The office is architecturally more efficient, psychologically more comfortable and more conducive to creative effort, and aesthetically more pleasing to the eve.

AUC/UNITY SCHOOL COORDINATION COMMITTEE: effectiveness of the Coordination Committee is apparent in the results being obtained, especially in the area of greater cooperation between the AUC and Unity School. In the remodeling of the AUC office, Unity School was directly involved in contracting for the ceiling, lights, air/heat vents and duct work, and carpeting. Not only did they contribute tremendous expertise and supervisory talents through John Pearson, design/space planner for Unity School, but also contributed 50% of the cost of those items, a contribution of \$5.686.

Roy Howard and Jim Sproul, of the Unity School staff, have been directly involved in the analysis of our computer operations and related needs. They have been delightful to work with. Being knowledgeable, they are being of great help in guiding us as to the most effective use of our equipment and personnel. Being flexible, they are open to all kinds of options and possibilities for our utilization of their equipment, depending upon cost-efficiency and time/use

availability.

The Coordination Committee is continuing to explore other areas of possible greater cooperation and future direction of the two organizations.

NEW "TURN-AROUND" ENVELOPES: Each ministry will be receiving a batch of return address "turn-around" envelopes. This will serve a three-fold purpose: it will help alleviate the confusion of letters intended for AUC being sent to Unity School, it will help us to direct your check enclosures to the correct account by your indication in the appropriate printed box, and it will help you in your correspondence with us. The envelopes will be printed on a brightly colored paper so as to be easily recognizable to you, to Unity School and to the AUC office staff. Please be sure to use them in all your correspondence to AUC. Also, please be sure to indicate on your check what account it is intended for, whether insurance, tithe, merchandise, etc.

AETNA MEDICAL INSURANCE: The changeover to Ætna from Blue Cross/Blue Shield has now taken effect. New coupon books will be forthcoming when we know the exact amount of the life insurance portion (this is being computed by the insurance company as the ages of persons in the plan are verified from the returned cards). Please Note: Persons coming into group insurance membership for the first time do need to pay two months premium in ad-

vance at time of sign up.

Persons in arrears with Blue Cross/Blue Shield need to pay off any arrears before being accepted into the Ætna plan. We ask that all participants be current with premiums paid up two months in advance by January 1, 1981, and to stay current with future payments in order to maintain their membership in the

Ætna group insurance plan.

It has been the AUC policy to require written notice for cancellation of membership in the group insurance plan. Payments not received have in the past been paid by the AUC for later reimbursement in order that claims by members are not refused because of non-payment of contributions. This will not be necessary if everyone stays two months in advance in contributions as is required, so this practice will be discontinued as of January 1, 1981. Written notice of cancellation to the AUC office is still requested. However, payments will not be underwritten by the AUC office after January 1, 1981. Thank you for your cooperation.

DO YOU KNOW . . .

why it is that sometimes you, as a minister, may receive a glossy little booklet from Unity School (such as "Love Speaks") with a card enclosed saying that it will not be for sale or available for distribution through your center? Maybe you have wondered why center ministries are excluded from distributing these items.

You may know that the greater part of Unity School's income is derived on a love-offering basis for prayers and services, and not from the direct sale of merchandise such as subscriptions, books, and tapes. As a part of their outreach into the Unity community, Unity School makes periodic mailings, some of which are linked to the glossy booklets mentioned above. Although these booklets cost about \$.24 apiece to produce and about \$.09 to mail, they

are offered, free of charge, to those who respond to the School's mailing. As such, they are considered a "premium," something that encourages people to write a response to the School. Thus they are an integral part of Unity School's outreach. To give these booklets away in some other manner than through Unity's direct mailings would greatly reduce the response. Unity School sends each minister a copy of these booklets as a gift, and sometimes at a later date, these booklets become available for free distribution through the centers. Unity School does retain sole distribution of these items during the time of their mail promotion. This is one way that Unity School stays in touch with its correspondents and sends them a special, unique blessing several times a year.

DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH

By C. Norman Shealy, M.D.

During the past decade it has become obvious that the major determinants of health are lifestyle and habits. Dr. Thomas McKeown's intense analysis of the death rate and causes of during the past years has revealed there has been minimal improvement in longevity beyond childhood; that is, despite the fact that people live longer now than they did 75 years ago, the major increase in such longevity occurs in people who survive to age 20. The major improvement in longevity has come in preventing and treating childhood infectious diseases and indeed the real factors in this trend are improved sanitation, safer water supplies, pasteurization of milk, proper disposal of sewerage and adequate calories and protein to feed most of the people of the world.

Unfortunately with the prosperity which has come, the improved number of calories now exceeds that which is necessary to prevent infectious and maintain a reasonable state of health. Now we are literally eating ourselves to death with excess calories, remarkably refined foods and improper proportions of the foods that we do consume. If all Americans suddenly were to eat a "natural"

diet, within one generation we could expect a decrease of 75% in death from heart attacks. strokes, cancer of the colon, diabetes, high blood pressure; and many other stress diseases would be virtually wiped out. The natural diet consists of roughly 75 to 80% of the diet in the form of complex carbohydrates (starch) such as those found in various grains, beans and peas; 10% in the form of protein; 10% in the form of fats (preferably about 1/2 unsaturated and ½ saturated) and not more than 5% in the form of simple sugars largely from fruits. Contrast this natural diet which the human race consumed until the last 125 years with that which the average American consumes today: 25% in the form of simple refined sugars: 40% in the form of fats, many highly saturated: 10 to 12% in the form of protein; at least 10% in the form of highly refined carbohydrates which have been deprived of their vitamin and mineral content; and probably not more than 15% as natural unrefined complex carbohydrates or starch. If Americans should revert to the natural diet not only would health and longevity improve but food bills would go down markedly. The (Continued on page 10)

problem of course is education adequate to convince people to change lifestyles. On the other hand what would happen to McDonald's, Howard Johnson's, Kentucky Fried Chicken and other fast food restaurants or to General Mills and General Foods?!

The second major determinant of health is physical exercise; 79% of American teenagers flunked a minimal fitness test devised by Drs. Kraus and Weber. In Europe only 9% of children flunked the same test. It is well known that adequate physical exercise is essential to health and wellbeing and is a major contributor to homeostasis or balance of physiologic functions.

And finally but not necessarily least, the third determiner of health is mental attitude. Emotional stress in the form of fear, anger, guilt, depression or anxiety are widely recognized as major contributors to illness. On the other hand, a calm relaxed attitude, regular practice of relaxation training, and various self-regulatory training procedures such as meditation, autogenic training, etc. stress relievers. One of factors that is not ordinarily taken into account is that there is tremendous interreaction between physical exercise, diet and emotion, People

who eat a natural diet and exercise adequately tend to be more calm. Those who are junk food junkies are likely to be biochemically stressed and to have their brains severely stressed to the point of upsetting emotions. Just as those in the holistic movement emphasize the importance of integrating body, mind, emotion, spirit and environment, we must look at the most important three determinants of health: nutrition, physical exercise and mental attitude, and recognize that these are inter-related as well.

Nine fables, written in captivating rhymed prose, relate everyday experiences in the lives of animals through which children can identify emotions An illustrated booklet accompanies the album.

Sunday school teachers also will enjoy these stories as

supplementary material. Each story recognizes a childhood experience that may be of concern to a young listener. Talking in front of peers about an imaginary animal is non-threatening and gives the child a chance to voice and share in a Sunday school setting.

ation.



- Q.If a teacher moves to an area where there is no Unity center nearby, what happens to his/her licensed?
- A.The teacher retains her/his licensed, but is put on the inactive list. She can return

- to the active status when she is again connected with an AUC affiliated church.
- Q.Why is it necessary for the minister to approve the renewal of the Licensed Teacher's license?
- A. As stated in the answer above it is not a "renewal" of her/his licensed, but an acknow-ledgement from the minister whether he/she is active or inactive in the church. Only under a flagrant breach of ethics would a teacher's license be withdrawn, (see Code of Ethics for Licensed Teachers.)
- Q. How active does a Licensed Teacher have to be in the center to assume the renewal of her license?
- A. Again, her/his license is set up for renewal. As a teacher it would seem she/he would be teaching classes, but how actively should be arranged with the minister. The minister is in charge of the ministry, talk with him/her about what you can give and know what is expected of you. "We will not undertake any activity without the consent and complete cooperation of the minister. We will be supportive of the minister, as we know he/she is of us." (Standard and Ethics For Licensed Teachers)

Beginning with this issue, you will notice a new item in the "Association of Unity Churches Statement of General Funds Operation" entitled "Unity School Contribution." The AUC Board of Trustees has voted to include this item in the statement, and it is a reflection of the growing sense of cooperation between the AUC and Unity School of Christianity. The figures are year-to-date totals of various forms of substance (goods, services, and so forth) contributed by Unity School to the operation of the AUC. They are presented with the intent of increasing your understanding of how the AUC and Unity School are working together to spread the Truth message

throughout the world.



Which Bible?

There are so many versions of the Bible available today it may be confusing as to which one is "best" for the job at hand. Information and new discoveries surface nearly every day and our rapid technological advances are helping us obtain a greater understanding of the purpose and teachings in the Bible. Here is a brief survey of a dozen Bibles that are available (Included are only translations of both testaments, therefore the omission of such New Testaments as Phillips). This survey is brief but hopefully will encourage further research.

KING JAMES VERSION (KJV. 1611, many publishers). This classic came at a British monarch's approval of a resolution "that a translation be made of the whole Bible, as consonant as can be to the original Hebrew and Greek." leading scholars of the day were involved. The original also known as the "Authorized Version," included the Apocrypha and marginal notes reflecting uncertainties and variant readings in the manuscript. Its elegant prose was ideal for public reading. Updatings in spelling and renderings were made regularly into the 1800's. so the copies we have today are not identical with the 1611 edition. Despite intervening centuries and advance in linguistic and textual knowledge, the KJV retains a unique place in Christian hearts. Attempts to replace it by three authoritative translations, the Revised Version (1885), the American Standard Version (1901), and the Revised Standard Version (1952), proved futile. Annual sales of the KIV remain higher than any one of the recent translations. It is unlikely that any modern translation will ever dominate the field as the (Continued on page 21)

WHICH BIBLE? (Continued from page 20) KJV has done for more than three centuries.

THE AMPLIFIED BIBLE (AB, 1964, Zondervan). This version was prepared under the auspices of the Lockman Foundation and Zondervan. Special notice goes to Frances Siewert who was researcher for the translation committee. The title comes from the alternative renderings and additional words supplied in the text itself (usually in parentheses or brackets) rather than in the margin or as footnotes. It is awkward to read the AB aloud and many critics feel that it loses both the readability of a freer translation and the precision of a stricter one.

GOOD NEWS BIBLE (GNB, 1976, American Bible Society, Collins, Nelson). The American Bible Society sponsored this runaway best seller (also known as Today's English Version). The emphasis is on colloquial language, spoken rather than written. Some poetical passages do not fare well with such treatment, but many scholars agree with Walter Abbott that this translation is "not only clear and accurate, but also a masterpiece of modern linguistic study." Many people think it combines the best attributes of readability while remaining close

to the originals. A special advantage of this translation is the inexpensiveness of many of its bindings.

THE HOLY BIBLE IN THE LANGUAGE OF TODAY (Beck. 1976, Holman). The late William F. Beck was a Missouri Lutheran scholar who, proficient in Hebrew and Greek, spent much of his professional life translating the Bible, working through manuscripts and papyri to get the exact meaning of the original texts. The translation is simple and precise. Beck's avowed goal was "to have God talk to the hearts of people in their language." His work has been hailed as both faithful and readable. Beck died in 1966, just after completing his translation: fellow scholars edited the work through to publication.

THE JERUSALEM BIBLE (JB, 1966, Doubelday). This respected translation is a product of Catholic scholarship under the leadership of a British priest, Alexander Jones. The name comes because the annotations are translated from a French version prepared at a Dominican center for biblical studies in Jerusalem. Unlike previous English Catholic ventures, this translation was made from Hebrew and Greek rather than Latin. Naturally the Apocrypha is included. The style is quite (Continued on page 22)

(Continued from page 21) readable and freeflowing.

THE LIVING BIBLE (LB, 1971, Tyndale). Although called a paraphrase, this work of Kenneth Taylor is bound and marketed like a translation. Indeed, a strong case can be made that there is no essential distinction between paraphrase and translation, but rather a continuum between more literal and looser translations. The preface says that "its purpose is to say as exactly as possible what the writers of the Scriptures meant, and to say it simply, expanding where necessary for a clear understanding by the modern reader." This is essentially the goal of any translation, although the KJV, for example, usually italicized what it considered necessary expansions. Many evangelical scholars have felt that too many passages are interpreted too freely or imaginatively. But the phenomenal worldwide success of this volume testifies that its idiomatic use of language has made the Bible lively for multitudes of people.

THE MODERN LANGUAGE BIBLE (MLB,1959, Zondervan). This was long known as the Berkeley Version for the California residence of the translator of the New Testament, Gerrit Verkuyl. A committee of twenty evangelicals, under Verkuyl's

chairmanship, produced the Old Testament. In general, reviewers have found more to commend this translation than has the buying public. The many explanatory footnotes sometimes become pious observations.

THE NEW AMERICAN BIBLE (NAB, 1970, several publishers). The Catholic Biblical Association of America used the original language instead of the traditional Latin in this translation. (While being prepared it was usually called the "confraternity" version.) The fiftymember team includes a few "separated brothers" and thus "fulfills the directive" of Vatican II. The NAB naturally includes the Apocrypha and appears to be the standard translation of Catholics who prefer not to use translations prepared by Protestants. Don't confuse it with the NASB

NEW AMERICAN STANDARD BIBLE (NASB, 1971, several publishers). Sponsored by the Lockman Foundation, translation aims at adhering as closely as possible to the original language of Scripture, and doing so in a fluent and readable style. It was undertaken in the conviction that the American Standard Version of 1901 "retaines its acceptability for pulpit reading and personal memorization." Nonetheless. (Continued on page 23)

staunchly evangelical translation team found it necessary to depart from the ASV policy of word-for-word literalness. The approach remains conservative, however, following Hebrew and Greek rather than English patterns. Marginal notes and cross-references are a prominent feature.

NEW ENGLISH BIBLE (NEB, 1970, Cambridge, Collins, Oxford). This British translation was intended to be used alongside the King James. It aimed at conveying a "timeless" English, at being accurate yet not pedantic, and at removing" a real barrier between a large proportion of our fellow-countrymen and the truth." It was prepared under the auspices of all of the large denominations in Great Britain. The translators held that faithfulness does not always demand a word-for-word rendering, and that the chief criterion of translation is intelligibility.

NEW INTERNATIONAL VER-SION (NIV, 1978, Zondervan). Work began in earnest on this translation in 1967 when the New York International Bible Society backed the project. "Few translations since the King James," it is claimed, "have been as carefully done as this one. At each stage of the process there has been a wrestling of various minds with the sacred text and an honest attempt to say in simple, clear English what the Bible writers express in the originals." The translators were concerned with its literary quality. The NIV team was evangelical, international, and from a wide range of denominations.

REVISED STANDARD VER-SION (RSV, 1952, several publishers). A revision of the 1901 American Standard Version, its aim was to "embody the best results of modern scholarship as to the meaning of the Scriptures, and express this meaning in English diction which is designed for use in public and private worship and preserves those qualities which have given to the King James Version a supreme place in English literature." Although produced under the auspices of most of the larger American Protestant denominations, this translation has won acceptance also in many Catholic and evangelical circles. Many biblical commentaries have used the RSV as their basic text.

BOOK REVIEW

ALTERNATIVES By William L. Fischer Unity Village, MO: Unity Books, 1980; \$3.95

Many people are attracted to Unity because they find in Unity's teachings viable and healthy alternatives to previously held beliefs. For any given traditional teaching or concept-God, Jesus Christ, sin, and the like--Unity presents an alternative and with that alternative a challenge to live out that truth or concept in everyday experience. William L. Fischer, presently director of Unity's Radio and Television Department, has written a book which deals with Unity's alternatives to traditional beliefs and practices. Called appropriately Alternatives, Fischer's book will prove especially valuable to newcomers to Unity.

In a succession of short chapters (each averaging about seven pages), Fischer deals with: God, Jesus Christ, Male and Female, Prayer, Worship, Baptism, Communion, Heaven, Hell, Satan, Sin and Life after Death. These concepts are discussed (in general terms) according to the traditional view and then an alternative interpretation is given the reader. The subjects covered embrace the range of questions newcomers commonly ask about Unity. Some subjects have been omitted from the book. For example, there is no discussion of Unity's view on the Bible. Also, there is no mention of Unity's distinctive metaphysical alternative to traditional literalism. In fact the only two times that the word "metaphysical" is used is when the book makes references to Charles Fillmore's Metaphysical Bible Dictionary (pages 63 and 71). The book also makes a lot of sweeping generalizations about traditional teachings and makes one unfortunate error (probably typographical) when it refers to the Fourth Lateral (instead of Lateran) Council on page 53.

Alternatives is simply written, is well organized, and engages in a minimum of philosophical complications. The book should be most useful as a presentation gift to new members or possibly as a supplementary source for a course in Unity Fundamentals. The book is short (101 pages), has a attractive cover, and is compact enough to

be carried in purse or pocket.
