Many of us have used the familiar illustration of a coin being held so close to the eye that it prevents the viewer from seeing anything else--so close in fact that the view of the coin itself is both distorted and imperfect. The transfer of primary responsibility for the training of ministers from the AUC to Unity School would seem to have become such a hindrance to the clear vision of a few ministers.

Let us gain a truer perspective. Unity is a developing, unfolding movement; it is a dynamic and changing organism. From an inspired thought that became the life-changing experience of a previously ailing woman, has grown a movement that has influenced for the better hundreds of thousands of individuals. What started as a couple praying with a few neighbors has evolved into a great prayer group daily assisting thousands, a publishing house circulating literature to the millions, a school training ministers and teachers, and an ordained clergy serving 400 widely scattered congregations of truth seekers. This is Unity.

Those of us who are involved in the day-to-day business of running the organization in any of its many facets know that for convenience some of these tasks are undertaken by the Unity School of Christianity and others are the responsibility of the Association of Unity Churches. But they are all aspects of Unity. It is true these two organizations are separate corporations, but in origin, philosophy, "doctrine" and ultimate goals, we are one. Together we comprise the Unity movement.

For most of Unity's life as an institution Unity School undertook the training and ordination of ministers. In 1968 there began the gradual transfer of these responsibilities to AUC. This was an internal transfer--there was no manifest difference to the observer on the outside or to the truth student in the field. Ordinands were trained at Unity School and that was all that mattered, by whom was not important. Now, Unity School which owns the campus, classroom space and library has stated its intention of once again starting a ministerial school.

The issue that needs to be squarely faced is whether the AUC is to feel threatened and become defensive, or whether on the other hand the AUC can feel secure as a part of Unity

and allow Unity School to resume a responsibility for which it is admirably equipped.

Of our about 400 active ministers in the field at this time, about 160, or 40%, were wholly trained and ordained by Unity School; about 120 or 30% were wholly trained and ordained by the AUC; while the remaining about 120, or 30%. were trained by the joint faculties of Unity School and AUC, but ordained by AUC. These figures do not purport to be accurate, indeed neither the figures nor the ratios are important in themselves. What does seem to be significant is that I am not aware of any ordained Unity minister who has made much of his/her being the product of either system. Is anyone of us aware of any advantage or disadvantage of being trained under one method over the other? We are Unity ministers, making the most of the best that the system at any given time had to offer. Under either system, our ministerial candidates will continue to be instructed by ordained Unity ministers.

The suggestion has been advanced that AUC should develop its own ministerial training program, independent of USRS, building on its experience with the Urban program in Detroit. This is, of course, a possibility, but has the disadvantage of being a duplication of effort. What really would be gained? Unity School has produced eminently successful ministers in the past, and will do so again. Given the alternatives of attending school at Unity Village with all its atmosphere, associations, consciousness and tradition, or a school at some other site, presumably most candidates would prefer to come to the Village. Would the AUC's school be left with rejects? It also seems a little lame to suggest "that graduates of the AUC's Urban program may elect to take an additional year of study at USRS." This implies that the author of that suggestion is himself conscious of some inadequacies or lack of attractiveness of an Urban program totally conducted away from Unity Village.

The Board of Trustees did not elect to follow this option, preferring to throw its weight in the direction of maintaining a unified Unity.

When we meet during Conference in June, possibly some effort will be made to reverse the direction being pursued by the Board and the Executive Committee, however, it is hoped a greater sense of responsibility will prevail. For the AUC to attempt to develop a ministerial school separate from USRS will be to advertise disunity and lack of trust in Unity School. I believe very few members of center and church boards and congregations will be able to fully appreciate the rationale for such actions. As they see it, Unity School is the home of Unity and they will have problems with understanding why Unity's School at Unity Village should no longer be deemed to be a suitable place for training ministers.

Despite some criticism to the contrary, the AUC Board of Trustees has acted responsibly and maturely in not reacting to seemingly facile alternatives. The Board is deserving of the support of all who truly desire for us to remain strong and united. To take any other course will threaten to splinter our movement.

Letter to the Editor.



The following excerpts were taken from a letter received from Jim Lewis, minister of Unity Church of Denver, Colorado

"I suppose I am one of those who have contributed to the rising health insurance rates with AEtna. However, I still feel that we in AUC with our AEtna Health Insurance Plan have an excellent program...

"My brother-in-law was visiting from California during the Thanksgiving Holidays and he was amazed at the rates we had in AEtna. He has AEtna in California and the individual rate is over \$160.00 a month.

"Now that Church employees can come under the AUC plan, we have canceled Blue Cross and gone with AEtna. It only costs \$9.00 a month more per person, and the coverage is much better with AEtna. I might add that the Church pays the full amount for our employees. I can't imagine any church not paying the full insurance coverage for the minister. I would encourage all Board Members who may read this to give careful consideration to this and if their church is not paying the full insurance coverage for the minister, please do it. I was sorry to see that some 14% dropped out of the AEtna plan when the rates were raised. The Church could absorb this increase and it would keep all our ministers in the AEtna Plan and help to reduce our rates.

"Need I remind our members about the 100% coverage? Twenty percent (20%) adds up to quite an amount when there are high hospital bills and surgeon bills. Under our plan AEtna pays 100% after the low initial deduction has been paid by the individual. AEtna also has the dental coverage which our Blue Cross did not have. It also has the \$10,000.00 life insurance policy.

"We have an excellent group plan in AUC with AEtna. I would pray that the ministers who left will come back and join us and I would pray that all churches pay the premiums for their ministers."

HAS News & Views

And he called the twelve together and gave them power and authority...And they departed and went through the villages preaching the gospel and healing everywhere. (Luke 9:1, 6)

Following the example of the twelve, the members of the Class of 1983 are preparing to go out to tell the Good News.

Last year Charles Caldwell, an MIT spouse, hung in the UMS hall a map marked with every center and study group in the United States. The class has responded by indicating a desire to go to every region and specifically to 16 states and Washington, D.C. Some are also interested in Australia, Canada, Caribbean Islands, Israel and South Africa.

A recent survey reflected the MITs response to the discussions with visiting "pioneering" ministers: 44 are willing to start a new ministry; while 29 are willing to go to an existing study group, 14 are willing but feel that the study group must be "willing to grow." In the first-year class 26 out of 29 are willing to pioneer a new ministry.

Twenty-five preferred to be in or near a medium to large city. Some prefer to be "near an active military base" and "near ocean and trees." To seven people, the "locale is of least importance."

A willingness to serve as an associate minister was indicated by 22. They placed emphasis on 24 areas including teaching classes, youth work, counseling, AA counseling, music, Bible interpretation and a "wholistic" approach to "family ministry."

They recognized 39 specific skills formerly pursued and now relevant to their ministry. Some skills were teaching, business management and organizational skills, backgrounds in science, biofeedback, newspaper columnist, radio and TV, electronics, chaplaincy, PR...the list goes on and on.

Reflecting on the activity of Spirit in their lives which brought to them these varied skills, I am filled with awe and I feel our movement is enriched.

The question naturally arises as to how our movement can best assist them in their futures. The most obvious is funding. Forty-one (41) acknowledged financial assistance would be helpful or a necessity; their estimates range from \$1600/month for 6 months to \$125,000 for a ministry in Israel. Students' ideas of how the AUC, Unity School and the regions could be of help will be the subject of our column in the next issue.

A challenge has been given to us all. We can allow this new energy to gradually dissipate against the rocks of apathy and procrastination. Or we can creatively inject this new energy into our total work.

There is a work for every one who will listen and obey the Spirit. (JCH 114)

At the beginning of each year, the Association will send to each participant of the Plan Quarterly Contribution Records. The following is an example of the Contribution Record:

This Contribution Record should be properly completed by each participant and sent to the Trustee in a timely manner. It is important to each participant and to the Trustee to appropriately fill out each Record so that the Trustee can credit each participant's account appropriately. Each participant should clearly print his/her name, address and the name of his/her employer. Also, it is very important that the amount next to the Employer Contribution, Employee Contribution and Voluntary Contribution lines be correct. At the quarter's end (March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31), the Contribution Record, along with the check, should be sent to the Trustee. The name and address of the Trustee is Kansas City Bank & Trust Company, Trust Department, 1801 Main Street, P.O. Box 266, Kansas City, Missouri 64141.

Getting the Contribution Record to the Trustee as close as possible to quarter end is important. Late payments of contributions, especially at the end of the Plan Year, can delay the valuation of the Plan. This delay will prevent the Trustee from closing the records for the year and will postpone the receipt of a Trustee Certificate.

Unity Armed Forces Chaplaincy



A dream of the Association of Unity Churches is now a reality. The AUC is the first New Thought religious organization recognized to provide Chaplains into the Armed Forces.

On Friday, January 7, 1983, the Reverend Sonja Creech, ordained in June, 1982, was commissioned a reserve officer on active duty into the United States Army. Lieutenant Colonel Riley Allen, also ordained as a Unity minister in June, 1982, conducted the ceremony in which First Lieutenant Sonja Creech took her oath of office.

Currently Sonja is attending a six week basic officers course for chaplains at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. Following her training, Sonja will be stationed in Fort Jackson, South Carolina.

As many of you are aware, the Association of Unity Churches has for years worked toward approval of a chaplaincy program in the Armed Forces, and we rejoice that this dream is now a reality. At the present time due to the size of our organization, we are eligible for providing only one chaplain into the Armed Forces. However, we look forward to the time when we will have a Chaplain in every branch of the military.

Youth Services Report

In March the Regional Youth Education Facilitators and Regional Youth of Unity Coordinators will come together to evaluate our current youth program and plan for the year ahead.

Last year was the first time these two groups have met as one and the results were so beneficial we decided to continue the approach. We expect the March gathering will be a time of mutual support, meaningful sharing and creative problemsolving.

The discussions last March highlighted our Uniteens (Jr. High) program as one area that needs special attention.

My article last month on uniting YOU and Uniteens was one of many steps the Youth Services Department has taken to strengthen the position of Uniteens in our overall ministry to youth.

This month, as a part of this same emphasis, our Youth Education Coordinator, Ron Tyson, is sharing the results of his recent study of the area of Jr. High ministry.

UNITEENS IN FOCUS

When I was a child, I used to speak as a child, think as a child, reason as a child; when I became a man, I did away with childish things. (1. Cor. 13:11)

Uniteens are young adolescent seventh or eighth graders between the ages of twelve and thirteen. They are probably the most misunderstood age group in our churches. They are not children, yet at the same time, they are not adults. They are too young for this or too old for that. They may vacillate from giggly children one minute to serious young teenagers the next.

They are experiencing a highly accelerated physical and mental growth during this period. They tend to be self conscious, lacking in confidence, and are physically and socially awkward. They are overly conscious of their appearance and desirous of peer acceptance. This is the age of self discovery when they tend to ask the questions: "Who am I? Where do I fit in? and What is my relation to God?"

It is at this age that young teens privately work out their own set of values and beliefs. They have been told that God answers prayers, yet sometimes their prayers are not answered in the way they think they should. They ask the question: "If God is all good, why are people starving, and why is there so much poverty and war on earth today?" Why? Why? Why?

Eric Erikson, author of <u>Identity</u>, <u>Youth and Crisis</u>, writes: "It is not until adolescence that the individual begins to see himself as having a past and a future that are exclusively his. Adolescence is thus a pivotal time when the individual seeks his distinctive identity. This search consists of a conscious sense of personal uniqueness, a subconscious striving for continuity of experience and solidarity with group ideals."

The Uniteen program covers a span of two years and serves as a bridge by which the young adolescent moves from child to teenager. Many times we find there are only a small number of young people of this age in our church, therefore, we may feel tempted to either place them with younger children or the YOU. In either case, it is not in the best interest of the early adolescent. There are exceptions to every rule, I am sure, but in most cases the junior higher will become bored and stifled when placed with younger children, and self conscious and experience feelings of inadequacy when placed with the YOUers.

Meeting the needs of the early adolescent is so imperative I feel we need to make every effort to embrace the Uniteen program even if it begins as one on one.

During my recent research on the Uniteen, I met with a young teacher in one of our local centers who started off three months ago with only one student. At present, there are an average of ten to twelve Uniteens in attendance each Sunday. Another Uniteen leader in California reports doubling his attendance shortly after speaking the word in the form of an affirmation to draw more adolescents of this age to the group.

What are some of the needs of this vital age? How can we help to fill those needs?

Recent studies show that communications is one of the main frustrations facing the Uniteen. "I can't talk to my parents, they don't understand. My brother is too young, what would he know? I really can't express to my friends, they might think I'm weird." We need uniteen teachers who can identify at their level of understanding, discuss things as equals, and make a conscious effort to bridge the communication gap by finding common denominators for stimulating discussion.

Many Uniteens have voiced the desire to see their groups expand and to have more activities. One way to increase enthusiasm, participation and class size is through well-planned activities and service projects. Let's face it, the kids go where the action is! Activities can be very meaningful in the growth and development of the Uniteen. When activities are recreational or service project oriented they tend to be more successful than if they are socially structured.

This provides an opportunity for the junior highers to comfortably communicate with their older peers and helps the Uniteens to make the transition into YOU. At the same time the individuality of the two groups is preserved. Recreational or service activities can occasionally be planned as joint projects involving both Uniteens and YOU.

Wayne Rice, in his book, <u>Junior High Ministry</u>, offers these suggestions for joint service projects: "Rake and Run, or Snow and Blow." This is a great way to involve Uniteens and YOUers in service to others. Communities with lots of trees and heavy snow provide the opportunity for these groups to work together just in the name of the Spirit of Christ. Arm each student with a rake or snow shovel, go up and down a neighborhood street or to the homes of members of the church. Everyone rakes or shovels together and the job is done in no time.

This age group is very eager to help in any way they can. This is when they truly get into the understanding that the gift is in the giving. Many of your centers can provide opportunities for them to be of useful service by simply stating a need for service or volunteer work.

These two years of transition can be very rewarding, not only to the Uniteen, but to the entire church. Let us be sure to recognize them as individuals seeking to express their "I AM" nature, unfolding to their greatest potential in the name of Love.



Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications

January: A book preview—Spiritual Economics—the prosperity process by Eric Butterworth

When Eric Butterworth writes a book it is news. This timely book is good news for Truth students because it addresses an issue that is foremost in many minds--prosperity. Spiritual Economics--the prosperity process, which will be available from Unity Books in March, concerns the spiritual basis for prosperity and contains very practical suggestions for individuals to use to achieve lasting prosperity.

Eric Butterworth emphasizes that readers cannot get prosperity from this book or any other but can grow into an awareness of the process needed to achieve it. "Prosperity comes from consciousness which unfolds from within. You will be amazed at the wonderful things that will begin to unfold for you as you develop a more positive image of yourself, and as you recenter your faith in the all-accomplishing power of the divine process within you."

He believes that lack and limitation, whether manifesting in ourselves or in our global economy, result from belief systems. "Even as most physical ills are now considered to be psychosomatic in origin, so we must begin to face the possibility that financial problems may be the outer manifestation of inner states of consciousness." His book helps us to understand some problems common to this age and gives suggestions for working through them from the vantage point of Truth teachings.

Practical advice for change is offered in the chapters, "Work and the Success Syndrome" and "How to Reverse Financial Adversity." Other chapters focus on building faith, giving thanks, the nature of security, the benefits of giving, and the history and essence of tithing, to cite just a few.

In his visionary final chapter, "A New World Order," he offers observations on how a new consciousness of prosperity and plenty can influence the world in which we live. He explores the rippling effect that can prompt a needed upward spiral.

His parting words challenge us to take hold of the idea of the omnipresence of substance and form it through our faith to help bring about the kingdom of God--the new age.

Consider this book for a study class. It has a wondrous array of ideas and illustrations for sermons and talks, ample material for counselors, and it can provide stimulating, well-timed reading material for personal growth. Look for Spiritual Economics—the prosperity process in March.

February: Margaret Pounder's "Love's Equilateral Triangle," an article in UNITY Magazine.

Imagine an equilateral triangle. Construct one side of love for God, another of love for yourself, and a third of love for your neighbor. With these three sides in balance, suggests Margaret Pounders in her article, "Love's Equilateral Triangle," this triangle of love is a sound structure. She proposes that this balanced equilateral triangle provides us with a model for our lives that is based upon the instructions of the first two commandments:

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

She believes that any impairment or blockage on any side of the triangle weakens the structure's integrity. Imbalance or unevenness, when manifested in our lives, can cause instability and throw our relationships out of harmony. She writes, "We must have equal love and regard for God, for others, and for ourselves. Otherwise, the delicate balance of our equilibrium is overturned, resulting in disharmony in our lives."

Margaret Pounders, co-minister of Unity Way Church, Dallas, Texas, says that the commandments to love are just that--they are not mere suggestions or recommendations for getting along with others. "Jesus did not say," she writes, "Now folks, you really ought to love God," or, 'Won't you just try and see if you can't find something to love in your neighbor?' Nor did he in any way imply that we should place ourselves last in this celestial love affair."

Her insights provide us with many good ideas on achieving balance and expressing our potential as spiritual beings--a harmony that when attained assures us happiness and inner peace.

Her quote from an anonymous source sums up her ideas about being loving: "Be a spendthrift in love! Love is the one treasure that multiplies by division; it is the one gift that grows bigger the more you take from it. It is the one business in which it pays to be an absolute spendthrift. Give it away; throw it away, splash it over; empty your pockets, shake the basket; turn the glass upside down and tomorrow you will have more than ever."

Margaret Pounders' ideas and suggestions from this article can be especially useful in counseling situations. Her equilateral triangle of love and other symbols provide practical illustrations for talks, too. Look for "Love's Equilateral Triangle" in the February issue of UNITY Magazine.

Ministers will already have received a letter from Jack Barker, President of the AUC, dated January 24, informing them of the approval by the Board of Trustees of the agreement reached between the AUC and Unity School. We confidently anticipate ratification by the Conference Body of this action in June.

It has been intimated to me that some persons were hesitant to apply for the two AUC positions in the Ministerial Education Program pending approval of the agreement by the Board. Now that this has been accomplished the Board has decided to invite additional applications. The posts are Director of Education and Chairman of the Department of Ministry Studies and Skills.

These are important positions and they offer unusual opportunities for the persons selected to make invaluable contributions to Unity's ongoing. The Director of Education will serve on the Ministerial Education Council, having direct input into the training of ministers. However, he/she will also have responsibility for the AUC's expanded education department including licensed teachers, post-graduate and field education programs, as well as overseeing the existing Youth Education and YOU directors.

Chairmen of the Department of Ministry Studies and Skills will develop the USRS studies curriculum embracing the major aspects of the practical side of field ministry including church management, leadership, records, planning, personnel management, special services, publications, professional relationships, ethics, etc.

It is emphasized that salaries are negotiable depending on ministerial and academic qualifications and experience. If you are qualified and interested do not hesitate to apply as the following salaries are base figures only. They will be within the range based on a minimum of \$2,500.00 a month for the Director of Education and a minimum of \$1,500.00 a month for the Chairman of the Department of Ministry Studies and Skills.

Benefits will include health insurance with major medical and dental, \$10,000.00 life insurance, pension plan (Banker's

Life or MPPP), paid vacations and holidays, Unity Inn discount, manse allowance and moving expenses.

We envision these as being long-term appointments, to be filled by ministers with at least five years successful center ministry and who are willing to further their education, if necessary, and to deepen their knowledge of modern management and business methods. Also to be willing to acquaint themselves with the wide variety of systems at present used in Unity centers. These are developing positions and provisional job descriptions are available on request. Applications should be sent to the Director of Ministry Services by April 15. Applications should include a detailed resume of Unity background and field experience, previous occupations and professional record, education and degrees earned with a covering letter stating the position desired and your reasons for believing you should be selected for that position.

Youth Services News

Brooks Myers

Many Youth Education Directors and YOU Sponsors have high praise for the support they receive from their ministers and congregations. These ministers and congregations have placed a priority on ministering to the spiritual needs of children and teenagers and their commitment is reflected in their actions. The ministers in these churches know that serving the community means serving all aspects of the community including families and children. Ministerial support is vital if Youth Education activities are to flourish.

Support for Youth Education is being expressed in a variety of ways; in decisions about facility design or acquisition, in the relationship between the minister and the Youth Education Director, ministerial involvement in youth activities, and the allocation of church finances and other resources.

For example, when Unity Truth Center in Santa Rosa, California, decided to move to larger facilities, a major motivation was to provide adequate space for Y.E. growth. Unity Center—Bakersfield, California, recently spruced up the interior of their center and one of the first areas they recarpeted and painted was the youth area.

The Youth Education Director at Unity of Livonia, Michigan, has easy and frequent access to the minister. Accessibility and periodic contact allows the minister, Gene Sorensen, to acknowledge accomplishments, clearly express expectations, share ideas, provide encouragement and assure the director that he will back her up in carrying out her responsibilities. Similiarly the YOU sponsors in Livonia have regular contact with Gene and receive encouragement and direction.

Ministers are also showing support for youth through direct participation in youth programs and activities. At Unity of Spokane, Washington, the first service has a family orientation. All the children enter the sanctuary near the beginning of the service and assemble at the front. The minister, David McClure, gives a three to five minute Truth lesson for the children, often using an object lesson to illustrate the message. In addition, David meets with the Spokane Youth of Unity on Wednesday evenings thirty minutes before the class.

The ministers in the Northwest region as a group are very active in the Youth of Unity on a regional basis as well as in their centers. Frequently the host minister for a Northwest YOU Rally attends all the Friday and Saturday Rally activities and typically the workshop leaders for rallies and retreats are Unity ministers from the area.

More and more ministries are recognizing that funding for youth education needs to be predictable. When the center has a budget for youth education, the director can effectively plan YE department activities in advance and members are more willing to teach, knowing they won't have to make out-of-the-pocket expenditures in order to have necessary teaching materials.

Unity Truth Center in Denver, Colorado; Unity Church of Dallas, Texas; and Unity on the Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri, are among the numerous centers that have paid YE directors and have a budget for Youth Education materials and supplies. At Unity on the Plaza, all love offerings from Sunday morning classes and half of the love offerings from classes led by the ministers during the week go to youth education.

Because of supportive ministries like the ones mentioned, Youth Education is a strong and developing part of the Unity movement. The ministries and ministers mentioned are only a few of the many who are promoting youth education by devoting time, attention and resources to activities for children and their families. Support takes many forms but all are appreciated. Those who work in youth education and Youth of Unity, giving tremendous contributions of time and creativity, give thanks for the ministers and ministries who stand behind them and enthusiastically enable them to provide a firm foundation in Truth for our children and youth.

UMS News & Views

Last month this column discussed the first half of a questionnaire in which 44 out of 51 second-year ministerial students indicated a willingness to pioneer a new ministry. Pioneering is a popular topic over coffee at the Snack Bar!

This month the focus is on ideas which the students have shared.

The second half of the questionnaire was devoted to the question, "Other than funding how could the AUC, USC or the Regions assist a pioneering ministry?"

The primary emphasis was on support, spiritual, moral and especially prayer support.-Silent Unity.

Students feel the need for more ministers to speak on pioneering in center operation classes and at Conference and

- 1. a How-To Manual containing lists of what to do, ideas on timing, how to locate population information, etc.;
- an experienced minister hired to VISIT new and smaller ministries, to be a counselor, a sounding board, an advisor, a brother/sister support, a liaison to AUC;
- 3. a source for "teaching aids, relevant publications, articles, book reports, condensations and synthesis." A sharing of other minister's ideas and programs that are working;
- 4. a clearinghouse for dial-a-blessings tapes, especially for children;
- attractive preprinted mailings for invitations and announcements;
- 6. information about other New Thought ministries in area or city;
- 7. pooling of information about equipment to purchase ("why keep inventing the wheel?"); in the regions an equipment pool and perhaps buying in large quantities;
- suggested expansion plans for regions since they have the general information about new areas opening in existing cities and local customs and cultures;
- advertising-national ads, tapes of THE WORD for radio spots, the use of DAILY WORD in newspapers, especially small community newspapers.

Strong feelings were expressed about the need for more unity and less fear of competition among Unity churches in any area. "The Kansas City area, for example, has demonstrated the willingness to have and realizes the need for a number of Unity churches in a metropolitan area. Similar concentrations of Unity churches throughout the country would more than triple the number of Unity centers!"

They believe the AUC would benefit by eliminating dissipation of energy needed for expansion and becoming "a more coherent body willing to face and make difficult choices."

Let's get serious about outreach, growth and expansion. We have the message that people want and need and the fields are already white for harvest. (John 4:35) Let's get out and give it to them.

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications
This Month: "Billy and the Worry Bug" by Sandra Canfield
in WEE WISDOM'S March issue.

An active imagination can be a blessing. It can enrich our lives. Imagination is an attribute of God; it is the formative power of thought and the molding power of the mind.

A misuse of imagination can cause us to worry. Little Billy in "Billy and the Worry Bug," has a lively, overactive imagination. When his schoolteacher, Mrs. Gray, gives him a note to take home to his mother, his power of imagination brings all kinds of worry-thoughts into focus in his mind.

When Billy learns that Mrs. Gray has requested a conference with his mother, he is so worried that he does not want to eat or play with his friends. As the worry bug nibbles and nibbles, Billy feels worse and worse.

In reality Billy had nothing to worry about; his teacher called the meeting to suggest that Billy be allowed special art lessons as a creative outlet for his preoccupation with sketching in class. Billy learns through experience that he can choose not to worry; rather, he can act out of higher consciousness.

This is an excellent teaching story. It can illustrate the power of the use and misuse of imagination in a series on the twelve powers geared for a child's understanding.

A valuable adjunct to his story would be an exercise suggested on the inside cover of Youth Education's AGAPE, the Winter 1982—1983 edition. In this play activity, children list their worries on a worry-ghost character that looks like the video character in the Pac-Man game. The worries are gobbled up by the circular Pac-Man figure, a fitting end to a worry ghost or worry bug.

Literature Starter Kits were approved for Unity Church of Maui, Hawaii, Mary Stovin, minister; Unity Center of Truth, Washington, D.C.; and Unity Church of Christianity, Bronx, New York.

The Committee requests any ministry interested in applying for a funding grant to please contact **Debi Maynard**, AUC, for further information. *The criteria must be received in final form to the AUC office before June 1, 1983*. Only those ministries following the prescribed guidelines set up by the AUC Board of Trustees will be evaluated during the June meetings.

AUC MEDIA COMMUNICATIONS DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE—The Association of Unity Churches Media Communications Development Committee met at Unity Village January 17—20, 1983. Applications for the media communications grant, graciously donated by Mr. John Templeton, Nassau, Bahamas, were reviewed at that time. The task of selecting only one ministry from the 41 applications required many hours of prayer work and study by the committee.

The grant was awarded to the Unity Center for Growth, Omaha, Nebraska, Colleen Lehnus, minister. The Unity Center for Growth will receive \$1,000 per month for the next ten months. At that time another AUC affiliated member church will be selected for the grant. This grant is to continue until ten Unity centers have been aided.

We congratulate the Unity Center for Growth and anxiously await the sharing of their progress in media communications during the June Conference.

Our blessings go out to Mr. John Templeton for this generous way of helping to spread the Unity message.

We, as licensed teachers, are truly "blessed...to be a blessing," as was Abraham so long ago. We have earned the privilege to serve God in whatever way is most helpful to our ministers and our ministries, however and wherever it may be, always under the minister's direction.

All of us want to be even better prepared, constantly growing in skills, knowledge and the consciousness of Love. We learn from our ministers, from our students and try to make use of every opportunity--the Licensed Teacher Post-Graduate Week, the regional conferences, the June Conference seminars, including sharing times, all offer aids to us. (*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

WHAT VESTING IS AND HOW IT IS DETERMINED:

- Q. If I am vested in the Association of Unity Churches Pension Plan, what does it mean?
- A. The word vested means accrued, not subject to any conditions that could take away, full right. Therefore, if you are 100 percent vested in the Plan, it means that you have a full right to your benefit.
- O. How do I become vested?
- A. You are always 100 percent vested in the amount you voluntarily contribute to the Plan. Also, you are always 100 percent vested in the amount you are required to contribute. Any amount you roll over to this Plan is also 100 percent vested at all times.

Your interest in the contributions the Employer makes to the Plan for your benefit becomes 100 percent vested upon your attaining the Plan's normal retirement age of 65 or if you terminate employment because of death or disability. If you terminate employment prior to normal retirement age or for any reason other than death or disability, then your interest in the contributions the Employer makes to the Plan for your benefit becomes vested in accordance with the following schedule:

Year of Service	Nonforfeitable Percentage	
Less than 2 years	-0-	
2 years or more	100%	

A year of service is defined as a Plan Year (January 1 through December 31) in which you work at least 1,000 hours for the Association, for any member church regardless of whether the member church has joined the Plan or for the Unity School of Christianity.

If you terminate employment before your interest in the Employer's contribution becomes 100 percent vested, you will forfeit the nonvested portion of your interest. A termination of employment does not include a transfer of employment from one employer or another employer, who has adopted the Plan, if the transfer occurs within 120 days.

In January of this year, the Internal Revenue Service announced a change in policy that can prove costly to ministers of religion when figuring their income tax for the year 1983 and in the future. However, this change does not affect the return for 1982 which is due by April 15 of this year.

The IRS has issued Rev.Rul.83—3 which eliminates what has been regarded by some as a double tax break for clergymen who are house-owners. Prior to this change ministers were able to deduct on Schedule A Line 12, real estate taxes, and on Line 16 a & b home mortgage interest expense paid to institutions and individuals for their residence even though they were receiving a tax-exempt manse or housing allowance as part of their salary package from their church. This change will go into effect at the conclusion of the minister's current contract year, but no later than June 30, 1983.

This administrative ruling does not affect ministers who are occupying parsonages, condominiums or other quarters provided by the church. Some such ministers also receive a tax-free housing allowance which may cover utilities, furnishings and any other expenses not paid by the church but which are incurred in the provision of a home. Such ministers must of course be able to justify all the amount received as tax-free housing-allowance in the event of an audit. Any sum received as housing allowance in excess of the amount actually expended for that purpose must be included as taxable income.

This change, Rev.Rul.83-3, could result in a significant increase in the amount a minister pays in Federal or state income taxes. Depending on the amount actually paid in real estate taxes, and on the interest component of mortgages, some ministers may find their real income can be slashed by from \$1,000 to \$3,000 a year!

The so-called double tax break was the result of an IRS ruling in 1962. At that time there was a general recognition that clergy salaries were relatively low considering the professional training and status that members of the cloth occupied. Conditions have improved some over the years, but the median salary of full-time ministers is still relatively low.

However, the political climate has since changed. There have been attacks on what some have regarded as an unduly privileged position occupied by churches generally in view of the constitutional need to respect separation of church and state. Some have regarded the ruling of 1962 as conferring an unfair advantage on the clergy, one not enjoyed by any other section of the population.

The new ruling is an administrative one, and could be cancelled out by Congress if sufficient opposition could be mounted. However the mood of the times is to eliminate what appear to be tax loopholes and inequities in the tax structure. The ruling is generally in line with the desires of Congress, which seems to be seeking new sources of revenue, and also can be seen as part of an effort to hold down future deficits.

No estimate has been published of the aggregate amount of new income that the IRS expects to generate from this source. It is not expected to be a large sum; nevertheless, the impact on individual ministers will probably be painful.

Fortunately most Boards of Unity churches are very sensitive to the needs of their minister. They have a loving and earnest desire to ensure that the minister is adequately compensated. A minister who is burdened with anxiety about his personal finance is unable to give his best to meeting the needs of his church.

Many church Boards will realize that if the minister is buying his own home, that the salary package at present granted to the minister may no longer be sufficient. It is a real possibility that this new regulation may result in a serious diminution of the minister's real income. Boards who appreciate their minister's efforts and who have the long-term interests of their congregation at heart will want to make some adjustment in the salary structure and ensure that he continues to be adequately compensated.

UAS News & Views

Every year as ordination time approaches, we hear the same question: "How are all those new ministers going to find ministries?" And every year, every ordinand who really wants placement is called to fill a vacant pulpit. Though in recent years, a few ordinands have elected to pioneer, right now, with graduation and ordination still months away, the interest in pioneering has so pervaded the UMS Class of 1983 that the nouns in the usual question have changed places in my mind. I wonder, "How are all those ministries going to find new ministers?"

As the two recent columns by Thora Hess revealed, the Class of 1983 wants the Unity field movement to expand, and almost half of the 51 prospective new ministers are willing to do what needs to be done to expand it. Since the first thing they need to do is to acquire information, we at UMS have been providing all we can. Recently, Jim Rosemergy and Pauline Beauregard helped by sharing their first-hand knowledge with them. MIT Janet Hankins summarized her experience in Excelsior Springs for them and presented the guidelines worked out by the AUC Expansion Committee. In addition, they will receive more information in courses offered in the final quarter, for what is needed for effective administration of an existing church is also needed for pioneering.

However, the MITs seriously contemplating pioneering have already done exploratory work. They have gathered specific information on the areas in which they are interested and by the time they receive permission to send out their resumes, they will be ready to act at once on what they have discovered.

Believing firmly in the spiritual law that supply always meets demand, I am confident that vacant ministries will find right ministers. Having witnessed what prayer and pertinacity accomplished for U.S. Army Chaplain Sonja Creech, I am also confident that many of this year's crop of new Unity ministers will answer the recurring question, "How are all those new ministers going to find ministries?" with an excusable pun. Their answer will be, "We'll found them."

This Month: "Three Days in Jerusalem" by James Dillet Freeman in April's UNITY Magazine

The extraordinary story-telling talent of James Dillet Freeman focuses in this issue on a tale of Jesus' boyhood. The result is a remarkable and enjoyable story, "Three Days in Jerusalem."

The Bible hints that the three days Jesus remained in Jerusalem without his parents after the Passover Feast was a pivotal period in his life. This imaginative, coming-of-age narrative recreates this formative time, as it may well have been, from Jesus' point of view.

Through the eyes of the young Jesus we visit the Temple, talk with the priests, and explore the city. Jerusalem was a large, cosmopolitan city. A pre-adolescent boy could have wandered into many quarters of it and would have seen many wonders, including market places with wares unknown or rarely seen in Nazareth. Jerusalem represented a cross-section of the diverse population of the Roman Empire and was quite unfamiliar to a boy raised in the more homogeneous society of a small, provincial town.

If we let our imaginations soar we can imagine how Jesus could have felt if he had seen Herod the King, witnessed the whipping of a slave, and conversed with a leper, as the story indicates he could have. Perhaps he said, as James Freeman imagines, "Suddenly, here in Jerusalem, I was faced with questions I had never before asked myself."

Whatever happened in Jerusalem seems to have centered Jesus' attention on the reality of a good and loving God. Perhaps it was in Jerusalem, as the story suggests, that Jesus first foresaw the image of a world of beauty, order, and love that he later taught.

What really happened in those three days is unrecorded. James Freeman's story, however, is beautiful, fascinating, and plausible. Read it for your enjoyment, enlightenment, and edification. Call attention to it in your centers—it seems particularly appropriate for pre-teen and teenage groups to discuss in Youth Education classes.

Utilizing Public Service Time

The major religious seasons of the year (Easter and Christmas) are opportune times to utilize public service time on radio and TV. This year Unity Church of Joplin initiated and participated in a joint venture with the Joplin Ministerial Alliance. Six area ministers (including Unity) each recorded a 30-second spot at a local TV station. The text of the Unity spot follows:

There's a saying, "Home is where the heart is." As we approach the season of Easter, invite someone you know to visit your church home. Whatever your faith, think for a moment of your friends and acquaintances who have never been asked to enjoy that experience with you. Why not ask them to be your guest. It's not a hard thing to do. As we become willing to share our lives, our love and our experiences with those we know, we'll make the world a better home in which to live.

This text was approved by the Operations Manager at the TV station and then sent to the other five ministers as a

guide. They wrote their own spots with the basic idea of centering on Easter and inviting people to attend the church of their choice, thus giving an ecumenical flavor. At the beginning of the announcement the minister's name and church appeared on the screen and the message closed with the words, "A public service message of the Joplin Ministerial Alliance."

After the project was completed, I then contacted the other two local TV stations and found their public service directors very willing to run the spots on their stations! They send tapes to the first station and get duplicates and the spots are aired on all three stations.

This has been a delightful experience for me, both in making good contacts with people at the TV stations and with local ministers of other faiths. Also, showing appreciation is important; for example, I invited the operations manager of the station where we recorded to lunch and sent letters of thanks to the other two stations.

LIGHT ON THE PATH

GUIDELINES FOR UNITY LICENSED TEACHERS, a booklet now being drafted by the AUC Licensed Teacher Development Committee for use in local ministries, is filled with helpful and interesting information. Not only for licensed teachers, or those desiring to become part of Unity leadership, but also for all members of the Unity ministry team--ministers, board members, and other congregational members who may have wondered, "What is a licensed teacher? What do they do? How does one become a licensed teacher?"

Although Unity teachers have been trained and licensed for years, only recently has there been interest in clarifying their role as a member of the ministry team and in attempting to define the various activities in leadership they may be called upon to undertake, depending upon their own unique talents and the desires of their minister.

GUIDELINES attempts to do just that. Springboarding from the practical (and approved) definition of the role of licensed teachers in field ministries evolved by the new AUC/LTD Committee last year, the booklet pulls together related data from specialized Unity publications not generally available to the reading public. The result is a compact compendium of information for and about Unity licensed teachers, their training, their Code of Ethics, their relationship to other members of the leadership team, to Unity School for Religious Studies, and to the Association of Unity Churches.

As presently proposed, GUIDELINES provides detailed and up-to-date answers to the following commonly-asked questions:

- What is a licensed teacher?: (Definition and clarification of the various possible roles of licensed teachers in field ministries.)
- 2. How does one become a licensed teacher?: (Details of credit requirements and courses of study for graduation from USRS.)
- 3. What is the relationship of a licensed teacher to the Association of Unity Churches?: (Definition of associate members, details of membership renewal, and requirements for continuing post-graduate study.)
- 4. What standards/ethics are required of licensed teachers?: (Licensed teacher's Code of Ethics given in full.)
- 5. What is the role of a licensed teacher in a Unity ministry?: (Possible roles other than teaching credit classes.)
- 6. What is the relationship of a licensed teacher to the minister/board of directors and other members of the ministry in which he/she serves?: (Discussion of the "ministry team" concept.)
- 7. What resources are available for licensed teachers?: (A listing of publications, conferences, and meetings that can be of help in the continuing professional growth of Unity licensed teachers.)

The LTD Committee met during Licensed Teacher Post-Graduate Week to reach concensus on the content of GUIDE-LINES. When approved by the AUC, it will then be on its way to publication. Watch for it!

NEW PROCEDURES FOR ALLOCATION

New procedures have been established for the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan (the Plan) so that your contributions and earnings will be credited to your account much faster than in the past. The Trustee, Kansas City Bank & Trust Company, will be valuating your accounts on a quarterly basis instead of on an annual basis. This means that your contributions will be invested quicker and earned income will be credited on each quarter end rather than once a year as in the past. The Trustee will also be sending directly to each participant a Trustee Certificate on a quarterly basis.

In order that this new procedure will run smoothly, the Trustee will need the cooperation of each participant. Contributions must be received and processed by the Trustee no later than 10 days after the end of each calendar quarter in order that the valuation can be completed on a timely basis. If the Trustee receives your contribution later than 10 days after the end of a quarter, the contribution will not be credited to your account balance until the following quarter end. Also, if you have a change of address, please let the Trustee know by writing your new address on the back of the Quarterly Contribution Record.

This new procedure will begin with the March 31 quarter end. We believe that this process will be very beneficial to each participant.

Originally our ministers were known as "leaders." A dedicated individual would draw a group of persons eager to become acquainted with this freeing truth. To share the work of serving a growing number of people, an inner circle of devoted workers would develop, also providing prayer support. As time passed and the group sought to acquire a permanent meeting place, the inner circle became the board of directors, bylaws were adopted, and a Unity center was born.

Eventually the original leader is succeeded by others. The board also experiences turnover but its composition may prove to be more longlasting than the ministers. Then, subtly, the relationship changes. There is a tendency for the minister no longer to be regarded as the leader, but to be seen as the employee of the church board. Nevertheless, if Unity is to retain its uniqueness and not slip into the pattern of traditional denominationalism which produced the ineffectiveness of mainline churches as life-changing influence, it is vital that the minister continue to be viewed as the center leader.

This is in no way to suggest that the minister should be an autocrat ruling by decree. In today's highly complex society it is desirable that those involved in church management should have some knowledge of financial and practical matters in addition to spiritual vision. This is the board's part; they are advisors and counsellors to the minister. The minister brings his special consciousness of prayer and his intimate acquaintance with spiritual principle to discussions. To these the board members add their own special contribution of practical experience. Together, a spiritually guided solution is reached.

This is the underlying purpose of the Bylaws recommended by the AUC for adoption by member churches. They say, in part: "the government of the named church shall be vested in the minister, who is the Administrative Director, and the Board of Directors elected from the Membership." They add, as Administrative Director, the Minister shall be "responsible for the complete functioning of the ministry." Then follows a description of the Board of Directors with a list of 17 separate duties.

Thus we realize the government of a Unity church is shared between the minister and board. The minister has sole control over the content of services and all activities that further the purpose of the ministry as defined. Once these defined areas are accomplished, the decision on all other matters is the business of the board of which the minister is a member, and, as administrative head, he is charged with the task of implementing those decisions.

The bylaws of most Unity churches adhere farily closely to those recommended by the AUC. In others there are variations and these make for uncertainty as to where the ultimate responsibility lies. Any conflicts that occur between ministers and their boards usually arise from honest misunderstanding of what respective offices should entail.

Sometimes board members who have come out of the traditional churches, bring with them a different concept of their responsibilities as members of a church board. This can make for misunderstanding and disagreement. Whatever provisions a particular Unity church's bylaws may contain, it is Unity's intention that the minister's leadership should be recognized; he is the resident professional, trained and educated for leadership in this highly specialized field. Recurring problems in some churches would dissolve if members of those boards recognized the uniqueness of Unity's structure and would refrain from mistakenly assuming that at all costs, they have to take charge.

It is not intended that Unity ministers should be subservient to domineering boards of directors. Many board members are rich in expertise in some special field (accounting, homemaking, real estate, for example), equally the Unity minister has received special training in the conduct of a Unity ministry. He is the natural leader of the church.

There have been examples of ministers abusing their privileged position. When this occurs the correct course is not for the Board to immediately terminate the minister, but to bring the events to the notice of the AUC. This can result in experienced mediation being furnished and avoidance of possible polarization and a damaging split.

Ministers and members of the congregation in Portland, Olympia and Spokane opened their homes and hearts to house the visitors. The women of all the churches prepared sumptuous meals. The ministers shared candidly with them, treating them like colleagues rather than students. As a result, the second-year class gained more knowledge of the life and duties of Unity ministers than they could have gained from a thousand hours in the center operations classroom.

The MITs were given the opportunity to express their appreciation to the Northwest Region by presenting a Wednesday night service in Spokane and a Good Friday evening service in Seattle. They even had some time to play afternoons and evenings in Seattle.

Now that they have returned to UMS, the MITs are sharing their observations so that everyone knows what everyone else learned. One thing they all learned--the Unity field movement is led by, and filled with, individuals who care about one another. They know that established field ministers are ready to welcome them into their ranks and that there is the right kind of ministry awaiting each member of the class of 1983.

More than just facilitating workshops and seminars, their main function is to consult with ministers and volunteers on the needs that are prevalent to each church or center. They want to help you set up a Y.E. Program if there is a need. They are there to answer such questions as; "How do we get started, how do we recruit teachers, or what curriculum do we use?".

Ministers and directors are encouraged to call upon their Regional Consultants at any time when there is a need to obtain professional advice in areas of Youth Education.

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications

This Month: A review of Antecedents of the New Insight in Truth.

"There is nothing new in New Thought," could be the subtitle of Eric Butterworth's new cassette album, Antecedents of the New Insight in Truth. New Thought movements, including Unity, are formed through a confluence--a flowing together of a multiplicity of unfolding streams of Truth, sources of which can be traced through ancient (and more recent) mystical and philosophical thinking. This is the view taken by Eric Butterworth as he reaches into the ages to trace the origins of Truth in this masterful, eleven-cassette series.

Eric Butterworth's position is that Truth progressively unfolds through humankind's ever-expanding awareness of the nature of, and his relationship to, God. Succeeding generations of searchers for Truth build upon earlier revelations, at conscious or unconscious levels, and evolve more advanced ideas.

His interest in great thinkers and teachers in Truth's golden stream take him from Pharaoh Akhenaton's vision of one God and the contributions of the Greek philosophers, Plato and Zeno, to the theories of Eastern philosophers, including Lao-tse and the Vedas.

He suggests that the cosmology of the Neo-Platonists and the mystic Meister Eckhart during the Middle Ages prepared the way for further discoveries that led to the acceptance and success of the mental healers and transcendentalists in New England in the middle-to-late nineteenth century. These innovative thoughtstreams strongly influenced the New Thought beliefs and teachings of Mary Baker Eddy, Emma Curtis Hopkins, Thomas Troward, Ernest Holmes, Charles and Myrtle Fillmore, and others.

Research into occult groups such as the Theosophical Society and the paranormal give a perspective to their historical contributions to modern New Thought.

Eric Butterworth's final tape is a summation and commentary punctuated by a sharing of his personal spiritual philosophy. "Truth is a reaching," he believes. When it crystalizes and becomes closed it is no longer Truth. Man progresses spiritually on a vertical rather than a horizontal, material level, reaching ever higher levels of consciousness.

He discourages "mental science," which he believes can be "manipulation of the universe for personal gain." Rather, he emphasizes that we will grow spiritually as we get a sense of our relationship to ourselves and with the whole--as we learn of our imprisoned splendor and release it. "We all live in infinite mind, the allness of mind, and each of us is a state of consciousness in infinite mind."

Listening to Antecedents of the New Insight in Truth is an eleven hour investment of time, but it is worth it. The series

will interest anyone who wants to know more about the evolution of metaphysical thought. The tapes can provide interesting class material, definitions, and illustrations and perhaps they will motivate some persons to do further research into the marvel of New Thought.

News About MPPP*

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS PRIOR TO NORMAL RETIREMENT AGE

According to the provision of the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan (Plan), if you terminate employment prior to obtaining normal retirement age, which is 65, the initial Trustee, only at the direction of the Advisory Committee, may commence payment to you. The direction from the Advisory Committee can be given to the Trustee at any time before the end of the plan year following termination. A plan year ends on December 31. The Plan clearly states that the Advisory Committee can not give the Trustee direction to begin payment of a terminated person's interest before the close of the Plan Year in which the participant's termination of employment occurred.

The Advisory Committee may direct the Trustee to make payment in either of the following ways: 1) to distribute your interest in the plan not later than 90 days after the close of the Plan Year in which you terminate employment; 2) to postpone distributions of your interest in the Plan until after the close of the first Plan Year in which you do work more than 500 hours (including a break in service); or, 3) to postpone your distribution of your interest in the Plan until you obtain normal retirement age.

In accordance with the Advisory Committee's directions, the Trustee will distribute your interest in the Plan to you either in lump sum or in substantially equal installments over a fixed period of time. The Advisory Committee will provide you with written notice of its distribution direction to the Trustee. For each Plan Year, your interest remains in the trust fund, it will share in trust fund earning gains or losses.

Dear Friends,

I had advanced the opinion that attending such a gathering of ministers must surely be the most inspiring experience ever. Ruth smiled and replied, "Don't expect too much, Charles. We ministers are human. But two things are very sure--we will find at the School whatever we expect to find and we will bring away from the Conference whatever we take to it." Ruth Johnston's words have stayed with me and my experience at some twenty-five conferences since has not proved her wrong.

At the Village we are now in the final stages of preparation for the 1983 Conference of Unity ministers, licensed teachers and delegates. All the Headquarters staff has been involved in varying degrees. Debi Maynard, Conference Coordinator, with the help of Cheryl Vestal, has put together the nuts and bolts of the framework of activities hammered out by the Program Committee. Meetings have been scheduled and rooms for the various committees found. Joann Landreth studies minutes and prepared agendas and reports in any time she can find when not wrestling with the placement concerns of 51 Ordinands and a dozen existing ministers contemplating moving.

Peggy Gray has emerged triumphantly from still another audit with another fine year's administration to her credit. The books have been balanced and we are in the black! Myra Moore prays for an improved premium versus benefit experience and consequent reduction of AEtna premium costs.

Joe Wilkinson and Dan DeLancey have enveloped and moved mountains of notices, invitations and other printed material through the mail. Jody Smith and Kathy Proctor deal daily with constant inquiries.

So the staff at the Village has done its part in preparing for the meeting. Also, 350 new rose bushes have been planted in the Unity Village Rose Garden to add beauty and fragrance to your visit. Thomas a' Kempis said in effect, "All men desire peace but few men do the things that make for peace." This is as true today as it was some five or six hundred years ago when he first wrote it. We can discover a peace-filled and inspiring conference if we all enter the experience with a determination to do the things that make for peace. Perhaps it is better re-expressed as: We shall find a peace-filled conference as we refrain from doing or saying those things that will destroy peace.

So we gather at Unity Village, some 400 persons, with widely differing backgrounds but all seeking renewal and inspiration to take back to our respective churches and centers. As we expect this so we will find it, and as we bring an attitude of love and cooperation, so shall we realize these.

This group of ministers, licensed teachers and delegates, some 400 dedicated and Christ-centered persons, has a tremendous potential. Charles Braden, an insightful observer of comparative religions, once described Unity as having a Christology second to none. We can, at this 1983 Conference, submit our decisions to the rays of Christ love and come away more strongly united than ever before. The world is hungry for Unity teachings, yet is mostly unconscious of its needs and where the answer may be found. As we demonstrate this healing, forgiving and harmonizing teaching in our organizational relationships, so will we equip ourselves to take this to the millions. This Conference can be the first of a new series of joyous reunions that can be repeated in years to come as we rededicate ourselves to the work and will of Jesus Christ.

UAS News & Views

Graduation and Ordination realize a dream for everyone in a Unity Ministerial School class, but this year when 51 individuals receive diplomas and ordination papers, one extra dream will be realized. The extra dream belongs to **Ruth Mosley**, and it will be realized when eight ministers-intraining from Detroit are transformed into Unity ministers.

The eight Detroiters were the first graduates of the Urban Ministerial School which Ruth dreamed about for years, worked for, and finally established and opened in the fall of 1980. Though her dream originated in the desire to prepare more Black leadership for Unity churches serving urban congregations, it quickly included persons of all races who, because of family responsibilities, financial conditions or educational background, needed more than two years to prepare for the Unity ministry.

Most of the students in the first class had studied Unity teachings and been active in Unity churches in Detroit for several years. To give succeeding classes a comparable background, Ruth immediately initiated a Head Start program which requires that individuals wanting to enter the Urban School must first spend at least a year taking basic Truth classes and serving a Unity church in various activities. Even then, acceptance is not automatic. Every applicant is interviewed by an admissions committee made up of ordained Unity ministers. For instance, at the end of April, Jay Dishman, Phil White and I went to Detroit to join Jim Sherman, Elizabeth Jacunski, Milly Collins, Richard Ammons, Mayola SaltPaw and Ruth to interview applicants for the program. We also checked on the progress of students finishing the first year and determined the readiness of the prospective graduates for the final year at UMS starting the end of July.

Although the existence of the Urban School makes it possible for ministerial hopefuls to take two or more years to complete the first half of their training, the curriculum of the school is not easier than the first year UMS curriculum. To the contrary. In addition to mastering the content of UMS courses, all students who do not have college degrees must earn an Associate of Arts from a local community college. Even those with degrees must take specific college courses in psychology, sociology and challenges of inner city groups, particularly those of the Black community. But the Urban School students share Ruth Mosley's dream.

Successful dreamers know that good dreams are realized only when dreamers do the work needed to bring them into being. The Class of 1983 has done the required work and on June 13 of this year it will realize 52 dreams.

David then entered the area and interviewed six of them, basing his questions on passages from scripture and relating them to life today. At the end of the interviews the apostles went out into the congregation and presented a flower to each member in attendance. News About MPPP*

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

WHO IS THE TRUSTEE? WHAT ARE THE DUTIES OF THE TRUSTEE?

According to Section 1.25 of the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan and Trust (the "Plan"), the Trustee shall be Kansas City Bank & Trust Company or any successor in office who in writing accepts the position of Trustee. The duties and the function of the Trustee are varied and diverse. The following is a list of functions which Kansas City Bank & Trust Company, as Trustee, now perform:

- 1. Provides to the Advisory Committee complete accountings of the Trust fund;
- 2. Provides to the Advisory Committee a list of assets of the Trust fund which include cost of securities and market value;
- 3. Collects all dividends, interest and contributions;

- 4. Holds all pension securities in safekeeping;
- 5. Collects and records quarterly contributions;
- 6. Maintains records of all contributions received;
- 7. Allocates the employer and employee contributions to each participant's account;
- 8. Provides each participant a quarterly statement indicating the status of his individual account;
- Distributes benefits due a participant because of death, retirement or disability pursuant to instructions received; and,
- 10. Prepares and files tax forms required for distribution to participants.

The Trustee can have full discretion and authority with regard to the investment of the Trust fund. Except with respect to this Plan, the Advisory Committee has given the control and the direction of the investments to an investment manager.

Youth Education Report

Recently I had the distinct pleasure to be invited to facilitate a Youth Education Seminar at the Unity Center for Growth in Omaha, Nebraska.

This center is certainly demonstrating the power of the spoken word as the Unity Center for Growth has increased from a small study group of 17 to an attendance of 237 in just a little over two years. How did this all take place?

Colleen Lehnus, minister, shared her story with me. While in ministerial school Colleen would drive the 210 miles from the Village to Omaha and back again every weekend to help this study group get started. Upon her graduation she became the full-time minister for this nucleus of students and pioneered the Unity Center for Growth. They really began to grow.

From meeting in a doctor's office they moved very shortly to a club room in an apartment complex; from there to the basement of a school; and from there to a converted restaurant. It is in this converted restaurant that the church still has its base of operation, but within a short time it became evident that this facility would only suffice for office space and week-day services. It would not hold the number of people who were coming on Sunday.

When I asked Colleen if there was any one thing she could pinpoint which facilitated each move to a larger place, she said, "In every case the children have been the catalyst that made it necessary for us to seek larger facilities. In May of 1981 we had thirty-five children meeting in two small classrooms here at the Center. It was then we began seriously looking for a facility that would be sufficient for unlimited expansion, and when we got serious, God got serious!"

It was on a Monday when Colleen said emphatically, "Father, we are ready!" The following Friday Colleen and her husband, Byrl, attended a local movie which is located not very far from the Center, in a very accessible and busy section of town. It was one of the nicest theatres in Omaha. "As soon as I entered the theatre and saw the beautiful 'Fillmore shades of lavender' and 850 seating capacity, I said, Thank You, Father, but what do we do with the children?" As you can see from the photograph below the children meet in classroom clusters in the lobby of the theatre. How Unique! . . . and it works beautifully.



Each Sunday morning the lobby of the theatre is transformed into areas for Youth Education. The transformation

takes approximately 15 minutes as the theatre has facilities for storing many of the items necessary for the set up. Nursery and kindergarten are clustered at one end of this large expanse of space, while 2nd and 3rd and 4th and 5th grade levels are clustered in the opposite end. Uniteens have their own nook, while the Y.O.U. meets in a conference room in the upper balcony. Everyone works together in the most divine order you will ever be privileged to witness, and the Y.E. program has grown to the point that they now have an ordained minister for their Y.E. Coordinator.

Seeking to fulfill the needs of the Y.E. department created a small vacuum for the church services as the new facilities always provided larger facilities for the adults to worship on Sunday morning. "God is always filling up this vacuum," says Colleen with a sheepish grin. "I wouldn't be too surprised to see all 850 seats occupied in the not too far off future."

Is your Y.E. outgrowing its facility? Perhaps this success story will inspire an idea that would work for you. The supply is always sufficient to the demand and "with God all things are possible."

As added incentive, it would be well to note that immediately following church services, the lobby of this fine theatre is quickly transformed into a social hall serving coffee and tea from the concession stand. No one wants to go home!

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications

This Month: Our Wonderful WEE WISDOM Magazine.

Many generations of children (and adults) worldwide have enjoyed WEE WISDOM and benefited from its positive contents. This column has drawn attention to the Truth message in many WEE WISDOM stories.

WEE WISDOM has many other valuable features--an illustrated pull-off calendar, a comic strip to be completed with the readers' own words and pictures, the "Action Corner with Pete and Polly" (which suggests winning attitudes and positive behavior), "Dear Readers" (the editor's message), "Dear WEE WISDOM" (letters to the editor), the "Good Words Booster Club," "What's The Good Word?," the "Writers' Guild," "Puzzlers," "Let's Do It!," "Let's Draw," "Prayer for Protection," and "The Prayer of Faith."

Perhaps the most popular features in terms of the amount of mail received are the participation features--the "Good Words Booster Club" and the "Writers' Guild." The pull-off calendar, which became part of the magazine in September 1973, is a very popular feature, also.

The "Good Words Booster Club" is an actual club that is now in its seventy-second year (it began in 1911). Boys and girls need just show an interest and they receive an invitation to join, a club membership card, and information on sending in a good word that is meaningful to them. The club is free.

The "Writers' Guild" membership is comprised of children whose original work is published in WEE WISDOM. Myrtle Fillmore, founder of WEE WISDOM Magazine, included readers' poems, stories, and letters in WEE WISDOM's first issue, August 1893. The section received a title, "Our Young Authors," in November 1912. The title "WEE WISDOM Writers' Guild," later shortened to "Writers' Guild," was selected for the feature beginning in October 1932.

"Let's Draw" dates from 1938. The artist who is currently responsible for this column also writes and draws the think-and-draw completion comic strip. This strip helps children develop their imaginations and eye-hand coordination, as do the puzzle, two spelling riddles, a scrambled-word puzzle, and a dot-to-dot completion. A mirror-writing technique is the June/July craft activity. These participation activities foster coordination, special comprehension, numerical concepts, spelling, and verbal and non-verbal skills.

WEE WISDOM conveys spiritual insights through the prayers that regularly appear--"Prayer for Protection" and "The Prayer of Faith."

WEE WISDOM is a superb teaching instrument; the oldest children's magazine in continuous publication in this country, and as far as we know in the world. Unity is very proud of this magazine that encourages children to use their inner wisdom and helps foster their ability to see good in their world. Be a WEE WISDOM booster!

Religious Public Relations

In the past few months the AUC office has had many inquiries concerning the availability of religious public relations materials. We would like to suggest that any Center interested in more information on public relations in the ministry to order the *Religious Public Relations Handbook* (for local congregations of all denominations). This publication sells for \$3.50 and may be ordered from The Religious Public Relations Council, Inc., Room 1031, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, NY 10027.

Another publication you may find of value is the *Media Resource Guide*. This guidebook sells for \$5.00 and may be ordered from the Foundation for America Communications, 3383 Barham Boulevard, Los Angeles, California 90068.

Both of these resources have proved helpful in establishing an effective public relations program.

The Association of Unity Churches also has a filmstrip and record, *The Church at Jackrabbit Junction*, available for loan to the Unity Churches. This filmstrip is an allegorical filmstrip on religious public relations. Good public relations begins within a congregation with an understanding among the members of what they are trying to do. As the western frontier characters in this filmstrip discover, a congregation's image emerges more from what the group is than from what it says, from substance. The task of communication in public relations is both listening to the community and helping the community to see the congregation as it is. The 15-minute color filmstrip is designed to motivate church decision-makers to consider the problems and challenges of public relations within their congregations and for their communities.

President's

Letter

Dear Friends,

As my first communication with you as President I wish to begin, not with promises but with a premise. If our goals are not in accord from the beginning then debating how to reach them in the future is pointless.

During the formation years of AUC our image was that of an emancipated Unity minister's group. No longer a department of Unity School, we sought to establish our own authority. We drafted a constitution and by-laws. We became an association. For I.R.S. purposes we identified ourselves as a church association. However, the old image of the UMA, that ministerial fellowship which preceded AUC was strong in our hearts, and in a subtle way affects our thinking today.

This shows up in our liaison with member churches, especially when a dispute arises between ministers and boards. In our image of being an association of Unity ministers we tend to arbitrate defensively in favor of our colleague instead of viewing the dispute objectively as a family communication problem. This has caused boards of directors of member churches to feel frustrated and distrustful of AUC.

The image we hold of ourselves as an association has in the past been reflected in our relationship with Unity School. In our negotiations with them we have usually weakened our position by representing ourselves as an association of ministers, a group of clerical personalities rather than the modal personality of an association of organized churches.

For a long time the UMA was the conscience of the field department of Unity School. In 1966 the AUC was formed, which then became a field movement. In the same year the UMA was laid to rest. It has been dead for eighteen years, yet its ghost is with us still. Like all ghosts it needs a house to haunt and AUC has unconsciously offered itself as that house.

Down in the South we are still haunted by the bitter fruits of the Civil War. I am not talking about the war memorials of Vicksburg, or Chattanooga, or Andersonville, or Kennesaw. Nor am I referring to the burning of Atlanta, or Sherman's destructive march to the sea, or the surrender at Appomattox. I am talking about Kudzu!

Kudzu is a plant imported from Japan to stem the erosion of soil that took place following the civil war. Today the soil is rich, supporting large tracts of diversified farm land, and... we still have Kudzu. Kudzu is a beautiful vine but, like a great ghost of the past, it refuses to be laid to rest. Anything that stands stationary for more than five minutes becomes a trellis for it to cling to. The point is: "That which is necessary and appreciated in one period of need often becomes a strangling influence in another."

AUC has been described as a child maturing and standing up to its parent, Unity School. As long as we hold to this image we are always going to act like a child fighting with its parent image. I propose that we concentrate on the original premise and free ourselves finally from the troublesome UMA ghost.

We are NOT a child of the school. We are NOT a ministerial fellowship. We ARE an Association of Unity Churches!

Over the past few years we have begun to entertain such an image, if but faintly. At one time we ordained our seminarians only if they took an oath to occupy a pulpit. We have recently broadened our view of the field and have taken a more realistic stance. A portion of our field ministers are now serving ministries through departments of Unity School. We now have a Chaplain in the U.S. Army... a woman... with visions of placing chaplains in every branch of the armed services. More of our ministers are becoming interested in hospital chaplaincy. One of our colleagues has recently become the first Unity minister to serve as resident chaplain to a prison. We are beginning to talk about training teachers and ministers in specialized fields such as youth education. We are also becoming more sensitive to the needs of the field and the talent that is there seeking expression. I see future conferences offering programs for lay persons, such as Boards of Directors, Music Directors, Youth Education, senior citizens, etc. I also see AUC recognizing its responsibilities as an association of churches and ministries representing people with needs to grow spiritually, instead of a professional organization fighting a ghost.

In accepting the gavel of President I do so as the President of a church association because I see AUC as an assembly of all. I have recently attended the annual International Conference of the Youth of Unity. I rubbed shoulders with the future of our movement and I was impressed with what I

saw. Soon I will represent AUC in the orientation program for those students entering the U.S.R.S./M.E.P. program. I want them to feel that I am their President and the AUC is their organization. I want the field ministers within the Unity School ministries to respect the position of President as their President too. I want Boards of Directors of member churches to respect this position and come to feel that their congregations are truly the spit and glue of AUC.

I know this will never become a fact until the talking stops and the contact begins. I see my role as the motivator of this process. We are not an adolescent ministerial organization. We are a field movement as old as Silent Unity, During Conference I was pleased to hear Jim Freeman say that Silent Unity has been praying with the field, and for the field, from the beginning. When the first study group was established we became a field movement; a field movement that is still waiting for field representation and leadership. WE are the field movement, the AUC and Unity School together. In the simplest terms Unity School and AUC are just names that identify responsibilities. When we focus on our responsibilities as an association of churches the probability of our receiving the respect of the school, member churches, student body, and of one another is a good bet, and, the status of AUC will then draw to us all the support necessary for us to do our job well.

I look forward to the coming year as President. In stating my position I ask everyone to join me in stepping forward on the premise set down in our charter. We must move in the same direction, beyond the annual crisis. The professional enrichment program during Conference has given us the direction and the skills to get there. I ask for your rallying spirit to fuel the thrust.

MINISTRY SERVICES PERSPECTIVES

A highly popular feature of the 1983 Conference was the full day's Post-Graduate Course presented by Louise lennaccaro, Senior Associate Director of the Center for Management Assistance. This group exists to help organizations in the not-for-profit sector in their internal structure and also to delineate responsibility of Boards of Directors. This management expert has spent several invaluable hours with both the AUC Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. They were at once impressed by the importance of her message and quickly realized that the principles she expressed were applicable also on the local church board level. Scott Sherman, Regional Representative for the Northwest, had no difficulty in arranging for her to make a presentation at a Subregional Minister/Board Conference. The ministers and board members present found the course to be of great value. The presentation at Conference seemed to follow as a natural outcome. Other regions or subregions are encouraged also to arrange local presentations. They cannot fail but to help church boards become more aware of their responsibilities and assist in orderly and harmonious church organization. Anyone interested should channel their inquiries through the AUC Office.


A direct result of Louise's input will immediately be felt in the AUC's committee structure. From this point Jay Dishman, AUC's President, is appointing a member of the AUC Board to serve on each standing committee. For a number of years it had been policy for the Board and the committees to hold their meetings at the same time. This has prevented members of the Board from serving on committees (an exception being the Finance and Budget Committee). However, this policy has had a number of disadvantages; one of these being that the committee often did not have a clear idea of Board policy in certain areas. Further they often did not have a precise awareness of the Board's desires or intentions. This has, from time to time, resulted in a committee's recommendations being rejected or radically amended with some consequent frustration being experienced by committee members. The Board member on the committee will have a better insight as to what is likely to win the Board's approval and steer the committee away from paths that appear unlikely to lead to success.

A further advantage of this change being that the committee will have a permanent voice on the Board. He/she will be acutely aware of the feelings and desires of fellow committee members. This will bring the board closer to the grassroots.

In practice, this will call for committees to meet early

in the week (Mid-Year meeting in January and Pre-Conference in June) while the Board will not convene until later in the week. We believe this change will have the effect of making both the AUC Board and its standing committees more responsive to one another and also to the needs in the field.

YOU CONFERENCE '83 "Celebrating the Christ"

The 1983 YOU Conference, "Celebrating the Christ" is now a nostalgic memory in the minds and hearts of 427 youth and sponsors who attended. This was the largest Youth Conference in the history of the Unity movement, and was indeed a "Celebration of the Christ" within each individual.

The objective of the Conference was to create an environment for the YOU'er that would stimulate the application of Truth principles in everyday living. The emphasis was on learning through direct experience by providing a wide variety of activities for spiritual unfoldment. Each delegate was assigned to one of 18 workshop families consisting of 20 other delegates which met daily for about two hours. They came together to share questions, experiences, impressions and philosophies. Each family was facilitated by an adult leader who raised topics for discussion and assisted the group in building a spirit of group trust and acceptance.

In addition to the 18 family workshops, there was a special officers workshop on "Leadership Development," and also a sponsor's workshop which offered new ideas on recreational skills, facilitators skills, puppetry and counseling.

Highlights of the Conference included meditation, prayer and inspiration from some of Unity's most dynamic ministers. This year we were blessed to have our well-known author and poet, James Dillet Freeman; the Chairman of Counseling and Interpersonal Studies in USRS, Jane Waddington; the Chairman of Biblical Studies in USRS, Sallye Taylor; and the minister of Unity Christ Church in St. Louis, Missouri, Richard Barnes.

Elizabeth Ellis and Charles King were special guests of the Conference--Elizabeth, the internationally famous professional storyteller, kept us spellbound with one delightful story after another, while Mr. King was a special inspiration to everyone with his unique ability to convey his excitement and joy for living through music. We are also indebted to Mr. King for organizing the YOU choir, "The Ambassadors of Love," which began its first concert tour of Unity churches in the Central and Northern Regions immediately following the Conference.

In "Celebrating the Christ," the participants were invited to become aware of the use of Truth principles in relationships as they actively engaged in participation of a special talent show, student newspaper, and sharing the fun of a social banquet which was followed by dancing in the parking lot. There was also ample time provided for relaxation, reflection and exercise by taking advantage of the swimming pool, tennis courts and the beautiful Unity grounds.

The 427 YOU'ers and sponsors who attended this Conference enjoyed the gathering of souls who came together to "Celebrate the Christ" in themselves and each other. They loved one another, had fun together, and supported each other in an intensive learning adventure.

I know that the YOU'ers who attended Conference this year had a tremendous experience of growth which will enable each one to be a better instrument of service to their local YOU region and church. LIGHT ON THE PATH

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A LICENSED TEACHER?

What does it mean to be a licensed teacher? It means you have devoted several years of study to take part in the Unity movement. In the West Central Region it means you are a part of a group of twenty-five, twenty of whom are very active in ministries in an area stretching from Reno, Nevada, to the islands of Hawaii. It means you may be asked to serve in many ways. Two work with their minister husbands, one with his minister wife. Three are salaried employees of their church, church secretaries and a bookstore manager. Three are active in youth education. Five are busy guiding study groups. An enthusiastic letter from Grace Wright tells me a group under her guidance has opened offices in Lodi with space for counseling, classes and a reading room, all with the loving support of the church in Stockton.

Another area where Licensed Teachers serve is in visitations. Here in the Santa Clara Valley where the San Jose church serves a large area, several visitors are needed. As a Licensed Teacher I have been asked to hold classes for these visitors, see that all requests are met and that follow-up records are kept.

These teachers also teach adult classes using books approved by their minister. This year Marion Melin and I have enjoyed team teaching. It has been most rewarding for us and well received by the students. We used a great many visual aids and ended each class with small discussion groups followed by a few minutes of sharing.

Licensed Teachers say they attend West Central Meetings not just to maintain credentials and gain in Spiritual growth, but to share in the loving atmosphere that is found there. Usually the program is so interesting it is hard to take time for a Licensed Teachers' meeting, in the limited time we have we share our dreams, ideas, desires, and suggestions for further work. We would all like to have more Bible study and more counseling training. Each one is enthusiastic about the work they are doing. There is a bond between us that extends across the Pacific to our counterpart, whom we have not met as yet, in the Hawaiian Islands.

This year, in order to serve our Region more fully we have, under the guidance of Mary Ann Detzler, prepared a brochure which gives the name, address, telephone number, church, classes taught, expertise, distance able to travel, etc., of each teacher able to serve outside her church. As new teachers are licensed their names will be added to the brochure. Mileage and a monetary gift are received for this service.

You can become quite busy and wear several hats as a Licensed Teacher. You can also work with some very dear people. The financial reward is minimal, far outweighed by the joy received from watching sorrow overcome, self-esteem regained, faith renewed and love overcome misunderstanding.

It is not always easy to be a Licensed Teacher, but it is always rewarding.



HAS News & Views

During summer recess, Unity Ministerial School features much coming and going. Some results from faculty vacation time and the arrival of new students, but most is the activity of new graduates who travel to and from try-outs and then depart for their first ministries.

As this column is being written, thirty-seven new Unity ministers are either on their way to or already at work in their churches. They have been called to all regions of the Association of Unity Churches. South Central leads with eleven distributed among Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Nebraska and Texas. Next is Great Lakes with seven in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. Eastern has four in Maryland, Massachusetts and Quebec. West Central and Southwest also have four each, with six graduates in California and two in Arizona. Northwest has three in Washington and Utah. Southeast also has three in Florida and North Carolina. In addition, one graduate has returned to minister in Australia.

The class of 1983 displayed a great interest in helping the Unity movement expand, so it is not suprising that seven of those already placed are pioneering while another seven are serving as the first full-time ministers of study groups ready to become churches. Of the fourteen graduates still not placed, two plan to pioneer in a few months--one in Pennsylvania and the other in Nassau.

This year, placement has been rapid and we are confident that the remaining twelve graduates will be called to their right places soon.

Now, we on the faculty have come back to our offices to prepare for the approaching quarter. Our attention is focused on the current second year ministers-in-training, among whom are seven new individuals from the Urban Ministerial School in Detroit, and on the first year class in the Ministerial Education Program of Unity School for Religious Studies.

The touch of melancholy that we felt when we bade farewell to the class of 1983 dissipates in the joy we feel as we welcome back the class of 1984 and greet the Urban MITs and in-coming class.

1983 ORDINATION SERVICE

Many comments were made on the beautiful and inspiring 1983 Ordination talk, given by class representative, Lois Caldwell. Lois has given her permission to share some of her insights with the field ministers.

Should you want to obtain a copy of the entire ordination talk you may receive one through the Association of Unity Churches office.

Lois will be pioneering a new ministry in Missouri City, Texas. We know that God's love and light will be shining on her pathway always, guiding her to her highest good.

FOUR-PART HARMONY: We have chosen to become Unity ministers at one of the most exciting times of man's evolution. We're on the brink of breaking through into a spiritual evolution that is so wonderous and so great that it's beyond our imagination. The world is yearning for Truth--the freeing Truth of Jesus Christ, and we've chosen to be instruments of God, through the Unity movement, to help spread this message of Truth. We're all different instruments. We play our own melodies. Each of us tune into a different key, but we all play in harmony in the one great symphony--The Truth of Jesus Christ.

The Association of Unity Churches is very much like an orchestra. No one minister plays the same instrument or the same notes. But every minister knows his instrument and blends it with the others, achieving harmony out of differences. Isn't that the kind of harmony the kind of unity, that is our crying need in the world today?

Wilferd Peterson in his book Adventures in the Art of Living has said that "The world knows the perfect tune for harmony and peace among men; there is no secret about it. It is as old as the ages. Seers, prophets, and sages have extolled it. The perfect tune is the expression of love and good will. All that is needed is that men transcend their differences so that the perfect tune may be played on the heartstrings of all people everywhere."

So with love being the keynote of our harmony, we are ready to be integrated into the full orchestra of Unity ministers. We bring to that orchestra our consciousness of a four-part harmony which is composed of (1) Love--love of God, ourselves, our fellowman, and Unity; (2) Commitment-commitment to serving God and mankind through the Unity movement; (3) Faith--faith in God, ourselves, our fellowman, and Unity; and (4) Willingness--willingness to expand in consciousness and to take an active part in the expansion of the Unity movement by establishing and helping to establish new Unity churches and centers wherever they are needed. We feel that the expansion of the Unity movement is an idea whose time has come, and we are dedicated to being instruments for bringing that idea into expression.

We are moving into the world as ministers at a time that appears to be critical. But we know that it is at that moment of crisis that we have the greatest potential for change and growth. We have the Truth that the world hungers for and we can help mankind to know that the Kingdom of God is within him and Christ in him is his hope of glory. So as we look into the world and see that things seem to be falling apart--we can know that they are not falling apart--in a destructive way, but that it is only making way for the Truth and for the new world of which we are already a part. We are prepared to bring that Truth into the new world.

As we become members of the full orchestra of Unity ministers, we do so with the consciousness of a four-part harmony of love, commitment, faith and willingness to expand our consciousness and the Unity movement. We're all different instruments. We play our own melodies. Each of us tunes into a different key, but we all play in harmony in the one great symphony—The Truth of Jesus Christ.

(*Money Purchase Pension Plan)

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS UPON RETIREMENT, DEATH OR DISABILITY

Retirement

A participant's Normal Retirement Age under the Association of Unity Churches Money Purchase Pension Plan is age 65. A participant may, at the end of the Plan Year during which he attains age 60 and has at least 15 years of service, take Early Retirement. Upon a participant's retirement the Advisory Committee will direct the Trustees to distribute to the participant his vested benefit. Distribution will be made no later than 60 days after the close of the Plan Year. The Trustee can either distribute the retirement benefit in lump sum or in equal installments over a fixed period of time.

Death

If a participant dies prior to receiving all of his benefits under the Plan, the Trustee will pay the balance of the account to the designated beneficiary. The Advisory Committee provides the appropriate forms for naming a beneficiary.

Disability

If a participant becomes disabled, the Advisory Committee may direct the Trustee to pay the disabled participant his account balance. This payment can either be made in lump sum or in equal installments over a fixed period of time. Under the Plan, disability means a physical or mental disability which renders the Participant unable to perform the duties of his customary position for an indefinite period of time which the Advisory Committee considers will be of long duration. The Advisory Committee may require a confirmation of the disability by a licensed physician.

THE CHALLENGE

Over my years within the Unity Ministry I have become aware of a phenomenon that isn't unique to Tucson, and in fact a situation that I would imagine is to be found within a large degree of Unity Ministries. It is the challenge of people who have served on the Board of Directors or Trustees who then disappear after their term of service—they leave the Ministry totally!

As I write this I can think of quite a few people who have been elected to serve on the Board of Directors here within this Unity Ministry that Mary Ellen and I serve, who after their service on the Board, have then left this Ministry and are never again seen. Obviously this doesn't cover everyone who has served on our Board, but it is applicable for a large majority. What can be the reason for this? What can be done?

I have given this many moments of thought and I believe that I have discovered an answer that is useful to me, and perhaps it will be to others as well. You see, I have discovered that the people who have departed the Ministry after their service on the Board have crossed over an imaginary line with both of their feet. What is this line? Well, it is truly an imaginary one, but one that nevertheless exists within each Unity Ministry. It is the dividing line between an individual's primary use of his or her Ministry as a place of Spiritual input and growth, AND their use of the Ministry as a place where their other talents come into play, i.e., the business of the Church.

It is necessary for that "line" to be crossed by some-but hopefully with only one foot, not both feet. For as I look back upon the people who have served on the Board and left the ministry, it is my judgment that those who have left the Ministry, crossed that imaginary line with both feet and therefore lost perspective of the real purpose for the Ministry and his or her place within it. Once that perspective is lost...once service upon the Board becomes the primary objective of affiliation with a Ministry and not Spiritual growth, then that person is on their way out of the Ministry after their service on the Board has come to an end. And, the Ministry has failed to serve that person in a very important way.

What is the solution? As I see it, the solution is awareness from the point of the Ministry AND from the perspective of the Board member. Board orientation before service upon the Board could be a positive area where this type of preventative care could be spoken to. I believe that Board members should be required to participate in mid-week activities and certainly be present at Sunday Services as well. They need to be the active member of the Church, and not just people who attend Board meetings and help make Board decisions. Perhaps the Minister needs to be willing to speak

to individual members of the Board when they can see that a Board member has crossed over the imaginary line with both feet and counsel them that while their presence is appreciated on the Board, their primary function within the Church is one of attending to their Spiritual growth, and to further tell them that the Ministry is doing them a dis-service if this is continued. Perhaps we need to be more aware and more forthright.

While all places of service on the Board are subject to this challenge, the most obvious one is the position of treasurer. In the majority of Churches the treasurer needs help. He or she needs someone who will do the accounting functions of the daily needs of the Ministry so that the treasurer can function as a treasurer and "cause to have done" many of the duties of treasurer rather than actually having to do them.

Board "burn out" can be helped, and as Unity Ministers we can become aware of the possibility of our wonderful serving members crossing over that imaginary line with both of their feet and failing to remember that the Church is functioning to serve the Spiritual needs of ALL of its people and to encourage a renewed perspective of this purpose.



UNITY PEACE NETWORK

A group of concerned Unity ministers and teachers met at the June Conference to discuss their involvement with issues pertaining to nuclear disarmament. In their churches and centers some individuals had organized prayer vigils, while others had held study groups to encourage enlightened discussion. A few had expressed interest in directly confronting the issue through non-violent means.

Although time did not allow, many at the meeting felt the need to make a statement that would be mutually acceptable by those individuals involved. It was agreed that all would meet at the 1984 Conference to compile the statement.

It was also agreed that dialogue would continue through the medium of a newsletter, to be compiled by Bill Wilson, Unity Church of Richmond, California. The newsletter will be mailed to all interested individuals in Unity.

What are your creative ideas about what we can do about peace, within and without? What have you done in your church? What do you want to do? How do you feel about Unity's involvement in nuclear disarmament?

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications

This Month: Nourishing the Life Force by Richard and Mary-Alice Jafolla.

One of the most helpful, practical series of articles ever to appear in UNITY Magazine was Nourishing the Life Force by Richard and Mary-Alice Jafolla, licensed Unity teachers. These well-received articles on the mind/body connection and nutrition are now combined into a hard-bound book.

A general holistic approach to living is not entirely new to Unity, but *specific emphasis upon nutrition and dietary supplements*, in addition to spiritual practices such as prayer, meditation, and positive attitude, is innovative.


The Jafollas champion well-nourished bodies, good living habits, and spiritually-based optimum health and well-being. To that end their book explores the connection between spiritual law and attitude and gives readers the benefit of their study and expertise in the field of nutrition and lifestyle.

In the first chapter of Nourishing the Life Force, the Jafollas write, "Spirit, soul, and body are the three phases of humanity. This idea is among the oldest doctrines of philosophy. There is a balance which is necessary—which is crucial—among these three phases. There has been a tendency, especially among some New Thought students, to minimize the importance of the body—an inclination to ignore the body and to concentrate instead on improving the mind. This is dangerous, for a balance is needed. Charles Fillmore tells us: To give men opportunity to get the full benefit of salvation, life is necessary, and a body through which to express life is also necessary. Jesus did not ignore the flesh in His ministry. When Jesus healed, His healings were of mind and body jointly."

The Jafollas say that as with spiritual law, we cannot break natural or nutritional law with impunity. We can, however, through ignorance or misunderstanding, fail to cooperate with it. This does not mean that the law then will not work. Quite the contrary. It will continue to work point by point, while we, ignoring its constancy, will continue to get sick, weak, tired, stiff and old.

Nourishing the Life Force is meant to serve as one means of working with the life force. Read it as a treatise on healing and health or use it as a reference book to help you through a specific challenge. Among the thirty-two chapters are some that deal with alcoholism, cancer, high blood pressure, underweight and overweight, senility, and arthritis, to name just a few.

This book will benefit its readers by helping to remind them to care for their body temples. Bodies are designed to heal themselves and with proper care they will do just that. The responsibility for carrying out this great plan lies with each person.



The Unity Church of Pittsburgh purchased a TRS-80 Model 3 computer in February 1983. The cost of the computer was \$2295.00 (the new model 4 is \$1995.00 and is much better). We chose the RADIO SHACK computer since there are so many new companies in the computer business that do not survive, we didn't want to buy an "orphan."

In addition to the basic computer terminal, we also purchased a DMP-200 (Dot Matrix Line Printer) for around \$800.00. This machine can type about 500 words a minute with various size types and graphics.

Software, which is the program that runs the computer is available from Radio Shack and many other sources. We purchased the following software programs:

1. General Ledger - \$99.95

The General Ledger program keeps all our Center books and accounts. It has space for 100 different accounts. We use about 70 of them at present. It is a true double entry accounting system with an audit trail of accounts for any Center that has an auditor go over their books.

Prior to using the General Ledger program, we spent nearly two weeks out of the month doing books and trying to balance them at the end of each month. Year-end closings were a major activity. With the General Ledger program we can use the computer for about two hours twice a month and have a much more accurate record of accounts. Everything always balances!

2. Profile III+-\$199.95

Profile III+ is really the heart of most of our computer work. This is a DataBase Filing system that can be adapted to meet the individual needs of the center. Its possibilities of center use is a challenge to the imagination. Some of the things we have used it for are:

A. Recording all offerings given to the center during a given year. A monthly print-out of thank you letters giving the monthly or year to date totals of offerings. A report format for the secretary, treasurer, or minister listing who has given what in any period of time. This can be programmed to list all who have given a certain amount over a base figure or any other combinations of information needed.

Prior to using this program, it took two working days each week for the secretary to post all the offerings received during the week. Now we do it in two hours twice a month.

B. Mailing Lists—About 5% of our mailing list changes each month with people moving or new names added. We used to use an Elliot Addressograph and handcut and ink each new stencil prior to use. With Profile III+, we simply type in the new name or make any correction on the computer. At the end of the month, the list is printed out on labels. This can be sorted in any manner you wish. For mailing we use the Zip Code sort. Master lists are also printed out in a report format so the staff can have everyone's name, address and telephone number up to date on their desks.

The mailing list file could also be used for birthdays, hobbies and special interests, talents and occupations and if a member of the center.

- C. Special Files—We have a program that records all weddings, times, dates and who conducted the services. This can also be printed into booklet form (Report format) for constant updating of the Center records.
- D. Other options—It makes a great speech resource file. It is especially good for indexing materials. My personal Library is in one of my own programs. Both Title and Author and subject matter are filed and can be pulled when needed.
- E. Inventory Lists of the Book Room and value of all the books on hand. This is also great at the end of each quarter when we take inventory. We print out a report format and simply update the figures on the report during inventory and enter the new figures into the computer for the next inventory period.
- F. Inventory List of all the Center assets in a permanent file for record keeping.

As I said, this program is only limited by your imagination!

3. Scriptsit and Superscripsit - \$99.95 and \$199.95

This is a Word Processing program in which you can write letters and even books before hard printing them. The advantage is the ability to move words, paragraphs and pages without having to retype everything. Even single words in a manuscript can be replaced wherever it appears. This program also interfaces with Profile III+ and merges the profile files into a letter or document that you may write to every member of the center.

This report on computers is written on a simple tape Scripsit program for \$39.95. It is a little slower than the disk programs but unless you write all day long it serves very well.

The programs from Radio Shack are self-explanatory in helping you set up your individual needs. President's

Letter

In the recent past I have enjoyed the privilege of speaking, as President of AUC, to three very important and exciting groups. In the order in which they occurred, they are: 1) two days of sharing with the YOU and regional sponsors at the annual International YOU Conference at Unity Village; 2) participation in orientation week of USRS and UMS student bodies; 3) speaking on behalf of AUC at the sixty-eighth INTA annual congress at Phoenix, Arizona.

Each of these involvements left their unique and definite impression. They also relate directly to the dynamics of AUC's future. In sharing them, the best place to begin is with the training of ministers, an impact on our movement that concerns everyone, and, having been the subject of a major decision of our membership is still fresh in our minds.

USRS-MEP welcomed its first enrollment of students July 21, 1983. UMS greeted its last graduating class July 22, 1983. The week in which these two groups met and became a body of ministers in training was an important notation in the history of Unity. From personal observation I can say it was a very positive amalgamation of consciousness. During a potentially awkward time of transition, cooperation, openness, receptivity, the spirit of unity was witnessed on every hand. Those who are intimately involved in the transfer of educational administrative responsibilities are making every effort to assure a smooth and harmonious shift. I feel good in reporting that the first step in the new educational partnership with Unity School has been taken with ease. Further, I am confident that such a successful beginning will serve the AUC as an inspiration to rest its concern in this area and direct its energies to other fields of development. One such area being youth education.

I am impressed with what has been happening in the Youth Department of AUC in recent years. Through this department a training and support system had been developed, and, is the resource center which sustains the spirit of regional youth education consultants and YOU coordinators. This activity is drawing attention to itself through the fine results of its labor. An example being that of the latest International YOU conference. It broke all previous attend-

ance records. Though it was the largest in numbers, it was the least beset by problems. The executive staff of Unity School, as well as security people, motel attendants and Inn personnel were highly complimentary of the attitude and behavior of the young people who made up the conference body. The high quality of consciousness among the sponsors is another testimony of the effectiveness of the youth department. I witnessed a great sense of dedication among these people. In every individual, I felt a commitment to the expansion of youth education and recognition within the Unity movement. As a body, they are firm in their call for equal dedication among the leadership of AUC, from field minister to president.

Brooks Myers and Ron Tyson are to be commended for the energy they are putting into the development of a quality youth ministry. Their professionalism has already revealed itself in the programs and materials they have thus far initiated. The morale is high among the regional YE and YOU consultants and coordinators. The demand is growing among Unity families in the field of expanded youth activities in local churches. Youth education can no longer remain a minor service of AUC. Its time has come to take a higher priority in the direction of our movement.

In collecting material for a short address to the International Conference of New Thought Alliance, I came upon some statistics that surprised me. I was also obliged to examine my own conservative attitude of protectionism regarding Unity's image in the New Thought movement. I have always dedicated myself and my career to the AUC. This has taken so much of my time I could not consider involvement elsewhere, such as INTA. As President of AUC, I began to think differently. It suddenly became important for me to move among other New Thought leaders as spokesman and leader of our organization. Research revealed to me that sixty Unity ministries are active members of INTA, representing about fifteen percent of our total field ministries. This convinced me that AUC should officially take part in annual INTA conferences. A telephone call to Blaine Mays, president of INTA, resulted in a warm and generous willingness to adjust the speakers' schedule of the recent INTA conference to include a few words of greeting from the president of AUC.

I was not the first president to represent AUC at an INTA conference. I am probably the first, however, to encourage a precedent for future presidents to follow. I feel strongly that many of the services AUC provides can easily be extended to independent churches in New Thought. This can best be communicated through our participation in INTA. An AUC sponsored literature table, youth education display, and

Unity book and cassette counter are just a few of the obvious ways of showcasing these services. An AUC representative would also gain introduction to the latest and most influential voices in the New Thought movement. In many cases, we would be pleasantly surprised to learn that our own would be among them.

A new era and a new opportunity is before us. In our new thrust in education, the needs of our youth deserve our first consideration. Throughout the New Thought movement, youth education is the one area receiving the least attention and direction. This could well be the area in which AUC makes its greatest contribution.

The last year or more has been a period during which we have seen the highly successful and accelerated use of interim ministers in our Unity churches. Their value has been proved in a number of widely differing situations. In most cases when for any reason a church loses its minister, it is desirable that the church be afforded the stability of receiving a new permanent minister as rapidly as possible. Boards and congregations naturally want the return to the security of stable and effective leadership as soon as is feasible. However, there are some circumstances when the appointment of an interim minister is a much more satisfactory answer to filling the special needs of an individual church rather than the early placement of a permanent minister.

The most obvious situation that calls for the appointment of an interim minister is when for any reason the church is suddenly left without its minister. The causes may be any of the untimely passing of a minister, his being unexpectedly incapacitated, or the peremptory resignation or termination of a minister. In these conditions of abrupt interruption there is a void that needs urgently to be filled by an experienced leader. This is true, whatever the cause, for without effective leadership the momentum of the church is halted. Substitutes may be found to conduct services, but their impromptu and temporary nature is often all too evident. In the meantime one or more board members or the office staff may seek to provide administration, but their inexperience usually quickly becomes apparent. It frequently takes weeks, sometimes months, for a church board to select a permament successor. If the church is left without professional leadership during this time, it may be gravely injured. Attendance and offerings suffer and the church falters. Sometimes, regrettably, local power struggles erupt from which it may take a long period to recover. An appeal to the AUC office for an experienced minister to run the operation can result in the church being kept on an even keel until such time as the new appointment is made.

Of course, all of the above underlines the importance of ample notice being given at any time a change of leadership is indicated. If a minister resigns or is separated by his board for any reason, both minister and board should agree that the minister should remain as administrative head of the church to allow the placement process time to operate. It takes time for the vacancy to be advertized, for applicants to prepare and submit their resumes, for speaking dates to be arranged, for the church to agree on a successor, and finally for the newly-appointed minister to give adequate notice at his church. So at all costs try to avoid abrupt resignations or dismissals, for they are injurious to all concerned.

Another situation in which an interim minister can serve a congregation well is to act as a buffer following a long-term successful minister, before the permanent successor is selected. Whenever a minister has served for five years or more and had substantial support in his church there is the danger that the successor will come in for considerable criticism, however able he may be. The church is the out-picturing of one level of consciousness, the congregation was comfortable with the style and methods of their previous leader. It is only to be expected that there will be those who will take an unfavorable view of an unfamiliar way of speaking, teaching, counseling, management and the like. Experience has taught us that it not infrequently takes two changes of ministers before a congregation totally accepts and grows with their new minister.

In any situation where considerable adjustment is required the interim minister serves not merely as a bridge, but is also useful as a "scape-goat" allowing the release of often unconscious pent-up resentments that otherwise would be vented upon the incoming minister.

Occasionally difficulties occur between church boards and their minister. It is seldom that these difficulties are the exclusive fault of one side, usually, both are partly responsible. This may result in the resignation or release of a minister. At such times the climate is seldom ideal for the immediate appointment of a new permanent minister. A better course is to provide the church with an experienced minister to serve as interim. This allows the congregation and the board to regain their faith in Unity ministers, and also provides an opportunity for an internal evaluation of the church producing desirable changes in bylaws and procedures that will promote a good working relationship between the board and subsequent ministers.

The interim minister can serve as a temporary replacement for the minister who needs vacation relief of from two weeks to two months, or for the minister who feels "burned out" and needs a longer sabbatical, but who does not wish to make a permanent change. Such breaks provide a respite for ministers who are both well established and well accepted,

but who need an extended break for renewal and wish to avoid harmful stress build-up. Some final transfers would be avoided if consideration is given to the appointment of an interim minister.

At this time we have nine ordained ministers serving (or about to serve) in interim positions. Last year Pauline Beauregard was appointed by the AUC as our official interim minister. She maintains an apartment in Lee's Summit, but seldom gets to stay in it for her services are in constant demand. In addition eight other single ministers are performing this useful service somewhere in our regions.

The Oasis Band completed the evening of fun with dancing in the parking lot under the star-filled sky.

Thursday was another spectacular "Show and Tell." Even Myrtle and Charles Fillmore were able to join in on the morning program. FINANCE & BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

An analysis of the audit report of March 31, 1983 reveals an excess of income over expenses amounting to \$10,834.00 achieved by very effective management and controlled expenditures. Love offerings were \$52,400.00 under budget and expenses \$52,000.00 under budget.

Student Book Store Funds "Excess of Income Over Expenses" operations developed a gross profit of \$37,248.00, out of which \$13,731.00 was transferred to Grant-In-Aid Funds for scholarship.

The total expenses of Ministry Services were under budget \$26,994.00. The total expenses of Ministerial Education were under budget \$25,029.00. Total expenses for both departments were under budget \$52,023.00.

A review of the financial reports for the first two months of this fiscal year (April and May) shows Love Offerings amounting to \$87,825.00 or an average of \$43,912.00 per month. To reach the goal of the Projected Income, Love Offerings need to increase by more than \$9,000.00 per month, to a monthly average of \$53,218.00

The revised budget for 1983–1984, including provision for tithe, is \$712,060.00. This compares to projected income of \$719,620.00. In order to meet this projected income, Love Offerings must reflect the increase of \$9,000.00 per month as stated above.

MEDIA AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee is working on a radio broadcast script possibly to be made available to member ministries.

Looking towards holding a special post-graduate program on various types of broadcast equipment and preparation.

The Committee will continue to work on the above areas and resubmit the ideas to the Board of Trustees in January.

LICENSED TEACHER COMMITTEE REPORT

A 10-page Licensed Teacher manual has been produced from materials approved by the Board of Trustees. The cost is \$1.00 per copy and may be ordered through the AUC office.

A new pamphlet, "What is a Licensed Teacher?" is now available for sale at 5¢ per copy, ordered through the AUC office.

Uniform stationery for the Regional Licensed Teacher Representatives is being prepared. Cost to be paid through Licensed Teacher individual budgets or by the regions.

EXPANSION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Expansion Committee recommended \$500.00 Literature Starter Kits to the following ministries: Unity of Lodi, California; Unity of Cape Cod, Massachusetts; Unity of Gainesville, Florida; and Unity of Lawrence, Kansas.

Financial assistance, not to exceed \$1,500, granted to Unity Church for Today, Mountlake Terrace, Washington. This money is to provide assistance in moving expenses for their newly-appointed minister.

Funding to be granted, on an individual basis, to the following ministries for a six month time period, beginning July, 1983: Christ Church Unity, Salt Lake City, Utah, Mike Fotheringham, minister; Unity Universal Wings of Truth, New Orleans, Louisiana, Melvera Brown, minister; Unity in Gaithersburg, Gaithersburg, Maryland, Allen and Anne Quay, ministers; Unity Church of Living Truth, Missouri City, Texas, Lois Caldwell, minister; Unity of Cape Cod, Hyannis, Massachusetts, Janet Hankins, minister; Unity of Gainesville, Gainesville, Florida, Joseph Bettencourt, minister; Unity Church of Christ, Wilmington, North Carolina, Don Allen, minister; Inner City Unity, Omaha, Nebraska, Helen Saunders, minister; Latin American Pioneering Ministry, Los Angeles, California, Mario DeFerrari, minister; Unity in York, York, Pennsylvania, John Tant, minister; Unity Church of Lawrence, Lawrence, Kansas, Ron Field, minister; and Unity of Rochester, Rochester, Minnesota, Vicky Abrams, minister.

NEW POLICY: Recommended moving expenses for established ministries be made available on a one-time basis. This would be in the form of an interest-free loan, not to exceed \$1,500 and to be repaid within 18 months. These funds to be made available only after pioneering considerations have been approved.

The committee sees a need to provide additional assistance to pioneer works after the first year of financial aid has expired. Recommend up to \$1,200, plus travel expenses, for Pauline Beauregard to offer assistance for a one-month period, to struggling pioneer ministries.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

The Program Committee recommended Barbara Marx Hubbard as keynote speaker for the 1984 AUC Conference. Mrs. Hubbard, a futurist, pioneered a global networking newsletter. In 1970 the newsletter led to the formation of the Committee For the Future. She has hosted the television series "Potentials," which focused on "new" news with good news about what people can do for themselves by activating their own potential.

The theme for the 1984 Conference will be "Finding Joy-Past, Present, Future." The 1984 Banquet theme will be "Somewhere in Time or Dimension." Guests will be invited to come as how they were, are, or envision being.

Recommend the Banquet Committee be dissolved and the Program Committee to assume this responsibility.

Recommend the Professional Enrichment Committee become a sub-committee of the Program Committee.

COUNCIL OF EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The council met individually with UMS faculty and staff. The focus of the faculty's responsibilities will be the completion of the 2nd year of studies for current 1st year students.

It is apparent there is a need for a full-time counselor to

be made available for ministerial students. The Unity School Counseling Center is staffed with volunteer workers and there is a need for professionally trained counselors for the ministers in training. This also was passed on to MEC.

Education Liaison Committee will now take over the roles of the Council, such as support and supervision of the faculty during coming year.

The increased number of exceptions to ordination is of concern to the Committee, as it diminishes the education process established by Unity School and the AUC. Policy should be reevaluated and council believes anyone considered an exception should be required to attend one full year of enrollment in ministerial school.

EDUCATION LIAISON COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee made the following recommendations. The recommendations were accepted and passed along to the Ministerial Education Council (MEC).

The spiritual counseling class could be more valuable if the students were supplied with a model counseling guidebook. Providing structured time for intra-personal sharing and processing, and greater exposures to various schools of counseling.

Criteria for graduation and ordination be more clearly communicated to student body and used as basis for progress evaluation.

Progress evaluation should provide early warning service. More realistic evaluations are desired.

There was concern that the AUC and Unity School criteria will not be consistent.

Center operations classes would be enhanced if the students received a basic church-structuring manual, and visiting ministers shared in how to structure a church and outlining day to day activities.

Practicum requirements and availability need to be defined. More participation in Silent Unity and more experience in radio and television is desired.

More pioneering information is needed.

Bible interpretation is needed to provide emphasis on methods for personal and individual interpretation.

More practical and immediate content classes to be scheduled for last term of second year.

INTERNATIONAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee submitted their report on International Ministries which was given to the AUC Executive Committee for further study and recommendation. They will report to the AUC Board of Trustees in January. Recommendations included: need for spanish program for Licensed Teachers and Ministers (however, this is a project to be developed as the Hispanic ministries grow in Unity of purpose); possible Spanish programs offered at Unity Village; research and brainstorm such questions as, how can the AUC support efforts to educate Licensed Teachers in foreign languages?; what are we willing to offer in assistance for developing a Spanish curriculum meeting the standards set by Unity School?; etc.

PROFESSIONAL ENRICHMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Committee reviewed past Conference professional enrichment courses, regional courses and decisions made by the Committee.

A list of speakers' names and courses, which was submitted by field ministers, was discussed. Tape of Barbara Marx Hubbard's futurism seminar was played.

Recommendations were: Barbara Marx Hubbard as keynote speaker (10 credit) and Florence Pert (5 credit), director of Church Volunteers for Marble Collegiate Church in New York, New York, for the 1984 Conference.

An application form on licensed teacher accredited courses was recommended by the committee as a general application form for all regional accredited courses. Each Regional Representative, who would be the one responsible for returning the completed form to the committee, received a copy of the form.

The lack of proper accreditation procedures for regional credit courses was discussed and it was concluded the new form would alleviate these problems.

Recommend the Professional Enrichment Committee merge into one committee with the Program Committee.

STANDARDS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Regional Representatives, as the Standards Committee, presented the following as guidelines for the Director of Ministry Services and for approval by the Board of Trustees.

Recommend a Unity minister be permitted to hold employment outside of the ministry. The type of work must be reviewed with the DMS to insure it is appropriate and not inconsistent with the primary profession of minister. Goal should be that the second employment will not be continued indefinitely, only until the ministry can fully support the minister.

Recommend Black ordinands should be seasoned by working with a Senior Minister for a period of time, and if a ministry capable of hiring and bearing expenses is unavailable, the DMS will place the candidate in a ministry that can utilize abilities and request financial assistance from the Expansion funding to pay moving expenses and salary for the prescribed time.

For Black ministers whose backgrounds suggests success in pioneering, and those wishing to do so, they be given guidelines amassed by Expansion endeavors along with funds through Expansion funding. Ministers pioneering Inner City ministries accumulate guidelines on what works, as well as what doesn't work, to increase success ratio.

The DMS may utilize Regional Liaison Reps to assist in placement of Black ministers whenever a vacancy exists in an existing ministry. The Liaison Rep may meet with the Board of a ministry in which the vacancy exists.

GROUP SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee recommends the following: Cost of the AEtna Insurance was discussed and findings will be submitted to the Executive Committee in September.

Banker's Life Tax Deferred Annuity program be continued as established. Kansas City Bank and Trust be retained as Trustee for the MPPP.

Guidelines for Local Ministries Using "The Word"

The Association of Unity Churches and the Radio/Television department of Unity School have been exploring a way in which local ministries can benefit from "The Word" public service program.

"The Word" is aired over more than a thousand stations worldwide. Some ministries have negotiated with a "Word" station in their local area to follow each broadcast of "The Word" with a brief message that mentions the local ministry. Stations are often happy to provide this service and some appreciate being able to add a local tie-in to the program.

Ministries are encouraged to investigate the possibility of a local tie-in with radio and television stations in their area that air "The Word." At the same time, some stations feel that such a tie-in is a means of obtaining free advertising for the local ministry that should be paid for. These stations feel that adding local tie-in defeats the public service nature of "The Word."

If a station does not air "The Word," it is possible to obtain promotional materials from Unity School that can be taken to the station or Unity School will mail promotional material direct to the station.

It is suggested that the ministry approach a new station with the intent of promoting a public service program only. If the station is receptive, the ministry may then wish to inquire about a local tie-in. Emphasis, however, should be on providing a public service--not obtaining a free promotion.

Unity School discourages ministries from offering to pay for broadcasts of "The Word" that include a tie-in message. "The Word" is produced as a public service program and should not be viewed as paid advertisement.

Unity School is aware of the potential benefit to local ministries that this kind of arrangement provides. The School requests, however, that if an agreement is reached with a local station, the ministry ask the station to send the School's Radio/Television department a brief letter indicating that the "tie-in" will not affect the public service status of "The Word." Your representatives have been sharing with you the activities of the Licensed Teacher Committee, the Post-Graduate week activities and what they are doing in their regions to enhance the role of Licensed Teachers.

As chairman of the Committee I would like to share with you and your minister some of the goals we have and ask for your input, which should go through your representative, to help us serve you better.

By now your Center should have received the pamphlet, "What Is A Licensed Teacher?" and hopefully you have placed your order for the Licensed Teacher Manual through the AUC office. These are but two of the projects we have covered. By putting the Manual in a duo-tang folder we have allowed room for future inserts and update material.

Some time this fall there will be the comprehensive results of the Minister/Teacher surveys which were sent out in the Fall of 1982. This is but one of our stepping stones in upgrading the role of licensed teachers.

Our committee has expanded to include representation from the Spanish speaking community and Maria Soler is now co-chairing along with Bea Copeland and myself, plus we will have Sadye Thomas from the Board of Trustees as the Board representative.

We have worked with Phil White and Janet Manning on the program for the Licensed Teacher Post-Graduate week scheduled for February 1984. We pray that more of you will take advantage of this dynamic week. I, as a minister, receive a renewal of spirit and being open and receptive come away with many old-new ideas with which to work.

You are an important part of the Unity movement and we are working towards your representation in the AUC office as the YOU and youth education departments have a coordinator.

Also, we are working to upgrade the quality and content of the 30 credit electives one takes to become licensed by the AUC, and we are open to your suggestions in this area.

We bless you, we praise you and I am grateful for being a part of this most important committee and give thanks for the guidance and direction of the Christ presence working in and through each one of you.

The Silent-70 pamphlet, "Prayers Are Answered" is no longer available.

HELPFUL HINTS

Two recent actions by the U.S. Congress and Internal Revenue Service are of particular interest to many not-for-profit organizations and clergymen. The following is a brief description of these actions:

- 1. Self-Employment Tax Increase: Clergymen will remain exempt from FICA taxes but will continue to pay social security taxes under the "self-employment" rate. The self-employment rate takes a dramatic jump up to 14% in 1984. To offset some of the increase, a tax credit of 2.7% for clergymen will be provided in 1984. With the tax credit, the effective rate will be 11.3% for the clergymen in 1984. The tax credit diminishes to 2.3% in 1985 and 2% in subsequent years.
- 2. Lay Employees of Not-For-Profit Organizations Subject to Social Security: The "rescue package" for social security approved by Congress included a revision to force all not-for-profit organizations into the social security program as of January 1, 1984. Under prior law, not-for-profit organizations were exempt from social security coverage but could elect to come under social security. The social security tax will be divided equally between employer and employee with each paying 7% of the employees salary (less the 1984 credit of 0.3% for the employee). This change in the social security law affects all churches as well as other not-for-profit organizations.



President's

Letter

Through the years the liaison work with troubled ministries has demanded a large portion of AUC's time and energy. The results of which have sometimes been less than successful in the minds of the principals involved. At times both minister and church were left with the distinct feeling that AUC had bumbled all efforts in solving the problem. This misconception of AUC's function has contributed to everyone's loss. The churches felt they were abandoned, unappreciated, became frustrated and certain that AUC was biased in favor if its fellow ministers. The ministers felt they were abandoned, unloved, became frustrated and convinced that they had been sold down the river by their colleagues. The AUC leadership has felt abandoned, unsupported, frustrated and concerned by the nebulous image our Association presented and the accompanying pressures that have led to the resignation of several talented and dedicated Directors of Ministerial Service.

On previous occasions I have written that as an Association of Unity Churches we must address ourselves to the responsibilities of serving the perpetuation of the whole ministry, rather than the emotions of the factions. I did not, nor do I now, purpose that this be accomplished at the sacrifice of a single colleague's rights or that the needs of our peers go unattended. This is very much the concern of our Board of Trustees. So much in fact that last June a task force was appointed to find ways in which the AUC can better help its fellow ministers deal effectively with the problems of their ministries and provide a rehabilitation program for those who have either burned out or feel overwhelmed by the responsibility of the ministry. This committee is made up of ministers with a vital interest in finding solutions, many of whom have had personal experiences with aforementioned feelings of abandonment. Presently, this committee is busy sharing ideas and drafting a preliminary report for the Board's evaluation and directive. I expect some constructive recommendations laid before the Board at its mid-year meetings. I have no way of knowing what those recommendations will be; however, I have a hunch the solution will be found in ways in which mutual trust, show of caring, expression of love and respect for one another can be demonstrated freely.

I attended the Northwest Unity Ministers' Conference a few weeks ago, and at this meeting time was set aside on the agenda for individual sharing of recent personal experiences. Two things were to be shared: 1) a recent challenge faced, and 2) an inspiration gained. As I listened to people I have known for years trusting me and all the others in the meeting enough to share a painful personal experience, I began to realize that I had only known their persona before, and had confused it with the real person. Before my turn came to share my mind skipped back a few years and I thought of two of our AUC Presidents, Bernard Dozier and David McClure. Who, during their term, thought it would be a good thing if those of us on the Board trusted each other enough to share our personal dreams, challenges, successes, failures, concerns, etc. I remember my reaction when I first heard the suggestion, it was one of resistance. I felt very vulnerable, I didn't want to reveal my pain button. While formulating my plan to resist I heard a prominent leader whom I respect, and consider to have a face of granite, confessing the same fears that I had, the same needs for approval, the same doubts and anxieties. I learned something about my friends during those sharing times, I learned a lot more about me. We are all pretty much the same when we get through the facade of personality and begin communicating with the person behind it.

I have great confidence that when all who make up the structure and spirit of AUC begin seeing our organization as a support unit, upheld, staffed and directed by caring equals and feel confident enough in the system to seek support and guidance before the fat is in the fire, liaison work will become much more effective.

Each month we include in Contact a statement of the general fund operations for the current month and for the year to date. At the foot of this statement there is a two-line item noting the Unity School contributions to the AUC through services provided. Then there follows in parenthesis the observation (Note: This contribution is a non-ledger item and does not appear on the AUC financial statements.). From time to time we receive requests from ministers and board members for information about this item. Therefore, I believe it will be helpful to all concerned if this is explained in some detail.

Reference to that item in this issue reveals that so far in Unity School's fiscal year they have provided goods or services totalling \$53,722.15. This is over the three month period from May 1 to July 31 (note: Unity School's fiscal year ends on April 30, while the AUC's fiscal year ends on March 31). These figures do not appear anywhere in the AUC's books because the AUC does not receive any cash. However, these goods and services are an expense to Unity School. These contributions fall under five main headings.

First, there is Unity Ministerial School. During the three months under consideration Unity School's expense for the UMS amounted to \$10,545.48. Items under this heading included salaries of faculty, supplies, use of facilities, classrooms, etc., insurance, equipment depreciation, utilities and use of library. For the entire 1982/3 12-month fiscal year Unity School contributed \$61,827.25 towards Ministerial Education.

Next comes Projects. This item includes provision of facilities for the AUC Pre-Conference week, Conference, Licensed Teachers' Skill Development Seminar and YOU Conference. In some cases the AUC was charged for facilities, but space valued at \$9,280.44 was contributed free.

The heading Religious Materials includes all the thousands of pamphlets furnished free for Silent-70 distribution and hundreds of subscriptions to DAILY WORD and UNITY Magazines sent to institutions at the request of Unity ministries. Also included are the copies of new books, cassettes and premium booklets sent to ministers in the field. In the three months the School has furnished the field with literature of a total value of \$22,937.53.

An item Miscellaneous covers Unity Inn discounts and Country Club memberships (a 12-month total) to AUC employees in an aggregate amount of \$7,141.86.

Finally, there is the matter of rent of the AUC Office space. Unity School charges the AUC only about 59% of fair market value of the office space, including, rent, utili-

ties and janitorial services. The balance of 41% is treated as a contribution to our work and amounts to \$3,816.84 for the three months.

Thus the total value of the goods and services provided by Unity School to the AUC and UMS during the three months amounted to \$53,722.15. The 12 months total for Unity School's fiscal 1982/3 was \$192,194.44. These are very impressive figures and are illustrative of the measure of support Unity School does give to the field movement and has consistently given over the years.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

"Behold, I make all things new." Those words of God from The Book of Revelation aptly describe the first quarter of this year's ministerial education activities. A new first-year curriculum, a new Student Chapel Service time, the new Common Meal following the service, new offices for the faculty of Unity School for Religious Studies... all these new things and more are here to help the student body prepare for new careers. Of course, there are many new individuals. There is **Bob Barth**, new USRS faculty member who, as Chairman of Ministerial Studies & Skills, is already at work designing a new curriculum for administrative studies; there are six new ministers-in-training who came from the Detroit Urban School to join the second-year UMS class; and there are the thirty full-time students in the first-year USRS Ministerial Education Program.

One fact that is not new is that the members of the new class began their journeys to Unity Village from many different places. One came from British Columbia, one from Puerto Rico, one from Nigeria. All the rest are from the continental United States: Arkansas 1; California 5; District of Columbia 1; Florida 5; Illinois 1; Indiana 1; Massachusetts 1; Michigan 1; Montana 1; New Jersey 1; New York 2; Ohio 1; Oregon 1; Texas 1; Virginia 1; Washington 1; Wisconsin 2. There are no married couples enrolled in the first-year class, but there are two new ministerial teams forming because two of the twenty-one women students are married to Unity ministers.

All the new things are good. Yet, as we watch individuals from the two classes talking, walking, eating, playing and praying together we realize that the very best new things that God is making this year are the same that God makes every new school year--friends.

The theme, "Follow The Son" reinforces the concepts of Truth while providing a fun enviornment that young people can relate to.


The camper is exposed to exciting Bible stories, creative crafts, swimming, nature hikes, lively songs, movies, refreshments, and much more.

"It would seem that there are so many things a computer can do for our church." These words spoken about six months ago got me involved in one of the most complex activities of my life. Since we began searching for the right machine for our office, my staff and I have had an education. I had no idea there were so many computers on the market, nor was I aware of how quickly the field is advancing technilogically. We actually ordered one computer system from IBM only to find out it was no longer available. (A move which saved us money and helped us learn more in the long run.)

We have finally made our choice, and in fact at this writing are anticipating delivery of part of our system this week, six months after allocating funds for the purchase. I hope to share enough of what I learned so that you might quickly decide if you want, can use and afford a computer.

First, see if you can find someone in your congregation who is familiar with computers, and preferably software. Software tells the machines what to do, and is of primary importance. Many sales persons claim their systems can do anything. You need someone on your side who knows for sure what can be done. It may be true that they can do it all, but only with long, elaborate, and costly programs. You may also find a consultant in your town. These are people who don't necessarily represent any one company, but will either free, or for a small fee, analyze your needs and recommend a system.

Second, decide what you will want the machine to do. They are great for mailing lists, and can type individual letters to the whole list. How about records of giving? Accounting and financial statements are possibilities. If you do bulletins and newsletters, the word processing programs allow you to compose and paste up, provided you have a letter quality printer as opposed to a dot/matrix printer. Study your mailing list and decide how much you want to know about each person on it. This information is critical for the storage capacity calculations for your machine.

Third, try to decide what software will be required. It can be very beneficial to find off the shelf programs because they are so much more inexpensive. Custom programs cost more and take longer to get operational. A program to handle your lists can usually be merged with another standard word processing program to generate a personalized letter to all on the list, those who are supporting the church, members only, families with children

or anything else you decide. Some systems also have use of software called program generators which allow you freedom to be your own programmer with a minimum of experience and training. Once you find programs you like, you have narrowed your search for a computer because the internal system design must mesh with the program you have selected. Most operating systems today use either one called CP/M or IBM MS/DOS. Either of these gives you access to many off the shelf programs. Insist upon seeing the program work the way you want it to. Any serious vendor will be glad to set up a demonstration for you. Some will even bring the equipment to you.

Finally, select a computer system. If you have consulted a software professional, he or she will often help you find the hardware you need. Cost does vary considerably, and thus you need to decide what you want to do. Some terms that you will run into are: user-friendly, multi-tasking and ergonomically designed.

USER-FRIENDLY

User-friendly means, "what does the keyboard look like?" Most people are using the IBM typewriter set up which is fine for those people who can already type. It is advisable to have a 10 key function for accounting, and also up-dating giving lists. There is also a word processing pad available which has arrows, etc. This eliminates the need for over-lays or extra symbols on typing keys.

MULTI-TASKING

Multi-tasking means a system can be used for more than one thing at a time. For instance, labels can be printing while word processing is being done. Often for this, more than one terminal is required, and this also eliminates a personal computer.

ERGONOMICALLY DESIGNED

Finally, ergonomics is a term used to describe some mechanical functions. Some screens tilt, and can be adjusted for brightness. Keyboards can be loose from the terminal, which allows for leaning back and holding it on your lap. All of these things can add to the ability to store much information without fatigue. There are a multitude of other computer terms that you will find as you begin your search. Most of them need to be explained by someone more qualified than I am at this stage.

There are a few cautions that I feel necessary to share with you.

- Don't waste time looking at off the shelf church programs. They are set up for orthodox churches and are quite expensive and contain a lot of useless functions.
- 2. Don't get involved in long term leasing programs. Your system will be obsolete in about three years at the present rate of growth and costs are dropping.
- 3. Insist upon an expandable system. You will find new uses very quickly, and many of these will require add-on components.

- 4. Check out computer services being done for you without you having to buy the equipment. The disadvantages of not having control may be offset by lower costs.
- 5. Don't get in a hurry. It is going to take a long time to get your machine, get your program running, get the data stored and really begin using. Remember, you got along without it this long, you can do it a little longer.

Hopefully, by next month, we will have experienced enough to be able to follow this up with some more detailed information on how our programs and machines are working. I do think that every church needs to at least consider a computer. There really are a multitude of ways you can cut costs, save time, and ultimately keep yourself and your congregation better informed about what is going on.

Talk Topics and Sermon Starters from Unity Publications

This Month: Commitment of Love, by Eric Butterworth

Eric Butterworth explores love-perhaps the most discussed and least understood word in religion. He declares love is a divine faculty, not something to be found or to do, but something to be.

This single album cassette could be used for counseling in groups, with singles, about-to-be-married people, or married couples.

In discussing true transcendental love, Mr. Butterworth covers situations such as marriage, living together, casual affairs, desperate relationships, and spiritual helpmates. He explains why so many marriages fail, and why some marriages should fail rather than continue in what he explains is a "purgatory of false expectations."

He views love as a basic step in the "fundamental purpose of life, which is to unfold our inter-inner splendor and to progressively come closer to the union of our human and divine self." In this context there can be no joining together in a marriage ceremony, for we are all already joined in our oneness with God and each other, he explains.

Mr. Butterworth's sense of humor eases the discovery that it is useless to look for a perfect mate. He insists: "Perfect people don't get married; they don't need to." But, he says, we can find within ourselves the transcendental love, the love that sees beyond faults in ourselves or others. He adds that differences may be more important to a good relationship than common interests, for where there are no differences, there is often indifference.

Quoting Charles Fillmore in saying, "Love is not the plaything of human volition, but the action of divine law. Mr. Butterworth brings us to the conclusion that in order to love or be loved, we must be still and let God be God in us.

President's

Letter

The other day I left my car to be serviced while I went out of town on AUC business. The dealership where I purchased my car, and returned it for service, provides transportation to customers' homes, places of business, airport, etc. In my case, it was the airport. As it turned out, eight other people were going to the airport also. Thus, nine people, in addition to the driver, were obliged to fit into a nine passenger station wagon. As we all squeezed in, holding our luggage on our laps, we discovered that our lady driver was only five feet tall, couldn't reach the brake, and could barely see over the dashboard. She said: "Gentlemen, I'm going to need your help to push the front seat forward." The two men sitting in the front seat, and the three of us in the middle seat, put our hearts and muscle into the task and catapulted the front seat forward as far as it would go, sending the two m n in the front up against the windshield. However, this did put the driver in excellent position to manipulate the necessary equipment to safely drive the car. As we pulled into traffic, she said: "It ain't easy being five feet tall." At this point, the tallest occupant of the front seat, speaking with a sun visor in his mouth, replied: "Sometimes it ain't easy being six feet three either."

This is an appropriate analogy of life. Some people are stretching, trying to adjust themselves into adequately filling a role. Others are cramped in their station of life, impatient to be freed of the tethers of mediocrity. Some try to alleviate the stress of these extremes by helping adjust the driver's seat. Most just go along for the ride.

This analogy also speaks of our predicament in AUC. As I travel around our movement, I talk to a lot of people who speak in subtle ways of their feelings of smallness and fears of inadequacy. Something within them yearns to stretch into the driver's seat and control the direction of their lives and view the future of their ministries with greater confidence. They look to AUC to help them move closer to the control panel.

I also talk to people who feel temporarily confined by the present goals and direction of AUC. They feel closed in upon, unable to stretch into the maximum of their potential. Pressed against the windshield, they look to the AUC to pioneer expanded vistas.

Some are riding along waiting to see what will develop. In this group, I see a refreshing sign of eagerness to get involved with our goals, plans, policies and commitments when they are more clearly defined as our mission.

I am truly impressed by the number of dedicated people filling our national board positions, standing committees and sub-regional committees who are earnestly involved in making the AUC a service organization that benefits everyone. Through their efforts, ways are being sought and tried for making the DMS position more creative and less dominated by liaison needs. One example being the growing tendency of the regions in accepting the responsibility of aiding local ministers and ministries in their growing, stretching desires at demonstrating confidence and greater effectiveness in their direction. An exhaustive executive search is now being conducted by the executive committee in filling the position recently vacated by Charles Neal. This search has already been publicized to the field and will be publicized in professional journals, if necessary, in order to find qualified applicants. As the pressure of liaison work is taken from this job, the executive committee is open to the possibility of a person trained in management, but not necessarily a Unity minister, filling the position. A questionnaire has also been circulated to the field asking for input regarding immediate needs of the field, and, visions of where the AUC should be in the next decade and beyond. As information from this questionnaire comes in, and as we provide our new DMS an environment conducive to creative planning and administration of executive matters, we can then get on with providing better services and support to a greater cross section of needs on the field.

During this month, traditionally set aside for the counting of blessings, I am very grateful for the spirit I feel stirring the minds and hearts of so many in AUC. I am truly appreciative to be working with people who demand much of the AUC, and who have the ideals and commitment needed to transform those demands into success.

A state Supreme Court recently reversed the ruling of a lower court in what may be a landmark decision possibly affecting Unity centers. The Missouri Supreme Court ruled on Tuesday, September 20, that the Bookstore in downtown Kansas City, affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention, should not be exempt from paying taxes. The Kansas City Times carried this information as part of an Associated Press story.

The store is owned by the Sunday School Board of the Baptist Convention based in Nashville, Tennessee, and which owns and operates similar bookstores throughout the United States. The convention had contended that it was not liable for \$13,612.00 in taxes over a two year period. It based its contention on a provision in the Missouri Constitution that allows property used exclusively for religious worship or for purely charitable purposes to be exempt from taxes. The group stated all profits were used for charitable purposes.

The 6 to 1 majority decision handed down by the court noted that the Baptist Bookstore's sales were to the general public and were made at competitive retail prices and so it was not substantially different from any other bookstore selling religious books. Judge Warren Welliver commented "A business cannot compete for profit and then seek to insulate itself from taxation by claiming its profits were used to attain a religious or charitable purpose,"

This decision, of course, applies to the state of Missouri. Each state has its own unique constitution and legal structure and it is not unlikely that the taxing authorities in other states will have become aware of the possibilities of increased revenue.

The decision might also conceivably have an application to the bookrooms operated in many Unity churches. There are of course certain essential differences, but it should alert ministers and boards of possible implications. Center bookrooms are generally all housed in the church building and not in a separate main street location. Nevertheless, doubtless some sales are made to the general public and this seems to have been a factor in the decision. Certainly those centers that take space in the Yellow Pages and other media to advertise their well-stocked metaphysical bookstore to the general public might deem it prudent to review their situation and take local legal advice as to the wisdom of continuing this practice.

Another matter for consideration is the growing range of materials that some church bookrooms offer for sale. Generally, it is thought that any religious, devotional, or self-help book, including the Bible, volumes on meditation, prayer, healing, and prosperity, and certainly anything published by Unity School, is acceptable. However, some

church bookrooms offer all sorts of items for sale, some of which have but little claim to be supportive of Unity's teachings. Notwithstanding this, some legal minds hold the purist view that only materials published by Unity School would withstand a challenge in the courts.

The tax-exempt status of religious organizations is a privilege that should be zealously guarded. It was given to religious organizations by the founding fathers of this country out of their own deeply held spiritual conviction. Today a new secular mood is making itself felt. We will do well to avoid risking losing our privileges because of the desire for extra profits by way of the bookroom.

Whilst on the subject of things legal, at its recent meeting, members of the Executive Committee expressed concern that Unity churches should not be sponsoring raffles. These are illegal in some states and an embarrassing situation might be provoked by sending material through the mail. Anyway, it is difficult to reconcile the necessity of seeking to raise funds by this method with Unity's exalted yet so practical prosperity teachings. Equally, the Executive Committee felt that as ministers we should refrain from sending raffle tickets or any form of financial appeal to other member churches. Let us rather seek to build consciousness and come into the awareness of the all providing love of God as our one Source and Sustainer.

STANDARDS COMMITTEE REPORT

The June 1983 Standards Committee Report is reprinted below in its entirety. Please disregard the abbreviated report, printed in the September issue of CONTACT.

STANDARDS COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES June 9, 1983

The Director of Ministry Services, through the Board of Trustees during the January, 1983, meetings, asked the Standards Committee to consider and to make recommendations on the following two items:

- 1. Whether or not it should be permissible for a Unity minister to hold a second position of employment.
- 2. In view of the increasing numbers of black ministers we are ordaining, to present a proposal of positive advocacy for the placement of black ministers.

During January 1983, the Regional Representatives, as the Standards Committee, met: we unanimously present the following as guidelines for use by the Director of Ministry Services, and for approval by the Board of Trustees.

- 1. In view of the need for an increasing number of ordinands to pioneer new ministries and/or rejuvenate established ministries in economically unstable positions, as well as for experienced ministers who may wish to assume either such challenge, we recommend that a Unity minister be permitted to hold employment outside of his/her ministry. It is further recommended that the type of work contemplated be reviewed with the Director of Ministry Services to insure that the secondary position is appropriate work and that it is not inconsistent with the person's primary profession of being a Unity minister. As to the hours it is permissible to work each week, it is not our intention to set an arbitrary number of hours, but rather to establish the premise that the amount of outsidethe-ministry work time should in no way compromise the primary position as minister. One goal should be that eventually the second employment will be discontinued entirely.
- 2. In an effort to utilize most efficiently the talents and capabilities of black ministers in the Unity Movement and to facilitate their placement in an existing ministry, irrespective of the demographic composition of races comprising that ministry, we recommend:
 - a. That in the instances it is felt a black ordinand should be "seasoned" by working with a Senior Minister for a period of time, such as might be prescribed by the L & O Committee, that if a ministry capable of hiring and bearing the expense of an Associate Minister is unavailable, that the Director of Ministry Services:

- 1. place the candidate in any ministry which can utilize his/her abilities; and
- to request financial assistance from the Finance & Budget Committee, through the Expansion Committee, to pay the candidate's moving expenses and salary for the period of prescribed time.
- b. That black ministers whose background suggests the strong likelihood of success in beginning a pioneering ministry, and those wishing to do so, be given practical guidelines amassed by our previous Outreach and Expansion endeavors along with funds insofar as possible from our Finance & Budget Committee, through the Expansion Committee, and our loving prayers of support for their success. We further recommend that ministers pioneering Inner City ministries accumulate guidelines on what works, as well as what doesn't work, to increase our posterity's success ratio.
- c. That at his discretion, the Director of Ministry Services utilize Regional Liaison Representatives as positive advocates to assist in placement of black ministers wherever a vacancy exists in an existing ministry. Specifically, this might include, but not be limited to, the Representative's meeting with the Board of Directors of a ministry with a vacancy, and hand-carry resumes of black minister(s) as well as the resumes of non-black candidates. (As a procedural guideline, we suggest the compiling of case histories by experienced Liaison Representatives to assist less experienced Representatives in accomplishing this particular assignment.)

All your church's donation files, word processing, financial statements and mailing lists can be done by computer in a fraction of the time and effort it would take to do them manually. There's only one problem: the state of the art in computers is changing so fast that most information on the subject is out of date by the time it hits the press. I hope this article, which is based on research done by Unity Church of Alhambra, helps you to make an informed choice.

First, there are three main parts to a computer system: the hardware (the computer itself), the software (the programs that tell the computer what to do) and the printer (which prints the results). Up until 1982, each of these three parts were sold separately. Now there are package deals available which can save you thousands of dollars as compared to purchasing each part by itself.

Our church bought a portable Kaypro II, with several free software programs that retail for more than the computer, and a letter quality daisy wheel printer, for under \$3,000. The price at this writing is around \$500 less (\$2,500). Several hundred additional dollars could be saved by substituting a lower quality dot matrix printer for the daisy wheel device. The popular Radio Shack TRS 80 system, with comparable features, would cost \$5,000, mainly because of the cost of buying the software separately.

The first part of a computer system is the hardware. Most computers consist of a keyboard, a CRT (a television screen), and a drive system (a church system would need two disk drives; one for the program and one for the memory storage). Some computers offer each of these as separate components, but many of the newer business computers are all in one. One word of warning: do not try to "make do" with a cassette tape drive. It is slow and hazard prone. Invest in two disk drives, because the software can simply be inserted in the top drive, and work you do will be reliably stored in the bottom drive. The cheapest and easiest way to buy your hardward is to buy it all in one unit.

The best buys in computers right now are in the portables. These are sewing machines size computers that weigh 25 pounds or less and can be carried anywhere. They come with a handle on the back, and fold up for easy transport-CRT, keyboard, disk drives and all. They also usually include the best deals on free software. The first portable that was invented is also the cheapest: the Osborne 2. Its CRT has only a 5" screen, but retails for around \$1,200. The new Osborne Executive has a 7" CRT, but costs more. There is even an Osborne that is compatible with most IBM software, but it is even more expensive.

Our church bought the Kaypro II, because it did everything the Osborne did, yet had a 9" CRT (which is easier on

the eyes). There are also newer Kaypro models, which have more memory capacity, but cost more. There are other brands of portables, but they are more expensive. The two I mentioned have taken 80% of the portable market. The other reason to buy a portable, besides price, is that it can be taken home by the secretary, minister or treasurer, and then returned to the church. Books and articles can be written, newsletters done, statements prepared, letters composed--all at home. The printing can be done at the church the next day.

The software is the second part of a computer system. Instead of having to program your computer to perform the specific things which you want it to do, you can buy software programs which already have done it. That way, you will avoid having to reinvent the wheel. The software that is free with our Kaypro II includes two accounting spread sheet systems, two spelling checkers (that's right, you needn't misspell commonly used words again), a word processing program, a calculation program, two programming languages, and GAMES! If purchased separately, these would retail for over \$3,000. Without having to do any programming yourself, you can use the standard software to do all the things I listed in the first paragraph of this article. The Osborne and other portables also include comparable software packages.

The third item, the printer, is the one that is the simplest to understand. In short, you plug it into the computer, and print what it is you have been working on. A letter-quality daisy wheel printer is a must for a church, because your computer can do word processing better than your type-writer can, it can generate your newsletters and bulletins, and it can create personalized letters for a love offering acknowledgement to each name on your mailing list. A dot matrix printer costs less, but does not look like it was typed on a typewriter. It looks unprofessional, and will limit the uses for your computer.

There will be many advances in the field of computers the next several months, but there is no need to wait. I have found that writing takes me less than half as long with a computer as with a typewriter. Mailing lists can be kept up to date at a fraction of the cost and effort. Records can be kept and acknowledgements can be mailed with little difficulty. A monthly statement can be computed in minutes. It may not be cost or time effective to put all of your accounting on the computer, because the available programs force you to conform your bookkeeping system to a rigid format. To hire a programmer to make a program from scratch that coincides with your present system would cost at least \$2,000 in labor costs, according to experts I have spoken with. Ready-made programs are becoming available for churches, but you will be paying for many things you will not need for a Unity church, such as records-keeping for weekly or monthly pledges.

These limitations notwithstanding, a computer is a tool that will not only cut down on time and work, but will improve the quality of the work and increase the professionalism of your church.

SILENT UNITY MINISTRY TO THE DEAF

An exciting new ministry is underway in Silent Unity-a service for deaf and hearing-impaired persons. A TTY (teletypewriter) machine, which enables deaf and hearing-impaired persons with a TTY or similar machine to telephone for prayer help day or night, has been installed in the Silent Unity Telephone Prayer Room. Unity School officials are confident that this new service will provide help to many people in need.

If you or the members of your congregation know of deaf persons who have a TTY or TDD (telecommunication device for the deaf), you may want to tell them about this new ministry in an item in your bulletin.

A special line has been installed for the exclusive use of the hearing-impaired. The number is 816–525–1155. Deaf persons may also use this line to make routine inquiries of any department of Unity School. It should be emphasized that the regular Unity School and Prayer Room numbers, including the 800 toll-free number, are not equipped to answer TTY calls. At the present time the TTY is not on a toll-free line. Possibly this will come in the future.

An estimated 22 million deaf and hearing-impaired persons live in the United States and more than 75,000 TTY's and TDD's are in service. Some of these are probably in your area. For information on how to start a TTY ministry in your church or center, contact the AUC Office.

The recent changes in the regulations governing Social Security have caused some uncertainty in the minds of some ministers and church administrators. As a result of Public Law 98-21 (Social Security Amendments of 1983) all nonprofit organizations described in section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code will be required to pay Social Security taxes in respect of all employees who are paid \$100 or more during the calendar year starting January 1st, 1984. Previously churches were exempt from such FICA taxes--now this will no longer be so.

Usually the persons affected will be secretaries, recep-

tionists, librarians, soloists, organists and janitors or gardeners, where these are paid for their services. No taxes are involved where the services are rendered on a volunteer basis. However, ministers are not included. In other words all paid employees who receive \$100 or more in a calendar year, other than the minister, must now be covered by Social Security; and the church is charged with the responsibility of collecting the employee's share and of paying its own share on a quarterly basis.

The uncertainty arises when some persons who render service prefer to be regarded as independent contractors. We have sought legal advice for our churches and those consulted are rather guarded in their expression of opinions. It would seem that the crux is one of control as to when the services are performed. When the secretary, librarian or receptionist is required to be in attendance on specified days and times, this one would clearly come within the scope of the new regulations. This also applies to the janitor who also performs custodial duties and is required to open and close the building at stated times.

There is however a gray area when the janitor is free to come in at any time that he pleases during the week to clean the church provided that it is clean and shining by, say 9:00 a.m. each Sunday morning. He might have some justification for being an independent contractor. The same might be said of the lawn and groundskeeper, particularly if he has other persons or organizations whom he serves.

Traditionally many soloists and organists have thought of themselves as being independent contractors. However, I am advised that the probability is the IRS will view them as employees for the purpose of Social Security. The reasoning being that the church or minister is able to demand that they perform at a stated time.

Before you decide not to treat a paid person as an employee it is recommended you consult the local IRS office. Should it later be discovered that you have not collected and paid FICA and income taxes in respect of an employee to whom this regulation does apply, the resultant amount demanded plus penalties would be considerable.

The form to report FICA taxes and withheld income taxes is form 941 (do not file form 941E). You should begin filing this form beginning with tax return due April 30, 1984, for wages paid during the first quarter of 1984. Any wages paid during that period that are for services rendered before January 1st are not subject to FICA taxes. For additional information on this subject and directions for making the required deposits, ask your local IRS for Publication 15 (Circular E) Employer's Tax Guide.

All ministers now become self-employed persons, and churches should no longer treat them as employees. Hitherto a portion of the FICA taxes of some ministers have been paid by the church. This new regulation may work hardship on some church employees and ministers, for the additional sum now to be paid by individuals is not insignificant. Boards of Directors of churches will want to examine the impact on individual ministers and employees and see whether some adjustment of the total salary package is called for.

Debi, as Expansion Coordinator, has kept in touch with our study groups, our emerging ministries, has edited Contact and has coordinated arrangements for the AUC Annual Conference.

Succeeding Cheryl will be Olga Kline who is transferring from the Unity School Visitors' Center. Among her many other qualifications Olga is fluent in both written and spoken Spanish. This will be a great convenience to our many Spanish-speaking friends who will be able to call or write and get speedier response from this office.

Kathy Proctor who has been on the staff for several months will be taking on Debi's responsibilities. Kathy is herself a long-time Truth student, having worked in the Springfield, Missouri, and other churches and has had first-hand experience with study groups.

EDUCATIONAL NEWS & VIEWS

At the beginning of the school year, friends asked, "How do you like wearing two hats?" I could not answer then because at first, aside from meeting once with the Ministerial Education Council, my only new functions were initialling purchase orders and signing checks. More of the director's responsibilities have been added, but they do not conflict with my primary assignment of this year--to prepare the Unity Ministerial School class of 1984 for graduation.

"Wearing two hats" is not as tricky as it might seem because several non-UMS responsibilities of the dean of faculty are now the responsibilities of the director of education-among them the writing of this column (now renamed to indicate the wider scope of its content), corresponding with and about licensed Unity teachers and teacher-candidates, arranging and supervising the Skill Demonstration Seminar (the final phase in the preparation of licensed Unity teachers), acting as an advisor to the Urban Ministerial School in Detroit and as an official AUC representative in liaison matters.

Though in the future, I shall evaluate plans of the Youth Education Department, for now I am supervising the personnel but not the programs; Brooks Myers and Ron Tyson take care of YE, YOU and YAU most competently. Janet Manning and the USRS faculty in conjunction with the Licensed Teachers Committee have already planned the Licensed Teachers Post-Graduate Week for February 1984, so my involvement with it will be slight; but during the January 1984 meetings, I will start work with the Committee. At that time, I shall also meet with the Professional Enrichment Committee to discuss future programs for the personal and professional growth of both ministers and teachers.

It is hoped that with a central person to oversee the total educational activities of the AUC, a coordinated program will emerge to help us continue to fulfill the educational goal of the AUC which is implied in the opening statement of the Code of Ethics: "As Unity ministers we dedicate ourselves to the principles of Truth as taught and exemplified by Jesus Christ and interpreted by the Unity School of Christianity and the Association of Unity Churches."

The answer to the question is fairly obvious: "I like wearing two hats."

Youth Education Report Ron Tyson



SLINGSHOT MAKERS

While serving as a workshop leader at the YAU Conference at Unity Village this past summer, a young adult shared with me a giant-like problem he was confronted with. There was a real challenge in his life.

Sooner or later every youth is confronted by a Goliath of sorts. These Goliaths come in all shapes and sizes, and affect our nation's most prized possession--our young Davids.

Recall the fascinating Biblical adventure recorded in I Samuel, Chapter 17. David, son of Jesse and youngest of eight brothers, had been sent by his father to the battlefront with some food from home. He arrived to find the Israelites intimidated by an arrogant, big-mouthed giant known to everyone as Goliath of Gath. The giant's challenge for someone to face him in battle had gone unanswered.

Obviously, the Israelites needed a champion, someone who would fight their battle and restore their confidence.

David, a young shepherd, accepted the giant's challenge. Choosing five smooth stones from the brook nearby, he drew his trusty slingshot from his pouch and went bravely to face the fierce Goliath.

Would young David face the giant with a slingshot? Was he mindless? The question, however debatable, was answered as soon as David fixed the stone in the leather sling, spun it around his head, and let it fly straight for the temple of the giant Philistine. That's all it took--one smooth stone from the perfectly aimed sling of a well-trained shepherd boy. Down fell the giant, victim of a boy whose faith was more than enough to lift his countrymen from their knees and to see them in hot pursuit of Goliath's kinfolk.

Interestingly enough, one rather important factor in the heroic drama has been overlooked: Who taught David to use that slingshot?

I submit, handling a slingshot with dexterity does not come easily nor without effort. You don't just go out one day and become David the giant killer. Someone taught David how to use a sling. Whoever taught him is to be commended—he not only strengthened a nation but gave a shepherd boy dignity, a feeling of being wanted and needed, confidence, knowledge that saved his life, and the opportunity to lead an army of soldiers, moving forward in faith and believing in God.

In this Bible story can be found the reason for and reward of the youth education program in Unity. Our Regional Con-

sultants, YE Directors, Teachers, and other faithful workers within our church teach young people how to discover the Christ within and how to use the divine gifts God has given them.

As we come to the close of another calendar year, let us commend all of our dedicated teachers. Their influence and efforts will remain forever as "... treasures in heaven, where neither moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal..."

Each one of us should ask ourselves: "Are we teaching some 'young David or Debbie' to use their slingshot?"

COMPUTERS AND THE MINISTRY

For the past three years I have owned and worked with an Apple II plus computer. I find that the machine has tremendous potential to aid in the ministry and it also opens the door to certain frustrations if it is viewed incorrectly.

With the Word Processing program 'Word Handler' it is very easy to create and edit talks and lessons. I find that the computer's ability to edit allows the ideas to flow and then easily and quickly be reorganized into the appropriate sections of the lesson. Also updating and revising lessons with new material is very easy. If you also have a File Management Program, which at this time I do not, other possibilities are available in storage and retrieval of information. However, a File Management Program necessitates the creation and input of the information you wish to retrieve. If you have a functional card file system and the time or a person to enter the data, finding information will be greatly simplified.

We are beginning to work with mailing lists and form letters, however, we are still just learning in this area.

In most churches under 1,000 member using a computer for bookkeeping takes far more time than a good manual system. So at this point, we are not using our computer in that way.

The most important thing that I have learned so far is that a computer is only as useful as the operator's knowledge of the machine, the program and the goal.

Expansion Funding

Marketing in the Church

Marketing may be the last thing you would associate with a church. However, a recently completed research project I was involved with indicates that all non-profit organizations, including churches, would serve people's needs more adequately and attract larger numbers of people if these organizations used modern marketing practices. Ministers and church administrators are typically busy with day to day operational duties and in creating classes and services they believe are expected in a church setting. Alan Andreasen writes for Harvard Business Review that this sort of activity is giving priority to the product or service rather than to what people actually need and want.

Marketing includes the methods by which an organization presents its products and services and in meeting the needs of the public. Marketing may begin by having an especially appointed marketing person or committee or by making marketing a part of an existing job description. Important

to the marketing package is reaching out to new prospects, learning the needs and desires of the people who are or will be served, setting short and long-term goals, developing the service, promoting and announcing the services, products, and/or activities, and training leaders to accept responsibility for various services and activities. All these must be in keeping with the whole purpose and theme of the organization.

A good marketing program is useful for several reasons. There is a great deal of competition in the market place. Churches compete with television, with sports, and with many educational and social activities in the community. Letting people in the community know you are there and what you are about, is important. Marketing can tell you where you are and where you want to go. It helps the organization to adapt quickly to new situations, and to have a design that fits its specific service.

According to William Andres in Vital Speeches, it is the consumer who must set the trends. The questionnaire responses for this particular research project indicate that first and foremost people want an inspiring Sunday lesson that can be related to their everyday lives. The second consideration people have in this limited study is the desire to be with others of similar belief where they can grow spiritually and have a support system. Next, people say that uplifting group prayer or meditation is part of their desire to attend church services. This, of course, is Unity's basic function, to live and work from a foundation of prayer. Other factors people are interested in to a lesser degree are friendliness of others at services, sufficient parking, location, music, acoustics, physical surroundings.

Some of the miscellaneous findings of this study are that people who are not married attend church more often than people who are married, people in the 55-69 age range attend most frequently--one or more times a week, the monthly bulletin was rated by frequent attendees as the best means of communicating church information, most people felt they would not attend more often even if more classes and activities were added. These same facts may or may not be true in your church.

The conclusions of the study were that in some instances, individually addressed invitations and an extensive advertising campaign will reach people who do not either read their bulletin or receive one. It was also noted that perhaps people who did not respond to the questionnaire would be interested in classes and activities other than what is now being given.

This information is limited by the short questionnaire, the location of the church and the small number of people surveyed. It may help you in adding a new dimension to your thinking. You may even want to survey your own congregation.

Special thanks to the fifty-six ministers who responded to the questionnaire mailed to a sampling of one hundred ministers in order to get input for a congregant questionnaire and especially to those who shared their own questionnaires and other information. This study was conducted as part of the requirements for a Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Relations and Organizational Development.
