SURRENDERING

When Joann and I visited the Southeast Region last October, we found Shay St. John, Jay Dishman and the entire region in a pot of gold consciousness. With Wendy Miller searching for the pain and aches of the body, thereby relieving the pain by relaxing the muscles, I was reminded of some of the letters of concern that I had received from various AUC members from the field.

There was a strong indication for the need for loving support and leadership in our AUC churches, study groups and temples. I believe the only way we can have this is through total surrendering of all our limited concepts of leadership and of the AUC.

We have ministers, board members and teachers we look to for leadership. A strong leader may not always be the one who raves and rants and pushes and shoves in an ongoing way to get the job done. It could be the one who follows in the footsteps of Jesus; quietly doing his or her work. Remember, we do have a choice.

Remember the scripture where there were two gates, two fruits and two foundations. There was a wide and narrow gate, which means that there is a wide road and a narrow road. When traveling down these roads one may choose the wide road because the majority walks that road. It is where the fad walks, it is where the trend walks. But the narrow road is not always available, not always easy to follow because there are not many people on that road. It is not walked or used by others a lot, but on the narrow road we sometimes discover some of the great leaders. If you think about Columbus, he was told the world was flat but he thought the world was round. The road was very narrow for Columbus, and yet he walked that narrow road. He chose his own thoughts and he dreamed his own dreams.

There was a man who lived in Philadelphia, who first discovered how to take a bath in a bathtub and hot water. He thought it was beautiful and wonderful, but then the Philadelphia government banned taking baths in Philadelphia in the early 1900's because they felt it would cause rheumatism

and inflammation of the bones if they would follow that procedure. So they banned taking baths in the winter. This man chose to follow his dream and today we can take baths anytime we get ready. He chose to walk down the narrow road. There are many people like that, the Wright brothers, for instance. They were laughed at and called fools for wanting to fly in the early 1900's. But they chose that narrow road with one chance in a million that they could fly from one place to another. Today we think nothing of stepping on a jet and going across the ocean. Many people have dared to walk down that narrow road.

A leader is one who stands on that which he or she believes and loves those that don't believe them in spite of the difficulties they may be facing. Sometimes in a board situation, and sometimes in a membership situation, there is a wedge between the minister, the board and the licensed teacher. If we could just know that the narrow road is where the dreamer, and the person that gets the job done, chose to walk and follow in Jesus' footsteps in saying "Forgive them for they know not what they do." Yet Jesus did not condemn them, he continued to walk in that road.

Today you and I have that same privilege of walking that narrow road. In our board meetings, with our teachers, with our ministers, we can be loving and supportive. We can care enough to listen, but also care enough to forgive.

A good leader sets the example and follows that example he or she has set. There are two fruits that Jesus talked about. There is the bad fruit and there is the good fruit. The person that walks down the wide road does not always produce good fruit, but if you choose the narrow road to walk down your tree can bear good fruit. What we're saying is that if you prune your tree with denials and affirmations and if you are one of those who dare to lead in love, who dare to share in love, dare to walk in love, that you, too, can bear good fruit in your ministry.

We talked about two foundations. When you think about the two foundations you have to think about the foolish man and the wise man. The foolish leader builds his or her hopes and dreams upon a sand bed and it shifts like sand under their feet. But the wise leader builds his foundation upon a solid rock of Truth. How do we do this? We do this with integrity, stick-to-it-iveness, by being honest with ourselves, and through loving support of each other. As we love and support each other we can and do experience good and our foundation is as solid as a rock. But if our hopes and dreams are hanging on a thread of misconception, backbiting and all of the other things that cause trouble in our ministry, then we will not be able to experience that Truth that we seek.

Today would you surrender all and walk in the footsteps of Jesus? Let Spirit be our guide, as Spirit guides us, we will be able to face the world with a greater faith. Our ministry will grow and so will we.

Ministers, teachers, ministers-in-training, and board members, in 1982, let us surrender any thoughts of holding on to that which is not Christ ideal. Let us put unity in Unity, by standing firm in the Truth, loving one another in a greater measure. A true leader forgives and leads in faith, in wisdom and in love. Total surrendering right now can enhance your ministry today. Why not do it now?

MINISTRY SERVICES PERSPECTIVES

Traditionally leaders of Unity centers have seemed to place emphasis on the simplicity of persons joining their centers. The pamphlet published by the AUC, "Membership in Unity," states that it is not necessary for the candidate to sever his connection with any other church. Usually all that is required is for the person to sign a card applying for membership. In most cases this is automatically approved by the board and the candidate receives spiritual baptism at a designated Sunday service. In addition, some ministers extend an open invitation to any and all others to come forward and be received into membership, immediately, on that Sunday.

This free and easy method, while at first appearing to offer welcoming love and to show signs of vigor of the center, is not without its pitfalls. What can happen is that we may have handed to persons who are basically orthodox believers from various denominations all the rights and privileges of a full voting "stockholder" and part-owner of all the assets of the center, as well as power to influence the direction in which the center moves. In their initial exposure to a vital and meaningful expression of the Jesus Christ teaching, such ones often are carried away with enthusiasm, but remain traditional, mainline Christians at heart. The danger lies in them bringing with them the traditional ideas as to how a church should be run.

But Unity is different! Unity is the cutting edge of the New Thought movement! Not merely do we have a different way of interpreting the Scriptures and a different perspective of our beloved Teacher and Wayshower, but we have a different

approach to organization, to finances, and to the place of purely social activities. Failure to make these differences clear can have the effect of the voting membership becoming weighted with well-meaning individuals who are not really Truth students at all. Sometimes with dire results!

Recognizing this possibility, many centers impose conditions of membership. These need not be onerous, but do have the effect of educating or eliminating applicants who are not genuinely Truth-oriented. Some ministers conduct a special orientation class explaining Unity's uniqueness and also insist on the candidate having studied "Lessons in Truth."

One church I served required candidates to follow a course of study, following which they met a committee comprised of representatives of the ministry, licensed teachers, Sunday school, men, women and in fact all departments. Membership in that center is a prized and coveted privilege, and its growth over the years is testimony to the effectiveness of this method. The voting membership is made up of individuals who are able to evaluate proposals from the Truth standpoint, and by the time they reach the board, they are mature Truth students, steeped in Unity's way of looking at situations. It follows minister/board problems are very rare in that center.

It is possible many problems within centers would be avoided if we were to rethink our approach to membership, and consider taking steps to ensure that all persons desiring membership are helped to realize that we are not just another church, but belonging does involve a new way of thinking. A Book Review

When we let the warmth of our love flow out from us in a complete circle, we touch everyone with it, and the world becomes a better place. We meet each person Christ-to-Christ and automatically let our love reach him. To love in God's way we have to let it flow freely, not withholding it from anyone.

This quote is from The Simple Truth, A Basic Guide to Metaphysics by Mary-Alice Jafolla, which will be available on April 15. The Simple Truth clarifies Unity teachings and presents metaphysical ideas in language that children can understand-but it is much more than a book for children. Sunday school teachers and parents will find this an indispensable teaching guide and source book-and new Truth students will enjoy the book's basic approach to metaphysics.

A whole range of metaphysical material is examined and explored. Simple definitions of God, Jesus, the Christ Spirit, and explanations of such subjects as the origin of ideas, faith, health, the Bible, and heaven (heaven is an inside job) can help children to develop sound understanding. Later chapters develop these topics into practical guidelines so that children can learn how to handle problems, to forgive and forget, to love, to be thankful, to know the power of thought, and to see the good in everything.

The reading level is beyond that of the very young child but most children ten years or older should be able to read and understand the book. The ideas are simple, clear, and uncomplicated, with easily apprehended examples. With guidance, even younger children can grasp most of the contents. Preteens will find that The Simple Truth can shed light on many of their questions, particularly the sections that will help them to apply the concepts in daily living. The book can be useful in opening up areas for further discussion in any age group.

From "Our Love Should Go to Everyone":

Love is a mighty magnet. Whatever we love we attract into our lives. If we love God we will attract goodness. Eventually each of us will have to realize that he is part of everyone else. And he must love everyone because we are all one.

What are you loving? Are you holding your love back in places? Try letting it beam out in a complete circle like a candle or a bright light, falling on everyone and everything in its path. People will notice your radiance and will love you in return.

From "Heaven Is Where You Are":

You have always lived in heaven. You just didn't realize it. But now you do. And you will begin to see how beautiful, good, and loving your life is.

Once you know you carry heaven inside you, you

see the world as God sees it. And God sees everything as perfect. God sees with your eyes and hears with your ears. God's ideas flow into your mind. God uses your hands and expresses Himself through your body. It is your job to realize this. And when you do—that's heaven!

The Simple Truth contains twenty-seven main chapters with many short sub-headings which cater to a child's shorter attention span. The book is richly illustrated with a color cover and pencil drawings by Carolyn Bowser and one illustration by Betty Chaisson.

To the average person who attends a Unity church or center, Unity is a two-fold structure. First, there is his local Unity church with its beloved minister, dedicated board of trustees, teachers, counselors and others. Here he is able to receive inspiration, one-to-one counseling and instruction for a meaningful life. Second, there is the Unity School of Christianity, the home of Silent Unity and publisher of helpful literature, like Daily Word, that has become the invaluable aid to his daily devotions. This, he thinks, is the Unity movement.

But there is a third element, largely unpublicized, but nevertheless, essential to the long-term well-being and, indeed, the very existence of the local church. This is the Association of Unity Churches. The AUC is not unlike the cement that holds a brick building together. The mortar binding the bricks into a solid structure is almost invisible, yet, without it the building would collapse. Similarly, the AUC is the not often perceived factor that continues to make Unity available to thousands of students nationwide.

The AUC is not an appendage gratuitously added to the more obvious Unity field ministry and Unity School. It is a federation of ministers and ministries who have banded together to unitedly do better those things that we are unable to do as well alone, if at all!

The AUC trains and ordains ministers, licenses teachers, supplies youth education and Sunday school materials and

Love is being . . . obedient to the Christ within . . . Love is being a friend, through the Christ, to each other. Every summer when we return to Unity Village, some of us say, "I am coming home." This is a beautiful way to feel; but unless we see love in action wherever we are, it is just a sham. When Jesus was asked which is the greatest commandment, he said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. . . . And a second is like it. You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets." (RSV) This scripture clearly points out to me that we must love one another. Our love for each other must be so broad that it expands beyond all boundaries, all cultures, all races, all nationalities; and most of all, above all faults that we see in each other. It also means that our love should be so long that no one feels left out. Our love should be so high, no one feels they are shut out. Our love should be so deep no one feels lost. In other words, Unity itself is love. The world is calling for Unity. At our Conference in June, bring your love consciousness with you and share it with all of your friends. If we be love in every aspect, we are living our unity. Jesus did not stop talking about love when he gave the commandments. He also told us what would happen if we would keep his commandments. He said, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in His love. These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full. This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you, . . . love one another." (RSV) Love is being a friend to Jesus through each other. Love is being at the right place at the right time. A friendship must be nurtured and the only way to nurture a relationship

facilitators. It offers group health and hospitalization insurance, pension and retirement plans. The AUC is the channel through which centers are able to select their ministers. It provides a procedure to assist in the adjustment of minister/board/congregation relationships. It provides unified by-laws, an acceptable moving policy, codes of ethics and an IRS umbrella. It is a resource center, it publishes helpful manuals for board members, ushers, membership and the like; it provides attractive bulletin covers.

Probably no one center or minister uses all these services. Some use many, others few. These are some of the services that we ministers and churches have provided for ourselves and our churches by the fact of our uniting in an association. Together, we did it. Directly or indirectly you had a hand in it, for you are the AUC.

This then is the AUC--not an entity separated from us, or imposed upon us. The AUC is all of us, ministers and congregations alike. We are IT. We need each other!

Some, secure in their strong churches, may ask, "What do we need with the AUC?" The answer is, "You need the AUC, and the AUC needs you. The AUC is not an optional, expendable adjunct to the Unity movement. The AUC is the ministries in the field giving each other mutual support." If you doubt this, remind yourself that the greatest single New Thought ministry of all time disappeared without a trace on the passing of its leader. Emmet Fox's church had no effective national organization behind it!

The Unity ministry in the field, welded together by our common membership in the AUC, is the cutting edge of the New Thought movement. Unity School provides us with the authority of 95 years of unsurpassed inspirational literature. Its superbly produced publications provide us with valuable tools. Our link with Silent Unity and its wide acceptance as a prayer center that has helped millions, is a tremendous asset. Through the AUC you are part of all this. It forms the impressive backdrop against which your local center operates.

UMS News & Views

Occasionally, this column tells Unity field ministers how they can help ministers-in-training; this one tells you how ministers-in-training can help Unity field ministers--not in the future, but right now. If you want to have a radio ministry which can offer practical help to people in your area and arouse interest in your Unity center, the Radio Practicum of UMS can help you.

Thanks to the generosity of the UMS student body and a field ministry which had faith in this project, the UMS Radio Practicum has ready for distribution a 13-week series of half-hour talk shows called "Open Mind." Each allows time for two one-minute announcements by a local sponsoring center of study group. Each also deals with a timeless or timely topic like developing a good self-image, contemporary marriage, family problems, tolerance, changing the world, prosperity or decision making. Most are simulated "call-in" shows; MITs role-play ordinary people giving typical worldly views on the topic of the day and the MIT hosts subtly give the Unity view.

For variety, there are straight interview shows: one is an interview on attitudinal healing with Gerald Jampolsky; another is an interview on the new holistic healing center in Detroit with David Williamson; a third is an interview on the Third Wave and the Aquarian Conspiracy with Jim Sherman. One show is a combination interview and call-in; Nan Wire, now an MIT, but formerly in charge of employee benefits for a national corporation, appears as an expert on retirement planning and answers questions.

The shows can be aired in any order. Of professional quality, they are produced under the guidance of Michael Davenport, a long-time Unity student and a broadcast expert with many Clio awards to his credit; the chief engineer is Mark Weddel, who for several years was involved in producing "The Word" for Unity School.

The shows are available to Unity centers for a donation of only \$300.00 for the series--approximately \$23.00 a show--to cover production costs, but new churches and study groups can have them for a ten-percent discount. If a group can afford broadcast time but is not yet able to afford production costs, the shows are available for a free-will offering or absolutely free.

Regardless of how they are ordered, the tapes are the property of the center. They may be reproduced for distribution or used as discussion starters. Should Unity field ministries find the tapes effective, the Radio Practicum will produce special tapes for study purposes only. It is also ready to produce fifteen-minute shows if enough centers request them.

"The theory of reincarnation has only slowly been accepted in the Western world, although it has been considered Truth in Eastern philosophy for thousands of years," says Miki Bowen in her article, "I'll Be Right Back." Miki writes on this interesting and controversial subject for the February 1982 issue of UNITY Magazine.

Some people accept the idea of reincarnation in theory only, others as truth, still more as simply a fascinating but unprovable hypothesis. People who say they believe in reincarnation are not always in accord. Evidence of this are the many terms used by authors who write on the subject-rebirth, re-embodiment, metempsychosis, and palingenesis. ("Transmigration involves the theory of rebirth in an animal body, and is not the same as reincarnation," says Miki.)

Regardless of the personal belief of the center leader, many ministries permit or prompt discussion of reincarnation because of the popularity of and interest in the subject. Ministries that have an extensive file regarding reincarnation will find that Miki Bowen's article is a good review of the subject. Center leaders and teachers who are beginning to explore and gather information will find this article a good one to read.

Miki mentions that Charles Fillmore had a personal belief in reincarnation and the subject was often discussed in Unity's early days. Then and now, in accord with Unity philosophy, people are encouraged to draw their own conclusions and to develop their personal belief systems about reincarnation.

Miki's article is well-researched and encourages you to open your mind and consider the possibilities. Be sure to read "I'll Be Right Back," in the February 1982 issue of UNITY Magazine.

Sweeter Than Sugar

By the end of the year, <u>aspartame</u> will be an ingredient in cold cereals, powdered drinks such as iced tea and Kool-Aid, instant pudding, dairy topping and chewing gum. Small packets of a new sweetener, called "Equal," will appear in restaurants containing the equivalent of two teaspoons of sugar.

Aspartame has so many appealing qualities it is sure to be popular. It is 180 times sweeter than sugar so you use very little. The caloric count is tiny. It is not known to promote tooth decay or contribute to heart disease or diabetes and it has no bitter aftertaste.

The FDA which approved it on October 24th for specified foods, is however, under attack by some scientists who find a link to a possibility of brain tumors. It will carry a warning alerting individuals who must avoid phenylalamine because they have an inherited disease P.K.U. (a rare condition). It is to be marketed only in two-teaspoon packets to prevent consumers from cooking with it. It must NOT be used in cooking because heat breaks up the two amino acids and allows a sour-tasting chemical to develop.

The FDA commissioner ruled "There is no reasonable certainty.... that aspartame will not be harmful to the public under its proposed conditions of use."

February is a great month for a hopeful romantic like me. It is also a time of evaluating our progress in Youth Services in the last two and a half years and taking a serious look at long-range goals and planning.

We are blossoming with ideas, workshops, teaching aids, classes, consulting, and great future visions. WonderWord is having a great time as s/he now spreads love in other countries and to other denominations and frequently makes live guest appearances in Unity centers! You have asked for for additional materials for families and for Youth Education Directors. I am glad to let you know that we have a workbook of object lessons and a Y.E. Directors' Handbook off the drawing boards and hopefully ready for you by June 1.

We are seeing great benefits and less volunteer turnover from ministries that take seriously the task of recruiting, motivating, training, supporting, appreciating, and evaluating youth leaders and teachers. Some of the people we have trained have continued to serve Unity centers by making youth ministry a full time career. We are seeing great creativity and progress in the services offered to people of all ages in Unity centers.

But we are also frustrated at times too. This week I heard about yet another faithful Unity family who transfered their membership to another denomination because they felt a great need for a church that ministered to families and had a strong program of spiritual education for young people.

There is absolutely no reason in the universe that you cannot have the best youth education department in your area! We are sometimes frustrated because we have all the skills, creativity, experience and love needed to aid you and every Unity center in having an outstanding educational program for young people, teachers and families. But we must be used! As our team travels around the country we see churches that do not provide a loving and accepting environment for people under 25—this is a not-so-subtle form of discrimination. There are actually a few Unity centers that do not train teachers, do not support and meet regularly with YOU sponsors, do not provide an adequate climate and environment for learning and do not make people of all ages feel welcome in worshop.

In March, the regional Youth Education Facilitators and YOU Coordinators will be meeting at Unity Village for training and planning. During this five days together we will evaluate our '81 programs, learn new skills, set goals and plan training events and services for 1982. We need your imput! This is your chance to tell us how we can serve you better this year. What services have you used this year? (AGAPE,

Image for Living, Y.E. workshops, Director's training, Wonder-Word, Y.S. Coordinator, UICE Youth Education Seminar, Regional resource people, reSPONSE, YOU Conference, individual consultations, etc.) How have you benefited? What could we be doing differently to meet your individual needs? What future programs and training would you like to see implemented? What is your greatest roadblock to creativity and how can we help? What is the sound of one hand clapping? Strengthening the Heart C. Norman Shealy, M.D., Ph.D.

Exercise can and should be fun. The minimum requirements for adequate heart exercise follow:

Start very slowly and build up gradually to the final recommended amount; take at least 16 weeks to build up to maximum; if you're over 40 and haven't exercised regularly take 24 to 32 weeks to build up.

WALKING

Start with 1/4 mile at your own pace. Work up (over 16 to 20 weeks) to 3 miles in 45 minutes; four times per week.

STANDING JOGGING

Use either a jogging trampoline (start with one minute) or a mattress on the floor.

Start with one minute at your own pace. Work up slowly to 20 minutes 4 days a week, stepping down at least 180 steps per minute.

BICYCLING

Start with 2 miles at your own leisurely pace. Work up slowly to 10 miles in 50 minutes, 4 days a week (take 20 weeks to work up).

STAIRS

Start with one flight at your own pace. Build up to 50 flights up and down as rapidly as you can go, 5 days per week. (Build up over 20 weeks).

SWIMMING

Start with 100 yards at a leisurely pace. Build up to 100 yards in 30 minutes, 4 times a week (take at least 16 weeks to build up).







President's Letter

1982 has begun with a bang and we in AUC across the world are experiencing changes in weather, political life, finances, as well as the upcoming change in our Unity movement. We humans don't always agree with changes, especially if it seems to be a sudden change.

During our mid-winter committee meetings we discovered another reason to grow and unfold. None of us can say which is the best way for us to grow into. But, if we take a look at the whole Unity movement, minister by minister, teacher by teacher, region by region, at that time we can decide what is the best thing for us to do. I believe that every minister can tell us exactly what is the best thing for us to do at this time for our movement.

While visiting the Southwest Regional Conference, some mentioned that the best thing is for us to build or establish a better school, regardless of who is in charge. One said, "the best thing is to broaden the AUC services in the field." Another said, "the best thing is to strengthen our liaison training that it might better serve our ministers, teachers, church boards and churches." But are any of these things best for us? No, I don't have the answer. But together in June, we can share and decide upon what the majority of us think is the best thing.

When I think of the AUC, I am reminded of the man who wanted to travel across country by stagecoach. He went to the depot and asked the agent what it cost to go across country. The agent said, "There are three fares; first class, second class and third class." The man asked the agent, "What is the difference since everyone is traveling in the same coach and there are no differences between the passengers?" The agent said, "Just buy the ticket and you will see later." Not knowing what to do the man bought the first class ticket. They rode all day and late that evening they came to some mountains. The driver hopped off top of the coach and opened the door. He said to the passengers, "First class keep your seats, second class get out and walk and third class get out and push." The natural thing for us to say or do at that time would be that it is good to ride first class. It is better than being second class or third class. But was it really the best thing? Yes, we all like to go first class in our ministries and sometimes it seems that we are not particular about too much walking with those in need or nurturing ailing ministries or doing what is necessary to establish a first-rate school. But if all of us could become pushers for God over this mountainous area in our movement we could prosper and our churches, temples, centers and study groups could become havens of peace and love. And at the same time, together we could find some answers.

The time for a change is now! What kind of change and how best this change must take place is up to all of us. Whether we are riding first class, second class or third class, the best thing is for us to come together in June to work together for a better Unity movement.

My deepest thanks to Bob Stevens, Bob Hill, Arthur Hammons and everyone participating in the Southwest Regional

Conference held January 24-26, at the Descanso Retreat Center. Throughout the conference the feeling of love and warmth was shared by all those attending. Many heartfelt thanks to everyone who made the Southwest Regional Conference the joy that it was.

MINISTRY SERVICES PERSPECTIVES

Leafing through the new AUC Yearbook for 1982 I found myself meditating on the differences in consciousness, size and influence of some of the Unity centers and the ministers that I know. What, I asked myself, accounted for the differences. The answer came in a single word: dedication.

Dedication might loosely and variously be defined as singleness of purpose, the concentration of mind and energy toward an end, persistence beyond difficulties and determination to achieve a goal. Dedication of this sort is the quality that separates the spiritual men/women from the boys/girls.

Many Unity centers started just as study groups, but they grew because, at some point, someone, either the teacher/leader/minister or the students/congregation or both decided to dedicate themselves to building an enduring consciousness of spirituality. They made a determination to work with what they had at hand, and not yield to the temptation of seeking greener pastures.

Building a successful ministry is truly a joint project, it calls for dedication on the part of both minister and congregation. In the AUC we have a policy of discouraging ministers from seeking a change of ministry within two years of their appointment. Equally, we discourage boards from terminating their ministers within the same period. It is so easy for one or the other to become impatient for results in the form of capacity attendance or greater income. But it is a fact that it takes at least two years for a ministry to recover from the trauma of a change in minister. It takes at least that time for the minister to lay the foundations for an enduring ministry.

Alas, all too frequently one or the other loses patience and seeks a change. Both minister and the center are losers. The minister moves on with a sense of being unfulfilled, and the center is left to start over with a new minister.

My mental tour of the Yearbook showed me how this destructive trend can be halted. I discovered many centers where some years ago a minister had gone into a small work, but unlike his/her predecessors, had stayed. Working with a dedicated board the minister's persistence has paid off and now a solid work has resulted. More important than possible larger numbers and increased income is the expanded consciousness of love and understanding, a stable work serving genuine truthseekers. Let us recognize that two years is but a preparatory period. Meaningful growth comes only after this term. Then the fruits of the Spirit begin to manifest.

This is not a plea for bigness, but for soundness. This is Unity at its best. Dedication to the Jesus Christ teaching where we are is the secret of fulfillment for ministers. And dedication to the loyal support of their Spirit-appointed minister makes for harmonious and fulfilled center boards. When we all, ministers and board members alike, put personal ambition and personalities aside, and dedicate ourselves to building with the material and people at hand, then will our centers grow in consciousness and Unity will become a new force in our communities.

UMS News & Views

Good news! Soon, you can tell persons who want to become Unity ministers exactly what UMS offers. When the UMS Catalog of Courses is distributed in either April or May, you can see what kind of curriculum has evolved to prepare ministers to serve in the Unity field movement which Unity field ministers have formed and are still forming.

However, it is one thing to read course descriptions and credit values and quite another to know the kind of experience the curriculum provides. So here is information to help you understand and explain what is in store for the person who becomes a minister-in-training at the school you have helped to form--UMS.

FIRST: UMS offers an integrated core curriculum--the kind which educational experts say is most effective for preparing adults quickly for new, multi-faceted careers. The Unity ministry is multi-faceted and two years is a short time to spend preparing for it. However, no educational expert advised that the ministerial school adopt an integrated core curriculum; apparently Spirit worked through the AUC and Unity School faculty members to evolve it. I know that ten years ago the principle was already being used by William Fischer to integrate some courses and that when Frank and Martha Giudici joined the faculty, integration became apparent among more courses. The process has continued until now the entire curriculum is integrated. An integrated curriculum accelerates and reinforces learning because development of skills keeps pace with and utilizes acquisition of knowledge. For instance, in the first quarter students must use what they learn in The Synoptic Study of Unity Teachings in short talks for Communication Skills and short articles for Ministerial Writing. What they learn in Management Skills, Teaching Methods and Communication Skills, they immediately use to prepare group presentations in Prayer Techniques. What they learn in Bible History is used for talks in Communication Skills, and what they learn to do in Communication Skills they do every time they lead an opening statement for a class or do any oral work in any class. Furthermore, each quarter's work provides a foundation for the courses of the next quarter.

SECOND: Though one credit is given for each ten class hours, the credit values assigned major curriculum areas do not always reflect the total time devoted to them. The UMS core curriculum has eight broad areas. With credits in parentheses, they are: Communication Skills--which includes all teaching courses, special services and speech skills (37); Bible Studies--History and Interpretation (29); Truth Fundamentals (24); Center Operations--which includes Management Skills (10); Credo (9); Historical Studies--World Religions, Christianity, New Thought and Unity (7); Counseling (6); Prayer and Meditation (6). It seems that prayer and meditation are slighted, but they are not. During the two years at UMS, students spend 80 hours in chapel and 80 hours in Silent Unity. If given academic credit, that time would yield an additional 16 credits. The same is true for counseling. To fill the practicum requirement of approximately 40 hours each

quarter, MITs serve in one or more of the following: the Counseling Center, Help Line, Hospital or Prison Chaplaincy. Of course, much historical material is woven into Bible Studies, Truth Fundamentals and Meditation Workshop.

THIRD: The UMS curriculum now has a nineth area which could be considered the growing fringe. It is Electives and Practicum (32). For several years, the practicum alone has been the growing fringe and has yielded no credit, but it has given MITs actual experience in traditional and new activities of Unity ministers. Recognizing that today many progressive colleges award credit for experience, UMS now grants credits for practicum work. While all 32 credits may be earned in practicum work, some may also be earned in electives. The elective program has just been initiated. It consists of courses of variable duration to satisfy special needs or interests of students or provide information and training required by new field activities. Depending on the nature of the course, it offers classes in the afternoon, evening or on weekends at Unity Village or elsewhere. The teachers are local or visiting Unity ministers or qualified experts. At this writing, Brooks Myers and Maggie Finefrock are conducting intensive elective workshops in Youth Leadership at the Village; Sallye Taylor is starting a long-term elective in pioneering and urban ministry at her center, Unity in the Inner City in Kansas City (it will be followed by practicum work at the center); Carol Nash is giving a long-term elective in chaplaincy training at Research Hospital in Kansas City. As you read this, some students will be in the Directed Studies elective to do individual research or prepare materials for distribution to the field in response to requests of Unity ministers, others will be in the Newsletter and Journalism Workshop under the direction of an expert, still others will be taking the Psychology of Leadership & Assertiveness Training under the guidance of a clinical psychologist. Many students have already earned elective credit for the Help Line and Silent Unity training periods and for the training period required for participation in the Radio and TV practicum.

Without disturbing the integrated core curriculum, the elective and practicum area permits us to enrich the background of the MITs, prepare them for today's field ministry, and discover what new material should be included in core courses.

FOURTH: Continuing curriculum work is consistent with the most enlightened educational practices. The faculty and all committees involved with the preparation of Unity field ministers constantly re-examine the core curriculum to see that it meets both the historical and the current needs of the field. In the process some separate courses seem to disappear but usually their content has been absorbed by another course. For instance, though Unity and Contemporary Issues has disappeared as a course, its content provides the material for exploration in mock radio and TV group interview programs in the first year of Communication Skills and mock retreat panels in the second year.

When you read the UMS Catalog of Courses, remember that it is largely the product of field ministers. Whether or not you have made suggestions directly to the faculty or Education Council, your field activities influence the curriculum, and when you say that you wish you had had more preparation in some area, as quickly as possible the appropriate course reflects your wish.

The faculty from AUC and Unity School, the Education Council, the Educational Liaison Committee, and all others involved directly with the preparation of MITs for service in the field are grateful that they can minister to the entire Unity movement through their work at the school that Unity ministers have brought into existence—the AUC's Unity Ministerial School.

Expansion Committee Report

The Expansion Committee met January 18 and 19, 1982, at Unity Village. The following action took place at that time:

Special funding was earmarked for expansion of new ministries in the following manner:

- a) Funds should be used for the revitalization of old ministries with excellent facilities.
- b) Small study groups with potential for growth and who are ready to assume the responsibilities of a full-time ministry.
- c) The growing needs of urban ministries.

The Committee believes this work can be accomplished by use of energetic and eager ministers interested in pioneering work. When a ministry is led by this type of minister a healthy church will result.

The Committee envisions five or six new ministries being funded when they meet again this year in June. Funded ministries will be reevaluated every six months. Regional Outreach Facilitators or neighboring ministries will be asked to accept responsibility for overseeing the new works. These responsible people should have demonstrated in their own ministries positive leadership qualities resulting in stable, healthy ministries.

Criteria for selection of ministry as follows:

- a) Statement of goals for utilization of funds.
- b) Willingness of ministry to provide salary package recommended by AUC.
- c) Financial statements for six or twelve months, showing clear picture of need.
- d) Description of meeting facility including seating capacity.
- e) Schedule of services, classes (and office hours if applicable).
- f) Indication of size, age span, and attendance records of group.
- g) Statement of how long group has been in existence, with information about any prior study group activity in area.
- h) Indication of strong, dedicated core group willing to work.
- i) Population study of area, showing potential for growth.
- i) Statement of group's target date to be self-supporting.
- k) Interview with group leader during January or June Committee meetings or in region with committee memher

Criteria for minister:

- a) Commitment to pioneering work.
- b) Statement of past ministerial experience and/or recommendation from UMS faculty.

- c) Ability to work with and motivate people.
- d) Demonstrated unquestionable leadership qualities (or potential for same).
- e) Primary thrust toward total self-sufficiency as quickly as possible.
- f) Firmly grounded in and dedicated to Unity philosophy and teachings.

Each case will be evaluated with funds administered in the manner most helpful to each group. The assistance given to new ministries is to be considered a gift.

If you are interested in the program or know of a ministry that would qualify, please contact **Debi Maynard** at the AUC office, no later than May 1, 1982, for consideration at the June Committee meetings.

PROPOSAL I-Statement of Purpose:

IMPLEMENTATION: The statement of purpose appears on CONTACT and Circle of Light. A camera-ready copy is available for ministries. The AUC Statement of Purpose will also appear in other newsletters, return envelopes, AUC Yearbook, Conference schedule, etc.

PROPOSAL II - Income Expansion:

BACKGROUND: The AUC has traditionally depended on tithes and love offerings to support its functions at the AUC headquarters. Annual income has only provided for a maintenance posture of operation with creative expansion set aside due to fund limitations.

RECOMMENDATION: We suggest that the Planning and Goals Committee in fulfilling its function of short, medium, and long-range planning be authorized to explore new income producing activities and services to enable complete funding of current operation and expanded services.

STATUS: Passed.

IMPLEMENTATION: Committee formed to explore funding projects for expanded service to field ministries. Suggestions are welcomed from the field.

PROPOSAL III - Future Projects:

BACKGROUND: The AUC's income level has been used as a rationale to limit serious consideration of creative future projects.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that a list of projects be established and ranked by priority, ready for funding and implementation.

STATUS: Passed.

IMPLEMENTATION: A letter has been sent to all Committee Chairpersons to inform them of this proposal. Each Chairperson has been given a form to complete for each project that they would like to have considered for future services. These forms will be compiled into a notebook and prioritized by the AUC Board of Trustees for future funding and implementation. AUC ministers and staff members who have ideas for future projects are encouraged to submit them. Please contact a Committee Chairperson or Brooks Myers in the AUC office for the one-page project form.

PROPOSAL IV - MIT Creative Services Project:

BACKGROUND: "What does the AUC do for us?" is a common refrain. The Planning and Goals Committee sees a need for increased visibility of services and better use of available resources. As one way to accomplish this we recommend that the professional services of MITs (lawyers, accountants, management specialists, etc.) be available on a love offering basis, to field ministers through the AUC office.

RECOMMENDATION: That this project be implemented on an experimental basis until evaluation by the Board in June

STATUS: Passed.

IMPLEMENTATION: In this issue of CONTACT you will read about this project under the direction of Etta Farrior (attorney), MIT, and the consulting services that will be offered. You can begin to use this service immediately on a love offering basis. The success of this project will be determined by your feedback within the next six months.

The Planning and Goals Committee seeks to serve your needs as a field minister by prayerfully developing long-range visions and plans. It is our desire to provide you with optimum support and services and enable you to do your job easily and creatively. During the next few months we will be developing a long-range plan for AUC and discerning ways that we can increase actual service to you. We welcome your dreams, ideas, goals, needs, and prayers for ways to more effectively and lovingly serve humanity, and provide strength to one another. Please join with us in considering these questions: (Let us know your insights and needs.)

- 1. How can we become more effective as an association... as churches... as ministers...?
- 2. How can AUC grow organizationally without becoming bureaucratic, rigid and institutionalized?
- 3. Will we need to expand our educational program to include professional training for ministers of music, ministers of education and youth ministers? If so, when?
- 4. As we grow, do we need to think about buying or building our own headquarters and educational facilities?
- 5. How will the current economic programs and unemployment affect local churches?
- 6. What kinds of outreach programs will be needed?
- 7. What should our priorities be for the next five-year period?
- 8. How can we better unite worldwide Unity ministries through prayer?
- 9. What would Jesus Christ have us do?

YOU/YAU Reports

YOU SPONSOR JOB DESCRIPTION

When I talk to new or prospective YOU sponsors, I tell them that the sponsor's most important task is to create a positive atmosphere of affirmation, acceptance and love in which the YOUers can share and grow. With this general goal in mind, new sponsors also have a need to know specifically what a sponsor is asked to do. The following outlines the responsibilities of being a sponsor, some ideal qualifications for being a sponsor and resources the sponsor can turn to in carrying out his or her job. It is suggested that the sponsor commit to carry out these responsibilities for at least six months, preferrably a year. I hope this sample job description helps you in recruiting and orientating new sponsors.

RESPONSIBILITIES

THE YOU SPONSOR(S):

Regularly attends Sunday YOU Meetings. . .

The sponsor participates in all Sunday meetings of the YOU group. As much as possible he or she supports the YOU officers in conducting the prayer and meditation activities. The sponsor teaches the spiritual lessons and facilitates activities which enable the YOUers to apply the principles taught in a practical way. The sponsor may arrange for guest speakers to present the lesson on occasion to provide a broader range of views. (YOU curriculum is available from the AUC office.)

Accompanies the group to Rallies and Retreats. . .

The sponsor makes sure that registration and medical release form for Rallies and Retreats are filled out correctly and are submitted to the host chapter in an orderly manner. The sponsor also oversees the group's transportation to and from these events. At the Rally or Retreat, the sponsor serves as chaperone for his or her chapter.

Helps with Service Projects...

The sponsor assists the YOUers in planning and conducting service projects for the community and the church. The sponsor works with the minister and YOU officers to identify possible projects. At least one major project is conducted each year

Participate in planning meetings. . .

Once a month the sponsor meets with the YOU chapter officers to plan future activities for the group. At these meetings the sponsor also spends time teaching leadership skills.

Every three (3) months, the sponsor and the chapter officers meet with the minister to evaluate past events and gain authorization for future projects. The sponsor is under the direct supervision of the minister and communicates with the minister on a periodic basis to coordinate YOU activities with other church activities.

Attends Training Workshops. . .

The sponsor is expected to attend either a Youth Education teacher training seminar or a YOU sponsor training at least once a year.

The sponsor is encouraged to develop an individual friendship with the members of the group and, if possible, to spend time with group members in addition to the Sunday meetings. The sponsor is urged to hold the members of the YOU group in the Light of prayer on a regular basis.

As a relationship of trust is established between the sponsor and the members of the group, it sometimes happens that individual members of the group may want to share their difficult challenges and feelings with the sponsor. The sponsor's role is to be an accepting, non-judgmental adult friend who listens and supports without trying to solve the YOUers problems for them. The sponsor seeks to draw out the Christ potential in each YOU member, and this enables them to take responsibility for as much of the group's activities as is possible.

OUALIFICATIONS

It is suggested that the YOU sponsor be a member of the church and at least 25 years of age. He or she needs to have a general understanding of Unity principles in order to teach. The YOU sponsor must be willing to lovingly spend an average of 2-4 hours per week with YOUers in meetings, planning, listening and prayer.

Ideally, the sponsor has had some previous experience working with teenagers. It is also desirable if the sponsor has had counseling experience or training in communication skills.

SUPPORT AND RESOURCES

The sponsor has several people to turn to for assistance and ideas. The minister is the sponsor's closest support person as well as their supervisor. The minister can assist the sponsor as well as define his or her role and can consult about the week-to-week activities of the YOU.

The regional coordinator is another resource person who can answer questions involving regional activities like retreats, rallies and sponsor trainings. The regional coordinator can also offer help with social activities.

The international YOU coordinator provides support through the sponsors' newsletter, reSPONSE, and the YOU curriculum, Sunlight and other written resource material. The international coordinator provides information concerning the international YOU conference and is available for consultation at regional rallies.

SUMMARY

The YOU sponsor is a teacher, a planner, a supervisor, a counselor, a mentor, a friend, a chaperone, a prayer partner, a liaison with the YOU group and the church and community and an advocate for the needs of youth.

Relaxation

The Key To Inner Balance by C. Norman Shealy, M.D., Ph.D.

Relaxation is a tremendous restorer of body balance of homeostasis. In a diabetic, for instance, 30 or 40 minutes of daily relaxation lowers insulin requirement up to 50%. Virtually everyone benefits from good relaxation, practiced regularly.

The first requirement is to put yourself into a comfortable position. If sitting, let the back of your chair support you; keep feet flat on floor, legs uncrossed; one hand should rest on each thigh; head in a neutral position; eyes closed. If lying down, place your arms beside you, bent slightly at clbows. Use a small, soft pillow if needed. You may also have a pillow beneath your knees. Be sure clothes are loose.

Breathe slowly, deeply, regularly. As you breathe in, say to yourself, "I am." As you breathe out, say to yourself, "relaxed." After five or six breaths, feel inwardly, with your mind, each part of your body. If any body part feels tense or has no feeling, tighten it for a moment; then let go; appreciate that body part.

As you practice this technique, you will experience a variety of feedback feelings; allow them to come and go without getting carried away with any one feeling.

Practice the above three to four minutes. Then change to "I am" as you breathe in, "calm and serene" as you breathe out. After 10 or 20 breaths and phrases, slowly open your eyes and stretch, filled with renewed energy.

Practice the entire exercise at least twice and preferably three times daily. Choose a time when you will do this. Try mid-morning, mid-afternoon, and end of workday--instead of coffee breaks and cocktails. It feels better and is healthier.

If you are nervous and/or smoke, try practicing this simple exercise two minutes out of every hour, and after awhile you'll find yourself relaxing well just by taking one or two deep breaths and thinking "relaxed." Once relaxed you still need internal balance.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Association of Unity Churches is a global network of ministries, ministers, teachers, and laypersons sharing the vision and aim of the Fillmore tradition of "Practical Christianity" as demonstrated by Jesus Christ. While maintaining a viable central organization, the AUC's larger purpose is to support the spiritual development of individuals through local ministries.

As an international service organization dedicated to spiritual unity, AUC supports the interdependence of its members through prayer, communication, and the combining of energies and resources to serve humanity. Support services provided by the Association include administration of international Association affairs, training, licensing and ordination of ministers, licensing of teachers, consultation in liaison and creative projects, training and materials in youth education, media and communication of dynamic ideas, educational and inspirational retreats and conferences, placement and support of ministers and other evolving functions deemed beneficial by the membership.

The Association is people in churches, centers, temples and study groups around the world united in spiritual fellowship to apply the universal Christ message of love in action.



MINISTRY SERVICES

PERSPECTIVES

The next step in the expansion of the Unity movement may rest with you who read these lines. Last month's issue of CONTACT contained the full report of the meetings of the Expansion Committee. This forward-looking report included a detailed policy for the use of AUC tithes in three general areas: (1) the revitalization of old ministries in possession of excellent facilities; (2) the further development of study groups with potential for growth that are ready to assume the responsibilities for a full ministry; and (3) the development of urban ministries.

The article also set out the criteria for the selection of ministries or groups. Individuals who believe their work may fall within these guidelines are urged to reread the article and submit a detailed application to Debi Maynard at the AUC office without delay.

This is only one part of an aggresive program to expand the number of Unity centers throughout the country. One thing we can all do is to reexamine the possibilities in our own localities. It is our policy to encourage the formation of more Unity centers in both metropolitan and suburban areas. By this time most ministers and boards have gone beyond the fear of "territorial infringement" and no longer feel comfortable claiming a large metropolitan area as an exclusive preserve. To this end we encourage existing centers in large cities to actively set about forming one or more satellite groups with a view to them fairly rapidly evolving into self-sustaining Unity centers. At first this will be a missionary project with the existing center assuming responsibility for all expenses. But as the satellite group grows it will progressively take over more and more of the load until eventually it attains independence.

Far from this proliferation of centers being detrimental to existing churches, it has actually been found to be advantageous to all concerned. The multiplicity of Unity works in and around Detroit and Chicago and in California and Florida testify to this. Every new center will draw fresh people. A student who becomes disenchanted with a church or minister is not then lost to Unity, but can find another center within driving distance. The announcements of several Unity services on the church pages, rather than the single advertisement lost in the sea of major denominations, will serve to underline that Unity is not an obscure sect, but is a growing force to be reckoned with.

Perhaps your attendance is increasing to the degree that you are considering enlarging your physical plant. Before you do this, ask yourself whether the needs of the community would not be better served by establishing an additional group on the other side of town. This can quite often be better than attempting to build a "mega-work," for it will result in a more personal ministry being offered to a handier number of people and in the long run it will touch more lives.

So dear friend, you who read this, whether minister or board member, take a new look at the size and influence of your center in relation to the population and extent of your community. There will almost certainly be an area into which the population is expanding where it would be advantageous for a new Unity work to be developed. As you prayerfully consider these ideas, the next step in the expansion of the Unity movement may well depend on your acting upon the ideas you receive.

UMS News & Views

Someone recently remarked that Unity Ministerial School is a school for success. He pointed out that the men and women accepted by the school have already been successful, that the teachers were successful field ministers, the curriculum is designed with an eye to what successful field ministers say is needed, and L & O recommends licensing or ordination only for graduates who show promise of being successful ministers. Then he added, "Since that usually means the whole class, UMS is a school for success." The comments were more than music to the ear, they were a whole symphony--not because UMS emphasizes success but because what it does emphasize during the two-year program leads to success. UMS emphasizes what the Association of Unity Churches emphasizes in its Statement of Purpose--service.

The men and women selected to be ministers-in-training have indeed been successful because they already know that the secret of continuing success is service. They come to UMS eager to learn how to be of spiritual service in the Unity field ministry, and, as the UMS Catalog of Courses shows, every part of the curriculum points them toward service. But, as the new MIT Creative Services Project indicates, the MITs do not want to wait until they are in their own churches to be of service. They want to serve the AUC member ministries right now and they hope that you will keep, and not hesitate to consult, the list of services that appeared in last month's CONTACT.

They really are eager to serve. Already, through their new Work Pool, MITs provide short-term temporary help for various departments of Unity School. Of course, the present MITs continue to greet retreatants and USRS students at the airport and provide transportation for them.

More in keeping, however, with the spiritual service for which they are preparing, in addition to participating in Silent Unity healing meetings every Tuesday and Thursday, MITs hold a before-school Prayer Service every Wednesday and Friday morning and activate a prayer chain whenever anyone needs prayer support. For over a year, they have happily accepted the invitation to read the Daily Word for retreatants on the steps of the Activities Center at 7:00 a.m.!

The Radio Practicum is busy with a new service. Now that it has a backlog of "Open Mind" programs, it has begun recording discussion programs for use by study groups or church discussion classes. Each professionally produced program deals with an aspect of Unity teachings and includes a study guide. The series is called "Helping Hand" and will be available soon. If you are interested write OPEN MIND PRODUCTIONS, Box 492, Lee's Summit, MO 64063.

Most of the new service activities were initiated by the MITs, for during the two years while they are surrounded by service-oriented individuals, they develop an even greater consciousness of service than they had when they entered. That consciousness prepares them not only to serve as successful spiritual leaders of Unity churches but also to serve as active participants in the AUC. UMS is a school for success but only because the school, like the AUC itself, is devoted to service.

YOU/YAU Reports

YOUTH OF UNITY REPORT:

A couple of months ago I attended a weekend seminar for people who facilitate group activities. Most of the other participants were co-workers and professionals working in the area of employment and career development. After a full day and evening of classes, we all decided to go for a late night swim in the retreat center pool. While we were in the pool some of the women sneaked into the men's dressing area and stole the clothes of their friends. The men who had to walk barefoot down the rocky dirt road in their swim suits on a cool night vowed revenge. At 1:00 a.m. a group of about 15 raided the offenders and covered them with shaving cream. While all this was going on it occured to me that if these people had been a group of YOUers, I probably would have talked to them about respect for property (shaving cream takes off paint) and suggested that if they kept it up I would have to send them home. But in this case, since they were adults (whose ages ranged from 25-40) I thought these folks were a little rowdy and fun loving but certainly not out of hand.

What I discovered was that to an extent I still had a double standard in how I interpret the actions of teenagers as opposed to how I interpret the actions of adults. It came to mind that if I were at a YOU retreat and the participants came late to a scheduled meeting I might think to myself that it was because they were irresponsible or immature, but if a group of adults did exactly the same thing I would pass it off saying that they probably had something important to do or just got involved in a conversation.

The point is that teenagers deserve the same respectful treatment afforded adults, because teenagers are not that different from adults in many ways. Teenagers are looking for love, for a purpose in life, for a sense of fulfillment for a degree of self-respect and self-worth, just like us. The extent to which I remember and act on that truth is the extent to which I am able to establish an honest rapport with teenaged people.

Youth Services Report

Joyous Easter Celebration!

I have heard lately from ministers whose youth population and family services are growing and expanding. They are requesting a sample job description that is being used in the field by a Youth Education Director. So, here is a sample from Unity of Denver, one of the most successful youth departments of any denomination.

Use these ideas as a guide to write your own. If you would like a sample outline for writing a job description for volunteers or staff, write me and I will send you one. Blessings!

In general the Youth Education Director:

- 1. Guides leaders in planning, conducting and evaluating their work.
- 2. Recruits needed leaders for the Y.E. Department.
- 3. Secures human and physical resources for Y.E.
- 4. Helps leaders set goals for their work.
- 5. Provides training for leaders.
- Coordinates the creation of new classes and activities as needed.
- 7. Conducts planning and support meetings.
- 8. Communicates with minister to choose leaders, establishes policies, procedures, changes.
- 9. Coordinates with other church departments, regional and national.

Skills and knowledge required:

- Love of children
- Receptivity to learning
- Ability to motivate and support people
- Commitment to personal prayer and ongoing spiritual growth
- Enthusiasm in working towards fulfilling the overall ministry of the church

JOB DESCRIPTION

OVERSEES & TRAINS: Youth Education Staff of 33 teachers,
Preschool through Uniteens. Conducts Orientation/training seminars to train new staff—approximately 1 per month.

WRITES: Monthly teachers' letter, which contains short article on Truth Principles, which teachers can study and consider for month. This is specifically done, so that the group consciousness of the Youth Education Department is maintained at the highest spiritual level. Also contains complete information on month's curriculum and agenda.

conducts: Monthly teachers' meetings for all Y.E. staff, covering new teaching ideas, program development, administration necessities, and generally keeping staff motivated, enthused, informed and spiritually uplifted. A short lesson and meditation is also conducted at these meetings.

RESEARCHES: Music, films, filmstrips, visual aids, and all material used in the presentation of Truth to the children, and the development of the Y.E. department.

RECRUITS: Volunteers to work as teachers and greeters through regular church channels.

TRAINS: New Y.E. Teachers for teaching duties. Also Y.E. Directors sent from other centers throughout the country to Denver, for specific Director training. This program is endorsed and approved by SCUCA. One of two such programs in operation throughout the Unity movement.

COORDINATES: With church office on all announcements, articles, etc., to be printed; i.e., bulletin Communicator, other publications of church.

DEVELOPS: Ideas for, and conducts 30 minute assemblies at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. session of Youth Education. This consists of a lesson, meditation, singing and overall discipline.

Ideas, and the implementation of same, of theme for the whole year, to be used in Y.E.department; for example 1979 was the International Year of the Child, and this theme was used extensively during Assembly time, combined with the 12 Powers of Man. This involves research of material, films, coordination with all staff, and training teachers for the right implementation into their classes. Providing as much informative materials as possible to teachers for theme.

Ideas for 10-11 activities, oversees correct implementation by person responsible for these activities.

Holiday theme ideas, Christmas, Thanksgiving, Halloween, etc. Ideas for bulletin boards, social functions; i.e., Parent Pot Luck Dinners, Parent Coffee Hour, Open House.

Ideas for programs to be presented in church. Implements same. Trains children in singing and program. Oversees development of whole program. Leads program in church.

Vacation Bible School Curriculum. Trains volunteers. Oversees program and working in same.

Seminars on parenting and teaching children Truth principles. Develops, organizes and conducts these all-day seminars.

COUNSELS: Parents and children. Also teachers both at church and at home.

RESPONSIBLE: For ordering all AUC material from Unity every three months. Making sure each teacher receives correct material at correct time. Filing same in order. Studying and becoming acquainted with all AUC

teaching material for all grades. Each grade has it's own theme and material. This involves seven different grades. Refiling old materials.

Researches material for teacher's resource books. Researches magazines suitable for teaching resources. Researches children's books on teaching Principles of Truth. Also those suitable for Parents.

Composes and compiles resource list for teachers at each grade level.

LOGISTICS: Keeping supplies maintained and orderly. All teachers supplied with correct concrete materials to work with. Ordering and developing holiday materials, printing, etc.

WRITES: Articles and suggestions for Y.E. program throughout the movement. Submits articles to Youth Services Coordinator at Unity Village for AGAPE, the Youth Education publication from AUC.

OVERSEES: The Uniteen program and the development of same, spiritually and socially.

ORDINATION BIBLE PROJECT

The licensed teacher is a member of the Unity ministerial team, whose value to the movement has not yet been fully realized. Here we have an asset whose potential has not been adequately exploited. And yet, in another respect, perhaps licensed teachers have been exploited in that they are seldom rewarded commensurately for the services they perform.

Generally our licensed teachers are those dedicated Truth students whose love of Truth and desire to serve have impelled them to embark on a long and demanding course of study, and to stay with it until they graduate. The course is tough. It involves sitting through hours of lectures, and writing many papers. It calls for several stays of resident study at Unity School. The applicants are then subjected to the rigors of a Skills Development Seminar. The process may take four or more years, and cost the individual \$3,000.00 in travel and accommodations. Some applicants receive some assistance from their centers, but most are on their own. Not all applicants make it!

On return to their centers, proudly bearing their hard-won certificates, the various newly licensed teachers, face widely differing, and often uncertain, futures. How now will they be used? What opportunities will be afforded them to share their skills and knowledge, to express their pent-up Truth lore?

And what will be the rewards? Will it just be the occasional class when the minister happens to be too busy or too burned-out to teach? And the rewards? (perhaps 50% of the class offering?)

This may have been the fate of some in the past, but we hope we are getting beyond this. We are being helped by the endeavors of the Licensed Teacher Committee, chaired by Catherine Garvey (co-chairpersons Betty Jacunski and Bea Copeland, all ordained ministers) aided by experienced licensed teachers from the regions. This committee is entrusted with the encouragement of the professional development of licensed teachers. The committee believes that in their licensed teachers, ministers and boards have a wealth of professionalism that is seldom used to the full.

Licensed teachers can be employed in many ways beyond the obvious teaching and counseling. Their wide and thorough knowledge of Unity's and other New Thought books and authors, make them uniquely suitable to be placed in charge of the bookroom or library. Many do yeoman service as visitors of members in hospitals, nursing homes and other shut-ins. After the first visit by the minister, the licensed teacher is wonderfully qualified to make subsequent visits bearing the love and greetings of the minister and congregation.

In addition, depending on the capabilities of the individual, licensed teachers may be considered for the prayer ministry, assisting on the platform, coordinating youth and other programs, guest speaking, business managers or secretarial posts. As center finances permit licensed teachers should be considered for full-time or part-time employment in any of the above mentioned roles.

We are awaiting the product of further meetings of the Licensed Teacher Committee. In the meantime, it is a challenge to the imaginative genius of all ministers and board members to discover for themselves new ways in which this dedicated group of Truth seekers can share their very real talent to the greater advantage of our movement.

Every Unity Center has something to meet. Prayer and faith go hand in hand in bringing about constructive demonstrations. It is important that each ministry work with the universal laws to bring forth the results it is seeking. This is what makes Unity such an exciting adventure.

UMS News & Views

Routine is rarely really routine at Unity Ministerial School, but perhaps it is least routine at this time of year, and this year there are more non-routine activities than ever before.

During the final quarter, second-year ministers-in-training usually have difficulty focusing attention on the present because they must spend weekends trying out for their future churches while they must spend weekdays polishing skills and rounding out knowledge needed for starting their work as Unity ministers.

The first-year MITs have just as much difficulty focusing upon the present; they assume the student government, plan festivities to honor the graduating class, organize welcoming activities for in-coming students and begin increasingly complex course work. This year they have added responsibilities: they are preparing not only to welcome a new class into the UMS program but also to welcome into their class the first group of students from the Detroit Urban Ministerial School. Although the Detroit MITs will not be physically part of the class until the beginning of the school year at the end of July, each one has been spiritually a member of a first-year prayer group for a long time. As a result, the class of 1983 is readying itself to say farewell to one group of spiritual brothers and sisters while it readies itself to welcome two other groups.

It is a confusing but rewarding time, and in a way it is as important to preparation for the Unity ministry as a required course, an elective or a practicum activity. For first and second-year MITs alike, the apparently conflicting demands upon them constitute a course in the "hidden curriculum" that series of growth tasks presented each person. Some must learn to organize time or finances more efficiently; some must discipline themselves to complete assignments before the last minute because the "last minute" tends to be filled with an unexpected demand; some must learn to stay spiritually centered so that outer confusion does not cause inner confusion; some must release valued friends; some must deal with disappointment; some must cultivate patience with themselves, classmates or UMS and AUC (or all of the foregoing). The tasks differ, but every year MITs learn important lessons during the hectic period. By conference time, all have made progress; the first-year MITs have more confidence in themselves and the second year individuals are ready to drop the "in-training" and become Unity ministers.

At the AUC Ordination Ceremony on the evening of June 14, the AUC Conference body will witness the final step in the process through which the UMS Class of 1982 has moved to answer the call to service in the Unity field movement.

Unity School Promotion and Editorial Department

Charles Roth's imagination and writing skill provide us with an excellent article in May's UNITY Magazine. "Three Magic Words" tells us in symbolism about the curse of the "Reverse Echo" and about the magic words that counteract it.

We are introduced in the article to the daughter of a king who is surrounded by beautiful things, but who is miserable nonetheless. As the story unfolds we learn why she is unhappy.

"The cause of her misery was a curse that an evil witch had placed on her while she was sleeping.

"It was called the curse of the Reverse Echo. It was a frustrating curse, and it went like this:

"Whenever the princess, the little child of the king, would think a good thought, the Reverse Echo curse would echo a contrary thought into her mind.

"For instance, she would think, I am going to knit a sweater for my sister. And the Reverse Echo thought would come back, you can't knit well enough, it will look amateurish; don't make a fool of yourself....

"No matter what good action or positive accomplishment our 'child of a King' tried to do, the curse of the Reverse Echo would contrive obstacles and discouraging circumstances."

The princess's older brother facilitated her exit from this cycle of despair by telling her to use these three magic words-"With God's help!" Before undertaking any task she was to remind herself that she was the child of a King and repeat these words. She uses this information, overcomes the curse, and the evil witch vanishes.

Charles Roth explains the symbols: The king is God and we are all His children. The elder brother is Jesus and the power that enables the princess to overcome the curse is the Christ Spirit. The witch is the programming of the outer world that tells us that we are inferior and helpless and it can come to us, as it came to the princess, while our spiritual nature is "sleeping."


The curse of the Reverse Echo can also be called the curse of mental polarity. Sometimes we get entangled in negative corresponding thoughts when we try to affirm the positive but approach it in a negative way. For example, when we say, "I am going to curb my temper this coming week," we are usually bombarded with troubling events that discourage our good intentions. We become mired in our own version of reverse echo. We can overcome this curse in the same manner as the Princess did--by identifying with our Christ-self and prefacing our heart's desire with the words, "With God's Help!"

This fascinating story can easily be adapted into a youth sermon. Children will be intrigued with the story characters and events and the symbolism is clear and easy to understand. Look for "Three Magic Words" in the May issue of UNITY Magazine.

Group Services Committee

For the past 2½ years your committee has been actively involved in updating and refining our Association's group health and accident coverage. Over the past decade the cost of medical care has had the highest percentage of increase in an individual or family's budget. Your committee has endeavored to keep pace with this rapid change. With the revised coverage and lowered monthly premium that becomes effective May I, 1982, we are confident the cost of our plan has been stabilized so a maximum coverage at reasonable cost is available to our members.

The Group Services Committee is now involved in giving our main attention to the retirement programs now available to our Association members. At this writing Banker's Life, the underwriter of our Tax Deferred Annuity, is updating the program in line with the new tax laws enacted in 1981. The final figures will be presented to the Board of Directors for its approval in June prior to conference.

Our other investment vehicle is known as the Money Purchase Pension Plan (MPPP) which is operated by Wright Investor's Service. This is based on the stock market and is not guaranteed as the Tax Deferred Annuity Plan is. The main difference there is the possibility for greater return on the investment with this plan. We are in close communication with Wright Investors' Service on its performance.

Remember, in addition to the return on these investments these plans meet the requirements of IRS so no income tax is paid on the principle or interest until the retiree begins to collect the benefits on retirement. (Exception: The members own contribution to the MPPP is taxable. The church's 8% contribution is not.)

Effective January 1, 1982, even though you are participating in the TDA and/or MPPP you are now eligible to participate in an Individual Retirement Account at banks, savings and loans, insurance companies, investment houses, etc. Maximum for one year for a working individual is \$2,000.00. Individual and non working spouse \$2,250.00. A very good opportunity for all of us to set aside additional funds not taxed by the IRS until retirement.

As we prepare for our retirement years in advance of need we are in the flow of the prosperity principles all of us Totally Accept Belief (TAB) in.

New Hymnbook

I know everyone in our movement is eagerly awaiting word on our new hymnbook.

Since beginning our preparatory work in 1979, good progress has been made. The process of selecting songs and hymns to be included was completed by our committee in June of '81. Our final task is the review of responsive readings and services which we will complete in June of this year.

The bulk of the hymnbook preparation is now in the hands of Unity School and the Editorial Department. Sharon Patterson, Unity School representative, has obtained copyright clearances for approximately 350 selections and is transposing much of the music to lower keys, as well as indexing and categorizing the titles. This is a big job, and we appreciate her thoroughness and dedication.

As Sharon prepares the selections, they are sent to Lau Music Engravers of Cincinnati, Ohio, who is doing the musical type-setting. We have seen samples of Lau's work and feel it is satisfactory—the print is bold enough and large enough. (Hopefully, we will have samples for review at Conference time.)

Lau's work is expected to take from six to nine months to complete. After that, printing and binding all require an additional six months to a year. Fall of 1983 is the projected target date for availability of our new hymnbook. This gives our Centers adequate time to plan for the purchase of these new hymbooks. Why not set up a fund right now so that you will be able to place your order as soon as the books are available?

Join us in knowing that Divine Light and Love will continue to guide the unfoldment of this project in Divine Order!

POLICY

Policy reads: "The Director of Ministry Services, or his designate, shall be in attendance at all Regional Conferences. The Regions are encouraged to reimburse the AUC for the expenses required of the DMS and the President to attend the Regional Conferences."

Conference 1982 is complete and all is well. In Truth we know the activity of Spirit has once more accomplished its purpose.

Let us be mindful of the words of Paul:

"Forgetting what is behind me, and reaching out for that which lies ahead, I press towards the goal to win the prize which is God's call to the life above, in Christ Jesus."

The forgetting may take many forms, but most importantly, let us rededicate and reconsecrate ourselves to the will and the work of our inner Christ.

Your Board of Trustees has done just this, we have unanimously adopted the following:

"That I, as a board member, am dedicated to establish the Board of Trustees of the AUC as a policy-making body, and allow the Executive Committee to make the pertinent decisions appropriate for the AUC, and that I commit myself to the spirit of a healthy organization in which trust and love are my primary attitudes and for one year our board fully commits itself to learning effective management, employing the services of an executive consultant agency."

Responding to this commitment statement, those members of our Association, present and voting, remanded the disposition of the Unity School proposal to the Executive Committee with the instructions to negotiate the best possible agreement relative to the training of Unity ministers.

We have begun the process and your Executive Committee has met with the Board of Unity School and this meeting was the best we have ever had. I see a harmonious beginning to our discussions. We will be meeting again in September.

Unity School will be continuing the development of a ministerial training program with our input, cooperation and expertise being utilized.

We are seeking and finding points of agreement and I personally feel that we are closer in harmony with the spirit of unity in Unity than ever before.

Unity is you, me, our churches, AUC and Unity School--all parts of one body, committed to one purpose--the sharing of Truth to the world.

The concluding sentence of Jack Barker's message that appears above left a deep impression long after I read it in manuscript. His words are so true, and worth repeating, because sometimes I feel we overlook the significance of the principle they enshrine. He said, "Unity is you, me, our churches, AUC and Unity School--all parts of one body, committed to one purpose--the sharing of Truth to the world."

We all, for all our apparent individuality and separateness, are parts of a whole; and the whole, the sum of our parts, is greater than the total of all our parts when viewed separately.

The bruised and bleeding world needs Unity; suffering mankind aches for what Unity has to offer. Americans need the solace of Silent Unity; they need the listening ear of Unity's prayer room; they need the strength offered by wholesome and inspired reading material; they need the practical help and local availability of dedicated Unity ministers reaching out in worship services, helpful messages, and instruction in Christ-centered living. America needs both Unity School as the heart, and the AUC ministries as the means of reaching people where they are face to face. Yes, America needs Unity. America needs a Unity with a strong central organization and it needs an increasing number of dedicated, well-trained Unity ministers in the field.

Over the years, by trial and error, we have been developing a system of training ministers that has been steadily improved. We have zigged and zagged in our progress, but progress has been there for all to see. Now Unity School has proposed another zig. During recent months, much time and energy has been expended in debating the pros and cons of this zig. Should Unity School resume the primary responsibility for training Unity ministers? Why should the AUC relinquish a task it is performing well? Is this an implied criticism of

present methods? But, after all, as the name suggests, Unity School is concerned with education, and it owns the facilities and the library, so why not? But what about the present faculty, the quality of education and future curriculum? All these are relevant questions, but somehow in seeking answers we must be wary of losing sight of the woods for the trees.

As Jack states, the AUC Executive Committee and the Trustees of Unity School have been meeting in an atmosphere of cordiality and friendliness that far surpasses any previous experience. The two groups are well aware of each other's position. Independently they are seeking ways of bringing those positions into agreement. In September they will meet again to share.

Then the onus will pass to the AUC membership. The probability is that not all of the elements that any one of us would desire to see included may be part of the final package. In the interest of retaining unity in Unity, concessions may be called for. Our overriding concern should be to remain a cohesive whole. Our greatness as a movement will become evident as we, as individuals, are willing to submerge our points of view in the interest of maintaining a united and effective movement. Our ability to become an increasingly effective influence on national thought and behavior depends on our remaining a united movement. Again, in the words of our president, "Unity is you, me, our churches, AUC and Unity School--all parts of one body, committed to one purpose--the sharing of Truth to the world."

Youth Services Report

Maggie Finefrock

In past articles in this column you have read about: 1) how to start a Youth Education department; 2) creating and maintaining your vision for effective youth ministry; 3) the material and human resources available to help you achieve your wildest dreams; 4) how to recruit volunteer teachers and appreciate them; 5) a job description of a YE director, etc. These are key elements in a creative and expanding youth ministry.

One of the most important responsibilities in your Youth Education department is teacher training. Every volunteer deserves to receive training! This often makes the difference between a YE department that is alive, vital, fully staffed, effective and exciting and the department that never quite gets off the ground because teachers are not trained.

In churches where volunteers are not trained, supported, appreciated and evaluated I have observed a lack of motivation, frustration when teachers and students don't feel successful, high turn-over rate of teachers, directors and children and a general lack of the love and sharing that makes ministry with youth so special.

To help you evaluate your current teacher training program or create one, here is a sample outline. This is the teacher training course taught by Betty Fleming, Southeast YE Facilitator and formerly Youth Education Director at Unity of Livonia. Betty is a dynamic and beloved licensed teacher, with many years of experience in Unity and Youth Ministry.

GUIDELINES FOR TEACHER TRAINING PROGRAM by Betty Fleming

All sessions are conducted with a pre-session activity, modeling, demonstrations, and always planned activities to involve the trainee in practicing the ideas presented.

Session I - Philosophy of Youth Ministry and Unity Principles

- 1. Philosophy-Aim of Youth Education program
- 2. Fundamental Truth Principles
- 3. Qualifications for a Youth Education teacher
- 4. Teaching "The Whole Child"-physical, social, mental, emotional, spiritual

Assignment: Observe a Youth Education class on Sunday (be 20 minutes early). Begin a personal study of Lessons In Truth by Dr. Cady. Read Unity and the Bible, a pamphlet by Meyer

Session II - Overview of Y.E. Department

- Share what they observed in Youth Education class last Sunday
- 2. Discuss rewards of teaching
- 3. Explanation of student groupings, curriculum for each grade (published by AUC) Youth Education staff
- 4. Guidelines for leading youth in prayer

Assignment: Observe Sunday Youth Education class, help with pre-session activity planned by

established teacher. Write a step by step

preparation and open prayer for

students (select a grade)

Handout: Guidelines in Leading Prayer-Prayer of

Faith (card)

Session III - Creative Teaching Methods

 After Teacher Trainer has read prayer and given constructive corrections, allow trainee to present their prayer.

2. Conduct a workshop on Teaching Methods, demonstrate

or model:

- A. Importance and use of visual aids (objects, pictures, puppet, puzzles, flip chart, films, tapes, chalkboard, flannel figures, etc.
- B. Storytelling
- C. Creative Ways To Use The Bible
- D. How To Ask Questions
- E. How To Answer Questions
- F. Role-playing
- G. Rediscover the Student Take-Home Sheet
- H. Learning centers

Assignment: Following Sunday the trainee will conduct the pre-session activity, opening prayer and help the teacher in any way possible during class—as planned and cleared by the teacher before hand.

Session IV - Self-esteem of Teacher and Child

- 1. Importance of praise and encouragement
- 2. Pre-session What it is, purpose, ideas for activities
- 3. Discipline (uplifting behavior in class). Present a workshop--"What to do with a student who. . ." (give examples)
- 4. General principles for creating good classroom environment

Assignment: Following Sunday conduct opening and closing prayer, pre-session activity, tell a story as planned by the teacher.

Session V - Creative Planning

- 1. Share experiences and observations about their part in the Sunday teaching hour.
- 2. Explain the assembly time-object
- 3. Explain concepts, objectives, writing a lesson plan
- 4. Explain lesson overview for two year curriculum
- 5. Discuss lesson preparation (Using Teachers' Guide and Student's Take-Home Sheet)
- 6. Creative ways to open your class

Assingment: Give trainee the lesson to be taught 2 or 3 weeks away. Set up meetings on the same evening as you have been meeting or another to personally (on a one-to-one situation) help with the preparation of their lesson (established teacher could con-

duct this). Trainee is to come the next week with some written ideas and plans for the lesson.

Sessions VI & VII - Practice

Individual instruction on planning the lesson. Suggestions on what to do if you have extra time.

Familiarize trainee with location of materials and equipment, procedure of keeping attendance records, if or when there is a prayer time for teachers, date of next teachers' meeting.

ADDITIONAL HELPS

- 1. Meet early the day they teach to make certain the materials needed are there.
- 2. Answer any questions the trainee may have.
- 3. Pray with the trainee. Encourage and bless.
- 4. After class, encourage Trainee to tell you in what areas, if any, they feel they need help.
- 5. Praise and encouragement are essential for the Traince as you review their class hour.
- 6. Make arrangements to meet for the planning of next week's lesson (this could be done over the telephone).
- 7. Follow-up training will occur from week to week as it is called for by the Trainee. Keep in mind that the Trainee is now largely on his own.
- 8. The key to effective Teacher-Training is making oneself completely available to new teachers.
- Equipment for each teacher will include a prepared loose leaf notebook containing AUC material for one quarter or one year or two years, teachers Guide and Take-Home Sheet and a Bible.
- Continue communication, support, appreciation, evaluation regularly and training at monthly teachers' meetings.

1982 AUC Conference Committee Reports

EXPANSION COMMITTEE:

The Expansion Committee met on June 8 and 9 and the following recommendations were made and approved by the AUC Board of Trustees: The Committee reviewed all applications for funding under the Expansion Tithe Program. Funding was to be used for revitalization of old ministries with excellent facilities; study groups with potential for growth ready to assume the responsibilities of a full ministry; and for the growing needs of urban ministries. The Committee felt that the following ministries met the criteria and funds were allotted for a six-month period of time. The churches to be granted funding are: Christ Church Unity, Lincoln, Nebraska, Frank and Louise Munkel, ministers; Unity Church of Denton, Texas, Cheryl Trafton, minister; One in Spirit Unity Center, Canton, Massachusetts, Teresa Lee, minister; Oakland/Berkeley Unity Church, California, Clotia Robinson, minister; Unity of Jupiter, Florida, Bryan Graham, minister; a new Unity center in Washington, D.C., Lafayette Seymour, minister. The Committee requests that any other interested ministry wanting to apply for a funding grant to please do so before the Committee reconvenes the week of January 17-21, 1983. The criteria will be available to you through the AUC office. Other progress to date reported by the committee is as follows: Spring and Summer issues of Helping Hand were completed and mailed to 700 study groups and ministries; 21 new affiliated groups have been established and 21 informal study groups were located. There are 14 study groups within the vicinity of Unity Village, being led by MITs on a weekly basis. Seminars were offered on a regional basis for study groups for the purpose of sharing techniques and ideas. Forty outreach packets were mailed as a result of the announcement in CONTACT.

PROFESSIONAL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM COMMITTEE:

The Professional Enrichment Program Committee recommended that all regional presidents and representatives be sent reminders of procedures for applying for and receiving credit approval for regional professional enrichment classes or workshops held in the region; that an article or questionnaire be placed in CONTACT asking readers to inform the professional enrichment Committee about interesting workshops or seminars which they are aware of that are either conducted by Unity ministers or other qualified experts. The workshops and seminars for post-graduate credit were approved for the 1983 Conference.

LICENSING AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE:

The L & O Committee recommended that they would meet with the graduating MITs in January and again in June prior to final decisions on graduates regarding ordination or licensed minister status. The MITs will not give a talk in June prior to ordination, but will have an evaluation session with them. MITs will be permitted to start placement procedures in April. This has been the practice in the past.

AUC MEDIA COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE:

The Committee reported that a ten-week pilot series of 30-minute programs, based on "The Best Is Yet To Be," has run on cable TV in several areas. Based on this experience, Unity of Maui, Phil and Dorothy Pierson, ministers, are prepared to work with ministries that would like to present this program over local cable television facilities. A twelve-part video tape class series based on "Your Thoughts Can Change Your Life," featuring Donald Curtis, has successfully run in Decatur, Illinois. Copies of this are available on a love offering basis from Unity of Decatur. Contributions on Media Communications have been contributed to the new Ministers' Resource Handbook.

AUC OFFICE EVALUATION COMMITTEE:

The Basic Four System Word Processor has been installed in the AUC office. Additional printer will be needed as soon as possible to utilize the capabilities of the equipment. Full use of this new equipment, along with extra peripherals that will be required, will enable the AUC to provide many new services to our member ministries.

HYMNBOOK COMMITTEE:

The Committee reported that Sharon Patterson had approximately one-half of the 350 selections returned from the engravers ready to be printed. The balance should be completed by Fall. Complete indexing will need to be done before the material can be turned over to editorial for printing and binding. The projected completion time is Fall 1983, though Conference of next year is still a possibility. The price is expected to hold at \$4.95. Responsive readings were submitted and it was suggested that the readings be placed throughout the hymnbook in respective sections, such as twelve powers, candlelighting, etc. Any materials received by August 31 of this year will be considered and appreciated. Please submit this to Marilyn Rieger, chairperson.

EDUCATION LIAISON COMMITTEE:

Education Liaison Committee reported suggestions for establishing a cassette library for AUC and initial investment of up to \$1,200 for the first two years. The Committee reported the level of satisfaction with the ministerial school is very high. Of the MITs answering the recent survey, 98% responded with the statement "in general I am satisfied with my UMS education so far" with either very high or high agreement. There is a feeling of cooperation among members of the Education Council and the Education Liaison Committee, the faculty and the MITs. The Committee wished to commend the faculty for their responsiveness and recommendations made at the result of the meeting with the ministers-in-training.

COUNCIL OF EDUCATION COMMITTEE:

The Committee reported to the Board that UMS school is functioning successfully and suggested an urgency in filling the open faculty position. The new elective program is developing well, classes in electives include Journalism, newsletter workshop, youth education leadership, hospital chaplaincy, music in ministry, and group dynamics. Progress assessment report

of the AUC Urban Ministerial was received from West Side Unity Church of Detroit. Eight graduates of the Urban school will be joining the second-year class of AUC ministers-intraining in July. The Council coordinated the admissions process for new students to the ministerial program. Thirty four were accepted of the ninety six interviewed.

GROUP SERVICES COMMITTEE:

The Groups Services Committee reported that they had been reviewing possible IRA carriers for the purpose of making individual retirement account investment which are tax deductible. They concluded that since there are so many worthy potential plans, each ministry would benefit by going through their own consultants. The Committee investigated professional liability mal-practice insurance. Some states, there may be maintenance of the comman law charitable immunity exclusion from suit rule. The committee recommends that purchase of professional liability insurance be done on an individual basis from local insurance representatives and counselors. The Committee reviewed the MPPP and recommends that we continue with the present program with KC Bank and Trust and Wright Investment Services. We believe that their service over the past ten years is a good or better than any other plans being offered. Eight Unity churches have contracted property and liability coverage with Preferred Risk Mutual Insurance Company. Committee recommends more participation by member churches. The Committee elected to retain AEtna Insurance Program as is, however, to raise the deductible to \$500 to help stabilize costs as recommended by the Group Services Committee. The Committee recommends all AUC employees and covered dependents pay first \$100 of covered medical expenses. Thereafter AUC will pay 80% of covered expenses between \$100 and \$500. This should be made retroactive to May 1, 1982, so benefits remain as before. Victor Rosencrans will be broker and agent for committee programs and appointed him to the Committee as a member. Committee recommends associate ministers working for Unity School to continue with Bankers Life program upon agreement of Unity School. The continuing information series explaining and promoting various aspects of programs will be published in CONTACT magazine in the future. The Committee report was accepted and approved.

FINANCE & BUDGET COMMITTEE:

The Finance and Budget Committee included provisions for an additional faculty member. Income was revised to reflect the percentage of love offerings in 1981–82. A review of the financial reports from May 31, 1982, showed love offerings were in line with the January income projection but fell short of the revised projected income by \$1,500 per month. The amount owed to Expansion Funds for Tithe Transfer at the end of 1981 was totally paid. The Board of Trustees accepted the recommendation of the Finance and Budget to discontinue publication of Circle of Light. The Committee requested a written directive from the Board to each committee chairperson to present an itemized cost analysis for every major project to the Finance and Budget for consideration before obligating

funds. The 1983 Conference cost analysis needs to be available prior to the September meetings of the Executive Committee.

EXCEPTION FOR LICENSING COMMITTEE:

Exception for Licensing Committee recommended Joan McKee and Margaret Pounders to be considered to meet with the Licensing and Ordination Committee.

INTERNATIONAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE:

The International Ministries Committee reported that the Association of Unity Churches will communicate with the Instituto in Puerto Rico by mail in Spanish and express our support for their work, while expressing our decision to discontinue financial support from the headquarters. The Board of the AUC has expressed that the original purposes for the Instituto have been served. They recommended that an Ad-Hoc Committee be formed to develop a plan for an AUC sponsored retreat in Spanish to be held in a location suitable for such a program. A proposal for such a retreat will be prepared and presented to the Board in June 1983. The proposal will be budgeted so that the activity will be self-supporting. The Director of Ministry Services will express to Unity School the AUC recommendation that consideration be given to increasing the number of USRS courses available in Spanish and increase the amount of Unity literature available in Spanish.

LICENSED TEACHER DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE:

The Committee reported that the exact role of a Licensed Teacher varies within each ministry. Licensed teachers serve as a resource person for their ministers in the planning and execution of activities for the betterment of the ministry. Each minister should take time to clarify with the Licensed Teacher their mutual expectations of the teacher's role in that ministry. As church finances permit, licensed teachers should be considered for permanent or part-time employment. They will continue to work to upgrade the education of licensed teachers, with recommended classes for licensed teacher week and correlating and funneling information regarding educational needs of future licensed teacher for input to USRS. The Committee also suggested that there is more work at a regional level with licensed teachers, such as newsletters or other communications, licensed teacher representatives providing aid as requested to teachers, discussion groups of ministers with licensed teachers and special teacher-to-teacher sharing. The Committee will continue to work on a informational booklet to be used in local ministries that explains what a Licensed Teacher is and does, the training and dedication required and explaining the importance of the Licensed Teacher Code of Ethics, and defining his or her relationship with the minister, the Board of Directors, and other key persons in the ministry.

URBAN MINISTERIAL COMMITTEE:

The AUC Urban Ministerial School has completed its first two years and will be sending its first group of students to UMS for their final year of study. Students have participated in many community activities and services, including hospital and prison ministry. It has been a productive year for students and teachers. Students have filled in the pulpit for ministers in Ann Arbor, Lansing, Flint, Jackson, Birmingham, Michigan and Down River.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE:

The Committee reported that all Conference plans for 1982 were finalized and at this time the registration stands at approximately 350 ministers, licensed teachers, and guests. Plans for the 1983 Conference were discussed with Conference speakers to be Charlie and Martha Shedd, who will be doing a "Fun in Marriage" Workshop on June 14 and 15. Some of the books written by the Shedds are Celebration in the Bedroom, and The Stork is Dead. Next year's banquet will be a street dance held in the parking lot across from the Unity Inn, featuring a picnic style dinner with country western dancing following. Any suggestions for next year's Conference will be gladly accepted by the Program Committee.

Mortgage Burning Ceremony

What do you do when you burn the mortgage on the church? "You burn the mortgage and give those attending a memento of the occasion," says Ross Tucker, minister of Unity Church of Decatur, Illinois, who had this experience.

Ross came across some unused "Faith Bonds" which helped raise funds to finish the interior of the sanctuary when Unity Church of Decatur was constructed in 1957. When an anonymous gift was recently given of more than \$2,000 to retire the mortgage, the ceremony was held. The mortgage was burned and the souvenior Faith Bonds were distributed. Ross added that "This doesn't mean we can rest on our laurels. Our Board also has decided that from here on out to use monies previously directed to retiring the mortgage to begin a capital fund where needed improvements can be made on a cash and carry basis, thus avoiding high interest rates and indebtedness."

PERSPECTIVES



It is an unusual day when we do not receive an inquiry from some individual living in a city or town where there is, at present, no Unity center, asking about the possibility of starting a center. This provokes the conflicting emotions of both satisfaction and frustration. We feel satisfaction at the knowledge that more and more people are becoming aware of this healing, harmonizing and prospering ministry that is Unity, yet frustrated that we are unable immediately to satisfy the demand.

Debi Maynard, Outreach Coordinator, sends most of these inquirers information as to how to start a study group, and many new study groups are formed in this way. When the inquirer is situated reasonably close to an existing ministry, the minister is informed. It is those groups that are able to receive the help of a nearby minister that are most likely, one day, to result in the establishment of a new center.

The frequency of these inquiries prompts me to suggest, once again, that ministers and boards of existing Unity churches should aggressively seek opportunities of founding new centers in, and around, their cities. Very few of our larger urban centers can be regarded as being saturated by facilities for obtaining Unity teachings. Most have but one church, and this is convenient for a relatively small proportion of the people.

There is a law of supply and demand. In spiritual matters,

these two factors are equal. But in the slow-moving world of people and material things, there can sometimes be apparent inequality. At this time, seven of the 1982 Ordinands and fifteen experienced ministers without centers are seeking placement. This is a total of twenty-two leaders. Not all of the centers listed month by month in The Minister's Letter are to be considered as available ministries. Some are filled by interim leaders, and others are not able to offer enough to attract a person with normal financial requirements. Thus we would seem to have more trained leaders available than there are suitable slots to place them. Further, in June of 1983, we will be graduating, and ordaining, upwards of 50 new Unity ministers. I cannot conceive that we will be able to absorb that number by the normal attrition of retirement.

At the last Conference, the Board of Trustees acted on the recommendation of the Expansion Committee and allocated \$66,000 to approved developing centers to assist them to becoming completely self-supporting. We suggest that every ministry and board reevaluate their local situation and give consideration to actively engaging in some missionary work by encouraging the formation of groups that one day can develop into new, self-sustaining Unity centers. In this way, the needs of our communities for Truth teachings will be met and our movement will grow.

UMS News & Views

If the size of the UMS student body indicates the future of the Unity field movement, it is one of continued expansion. UMS has the largest enrollment ever. The second-year class reached a total of 51 when the 8 former Urban MITs (who completed the first year program in the Urban Ministerial School in Detroit) joined it. The first year class numbers 31. That means that UMS is now preparing 82 individuals to serve as Unity field ministers.

Of course, not all will serve in the United States. Every year, the call to the Unity ministry is heard by persons beyond its borders. This year, the call was answered by one person in Nigeria and one in British Columbia. The rest of the first-year MITs responded in the following states: California 5; Colorado 4; Florida 1; Idaho 1; Illinois 1; Kansas 1; Missouri 8; Montana 1; New Jersey 1; New York 1; North Carolina 1; Ohio 1; South Carolina 1; Virginia 1; Washington 1.

Although the student body is large, UMS can now accommodate it comfortably. During the summer, a wall was removed to make one large classroom out of the medium-sized and the small one. In addition to more space, there was a bonus of increased flexibility; the new, large classroom has no windows, so the huge second-year class can move into it whenever an instructor needs to show films.

The full-time faculty increased, too, when Thora Hess joined it as Assistant Faculty member. A 1982 ordinand, Thora has a rich background in education to enhance her ability to teach Unity fundamentals and assist in other curriculum areas. Sallye Taylor is also with us, serving part-time this quarter on the communication skills team.

Last school year, the curriculum was expanded by the elective program. Now with expanded space and expanded faculty, UMS can meet the needs of the expanded student body as MITs prepare to meet the needs of the expanding Unity field movement.

YOU Report

Brooks Myers, YOU Coordinator

Before accepting my current job as YOU Coordinator, I served in several churches as a YOU Sponsor. During my years as a Sponsor I was fond of telling people that I was involved with YOU because "young people are the future of the church." I no longer make statements like that. From talking with people inside and outside of Unity who have devoted much of their lives to youth education, I have learned that it is more accurate to say "young people are an important part of the church now!" I have expanded my concept of "church" from a Sunday morning lesson to a community of people dedicated to the journey of spiritual unfoldment. It is a community of all ages and in this community the spiritual development of each individual is equally valid and important.

The "church of the future" notion fails in a number of ways. It encourages a subtle form of discrimination that can influence the allocation of attention and resources given for youth programs.

If the choice is between the church of tomorrow and the church of today, it seems natural to focus on the group we consider to be the current church. Immediate needs usually take priority.

The church of the future notion also fails to recognize that youth need the Truth teaching in their lives just as much as adults. The challenges faced by young people are no less difficult or spiritually demanding than those faced by adults. In fact, the life philosophy decisions made at 13 or 14 probably have a more permanent and powerful force in directing life patterns than decisions made later in life.

Finally, the church of tomorrow idea ignores the fact that young people, not only receive from the church, but also make a great contribution to the church, if we are willing to accept their gifts. Young people bring an innocence, an idealism and an enthusiasm that can teach, serve and enliven a congregation.

In letting go of the "church of the future" idea, I have adopted a wholistic perspective. Wholistic approaches are getting considerable attention these days and I think young people in Unity will benefit as a result.

To me a wholistic approach in ministry means that everyone is included, every need is valued and every person is served. I believe that by adopting this perspective, the sense of spiritual community will be strengthened in our churches and centers and we will see more clearly that all ages are one in a bond of love.

- 17. I can elect to change all thoughts that hurt.
- 18. I am responsible for what I see. I choose the feelings I experience, and I decide upon the goal I would achieve. And everything that seems to happen to me I ask for, and I receive as I have asked.

DAVE SCHUMACHER'S MINISTRY OF LOVE

From the Old Testament of the Holy Bible came a message inspiring to all mankind: "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares."

That thought comes to mind when addressing the prospect of a memorial message for one of Springfield's most beloved citizens--the Rev. David L. Schumacher, who died last Tuesday at the age of 39.

There are literally hundreds of people in Springfield who will swear that "Dave," as he preferred to be called, was indeed an angel--or at least that he served and ministered to them in the fashion which angels are supposed to serve and minister.

Dave Schumacher had the humor of a pixie, the wisdom of Socrates and the patience of Job. He refused to admit to personal defeat and he refused to allow those with whom he came into contact to think of themselves in a negative fashion. He believed in the self-worth of every human being and in the belief that each person has the innate capability of handling every single problem of life that is encountered--if only that individual can be made to "believe."

Dave used these personal characteristics to weld a faithful following at Christ Church Unity, 2214 E. Seminole in Springfield, over a period of 11 years. He was a man of religion for his time. He devoutly believed in the teachings of Jesus, but his religion was the daily application of those teachings. The church has dozens of tapes of his sermons, each filled with Dave's philosophy of religion and life, on file for future reference. He also believed that religion should not be feared, but should be loved, that church should be filled with laughter and bright music, not tears and dirges. Jazz might be included in his services, or popular music might be on the agenda.

But never was a lilting tune or a bit of humor disdainful to the task at hand--using Dave's interpretation of the Gospels to help his friends (not just his congregation, but his friends) through the difficult moments of daily life. And in that latter activity he had no peer.

Dave was a marvel in the pulpit, with his resonant voice and flair for the dramatic. But it was perhaps in personal counsel that he was at his best. Countless hours of countless days his mind and his ear belonged to the member of his flock who was in trouble, a sacrifice shared by his own family with the greatest of grace.

It was his request that he be cremated and that his ashes be cast upon the rose garden at Unity Village, near Lee's Summit. How like him to want his physical remains to be cast in the essence that only a rose can capture, while his deeds and words live on in the hearts of those to whom he ministered so self-lessly.

THE REV. ERNEST C. WILSON

The Rev. Ernest C. Wilson, 86, of 700 E. Eighth St., a prominent Unity minister and a pioneer in religious television programming, died Friday at University Hospital.

Mr. Wilson served the Unity church more than 60 years. He was appointed minister of the Unity Society of Practical Christianity by Charles and Myrtle Fillmore, founders of the church, in 1934.

In 1938 Mr. Wilson founded the Christ Church Unity in Los Angeles. Under his guidance it became one of the largest Unity churches in the world, attaining a membership of 8,500. In 1965 he returned to Kansas City to again become senior minister of the society.

Mr. Wilson was considered a pioneer in religious television for his daily appearances on a Los Angeles television station, culminating in weekly network appearances on Betty White's NBC television show. Before that he had several syndicated radio programs.

Mr. Wilson also originated Unity's Christmas Candlelighting and Easter Flower services.

He wrote 17 books, including The Emerging Self and The Great Physician, which introduced his Master Class lessons in 1932.

Mr. Wilson was editor-in-chief of Unity Publications from 1930 until 1938.

He was ordained in 1918 and also had been minister of the Cleveland Unity Center and was graduated from the Unity School of Christianity.

- 2. You wish to cancel your insurance policy. Please remember, you must send written notice to the AUC office, stating the effective date you wish the cancellation.
- 3. You change marital status (such as single to family)-send written notice stating wedding/divorce date, name and birthdate of additional person to be covered or dropped on policy. Also, any change in beneficiary on the life insurance policy.
- 4. You have any questions or complaints--please ask or let them be known to me. If I don't hear anything, I can't help correct complaints or answer questions.

ALSO REMEMBER THAT:

- 1. At age 65, the policy rate is lowered once you have medicare. Send in the effective date of your medicare
- 2. At age 70, the policy rate is lowered. The Life insurance policy automatically drops from \$10,000 to \$5,000.



As I sign the letters of acknowledgement that go out in respect of every gift, I experience a warm glow of thankfulness for you. As I sign the checks amounting to between \$40,000 and \$50,000 a month, I think of you again. You make it possible! These payments go to emerging groups as expansion grants, to our Emeriti, to Uncle Sam for postage, to various printers and suppliers, to staff for salaries, to Ma Bell for telephone, to Unity School for rent and services, among many other recipients.

While on the subject of center and individual giving to Unity, it seems to be timely that we should remind all concerned that the Association of Unity Churches and the Unity School of Christianity are two quite separate and distinct corporate entities. Each has its own bank accounts and accounting systems. It is, therefore, important that all checks should be correctly drawn for whichever organization is intended. With surprising frequency we receive checks from centers in an AUC address reply envelope, yet the check is made payable to Unity School. This, we cannot cash; but it is sent to Unity School. If we can satisfy the School by referring to a cover letter, that the sum was intended for AUC the School will remit the sum to the AUC. Otherwise, the money remains with the School.

Sometimes the reverse is the case, and Silent Unity or Unity School may receive a check payable to Unity that the correspondence reveals is truly intended for the AUC. In such a case, the school will send us a draft. In all circumstances, efforts are made to insure the wishes of the sender are observed. Fortunately, we enjoy a fine, harmonious relationship with the School and problems seldom arise. All of the officials are most cooperative. However, this is a time-consuming procedure

often involving further correspondence or additional expenditure on long distance telephone calls.

Further, we learn from an occasional conversation that there exists a wide-spread belief that the AUC in some way benefits financially from gifts to Unity School! This is not so. No part of any gift or legacy to Unity School ever finds its way to the AUC. It does not "filter down" benefits to the AUC. Perhaps this should be pointed out to center congregations. If your members desire to assist the ministry in the field through the AUC, bequests should be clearly so specified by being directed: "The Association of Unity Churches, a not for profit corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the state of Georgia, with headquarters at Unity Village, Missouri."

UMS News & Views

Last November in this column, I shared my feeling that Unity Ministerial School is indeed a ministry. Now, nearly one year later, I am even more convinced that teaching in UMS is a valid and fulfilling ministerial position.

I continue to specialize in Biblical Studies, teaching both historical and interpretative classes. I also assist in other class offerings. Actually, I have quite enough to stimulate me, thank you. So why in the hallowed name of peace of mind, have I decided to tackle Center Operations in UMS as well?

The UMS program is, I believe, the finest ever offered. Yet, Center Operations has not received the same consistent attention as other areas of study. I feel I have been called! During my last Christmas season as a Unity field minister I had a vision as it were, that I realized could greatly ease ministerial stress and fatigue, and at the same time, increase the quality of ministry to the congregation. It would seem to me that a significant number of well-intentioned ministers each year manifest health challenges, personal and family challenges. Many ministers are obviously suffering from stress reactions. Loving ministers who are honestly trying very hard to succeed are actually struggling, primarily for want of intelligent organization, planning, goals and measurable objectives. For the most part, such symptoms need not manifest and can quite easily be altogether avoided! I had little time to begin to implement the vision in my field ministry or when I began to teach in UMS. Last month, I was reminded of my as yet unfulfilled vision. I feel that sharing this new approach to ministry with the MITs could well be my greatest gift to this, my present ministry.

My goal is simple: to help MITs avoid at least a few of the common errors made by field ministers who are just learning on the job, and at the same time to provide Unity ministry in general with a tool for improving service and promoting more rapid growth. I am being inspired to teach MITs how to create a master-ministerial game plan, which I have entitled: "The Minister's Master Manual for Magnificent Ministering." I would like to enlist the help and input of my fellow ministers in this endeavor. Please contact me and share your ideas and techniques that could be shared with our future peers to better prepare them for happy and effective ministering in the field. If you would like to be considered for a seminar presentation on some phase of center growth and service, let me know.

The Unity Field Movement is all of us helping each other to help others in their own spiritual unfoldment. The blessings we share with our ministers-in-training will soon multiply throughout our Unity Movement.

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

During the next few months, we will be featuring an article on the Association of Unity Churches' Money Purchase Pension Plan. We hope that the information provided in this regular column will bring a more complete understanding of the provisions of the Plan.

The various aspects of the Plan which we will attempt to cover include:

- 1. Requirements for Eligibility;
- 2. Requirements of Contributions;
- 3. Procedures for Making Contributions;
- 4. What Vesting Is and How It Is Determined;
- 5. Termination Procedures and Payouts;
- 6. Investment of the Plan's Assets; and
- 7. What the Function of the Trustee Is.

If you should have any questions regarding the Plan, send them in writing to Peggy Gray at the AUC. Through this article, we will attempt to answer all of your written questions.

As you read this feature every month, keep in mind that we are only providing you with an explanation of the Plan's provisions. The actual Plan document, the Trustee Agreement, is the controlling authority.

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications This month: "The Marilyn Ferguson Talks at Detroit Unity"

Marilyn Ferguson's innovative, futuristic work, The Aquarian Conspiracy, is capturing attention and interest of groups who embrace its visionary, New Age ideas. In this set of two entertaining and informative cassette tapes, Marilyn Ferguson shares her observations that:

- Society's old ways are not working. "If what you are doing is wrong, doing more of it isn't going to help."
- The transformation of society, like the transformation of individuals, comes from within and is the result of a paradigm change (a fundamental change in thought-patterns held by a society at an unconscious level).
- People need to cooperate, communicate, form self-help networks, and share strategies (conspire) on a grass-roots level to effect social change.

Marilyn Ferguson's detractors believe that she and other New Age thinkers are engaged in a revolution-from-without global plot. Suspicion and mistrust arise because of the inability of those within the old paradigm to understand the

language and intention of those within the new. They perceive the changes in society as threatening. She believes that basic social change will occur as an increasing number of people awaken to the new paradigms, and as these inspired individuals find one another, thus joining the power of their new ideas.

She sees her mission as one that seeks to awaken others to their power in effecting change. She believes, "We have an endless capacity to keep transforming" and, "Stress is the agent of our transformation just as problem-finding is the agent of our creative breakthrough. Changes can and will take place as we let go of ego defensiveness, as we stop fearing change by understanding that paradigm shifts are the norm, by assuming responsibility for change on a personal and community level, and by nurturing this change in others."

She points out that beneficial changes are occurring in education and in science, that they now manifest through environmental associations, spiritually-oriented groups, barter societies, holistic health centers, and in limited ways are seen in curriculum changes in medical schools, in military philosophy, and in industry.

Change is uncomfortable but necessary, she believes. Fear of change is the most formidable obstacle to change. The need to "feel safe" by embracing the values that the culture has given us is the strongest inhibiting factor. "The only real safety," she says, "is knowing that there isn't any."

She urges us to start the process of change in our own small way. Another kind of world is possible. "Get the word out... Communicate your ideas.... It doesn't take very many people to make a revolution." As we share new ideas, old ideas will not continue to dominate the culture and a new age will be ushered in through the people. She believes that now is the time to begin.

This series of thought-provoking cassettes is rich in material for talks, classes, and for personal growth. Listening to these tapes is an easy way to acquire more knowledge about a subject that has stirred great interest in many communities.

Your church should be thoroughly inspected at least twice a year, with routine repair and maintenance performed as needed.

Why not start a church safety committee or add the subject of safety to the church board agenda? The more people who become aware and involved, the more effective your program will be. It's easy to start a safety program, and it benefits everyone in your church—from the youngest member to the eldest.

GROUP SERVICES COMMITTEE NEWS

For one year now your Association has been offering all AUC member churches planned protection multi-peril coverage for church buildings, equipment, supplies and buses (if any). This program was instituted to make it possible for all our churches to have the latest coverages with reduced premiums due to the mass marketing approach.

To participate in a real reduction in premium the \$300,000 annual premiums must be generated in total by all participating churches. At present those churches who are participating have only generated approximately \$25,000 in premium.

Preferred Risk Mutual Insurance Company of Des Moines, Iowa, is underwriting this program. This is a company that was organized primarily with the intent of insuring religious organizations. It is one of the major underwriters of church coverages in this country.

Preferred Risk insures the building contents and fixtures for "Named Peril & All Risk" coverages. It also includes in the one policy, "Bodily Injury & Property Damage Liability" for the limits you desire. Designated medical coverages for each

person are also included in this package. Volunteer workers are included. Additional coverages are: newly acquired property, glass breakage, valuable papers and records, extra expense (payment of rents at another location during repairs), outdoor signs, products liability (someone becomes ill from eating at a church dinner, etc.), inflation protection, blanket bond. The list goes on.

By this time ministers in the field will have received the letter from Jack Barker, AUC President, in which he outlined the agreement reached between the AUC and Unity School of Christianity on the matter of the training of Unity ministers. This agreement contains a number of important modifications of the draft proposal presented by the task force comprised of representatives of both AUC and Unity School.

Probably the most significant of these is one that offers promise of an even more improved ministerial school and the production of even better prepared ordinands. It is the retention by the AUC of the teaching role in field matters.

We, in the AUC, are justly proud of our Unity Ministerial School that has continued to develop and improve over the years. UMS has produced and continues to turn out highly-dedicated and spiritually-oriented ministers. The emphasis has rightly been placed on Unity's unique spiritual teachings and philosophy, on a proper understanding of the Bible and of the very special role of Jesus Christ and on affirmative prayer and meditation. These, with effective speech techniques, have been given major attention.

Stress laid on these most necessary spiritual elements of a minister's preparation has had the effect of de-emphasizing some very important practical, even mundane, factors that are none-the-less essential in the preparation of an effective minister who is going to administer the affairs of a Unity center or church in these modern times.

According to our agreement, responsibility for teaching all the spiritual and theological studies falls into the purview of Unity School. Relieved now of any responsibility in those areas, the AUC is now able to concentrate the full attention of its faculty members on those studies which deal with the essential, practical side of running a church. These will include: center operations, accounting, reading a cash statement, recording offerings, ministerial writing--such as letters of acknowledgement, preparation of church bulletins, service sheets, press releases and the like, leadership training, youth ministry, library management, special services, management skills, employment evaluation and some communication skills. Our faculty member, or members, will be encouraged to take professional courses to enable them to maintain and improve

their special knowledge in these areas.

My first year as Director of Ministry Services has taught me that many ministers are woefully unprepared in some of the foregoing and other very practical matters of center organization. Under the agreement, the teaching of these special studies will be our sole responsibility. We should be able to send our ministers into the field better equipped than ever before.

Yuk" stickers, available free from the Red Cross,
will help discourage even toddlers from poisonous
substances. Keep the number of your local hospital
or Poison Control Center handy.

YOUTH EDUCATION IDEAS...

Monthly Newsletter—Why not send a monthly or bimonthly newsletter to parents of the people in your Y.E. Department. Featured could be a personal note about Y.E. events. Consider highlighting one age level in each letter—physical, educational, spiritual, and social characteristics. The newsletter could list the topics kids are studying in Y.E. along with Bible reading or WonderWord for the whole family, and perhaps a project that would tie in with the Y.E. theme. Include items of news about the Y.E. pupils and teachers.

Skill: Your PA System-

Now is the time to think about the areas where your teachers should be developing skills. You need to have a good PA system. No. That's not a public address system. It is the plan ahead system. People follow leaders who know where they are going.

Make your plans well ahead of time. Let your teachers know what you are doing and why. It's fall. You should be starting on your winter and spring plans now. What spiritual discipline will you stress?



We're Glad You're Born!-

Sponsor a monthly birthday recognition to which parents of the birthday children are invited-perhaps on the last Sunday of each month. Give a birthday card to each child signed by everyone in the Y.E. class. You should offer prayer for each child.

Advertisement Idea—Have your students put advertisements about the Sunday school into heliumfilled balloons. On the ads encourage people to come to your center and share where they found the balloons—or at least call to tell how far the balloon went.

Report on this fun activity in front of the whole church. Any unusual activity that also has an outreach attached to it will tell the whole church that important things are happening in the Y.E. program.

Give a talk or sermonette to the entire congregation at one Sunday morning service. The talk could center around the importance of teaching children and adults the Truths of God.

News About MPPP*

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

I. Eligibility

- Q: Who is eligible to participate in the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan?
- A: You may be eligible to participate in the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan (the "Plan") if you meet certain eligibility, age and service requirements. To meet the eligibility requirement, you must either be (1) an employee of the Association of Unity Churches, Inc., (the "Association") or (2) an employee of a member church of the Association (a "Member") that has signed the Joinder Agreement agreeing to adopt this Plan or (3) appear in the Association's records as either a licensed teacher or an ordained minister and are employed by the Association or any Member who has signed the Joinder Agreement.
- Q: If I meet the eligibility requirements, when will I become a participant in the Plan?
- A: If you meet the eligibility requirements defined (above) or (in the first article), you will become a participant in the Plan on the first day of the month coincident with or immediately following the later of: (1) the date you complete one year of service; or (2) attain age 25; and you must consent in writing to make the required contributions.

A Year of Service is defined as a 12 month period in which you work at least 1,000 hours for the Association, for any Member Church or for the Unity School of Christianity. The 12 month period begins on your first day of employment.

As an example, if you begin work on February 15, 1982 and work 1,000 hours from February 15, 1982 to February 14, 1983, you will be able to enter the Plan on March 1, 1983 if (1) you are at least 25 years of age; (2) you consent in writing to the required contributions; and (3) you meet the eligibility requirement defined (in the first paragraph) or (in the first article). If you have not reached age 25 when you complete one Year of Service, then you will be eligible to become a Participant on the first day of the month immediately following your 25th birthday.

- Q: How is my eligibility in the Plan affected if I terminate my employment but later return?
- A: If you terminate employment either (1) after becoming a Participant in the Plan or (2) after satisfying the Plan's service and age conditions but before actually becoming a Participant in the Plan and later return to employment with the Association or to a Member Church that has signed the Joinder Agreement, you will become a Participant immediately upon your re-employment. If you terminate employment before satisfying an eligibility

condition and later return to employment, you must satisfy the eligibility condition(s) before you can be eligibile to participate in the Plan.

On July 9, 1982, Dr. Ernest C. Wilson made his transition. It was a peaceful passing. He was sitting upright, his hands folded, his eyes closed, a slight smile on his face. No pain, no discomfort as he slipped out of his earthly vehicle. It was as he had wished.

We will dearly miss this saintly man. To each of us he had special meaning. He held a small corner of our heart. Over the years we grew to know him, either personally or through his many books and articles. He was always a ready listener, eager to help, eager to serve. To know him was most certainly to love him, and this love we have for him will never cease just because he is lost to our vision. He resides within us.

Dr. Wilson served the UNITY church more than 60 years. He was appointed minister of the Unity Society of Practical Christianity by Charles and Myrtle Fillmore, founders of the the church, in 1934. In 1938 Dr. Wilson founded the Christ Church Unity in Los Angeles. Under his guidance it became one of the largest UNITY churches in the world, attaining a membership of 8500. In 1965 he returned to Kansas City to again become senior minister of the Society.

Dr. Wilson was considered a pioneer in religious television, culminating in weekly network appearances on Betty White's NBC television show. Before that he had several syndicated radio programs.

Dr. Wilson also originated Unity's Christmas Candlelighting and Easter Flower services. He was responsible for Unity work starting in London and Honolulu. He had the largest Youth ministry ever in Unity. He coached a Unity basketball team and with great success. He lectured worldwide drawing thousands.

He wrote 17 books and many, many poems and articles. He introduced his Master Class Lessons in 1932. Dr. Wilson was editor-in-chief of UNITY Publications from 1930 until 1938.

As a personal friend Dr. Wilson had no equal. He spent the last seven Christmases with Ron and me. These times together will be forever cherished.

So we say goodbye to our friend. God speed, dear Ernest. We know he has happily entered a brand new phase of new life. He is one step closer to man's eternal quest. And he is content.

The Ministerial School absorbs approximately one third of the income, staff and energy of the AUC Headquarter's operation. However, this does not mean that we will suddenly have all of these potential resources available for redirection. Our taking responsibility for the appointment of a full-time Director of Education and a Chairman of Ministry Studies implies that we will be retaining an important role and influence in ministerial education. Obviously, we will thus continue to have a significant financial obligation in this area.

The AUC is a unique combination of a federation of churches and centers on the one hand and a ministers' professional association on the other. The AUC is indispensable to the field movement, both to ministries and to ministers. Without the Association, both ministries and ministers would be immeasurably weakened. For these reasons it behooves us to take a good look at ourselves and examine both our direction and methods and to reveiw our priorities.

Clearly, essential to our organization is the maintenance and growth of our field movement. It has been said that the AUC is "maintenance oriented." But this is not necessarily a bad thing. With some 396 active ministries and 412 active ministers listed in the new Yearbook, maintenance must be important. We are a support organization and our purpose is to provide both ministries and ministers with supplies, services and assistance. These include ordination, licensing, placement service, liaison assistance, organizational communications (CONTACT, AGAPE, reSPONSE, HELPING HAND), materials (Youth Education and YAU teaching outlines, Sunday service bulletins, etc.), health and hospitalization insurance and pension plans, and more. We will shortly be inviting your individual comments on our existing services and asking for your suggestions for additional ways in which we can serve you and also your input as to any which you may think are unnecessary.

The growth of the field movement is largely in your hands. We are constantly receiving inquiries from people who are hungry to have Unity's healing, prospering and freeing messages brought to their towns. We offer advice and help in the formation of study groups. Always, we inform inquirers of their closest Unity minister. But progress is slow for those groups that are not aided by a nearby Unity center. We suggest that ministers and boards deliberately seek opportunities to establish new centers to better serve students in their own localities. The Expansion Committee has this year given great impetus to this effort.

A further need, and perhaps our most important need, is to provide an annual Conference that will be a time of true spiritual retreat and refreshment and be free from contention and controversy. Like those who have preceded him, this year's President, Jack Barker, earnestly desires such a conference. Perhaps we shall see this in 1983, Truly it is up to you, the ministers who attend. As a scarred "conference floor fighter" of some experience I know the temptations. Who knows whether 300-400 Unity ministers and teachers coming together next June peaceably and lovingly determined to obtain unity within Unity at all costs will not prove to be the greatest force for both the maintenance and expansion of the Unity movement.

Let us link our consciousness in prayer and hold a high vision of Spirit at work, building and expanding our AUC into the most dynamic and creative service organization ever.

Letter To The Editor . . .

Something that has always concerned me as a member of AUC is the method by which we, as an organization, select our leadership. I'm not referring to offices such as President or Vice-President, but to the procedure by which we elect individuals to the Board of Trustees.

It has been my observation that our National Youth of Unity take far greater care in electing leadership than our own AUC. The YOU has each candidate for office stand before the entire body and individually express why they want to serve, what strengths they see themselves as having, what they feel they have to offer to make YOU better, and what they have already been involved in within the organization to display their level of commitment. After each person has had their chance to speak, they open it up to questions that may be asked specifically of each candidate. In this way, although you may not personally know any of the candidates, you have enough information to make an intelligent vote.

The voting that goes on in AUC can only be based on popularity, sexism and other inappropriate factors, and how can we fault anyone for this when no information is provided for one to make an intelligent vote?

In light of the controversial issue at hand this past June, it would have been most appropriate to ask candidates questions relating to their views and how each felt AUC might insure, preserve, and strengthen its voice in the future of the Unity movement.

Clearly decisions that the members of the Board face continue to grow in magnitude and importance concerning the very life and existence of AUC. Serving on the Board is a tremendous responsibility to represent the ministers and ministries of the AUC. Surely, when selecting candidates for positions of such importance, it would be most appropriate to provide a means for each nominee to briefly address the conference body followed by a question and answer period. Thus far we have had no possible way of determining one's qualifications over another, let alone their opinions, views, and ideas about relevant matters. We should be embarrassed as an organization to have been blind to this oversight for so long.

Perhaps there was a time when the AUC was much smaller and it was assumed that everyone knew each other sufficiently. However, this has not been the case for some time.

In closing, I wish to reiterate that the issue of this article is not to in any way question the qualifications of those now serving on the Board, but to address the issue of the method by which we elect individuals to that Board of Trustees.

Certainly, great improvements can be made whereby those voting will have the information to vote intelligently on the most qualified and capable to carry the responsibilities of the position that concerns an Association important to us all.

GOOD NEWS! The Association of Unity Churches is now an official endorsing agent for ordained Unity ministers who are graduates of Unity Ministerial School to serve as chaplains in the armed forces of the United States. Although the present membership of Unity churches entitles the AUC to only one chaplain, as the official membership increases another chaplain may be added.

Since UMS is not accredited, before the AUC can endorse a UMS graduate, its program has to be approved by an accredited theological school. That has also been achieved. The AUC has on file a copy of a letter of approval from the academic dean of a nearby theological school which is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools and the North Central Association of Schools and Colleges. His letter states that the total number of hours and spread of the curriculum of UMS is the equivalent of what his institution requires for the Master of Divinity degree.

The new status for the AUC and the approval of the UMS program culminate efforts dating back to 1972. Thanks are due to Phil White and all others who contributed to the mound of papers pertaining to the efforts to give ordained Unity ministers the opportunity to help the men and women of the armed forces of the United States. Particular thanks go to Sonja Creech, a 1982 ordinand. She pored over all the past work, utilized her life-long knowledge of military rules and regulations, personally consulted armed forces chaplains, and saw that not a jot nor title was omitted from the AUC application.

As anyone acquainted with military organizations realizes it will be some time before the first ordained Unity minister actually serves as a chaplain in the armed forces. Nonetheless, the knowledge that it is just a matter of time is GOOD NEWS.

YOU/YAU Reports

Some Youth of Unity groups enjoy a steady influx of younger members, while other groups experience large fluctuation in membership. Sponsors I have talked with point to continuity between the Uniteens program (junior high) and the YOU program as one important factor in keeping our younger teenagers involved in Unity.

The importance of linking Uniteens and YOU seems logical and obvious, but often special attention is not given to helping the junior high students find their way into the YOU program. Improved continuity has been achieved in some centers because the minister (in meeting with the Youth Education Director and YOU Sponsor) has stressed the importance of easing the transition between Uniteens and YOU, and has encouraged the YE Director and YOU Sponsor to cooperate in developing innovative activities to help keep our junior high students interested. It is appropriate that ministers set this as a priority since in most centers the minister supervises both the YE Director and the YOU Sponsor.

The Seattle Unity Church has established a special graduation dinner in May to honor graduating Seniors and welcome junior high students who are entering, or soon will be entering, YOU. Uniteens, YOUers and parents are invited to attend this evening program. The event recognizes the accomplishments of graduating Seniors, and all the students, while allowing the Senior to express what they gained from YOU. It provides an opportunity for the junior highers to get to know some of the YOUers and allows for the Uniteens to build some positive anticipation for YOU. The evening also provides a chance for the parents in the church to meet and support one another.

Another approach is to encourage the YOU Sponsor and YOU officers to occasionally plan a social or service event which includes the Uniteens. While there are many important reasons for the groups to meet separately, many of the benefits mentioned above can come from having joint projects.

Other centers have promoted continuity by occasionally holding a morning and afternoon program called the Uniteens' Fun Day. The Uniteen teacher, the YOU Sponsor and the YOU officers facilitate a Saturday of singing, new games, prayer, meditation and Truth workshops for the Uniteens. The day allows the Uniteens to get to know some YOUers and develop some feeling for what a YOU rally is like. The 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. time span makes the program relatively easy to develop and is more suitable for the maturity and attention span of Junior Highers.

Young people begin to make some of their most crucial and fundamental life choices at the age of 12 and 13. They start deciding questions like, "Do I really believe in God?"; "Is the church a place I would go out of my own free choice?"; "What is the purpose of my life?". Because junior highers are less verbal and more reserved around adults, it is easy to overlook their needs. By giving a little special attention to helping them feel comfortable about making the transition into YOU, we can ensure they have access to Unity's powerful message throughout their teenage years.



UNITY IN THE COMMUNITY

Marilyn Rieger, co-minister of Unity Center of Independence, Missouri, has found community involvement to be an expanding part of her ministry. During the summer months she participated in a task force of community leaders organized by Independence Mayor Barbara Potts to establish a shelter for battered women and their children.

LIGHT ON THE PATH

Since the Post-Graduate week for licensed teachers is coming up soon, we thought it would be good to re-print the article from Unity Education Newsletter with details:

"An exciting program is being planned for the Annual Licensed Teacher Post-Graduate Week which will be held at Unity Village from February 26 through March 4, 1983. Focusing on a theme "New Thought Writers," the major sessions of the week will explore the works of such greats as Emma Curtis Hopkins, Thomas Troward, Annie Rix Militz, and Ralph Waldo Trine. Those who attend will be helped to see how these writings can enrich them as individuals and as teachers. A special feature will be a visit from one of our current New Thought Writers. This will include a lecture and an autograph party. There will be plenty of opportunity to share ideas, to pray and sing, and to enjoy each other's company. Put the dates on your calendar now. Registration materials will be mailed to all Licensed Teachers before Christmas."

This week will be a special opportunity for licensed teachers to earn Post-Graduate credits. After you are licensed as a teacher, you have the responsibility to earn at least 10 Post-Graduate credits within every three-year period. These are recorded by AUC and listed on the back of your annual associate membership card. The form for active license renewal is mailed to you in the late summer. Have the form signed by your minister and mailed back to AUC. Post-Graduate credits may also be earned at the annual AUC and Regional Conferences. These credits and membership renewal must be maintained if you wish to lead classes for credit in the Unity School for Religious Studies Extension Program, and to be considered an active licensed teacher.

Hospitalization and Medical Insurance

The recent increase in the monthly premiums for our AEtna Medical and Hospitalization Insurance has prompted some ministers and board members to ask how good is our plan. The plan is a comprehensive one and compares very favorably with other group plans.

THE PLAN IN BRIEF: This is a Major-Medical and Hospitalization Insurance. All office calls to doctors and physicians, all hospital charges, doctors, surgeons, anesthetists, rooms, and prescriptions are included, also Chiropractic treatment. (Note: Optometry and Acupuncture are not covered.)

PURPOSE OF PLAN: At the outset we should understand the purpose of the plan. It is designed to protect the individual or the family from financial disaster in the event of major illness or surgery. It is not the purpose of the plan to reimburse you for every visit to a doctor's office. For this reason there is a \$500.00 deductible.

HOW THE DEDUCTIBLE WORKS: The deductible is applied to each individual. Every individual must have paid out \$500.00 before the company pays anything. After the deductible the company pays 80% and the individual pays 20% of all charges until the amount paid by the individual reaches \$1,500.00. At this point AEtna starts paying 100% of all charges.

FAMILY DEDUCTIBLE: For the family policy (two or more persons) the deductible is \$1,000.00. The individual pays the first \$500.00 for the first family member to be ill, after which AEtna starts paying 80% and the individual pays 20%. The individual then pays the first \$500.00 for the second family member to be sick (AEtna usually breaks this second \$500.00 deductible among the remaining family members covered.) After this when 20% of expenses incurred to each family member reaches \$1,000 AEtna starts paying 100% of all remaining charges.

REACHING THE DEDUCTIBLE: For the purpose of the deductible only, it is good to keep account and receipts of all medical charges however small even though these may not amount to \$500.00. These can then be forwarded as evidence that the deductible has been reached when making a claim for treatment which is over \$500.00.

HOW TO CLAIM: Claim forms and mailing envelopes can be obtained from the Insurance Department at the AUC office. On completion, all claims should be sent directly to: AEtna Claims Office, P.O. Box 6610, Leawood, Kansas 66206.

DENTAL WORK: Dental work is covered, but there is an individual deductible of \$50.00 and family deductible of \$100.00. The deductible works similarly as with the medical coverage, after which AEtna pays 80% of check-ups (two per year) cleanings (two per year) X-rays, fillings, and other regular dental work. It pays 50% for crowns, inlays, dentures, bridges, etc. However, AEtna will only pay up to a limit of \$750.00 per individual per year on dental work.

LIFE INSURANCE: There is a life insurance policy of \$10,000.00 for the individual, payable to the beneficiary named. After the age 70 the life insurance drops to \$5.000.00 for the individual.

some statistics: Of almost 400 ministers in the field, currently 182 are covered by our insurance plan. This is 14% fewer than were covered before the last rate increase went into effect. Of this total, 75% of churches are paying the premiums for the ministers; 15% of the ministers are paying the premiums themselves and the remaining 10% is being shared between the minister and the church.

ALTERNATIVE PLANS: Your Group Services Committee has examined the possibility of finding other insurance carriers. One factor emerges clearly, that we, the members of our group, ultimately determine the cost of our insurance. Group insurance rates are not arbitrarily set by the company, but are based on the actual experience of our own group. Two different professional groups insured by the same company may have widely differing rates because of the difference in claims. The simple fact is that over recent years our insurance carriers have not regarded our account as being a profitable one.

CHEAPER PREMIUMS? We would all like to reduce the cost of this insurance and one way to do this is to remain faithful to the group and above all stay healthy. It is now possible for center employees to be included under this plan. If your church's full-time employees are not already covered by the AUC's group plan, it is suggested that you consider including them. Hopefully, by broadening the base of our membership less expensive premiums will result.



News About MPPP*

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

How is the contribution to the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan (the "Plan") determined?

Under the Plan's contribution formula, there are three sources of contributions. They are as follows:

- A. Mandatory Employer Contribution;
- B. Mandatory Employee Contribution; and
- C. Voluntary Employee Contribution.

For purposes of this article, Employer means the Association of Unity Churches, Inc., and member churches of the Association who have signed the Joinder Agreement agreeing to adopt the Plan.

A. Mandatory Employer Contribution: According to the contribution requirements of the Plan, the Employer has a fixed obligation to contribute eight percent of a participant's compensation on a quarterly basis. The Employer has the responsibility of determining the amount of contribution to be made by it to the Trust.

The term compensation shall mean the total amount of all payments made by the Employer to a Participant for service rendered. In addition, compensation shall include, in the case of a minister covered by the Plan, the rental value of a home furnished to the minister as part of his compensation. It shall also include the housing or rental allowance paid to a minister covered under the Plan, to the extent it is used by the minister to rent or provide a home.

When the contributions are received by the Trust, the amount of the Employer's contributions are credited to each participant's individual account.

B. Mandatory Employee Contribution: The Plan requires each Participant to make a contribution to the Trust in an amount equal to three percent of the Participant's compensation. Compensation means the same as defined in Section A above. This contribution must be made on a quarterly basis. Any participant who does not make his/her required contribution for a Plan Year shall not receive an Employer contribution allocation to his account for that Plan Year. A Plan Year is the period from January 1 through December 31. Also, a participant can be terminated from the Plan for failure to make a required contribution. Such termination would occur within sixty days following receipt of a delinquency notice.

Each Participant's contribution is credited to an individual account under his/her name. This account is maintained to reflect the accrued benefit derived from a Participant's own required contribution.

C. Voluntary Employee Contribution: In addition to the required contributions made by the Employer and Employee, the Plan permits each participant to make a voluntary contribution to the Trust Fund. In general, the total amount of

a Participant's voluntary contribution may not exceed ten percent of his/her compensation.

A participant is always 100 percent vested in the amount of his/her contribution -- whether it is voluntary or required.
