about what is happening in his church, he can hardly stand it! He wrote that he had become disillusioned and greatly disappointed by his life as a minister and was seriously considering changing iobs -- when suddenly it was revealed to him that the ministry was not a job, but a very high calling to one of the world's most respected professions. It was a revelation that changed his life. . .and his attitude. . . and his whole approach. He decided to become a "professional," or "one having great skill and an assumed competence in a particular field or occupation!" He wrote, "Jack, you would hardly believe how the changes I have made in the way I conduct my ministry have affected our whole congregation, and I would like to share this experience with my fellow ministers."

In that last sentence was the idea, but I didn't see it yet. Even though his letter had me so motivated that I was already examining my own ministry to see what else needed to be improved, I was not yet aware of how deeply he had touched me.

Later Tuesday morning, I called Jim Sherman in Toronto. As you know, Jim is the Vice-President of the AUC, and while we were talking, he told me of an experience that took place during a three-day retreat in August. They did an hourlong program called, "An Exciting Idea," in which four Unity ministers each gave a tenminute talk on one really exciting idea that has them really turned on in their own ministries in their consciousness right now. Iim said, "Those talks set that whole group and me on fire! They just absolutely put us on fire!" It was the one program that just had everybody humming and buzzing and talking! We were excited and inspired--and it happened to us four times in one hour!"

Now the idea was really getting my attention. We ministers spend our lives inspiring and motivating others, but provide ourselves with almost no opportunity to improve our skills and to be stimulated by the excellence being demonstrated by our peers. "Regeneration" for us is a trip to the mountains or the beach--away from the telephone--or an extra hour in meditation! Sometimes we even appear to avoid or resist hearing from those excited and delighted members of our profession who are demonstrating new levels of excellence--and those people are our most valuable resource.

On Wednesday, two more letters in the same mail did it! The first writer closed with, "We have some dynamic and beautiful people out there' who may be just the stimulus the movement needs to inspire us to the accomplishment of our objective. Jack, help us to find a way to hear from them." The second letter was from one of those "beautiful people"--a lady minister who made her church sound so exciting that I want to slip into the back pew some Sunday morning and take notes of changes I need to make in my own service. (I did order a cassette tape of her service.)

I know that in our Unity Movement, we have a number of people who are genuinely excited about something in their own ministries, or in Unity's teaching, or in their own presentation of Unity principles that has them really turned on, and they in turn have turned their churches on. I know we have some ministers who have discovered new levels of effectiveness in leadership and new techniques from which we could all profit. At this moment, I am not talking about metaphysics. Sometimes we ministers get so metaphysical, we forget who the "center leader" is. We are the center leaders, and we have the responsibility of conducting a successful business (Continued on page 4)

If you are one of these "turned on" people, the rest of us need to hear from you! Perhaps you can help us all to become better center leaders. We need to learn from you and to be inspired and motivated by you. We need to take as many of your ideas so we can use and put them to work in our own centers and churches.

The idea that came to me is this: We are going to discover and invite those of you who seem to have the most exciting ideas to speak to us at Conference in June of 1980. A different person will start each morning and each afternoon session with one of these "Here's An Exciting Idea" talks. The easiest way for us to discover who you are is for you to write and tell me all about what has you so turned on. I can't wait to hear from you, so call your secretary in and dictate a letter to me as soon as you finish reading my letter to you!

When psychiatrists or surgeons get together, or geologists get together, or engineers or architects get together, or when any professional group gets together, the highlight of their conference is not their business meeting. Their primary purpose for gathering is for an exchange of ideas through the presentation of papers to each other and the subsequent publication of those papers. Professionals in all fields come together so they can profit from the advanced knowledge that is being presented by some of their members. A real

professional is aware that there is always a better way to do what he or she is doing. A true professional should never stop seeking to improve his/her techniques and sharpen his/her skills.

I have heard such marvelous reports of the Robert H. Schuller Institute For Successful Church Leadership that I am taking Karen, my wife, and Thelma Hembroff, my Associate Minister, with me to the seminar scheduled October 31—November 4, 1979. If you still have time to arrange it, I would like to meet you there. My own professional life as a minister came to me late, and I know that as yet, I am not nearly well-enough prepared to properly fulfill the responsibilities I have assumed. I still need all the help I can get to become a successful minister.

If you have an exciting idea, please let me hear from you. Your idea just might be the one that keeps some discouraged Unity minister from looking for another "job!"

"Put People to Work"

This month I want to share with you some important ideas from an excellent little book entitled "How to Save Time in the Ministry" by Leslie B. Flynn. The author was most gracious and for a modest fee gave his permission to share these excerpts. The ability to delegate responsibility is imperative for the growth of a ministry. How much of the work do you share and how much do you do?

"I have never mimeographed a page in my entire ministry," said one pastor. "I do not know how. And I refuse to learn!" He added, "When our church purchased a new duplicating machine a few years back, the salesman offered to teach me how to operate it. Politely, but firmly, I showed him the door."

This pastor's refusal to mimeograph does not stem from any aversion to soiling his hands but from dislike of devoting valuable time to tasks which can be done by members of the church. "When I have been trained to minister the word publicly from pulpit and privately in interview, why should I give precious hours to what many others can so ably and willingly do? I need every minute to study and counsel the souls entrusted to my care."

Dwight L. Moody said, "Put ten men to work rather than do the work of ten men!" Assigning work to ten men multiplies a pastor's time tenfold. One pastor operated on the policy, "I never do anything that someone else can do."

#### Delegating Work Is a Scriptural Principle

The nonmimeographing pastor was following a Biblical principle.

When Jethro visited Moses in the wilderness, he noticed that his son-in-law was wearing himself out by acting as judge for every complaint arising among the people. Perhaps Moses had not delegated authority to anyone because he distrusted the ability of his countrymen so recently removed

from serfdom. To save from exhaustion both the time and strength of Moses, Jethro recommended the appointment of subordinate judges who would handle all cases except those too difficult, which would be referred to Moses. So Moses chose capable men to rule over thousands, hundreds, fifties, and tens (Ex. 18:13-27).

When the modern pastor delegates work, he follows in the same pattern.

#### Jobs That Can Be Delegated

If a church cannot afford a part-time secretary, the pastor may be surprised at the willingness of capable members to do office tasks. For three years a young stenographer and her girl friend came one night a week to the church office to take the pastor's dictation and file. Much valuable time was saved that minister till the church could swing the services of a paid secretary.

No pastor should be saddled with janitorial jobs like arranging chairs or putting out hymnbooks. Nor should he be bothered with minor matters like the frequency of piano tuning, the color of choir robes, nor the type of refreshments at the next social. Nor should he have to count the people present in the Sunday and midweek services. Rather, assigned personnel should report church, Sunday school, youth, and prayer meeting attendances promptly. When a church official passed away suddenly, leaving insufficient time for the congregation to learn the time of the funeral which had been incorrectly stated in the newspaper, the pastor asked one of the church ladies to organize a phone brigade to pass along the pertinent information, which resulted in a large attendance at the service. A lady who has taken a short correspondence course in journalism efficiently handles all news releases for her church.

Taking a leaf from the practice of busy doctors, many preachers today suggest that members, unless incapacitated, come to the study to talk over problems, instead of the pastor making house calls. Besides saving the minister's traveling time, this method guarantees privacy for the interview. The pastor should not consume precious moments running to members' homes on the slightest beckon.

#### The Pastor Must Develop Leadership from Among His Members

The four steps in good executive administration are: analyze, organize, deputize, and supervise. Restating these points: survey the problem, design a plan, assign competent helpers, then call to accountability. (Continued on page 6)

In deputizing his helpers the pastor should inspire, motivate, and create enthusiasm. One Sunday school teacher said of his pastor, "He makes you want to do the job." President Eisenhower offered this definition of leadership, "The art of getting somebody to do something you want done because he wants to do it." Wayne Dehoney, Southern Baptist pastor in Jackson, Tennessee, says, "In delegating responsibility, delegate authority too. Don't try to keep your hand on what you delegate to someone else." Supervise, but don't "snooperize."

The Promotion and Editorial Departments are working together to bring a service to you--an overview of literature that may be helpful to your center ministry. We will use this space to point out material in our periodicals and books that we feel may be of particular interest to you.

SPARKPLUGS

Young people sometimes find that persons upon whom they rely may prove unreliable. This can be a hurtful experience during the preteen years when peer-group relationships are very important. It is frequently through pain, however, that people are brought to see the need to change their thinking. A temporary frustration can spur a person on to new ways of life.

According to the law of cause and effect, no matter how adverse the situation may be the providing presence of God always supplies exactly what is needed to resolve a situation.

The October issue of <u>WEE WISDOM</u> Magazine contains a short story that illustrates these points. "Belinda and Her Too-Curly Hair" can provide material for a youth sermon or lesson for those between the ages of ten and fourteen. The story can be used to help young people learn to rely on the true source of strength, the Christ Spirit within, and this can give youngsters a sense of real security that is not dependent upon their peer group.

In this story, several girls in Belinda's fifth-grade class make a pact to give themselves the same type of home permanent on the same night so they will all have curly hair when they go to school the next day. Belinda asked her older October 1979

brother, Randy, to give her a home permanent that evening. Randy has many misgivings about the situation but complies. The permanent turns out much too curly, and Belinda is dismayed by her appearance. But even more unfortunate is the fact that Belinda is the only girl in the group who honors the pact to have a permanent. She is laughed at by a friend before school the next morning. "Oh, Belinda, you always believe everything. Imagine anyone doing that to their hair."

The providing presence of God supplied the answer through a word of advice from her older brother, "You can have your hair straightened tonight and look just like your friends again or...you can wear your too-curly hair proudly and be an individual." This helped Belinda to accept her appearance.

The good Biblical reference is from Psalms 23:6: "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life." The aim of the story is that the readers gain a greater insight into the law of cause and effect and its action in all areas of life, learn to trust that Christ Spirit within for a sense of real security, and be inner-dependent, not outer-dependent.

First, there is the joining together of our UMS faculty, some new and some old in terms of service, and the witness of them melding together

into a spiritually oriented, cohesive body eager to serve.

Second, there is a coming together of a new UMS class for the first time, the largest in our ministerial training school history. Wheretofore, in the processing of applicants for admission, this class was comprised of 46 separate individuals. Now it is melding together into a unit of dedicated souls, forming early its own personality and character as a class body.

Third, there is a joining together of the first year with the senior class, combining to make it the largest enrollment on record for our school. The big brother (or sister) class of second year ministers-in-training are diligently at work blazing a trail of love and caring, of total sharing to make bright and easy the way for the first year MIT's.

"To Nourish The Sense of Wonder"

Ten years ago, I was in my first year of ministerial training here at Unity Village. Harry Young, a fellow student, was asked to open the class with prayer. He prayed, "Father, we are amazed and mystified to find ourselves here!"

Harry's prayer has stayed with me over the years. Once again, it echoes in my heart: "Father, I am amazed and mystified to find myself here!" Just a few days ago my wife, Kathryn, and I were sitting in our apartment at Unity Village, reflecting upon the events of the past few months. It seemed to us as though we had suddenly been catapulted into a new place and new positions, and we were still reeling from the overwhelming significance of it all.

There is such a feeling of rightness to be doing what we are doing, here at Unity Village, a feeling which persists to this day. Certainly, we went through a great deal of pain in separating from our loving friends and the ministry in Roanoke. Virginia, which we had built up virtually from scratch and loved so dearly. Then, it was not without a sense of trepidation that we moved into our new positions, Kathryn as a faculty member and myself as Field Services Projects Coordinator. Both of us have struggled with ourselves, agonized over our doubts and fears, felt unsure of ourselves and even inadequate to the task that is ours to do. Yet in the midst of it all is the sense of a loving presence which surrounds us as if we were in a sea of wonderment.

I wanted to convey to you some sense of what we are feeling, for two reasons: First, because I know that many of you who will read this also feel or have felt the same struggle within yourselves, frustration and impatience perhaps, even a lack of self-worth or inadequacy from time to time. Yet I know too that you have found when you keep on, out of that "keeping on" something beautiful is born; something real is born.

I am reminded of a letter I recently received from my youngest daughter who lives in England. She left home this summer for the first time and got a summer live-in job as a waitress in a resort town far away from where she lived. The feelings she is experiencing are the same ones that are repeated time after time in our lives as we move into new experiences and different surroundings. Yet when we step out boldly, all the difficulties and obstacles fall away and we are strengthened by our new experience.

Some of you have just moved into new ministries, some of you have just started a new year of ministerial training, some of you are moving into building projects, new classes, new experiences in your personal lives and in your professional lives. If you get into the feeling of being overwhelmed or lacking in self-worth, I suggest that you remind yourself that you may be simply misreading the signals of the creative effort. The creative process demands our whole being, even to the point of giving up, before the new idea comes forth, the talk is given, the class is taught, the demonstration comes forth, the new relationship is established.

In an article on "Creativity," in Synthesis, James Vargiu refers to the creative process as being in five stages: preparation, frustration, incubation, illumination, elaboration. It is well for us to be aware of this process. With this awareness, we are not so liable to get caught up in the early stages as to fail to move through into the final stages of the creative process. We can learn to "ride the wind," as it were, and live at the point of creative expression where the unknown becomes the known and the invisible moves into visibility. Teilhard de Chardin calls this the "greatest glory to man," where we accept our "natural place not at the center of the universe, as was once believed, but at its fulcrum, the pivot point, the bridge, the life line, the agent through whom the energy of the universal creative field can flow."

Secondly, I wanted to share my feelings with you because I agree so strongly with a statement made recently by the Dalai Lama during his visit to the United States. "I have noticed so often," he said, "if people dare to reveal their innermost concerns, their reality, if they speak from heart to heart, there is perfect understanding. All barriers fall away and communication is so easy."

As Unity ministers, let's not be afraid to reveal our innermost concerns to one another, to speak heart to heart. We have much to share, much to learn, much growing to do together. From my new position here in the AUC office, I'd like to facilitate that sharing and growing together in any way I can. I would like you to help me, if you will.

l ask that you remind yourself of this, with me: (Continued on page 9)

we can become the best ministers we are capable of becoming; we can enlarge and expand our ministries; we can help the Association of Unity Churches become all that it can become and see the Unity movement as having the capacity to be the greatest vehicle for the teaching of Truth that the world has ever seen. But in all of this, let me not make the simple ever more complex. Let me not forget the example of Jesus Christ,



An old VISTA maxim states, "If you're not part of the solution, you are part of the problem." If indeed the culture of youth is a challenge in our age then Unity is definitely providing opportunities and alternative solutions for youth to explore their true nature. We expose our young people to basic Truth principles and help them to see how these principles apply to their daily life. We send them into the laboratory of life to test these formulas, and we accept them when they return to us with reports of successes or seeming failures. We re-negotiate and re-apply the principles together and again they are tested. As teachers and ministers we provide vital support systems for young people and in turn the youth have many lessons to teach us about living.

I wish everyone at some time could have the exhilarating experience of being in my shoes (well worn as they are) and seeing the miracles that happen when people of all ages gather together to learn from one another. This summer we have had the Youth Education Seminar, the International Youth of Unity Conference and the Young Adult Retreat. What a tremendous affirmation of the joy and learning of youth! The young people at the conferences were alive and vibrant expressions of Truth. They touched the hearts of everyone here at the Village. They acknowledged the challenges of growing up in the 70's but expressed beautiful insights for facing October 1979

the tough times steadfast in love and faith.

Each day I meet with or correspond with youth and youth leaders that are creatively working with Truth in their lives and in their centers. Teachers, sponsors, and students are finding a beautiful balance of learning from each other. A center that is involved "intergenerationally" is a center that is resounding in harmony.

Unity is becoming a model of working with youth because we realize that each stage of this life experience provides beautiful opportunities for learning and teaching. This is evidenced by the 75 year young woman who attended the Young Adult Retreat; the YOU Sponsor at Conference who felt he learned more than the kids; the YE Seminar students who gave up two weeks of vacation to attend UICE and become better youth leaders; the manager at the Pizza Hut in Dallas, who after being decended upon by 100 hungry, enthusiastic post-rally YOU'ers told me that they were the most helpful and loving group of people he had ever served.

These are the experiences I draw my impressions from. In the Unity movement we are not anti-youth. We embrace the openess, adventure and love of youth as the gifts they can remind us of when we lapse into forgetfulness about what this business of life is all about.

We are providing a vital and loving service. I bless you, as a Unity minister, for actively supporting and providing spiritual guidance for youth of all ages.

Now if I can step down from my soapbox a moment to discuss what is happening in the office...

Thank you for your WonderFull response to WonderWord. Many of you have called the office for additional copies. As stated in the AGAPE newsletter, Quarter I, this is a pilot issue to determine the need from the field. We printed 1,500 copies only. One copy was sent with AGAPE to each center. Each Youth Education Facilitator was given 100 copies which are available to ministries in their region on a love offering basis. The additional copies were distributed from AUC and are all gone. I managed to save ONE copy that I promptly locked in the safe! Needless to say, WonderWord has captured the hearts and imagination of the young and young at heart.

If you would like to see this project continued, please drop me a note and let me know your reactions and suggestions. Also include the number of copies you would like to have if we print another issue (December?). The books are dated with the month and power only so the same copy can be used several years in a row until we (Continued on page 11)

have all 12 issues in print.

On one of the calls I received on <u>WonderWord</u>, a minister did not know who their Youth Education Facilitator was. We will print these addresses again. Please clip them out and keep them on file.

This dedicated group of Unity students and teachers are responsible for WonderWord and are available to serve you in all areas of Youth Education. The facilitators are appointed by each region to act as YE consultants to ministers and teachers, conduct teacher training and meet here once a year to plan and implement quality programs and materials for Unity youth.

This fall is a particularly important time to be aware of the expertise of your facilitator. Each one is available to present to your center a teacher training seminar entitled, "The Harmony of Youth Ministry." This seminar covers teaching skills, classroom management, Truth principles and creative use of the AUC curriculum. You may contact your facilitator to host this seminar on a Saturday for your church or you may want to combine with other churches in your area to host the workshop. If you haven't already done so, contact your facilitators and find out the ways they can serve you best.

The AGAPE newsletter is another service that has met the needs of teachers and ministers. Be sure that when you receive your copy it is passed on to the Youth Education Staff. Additional copies can be obtained by writing your YE Facilitator.

If you have any views on youth from a minister's perspective or an article for the "Forum" in AGAPE, please share with us. We can't pay

you by the word but your ideas and opinions will be appreciated!

With these services and the tremendous attitude of our youth, their leaders and ministers, we are working together to bring a workable Truth to young people and they are helping us discover that Christ child within us. Thank you again for being an important part of this dynamic activity.

## COMPUTERS AND THE MINISTRY \_\_\_\_\_ by Gary Simmons, MIT \_\_\_\_\_

Most folks probably get started in Unity as a result of a dramatic, inspiring challenge. As for me, I was dragged to Unity Christ Church in San Francisco by my wife, **Stephanie**, shortly after our marriage in the Spring of 1971. Needless to say, I am grateful for her loving persistence in getting me started early in life in such an exciting and fulfilling way to live.

Prior to entering UMS I was employed by Pacific Telephone Company as a Communications Technician; an experience which has given me an analytical mind, a semi-photographic memory, a keen sense of logic, and an appreciation for telephone operators everywhere.

My involvement at the San Francisco Unity center began slowly, but accelerated as the years rolled on. I served as an usher, utility person, Sunday School teacher, and then became an official member. The next five years saw me as a Board Vice-President and President, platform assistant, teacher, and guest speaker. I guess you could say I was "groomed" for the ministry by both Dave McClure and Gwen Norment who saw in me what they called "potential," and what I call a big mouth with a big message.

I entered ministerial training with no visions of grandeur. But, I suspect that is not the way I will leave. Perhaps the most fulfilling experience that I have had here at UMS thus far, is my work as a volunteer phone worker in Silent Unity--a work that has demonstrated to me time and time again the dynamic power of prayer. Truly, all things are possible!

I have had the privilege for the past three sessions of teaching Tai Chi Chuan (an ancient

Chinese exercise form) as a part of the Adult Education program at the Unity Village Chapel.

I am currently involving myself in an area of special interest concerning center operations. How would it be to have four file drawers of information, articles, quotes, stories, and sermon ideas at your finger tips? Or to have your membership list, financial statement, and bookstore inventory accurate and available at a moments notice? Wouldn't it be nice to be able to address your mailing, have a list of all Unity books, pamphlets and Sunday School material cross referenced, and to be able to balance the books in about the same time it takes to record a dial-aprayer message?

With a small computer you can. Last Spring I began exploring the feasibility of small computers in center operations. We all know what happens with "thoughts held in mind." Recently I received as an early graduation present from my parents a Radio Shack TRS—80 Mini-Computer, an expandable, portable, modular system. I have now outgrown the capacity of my system and am ready to expand. Thus far I have discovered and invisioned tremendous potential in owning and operating a small computer system and plan to bring a bit of the space age to my Unity ministry.

Dr. Marcus Bach offers some profound words: "Unity must always stay ahead of its time. It must continually lead and not follow. It must be the recipient and the channel for new revelation, new interpretation, and new demonstration."

In upcoming issues of CONTACT I will share with you some vital statistics concerning the feasibility and practical use of small computers in both the large and small ministries, for center operations or personal use.

#### WHOLISTIC HEALTH CENTERS——In Local Churches

The following article appeared in the August, 1979, issue of ACTION INFORMATION, a journal published by "The Alban Institute, Inc., Washington, DC. Dr. Norman Shealey spoke encouragingly of programs such as presented here at the June Conference:

"After a number of years as chaplain and teacher in university research and teaching hospitals, Granger Westberg became disillusioned. He sensed that many of these patients would not have had to have such radical medical and surgical care had someone dealt with them more wholistically ten to twenty years before. With this in mind, he now is experimenting with what are called Wholistic Health Centers which are, in effect, church based primary care doctors' offices where three professionals (physician, pastoral counselor, and nurse) are seen as equals dealing with patients in a slightly more wholistic fashion. They seek to pick up the early symptoms of illness and help the person see that often a change in life style and philosophy can prevent the illness symptoms from increasing.

"Westberg has done his work through the Department of Preventive Medicine of the University of Illinois Medical School in Chicago with the generous help of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. Some six clinics have now been started in churches located in a variety of neighborhoods where people of all income levels and cultural interests are represented. Most of them are in the Chicago area, but several are now being started in Minnesota,

Ohio, and Washington, DC.

"Westberg is convinced that most people who come to see a primary care physician have problems that are really more in a minister's field than they are strictly in a doctor's field. Yet he is also convinced that such patients coming to a primary care physician ought to be given a thorough physical examination so nothing of a somatic nature is overlooked. This physical exam, however, is preceded by a "health planning conference" attended by the physician, pastoral counselor, nurse, and patient (and any close relative whom the patient may want to have sit in). The minister is the moderator of this half-hour discussion where the patient is seen with his or her clothes on and viewed as a person like the other three. The fact that the minister is in charge of this discussion gives the patient the feeling that the minister is an equal member of the team and not someone sitting off in a corner available only if absolutely necessary. The nurse also is encouraged to participate as an equal member, and though this comes hard for nurses who have been trained to be quiet and servantlike, a growing number of nurses are beginning

to participate in the discussions, and this adds a dimension of patient advocacy which is often lacking

"The doctor also actively participates in this health planning conference even though most of the discussion has to do with the person's hopes, aims, values religious interests, concerns, anxieties, etc. The aim is to get to know the patient as a whole person. The specifically physicial complaints are dealt with in more detail in the next half hour in the examining room

where the doctor is in charge.

"The fact that these Centers are conducted in churches is especially important to the overall philosophy of Westberg's concern. He feels that the churches have abdicated health care and turned over their hospitals to secularists and given the impression that the spiritual or values dimension is of little or no importance in the healing of diseases. Just the fact that these doctors' offices are located in church buildings immediately symbolizes the God dimension of health care and says that the churches do care about bodies as well as souls. He has had little difficulty finding underused church buildings which are delighted to open their structures to remodeling portions to make attractive medical suites. The only problem lies in the start-up costs, which are considerable but not impossible to surmount.

"The most recent development is that hospitals throughout the country, concerned about their past lack of local community concern, are now seeking to place more emphasis on preventive medicine and humanizing health care. A number of hospital administrators and boards of directors are now considering sponsoring one or more such Wholistic Health Centers in nearby churches within their own catchment areas. Such sponsorship would solve

the problem of start-up costs.

"Westberg feels that the church should respond to the call of a growing number of physicians and nurses who are recognizing that 'science is not enough' and that the spiritual component must be added to the care of the sick. Our great-grandfathers responded a hundred years ago to such a call by building the magnificent hospitals and schools of nursing which have made a great contribution to the health field. Today the call is for local churches to see how effective they really are in the area of preventive medicine and relate these with the very best of medical care."

## STANDARD AND ETHICS FOR LICENSED TEACHERS

As Licensed Unity Teachers "we dedicate ourselves to the principles of Truth as taught and exemplified by Jesus Christ, and interpreted by Unity School of Christianity and the Association of Unity Churches.

"We look to the indwelling Christ for inspiration, to guide, govern, and prosper us."

We will endeavor, to the best of our understanding and ability, to teach classes of a quality that will inspire our students to live the Truth that will make them free. We will do this always under the influence of Divine Guidance.

We will emphasize the importance of prayer in every person's life,, and especially will we use prayer to make our lives an example of living Truth. Our own prayer consciousness will prove our dedication to God.

We will be mindful always of our proper relationships with our ministers. We will bear in mind that the minister is in charge of the ministry. We will not undertake any activity without the consent and complete cooperation of the minister. We will be supportive of the minister, as we know he/she is of us.

We will not undertake any activity however related to the ministry without the approval of the minister, knowing that all outreach activities must be sponsored by the parent ministry.

We will make sure that all classes taught under the sponsorship of the parent ministry for credit in the Unity Institute for Continuing Education will be conducted according to the standards and requirements of UICE.

In all our Unity Classes, we will teach the Unity teachings. In this, we will avoid teaching any subjects which may be deemed incompatible with basic Unity principles.

We will prepare our lessons well, knowing that students attracted to a Unity ministry expect excellence. Our lessons will be presented in a practical, yet beautiful and inspiring manner.

We will subscribe to all points in the CODE OF ETHICS FOR MINISTERS OF THE ASSOCIATION OF UNITY CHURCHES, as presented in the AUC Yearbook, and which are applicable to us.

- Q. When the Minister is absent where can I, as a Licensed Teacher, obtain information to assist me in performing special services, such as, funerals, christenings, etc.?
- A. You may order from AUC a booklet titled "Special Services Manual" for only \$4.50. It might be wise to check and see if one is available to you through your Center.
- Q. Where can I get assistance on how to teach, grade papers and fill in the evaluation sheets for credit classes?
- A. When a Licensed Teacher sends in the form to register her class for credit she may, at this time, request the "Extension Program Teachers Guide." It contains annotations or teaching helps for all credit classes that can be taught in Centers, plus other valuable information. These beautiful books are UICE's gift to Licensed Teachers who are teaching credit classes.
- Q. What does my Minister expect from me as a Licensed Teacher, and what can I expect?
- A. I suggest you take time to read the "Standards and Ethics for Licensed Teachers" we have printed in the corner of this page. Licensed Teachers and Ministers are interested in sharing Unity's Truth message. Your Minister's recommendation was necessary for you to become licensed. I'm sure he/she would appreciate your asking him/her for a time to sit down and talk things over. Let him/her know the time you have available and discuss topics of mutual interest concerning your Center.
- Q. Will there be a S.D.S. for Licensed Teachers who are already teaching?
- A. UICE has no plans at this time for such a program. However, they are interested in assisting you in any way they can. Perhaps, if enough of you made the request to them (Continued on page 20)

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## WHAT'S NEW?

Thanksgiving Bulletin Covers and Stationery Sets: You have already received a flyer and order form on these items, and most of you have sent in your orders by now. If you haven't, here are the answers to some of the questions that have come up so far:

Yes, the Thanksgiving bulletin covers are the same price as the other bulletin covers that came out, \$3.00 per 100.

A Thanksgiving Stationery Set consists of (a) a letterhead, (b) a carrier envelope, and (c) a return envelope. These sets retail at \$7.00 per 100 sets.

Though we do encourage you to buy in sets of 100, this can certainly be broken down into 50's if you need 150 sets or 550 sets or whatever for your praticular mailing.

There is ample room for you to address the mailing (carrier) envelope in your usual manner. This is a window envelope, but the window is on the left side of the envelope, positioned to let the artwork of the letterhead show through.

Yes, the return envelope is "check size." This enables contributors to return donations without having to fold their checks or bills.

Yes, it may be that the letterhead would fit your own envelopes, but the whole package is designed around the idea that all the items—bulletin cover, letterhead, and return envelope—carry the same picture, and the window in the mailing envelope allows the letterhead picture to show through. This is why the stationery is being sold in sets rather than individual items and how we are able to offer it at the reasonable price of \$7.00 per 100 sets.

No, we don't have samples available. Just as soon as we take delivery from the printer, we'll start filling orders. This will be the second week in October, so orders will get to you in time for you to get your mailing out.

Samples will not be available before we start filling Thanksgiving orders. Our time schedule on this has been tight, but we will be making deliveries by the second week in October to 21

allow you as much time as possible to do your mailing.

Christmas Bulletin Covers and Stationery Sets:

These bulletin covers and stationery sets are similar in design to the Thanksgiving package, except that the theme is centered around a picture of the Unity Tower on Christmas night. The lights of a Christmas Tree and the decorated tower seem to radiate a special magical feeling!

The Christmas material was printed along with the Thanksgiving material, so we will be able to mail it to you in plenty of time for your special Christmas mailings. A sample will be mailed to you as soon as the Thanksgiving orders have been filled.
