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
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

Networks: A NEW Beginning in Mutual Support

Every church is a support network for the people it serves. That's what ministry is all about-systems and networks of intellectual, emotional, and spiritual support. The minister serves as the focus of that support, yet who supports the minister? We undoubtedly benefit in the very act of blessing others, but more is needed. Ministers need their own support systems.

Some of us are in isolated areas where we really don't have the availability of other Unity ministers nearby. However, most of us are in proximity of other ministers where we could support one another. We are strengthened as persons and as ministers to the degree we minister to one another and allow each other to minister to us.

You remember the vision of Ezekial where he saw the wheel within the wheels. His mysticism conjures up many images, but there is an aspect of his vision that is sound organizational principle. The successful church has groups within groups, or wheels within wheels, so do we as a national and international organization. We have our regions and sub-regions so that there are groupings within the International Unity movement. However, these groups do not usually give the kind of emotional support that a minister needs. In your geographical area where there are even two or more together in this teaching, you could create a wheel within the Unity wheel -- a network of encouragement and support for one another that could greatly strengthen you and your ministry.

Recently I came across a little booklet with the intriguing title, "There's Algae in the Baptismal Fount," by David Zeloff. You can get a copy through your local bookstore or by writing directly to Abingdon Press in Nashville, Tennessee. The author has worked as a national director in a religious activity and now is director of a counseling center for ministers. He says that through the years in his dealings with ministers he has come to two conclusions about ministers. With all their strengths and abilities they tend to have (1) a low self-esteem and (2) a desire to avoid deep and lasting relationships.

Certainly Zeloff has worked almost entirely with ministers who were in trouble or were having challenges in their careers. This could explain his conclusion, yet there's an element of truth in what he says for all of us. Whether we start out that way or become that way because of the challenges of ministry, ministers do not tend to respect their own value. Frequently I hear ministers devaluing their worth and abilities. More than anyone else, we see the beauty of the teachings and are confronted with our own weaknesses. It's

easy to feel less than successful.

In a small church especially it's imperative that a minister be friendly. The demand of ministry is often to be a social contact person; simply saying "hello" to people and no further. The expectation is for a professional "shallowness," and that can be counter productive in the long run.

Eric Berne has written a book entitled, "What Do You Say After You Say Hello." One of the ideas in the book is that many people tend to spend their whole lives simply saying "hello" and never getting beyond the superficiality. Saying "hello" repeatedly can be a way of avoidance; we keep moving on and never moving into a meaningful relationship. Because of a low self-esteem, basic shyness, or the seeming pressures of much to do, we ministers can get involved in being aloof, too busy, or just simply not intimately involved in the lives of the people we minister to.

Zeloff talks about a number of syndromes evident in the ministry that interfere with good ministering. I'll identify only a few. One is called "roadrunner" that's when the minister is in perpetual motion, like the cartoon with the attendant "beep-beep." He or she is always on the run, always busy, always with much more to do than can be done so that there is never time to talk or care or share or do what a person needs. Members of the church even feed this by saying, "I really can't take your time," or "I wanted to share my serious concerns but I didn't want to bother you because I knew how busy you were." We are not successfully ministering if we are "road-running."

"Room service" is another style. This is a syndrome when the minister feels that he must cater to everyone's demand at that moment. Whenever the call comes in, no matter what the hour of the night, no matter what the plans of the family, the minister must drop everything and rush to be supportive and be counselor. We're all aware that most problems are not acute, but chronic. The time when the individual wants to talk, if it is not convenient for the minister, can be a time to set the appointment for a more convenient time for both parties. Too many times the minister's marriage or the family suffer because the minister hasn't learned to say, "No, I'm busy right now," when that is the case.

Another style is called "clean blackboard." Ministers are sometimes guilty, as can be anybody, of blaming the challenges in life on others. The thought then is if we can clean the slate--get rid of the board or the group of people or close out (Continued on page 4)

that difficult-to-deal-with group-then everything will be all right. Inevitably it isn't all right because getting rid of a few personalities is a delay until the challenge emerges again through new personalities. David Zeloff identified another syndrome entitled, "I must be a prophet, else, why are they stoning me?" Martyrdom is often subtle. As we create our own lives, we do create our own challenges. Often problems serve the purpose of justifying our existence through compounded problems.

Then there is the syndrome entitled "plaster of Paris." Certainly we're all guilty of this. We create an impossible image of what a minister should be and then berate ourselves for never living up to the ideal. We must have models and goals in our style of ministering, but at some point we allow ourselves to be our own model—to be our own guru—even as we teach that truth to others.

These syndromes and many more besides that we could make up or identify from the book do substantiate the sense of low self-esteem and avoidance of deep lasting relationships that ministers tend to express. As the problems lie within us, so do the solutions. However while the problems can be personal, I think the solution is interpersonal. We can serve each other. We can create those wheels within the wheels, the network of support of those ministers closest to us in proximity and in attitude, so that our mutual support can help us become every better examples of our way of life.

In several places around the country ministers have been getting together once a month for a lunch and sharing. This wheel within the bigger wheel isn't large. It is more like a master-mind activity of just a few ministers, sharing, supporting, caring, loving and blessing each other.

Create your own network. Whatever kinds of syndromes you have experienced, whatever degree you may have low self-esteem, or whatever ways you have been avoiding deep and lasting relationships, get together regularly with several other ministers to discuss your life and to encourage each other. This month, call two fellow ministers and talk. Really talk. Even get together for talk. Create your own support network and find that your stronger wheel rolls well to take our whole Unity movement farther and make it better. ++

I learned this, at least, by my experiment: that if one advances confidently in the direction of his dreams, and endeavors to live the life which he has imagined, he will meet with a success unexpected in common hours. He will put some things behind, will pass an invisible boundary; new, universal, and more liberal laws will begin to establish themselves around and within him; or the old laws be expanded, and interpreted in his favor in a more liberal sense, and he will live with the license of a higher order of beings. In proportion as he simplifies his life, the laws of the universe will appear less complex, and solitude will not be solitude, nor poverty poverty, nor weakness weakness. If you have built castles in the air, your work need not be lost; that is where they should be. Now put the foundations under them.

We're excited, too, about the Church Leadership Retreat scheduled for March 20-23, 1980. This is a first—the theme of the retreat is "The Creative Ministry" and it's for ministers, board members, and any lay persons involved in any key position within a Unity ministry. There will be a flyer and registration forms coming to you in the near future—I hope you'll plan to come, we're anticipating at least 200 people!

Something that's going to be really helpful to a lot of folks, available through your supplies catalog, will be a simplified bookkeeping system that is just great for small or medium-sized churches. This has already been presented to the ministers-in-training and will be presented to those attending the Church Leadership Retreat in March. Even if you can't be at the retreat, you will be receiving information on the bookkeeping system. In fact, if you'd like to know more about it now send us an order form out of the catalog with "bookeeping sample and information request" in the description column and we'll get it off to you as soon as possible.

If you've read Charley Townsend's article in this issue, you already know that we're changing around the format of CONTACT and the Placement bulletin a little. We'd like to increase the circulation of CONTACT so that it becomes a true vehicle of "contact" between the association and the field ministries as a whole instead of just being for "the few." We are creating a new vehicle for items which concern ministers only, such as the placement list, letters of interest to fellow ministers, seminars, materials, etc., etc. This will be called, "The Minister's Letter." It will provide a channel where we can be totally open to one another and "say it as we see it."

On the up and coming list are home and hospital visitation cards, thank-you and similar cards, prosperity banks, and an AUC brochure and/or audio-visual presentation.

THE FIRST THREE MONTHS

Dear Alan,

You may recall that a short time ago when we were having a phone conversation, you invited me to put down some ideas on what it feels like to be a new minister in the field. Following our conversation, I began to observe my feelings as I carried out my daily routine. (If there is such a thing as routine.) Obviously, my feelings and experiences will be unique and will reflect my approach to the ministry, which may or may not have any similarity to the other new ministers who graduated with me. I entered the ministry out of a background of a very technical business, and much of what I do probably reflects that background.

The main thing I am experiencing is the constant excitement. This definitely is not work! It has become apparent to me very quickly that one can get so hooked on this excitement, that it would be easy to overdo it. I have had to depend on a very helpful wife to let me know when I need to back off. Marie is a godsend for me in a variety of ways, too numerous to list. I have found it necessary to use discipline in relation to things like scheduling meetings on my day off, and the main reason is, that it just is not work.

This has to be the greatest time ever to be starting out as a Unity minister. So much ground work has already gone on; our central organization is strong, sound, and supportive; the publications from Unity School are well known; Silent Unity is a dynamic force in the world; and our message is being received without resistance by greater and greater numbers of people all the time. Is it any wonder it is exciting to be a Unity minister!

I recall leaving the protective confines of the Village with a whole bag of mixed feelings. Along with eagerness and a desire to be on with it, were feelings of uncertainty. My mind was full of questions like: "Have I prepared enough?" or, "Do I know enough?" It may be of interest to all field ministers to know why there was some doubt in my mind about my preparation. It was my experience during my two years in the Unity Ministerial School that there exists (or existed) many doubts about the school, the curriculum, the faculty, and the quality of the students, in the minds of many field ministers. The most emotional items both years at conference were debates concerning the education and ordination of new ministers. I wondered at the obvious concern, "Do you suppose," I thought, "that we really are not learning enough?" I have been

active now for only a little over three months but, quite frankly, have yet to have anything come along that I could not handle, or find out very quickly how to handle. Every day, every week, I learn something new, of course, but I don't expect that to ever be any different.

I'm sure I haven't seen it all yet, by any means, but let me give you an idea of some things that have gone on. First, two weeks after my arrival the interim board of directors left office, and seven brand new members were elected. In addition to the Sunday Services, I began a midweek service, to teach a daytime class, and have a Dial-A-Prayer. I've done a funeral, two weddings, two infant christenings, taken in new members three times (with a ceremony that had to be written new), started complete renovation and redecorating of the church, am co-hosting a special regional conference in February, survived Thanksgiving, and am in the process of organizing a Christmas program including a party, musical program and candlelighting ceremony. Now, to top it all, the organist is resigning as of the first of the year, so I get to pick a new one.

I realize that this is just normal for a minister, but that's the whole point. I thank God for Paul Barrett, Bill Fischer, Gary Jones, Frank and Martha Giudici, Phil White, Hypatia Hasbrouck, Dennis Neagle, Marilyn Rieger, Stan Hampson, Scott Sherman, and all the other ministers who worked so hard convincing me and my classmates of one basic fact -- we already were ministers. Somehow I knew that I was expected to be just as much a minister my first day here as if I had been ordained twenty years ago. The lady who called and asked me to pray with her the first time my phone rang wasn't concerned about my lack of experience. The people who came to that first lesson weren't checking my length of service. The young man referred to me by Silent Unity because of his potential for suicide, didn't stop to ask how long I had been there. He needed help now. They all need help now! They need to know that God is responding through the Christ within them, which is what we all need to know.

Are we ready when we leave Unity Village? I believe we are. I'm sure my classmates are every bit as busy, enthused, and active as I am. I'm sure they all are caught up in being ministers, because that's what they are. I believe that if any one somehow fails, it will be because he or she was unable to believe that of him/her self. The same holds true for every one of us, regardless of when we graduated from ministerial school, and who the faculty was. I believe our method of treating (Continued on page 9)

the educational process with the idea behind the title, "Ministers-in-Training" is the proper way to

I can't help but believe my excitement was ignited sometime during my two years at UMS, and I hope this fire is still being lit in the hearts and minds of those beloved people who are now Ministers-in-Training. I just can't imagine doing anything else with my life!

Recent discussion with C. Norman Shealy at his "Pain and Rehabilitation Clinic" in LaCrosse, has resulted in preliminary plans for the formation of Whole Person centers in conjunction with Unity churches. Dr. Shealy is interested in creating these centers to serve the needs of individuals in communities across the country. These Whole Person centers may be located in churches (if facilities permit). They would require little change in physical facilities to accommodate the services of an M.D., osteophathic physician, a psychologist, registered nurse and a Unity minister. One or two administrative personnel would round out the team.

It is our hope that such a Whole Person center would provide not only a service to the members of Unity churches but also attract those who subscribe to the Unity point of view in the general community. In this sense the project would become an important new beginning in outreach activities of the Unity church.

Dr. Shealy is preparing a preliminary survey form to be sent to those churches which have already shown interest. It is anticipated that although the first center might begin in a larger Unity church, those of medium size would also be good candidates for the program. More information of the pilot project will be provided as it develops. If any member ministry is interested and would like more information, please feel free to contact me at the AUC office.
