AUC President's Letter

Dear Friend,

The first Unity Conference and Healing Revival was held at Unity Village in 1928. In his opening remarks, Charles Fillmore said: "Thirty-eight years ago, Mrs. Fillmore and I began this Unity work-- and it was a very small beginning--as fast as we worked an idea and logically adopted it, our attention was in some way called to the same teaching in the Bible. In this way, we found that we were being guided by a higher power. The more we looked for the spiritual guidance, the more definite it became. Often, when the inner urge to do a certain thing came to us and we were not sure that it was the right thing to do, the matter would clear up in a symbolic dream. Again, it would be a waking vision, a voice from the heavens that indicated the right way. Thus, we found that we were being educated in spiritual ways as were the children of Israel, and as were the earlier followers of Jesus Christ. When Solomon wanted to know how to guide the Israelites wisely, he did not consult worldly authorities, but he went to Gideon, the Great High Place, where Jehovah appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, 'ask, what shall I give thee?' "

Charles and Myrtle Fillmore were visionaries-dreamers chosen to bring spirits own timeless vision into the twentieth century. As Charles said ninety years ago when they began this Unity work, it was very small, and in those early exciting years went through a series of changes. Growth always requires that change takes place. The reason I began this letter to you with the quotation from Charles to the first Unity Confer-

ence was because in his opening remarks, he was telling the members of the movement how much they had grown, how far they had come and how difficult it had been, but that the answers were always provided because their unity was being guided and directed by spirit every step of the way.

If our movement has become restless, perhaps it is because we have lost some of the vision, dynamism and the spiritual direction of the early years. "Where there is no vision, the people perish (cast off restraint)." (Proverbs 29:18 KJV) Could it be that we have settled down into what our founders accomplished and have established as our goals the maintenance of the status quo? No generation can live happily or successfully on the accomplishments of the past unless the processes that brought that good forth are carried forward and demonstrated.

In recent weeks, as the Executive Committee and Board of Trustees of the AUC were involved with finding solutions to the problems that naturally arise in conducting the business of the Association, we found that each problem was presenting us with a series of new ideas and concepts--actually forcing us to grow--and certainly causing us to reevaluate many things. To a person, we have felt that we were being guided by higher power, and the more closely we have worked with each other and with spirit, the more definite has been this sense of Spiritual guidance.

As a result of deep thought and earnest prayer, we made an initial proposal that asked for a dialogue with Unity School about an exciting concept we feel could give new vitality and direction to our movement. Unity School examined our proposal and turned it down. The basic idea of our proposal actually came out of Unity School's bulletin number four that resulted in the dissolution of the field department and the formation of the AUC about 13 years ago. There is much more I cannot go into here, but I mention this to you because already many rumors have spread and concerns have arisen. If you should have a question, please don't hesitate to call me or your area representative.

I would also like to extend an invitation to have you come to the Village and attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees on Monday, January 14, 1980, at 1:00 p.m. More than 100 of our members will be there for Committee meetings. There are no secrets and no "revolution" is taking place. Our Association has a right to hear and participate in any matter or decision that involves our movement, and the Board would like to share every-(Continued on page 4)

thing that has developed with you personally. Please plan to attend. Your questions will be answered, your voice will be heard. In the meantime, please put your mind at ease.


in Unity's movement forward into the twenty-first century as a more mature, responsible, and

Calling AII Leaders!

Unity needs you. More than that, Unity needs you to be a leader! This is a call for you to determine by your faith and daily actions to lead in living the Unity teachings; to lead in shaping the future of our movement; to truly be the leader in regular, soul-stirring praying.

Years ago, Marcus Bach spoke here at Unity Village and stated an idea that has lingered-even haunted me. He praised Unity and then said that the teachings were not entirely unique-others taught the basic ideas too. What would set Unity ahead would be if the students of Unity would truly LIVE the ideas. That call for leadership continues today. Unity needs leaders in living the Truth.

We in Unity are at a crossroads right now. Bevond whatever directions we establish, we must do what we do in a livingness of the Truth we teach. Each of us is needed to be a leader -- a leader in love, in faith, in forgiveness, in wisdom, in patience. Now is the call to leadership. Unity needs you.

We can no longer ignore our structure. Are we a movement of churches? Are we really a movement? If so, where are we going? What will we make of the future? Unity needs leaders to decide and move.

5:00 p.m., Tuesday, October 30, 1979: I am standing on the balcony of the Rodeway Inn, Garden Grove, Orange County, Southern California. To my right, one block away, is the Orange Drive-in Theater. The screen, seen almost edge-on from where I am standing, rises like a giant monolith in the evening sky.

To the west, a block away in front of me, the freeway arches over streets and buildings, carrying the teeming millions of the rush-hour traffic, drivers bent to the wheel in a relentless pursuit of time.

Beyond the freeway, left and right, a factory and a Holiday Inn. One mile away, framed between them and silhouetted against the setting sun, the Tower of Hope with its tall cross rides the sunset sky. To the right of the tower, the great bulk of the Crystal Cathedral bulges on the skyline like a giant football stadium.

The sky glows like fire and begins to darken as I stand there, watching, wondering. . .

Garden Grove Community Church, an idea born in the mind of a man named Robert Schuller. It started just over there, in the Orange Drive-in Theater.

The sky is darker now. 5:30 p.m. The cross on the tower is illuminated. Below it, the lights are on in the uppermost part of the tower itself. Is that where the prayer room is? The top part of the cross above the horizontal arms is dark, the light not working. He too has the frustrations of things needing his attention, not much different to any other minister. . .

How did he do it? How did he get all these busy, headlong-rushing people to take notice?... It is small in the midst of all this...and yet, it looms larger in the sky now.

Well, tomorrow I'll be over there, at the Institute for Successful Church Leadership. What is in store? What will I learn? What will I feel?... I don't know. But one thing I do know--something has stirred in me tonight.

Almost 2000 years ago. . . . The sky is dark. In the east over the mountains of Judea a bright star is shining. . . . A child is born. Jesus of Nazareth.

... What dreams he had, this Jesus of Nazareth!

It's a long way from the star in the east to a cross framed against a western sky amid a concrete countryside and electronic echoes of life-transforming truths. Yet, the dream lives, becomes real, and grows. . .

We are gathered here in His name, to learn from one another—a God-called people, ministers from all different denominations. There is no conflict, no competition, no confusion of tongues. There is only the desire to carry on and expand the dream, each in his or her own unique and individual way. I think He would like that! Paul, the apostle who carried the dream to the west, would applaud too! For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. For the body does not consist of one member but of many. . . .

Each day we gather together in a progressive intimacy and harmony of spirit. We share with one another the dream of the living Christ... how we were touched and turned around... how we can be a window for the dream to shine through, sharp and clear to touch and enliven others. Individual dreams are expressed. Challenges are confronted. Plans are prepared and shared. Implementation is discussed and action eagerly awaited.

The last day together.... Inspired, minds and hearts wide open, we listen... experiencing in feelings far more than words can ever tell, as the story of Don Quixote, man of La Mancha, is told and unfolds as a story retold of Jesus, the Christ; we are caught up in the drama of it...

Don Quixote finds the one he calls his fair lady, Dulcinea—a whore in the sight of others. "You shall be my lady. I shall call you Dulcinea!"

But, "Aldonza!" she says. "I am Aldonza!" Over and over she rejects that which he sees in her.

Nonplussed, Don Quixote sings his song. Undaunted, he claims her: "Dulcinea, Dulcinea. You will always be Dulcinea to me."

Finally, Don Quixote is dying. A woman comes to him, one he does not recognize. She is beautiful, and dressed in fine clothes. "But you must remember," she says. "You sung to me your song. I heard it...you said it! Dream the impossible dream! And ... you gave me a NEW NAME ... I AM DULCINEA!"

it would be hard. When I say hard I am not speaking of the classes per se. It was what it did to the way I think and feel. I discovered that I too, Vesta Barth, was the child of a loving Father. I hadn't really thought about that much. Up to this point I had been too busy trying to be the perfect wife, mother and cookie baker. Now, I was going to try to be wise, warm and wonderful as a minister's wife and "oh, Lord, what have I gotten myself into?"

Well, I did find the cookie baking has come in handy. Knowing how to scrub toilets is well worth keeping up on if you don't have a janitor or the one that you have is ill. Praying for peace quietly to oneself is worthwhile when the ladies group is raising havoc over whose recipes are to be used for the ladies luncheon. Keeping your mouth shut when some sweet loving person tells you that "you are attractive, but you would look better if you wore your hair another way," can give you lumps in your stomach, while it makes you strong in Spirit.

I have told God "I quit" more times than I can count, but you know what! I can't quit.

Through the pain and the anguish I love the ministry and the people in it. I am strengthened by their faith as they face every kind of challenge and come out on top. I love them even during the times I want to shake them or rattle their teeth when they don't or can't see what they are doing to themselves. And then that "still small voice" says "who set you up as judge and jury, sometimes you can't even take care of yourself."

I think I have learned a little about tact and diplomacy, and sometimes I'm not even too sure about that.

I have prayed with many persons. Sometimes I feel as though my heart will break such as the time one of my friends told me "her son was dying of a so-called incurable illness and would I pray with her." Again the thought came to me "what am I doing here and please God give me the right words to say and help me to be strong." My friend's son did die but she told me many months later that there were certain things I had said to her that day that had sustained her when she wasn't sure she could make it. I knew it "was not I, but the Father within me" that did the work. It was hard for me then--it's hard for me now but I shall go on.

I have considered going in to some other line of work, but I don't know how to do anything else. I have put so much of my thoughts, feelings, tears and frustrations into this--I really don't want to try something new. Besides that, I keep learning new things every day and maybe when they start giving qualification tests for spouses of ministers I will be able to answer some of the questions.

The Bible has wonderful words of love and wisdom for such as me. In the 12th chapter of II Corinthians, verse 9 it says—"And He said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee; for My strength is made perfect in weakness." I think of that verse a lot when the going gets tough. It helps.

Perhaps there will come a time when some one will teach a course at Conference on "How to Be the Spouse of a Minister." I know each ministry has its own personality so to speak but there are some basic principles where we are all alike.

There are many of you I know well and many of you I have never met but I am aware of all of you. I am praying with each one of you and for each one of you. We are all in this special place and time together. The road may be rough going sometimes but there are the smooth paved miles that make it all worthwhile. I shall continue to walk the path wherever it leads me. Maybe some of it we can walk together and who knows, we could end up on someone's list.

THE FIELD SPEAKS

UNITY AND THE BIBLE

One of the things Unity ministers, teachers, and all of us as "Truth students" must cope with is the repeated challenge as to what constitutes our authority for calling our teachings Truth. Is our authority based on our trust in the insight of Charles Fillmore and others who have shaped our Unity movement? Is it based on a belief in the literal accuracy of every word of the Bible? In actuality, our authority to call our teachings Truth is derived from the fact that we live in a universe governed by spiritual principles. Men and women open to the inner light of Spirit-both in ancient and modern times-have perceived, lived by and on occasion written these down in direct, or more often in allegorical form. Some of these inspired writings comprise the literature of the worlds great religions, including our own Bible.

In Unity we see the Bible as a source where all that we teach of Truth can be found. But we do not find its value exclusively or even primarily in its literal accuracy—which in many cases is in doubt. Rather, the Bible in its literal and allegorical meaning serves as a catalyst that opens us to a Truth that can only come from within us.

In his book <u>lesus Christ Heals</u>, Charles Fillmore writes: "The Bible contains more high mysticism than all other books. But it requires a study of

certain fundamental spiritual principles to discern it. Unless you call upon your own innate spiritual light you cannot appreciate the insight of those who wrote the books of the Bible. The Bible is a perpetual revelation of Truth because of its allegorical character."

Metaphysical interpretation of our Scriptures is based on the premise that beyond the literal significance of Bible passages, there are other levels of meaning that are just as valid, and often more spiritually enlightening than the literal meaning. Some people cannot accept this premise, and so miss a vast wealth of Biblical meaning. Others who can accept this idea find that for the first time the Bible begins to make sense. The inner meaning of biblical characters, places, and events begins to bring life changing insights, and a deep understanding of basic spiritual principles which have been taught by all the great religions of the world. For this reason, mataphysical interpretation of the Bible is gaining more momentum in the interest of intelligent persons all over the world.

Unity has been the major pioneering movement in this direction. Unity is now the leading metaphysical Truth movement still making serious effort in this direction, and every student, teacher, and minister in our Unity movement is making valuable contributions to our overall and everincreasing understanding of the inner meaning of the Truth within the Scriptures.

Steps for Starting A YOU Group

- 1. Pray
- 2. Let Spirit direct you to your perfect YOU sponsor(s), someone who understands the commitment of time and love.
- 3. Decide a time and place to hold your YOU class.
- 4. Make an exciting announcement from the pulpit several weeks in advance, for several weeks in a row.
- 5. Contact your regional YOU coordinator and let him/her know what help or ideas you need. Make sure you're on their mailing list.

- 6. Contact the International YOU coordinator at Unity Village to be put on the mailing list.
- 7. Hold class each week. Use Truth books, discussion, Teenage Survival Manual, etc.
- 8. When a core group is formed after a few weeks, take time after class to discuss prayer panel, YOU Conference and delegates, social activities, service projects, rally travel and elect officers.
- 9. Make sure you are receiving reSPONSE (the sponsors' newsletter) published by the Youth Services Office.
- 10. Have fun, flow with the needs of the group.

There is a famous newscaster who, after a twenty minute monologue of negativity, closes with a wry smile and says, "And that's the way it is!" There are 85 dedicated ministers-in-training at UMS who are out to prove him wrong.

The faculty and MIT's here at Unity Village are excited, we're "turned on"! We're turned on with the Truth that sets us free! We feel our Unity message is coming into a new age of growth and development that will continue to help "set free" people who are in bondage to darkness and fear. We know "the way it is" can be a life of joy and fulfillment, and more and more people are stepping out of their comfort zone and carrying the message forward of "Christ in you, your hope of glory."

Being on the faculty now for four months has afforded me many opportunities for growth. In fact, I feel I may have grown more in this brief period of time than in all my years in Truth. When faced with the instruction of 85 prime people who all have the strong goal to become Unity ministers, it challenges me to draw deeply on the Christ within for divine ideas to keep the lessons fresh and new.

Even amidst the busy preparation for the Holiday season you, no doubt, are looking ahead and perhaps thinking about your educational program for next year. You may well ask yourself, "How do I motivate and inspire people to study, grow, and to help spread our Unity teachings in a more unique and creative way?" I had found when serving in the Center Ministry that the strong support foundation of the work came from the sincere, dedicated Truth student who attended classes, took courses for credit, and wrote the papers. To strengthen our movement I'd felt a need to offer challenging and varied courses of

study. As you know, the people in these study groups not only learn Truth and draw together in a strong bond of love and fellowship, but they form a core group out of which emerge future leaders; board members, youth education teachers, etc. The strongest students we have here at UMS are people who have come out of Centers with a strong educational trust.

Working with our excellent teachers and staff at UMS, together with the new Educational Council, has increased the professional approach which is reflected in the students and is bound to be brought into the Unity movement in the future. We have found the Truth, we are teaching the Truth, and that is the answer to the prophets of doom who proclaim, "that's the way it is!"

My work here at UMS is to teach Unity Truth Fundamentals, Counseling Practices and to assist in the Communications Skills Class. It is always amazing to me how many creative ideas the ministers-in-training come up with in their class presentations. As we enter into this new age we need talented people to enliven and bring freshness and enthusiasm to the Unity message. I feel it is also important to stay close to the Jesus Christ teachings while allowing each person the freedom to give that message in their own unique way. This is not only being done here at UMS, but can be done right in your Unity center with the idea that every person is a minister.

People learn best by doing, so I feel individual involvement is very important. Here are some ideas I hope will help stimulate your thinking and enrich your educational program.

- 1. Plan a strong program that meets the needs of the people. Write it down. Ask yourself, "What is the greatest need among the people?"
- 2. Initiate sound basic Unity courses, with a fresh new look.
- 3. During Bible lessons, encourage students to write their own Bible.
- 4. Have self-esteem, leadership training, and meditation courses that involve individual participation.
- 5. Execute well prepared lessons and leave plenty of time for discussion.
- 6. Hand out meaningful material.
- 7. Encourage and challenge students to compile workbooks and teaching books as term projects.
- 8. Have students keep a personal journal including goal setting and the use of creative imagination.

- 9. Allow students to then become involved in the Unity Center so that they, in turn, become a means by which others will be attracted to Unity.
- 10. Award achievement certificates for completion of courses and have an end of term celebration. (This really keeps them coming back!)

These are just a few "thought starters" that may be helpful in getting you started towards your program for the New Year. What we are doing here at UMS can be done right where you are. I know many of you are deeply involved in doing this already.

My husband, Alan, as Projects Coordinator, is compiling an idea book of student presentations to share with you later on. Everyone likes to feel part of a growing, exciting program, it promotes creative energy which will let your work grow as UMS is growing here.

On the personal side, Alan and I have gone

through a tremendous change in our Ministry and lifestyle. We are still going through the pain of leaving the ministry in Roanoke, Virginia, and our loving Unity family there. We are, however, enjoying our new work tremendously and we love living in our little apartment here at Unity Village.

We both welcome and appreciate this opportunity to serve the Unity ministry in a larger way. The words of an old hymn come to mind, "Where he leads me I will follow." COMPUTERIZED MINISTRIES by

Gary Simmons, MIT

If there are young people on your Christmas list you are probably aware of a new age Santa Claus; one whose gifts have become as sophisticated as the imagination of those to whom they are given. These days are likely to echo request for talking dolls, radio controlled airplanes, video games, and most popular of all—computerized toys. Recently, a breakthrough in computer tehenology has made it possible to market a fascinating assortment of electronic gadgetry to amuse and mystify the minds of young and old alike.

The same technology has given birth to the rapid growing field of personal or micro-computers. What twenty-five years ago was a \$20,000,000 machine now sells for under a \$1,000. A facility that once occupied many rooms of office space now rests on a table top. And a field which once required specialized training and months of hands-on experience can now be mastered in hours by most persons of average intelligence.

The point is computers are no longer a luxury of big business and government. They have become a realistic and practical approach to personal information management. Within the next few years they will likely be considered appliances, as common as video recorders and microwave ovens.

Presently, personal computers are designed to function in three areas: family entertainment, personal information management, and with the addition of special componets (peripherals) they also function as sophisticated business information and word processors. What is of special interest to us is the latter two areas of operation.

Thus far, my only criticism of this column has been that of avoiding the "nitty gritty" or getting to the specifics. Now that you are sufficiently curious I feel it safe to proceed (slowly at first) in reporting the facts, figures, and frustrations, as well as the fascinating potential of microcomputers.

Let's begin by meeting Mork, my personal computer. Mork is a TRS-80 Model I Microcomputer manufactured by Radio Shack. This computer retails for \$499.00. In the October issue of CONTACT I mentioned that my parents gave me this beginning system as an early graduation present. Since then, Radio Shack has loaned me the use of a larger system in order to conduct the research behind this series of articles. The sys-

tem that I am now using for personal information management retails for \$849.00

Like many micro-computer systems on the market, the TRS-80 is expandable to function as a business computer. It is in this flexibility that micro-computers provide a great option to the average Unity ministry desirous of word processing abilities. The system is expanded by adding more components such as larger memory storage, line printer, and other peripherals that enable the computer to process great amounts of information. Nowhere in the expansion process is an investment wasted. Components are added to the system rather than replacing hardware already purchased. Each peripheral adds to the capability of the total system, insuring that maximum performance is realized from each stage of expansion at a minimum of cost. I estimate that a complete system suitable for center operations (including quality word processing) would cost an additional \$3,000.00 This means that the total investment for a quality micro-computer system would run under \$4,00.00 (Other manufactures such as Apple Computer, Inc., are comparable in price and quality.)

One of my goals is to have a working model, a fully equipped system set up for center operations on display during Conference time this June. I hope to be able to present and demonstrate the variety of tasks such a system will perform and inspire you to consider such an investment for yourself or your ministry. I invite and would be most appreciative of your prayers for substance and support in regard to this goal.

Mork and I have become very close friends, too close says my wife Stephanie. We spend many hours together learning about each other, (too many hours says Stephanie). My first challenge in putting Mork to work was in learning to speak his language. Every computer system has its own language and requires that the operator use that language correctly. This is how we establish rapport with our computer friends.

Many persons have asked how easy is it to learn computer programing. My answer is "I don't know." Most manufacturers furnish a beginner's manual to assist the owner in the process of learning the computer's language. Like most owners of micro-computers, I am categorized by the computer people as being a non-programing user. This means I've only learned enough to turn the machine on and off plus the essentials of Mork's dialect. (Although I have the ability and the background to master computer programing, I wish to approach the entire

field as on of you, from the perspective of one who has little or no knowledge of what might be in store.) For non-programers some manufactures like Radio Shack sell a variety of user programs to perform many specialized tasks. Also, there are programing companies which will customize programs to meet your special needs. (A program is a set of instructions that tells the computer what you want it to do.) With user programs available the operation and productive use of the micro-computer is relatively simple, a matter of you or your secretary learning a few basics. (I will discuss this subject in greater detail later.)

Since the beginning of this series of articles I have received many positive inquiries from the field and from my classmates. I was also pleased to learn that some of you already used microcomputers or word processors in your centers or are planning to investigate that possibility for the near future. But for the most part, the concept of a computerized ministry is new to our movement. Even if your center is "computerized" you may not have yet comprehended the full potential of your system. I believe as these next months unfold that you will share in my excitement and be amazed by the possibilities that are within the embrace of us all.

I see the remainder of this series exploring three aspects of this concept related to us as ministers and center leaders: 1) THE COMPUTERIZED MINISTER—how micro-computers can assist the minister and his or her message; 2) THE COMPUTERIZED MINISTRY—how micro-computers can serve the Unity ministry and its members; 3) THE COMPUTERIZED MOVEMENT—how our Movement can be aided in meeting the demands of the New Age.

YOUTH SERVICES COORDINATOR REPORT

April – December 1979



- 1. YE Curriculum: All curriculum completed for all quarters, Year I and Year II. (YEA!)
- 2. YOU Curriculum: Learning activity packets for Synoptic Study of Unity that are written are Chapter 1, "What is Unity," Chapter 2, "First Things First" and Chapter 24, "Unity of the Spirit." Chapter One is being piloted in ten centers. The evaluations are now being returned. We plan to have Chapter One available in some form for the field by January 1.
- 3. Youth Education Facilitators: This group met at Unity Village In March. All regions were represented except Southwest. We planned the Seminar for 79-80. "The Harmony of Youth Ministry," focusing on creative presentation of the AUC curriculum. Our projects for the year are: a) WonderWord, and b) Administrative Handbook for Youth Education. Next meeting is March 16–23, 1980.
- 4. Leadership Training: Sponsor Training was conducted at YOU Conference with 70 sponsors in attendance. The new curriculum, lesson planning, counseling skills, teaching skills and resources were presented.

Greg and I attended a sponsors workshop in Des Moines, sponsored by South Central and Great Lakes, and conducted sponsor training. We have met with sponsors and coordinators at each rally. We would like to see this expand.

In July, 30 youth leaders took the Youth Education Seminar for credit. This was an intensive course for two weeks, covering teaching skills and administrative procedure and was enthusiastically received.

5. Consultation, Speaking, Workshops: We have been available to speak and lead workshops for youth leaders, and ministers at rallys, regional conferences, with individual centers, 1-1 counseling, by phone and correspondence--

and have been well utilized.

6. Communication: Greg and I write monthly articles for CONTACT and publish four newsletters: AGAPE (quarterly YE), reSPONSE (YOU Sponsors), NEWS*NOTES (YOU), Pathway (Young Adults) and a Conference Newspaper once a year.

7. Supplementary Resources:

- a. YE Resource Library compiled--books, instructional resources, filmstrips, games for Youth Education available for reference.
- b. AUC Bible Log--chronological guide to AUC curriculum titles aids teachers in finding Biblical references in curriculum.
- c. Christmas pageants packet--six titles for planning Christmas programs.
- d. Young Adults Guidelines--ideas for starting a Young Adult group.
- e. WonderWord, a daily meditation workbook to be used in Unity YE and at home. 10,000 copies printed in December.
- f. Newsletters for YE, YOU, Sponsors, YAU.
- 8. Ministerial Training: I will be teaching a twelveweek course (Winter Term) in UMS covering administration and teaching skills for Youth Education.

9. Future Projects:

Patrick stood a moment and looked into the beautiful eyes of his new friend. He bent down and kissed her on her soft and wrinkled cheek.



meetings and seminars. Janie is known for delivering outstanding meditations, and for the past several years she has been one of the first-day speakers featured at the annual INTA Congress.

Before moving to Texas, the Paulsons served for 16 years as co-ministers of Unity Village Chapel at Unity's world headquarters in Unity Village, Missouri. There Janie taught at the Unity Institute for Continuing Education (UICE), spoke at retreats held throughout the year, and worked on the counseling staff.

NEWS FROM THE EDITORIAL & PROMOTION DEPARTMENTS OF UNITY SCHOOL

The Promotion and Editorial Departments are working together to bring a service to you--an overview of literature that may be helpful to your center ministry. We will use this space to point out material in our periodicals and books that we feel may be of particular interest to you.

SPARKPLUGS

LAWS OF LOVE, a new book by Margaret Pounders, will be of interest to ministers and teachers. It was recently published by Unity School and could be used for a series of classes. The twelve chapters concern a variety of ways the author believes God's laws of love come into expression.

Mrs. Pounders' premise is that our use or misuse of the spiritual laws of the universe is up to us. The laws of love, simply stated are eternal and unchanging and available to everyone. She believes that if we align ourself with the spiritual principles through which the universe operates we will be in accord with God's perfect plan for our life and we will demonstrate this divine harmony in Daily living. Her book is designed to help us develop insight so we can

recognize the correlation between our thoughts and actions and to develop new ways of thinking and acting.

All of the chapters, some of which are titled "Abundance," "Release," "Divine Discontent," "Compensation," and "Grace," contain good definitions and examples. The chapters concerning non-resistance and free will are particularly interesting. Mrs. Pounders believes that these concepts are often the most misunderstood. The explanations and stories with which she illustrates these concepts are clear and easy-to-apply.

At the conclusion of each chapter is a brief recap of the chapter's main points. Students could use these reminders between classes to study and practice.

SCIENCE PROVING RELIGIONS: One Power

The following quotes are from an article in a recent Newsweek, September 10, 1979, page 50 entitled "Stalking The Elusive Gluon." One scientific theory, apparantly finding proof, is that all forms of energy have one element in common--named the gluon. Maybe it's an idea you can use for a coming lesson:

"The path of a comet, the smell of a flower, the glitter of a star and the glow of radium are each caused by one of the four fundamental forces-gravity, electro-magnetism and the strong and weak muclear interactions—all have a single underlying explanation that accounts for the basic structure of the universe. This 'unified field theory,' however, requires the existence of a particle-whimsically christened the gluon-that holds all matter together. The gluon has long eluded scientists, but last week four international teams of researchers jointly announced that the particle had almost certainly been found at last. 'Physicists are ecstatic,' said Leon Lederman, director of Fermilab in Batavia, Illionis, where the discovery was explained. 'Now we're beginning to understand how it's all put together.'

"The most promising scheme for unifying the four forces is to prove that they all arise from an exchange of subatomic particles. So far, physicists have discovered that this common quality does indeed link the electromagnetic and weak nuclear forces. To unite the strong nuclear force with

these two, theorists hypothesized that the necessary exchange of particles involves entities called quarks and gluons. They reasoned that quarks, the tiniest building blocks of atomic nuclei, are bound together by the strong neclear force. And the particle that transmits this binding action is the elusive gluon. But until physicists actually found the gluon, the theory remained little more than elegant conjecture.

"Rings: The successful experiments, conducted in Hamburg, West Germany, employed a new particle accelerator called PETRA, which generates three times the energy of any previously in use. Beams of electrons and positrons (electrons with a positive electric charge) were circulated in opposite directions inside an enormous ring. By smashing them together, the scientists produced what usually occurs from such collisions - a pair of quarks-each detected by its own stream of identifiable particles. But PETRA's power is so enormous that something unique occurred. A third stream showed up on the detection grids. Although the stream existed for only an instant, its very presence-coupled with its width and direction-provided almost conclusive proof that one of the quarks had radiated a gluon.

"Now that the gluon has been found, only gravity has yet to be brought within the compass of a unified field theory. But if physicists can eventually show that gravity is also spawned by an exchange of particles (in this case, known as gravitons), they will have solved a puzzle that stumped Albert Einstein—and they will have uncovered one of the secrets of nature's unity.

COLLEGE DEGREE COMPLETION PROGRAM FOR MINISTERS AND LICENSED TEACHERS

Representatives of Ottawa University's College Without Campus and the Association of Unity Churches are discussing a possible degree completion program for Unity ministers and licensed teachers. The course of study would involve intensive short-term class sessions in the Kansas City area or other locations. These intensive classes would be followed-up with reading and written assignments that students could complete at times and places convenient to their schedules. Classes might be held concurrently with the Conference meetings in June, when Unity ministers visit the Kansas City area.

The College Without Campus (CWC) has extensive experience in designing programs to be delivered through non-traditional education formats. Included are degree plans in Education and Administration offered through similar intensive weekend sessions across the nation. Established on the Plaza in Kansas City, in 1974, Ottawa University's CWC is an outgrowth of a liberal arts college located in Ottawa, Kansas, since 1865. CWC works exclusively with adult students whose schedules and educational needs cannot be met by traditional college programs. Over 600 adults have completed their B.A. degrees with the Kansas City center since 1974.

Included in the CWC student body are Unity ministers-in-training, several graduates of Unity Ministerial School, and other members of the Unity community. Among the attractions of the CWC programs are the flexibility of course formats, the possibility of gaining college credit for "experiential learning" (college level learning from work, travel, volunteer, church, or leisure activities that were not sponsored by colleges or universities), the transferabilty of course work from the Unity Ministerial School (approximately 90 hours for the current program), and the quality of instruction in areas of particular interest to students from Unity (Counseling, Religion, Education, Administration).

CWC and the AUC need to know the extent of interest among Unity ministers and licensed teachers in the field before further plans for a special program can be made. If you are interested in this program, please return the form below.



How to write a business letter

Some thoughts from **Malcolm Forbes**



International Paper asked Malcolm Forbes to share some things he's learned about writing a good business letter. One rule, "Be crystal clear.

A good business letter can get you a job interview.

Get you off the hook. Or get you money.

It's totally asinine to blow your chances of getting whatever you want—with a business letter that turns people off instead of turning them on.

The best place to learn to write is in school. If you're still there, pick your teachers' brains.

If not, big deal. I learned to ride a motorcycle at 50 and fly balloons at 52. It's never too late to learn.

Over 10,000 business letters come across my desk every year. They seem to fall into three categories: stultifying if not stupid, mundane (most of them), and first rate (rare). Here's the approach

I've found that separates the winners from the losers (most of it's just good common sense)—it starts before you write your letter:

Know what you want

If you don't, write it down-in one sentence. "I want to get an interview within the next two weeks." That simple. List the major points you want to get across-it'll keep vou on course.

If you're answering a letter. check the points that need answering and keep the letter in front of you while you write. This way you won't forget anything-that would cause another round of letters.

And for goodness' sake, answer promptly if you're going to answer at all. Don't sit on a letter-that invites the person on the other end to sit on whatever you want from him.

Plunge right in

Call him by name-not "Dear Sir, Madam, or Ms." "Dear Mr. Chrisanthopoulos"—and be sure to spell it right. That'll get him (thus, you) off to a good start.

(Usually, you can get his name just by phoning his company—or from a business directory in your nearest library.)

Tell what your letter is about in the first paragraph. One or two sentences. Don't keep your reader guessing or he might file your letter away-even before he finishes it.

In the round file. If you're answering a letter, refer to the date

it was written. So the reader won't waste time hunting for it.

People who read business letters are as human as thee and me. Reading a letter shouldn't be a chorereward the reader for the time he gives you.

Write so he'll enjoy it

Write the entire letter from his point of view—what's in it for him? Beat him to the draw-surprise him by answering the questions and objections he might have.

Be positive—he'll be more receptive to what you have to say.

Be nice. Contrary to the cliche. genuinely nice guys most often finish first or very near it. I admit it's not easy when you've got a gripe. To be agreeable while disagreeingthat's an art.

Be natural—write the way you talk. Imagine him sitting in front of you—what would you say to him?

Business jargon too often is cold, stiff, unnatural.

Suppose I came up to you and said, "I acknowledge receipt of your letter and I beg to thank you." You'd think, "Huh? You're putting me on."

The acid test-read your letter out loud when you're done. You

might get a shock—but you'll know for sure if it sounds natural.

Don't be cute or flippant. The reader won't take you seriously. This doesn't mean you've got to be dull. You prefer your letter to knock 'em dead rather than bore 'em to death.

Three points to remember:

in front of you - what would

you say to him?"

Have a sense of humor. That's refreshing anywhere –a nice surprise in a business letter. Be specific. If I tell you there's a

new fuel that could save gasoline, vou might not believe me. But suppose I tell you this:

"Gasohol" - 10% alcohol, 90% gasoline – works as well as straight gasoline. Since you can make alcohol from grain or corn stalks, wood or wood waste, coaleven garbage, it's worth some real follow-through.

Now you've got something to sink your teeth into.

Lean heavier on nouns and verbs, lighter on adjectives. Use the active voice instead of the passive. Your writing will have more guts.

Which of these is stronger? Active voice: "I kicked out my monev manager." Or, passive voice: "My money manager was kicked out by me." (By the way, neither is true. My son, Malcolm Jr., manages most Forbes money—he's a brilliant moneyman.)

Give it the best you've got

When you don't want something enough to make the effort, making an effort is a waste.

Make your letter look appetizing -or you'll strike out before you even get to bat. Type it—on good-quality 8½" x 11" stationery. Keep it neat. And use paragraphing that makes it easier to read.

Keep your letter short—to one page, if possible. Keep your paragraphs short. After all, who's going to benefit if your letter is quick and easy to read?

For emphasis, underline impor-

tant words. And sometimes indent sentences as well as paragraphs.

Like this. See how well it works? (But save it for something special.)

Make it perfect. No typos, no misspellings, no factual errors. If you're sloppy and let mistakes slip by, the person reading your letter will think you don't know better or don't care. Do you?

Be crystal clear. You won't get what you're after if your reader doesn't get the message.

Use good English. If you're still in school, take all the English and writing courses you can. The way you write and speak can really help -or hurt.

If you're not in school (even if you are), get the little 71-page gem by Strunk & White, Elements of Style. It's in paperback. It's fun to read and loaded with tips on good English and good writing.

Don't put on airs. Pretense invariably impresses only the pretender.

Don't exaggerate. Even once. Your reader will suspect everything else you write.

Distinguish opinions from facts. Your opinions may be the best in the world. But they're not gospel. You owe it to your reader to let him know which is which. He'll appreciate it and he'll admire you. The dumbest people I know are those who Know It All.

Be honest. It'll get you further in the long run. If you're not, you won't rest easy until you're found out. (The latter, not speaking from experience.)

Edit ruthlessly. Somebody has said that words are a lot like inflated money-the more of them that you use, the less each one of them is worth. Right on. Go through your entire letter just as many times as it takes. Search out and Annihilate all unnecessary words, and sentences-even entire paragraphs.

Sum it up and get out

The last paragraph should tell the reader exactly what you want him to do-or what you're going to do. Short and sweet. "May I have an appointment? Next Monday, the 16th, I'll call your secretary to see when it'll be most convenient for you."

Close with something simple like, "Sincerely." And for heaven's sake sign legibly. The biggest ego trip I know is a completely illegible signature.
