
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
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#### THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Recently I read an article by Adam Smith, author of *Powers of Mind*. He recalled the days in which a product stamped "made in Japan" was a sure indication of cheap and shoddy workmanship. Not so today--Japan has become a world model of a smoothly functioning society and its products are of highest quality.

Japan has the world's lowest infant mortality rate and the highest life expectancy rate.

Crime? In Japan, the cities are safe and the crime rate is going down.

I'm not trying to promote Japan, but I am interested in the process by which this

crowded group of islands, without significant natural resources, has brought itself to a place where it is working better than most other societies.

The Japanese have learned the art of cooperation. They work throughout the day in an atmosphere in which concensus is always the goal.

We here in the Western Hemisphere, and especially in Unity, pride ourselves on our individualism. Our diversity of talents and strengths is what has made us great. While our individualism can be one of our greatest strengths, it has also proven to be one of our greatest weaknesses.

We wonder why our AUC organization does not function smoothly. We bicker with each other and distrust the intentions of our associates. Something in our make-up promotes adversary relations and divisiveness. We seem to have lost a sense of community.

We have complained that our organization is too big and that it directs us too much. We have become suspicious of one another and of our brothers and sisters at Unity School.

I believe that the time has come for Unity to become COMM—UNITY.

I'm not suggesting that we

give up our precious freedom of choice. But let us choose to help one another to win. Let us reach out to one another in a spirit of mutuality. Let us become a support group for each other; for when one of our number loses, we all lose.

The model lived by Jesus and his disciples was one of "all togetherness" and interdependence. He said that loving "one another" was just as important as loving oneself. Jesus focused on one lost sheep or the one sparrow that had fallen. He knew that no one "gets there" until we all "get there."

There is a time and place for individualism. Each one of us must follow a "different drummer." But there is also a time and place for group solidarity and team consciousness. I believe for us in Unity now is the time as never before.

# COUNSELING

The subject of counseling is a lengthy and involved one. The need to understand the principles of counseling efficiently and effectively is the topic of this article. It will not "make" you a counselor. It will only share some thoughts and directions that you may choose to explore to become a more effective counselor or ministerial director of a counseling staff within the church or center setting.

#### The honest counselor

"Teach me to counsel" is an urgent cry among most ministerial students, ministers, and mental health specialists. The fact is, no one can be "taught" to counsel. This request often indicates preconceived concepts as to what counseling is supposed to do. Someone working from this premise takes upon him or herself undue responsibility for client change, like a magician who waves a magic wand, knows what is the right course of action for an individual to take and makes him or her take it--then the world is in order so the individual may live happily ever after. The client often reflects this same attitude. "Make me well and do it right now"! This is a trap that many well-meaning, committed ministers are subject to.

Counseling that can be taught or learned is really best titled "counseling skills." It is still up to the individual to be an effective counselor and, according to my definition, an effective counselor is one who has explored him or herself, recognized needs, attitudes, thoughts, motivations, and has had more successes than failures in counseling. If clients never come back, or if they continue on and on and on, or if they don't change, then something is not being done within the sessions for the counseling to become successful. Evaluating counseling progress can be very painful, and it takes an honest counselor to face any area within the situation that is not changing, or is avoided, or is constantly rehashed.

### What is the purpose of counseling?

This is a question that anyone wishing to counsel needs to ask him or herself. It is amazing how many different answers

can be given to the question. How it is answered determines the counseling relationship. To me, the purpose of counseling is to participate in the freeing of an individual to become more dependent on the Christ self-to draw a person out; point out options; encourage choices; confront "game playing"; apologize when wrong; share vulnerabilities: stimulate growth and responsibility to and for self. Try a variety of interventions or new methods if the old stand-bys aren't working. Put the client in control of the counseling goals so that he or she decides the outcome or areas of exploration as awareness develops. All these aspects encourage internal dependence. In this process, the counselor gains greater awareness of his or her own thoughts and feelings and becomes more dependent on the Christ self.

### What do you expect to receive from counseling?

The counselor should learn and grow along with the client. If there isn't some accomplishment, some new awareness on the part of the counselor, then an exchange isn't happening. The counselor needs to honestly confront what he or she expects to receive from counseling in order to be an honest counselor. How much change can the client accept, absorb, and assimilate, and at what rate? This is

the crux of self-evaluation, of being honest with oneself. The magnetic attraction of the experience of change, growth and fulfillment is the prize of honest evaluation and the prize of participating in the client's selfexploration. When both experience the risk of launching out into the world process and inward to an infinite process, the counselor is rewarded with his or her growth primarily and secondarily by the client's growth. For the client the same is true but the point of interest is reversed. The counselor who is "self-sacrificing" will soon get discouraged and develop excuses for not counseling. The key is not to be afraid--to be the flowing, changing, open, expressive, creative person one has the divine right to be and to encourage the client to claim all "right to life" options.

#### Be honest enough to let go.

Don't hold onto a client because you feel that you "have to help" him or her.. Be free enough to refer a client when the need is beyond your professional expertise. If the person is showing signs of psychosis or neurosis, be loving enough to refer him or her to another professional who can invest the time and facilities to help make the person's life better. Church or center counseling often isn't the best environment for deeply disturbed out-of-contact-with-

reality clients. You could arrange with a doctor or psychiatrist to be co-counselor in order to help your client make the transfer of trust that may have developed in your sessions. It is not a failure to recognize needs beyond your present skills. Be kind to yourself and to the client--loose them to their highest good, and you to yours.

### Be honest enough to admit your areas of weakness.

invest to Take time seminars or special classes that will increase your counseling and coping skills. There are research. always new methods, and new approaches being developed. Keeping abreast of these will give you more tools with which to work. This is an investment in yourself, and the techniques you learn may surface during a counseling session to help others when you least expect it.

#### What are you worth?

Place a mental value on yourself. Your time is worth something. Statistics show that people most often appreciate what they pay for. Unity does not "charge." However, you can suggest a minimum love offering rather than have the client squirm because he or she doesn't understand what a love offering is. You could ask the client to place the value on the sessions. You will be surprised, often favorably, as to the value received. Sometimes the "surprise" isn't so favorable. Then you need to ask yourself what value is missing in the client's needs. rather than assuming you know that he or she hasn't any money. If the client isn't in the position to give monetary compensation. then ensure his or her dignity in not accepting "charity" by allowing him to work in the church or on some special project. These people often become your most dedicated workers because they have found "something" that works in their lives. You in return have given them a way to express self-respect. Be generous enough with yourself to look for your own emotional, mental and monetary rewards, remembering, "It's God's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." Your responsibility may be to define what aspects of the kingdom you are to be rewarded with.

#### Cherish your divine privilege.

You are in the prime position of confidentiality. There is no circumstance where a client's confidence can be betrayed. If the client gives you written permission of disclosure, then the circumstances and the rules have changed. You will be protecting yourself legally also should such a case arise. The trust of another individual is a sacred gift and

should be regarded as fragile, precious, and a divine privilege.

Summary--To evaluate yourself is one of the most difficult tasks to be undertaken. However, it would give not only a greater inner understanding of who and what you are, but it would begin to dissolve the myriad

dichotomies that separate one from oneself. Self-evaluation is a starting point at which to meet the client on equal ground. Both of you will be student and teacher, participating in each other's growth, discovering each other's Christlike potentials. It's an exciting adventure. It is the foundation upon which to build and develop counseling skills.

#### EATING THE "NATURAL" DIET Stocking Up

Despite the simplicity of the natural diet, food has been so artificially altered (processed chemically mechanically) that most people are at a loss to know how to buy and prepare natural meals. Even purchasing good food requires extra attention since a majority

of foods in most grocery stores is chemically altered with additions of sugar, BHT, BHA, and other preservatives. Despite the effort required, the quality of your food can be improved-and costs reduced--if you shop wisely.

First, for bulk items, try either a natural food co-op or order from a reputable organic food supplier. Stock your larder with whole wheat, brown rice, millet, corn, rve. buckwheat, triticale, and oats. If you do not invest in your own "mill," you will also want corn meal, whole wheat and buck wheat flour, and rolled oats. All these cereals are delicious simply boiled alone or in various combinations, served with sauces, butter, curries, or in casseroles. They can also be ground and cooked as you



would of cream wheat; or they can replace up to one-half of the flour in various pastries, breads, etc. Whole wheat macaroni. spaghetti, sagna, etc., also offer welcome variety.

As a minimum, purchase brown sesame seeds (excellent for complementing pro-

tein and for flavor: they can also be sprouted easily). Alfalfa seeds for sprouting are another must; sunflower and pumpkin seeds offer optional variety.

An extensive selection of peas and beans rounds out the basic stock. You may want to begin with chick peas, lentils aduzi, mung, green peas (whole and split), and soy. Lima beans and black-eyed peas are other favorites. All these require at least overnight soaking plus fairly long cooking or grinding the next morning. For a magnificent humus, soak chick peas overnight. Then grind or blend 2 cups of chick peas, 1 cup of sesame seeds, ½ tsp. salt, and the juice of I lemon. Cooked chick peas can also be used. Humus is a delicious complete "protein" food and is excellent

with whole wheat bread or puff bread.

Nuts are also excellent food; almonds and peanuts are basic choices, but choose any variety you like. Grind your own peanut butter or buy old-fashioned types. You may mix humus and peanut butter for a taste treat.

As a general rule, per person per year, you need

-- 150-200 lbs. of grains

-- 75-100 lbs. of beans & peas

--10-15 lbs. of nuts

-- 5 lbs. of seeds

Ideally you will also raise large quantities and many varieties of fresh vegetables or purchase them from an organic gardener/farmer. Irish potatoes, green beans, sugar peas (especially snap peas with edible pods), lettuce, kale, chard, summer and winter squash, tomatoes, onions, garlic and cabbage are minimal varieties.

Fresh eggs and homemade yogurt are essentials. Yogurt can be made from a Piima culture which grows easily at room temperature, (culture obtained from Piima, Box 2614, LaMasa, CA 92041). Freeze it in a clean jar, divide your initial batch in half so that you always have a fresh starter.

Fish and meats raised free of added hormones and chemicals are healthy and tasty additions to the natural diet. Two to six ounces per day will satisfy taste and supply enough protein (even two ounces per day if you blend grains and peas and beans).

Natural (non-processed) cheeses are also good in moderation (not more than one or two ounces per day).

Fresh whole fruits add joy to the process of eating. In general they should supply many snacks and desserts. When these are not available, frozen (without sugar but with a little honey) or dried (without sulfur dioxide) may be used in moderation (especially dried fruits, which tend to be eaten in large quantities because of their lesser bulk).

Honey may be used in a natural diet; certainly no more than one pound per week and ideally only one-half pound or less.

In summary, stock your larder with virtually all these foods and avoid those that are bleached and/or "perserved," or artificially hydrogenated or flavored.

# TAX CONSIDERATION IN SELECTING A RETIREMENT PLAN

As the year end approaches, consideration must be given to financial planning for 1981. Factors to consider are the alternatives available for contributions to a retirement plan. As you know, the Association has established a money purchase pension plan that can be adopted by any member church.

Upon adoption of the Association's plan, all full-time employees who have completed one year of service and have attained the age of twenty-five will be eligible to participate. In addition, the employee must agree to make the voluntary contributions required under the plan. For purposes of this rule, years of service will include vears of service with the employer before adoption of the plan, service with another member of the Association which has not adopted the plan, or service with Unity School of Christianity.

As the plan is adopted, the employer is required to contribute 8 percent of a participant's salary to the plan and the participant is required to contribute 3 percent of his or her salary to the plan. In addition, the participant may voluntarily contribute an additional 7 per-

cent to the plan so that the total contribution would equal 10 percent. The participant's contributions do not result in a tax deduction although the income earned on the participant's contribution is not subject to tax until distributed. This allows a participant to save and see his savings compound faster than would occur if the funds were placed in a savings account.

It should be noted at this even though point that minister is classified as a selfemployed person for purposes of the Social Security taxes, a minister is an employee of a member church for most other purposes, including the money purchase pension plan. Thus, if a member church adopted the plan, the minister would be eligible to participate in the plan if he or she would meet the age and years of service requirements and would agree to make the voluntary contribu-

If the member church has not adopted the money purchase pension plan, the minister and other employees would be free to contribute to an individual retirement account. Each employee would have to establish his own account and could

contribute 15 percent of compensation up to \$1,500. If the contribution is within the limits referred to in the previous sentence, they will be deductible on the individual's personal tax return.

It should also be remembered that even if the member church has adopted the money purchase pension plan, the minister will typically receive amounts of income other than salary. This could include income as a result of weddings, seminars, or other services. This income would be classified as self-employment income and the minister could establish a Keogh (H.R. 10) plan to receive up to 15 percent

of his self-employment income. Again, this contribution would be deductible on the individual's tax return.

There is also a minimum contribution rule for Keogh plans. If your adjusted gross income is less than \$15,000, you may contribute up to \$750 of your self-employment income to a Keogh plan even though this exceeds the 15 percent limitation mentioned earlier. Bear in mind that the salary received from the church as compensation can be considered only for money purchase pension plan or individual retirement account (one but not both) purposes and is not eligible compensation for a Keogh plan.

A brief article such as this does not cover all the ramifications of a retirement plan. If you are interested in any of the plans discussed in this article, you should discuss this with a competent advisor before a course of action is taken.

This past fall our church decided to commit an act of love by creating a neighborhood circulation day. Members brought to our church various items they had not been using. Then we invited the public to come and take anything they felt they needed. It was sort of a garage sale without money.

I strongly urge you to consider having a "Circulation Day" in your church. Be sure to advise all newspapers and television stations in your community. Due to public response of the story the news station is now working with us on a city-wide Circulation Day to be held in July. All Kansas City churches and synagogues will be asked to participate in the mass Circulation Day to benefit the entire Kansas City area.

On a Saturday morning hundreds of people passed through our church claiming everything from popcorn poppers to fur coats. A good time was had by all, but two incidents in particular made my heart light up. I write them now with the hope that they will touch you.

I opened the door early Saturday morning to hundreds of enthusiastic people. In thirty minutes everything was gone, yet there were many people who never got a chance to take items. I was concerned that somehow we had failed Sowing

by not having enough things for everyone. As I began to walk around and explain our situation to various groups of people an amazing thing happened. The tables began to fill up once again with clothing and household goods. You see, the people who had come early to receive caught the spirit of giving. They returned home, cleared out their closets, and came back to church to give their wares.

This process repeated itself numerous times, and when we finally closed the doors we had given away approximately five times as much as we initially hoped for. It was magnificent to see hundreds of people excitedly sharing with each other.

On Friday before Circulation Day, as I sat in my office, a little man of perhaps eighty-five years shuffled in and sat down. I introduced myself and then asked how I might help him. He explained how he was too old to fight a crowd and therefore had come one day early because he desperately needed a winter coat. He said, "The Lord told me if I would come a day early, someone would help me."

I was totally unprepared for the encounter because we had told people not to bring items to church until the evening before Circulation Day. As lovingly as I could, I explained the circumstances to him. He listened very calmly and when I had finished he very resolutely stated, "You don't understand. The Lord told me you would help me."

We sat silently for a few moments and then I explained to him that I had to leave the church and make a hospital call. Gradually the old man pulled himself to his feet and began door. the hobbling toward Suddenly a thought occurred to me. In one of the church closets a few items of clothing had been left over from a rummage sale that had been held earlier. I took the man's arm and walked him toward the closet.

As I sifted through what were mostly women's dresses, I happened upon what appeared to be a brand new overcoat. Gleefully I handed it to the little man and he wrapped it around his tired shoulders. A tailor could not have designed a coat to fit him more perfectly.

He smiled in triumph and without saying a word spun around and almost youthfully strutted toward the door. Before leaving he turned to me with a magical sparkle in his eyes said something I'll not soon forget.

He said, "Young man, if you're going to be a preacher you got to learn something. The Lord don't ever lie."

# SIG PAULSON SPEAKS TO HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Sig Paulson, Unity Church of Christianity, Houston, Texas, offered the opening prayer for the United States House of Representatives in Washington, D.C. on August 26, 1980. Sig's prayer:

"Let us take a few moments to be grateful for each other and for all who pray with us today.

"I refer to the Reverend J. Sig Paulson, minister of the Unity Church of Christianity. Reverend Paulson has come to us from Houston, Tex., to inspire this House today with an opening prayer.

Our nation rests upon faith in a universal God who may be approached through the many paths to Christ consciousness."

#### YOUTH SERVICES COORDINATOR REPORT by Maggie Finefrock



"The time has come" the Walrus said,
"To talk of many things

Are you looking for a fresh way to stretch your creativity for the New Year? If you have not already embarked upon this great adventure, why not try incorporating a children's sermon into your Sunday worship service?

Many churches are emphasizing family worship services as a means to encourage family participation; promote intergenerational sharing of faith; bring more life to the worship experience; and help young people feel they are an important part of the congregation.

One way to provide this atmosphere of ministry to all ages is a children's sermon, already used successfully in some Unity Centers. This can be handled in several creative ways, but here is one suggestion.

Have the family sit together for the first part of the service, the opening prayer, songs, and announcements. The children's talk is usually given before the meditation so children can then return to their classes.

When it is time, the minister asks the children to come to the front of the sanctuary. They can sit in a half-circle around the minister, on the steps, etc. The minister should sit at eye level with the children.

What kinds of activities can be successful in a children's lesson? The answers are as farreaching as your imagination.

Usually this segment lasts from five to ten minutes. The theme can be a capsulized version of the adult lesson to be given later in the service. It can be a reinforcement of the power or objectives that the Youth Education Department is working on for one month. Whatever you choose, you will probably find that the adults learn and enjoy as much as the children. But remember, this is a special time to be with

the children and not a time to preach to the parents in disguise!

An effective way to present concepts to children (of all ages) is through object lessonstalks that focus on one concept and a tangible object, as in the example given later in this article. Here are some simple steps for writing and presenting your talk:

- 1. Focus on one main idea.
- 2. Find an object or interesting illustration of that main idea.
- 3. Reinforce the idea as many ways as possible.
- 4. Draw the Truth out of the children rather than just telling.
- 5. Help the children apply this idea to their daily lives.

Here is an example of a children's talk that you might use. You might find that you have fun along with the kids relating to Truth from a new angle!

#### THE IRRITATED OYSTER

Text:

Ephesians 4:2-3. With all lowliness and meekness... with forbearing one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

Object:

A small rock and a pearl.

Main Thrust: Make an effort to respond positively to irritation.

Minister: Can you all see this? (Hold the small stone in the palm of your hand.) It's very small, but I want all of you to take a good look at it. Now, you wouldn't think that something this small could cause much of a problem would you? But it can. And lots of times it does! How many of you have ever gotten a small rock like this one inside your shoe? (Let them have a show of hands and relate the experience.) It really can be a problem can't it? Every time you take a step, it hurts. It rubs against your foot, and pretty soon you have a very sore spot.

What is usually the first thing you do when you get a rock in your shoe and begin to feel it rubbing? That's right. You take off your shoe and throw the rock away. That solves the problem. Have you ever thought however, what would happen if you could not take your shoe off? What if that rock just had to stay there? That could be a very painful experience. Yet that is exactly what happens to poor Mr. Oyster.

How many of you know what an oyster is? Well, it's a kind of mollusk that looks like a little muscle, and it lives inside a shell at the bottom of the ocean. One of the biggest problems in an oyster's life is that sometimes a small grain of sand gets inside its shell, like the little rock that gets into your shoe. The oyster's problem is that it does not have any way of getting the sand out. It just stays there and rubs against him. It irritates him and makes him sore. That would be a hard way to go through life, wouldn't it? What do you think the oyster does? Can any of you guess? (At this point some of the ideas may prove interesting.)

Let me tell you what he does. When that rock starts rubbing and hurting, the oyster puts a very fine coating of fluid over it. The oyster is small, so he can only put a little on at a time, but every time that rock hurts him, he puts on a little more and little more. Very slowly all the rough edges of that stone get smoothed out as it is coated over and over again. Do you know what finally happens? We get one of these. (Show them the pearls.)

They really are pretty, aren't they? You see, with a lot of patience and hard work, the oyster turns that painful rock into a beautiful smooth pearl. It isn't easy, but I'm sure you will all agree it is worth it in the end.

I think you can all see the lesson we can learn from the oyster. I don't mean that we are going to make the rocks in our shoes turn to pearls, but there is something more important than that involved. There are certain people in all our lives who affect us a lot like a rock in a shoe. They are the

folks we just can't seem to get along with. They irritate us. Right? And how do we usually react to them? We are usually grumpy or we argue with them. We just don't get along at all. That is where we can learn from this pearl. Jesus said we ought to make a special effort to win over the people we have problems with, and that is what the oyster does.

This week, whenever someone does something that would make you angry or hurt your feelings, remember what Jesus said and return good things for bad and love for hurt. It is just possible that after a little while you will discover that your friendship has turned a rock into a pearl. It might just be a lot of fun to try.--



#### YOUTH OF UNITY REPORT

The minister can be an important participant in the local YOU program by supporting the YOU sponsor. Be careful selecting the sponsor, encouraging him or her to attend sponsor training opportunities and by meeting with the sponsor on a regular basis, the minister can build a strong working relationship that will in turn ensure that the spiritual needs of the YOUers are met.

#### SELECTION

As previously discussed in CONTACT, the YOU sponsor should know Unity's teachings in order to teach them, but more importantly he or she should be a person who lives the Truth by knowing how to love. The ability to respond from a consciousness of love when confronting any situation, especially a difficult or frustrating one, is the most important attribute of the sponsor.

As an extension of knowing how to love, the sponsor should seek to give the YOUers the opportunity to learn about responsibility and leadership through direct experience. This means the sponsor does not dominate decisions but is capable of acting as a consultant to the group, identifying responsibilities to the church and community, but as much as possible allowing the YOUers to plan and carry out their own projects.

Similarly, the sponsor should approach the group's exploration of Truth principles as a cooperative work, with the sponsor acting to facilitate learning rather than imparting information. The sponsor must recognize that the YOUers have the same indwelling Christ which enables them to be teachers as well as students.

Finally a YOU sponsor should be nonjudgmental and unshockable. YOUers frequently confide to the sponsors questions or situations concerning sensitive subjects, and it is essential that the sponsor be able to address these topics in an objective, accepting manner. The sponsor must be free from the need to force his or her own code on the YOUers, but should challenge YOUers to develop and be true to their own code.

#### RAPPORT

Once the sponsor has been selected, the minister can prosupport and direction through periodic consultation meetings (every one to two months). Such meetings enable the minister to communicate expectations for the sponsor's and the YOUers' participation in church activities, while expressing appreciation for the rather large amount of volunteer time the sponsor contributes. In turn, the sponsor can use this time to inform the minister of planned YOU activities and areas where the support of the church would be helpful. This kind of dialogue can yield benefits to everyone involved and will help create a cooperative spirit.

At some centers the sponsor meets individually with the minister, while in other cases the sponsor is invited to attend the monthly board meetings. Some ministers also meet occasionally, (every three to six months) with the YOU president to communicate support and maintain a direct link with the young people in the church.

#### TRAINING

The sponsor's job requires definite teaching and leadership skills that can be sharpened with training. The minister can make sure that the sponsor knows how to conduct an effective YOU program by en-

couraging him to attend sponsor training seminars/retreats. Sponsors who receive training feel more confident in their work, and thus, they are more effective and more likely to have a long-term involvement.

The church can make it easier for the sponsor to attend training sessions by assisting with the cost of registration and/or transportation. YOU sponsor training retreats will be offered in the near future:

# DO YOU KNOW . . .

why it is that sometimes Unity School makes a "special offer" on a subscription that seems to undercut the price a center can offer? For example. every now and then Unity School makes a mailing to DAILY WORD subscribers that allows them to send four gift subscriptions for half price (\$1 a year, instead of \$2). These offers are conducted primarily to add to our list names of persons who might be interested in our message, and to let more people know of the work we are doing.

Centers offer subscriptions for the regular rate of \$2 a year. However, Unity School gives centers an ongoing discount of 40%, which enables them to make eighty cents on each subscription they sell. It may interest you to know that your center makes more on these subscriptions than the School does! For example, the maga-

zines that make up a one-year subscription to DAILY WORD cost seventy cents to produce. Mailing charges are about five cents per copy, or sixty cents for the twelve issues. Thus Unity School's cost for this magazine is \$1.30, excluding any office cost. The subscription is sold to centers for \$1.20. Unity School makes a contribution of at least ten cents every time a center sells a subscription to DAILY WORD.

The figures for other periodicals, books, and cassettes differ, yet the rule holds true that Unity School makes very little profit on its publications. Unity School sees the publication and distribution of its literature as an integral part of its outreach, and for this reason strives to keep the prices as low as possible.

#### The President's Letter

A word that has become very special to me over the past few years, thanks to Lyman Coleman and his Serendipity concepts, is "enable." I think, as Unity ministers and teachers, we are more than anything else ENABLERS, engaged in the adventure of "enabling" people to find and be their Christselves. We grow people; and growing involves letting them use their unique spiritual gifts.

I have found that many of us in a leadership role in Unity have been good "affirmers" of people's potential, but poor "enablers." We have affirmed them on Sunday and told them and taught them of the "gift of God" within. But on Monday (and the rest of the week), we'd rather "do it ourselves." We fail to give our people the opportunities to use their special skills and abilities.

There are several styles of leadership that I have found myself and other Unity leaders expressing:

- 1. There is the Doer--this is the leader who does it all and is doer of all significant, important, and praise worthy things in the church or center.
- 2. There is the Expert--no matter what you've done, he's done it too and better! He or she can show you a scrapbook that shows when and how they did it.
- 3. There is the Boss--who says "do it my way or else!"
- 4. There is the Abdicrat-- this leader's always out to lunch, always getting someone else to do it, but wanting the credit if it works, washing his or her hands if it fails.
- 5. There is the Hero-Martyr--this type just sighs a lot.
- 6. Then there is the Enabler--this person is a discipler of people, helping them to know themselves and to be themselves.

I believe the enabling style of leadership to be the style adopted by Jesus Christ. I believe it to be the true calling of each Unity leader. I believe we sell our people short when we only lecture them on their potential, but fail to give them the opportunity in our ministries to use and strengthen that potential.

Lao-tze said it best: "A leader is best when people barely know he exists. Not so good when people obey and acclaim him. Worse when they despise him. But a good leader who talks little and when his work is done his aim fulfilled, they will say: 'We did it ourselves'."

#### An Expanding Unity and You

In the months to come the Outreach Facilitator for your region may be calling you to assist in the development of a study group near your ministry. Your conversation may flow like this: "Hello, Mary. This is John Smith, the outreach facilitator for our region. I have just received a phone call from Debi Martin at the AUC office informing me of an individual who is interested in forming a Unity group near your ministry. I am calling to ask if you are willing to assist this person in forming such a group?"

This article is being written so your first question will not be, "What is an Outreach Facilitator?" Outreach facilitators are members of the Outreach Committee who have the task of helping to develop and sustain study groups in their efforts to serve the spiritual needs of their communities.

The facilitator concept was the result of two basic acknowledgements. First, much of our expansion as a field movement has been the direct result of the grass roots approach to expansion. Ministers and ministries have developed study groups in close proximity to their churches. Secondly, each year numerous people contact Unity Village about the outreach activities of our movement. For instance, last year over one hundred such contacts were made with little development resulting. These two basic ideas gave birth to the Outreach Facilitator concept.

At this time Outreach Committee members are in the process of preparing three packets to assist groups in various stages of unfoldment. The basic goal is to provide for the orderly development of a core consciousness and to establish personal contact and a feeling of being a part of the Unity family. In addition, a newsletter network is emerging that will create an atmosphere of sharing ideas between groups and provide a format through which helpful ideas governing development can be aired.

You as a Unity leader can help. Outreach packets and newsletters are important, but they are no substitute for an understanding, caring helper. That is why you will be contacted when a person desires to form a Unity group. Your personal involvement and leadership will be invaluable in forming and sustaining an outreach activity. Perhaps if the minister has commitments that do not allow his or her direct involvement, then a licensed teacher could shoulder the leadership and helping responsibilities.

As personal contact is made between the group and a Unity leader, the facilitators will mail outreach packets to the study group. In addition, the facilitators will be available to conduct seminars for the groups that will help sustain their unfoldment. Overall, the Unity movement is returning to an acknowledgement that the grass roots approach to expansion is effective and our forte is personal involvement with our people. With this as our foundation, our harmonious unfoldment is assured.

#### NORTHWEST REGION (Tom Sikking, R.R.):

The Northwest ministers are proud of the number of ministries they have jointly and individually started. In the last twelve years, twelve new ministries were pioneered. All but two now have full-time ministers.

To help these and other smaller ministries in the Northwest, the region has established an Outreach Development Fund in the amount of \$2000. The fund is being financed by each member church, giving an extra \$200 per year from their tithe. A Planning and Program Committee was set up at the Great Lakes Conference in Toledo last September. This committee is initially charged with investigating possible meeting places for our regional conference and working out a program. Tentative arrangements have been made to go to Potawatomi Inn, halfway between Detroit and Chicago. This location should allow just about everyone to drive (or share rides), thus saving travel expenses. The thought is to tap our own resources and to have more time for sharing and helping each other. We also want to have activities for teachers. Please share your ideas and comments. We will vote on finalized arrangements in June at AUC Conference.

One of the new directions taken at the Great Lakes

Regional Conference in Toledo was the appointment of the Licensed Teacher-Minister Relations Committee. Members of this committee include Helen Rozek, Toledo, Licensed Teacher; and Ministers Betty Jacunski, Birmingham, Michigan; John Cuddeback, Cedar Rapids, Michigan; and Ross Tucker, Decatur, Illinois, Chairman.

The major purpose of the committee is to serve as an informational resource point to improve relations between Licensed Teachers and Ministers and to work with our new Great Lakes Facilitator, Ara Helen McDonald, Madison, Wisconsin, in developing programs that can and should be included in our region.

#### **UMS News & Views**

Nowadays most newly ordained Unity ministers are immediately called to serve established Unity churches previously led by experienced ministers who have ministered as much by what they are as by what they know, say and do. The congregations expect the newly ordained ministers to be as confident and convincing as their predecessors. That is why the faculty of UMS pays as much attention to the psychological and spiritual development as to the academic progress of the ministers-in-training.

It is easy to monitor academic progress because the formal academic curriculum is the same for all MITs. Designed by the faculty, the MIT curriculum committee, and the Education Council to provide the knowledge and information required of Unity ministers, it also provides opportunities to master the techniques and skills by which they can use the knowledge and information effectively. The academic curriculum teaches MITs what to say and do like seasoned professionals.

The MITs learn how to "say and do like seasoned professionals" by taking a hidden curriculum which is different for every MIT. The hidden curriculum-often called THE PROCESS by MITs and faculty-is revealed course by course to each individual. The "courses" in the individual's hidden curriculum run concurrently with the outer curriculum; indeed, the hidden course is usually direct outgrowth of the outer curriculum. The individual's hidden curriculum consists of the specific growth tasks (better known as challenges) which the individual MIT must master to become an embodiment of what he or she will teach and preach as an ordained minister.

Many tasks are accomplished easily by the individual, but some require assistance from an experienced minister. That is why personal counseling is an important function of the UMS faculty. During counseling sessions, MITs discover not only ways to deal creatively with current challenges but also ways to help their future counselees to deal with similar challenges. Since faculty members, whether in UMS or Unity School, are all Unity ministers, they encourage use of spiritual principles learned in the academic curriculum. As MITs use the principles, they incorporate them and discover their own potential for living the Truth.

By progressing through the two curricula, MITs gain the confidence and conviction which their first congregation will expect. They are able to go into the field to serve not as fledglings but as full-fledged

Unity ministers.

# YOU/YAU Reports

#### YOUTH OF UNITY REPORT

Recently, the YOU minister advisor for the Southwest region, Arthur Hammons, conducted a survey to determine what YOUers, ministers, and sponsors expect from YOU as an organization. The YOU officers and adult teachers plan to use the results to make YOU more responsive to everyone's needs and desires. In responding to the questionnaire which was sent to me, I focused on what I believe are many of the basic objectives of YOU and so I feel it is worthwhile to share in this issue of CONTACT some of the survey questions and part of my responses.

1. What do you feel are some reasons for having a YOU chapter in a church?

The YOU chapter is an intricate balance of study, prayer, service, and social activities that provides young people in Unity an opportunity to express their Truth nature as children of God. The YOU Chapter meeting provides a loving, nonjudgmental environment where YOUers may learn Truth principles and the Unity way of life.

2. What do you feel are some of the reasons for forming these chapters into a Region?

Organizing into Regions helps to develop closer contact and support among the Chapters. Regional activities build enthusiasm, encourage an exchange of ideas and also allows for the use of teaching methods which typically are not possible at chapter meetings. The Regional prayer-panel material creates a powerful group consciousness of prayer which unifies and energizes local Chapters. The Regional newspaper is a useful channel of communication and creative expression as well as a vehicle for mutual support.

3. What do you feel a young person in YOU gains from being a part of YOU?

What an individual gains from being a part of YOU depends in large part on what they are seeking and how much effort they are willing to expend in order to learn. I think it is more appropriate to talk about what YOUers may gain if they choose to take advantage of the opportunity which YOU provides. Through YOU an individual can gain the following:

- 1. A purpose for living and a method for answering life's complexities
- 2. A sense of self-worth and identity
- 3. Peer group acceptance and support
- 4. An opportunity to develop a philosophy of life
- 5. Communication and leadership skills
- 6. The ability to relate to other persons in a positive and meaningful way
- 7. Emotional stability and maturity
- 8. An opportunity to use talents, wisdom, and energy
- 4. What do you feel are some of the reasons for having Regional Officers.

The Regional Officers are responsible for the production of regional publications such as prayer-panel material or the newspaper. They also may take responsibility for planning and conducting regional rallies or assisting local chapters with that function. The Regional Representative presides over the regional business meetings and

coordinates the regional service project, while the associate acts as the chaplain for the region. In addition to these very necessary and practical functions, the Regional Officers teach leadership skills through example to the younger YOUers. It is the Regional Coordinator's responsibility to make sure that the Regional Officers have adequate opportunity to develop their own leadership skills.

## The President's Letter

It seems that I have spent a great portion of my life as a Unity minister majoring in minors! What I mean to say is that I have long been preoccupied and involved with aspects of life that are none of my business. I have spent time judging, frowning, criticizing, complaining, and shaking my head at things that don't amount to a "hill of beans."

My feeling is that I am joined in this fruitless effort by countless numbers of my colleagues in the Unity ministry. We've been caught in the same trap that we warn our congregations about every Sunday-judging by appearances. We spend our time reading the graffiti on the wall of life--watching what people do and say, and reacting to their every move. We spend our days under the spell of believing that what other ministers or what Unity School is doing or not doing is really the essential issue of our lives. All the while, knowing deep down that all this is graffiti on the wall of life. It is nonessential, unimportant, irrelevant, and none of our business.

When the young Jesus was discovered missing by His parents and was found sharing with the priests and teachers in Jerusalem, His parents attempted to put a guilt trip on Him by displaying their disapproval and embarrassment. Jesus replied that He was simply going about His Father's business.

What is my Father's business? What is yours? It would appear that our only business is being who we really are. Jesus was preoccupied with the pursuit of His own excellence--the raising of His consciousness to better express His own being. He was not caught up in the nonessentials of life. He saw the essence of life, not the evidence.

We who have spent countless hours arguing, backbiting, complaining, or nitpicking in recent years have lost sight of our appointed business. We are also out of touch with the call that brought us into the ministry in the first place. To stay in this preoccupation is to put ourselves on a crash course with mediocrity.

It's time to get back to business--the Father's business of being who we have been divinely ordained to be--ministers of Jesus Christ. Our only business is being the Christ, teaching the Christ, and seeing the Christ.

What you think of me or I of you is none of our business! What you and I are becoming as excellent leaders, teachers, trainers, models, and human beings is what we are all about.

An argument has been called "the friction of two fictions." An argument never occurs between who we really are, but only between the illusions of who we think we are.

If we are still tempted to major in minors, let us remember Jesus' words--"What is that to us?" Let's all get back to business as usual--the Father's business of pursuing excellence in expressing what He created us to be.



## **Ministry Services Perspectives**

Hello Friends:

Exciting things are in the works!

The newly-formed Media Communications Committee presented a proposal to your AUC Board of Trustees in January that has tremendous potential benefit for your ministry.

The idea involves the development of video cassettes for cable TV and/or commercial TV. These cassettes are intended to provide fifteen, thirty, or sixty-minute programs with local inserts. Implementation will require a minimum of involvement or media experience on your part. To help you in the creative use of mass media, self-help kits are already being prepared for distribution. Other aspects of the proposal include the production of teaching aids on video and tape cassettes for use in ministries, study groups, youth education and Sunday schools. A two-hour seminar on media communications by Jack and Hope Fries is planned for conference week, and regional or local seminars may be scheduled at that time

Your AUC Board of Trustees received the proposal enthusiastically and authorized the preparation of two pilot programs for presentation at June Conference. The Board allocated \$2,000 to get the project

off the ground. Since then, the Southwest Region has matched that amount with another \$2,000, Christ Unity Capistrano has given \$500, and another ministry has elected to contribute a monthly donation toward the project.

In order to handle donations for this project in an orderly way, a special fund has been set up in your AUC office. # Positive Public Relations

How would you like to provide an outreach service for professional people in your community? I refer not to doctors, lawyers, or teachers, but rather to professional journalists.

Did you know that newspaper and television executives hire entire staffs of reporters whose primary functions are to seek out stories? They work night and day to uncover any stories that might be of interest to you and me. Many of the stories we hear and read about are negative in content and often quite shallow and uninteresting to much of the public. Why? Because those of us who have positive, uplifting stories never bother to pick up the phone and call reporters.

We spend many dollars for a tiny little advertisement on the church page when we should be sending press releases to the media. Believe it or not, when you teach Lessons in Truth on Wednesday nights, it can be newsworthy to some papers.

If you teach "Psychocybernetics," your entire community should be made aware of that fact. If your center hosts a circulation day, every arm of the media should be advised.

It is time we recognize that we have the ability to assist our local reporters. I would like to share with you a few simple rules that Edwene and I have found to be beneficial to the media and to us.

- 1) Cultivate media friends. Invite reporters to lunch for the purpose of making new acquaintances. Most journalists are very open and receptive to new ways of thinking and often end up as stable church members.
- 2) Each time your church begins a new class or event make sure each office of the local media is sent a typed press release. Always type at the top of the sheet: For Immediate Release.
- 3) Select a small, local newspaper and submit a potential weekly column based upon positive living concepts. If they like your writing style, chances are you will be awarded your own column.
- 4) Whenever possible submit a black and white photo relevant to the event you are submitting for publication.
- 5) Contact all radio and television talk show hosts and offer to be a guest discussing your particular area of expertise. I was shocked to discover that the most widely watched television talk show in Kansas City sometimes has difficulty finding guests. We have been guests on that show two times in nine months and are scheduled for a third.

I believe the key to effective public relations is a willingness to reach out to people who are hustling to find stories. They appreciate your help and, needless to say, whenever you give to the media, the benefits are returned and multiplied to your church.

## Youth Services Report

Recently I attended a teacher training workshop with representatives from many denominations. We discussed the recent statistics of why Sunday Schools fail and what impact this has on overall church growth. This article was inspired by that discussion. I hope you will enjoy my "Second Annual Tongue-in-Cheek" article in the loving Spirit in which it is intended.

"How to kill your Sunday School, decrease church attendance, and drive families away."

#### 10 EASY STEPS

- 1. Make Sunday School--All Ages From Nursery Through Adult -- A Low Priority In Your Church. Make teaching a low-status job. Encourage a youth education objective of "just keep the kids quiet and out of our hair." Do not show appreciation for your teaching staff.
- 2. Be Resistant To Change, Saturate planning meetings with phrases like, "but we've always done it this

way," and "we tried that once and it didn't work." Be satisfied with the status quo, and keep affirming Unity's philosophy.

- 3. As A Minister And Leader In The Church, Do Not Educate Yourself In Youth Ministry. Do not attend teacher training events in your Region--(Say you're "too busy" or, "I know all that.") Do not YOU coordinator. Do not visit in your Y.E. department, take post grad courses in youth education, or drop in at a YOU rally. When AGAPE, NEWS\* NOTES, reSPONSE or Pathways arrive in the mail, skim them over once lightly then deposit them in file 13 without passing them along to the appropriate people.
- 4. DoNot Encourage Long-Range Planning. Keep youth education at the level of babysitting week by week with no goals or objectives. Keep the youth department isolated and not an integral part of the church family.
- 5. Be Satisfied With Inadequate Leadership From Yourself And Others. Shy away from taking an active part in teacher recruitment, training, and planning. Do not hire a Y.E. director, or pay for teachers and sponsors to receive training. Forget to schedule a monthly training and planning session for the teachers you supervise. Above all, don't express interest or appreciation. Complain a lot about what an extra hassle youth education
- 6. Model Inappropriate Teaching Methods In Your Classes And Encourage A Low Level Of Teaching Competency In Your Staff. Ignore all recent research in the field of education, and do not allow learners to become involved with their learning. Lecture all the time and do not try new and creative ideas. Do not invite others to explore, extrapolate, apply, and think about the concepts they are learning. Teach books, not people, and encourage all teachers at every age level to do the same.
- 7. Make Sure That Courses And Classes Are Not Relevant To Daily Living. Encourage teachers to "cover" isolated concepts. Stay away from sensitive life issues that would stimulate people to question and apply Bible truth in their lives. Stick to the generalities and do not deal with loneliness, family challenges, suicide, low self-esteem, alcoholism, sex, the economy, health, divorce, parenting, energy, values, drug abuse, technology, international crises.
- 8. Do Not Ask For A Commitment From Your Teachers. Since this job is not really very important, keep your expectations fuzzy, do not discuss job descriptions or time commitments. Allow them freedom from having to be challenged by standards

- as long as they don't bother you about the kids or bug you about money.
- that outreach to the community is not part of 9. Exclude Young People From All Worship Experiences. Rationalize this by saying that they will disturb the consciousness of the group. Don't offer family worship services, teach children's sermons, or allow youth to take a part in the service. They will only be a distraction.
- use the skills of your regional youth education or 10. Keep Your Distance. Do not minister to young people as individuals, really listen to them, or sit down at eye level when talking with them. Communicate that you don't really trust the judgment or perceptions of young people under twenty-one. Know that if you don't bother them they won't bother you. Know that Unity concepts are for adults. When you read that seventy-four percent of unchurched families want their children to receive a good religious education, sigh in relief that those 61 million folks will go elsewhere to church.

## The President's Letter

Here's a typical scenario played out by Unity ministers: let's call the minister Joe. Joe is minister of First Church Unity. It is "holding its own"--that is, while it isn't growing greatly it is not declining much either. Joe attributes that largely to his vigorous, dedicated effort. He writes and runs off a newsletter to keep the congregation informed, does his own typing to keep expenses down, does all visitation and outreach calling with clockwork precision, and spends at least 70-80 hours a week in God's service.

Lately he has noticed something happening. His health has started to deteriorate and his stamina and resilience are dissipating. He has also noticed some undercurrents of discontent in his family. He has explained that if he doesn't do the work, no one will, yet his family and his body cannot seem to understand.

This profile is fairly typical of a large number of our field ministers. And over past years we have seen a clear manifestation of this dilemma in the form of burn-out, divorce, sabbaticals, serious illness, and even transition. This has become an occupational hazard of the ministry for those who cannot seem to delegate their work.

Such ministers are operating under several misconceptions that have been built up from old training and old tapes. Here are some of the misconceptions:

- 1) "If I don't do it, it won't get done." This is often an excuse for poor training and delegating. "I'd rather do it myself" is often the line of least resistance. We'd rather do that than sit down with someone and show them how to do it.
- 2) "If I give my job away (delegation) I won't have a job anymore." This is an egocentric fear that we must keep the inner knowledge of Truth and how to run a ministry largely to ourselves and give it piecemeal, bit by bit to our congregation so as to always remain the one in control and "in the know." True teachers and disciples share all they know and give it all away in training and teaching. Doing so makes room for more congregations to become delegations—people with a mission, a task, and a sense of belonging.
- 3) "Serving God means ignoring health and family." Something is very wrong with our understanding

- of Truth principles when we allow ourselves to function under this misconception.
- 4) "More hours mean better quality and higher commitment and spirituality." More hours are often put into a ministry to "be seen of men"--especially the board, so that they will be impressed and the minister can justify his/her job and salary. Or perhaps the minister is escaping a problem at home and finds refuge in work.
- 5) "Self-sacrifice is okay with God." Self-sacrifice is cannibalism. Others will eat us up if we let our lives be lived entirely for them. We are in this world to become serene in our living and to let the Christ shine. We are not in this work to work our tails off.

Part of being a minister is learning to train someone else to be a minister. We need not fear that our power, our prestige, and our position will be taken away. Only fear can do that. Let us learn to delegate responsibility. This does not mean just shoving a Youth Education manual at someone and saying: "Okay go and teach!" It means spending quality personal time, disciplining that person, sharing all you know, so that that delegate can go forth equipped to do the task. In so doing, you have given yourself the luxury of time and the freedom to do and be what is really yours to do and be.

- 4. Who needs to be involved in this kind of planning? What do they need to do?
- 5. What do you think needs to be done in terms of long-range planning to coordinate the Unity ministries and Unity School? What suggestions do you have along the line of planning together?
- 6. What changes in religion, economy, values, science, education, media, business and technology, medicine or other fields do you feel especially bear on the long-range planning of Unity? How? What are we going to have to do to respond or change?
- 7. Are there any other comments or visions, etc.?

I want you to know what a dynamic and professional team we have. The regions have done an outstanding job in hiring these gifted folks to serve you. Use them! All are professionals in either Unity,

Family Services, or Education. They have taken on this job as consultants in their region because of their depth of commitment in Unity.

## New Workshop Planned

From the planning sessions emerged our 1981-82 workshop titled "Imagine Me...a Teacher!" This workshop will be available this fall for ministers, licensed teachers, Y.E. directors and teachers, YOU sponsors, and anyone interested in and dedicated to the teaching ministry of the church. Make sure that your teaching staff has the opportunity to attend!

Remember also that in addition to one-day motivational workshops, your Y.E. facilitator is available to you for consulting on site, by phone and letter, speaking, post-graduate courses, Y.E. directors' training, and is available to ministers to help plan a teacher training course for your individual center. In many regions all or part of the facilitator's expenses are picked up by the region, and services are offered on a love offering basis.

### **Training Opportunities**

This year one of the major emphasis areas of Youth Services is training. I find that teachers and volunteers in general who are well-trained by their church feel more confident and hence are more committed to doing an excellent job. Handing a new teacher or sponsor a teacher's guide and saying, "Here, they're all yours, see you at the end of the quarter," is a great way to encourage frustration, burn-out, and a decision to never volunteer again.

#### Training for Y.E. Directors

An exciting program that will be started this fall is Unity of Denver's laboratory school for Y.E. Directors, under the direction of Joy Powell. Joy is Youth Director for Unity of Denver's open concept, Montessori-based youth education department, and Regional facilitator for South Central Region. She is offering to train Y.E. directors on site in Denver. You can send your Y.E. director to work with Joy for three or four days of intense on-the-job-training. # COUNSELING

## COUNSELING SKILLS: The Physical Environment

Counseling skills begin with the physical environment. There is much that a counselor can do to put the client at ease as well as make the session easier on him or herself. Following are some suggestions to attain better results.

### The Physical Environment

It takes a great deal of courage on the part of the client to make an appointment for counseling. Many times clients who have not attended a session will cancel or not show up. You are dealing with the physical presence of fear. A simple way to meet this situation is to ask potential clients to call or notify you in some way if they cannot keep an appointment. Emphasize the facts that there are others who need your time; you are willing to make yourself available, but you need to know in advance so that your time together will be undisturbed; or you have other obligations that you are putting aside for them. Often this simple procedure reassures the client that you care and subtly encourages him to keep appointments.

### The Room Setting

The best possible way to furnish a room for counseling, according to current research, is to have two comfortable chairs facing each other with a small table to the right or left of one chair for coffee cups, ashtrays and kleenex. Whether or not smoking is permitted in your counseling room is your option. Clients will respect your suggestions, but remember the client can be extremely nervous. A soft light should be the main light in the room. If there is a window, and it is in a traffic area, the blinds should be closed in order to insure the client's privacy. The room should be away from traffic areas so that private conversations are not heard, even if a voice is raised. Any phone in the room should be unplugged so that its ringing does not break into the moment or disrupt prayer.

Counseling across a desk, or to the side of a desk, puts up barriers that may take weeks to overcome. This approach to counseling is not a sign of professionalism; it is a signal for the client not to get too close, to remember his or her position as student with you as teacher. There is more lost than gained in this type of environment.

To relax clients, I find it convenient to have a pot of coffee and/or tea available. I encourage the client to help him or herself while I place "IN CON-FERENCE" signs on the outside office doors. This procedure has two purposes. One, the signs are a signal for people not to intrude and, by my being occupied for a moment the client has time to "move" out of a rigid sitting position and into the room to explore new territory without my observation, which helps the client to feel more free.

If there are children, they should be placed in a nursery. Children in the counseling room are distracting unless they are the counselees. Encourage parents to leave the children at home or with someone.

## Structuring the Hour

Half-hour sessions are not adequate; an hour should be allowed. The session itself should be about fifty minutes so that you can have a break to refresh yourself for the next activity. This also gives you time to center yourself in prayer and fill the room consciously with God's presence before the next client arrives. Explain counseling to the clients in a few words, so they may know what to expect, and they can clear away the clutter that has accumulated in their minds about counseling. Some main points to cover are: their right to privacy and their right to say what they feel and think. Reassure them you are not going to pass judgment or preach to them. Explain the amount of time they have. By stating the amount of time, you eliminate the "going over sessions," the "door stoppers," who say as they are halfway out, "Oh, by the way, I forgot. . . .

Place a clock in a position that you can see easily without breaking your eye contact with the client. This eliminates checking your wrist watch. By the way, if you are bored, get in touch with those feelings. More than likely the client feels the same. Stop what is transpiring and say: "Where is this going? I seem to have missed something, or "What is the point you are trying to get me to understand?"

## Keeping Records

If you have a dependable memory, it is best not to keep records. You run the risk of having them summoned to court in divorce cases, child custody cases, mental commitment cases, and the like. However, most of us do not have a photographic memory. Therefore, if you keep records, write them in a code only you understand and keep them at home. Review them before you begin the day at the office. Records are often safer at home if locked up, and courts in

many cases cannot summon personal files that are not part of church property. If they are confiscated, no one can read them. Case records are excellent reference material to skim before seeing clients, as they are a "running record" of client progress or change, nation effective June 30, 1980 brings to a close four as well as a way to check your perceptions.

#### Closure

As the session draws to a close (about forty minutes have lapsed) state, "We have about ten minutes left. could you summarize what you thought was important to you, or how you felt about this session?" Some can summarize, some can't. In either case it gives you an insight as to what was important, if anything, to the client. Then you summarize what you heard and felt. Check with the client for his or her responses to your summation. Some questions you may want to ask at the end of this procedure are: "Are there things that you would like to complete? Think about what you want to cover next time. What are you feeling now? Would you feel comfortable with a closing prayer?" If the answer is ves, and you begin the prayer, ask the client to end it, perhaps by saying "\_\_\_\_would you like to add anything to this prayer to increase the power of our joined consciousness?" If not, you do it, and each time encourage him to take responsibility for his own prayer requests.

Don't make promises. It is better to support the client's concerns through a positive direction. Explain that as he goes through the counseling process he may feel very bad or very happy at different times. This is part of the process of "focusing" and of self-discovery. Hopefully, the fulfilled times will increase through the client's honest confrontation of things he dislikes within himself and in his life. He can begin the process of denial, which is a way of erasing the unwanted and of choosing to adopt what is wanted.

### Negotiate for the Next Appointment

Make the next appointment time, date, and place clear to the client. Have appointment cards printed with spaces for this information. Be certain to have an emergency phone number where he or she can reach you if the need arises. Often just knowing you can be reached eliminates the need. Appointment cards are inexpensive and they add professionalism to your image. Outline the number of sessions. Four or six are good numbers to work with. Suggest that at the end of the fourth session there will be a review of the counseling progress as you and the client perceive it. Then the sessions can be renegotiated for a few more sessions or terminated. Extended counseling is demanding. If the person needs a great deal of help this may be the time to suggest referral.

The Night an Octopus Hid in My Room. Tony brings home a small octopus and plans to keep it in a jar. Overnight, the octopus teaches Tony a lesson. But the most important lesson is that all creatures need to be in their natural habitat, where they belong.

Life Is Full of Surprises! A large, old sugar pine tree is felled to make room for a lookout tower on top of a mountain. The tree adjusts to changes in its lifestyle. It soon becomes shelter for foxes, green ferns, and wood violets. Its ultimate happiness comes when a man discovers the beauty of the tree's wood and proudly uses it for magnificent carvings of woodland creatures, flying birds, and friendly pets. # WHO IS AT FAULT WHEN THE MINISTER IS FIRED?

The Associated Press recently reported a study of 117 congregations that fired their pastors for reasons other than unethical conduct which has shown that the dismissals usually weren't the minister's fault.

The study, made by a United Church of Christ clergyman, involved congregations in four denominations—the United Church of Christ, the Episcopal Church, the United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

About one out of 100 of all congregations each year dismisses its pastor for reasons other than unethical or immoral conduct the study found, and among congregations that have done so the main reasons included:

• Congregational conflict that began before the pastor came.

• Factions in the congregation and disapproval of the pastor by a powerful minority.

Pastor-laity value conflicts.

• Frustrated desires of members for big success in the congregation's ministry.

These kinds of tensions are apt to continue indefinitely, whoever the pastor is, unless outside counseling is sought, the report said.

However, it attributed 23 percent of the firings to authoritarian behavior or contentiousness on the pastor's part and another 23 percent to poor "interpersonal skills."

Letter

WANTED ALIVE!!

Everyone wants to belong to someone or to share their life with someone. We go to great lengths to make ourselves attractive, desirable and beautiful just to get the attention and accolades from others, and yet this is not satisfying. Outer preparations are not satisfying because a part of us is asleeplying dormant--awaiting the great resurrection of the Christ within us.

I believe that God wants us alive because He caused His Son, the Christ, the I AM, to live in us and to live as us. This expresses through us as Christ love.

Because He lives in us, I believe God wants us to live the Truth . . .

not just talk about love, but be loving.

not just wish for prosperity, but be prosperous.

not just affirm peaceful statements of Truth, but to be peaceful, inside and out.

not just wear beautiful garments, but to let the life we live be beautiful.

not just talk about how Jesus healed, but to be healthy.

... and most of all, be alive in thought, word and deed.

When you are aware that someone loves you and cares about you, your eyes light up, your face changes from sadness to joy, and you begin to walk spryly, lightly, and lively. That joyful, enthusiastic, loving expression that comes over you because you feel alive is like magic. It spreads to all you meet. You and I know that Christ aliveness is the one high that truly satisfies all who dare to let it express through them.

Today you are wanted alive by God. God wants you to pray like Elijah, to persist like Paul, to touch like the woman who touched the hem of His garment, and to desire fulfillment like Hannah.

I believe God wants us to persist as zealously as Paul in teaching the Christ message to all people. We, too, must allow this message to continue by letting our own Christ teach through us.

Nearly two thousand years ago Jesus asked the question. "Who do men say that the Son of man is?" The disciples answered, "Some say John the Baptist, others say Elijah, and others say Jeremiah or one of the prophets." But then Jesus asked again, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered Him and said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus knew that Peter alone was not strong enough to build a church of God but yet he built his church upon the message of Truth. He said, "On this rock I will build my church." He also gave Peter the keys to the kingdom. He also told him that whatsoever is bound on earth is bound in heaven and whatsoever is bound in heaven is bound on earth. In this context I want you to think about AUC. What is AUC? It is a religious organ that is based on the teachings of Jesus Christ. Who is AUC? It is you and me--it is us--it is the togetherness of the Unity movement. Is AUC necessary? Look at your neighbor churches, especially your neighbor Unity churches. Which one would you eliminate? Would it be yourself or would it be the church down the road or the church in the next town. I received 56 letters from you during the survey last month. It is my intention to answer each letter personally but there are some things I heard that seemed to come through in most of the letters. I heard you say, "I want a live AUC." I heard you say, "I want a friendly AUC." I heard you say "I want AUC to talk to me about me." I heard you say "I want AUC to be warm and friendly toward me and my work." I heard you say "I want to know how you feel and how you succeed in doing whatever you did so that it will help me in what I am doing." I heard you say "I want to pray with my Unity friends and feel their consciousness." Most of all, I heard you say, "We are Unity and we want a Unity experience." I am sure 1 am not the answer to your wants but I am sure that WE are the answer to our needs. Our AUC office counseling materials, teaching techniques, strong ministers, group services, bulletins, and letterhead--these services cannot be bought, but be experienced. That is the team work from our AUC office, from our churches, whether you are a temple, a storefront, a church, a study group, from a region or from headquarters--YOU are wanted alive!

When I think of the aliveness of the AUC, its member churches and its office I have to think of a young woman who tried to commit suicide. She did not want to live because she believed no one cared for her. A young man who lived in her neighborhood was afriad to speak to her because she was so beautiful. Daily he wished she would look his way in order that he might receive a favorable signal from her. When he heard how lonely she had been and how she had tried to commit suicide, he went to the hospital and told her how he

felt and how long he had wanted so speak to her. He assured her that he wanted her alive and that God wanted her alive. She believed him and fought for her life. She is alive today! Today God wants you alive so you can live again like the young lady who found love when she was near death. Today God wants you alive so that you can pray prayers with the fire of Elijah. Today God wants you alive so you can touch the Christ with faith like the woman who touched the hem of His garment. Today God wants you alive so you can persist in the aliveness of the word of Christ as did Paul. Today God wants you alive so you can fulfill your desire as did Hannah of old, and most of all, so you can know that you are wanted by God--alive.

I know it! You know it! God knows it! So let us be alive and become consciously accepted by God this day in all that we do. Let's keep AUC alive and well by dreaming our dreams together.

## Youth Services Report

Except Ye Become as Little Children . . . .

Recently I was at a YOU rally at a camp in Independence, Missouri. A workshop I gave included a hike in the woods and experiencing the silence in a natural setting. On the hike was a YOUer with braces on her legs and I realized that my normal fast-paced hiking was too fast for her, so she led the hike through the woods as we all held hands. Going at a slower pace I was able to take the time to look at nature around me and enjoy the simple pleasure of a beautiful setting and beautiful companions. I give thanks for this "seemingly" handicapped YOUer and the opportunity for her to teach me to SLOW DOWN and enjoy.

The other day, I took a walk on the Plaza with a six-year-old friend of mine. I led for awhile as I ran some errands, then gave her the lead. She led me to a group of sculptures that I had walked by many times. I had never stopped to really look at, touch or talk to these beautiful penquin sculptures. We spent the next half hour doing just that. I joined her in climbing on them and appreciating their beauty. She carried on an active conversation and fantasy with them. As I watched her I thought how delighted the sculptor would be if he could experience this accolade of his work. On the way home I would have missed a beautiful mosaic that was at my friend's eye level and not mine if not for her keen perception. I also would have missed an anthill in the midst of the city! I give thanks for small friends that remind me to be in the here and now and reap pleasure from life's hidden beauty.

I was teaching Sunday School a few weeks ago in Kansas City, Kansas. Some teachers were sitting in and a parent decided to stay. Our class consisted of twenty people--the youngest was five and the oldest was in their 50's. There was a special love and energy in that room as all ages shared together and learned "I Am the Light of the World." There was a special light in hearing Truth expressed by all ages, colors, shapes and sizes. I give thanks for wisdom expressing in all ages.

Sunday, I attended a family service at Overland Park. All ages were worshiping together, singing, praying, listening, thinking. I give thanks for times for church families to come together rather than always be fragmented into special groups.

During AUC Conference, I was sitting in a business meeting feeling very tired. A young child sat in my lap and snuggled close for the rest of the meeting. Her love, trust and warmth rejuvenated me. I give thanks for the attunement of a young child to my need for affection.

Much has been said about the ministry for children and with children. Churches that are healthy and growing I believe are those that are realizing the ministry of children. Children are profound teachers of the qualities of love, honesty, spontaneity, affection, joy and the here and now that we as adults in Truth are trying to regain. Their presence in our church family helps us to keep vital and alive. Sometimes the lessons are hard as we learn patience and nonresistance and often they are touching moments in realizing the simplicity of Truth.

Sara Barnes shared a book with me (that I wish I would have written) about two ministers who have experimented with ways to affirm the ministry of children and have been profoundly moved. They expound on the ways they have been ministered to by children in the church. The basic assumptions of the book are:

- 1. The childlike quality underscored in the gospel is the key to faith and life.
- 2. Babics, toddlers and young children have been naturally granted the quality needed by the church if it is to be faithful to its true essence. If acknowledged and valued Starchildren can help enable the community of faith to be whole.
- 3. Starchildren are those of any age who permit the spirit of God to lead them to become "as little children" again and again.
- 4. The time is right to affirm strongly that the starchild has a unique ministry to individuals, the church and the society.
- 5. STARCHILDREN NEED THE CARE OF ADULTS IF THEY ARE TO SURVIVE; ADULTS NEED THE CARE OF STARCHILDREN IF THEY ARE TO GROW!

The book also provides a six-week course for group study and a plan for an intergeneral celebration for the entire congregation.

The book is <u>The Ministry of the Child</u>, by Dennis C. Benson and Stan J. Stewart, available from Abington Press or the MIT Gift Shop.

### Unity School Promotion and Editorial Departments

Charles Lelly's <u>The Beautiful Way of Life</u> is a book of inspiration and beauty. It is potentially rich for center classes in meditation or to support specific talk topics. Seven chapters address themselves to the beauty of being, awareness, life, action, nuance, control, and evolving. There are forty-two short sub-chapters, skillfully written to inspire meditative experiences, and ideal in length for short classroom use.

You may find "Know Thyself" of assistance in a class on self-esteem. "The Way We All Must Go" asks the question, "Why are we afraid to be what we intuitively know we can be?" and explores the theme of being true to oneself. "Oh, That Spiritual Plateau!" will help in understanding that periods of frustration and doubt are not unusual on the path of spiritual growth.

A sample of sub-chapter titles includes: "The Hem of Reality"; "The Spiritual Dimension"? "Why Is It Difficult to Choose?"; "Fear of Silence"; "Change Without Fear"; "Look at It the Way It is!"; "Can We Accept Our Good?"; "A Time to Sow, A Time to Reap"; and "The Door to Inner Guidance."

This book is an endless resource for meditative ideas that can open classes and counseling sessions, setting the mood for the hour.

# What Comes After the Call?

A workshop entitled, "What Comes After The Call?" presented by Carl Bergstrom, PHD, June 9-11 gave the Ministersin-Training at Unity Village an intensive learning experience which focused on the minister's need for self-esteem and personal relationships. To design the workshop, Dr. Bergstrom combined his expertise in education and psychology with personal research into the work of ministers.

The workshop provided experiential exercises to build selfesteem, to discover what might be blocking change, and to find alternative ways of relating to others. He emphasized the ministers' need to take care of themselves in all areas of living so that they can serve and stressed their need to have fun and be themselves.

To be a successful minister, Dr. Bergstrom suggests that ministers 1) set aside "alone time" so they can stay in touch with their real purpose; 2) form supporting relationships with other ministers, friends or professionals; 3) clean up "frits" (those activities that take time and energy without yielding the reward of good feelings); 4) affirm their own greatness and uniqueness; 5) be willing to risk in order to change and grow; 6) release and let go of any blocks to change and blocks to self-love; 7) form a clearer picture of what they love; 8) be working at a love relationship in which they are willing to be vulnerable and more trusting; and 9) prioritize their activities and manage time wisely.

Dr. Bergstrom received his BA and MA in psychology from

the University of Michigan and his PhD from Michigan State University. He is a psychological educator and is presently the School Psychologist for the Waterford Schools in Waterford, Michigan. Dr. Bergstrom also teaches a self-help course called "Winners Do What Losers Won't." He and his wife, Alice, are members of Unity of Livonia in Livonia, Michigan.

## RADIO THE EASY WAY

"Nice to meet you, Reverend Jim, I've heard you talking about Unity on radio." What a pleasure to have Unity, and you, recognized with an open, positive attitude. This is the number one benefit of a radio ministry. It's an opportunity that 75% of us can now add to our outreach tools—only one quarter of us use either radio or TV in our ministries.

True, a number of folks begin studying Unity because they heard about it on radio. One listener has even moved to St. Joseph from rural lowa so that she could be near a Unity congregation. There are always a few class and seminar participants who heard about it on radio. There are some love offerings too, including special support from the congregation, who like to hear their church on radio. But the primary benefit of a radio ministry is creating a more positive, receptive attitude toward Unity. Out in your community, you'll meet more friends and less fear.

Unless you've had radio/TV experience, the thought of spending time, energy, and money to produce a really first-rate radio program has held you back. You're aware that radio time is not too expensive, and sometimes even available free if the program quality is high. But to educate yourself in radio announcing and production techniques does take time.

There's another way. You can use "A Habit of Miracles," with you, your church, and upcoming events publicized at the beginning and end of the 30-minute program, for \$20 a week.

"A Habit of Miracles" is a co-ministry of four Unity folks with radio savvy: Jim and Judy Fisher, Unity of St. Joseph (who have college radio experience); Michael Davenport (a student of Eric Butterworth and professional radio actor, producer, director); Mark Weddle (formerly of the Unity Radio Department and a professional sound engineer). Consciousness is high at every recording session. The result is inspiring and explicitly designed and paced for radio.

It is easy for us to edit these programs to add your name, address, and events, deleting the St. Joseph promotional material. Your voice, our voices, or a combination can be used. The result is a 30-minute program with you and your church identified, followed by "Jim and Judy" (no last name needed) discussing Truth, with songs by Janet and Wayne Manning interspersed, ending with you again.

Demonstration cassettes are available. Get one and test the availability of public service time and program costs on stations in your area. "New Beginnings Now," that theme of this year's AUC conference is also the theme for UMS. Gary Jones has returned to the field and Kathryn Rowbotham has left to take some much needed "R & R" before seeking direction for her next mode of service to the Unity movement. As always, Spirit has provided three other dedicated teachers to complete the core faculty--Martha Giudici, Bill Esslinger and Ed Rabel.

With her return to full-time faculty duties, Martha brings a total of seven years of experience in preparing new ministers for the Unity field movement. While this quarter will be Bill's first experience in teaching MITs, it will not be his first in teaching adults; his ministry emphasized classes—often two or three a week—and in college he studied educational psychology and teaching methods.

Ed Rabel's long teaching experience is well known throughout the Unity movement. He has often taught in the ministerial school, but this time he will be implementing the new "revolving chair" concept. That is not a piece of furniture but a unique form of service. For the first quarter, Ed will teach in UMS. In following quarters, he will be available as an interim minister either for centers temporarily without leadership or to fill the pulpit of a minister who has been invited to serve for a short time on the faculty of UMS.

It is hoped that each year several experienced field ministers will participate in the regular curriculum for periods ranging from two to ten weeks so that UMS courses stay related to the contemporary needs of center ministries. It is also hoped that the involvement of field ministers in UMS will afford them a time of renewal while they contribute to the expansion of the Unity movement through the preparation of new ministers.

This year's new beginning for UMS is rich with promise.

Letter

WEARING THE MINISTRY

AS A LOOSE GARMENT

I stood watchful as the young woman rose to address her eagerly awaiting club members. As she commenced to speak, you could hear the strain and urgency discharged in her voice. The muscles of her face were stiff and tightly drawn, causing a slight distortion of her youthful features. This was the first time she had made any public remarks to the entire group, as their new president, and her reaction to the occasion was stress filled, causing her to project a ruffled state of mind to the members.

Suddenly, a tender and compassionate, yet powerful voice emerged from a pleasant woman seated nearby. "My dear," she uttered with a peace that could calm a raging sea, "wear your office as a loose garment." Pleasingly astonished and not the least bit annoyed by the interruption, the president replied, "Do you mean like our master teacher taught?" The woman gently acknowledged by nodding her head in answer. Upon realizing she had grasped the true nature of the words the woman had imparted, a wide bright smile spread from the corners of her mouth and one could actually feel the chains of tension release her from its bondage. The remainder of her speech reflected the placidity of that moving instance when she experienced an understanding and acceptance of the Truth.

All of us can achieve instant success. All of us can embrace instant energy. All of us can enfold ourselves in instant power, as we learn as David and the new president did, to wear this world as a loose garment.

So today step into the loose flowing garment of your ministry. Let it fall gently around your shoulders and augment the nature of your true being. For we are free and unlimited as the universe, yet the only way our garment can compliment and enhance our endeavors is to wear our ministry as a loose garment, today!

Unity of Louisville, Kentucky, Charles Lelly, minister has developed an interesting new program on the "Unity Way of Life."




Notebook binders with "The Unity Way of Life" printed on the cover are also available through their bookstore. Each notebook contains five dividers with the following indexed sections:

During pre-Conference the following proposal was presented and accepted by the AUC Board of Trustees:

Proposal for Licensed Teacher Development Committee

This Committee will be made up of four ministers and three licensed teachers who will serve terms of three years. The purpose of the Committee will be to encourage the professional development of licensed teachers.

Criteria for Licensed Teacher Development Committee:

- 1. Have an interest in the role of the licensed teacher in AUC.
- 2. Desire to upgrade the continuing education of licensed teachers.
- 3. Work to promote a compatible relationship between ministers and teachers.
- 4. Clarify the role of the licensed teacher in the ministry. Each minister in a region will be asked to submit the name of a licensed teacher, qualifications to be forthcoming in a letter to each minister in the near future.

From the names submitted, the teachers will select their own Regional Ambassador during the next Licensed Teacher Post-Graduate Week, to be held Feb 26–Mar 5, 1982.

All licensed teachers attending will select from these seven ambassadors three to serve on the Licensed Teacher Development Committee for a period of 3 years, in graduated terms.

You will note each region will select its own ambassador from those in attendance whose names have been submitted by their minister. If you are interested, and have the time and incentive to serve the licensed teachers in your region speak with your minister about it. My letter to the ministers will go out in the next month.

I would also like to hear your suggestions for classes during this special week. We will have plenty of time for praying and sharing together, and more free time too. Remember this is your week. If it's important to you, take the responsibility to support it.

I cannot close without thanking you for your wonderful gift of love at Conference, and for the many cards and notes of congratulations. You are all a very special blessing to me and I love you — each one!

## **Prosperity Checklist for Churches**

- 1. Are you tithing faithfully to where you receive your spiritual food?
- 2. Are your tithe checks the first ones written each week?
- 3. Are you flexible in your tithing so that you are consciously aware of the channels through which your spiritual food comes?
- 4. Have you dropped all money-raising projects? (activities which have as their primary purpose money-making) The Prosperity focus is "service-giving."
- 5. Does the Board treasurer have a high prosperity consciousness? Has he/she read Prosperity by Charles Fillmore?
- 6. Are the members of the Board and the minister willing to change?
- 7. Have you dropped from your Board discussing statements such as, "We can't afford it," or "It costs too much."? These are statements of mammon-worshippers.
- 8. Is your church truly serving, following the giving laws and the teachings of Jesus Christ?
- 9. Are you praying together?
- 10. Are you willing to receive God's great abundance now?
- 11. Are you tithing on the building fund and other special funds?
- 12. Is your minister paid as veil as other professionals in the community?

## Responsibilities of a Unity Ministry and its Outreach Group

The relationship between a Unity ministry and its outreach group can be equally fulfilling for each activity of spirit. For the ministry, there is the knowing that another group of people is being helped toward a deeper understanding of the principles of the Christ teachings and for the outreach activity, there is the excitement of growth and that loving contact with a Unity group dedicated to their harmonious unfoldment. In order for this union to be fostered, it is necessary that certain legal and financial responsibilities be understood.

As a study group evolves, people will begin to give to this new channel of their spiritual good. In order for these gifts to be tax deductible, the group must be under the tax umbrella of a parent, nonprofit ministry. The outreach facility should send written notice to the board of the mother ministry indicating a desire to become affiliated with this particular ministry. This letter should become a part of the board minutes of the ministry.

Since the Unity ministry has financial and legal responsibility for the fiscal action of the outreach group, certain guidelines should be agreed upon. Minimum responsibilities include financial reports revealing income and itemized expenditures. In addition, it is helpful to have a copy of the steering committee minutes so the ministry is aware of the future as well as the current plans and activities of the study group. Also, there should be a mutually agreed upon maximum expenditure per month that the group must adhere to. This maximum expenditure will be adjusted upward as the group grows or if a special need arises.

Finally, it should be understood that if the group dissolves, the funds may not accrue to the members of the group since it is under the auspices of a nonprofit organization. The funds of the group are to revert to the Unity ministry to be held in escrow until another group is formed at some future time.

With the ministry and the outreach group in full awareness of these guidelines, it is possible for the two activities of Spirit to develop into the harmonious relationship that is an innate part of Unity.

## STRESS AND DISTRESS

"Stress" is the result of the total cumulated pressure created chemically, physically and emotionally:

All of these factors lead to chemical changes inside your body. Ultimately, they raise the blood sugar to prepare you for "fight" or "flight." Since physical fleeing and fighting are rarely done, the body must deal with the stress in a less healthy way--by producing insulin to reduce the blood sugar. And since there is often an excess, erratic input of stress, the pancreas begins to become less efficient, often over shoots and produces hypoglycemia. And hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) is a stress which starts the entire vicious cycle all over again.

Stress becomes distress only when it exceeds the individual's capacity to deal with it well. Let us assume that an average individual has a stress reserve of 32 oz.; 33 oz. of stress will lead to illness.

The average American consumes 42 tsp. of sugar, three cups of coffee, 1 pack of cigarettes, and two or three ounces of alcohol per day. This uses up at least one-half, or 16 oz., of the stress reserve.

The average American is extremely inactive and has limited exposure to natural light. This and other physical stressors probably create another 12 oz. of stress.

Thi leaves only 4 oz. of reserve for emotional stress. With superb habits, the average American could reduce chemical stress to about 2 oz., and physical stress to about 2 oz., leaving a reserve of 28 oz.!

Incidentally, intense joy is so rare and short-lived that you need not worry about it! Joy, laughter and happiness generally reduce stress.

The simple fact of their all pervasiveness makes chemical and physical stress the most important determinants of health. Thus the "final straw" in many persons is emotional stress, often one that is relatively small but which is too great for individuals who are barely coping.

Stress reduction requires will-power and determination that health and happiness are more important than temporary "lifts" from poor habits. But it is possible for all of us to reduce stress enough to improve health and well-being.



WHEN GOD FORGETS

The Great Lakes Conference was held in the beautiful Pokagon Park in Angola, Indiana. The Unity consciousness was at an all time high. With ministers like Edie Skalitzky, Glenn Mosley, Eugene Sorensen and George and Winifred Hausmann sharing with us various techniques they have used in their ministries. This will always be a memorable experience for Joann and me.

Glenn taught us how to handle the terminally ill, while Eugene taught us how to enhance our relationships in marriage, and the Hausmanns taught us how to put a workshop or seminar together.

This brings a lesson to mind that I taught sometime ago. In reliving that lesson, I thought of this thought, "When God forgets, what happens?" To me the workshops showed what happens when we forget to love or forget to share. Did you know forgetfulness is forgiveness? God always forgives and forgets the guilt or the reasons for those conditions or situations that were caused by the guilt. We are very forgetful. We sometimes forget each other's name. We forget each other's faces. I know you have heard the thought, "I remember the face, but I can't put a name to it." Sometimes we can get away with this, but most of the time we are humiliated because we cannot remember such a wonderful face and such a wonderful person. We forget our promises, we forget our pleasures, we forget our wedding vows, we even forget our promises to God.

I am reminded of a man who some years ago called and asked us to come and pray with him. We prayed with him and he made a promise to God that when he got well he would attend church. That man never got around to attending church. He called us two years later as he was very ill again. He was feeling very guilty because he had not kept his promise to God. I think sometimes we forget that God has already forgiven us for the things we have forgotten. I read once of a little boy that was coming home after visiting his grandmother. When he got to the train station he was in a desolate place--there were very few people standing around. The conductor lifted up this boy and you could see that he had a problem with his legs. He took up the two little crutches as he stepped off the train and the little boy was looking, searching everywhere for a familiar face and he saw none. But then the conductor stood

him up beside the depot and he put his little crutches under each arm. The little boy was still searching and looking for someone. His mother had forgotten to pick him up. I think sometimes we are like that. We forget to do the things that are important. And perhaps some of you as you read this will say, "Oh, that's awful to forget that little crippled boy." But what about those people that are not crippled? Those people that love us and care about us and that feel a part of our lives. Sometimes we, as ministers and teachers, forget those that we love. We forget to reach out to them. I am saying there are people in your congregation that perhaps need you to reach out. You cannot reach everyone, but you can touch, through your consciousness, those you love.

Yes, we forget, but God remembers! He remembers to breathe through us. He remembers to live within us. He remembers to pump the blood through our veins, and yet for a moment if he forgot, we would be in trouble. But he does forget! According to Jeremiah, He said, "I will forgive thy inequities and I will remember thou sins no more." God forgets the hurt we cause one another. He forgets we have not lived the way we should perhaps. He forgets because it is His nature to love, just as it is our nature to love. Jeremiah's instructions were that if we were weak God would teach us. Because he was one that spoke of himself as a child, and that inner voice within him said not to speak of himself any longer as a child, but to think of himself as a teacher. In paraphrasing this scripture, I find that even though we sometimes forget as ministers, if we could only remember that our job is no different than that of Jeremiah's. That God gave Jeremiah strict instructions to establish Truth. It is each minister's job to do this. God touched his palm and he began to think in Truth. He taught the people that they were to build houses: and dwell in them. That they were to plant gardens; and they were to take a mate and bare children. That they were to go out and be happy. Isn't that the message that we are teaching today? But in order to teach that, we have to remember that when God forgets, He forgives. So if you, as the minister, cannot do all the things that need to be done by you even after you have been involved in many workshops, remember that God forgives and forgets our shortcomings. That He loves us so much that He gives us energy and the stick-to-itiveness that is necessary to do a good job. When God forgets--He forgives. When you forget, don't criticize yourself. Begin right now to do that which you know is best. He will put the words in your mouth, He will teach through you this day, for you are God's ministers.

## YOU/YAU Reports

Parents are a vital supporting part of the Youth of Unity, but because their involvement is indirect it is sometimes overlooked. It's easy to forget that whenever a Sunday meeting is held, parents often are providing the transportation; when a bake sale is scheduled, it's the parent's kitchen that is used; when a regional rally is planned, the parent's permission and sometimes financial assistance are required.

If we want to have dynamic and exciting YOU programs in our church, then it makes sense to seek the enthusiastic support of parents with teenagers.

Hosting a Friends of YOU Night is one way to appreciate, inform and more fully involve parents (and other interested adults) so they can identify with the YOU group and support its activities. Before parents can feel a part of the group they need to know what's going on. One purpose of a night like this is to share with the parents the YOU group's plan of activities for the year ahead (this presupposes that the sponsor, minister and YOUers have worked out a one-year plan which they all approve). By offering the schedule to parents a year in advance, it allows parents to have some input into the planning process and makes it possible to revise plans which parents don't support.

A Friend of YOU Night also offers the opportunity for parents to get to know one another and for the minister to establish links with a segment of the congregation that shares unique joys and challenges.

I have intentionally labeled this event a "Friends in YOU Night" rather than a "parents" night to include a wider range of adults. Some teenagers live with relatives or sometimes parents are unwilling to attend but another adult friend (like an aunt or uncle) will come. Also there may be adults in the church who are willing to assist with transportation or occasional chaperoning, but do not have teenage children.

All of the benefits of a Friends of YOU Night can be accomplished in an atmosphere of fun and mutual acceptance. Here is a suggested schedule:

The question and answer period is also used as a time to determine which activities the majority of parents are willing to support and which activities should be thought over again.

While the adults are having their meeting, the YOUers can be having a rap session in another part of the church with the YOU President leading the meeting. This makes it possible to bring both groups together for the prayer and closing.

This may seem like a large investment of the minister's

time in meeting with the sponsor and YOUers to go over the proposed schedule and then presenting the schedule to the Friends of YOU. The payoff is that you avoid time-consuming problems throughout the year that come from lack of parental support and lack of clear communication.

Cassette recordings offer a unique way to gather information, and Unity's Cassette department produces a wealth of pertinent instructional and inspirational material. Centers can use cassettes in a variety of ways. Some suggestions are:

- 1. For personal edification and information;
- 2. To gather stories, anecdotes, etc., to support talk topics;
- 3. As a follow-up for classes;
- 4. To help people meet challenges, for counseling.

A recent Cassette department release that can be helpful is a new series of six taped lessons, "The Art of Successful Living," by Judith Ann Childress, associate minister of the Unity Church of Today, Warren, Michigan. Judith's lessons are based upon her understanding and interpretation, from a Truth viewpoint, of the book, The Game of Life and How to Play It, by Florence Scoval Shinn.

The first lesson is designed to help you to go beyond intellectualizing and to inaugurate changes in four areas of your life experience: health, wealth, love, and perfect self-expression. The next four lessons deal more thoroughly with behavior, ideas, and belief systems, and raising expectations in these areas.

Lesson six is a wrap-up that stresses how to change cherished but possibly defeating or impeding attitudes, defines true patience, and tells how your intuitive nature serves you best.

Judith Ann Childress incorporates many illustrations, stories, and humor to support her main points. The lessons are recorded before an enthusiastic audience and contain a wealth of practical information, well-presented and well-organized.

## **BOOK REVIEW**

Teen Age Survival Manual by H. Samm Coombs

This book deals with more than teen survival; its sub-title is "How to Enjoy the Trip to Twenty." The teen years can be enjoyed, not merely endured.

The essential attitude presented here is that life is good, people are good, teenagers are good. Yes, there are many experiences a teenager must go through. For example, just as my generation had to deal with alcohol, today's youth must deal with alcohol and drugs. No teenager can avoid drugs, for drugs are thrust upon them. But no one has to accept drugs. There are fun alternatives. Since teenagers are essentially good, they can and should accept responsibility for their own behavior.

The book is written to be read by teenagers. Sentences are short and slang abounds. According to teenagers of my experience, the book communicates. Teenagers are willing to

accept responsibility for their own actions, but they need adult support and love, especially from their parents.

Here are Unity principles pared to teen-sized bites: give to get, everyone is worthwhile, life is sacred, enjoy, one is never alone, cause and effect, and positive thinking. This wholesome, straight-talking book should be around the house. Devour it yourself and watch any teenager in range devour it. Then talk it over. Refer to the book from time to time. Treat it as a reference book, as a reminder that teenagers are special people.

## PHYSICAL EXERCISE

by C. Norman Shealy, M.D., Ph.D.

Physical inactivity is stressful, and our society increasingly discourages physical activity. Automobiles, escalators, elevators, even "moving sidewalks" in airports are signs of "progress." Our first suggestions for physical fitness are:

- 1. Walk whenever possible, especially if your destination is less than a mile. If more, consider a bicycle.
- 2. Walk up and down stairs whenever possible. If you work up gradually, you will easily be able to walk up at least 10 flights of stairs. In many buildings it will save time.

Walking and stair climbing are partly limbering and partly cardiovascular strengthening. But, even intensely used they are not adequate for keeping the body flexible. Each joint, muscle and tendon needs a full range of motion daily. The following simple exercises can be done in 10 or 15 minutes. Start with one repetition; each week add another repetition; build up to 10 of each. Breathe slowly and deeply, exhaling during the most strenuous part of the exercise.

NECK - Roll head slowly in all directions, clockwise and counter clockwise, stretching to limits.

SHOULDERS AND ARMS – Shrug shoulders up and back, relax. Raise arms over head, swing out to shoulder level and make circles with each hand in both directions.

TRUNK — Stand erect and bend to either side. Return straight. Keep feet flat and straight ahead; turn as far to either side as possible. Straighten. Let your head and body drop gently forward stretching as far as you can loosely go. Go further each day or week.

LEGS AND HIPS — a) Lying on back, with one knee bent, raise your other leg straight up as far as it will go; lower to floor; repeat with opposite leg. b) Pull one knee up to your chest; then turn knee out to side; hold foot in crotch as you stretch knee to side; gradually straighten leg; repeat with other side.

SPINE — a) Lying on back; bend knees with feet flat on floor; raise buttocks as high as they will go; lower slowly. b) Get on all fours; arch your back up while you bend your head forward; raise your head up and back while you arch your back down, (buttocks up).

## The President's Letter

The Eastern Regional Conference met in Pawling, New York, where Joann Landreth and I were warmly greeted by Ed Myler, John Salunek and other conference participants.

We found the Eastern Conference to be very exciting and stimulating. We were introduced to some very interesting techniques that teaches one how to relax and release stress and strain that our jobs seem to cause. Tom Coates, Unity Center of Pittsburgh, involved us in meditation using stress-related techniques. We learned that stress is one of our most powerful enemies. Tom pointed out that ministers, spouses, and teachers face similiar stress. All three try hard to make things happen; whether in their ministry, services or personal projects.

One of the main reasons for stress is caused by being programmed to be stress symbols 24 hours a day, seven days a week and 12 months a year, with no time off for vacation. We live in skin-tight situations and conditions that are guaranteed to excite, energize, frustrate and dominate our professional and personal life.

In spite of our constant meditation we sometimes find it difficult to deal with day-to-day challenges such as: death, marriage, births, children, divorce, parties, shopping, personal care, church, board and many other day-to-day activities.

Tom said that he had to take the time to really get in touch with his real self before he could relax. He had been in Unity most of his life and because of this he took his meditation periods for granted.

His experience reminded me of a lady I once knew, who prayed The Lord's Prayer daily and fervently. Yet, had no inclination of what she was really saying. She was just going through the motion. Never once did she take time to really understand the words. She said, "I pray The Lord's Prayer because I have always done so."

Sometimes we, too, pray and meditate without reason and find ourselves still frustrated, uptight and disillusioned over certain situations that we face or in which we find ourselves. As a remedy for this Tom recommends that we take time at various intervals to care for the body.

His recommended techniques are:

Five minutes of deep breathing

Five-Ten minutes of mental relaxation

Five-Ten minutes of tensing and relaxing muscles

Twenty minutes of thinking about the parts of the body

Three-Ten minutes of a deepening exercise by counting down and also a health and wholeness technique

If you are interested in the full details of these techniques, write to Tom Coates and request them. I am sure he will send them to you.

Let us as ministers, spouses, teachers and board members learn to deal with our tasks or challenges with ease and the

joy of Spirit... take time to be holy...take time for YOU. "Would you believe that in your ministry the most important aspect is MINISTERING to YOURSELF"?

One of the real joys of Christmas is the opportunity to say thank you and wish you the very best of the New Year!

## Divisions Become A Shame To Religion

The following article, written by Howard Caesar, minister of Unity Church of Olympia, Washington, appeared in "The Daily Olympian" newspaper, Saturday, September 19, 1981.

Every community has its churches and variety of denominations. Consequently, every individual has the opportunity to choose from any number of spiritual paths within that community.

Denominations vary and even different churches within a denomination vary. But that which makes one different from another, a Catholic from a Methodist, a Baptist from a Pentacostal and so forth, is the beliefs and doctrine which accompany each. There are always similarities, as well as diversities.

It goes without saying that every person in this land is free to choose the church of his choice. Upon making that choice, the person usually feels a certain commitment to the beliefs and doctrines of the particular church. Some are more zealous than others. It is this zealousness to which I will speak.

There has been a trend throughout our country that is both good and bad. People are finding their way to spiritual paths and getting "turned on to religion." Certainly that is good.

The bad news is that in the "turn on" many people and church leaderships have begun peddling a message that is unhealthy. It is said in many ways, but the bottom line is essentially that there is one way to God and that is their way. Any other way is either scoffed at, belittled or condemned.

It is a shame, but divisions within friendships and family units are being created because somewhere and somehow in getting turned on to religion, they missed the essence of spirituality.

Spirituality creates no divisions among anyone. The spiritual minded person respects the right of every soul to pursue the path of his own liking and blesses that soul whatever the path.

Spirituality does not stand in judgement of anyone or any path. Spirituality is universality. It recognizes that everyone is a growing, unfolding being.

Unfortunately, some people have become so heavenly minded, they are no earthly good.

It is the person who has become so self righteous that he feels justified in almost harrassing others who either have no faith or have one that isn't to his liking. It is the person who lets his religion give him license to stand in judgement over all other paths and will terminate associations with even family members and friends, not because they are bad people or of questionable character, but because they have chosen a different set of beliefs.

How sad to think that religion has in many instances become paranoid about the preservation of its beliefs and the maintenance of its members that it has resorted to turning people against one another in the name of religion.

Certainly not all people are guilty of this and hopefully only a few churches are. It would be my hope that every church leader and member take an honest look at whether or not they are thinking, speaking and behaving condescendingly and judgmentally to others of different faiths.

It is not our place to deny anyone the right to pursue the spiritual path of their choice. It's time we respect each others choices and not create divisions among people in the name of religion.

Jesus emphasized that it was not "the letter" but "the Spirit" that was all important. It seems that the judgements and divisions being made are over "the letter," or doctrinal differences. The Spirit beholds the good in every soul and loves unconditionally. The Spirit moves one toward unity among all, not separation and division. One doesn't have to agree with another person's beliefs to apply the spiritual virtues of love and acceptance for the person.

Consider the spokes on a wheel. They come from a variety of directions, but all head toward the center or hub. The spokes are the different spiritual paths and the hub is God. We all may be a little ways apart in our beliefs, doctrines and approaches, but we are all seeking the one true God at the center of all life. I respect your spiritual quest and bless you on your chosen path.



## PLANNING AHEAD BUILDS ENTHUSIASM

In YOU we teach that order, good judgment, and dominion are aspects of each individual's Divine nature. Our teenagers are eager to discover how to express these qualities and they need creative and practical opportunities through which they can learn. If the YOU programs in our churches emphasize order, wisdom, and mastery, then the young people in our churches will discover through example and direct experience the importance of these spiritual powers. At the same time, an emphasis on organization in the activities of our groups will help insure that our programs are meaningful and satisfying.

I recently attended a weekend seminar for youth workers and youth ministers presented by David Stone. At that seminar I learned a method of long-range planning which can enable a church to develop a six-month or one-year plan for youth activities, and I would like to share this method with you. The following diagram shows the basic steps of advance planning.



#### PRE-PLANNING

First, the YOU Officer gathers ideas from the members of the group informally or with a simple written survey. After talking among themselves, the YOU chapter officers and the sponsor meet with the minister (or youth minister) in a preplanning meeting. The participants brainstorm a list of all possible activities for the year ahead, incorporating ideas gathered through the survey. The ideas are categorized into three areas: topics for spiritual inquiry, service activities, fellowship. The aim is to get as many ideas as possible, so every idea, regardless of how wild and crazy is written down.

Following a break, the list is evaluated to identify those activities which everyone (officers, minister, sponsor) find desirable and can support. The number of potential activities should be many more than can be accomplished in one year.

The next step of the pre-planning meeting is to develop a tentative calendar that frames choices of activities for each month. In the full planning meeting, the YOU as a whole will have a chance to select between the alternatives provided for each month. For example, in the pre-planning meeting you might decide that in September the YOU will study either Sunlight Packet No. 3 (The Nature of Man) or the Parables of Jesus. Another example—you might decide that the fellowship activity for October will be either a hayride or a roller skating party. The technique for framing choices saves time and still leaves the YOU members some say over what happens.

### **PLANNING**

Next, the sponsor and officers present the tentative calendar to the entire YOU group. The sponsor and officers describe

the choices for each month, then time is provided to discuss and vote on activities for each month. It is good for the officers to set a maximum amount of time that will be allowed for discussion of each month. When time has run out--the group votes. Since this planning meeting will take a few hours, it is good to make it part of an overnight retreat or a "lock in" at the church.

### MINISTER'S APPROVAL

If changes have been made in the calendar in response to input from the YOU as a whole, then the plan is again reviewed by the minister.

#### FRIENDS OF YOU NIGHT

The schedule of events that comes out of the planning meeting can then be presented to the parents of the YOUer at an evening meeting. In my last CONTACT article, I outlined how a meeting like this could be conducted to present "the year ahead." The purpose of this meeting is to gain the support and approval of the parents and other adults for the YOU program.

#### **IMPLEMENTATION**

The next step is to carry out the plan. Each month a calendar is sent to parents and YOUers to remind them of upcoming events. Youth activities are also listed on the church master calendar and in the monthly bulletins.

#### **EVALUATION**

Once a month the YOU officers meet with the sponsor to

evaluate the past month's activities and prepare for future events. The evaluations should be brief written descriptions of the events and the main points to consider in planning similar activities in the future. The evaluations from these meetings are used as the foundation of the next annual pre-planning meeting.

Ministers, sponsors and YOUers who have been involved in a planning process like the one just described, report many benefits from the YOU and the church. Ministers like the involvement of parents which increases communication and reduces confusion and complaints. Sponsors and YOUers like having events to look forward to and enjoy the continuity that planning brings.

I have shared this planning approach with the ministers in the recent issue of reSPONSE. I hope you will talk with your YOU Sponsors about ways to adapt this planning model to the needs of your church and YOU. I believe the rewards will justify the time investment.

Here's an idea you may be able to use in your Center:

Our Unity Center of Independence Unlimited has just launched a three-stage program for expansion. First, to pay off the mortgage on the new building site property. Then to build a new all-purpose facility at the right time as Spirit directs, and finally to open a New Age School and Holistic Health Center. Pray with us for the unfoldment of this Divine Plan.

Several months ago our Board of Directors took a step on faith and set up a "B.E." Fund--Building Expansion Fund. This is not the usual drive for funds, but truly a step in faith. In addition to the regular weekly tithe (right off the top of all income and offerings) which goes to the greater Unity work (AUC, UMS, Silent Unity, SCUCA, and new ministries) our Center now sets aside 10% of the Sunday tithes and love offerings as the "B.E." Fund.

Unity of Independence is like many of the other Unity Centers--its weekly income just about equals expenses, so to take 10% of the regular operating fund and put it toward a Building Expansion Fund was indeed a step in faith. We knew that if we upset the balance in this way, Spirit would give the increase. And Spirit has!

If your center is in need of funds for expansion, why not try a "B.E." Fund? It has several advantages:

- 1) It puts your faith where it belongs--in God.
- 2) It quickly and effortlessly raises money for architect's fees, etc. (In a short period we had \$4,000 in the fund with no effort.)
- 3) Every contributor is a part of the building program, even those who are already giving as much as they are able. Regular tithers know that 10% of their gift each week goes into this fund.

We give thanks to Spirit and to our wonderful Board of Directors for implementing this Divine Idea, and we wanted to share it with you.
