


THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

This Could Happen To You

"Your sermon on Sunday. . .touched me so deeply that I feel a need to write and express my gratitude. I have been attending your church for about two months (from another New Thought church) and each week I listen to (your church credo): where Truth is taught, hurts are healed, and we learn to live our lives in Love.' And although these words are beautiful and the people appeared friendly, I must admit I have had my reservations. (I came) out of a home where I was physically, sexually, emotionally, and spiritually abused. I don't yet trust people easily and authority figures rank lowest on my list. So it was with deep awe and respect that I listened to you courageously, truthfully, and with great dignity share your humanness. Your words struck a chord of joy in my soul... I'm looking for someone who will walk the walk as she talks the talk--someone to inspire me and walk beside me. . . . Thank you again. . . I am enclosing my application for church membership. I know I have truly found 'a spiritual home where Truth is taught, hurts are healed, and we learn to live our lives in Love.' "

These words were written to a minister who has served five years in the field and about three of these years in the church referred to. She had just finished the first portion of a spiritual mentoring process (called VisionQuest) and shared (with her congregation) its impact on her and her own spiritual insights. Then she wrote a letter to me describing her feelings:

"Two weeks out from my VisionQuest has found me still rapidly transforming. It is sheer bliss to have rediscovered 'me' again and to live in the present more each moment. The bottom line really is, 'there is no place (I need) to get to!' I love and support your magnificant healing ministry...thank you for...assisting me on my own personal path of discovery."

I received this letter after the VisionQuest back in May. I have had regular telephone contact with the minister and know that her renewal process and ministry are still going strong. (In fact, she's just become engaged to be married!)

This could happen to you. You, too, can experience a powerful sense of deepening and renewal. During our January meetings dozens of us met to facilitate more Association support of ministry development and spiritual renewal programs for Unity leaders. We opened ourselves to information, programs, retreats, renewal sites and ideas both within and outside Unity. Our Executive Committee also reviewed the preliminary information that Barbara O'Hearne developed in her field focus groups in 1991. Three of our Association standing committees will be tasked to provide further information to you at our Convention in June at Pheasant Run. Other information will be distributed to you through both the Minister's Letter and CONTACT.

Please look for information in your Conference programs for the Renewal Program already scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, June 15 and 16. Your Association is serious about providing you opportunities for your own and your church's spiritual renewal and transformation locally, regionally, and nationally.



Must Reading: Tax News Alert ALL MINISTERS

Now that I have your attention, before I share three items of very important tax information, I need to say "thank you" to all who made your Association's new dream home a reality.

From the minute your Board of Trustces approved the purchase and completion of our new building, the staff morale began to rise and it continues to do so daily. We no longer have to back out of our offices (offettes) to change our minds.

We thank God for ideas that have come through committees, board members, staff, volunteers, donors, our coworkers at Unity School, and you. We are grateful for God's abundance to be able to acquire and finish and furnish your new Association headquarters. We thank each of you who have given to help us in dream-making; we thank those of you who are giving so that this dream can be paid off ahead of schedule; and we thank you for your continuing ideas, prayers, and money to bring the next phase of our dream into reality by the time the 21st century is upon us.

We are keenly aware that the building is only a vehicle or tool to help us support you, our ministers and ministries, and to expand Unity's message and movement through coming years, but we want to share our joy with you. We praise God for

the quarters which housed us for the first quarter-century of our organization in Unity School's Administration Building and we praise God for our new home. (Headquarter's Highlights--in this issueshares photos of the big move.)

Now let's return to the mundane and necessary Tax News Items.

Great Lakes and Eastern Regional Conference attendees PLEASETAKE SPECIAL NOTE; There exists the probability you received misinformation from the tax workshop presenters.

The Great Lakes presenter said that he thought most Unity ministers qualified as self-employed for income tax as well as for social security tax. We believe that the presenter must have a false notion about how the majority of Unity ministers function; from IRS literature and from what we know about how Unity ministers function, Young Bae and I disagree with the presenter. For Social Security taxes, a minister must be selfemployed. To find out whether or not you as a ministry qualify to be self-employed regarding income tax, see IRS publications 539 and 517. You may determine for yourself by answering 20 questions in the Common-Law Employee Test as it relates to ministers in #539. The outcome of this test will tell you whether you are to be given a 1099 or a W-2 by your church. Most Unity ministers probably should receive a W-2.

The Eastern Regional presenter was understood by Alan Rowbotham and others, to say that churches must file US Form 990 "Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax" and then Mr. Sobel made the statement in the second paragraph of his letter to Eastern Regional ministers dated October 25, 1991. THAT IS ERRONEOUS INFORMA-TION. OTHER NONPROFITS NEED TO FILE #990, but your church as a ministry listed in the Association's Yearbook does NOT need to file this form. Further, you DO NOT NEED TO OB-TAIN YOUR OWN TAX EXEMPT IDENTIFICATION NUMBER; this was

also misinformation you were given during the tax workshop at the Eastern Region. It is becoming critical, however, that all ministries and study groups listed in the Yearbook must submit an annual report to the Association office. The IRS is increasing its strict adherence policy and the severity of fines (including to churches) for non-compliance. If your church did not submit an annual financial report in September when you received your membership form, I urge you to do so now. Your Association staff can only urge you; we cannot coerce you to comply. However, if the IRS is satisfied that your national organization headquarters has informed you of the need to do so, the national body will not be fined or penalized, but individual churches might be. Your Association office only places your annual financial statement on file; we do nothing with it, but if we are audited, we then have the information required by IRS. Such information has been required by IRS to be sent to the Association office since before the Association was organized, and IRS is now determined to obtain compliance. The recent expose' by TV's Primetime Live on three TV evangelists seems to have increased the determination.

EXCEPTION TO ITEM 2) If your church receives more than \$1000 in non-related income during its fiscal year, you must file US Form 990-T, but not Form 990. If you have \$999 or less of non-related income during your church's fiscal year, you do not file Form 990-T either.

3) The Eastern presenter was also quoted as saying that a minister can take a social security tax waiver anytime during his/her career. It is our understanding that such social security tax waiver must be signed and returned to IRS by the end of the calendar year after the year in which a minister was ordained; usually about 18 months, definitely not anytime.

May God bless this mess and "us what has to live by it!"

Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees of A Unity Church

An Overview

Often we make assumptions that people automatically know how to be a board member. The make-up of many of the Unity churches' boards include women and men who have been involved with the church or center for many years--those with previous community and civic board experience, and/or individuals with extensive business experience. While the qualifications are helpful, if not necessary, specific board development training is needed and ideally ongoing. The organizational culture of each ministry is unique and needs to be understood and appreciated by board members.

As I travel extensively throughout the country, one of the most common requests for information from ministers and board members is a clear understandig of what board members' responsibilities are in serving the church. A key point made at the onset of this discussion is that the minister is a voting member of the board in addition to his/her many other responsibilities.

Board of directors have three major responsibilities which include: policy setting, planning and fund development. In order to clarify and stimulate discussion during the Church Development Workshop these responsibilities are bro-

Responsibilities of a Board of Directors of a Unity Church

Administration

- ✓ Help set policies for operations
- ✓ Enact charter and bylaw changes
- Recruit and orient new trustees
- Assess board performance
- Meet its legal and ethical responsibilities

Planning

- Determine and interpret the mission
- Develop and approve the vision and long-range plan
- ✓ Insure implementation and ongoing evaluation of the plan

Fiscal

- ✓ Set standards for tithing by your personal giving
- ✓ Secure and manage adequate funds for operations
- Make financial and investment decisions
- ✓ Insure fiscal policies are written and implemented

Personnel

- ✓ Select and support the minister
- Secure volunteer resources needed by the church
- ✓ Insure adequate personnel policies are in place
- ✓ Evaluate the performance of the board

Programs

- Monitor program activities
- ✓ Support the minister in developing criteria for quality programs
- ✓ Actively participate in the programs and activities of the ministry

PR/Community Relations

- ✓ Enhance the image of the ministry in the community
- Communicate with the Association and increase the awareness of being part of a worldwide movement.
- ✓ Insure quality in all materials developed and distributed by the ministry
- ✓ Serve as an ambassador for the ministry in the community

ken down into six key areas: administration, planning, fiscal, personnel, programs, and PR and community relations.

How many of the aforementioned duties are performed by the board will depend to some extent upon the size of the church, its complexity, its available staff, and the effectiveness of the committee structure. All areas of responsibility need to be clearly understood by all, need to be in writing, and need to be periodically reviewed and updated.

EXPANSION NEWS

The Reverends Austin and Mary Hennessey, ordained in June, 1991, pioneered a new ministry in Burnaby, British Columbia. Both Austin and Mary were eager to share their learning experience about pioneering with other ministers, licensed teachers, and lay leaders interested in such a venture. Following the Hennesseys have shared insightful responses to the questions I asked:

What qualities are necessary in the individual who pioneers?

An entrepreneurial attitude is key, consciousness of ministry, courage, tenacity, leadership skills, meckness and humility, absolute faith and trust in God and a deep belief in the Unity principles.

What steps did you take as you began the venture of pioneering this new ministry?

First of all, during our two years in ministerial school we took the necessary steps to prepare ourselves and establish for ourselves a pioneer consciousness. We were continually focused on pioneering and did everything possible to learn as much as we could about pioneering a ministry. When we arrived in Burnaby we studied the demographics of the area, learning where people are, what was happening, and how they were being served. We did not come to this area by chance. We knew the population and the numbers of unchurched and we saw the need for a family-oriented church. Looking at the demographics is important to finding the best location, yet bearing in mind and honoring other Unity churches in the area. Then, we began our search for a quality place. The criteria for the location includes (a) quality and excellence; (b) easy access to the facility by the majority of the population; (c) easy to find; (d) visibility; (e) plenty of parking.

Once you selected a location and a date for the first service, how did you go about informing people of this new church?

We advertised in a number of different ways. We developed a quality brochure about the ministry, which we handed out on a one-to-one basis and also left copies in all metaphysical bookstores. We also drew up a press release which we sent to 17 newspapers, 15 radio stations, and 4 television stations.

As pioneering ministers what are your recommendations to other newly developing churches as to what programs should initially be offered?

We began by having an 11:00 a.m. Sunday morning worship service as well as a youth education program for children. A consciousness and a spirit of oneness was established right from the beginning that this church would have an emphasis on family orientation. We also conducted a Wednesday evening program. When you pioneer all ancillary activities have to be done by you personally. Therefore, we recommend to any other pioneer spirits to focus energy and total emphasis on establishing an excellent Sunday morning worship service only. Pioneering is very demanding, but it is also very rewarding, and highlighting the Sunday morning service is important since that is where the majority of the people will attend. It is also important to establish a steering committee or board, and we used the mastermind prayer technique to open board meetings. In this way we established a prayer consciousness and a prayer based ministry. Other programs can be added.

What is the key to successful pioneering?

Loving the people! It is not the

minister's church but the people's and we need to know that we are all in this together. Also, it is important to share with the congregation an exciting vision for the future and we are enthusiastically helping the congregants to catch this vision. The core group of people who attend have already caught our vision, and they are offering to help in more and more ways. As pioneers we have to be involved in every aspect of ministry, but as we grow, we can delegate and equip people to do more while maintaining our leadership. Communicate with and listen to the people. Sense what they are needing and wanting, and then present vital Unity Truths to them.

Have you any other comments to share with those who have caught the spirit of pioneering a ministry?

Yes, remember that the church may not grow as fast as the ministers wants it to. Be patient and keep the faith!

How are the two of you leading and coministering this church?

Essentially we agree that there can only be one leader. However, we researched one of the most successful churches (a Baptist church in Florida) which has two leaders. Each of us has gifts that complement the other. We have been blessed by working in a business partnership for 14 years. We have similar temperaments, and we both have a strong commitment to ministry. We also recognize that what works for us in co-ministering may not work for all couples. We have come to understand that ministry is a process, an ever-changing process, and we as ministers continually grow and change.

It was my joy and privilege to be invited to conduct a special blessing and dedication of this new ministry, Unity Church of the Pacific, on November 3, when the ministry had been in existence one month. The consciousness of love, commitment, and excellence that was present were easily felt which I know will move this ministry forward continually toward greater unfoldment and success. We wish the Hennessey's and Unity Church of the Pacific and all its congregants much success, joy, and prosperity in the future. God bless you all!

CHURCH GROWTH BY RADIO

Radio For Peace International

Recently I returned from Costa Rica where I met with 40 World Peace University ambassadors to collectively bring forth new ideas for kindling peace in our world via Radio. Robert Muller, who was for 38 years Assistant Secretary General to the United Nations, spoke to our circle about the many ways for effecting global harmony--with Radio For Peace International (REPI) being the primary objective for our assemblage.

The focus of the four-day meetings was to heighten the awareness for Radio For Peace International and to expand worldwide awareness of the station and the power of short wave radio. REPI provides programming on such issues as: human rights, the environment, oppression, non-violence, arts and media, peaceful solutions, spirituality, the obvious and not so obvious splits in humanity (weaker/stronger, shades of color, men/women, richer/poorer, etc.) and more.

Through REPI, listeners hear programs that alert, empower, educate and inspire without an impending snarl of censorship. (Most of the more than 4,000 short wave stations are government owned and operated.) Radio reaches 80% of the world, while television reaches 20%. REPI

In my recent Partners in Ministry mail I received the following bit of wisdom on relationships. I would love to give credit to the person who sent it to me but there

was no name nor address; only a note saying: "maybe you can use this, blessings."

The following words of wisdom come to you from some wonderful partner in ministry named Blessings.

RELATIONSHIP - The most important lesson, of course, is the care and love of SELF. For without SELF, there is only despair, fear, and loneliness. is currently heard in 70 different countries (Russia, for example, has over 85 million short wave receivers). With a recent transmitter upgrade, this station can now be heard all over the world. With media as the environment, Radio is the recurrent voice that can speak to millions directly and instantaneously.

From his involvement with the United Nations, Muller shared during our sessions that "world leaders from the United States and Soviet Union believe that our planet will be "busted" in 17 years if we continue to treat our planet as we have in the past."

In Truth, we believe in the power of the invisible over the visible and we believe that our thoughts create our world. We know that in refining our consciousness we do make a difference in our world. Yet, during these days together in pro-active brainstorming, I consistently asked myself how can I make a difference.

If the planet and the human species are waking up at an accelerated rate during this decade as many of us believe, then what can I do differently to further bless and express peace for myself and for my community. The answer that continues to come is "move your feet." Yes, we have a responsibility to ourselves to live moment by moment from our Christ-self, a responsibility to our communities to stay awake and to respond to the needs of our brothers and sisters, and we have a responsibility to this earth plane to share our spiritual insight, knowledge, stories. and inspiration, so we may break through old ideas of limitation and race conscious beliefs.

In your community, city, or on a national/international scale, you who are about the experience of regeneration and soul unfoldment; can share your heart with the world via Radio. sciousness on our planet when you share your ministry through Radio. Our planet desperately needs Unity. Currently there are program openings on Radio For Peace International through New World Radio (NWR) and Unity is the only religious affiliation with NWR to date. Michael and Faith Moran's radio program, "Vision For A Better World," is on the air with REPI. This program is also available to you for use in various ways. (Call the Radio/Media Department for details and/ or a cassette sample.)

Love Can Build A Bridge

I believe that we are living in a glorious time, a time when the world is changing, for the good of humanity, right before our eyes. Who would have thought just a few years ago that we would see the end of the "cold war" in 1991. Who would have dreamed that the Berlin Wall would come down or that governments of oppression would crumble and fall all over Eastern Europe. The human spirit is awakening worldwide to its true nature, which is peace, freedom, and love.

There is indeed a major shift in human consciousness that is opening doors and lifting gates that have been closed for decades. We have a unique opportunity to build a bridge of friendship, support, and love to people around the world as never before.

Hopefully you read in the December/January issue of CON-TACT about the establishment of "Spiritual Unity," the first Unity ministry in the Soviet Union, Republic of Russia. It is my privilege and joy to work with you--ministers, boards, and staff--in many of our Unity ministries. It is exciting to watch you affirm a willingness to understand and implement proven fund raising techniques. Balanced with our dynamic Unity principles, development work is a vital tool for insuring the funds required to do the work ahead.

In my two years of service at our Association Headquarters there have been many questions, mixed emotions, resistance, and encouragement from you, the field, as we have implemented an active and growing Development Department. Time, patience, and the evidence of these fund-raising principles at work have opened many doors that at first appeared closed. Our move into our new World Headquarters building affirms the rightness of the decisions of our Board of Trustees as they made a commitment to move us into active fund-raising. Much of the initial resistance has softened. More and more requests for consultation and increased invitations to come work with staff and boards clearly indicate a growing acceptance.

There is one area, however, that appears to be the most difficult one in which to make a breakthrough. As a field minister for twelve years, I understand the resistance. As one who is daily growing in my understanding of the importance of

active Development Teams within every Unity ministry, I am saddened.

Just one area. It requires a new vision to dissolve its energy. Marilyn Ferguson, author of the Aquarian Conspiracy, might say it will require a paradigm shift in our thinking. This one area concerns our hesitancy to actively participate in and accept the concept that as we unite our energies --as we cooperate and work together, sharing our combined resources in all areas--we will synergize the potential within our individual ministries as well as within our Association of Unity Churches.

"But we do that," you may say. And on some levels, we do. Yet there remains a separation between our congregations and our international movement. Most people who attend a Unity ministry know nothing about our Association and its commitment to serve their ministry. Silent Unity is known. Perhaps even Unity School is recognized by many Unity people. But our Association remains a mystery to most of our individual members.

For the first time ever, our Association is actively seeking to break through this 'cloud of unknowing.' Our Annual Fund invites individuals to join our STARlight team and Share The Abundant Resources as we expand our services to you, our member ministries. Many have responded positively. Some feel uncomfortable as individual participants in local ministries are receiving information.

Questions have come. Where did you get the names on our very small mailing list? Did we somehow gain access to the church's list? To answer these questions is important. Our mailing list has been built slowly, but surely. People who have written to us asking questions, or who have sent in a donation at some time are

apart of it. In addition, when I travel to a ministry, I invite people to sign up for mailings from our Association. Our Vision subscription list, those who have attended our annual conference. . .these various sources have become compiled into a mailing list of close to 8,000 names. One ministry has willingly shared its mailing list. Another has selectively chosen a few names to send us. Still another has been willing to take our STARlight literature and mail it with their newsletter

The possibilities that stretch before us are exciting to contemplate. I envision each Unity ministry abundantly blessed with the financial resources it requires to live its vision. I am committed to working with you as you create the "Dynamic Re\$ourcing of \$pirit for Your Growing Ministry." Our Association affirms its support to you by gifting your ministry with the cost of my expenses as I travel to work with you.

We understand the most basic principle of fund-raising--and of Unity--that the more we share with each other, the better all of us are! The more we give to one another, the more we receive from one another. "Challenges of the Minister"

Unity, along with many denominations is asking the question, "Why are ministers moving often? Why is it so many ministers are questioning remaining in the ministry? Why is there so much burnout and breakdowns along with physical illness? Could it be there is a misunderstanding regarding the role of the minister and a need for a clear understanding of his/her responsibility.

The old system sees ministers more as servants rather than the professional individuals they are. Years of training puts the minister in a role along with top professional people. Payments to ministers certainly are not in keeping with other professions for services rendered. The minister is required to be committed; that is part of the calling, but not to the whims of individuals who take advantage of the role. Some say there is a lack of respect for the private life of the minister. Like any professional, certain rules are to be followed and their lives need to be lieved in an acceptable way. The way we live is often the way we minister.

Ministry is an interaction with peopleall kinds of people. We are required to have skills in communication and understanding. It is important intuitively to recognize problem areas as well as peopleproblems. Every congregation has its difficult people the same as any other organization. It is the role of the minister and Board of Directors to work together with prayer and healing. In some cases an individual may need to be confronted and allowed the right to state his/her case. Such an instance comes out of a good understanding of our teaching based on the thought, "Principle before personality."

Jesus speaks clearly to the concept of stewardship and its importance in our individual life as well as the life of a church. It is an important quality for leaders in any profession. Good sound administration makes the difference in success or failure. However, care must be taken not to equate success with financial achievement. In many cases the minister and members of the congregation come from backgrounds of poor money management, not just the experience of a shortage of money. They find it difficult to understand the idea of consciousness and the power within to work with principle in developing a strong prosperity program.

Responsibilities of the minister often become overwhelming and often there is not a support team to turn to. Networking is an important factor in the health of an individual and the health of an organization--NO PERSON IS AN ISLAND (or no person can be everything to everybody). Preaching and teaching are a relatively small part of the work of the minister. The minister is there to work with individuals through their challenges. grief, fear, and all the human experiences encountered on life's path. This is the time when the "timeless Truth" must be shared, realizing it is the Truth that frees and not a person. The successful minister/teacher must assimilate ideas and concepts to keep current. There is organization and planning that is vital to the life of the ministry. Both adult and youth programs must be worked out and given good leadership. Then come the weddings, funerals, christening, and personal counseling which require great amounts of time, and they seldom fit into a schedule of regular hours. Too often proper consideration is not given to the minister for this extra time and specialized service. We also must stand guard so that quantity will not diminish the quality of the services rendered. Scheduling is important along with timing of events. This is only a small part of the ministry but hopefully it will answer questions for some who ask.

Minister's Role In The "Year of The Child"

As we enter this New Year, I suddenly realized that "The Year of the Child" is only a year way! Before we know it, we will find ourselves hanging up those calendars marked 1993! So now is the time to plan and set goals to "enhance and expand our ministries for children and youth." Some of you have already started your plans and I would like to applaud you on your enthusiasm and excitement. Let me share some projects I have heard about in my communications with the people in the field.

One youth director said that their church was planning to initiate ways to provide child care or some kind of program for the children of parents who attend classes during the week. Another plans to hold a community dinner every Wednesday night for parents and their children for fellowship and fun.

One small ministry I visited does not have a Sunday school, but on occasion will have a family with children attend. However, these people never return, so they are planning to have sets of lesson plans available with someone prepared to teach the children when they do attend. They believe that as they begin to serve families, their ministry will blossom.

Other ministries are making plans on

a grander scale. I have heard mention of ideas such as initiating a latch key program for the community, day care facilities, preschools, and improving the space that houses the Sunday schools.

As each and every church commits itself to create better programs for children, Unity will truly make a difference in the spiritual lives of these dear ones.

How can you have a successful program for "The Year of the Child" in your church? Where do you begin?

The first step is the desire to celebrate and empower the children. We want to provide the environment that will be condusive to helping children and youth express their Christ consciousness and develop their full human potential. The following steps will help keep you on target and give some ideas of how to begin.

Ten Steps to a Successful Year of the Child

1. Select a chairperson

This person should be dedicated to children, have a willingness to work with others as the chair of a committee, and be willing to commit time and energy to seeing plans are carried through.

2. Form Education Committee

Purpose of this committee will be to do a needs assessment to determine the quality of the youth education department and brainstorm ways to improve it. The committee should consist of the YOC chairperson (if not the YE director), the youth education director, a board member, a teacher, and a couple of parents. This committee should report to the minister.

☐ 3. Write a Vision Statement

"Where there is no vision, the people

perish" (Proverbs 29:18 KJV). Just as each of us is individual and unique, our churches share in an individualized expression. Therefore, each ministry will have its own vision, which will be an expression of what is needed to better serve the children and youth. An example would be to raise community awareness of the inherent spiritual value of each child through worship, education, and social action.

4. Set Goals

Remember to reflect back to your vision statement when doing this. You want to make sure that all your goals are congruent with it. Some important questions you might want to ask yourself when making your plans are:

- *Are children going to be involved?
- * Are others in the congregation going to be involved?
- *Will your plans extend into the community?
- *Are your goals balanced with availability of volunteers and funds?
- *How will you get financing? Do you need to do some budgeting?

☐ 5. Action Steps

Break down each of your goals into action steps. Be sure to indicate who will complete the steps and make a time line that shows when they are to be completed.

☐ 6. Get Board Approval

This is very important. Include your action steps when you present your plan.

☐ 7. Form subcommittees

These subcommittees will be assigned certain tasks. For example, if you want

special music, you may want to have a music subcommittee, which your music coordinator may possibly head. (The chairperson should check in and make sure that the subcommittees are on target and give any support needed.

8. Publicity

First of all you want to publicize and create enthusiasm and support in your congregation for your plans for "The Year of the Child." One way to do this is through a short insert in the bulletin which can be a sort of mini-newsletter. Also announcements from the minister or the Youth Education Coordinator will be helpful. A display of the promo items-the T-shirt, buttons, affirmation cookies, and The Year of the Child song, "Growing Love," with order blanks and a poster designed by the children--can help. Some churches are having the children pass around affirmation cookies (available thorugh the Association) to the congregation after a special service on children. Other churches are distributing the YOC buttons to those who will sign a card of commitment to children and youth. Use your imagination!

9. Regularly Set Meetings

Decide on a time when the committees are able to meet and spend time to check where you are on your goals. Also this may be the time to support and encourage one another and spend time in prayer for your children's ministry.

☐ 10. Celebrate

Plan a time to celebrate your "Year of the Child" projects and your children and family ministry. But most important, take time to celebrate yourselves! You deserve it!

In closing, you will be successful if you follow the three steps found in the acronym for the "YOC." "Y" is for youth. How will you improve the spiritual education for the youth you so dearly love? "O" is for organized. Use these steps to help organize your plans and make sure that your vision becomes a reality. "C" is for celebrate. Let your inner child free and celebrate with the children.

Teaching Resources for Unity Centers

An Update

Upon joining the staff of the Association of Unity Churches almost four and one-half years ago now, it became clear to me that our churches' greatest need was for lesson materials to use in their classrooms, particularly with children and teens.

It became my goal as International Consultant for Teens, as I was then, to meet that need by producing lesson materials for Uniteen and Y.O.U., which were written by Unity people as easy-to-follow lesson plans, based on whole-brain learning.

Our first step was to establish a vehicle by which teachers/sponsors could share their lesson plans with one another. First came the Y.O.U. SPONSOR PAK, a quarterly packet of lessons, fund raisers, and "this worked with us" ideas. Then, came UNITEEN LEADERS' PAK, a biannual packet of lessons and information shared by those who worked with this age group. These two packets continue to be our most popular and useful tools.

Soon we were able to publish, LESSONS IN TRUTH FOR Y.O.U., then after that, MAKING CHOICES, a study for Uniteens. This past year we published, JESUS THE WAYSHOWER, for Uniteen and Y.O.U., and a book of the joysongs we sing in our teen ministry entitled, JOYSONGS, JOYSONGS, JOYSONGS,

Our children's department published, THE META-PHYSICS OF OZ and HOLIDAY EXPERIENCES FOR UNITY CHILDREN. To date, we have published six (6) Unity-based materials.

Meanwhile, we were busy identifying material published by non-Unity publishers which we considered usable in our churches. Over 50 titles were added to the resources we were making available to our churches for children and teens.

During this time, IMAGE, our basic curriculum resource was being updated in language and artwork. Six quarters were re-done before response from the field told us that the revision was not a high priority.

These action steps have been helpful, but are not sufficient. Upon approval of funds, we shall publish another 14 resources written by Unity teachers and 16 from other publishers by 1992-93.

Most importantly, our Curriculum Task Force has designed a totally new curriculum which cuts across all age levels and involves the family. We will present a typical Sunday morning sample lesson plan in January to our Board of Directors. A complete report of our educational philosophy, learning objective, format and lesson topics is available now. Next steps for the Task Force are to field test the sample, identify an editor and writers, and create a budget and time line for Board approval.

I trust this update provides you with data as to what our goals are, what efforts we have made, what has been accomplished, and where we see ourselves going related to providing Unity centers with quality teaching/learning material for children, youth, and adults.

It is a privilege to be of service to you. Your response to this update is encouraged. Together, like our cofounder, Myrtle Fillmore, we "will take care of the children."



THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Listen, Hear, Respond

One of the greatest needs of adults is to have individuals in their lives who really listen to them then to have clear evidence that the listener really "hears" the meaning of the communication, and finally, that some impact is made so that a response occurs.

In our North American cultures today, there is a great deal of communication, but very little listening, hearing, and responding. This is particularly true in groups and organizations of every size and description. It can also be true in our own homes, churches, and in the Association. In this article, I want to list several areas of need or concern that your Association Board and staff have heard from ministries and how we are responding to you.

I want my ideas for the Association's future to be taken seriously. Sometimes I feel the Board and staff set goals and make decisions without really considering my ideas.

Barbara O'Hearne has spent almost a year conducting thirteen focus groups including 175 ministers and teachers. This information has been presented to the Board and staff for action. Additional work will be done to incorporate the

needs, concerns, and visions in ALL Association plans and programs now and in the future. These ideas will create the Association of tomorrow.

Our Association plans called for a chaplain to support ministers to be hired some time ago. When will this happen?

The board voted to fund hiring a chaplain right after convention this year. Applications will be circulated then.

I want a more spiritually-focused Convention/Conference; a time for my own spiritual renewal.

Our Program Committee, convention staff and board have developed a wonderful convention program for June that includes a two-day renewal retreat, inspirational speakers, much prayer support time and a unique site that will be all ours if we have 1,000 guests registered. The Board has adjusted the schedule so there will be no board or committee business during the renewal retreat so all who desire can attend.

Conventions are too expensive.

Rates at the beautiful Pheasant Run Resort will be \$55 per room for the entire resort except for suites. This compares very favorably with Unity Village and nearby motels. The several resort restaurants and those nearby also compare favorably with the Inn and restaurant prices in the Kansas City area.

I want a live voice when I call our Association offices. The phone system is too impersonal.

Another employee has been hired so you will be greeted "live" during regular office hours and on Fridays. This change should be in effect by the time you read this. This is a powerful commitment as the home office receives 11,000 calls each month.

Our plans for building a new building are much too grand and expensive. Why conduct a building fund when we have an adequate building now?

Our building fund activity is directed at the present building in Lee's Summit. Unity School has granted us a delay in building on the Unity Village site. We plan to complete the present building and pay it off entirely before doing additional work at the other site. Our present building will probably be our home for another eight years.

I need more direct services such as Barbara O'Hearne provides plus more materials to support me in my ministry.

Our chaplain, mentoring, and renewal are being given top priority. As these continue, we will be asking you for more direct input and suggestions. Our plans are strongly emphasizing these areas now and in the future.

These comments represent only a part of our support for one another, but I hope they give you a flavor of our commitment to listen, hear, and respond.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

We're here to "hear" and we're here to love. The loving is easy and we do it, sometimes when you, the object of our love, are unaware. The hearing is also easy; the problems come when what we "hear" is not what you said, or we "hear" through economy-tuned ears or...or...etc.

Although the Focus Groups' raw data is not yet correlated, we (the Board of Trustees and I) have heard three requests which we can already work on implementing:

- 1. The desire to have our telephones answered by a person. At this writing, Martha and Young are working on ways that this can be accomplished. This desire of yours will have begun on February 21st (3-4 weeks before you receive this issue of CONTACT).
- 2. Your desire for a chaplain has been heard and we are preparing for this to happen. We are writing a job description, and preparing space and equipment in the faith that funds will be available so that a chaplain can be identified by late summer.
- The desire for mutual exhange of feelings among all our ministers and licensed teachers and our Association

management team (Board and staff) and a desire for less "management" has come through in such a way that we cannot mistake it. From the respones of your Board and the Executive Committee which I observed in January, and knowing my own feelings on the subject, this is definitely a mutual desire on the part of all of us.

A step toward responding to request number three was taken when your Board of Trustees approved the Spiritual Renewal Committee's recommendation that they and I reschedule our June board and committee work so we can all attend the pre-convention Spiritual Renewal Retreat. The Board then requested that Scott Sherman and I do whatever was necessary to allow this to happen. Gladly! And the rescheduling is done.

The past several years, your Board has had personal "check in" time very early in their meetings and I consider what others say as confidential. If you will permit (by reading on) I'd like to share with you some of my personal "stuff" however.

When I was elected to the Board of Trustees, a few personal friends who were colleagues seemed to begin immediately thinking of me as one of "them." Since I didn't feel as though I was one of "them," I was confused. When elected to the Executive Committee, apparently I became still another "them" member.

In June, 1985, eighteen of the twentyone board members either "recruited" me to take my present position, or at least to apply for it. By actual count, more than sixty minister-colleague-friends also asked me at the June Conference in 1985. To all I said, "God has not told me to do that." On the drive home from conference, God changed her mind--or at least on the way home I heard what she had been saying all along. I applied and had a conference call interview with the Executive Committee, and I was asked the same questions all other applicants were asked. They selected me. With all the support for my applying for this job, I just

knew I would have support in executing it.

And I did! At least professionally and organizationally. Good things began happening, thanks to the head, heart, finances, hands-on support of so many. The number of donors to the Association nearly doubled the first year, and has continued to maintain or increase since then. Strategic goals and plans began falling into place like a precision Swiss watch, truly thanks to the full support and cooperation of several hundred colleagues and their ministries.

My personal support from colleaguefriends became almost nonexistent--or at least that's how it felt. Twenty of my twenty-six years in field ministry were invested in the Great Lakes Region which I dearly loved and by whom I felt loved. My first attendance at their regional conference was in September, 1985, after accepting office in late June. Personally I felt cut off from my friends in the Great Lakes. Through that Fall and the next Spring, I repeatedly felt that personal loss in the regions. There have always been exceptions; some colleagues have accepted me personally, warts and all--and in this position, "warts" don't go unnoticed. However, for the most part, I felt a dichotomy; support for my organizational skills; non-support for me personally. I was no longer one of "them"; I was "him."

Jay Dishman helped me begin to see what had happened and that it was no one's "fault," but long-established customs which helped to support the "happening." In February before he died in December, 1988, Jay called and said, "When I come out to the Village for the M.E.C. meetings in March, can I take you out to dinner? Through the years in which you and I have served on committees and the Board, we have developed a friendship that I don't want to allow to deteriorate. I know you often have dinner subcommittee or task force meetings, but can you "save" one evening for us to have dinner together?" With tears in my eyes

RE: Strategic Planning/Focus Groups Update

Please accept my sincere thanks and appreciation for your participation in one of the 13 focus groups conducted around the country over the past few months. Approximately 175 ministers, licensed teachers, and non-management staff members willingly shared their perceptions, ideas, and vision for the future of the Association. I valued your thoughtful input, passion about some issues, and interest and support of the focus group process. It is an important part of the strategic planning process currently being undertaken by our Board of Trustees.

Many of you asked to receive some type of feedback on the results of the focus groups. This letter is to assure you this request will be honored once the final report is completed.

During the mid-year meetings in January, I presented an initial summary of the focus group results to the Board of Trustees. They were asked to respond to this summary by answering a series of questions and to make recommendations for action.

In late March the Board will reconvene for two days of planning at which time an indepth analysis of the focus group results will be completed. During this planning session additional sources of data will be explored in order to validate the findings of the focus groups. These include: a movement-wide written survey based upon the key issues and questions identified in the focus groups and an indepth analysis of the total organization and management data from headquarters; for example, organizational structure, financial statements, board meeting minutes, bylaws, policies, procedures, etc. The results of these three sources information will be used to validate the current practices of the Association of the "Triangulation of Information About Current Practices." The Board will be asked to review the current mission statement, core values of the organization and draft recommended revisions or changes. This will be done after they review approximately 105 vision statements written by focus group participants for surface common themes, ideas, trends, needs, etc., and draft a vision statement.

I am proposing that once the DRAFT mission statement, core values, and vision statement are written that I return to the regional meetings with this information for your input. You will be asked to review these draft documents and give feedback. This will insure that your needs, recommendations and vision are being reflected in these documents. For those who were unable to attend one of the focus groups this will be a wonderful opportunity for your input.

This is a vastly different approach to the strategic planning process and requires a lot of time (and patience). The process invites you to be more actively involved. I hope you will be part of the process by completing the written survey when you receive it and by attending the second series of focus group sessions at the regional meetings in the fall.

The Joy of Pioneering A Ministry

What a wonderful feeling of creative expression comes from pioneering a new ministry! Knowing that you are a meaningful part of the birthing process of a vital growing activity brings special meaning to the phrase, "co-creating with God!"

In my almost sixteen years in the ministry, I've had the joy of founding three ministries. Each was a different experience, yet each had important similarities.

As completion of my ministerial training drew near, Kathryn and Alan Rowbotham, the ministers, extended an invitation to me to return to the Roanoke area as an associate minister. Then we would determine if there was enough interest in the Lynchburg, Virginia, area

Pioneering A New Ministry

The following are some suggestions for pioneering a new ministry that worked for me and may be helpful to you if you are drawn to pioneer work.

- God first! Open your heart and mind and affirm, "Thy will be done!" The guidance will surely come.
- 2. Practice the principles of faith, trust, and order. Be totally committed to doing God's work and God will provide in every way.
- 3. Listen for the voice of guidance through intuition and contemplative prayer and then take action on what you receive.
- 4. Prepare a plan of action for the "outer world." For example, how are you going to begin--with an established study group, or jump in with both feet as a faithguided activity? Both avenues are workable. Once you have a feeling for your plan of action, make a list of what is needed to bring this plan into manifestation. For example: facilities, advertising, programs offered, etc. Take advantage of the helpful tools offered by the Association of Unity Churches for expansion activities. And remember the scripture in James 2:17 (RSV), "So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead."
- Make early contact with media fields--newspapers, radio, television. Often there are radio and television talk shows which can provide an opportunity for exposure for you and your ministry.
- 6. Get involved in the community. Some possibilities are as assistant hospital chaplains and presenting programs for retirement and nursing homes. Introduce yourself to area funeral directors and offer to be of service. Get involved in Chamber of Commerce activities and meet and get to know local business people. If your community has a college or university, ask to be placed on their mailing list. Often there are activities which provide many opportunities for community involvement through this connection. And, if they have a music department, it could provide information and contacts for soloists and musicians for your ministry.
- 7. Many civic and community organizations begin activities with prayer. Make yourself available. Here in Bremerton, Washington, the City Council weekly meetings are televised and I am regularly invited to open the sessions with prayer.
- 8. Practice the Unity principles in your own life. When you "walk the talk" you become the example. And being/living is the best example. It's contagious!
- Plan social get-togethers to involve all members of your congregation--pot lucks, movies, bowling, pizza parties, concerts, etc. Get to know one another and grow together.
- 10. Give thanks! There is much to give thanks for, right where you are. And we know what happens when we lift our consciousness in praise and thanksgiving. The universe responds!

to establish a Unity activity. Lynchburg is about fifty miles from Roanoke and several people from Lynchburg were driving to Roanoke to attend services.

Unity of Roanoke Valley provided a minimum salary for three months and a small amount of cash to open checking and bookstore accounts. They were stepping out in faith also. I flew to Lynchburg a month prior to ordination and pur-

chased a condominium. There was now a home base. My heart was so full of love and excitement that my logical mind didn't have a chance to argue! Sometimes, if we refuse to get bogged down with what "can't be done," we go ahead and perform the task that is before us.

One week after arriving in Lynchburg,

our first Sunday service was conducted beside a lovely lake amid a wooded setting on the property of a Lynchburg supporter. Eighteen interested people sat on blankets under the trees that autumn day, listening to the new minister share vision possibilities and asking and answering questions.

Those present and myself decided to jump right into a full ministry. Within a week a large meeting room of a centrally located downtown motel was rented as our Sunday service site. The trunk of my car contained our "portable church," i.e., books for sale, a tape recorder for music, refreshment fixings, etc. One room of my condo was designated as a church office and prayer line center. Our first two classes, Lessons in Truth by Emilie Cady and Charles Fillmore's Prosperity came alive in my living room.

The power of prayer and faith is fantastic. At the end of three months, Sunday attendance had increased to 35-40. With the able assistance of a local realtor, I negotiated with a Lutheren congregation that had outgrown their facilities and moved on to a larger building, to lease with option to buy a lovely white frame

church in a beautiful residential neighborhood. And at less money than we were paying in rent for the motel room. (This negotiation took three visits with the Lutheran board of directors and some strong convincing that the lease/purchase project would be benficial for them as well as for Unity. They were open to rent, or sell outright, but not to lease/purchase. However, never underestimate the power of persuastion backed by prayer!

We excitedly moved into our new facilities in full swing--Sunday and special services, classes, youth education program, counseling, regular office hours, etc. A Steering Committee was appointed, and an accountant helped us establish a bookkeeping system.

I made contact with local newspapers and both the Religion and Senior Editors were warm and welcoming. Within four months of leasing the church building, the Feature Editor did a tremendous "spread" (complete with several photographs) of the congregation's fixing up our building and grounds. It was a neighborly human-interest type story which attracted several families into our church. As a result of additional newspaper ar-

ticles about myself an an author and minister, I met people from various service and social organizations in the community and was frequently asked to guest speak at different functions.

An invitation came to become a member of the local Ministerial Association, which enabled me to become acquainted with area ministers. I distributed *Unity* magazine, *Daily Word*, *Wee Wisdom*, and various other pamphlets wherever I spoke or visited and people asked about Unity.

Almost to the day, one year from its inception, Unity in the Seven Hills became incorporated and chartered with sixty-one charter members. It was a day of celebration and rejoicing for a divine idea whose time had come. (Note: at the end of the initial three-month period, the ministry was self-supporting and Kathryn and Alan's faith was substantiated!)

In addition to Unity in the Seven Hills, I was founding minister for Unity Church of Applied Christianity, now in Roswell, Georgia, and Unity Church of Albany, New York. Both of the latter were established study groups, yet the process of growth and organization were similar.

and my throat, I said yes. We did and it was like "old times." (During that dinner, we scheduled a time for me to speak in his church and to do a "Grief" workshop several months later, which I did six weeks after he died.)

What was becoming clear was that since coming to my present place, to serve the Unity movement, I was more "locked away" than I ever had been when I was on the board or committees. It was a practice that went way back into U.M.A.-Field Department days and has continued until now. I meet with the Executive Committee until the Board of Trustees meets; I have sub-committee breakfasts, lunches, and dinners most of the time. When others take refreshment breaks, I

often spend the entire break time with a committee or at least a committee chair. Then at Conference time, I have one-on-one appointments and so am in an office and not in the workshops. I make it almost exclusively to morning prayer times, general assemblies, and business meetings.

Jay helped me to begin to see, and after hearing the raw data from the focus groups, your Board and Executive Committee helped me to further clarify and to see that they, and especially I, need to create it differently.

Igo back to my first paragraph and this time I personalize the pronoun from "we" to "I," and the "you" is not collective, but singular. I am here to "hear" and I am here to love. The loving is easy and I do it, sometimes when you, the object of my love (my colleague-friend) are even unaware. The hearing is also easy--but we have to make contact to do that.

From my new discoverings (they're not complete nor perfect), I take it that perhaps you do support me personally and that we need ways to say that to each other.

I commit to you to make every effort that when "business" can be conducted by all of us simultaneously that that will be my "business" conducting time; that when "non-business" time is available, I will avail myself of that fun-learning-growing-touching-heart time. I know your Board's intention to do this and I know their support for my doing likewise. There are "specifics" of the raw data of the focus groups yet to be dealt with; however, from the first feedback given your Board and me, I believe you support that too.

I want your organizational support; and more than that, I want your love. You have mine.

What's Working For Me

Below is an interview with Thelma Hembroff, minister of Unity Christ Church in Memphis, Tennessee, on what broadcasting ideas have worked for her ministry:

Carolyn: How has radio or other media worked for you in your ministry?

Thelma: In the different years I have been in the ministry I have always enjoyed the radio. I have either found the 60-second spots or half-hour programs to be the most effective. The last program I had was "Life is For Living," and it was an interview show with key people in the community, not necessarily religious people. We would talk about what was going on in the community and I would also interview authors or someone in town for speaking engagements. The feedback from the commuity was that they learned a lot. One time I interviewed Cohn, the author of Tender Power. People in the community commented on how empowering it was to see how two women could share so much when each came from completely different faiths.

Carolyn: Tell me how you feel about doing the interviewing yourself?

Linda brings a diverse professional background in telecommunications and computer technology. She is a Unity student, a Truth teacher, a member of Unity Church of Overland Park, Overland Park, Kansas, and brings many other wonderful qualities and vitality to our staff. She also enjoys country western dancing, riding her horses, painting and photography. Join me in welcoming her and celebrating the gifts she brings to our collective effort of sharing Unity with the world. Welcome Linda!

Thelma: I love it, as with the interview with John Templeton. I interviewed him at the Dallas Convention and he gave me some very inspirational words to share with the Memphis community. Usually, my style is to ask pertinent questions such as: "let's clarify this" or "could you tell me what you meant by that?" I just play the role that I am hearing this person for the first time. I've interviewed the 12-step groups and representatives from various rehab centers. I do not interpret but I do position questions so to appeal to the needs of the listeners.

Carolyn: What stations do you use?

Thelma: Primarily AM's because they have been easier to work with in providing the half-hour program time.

Carolyn: When do your programs air and are they seasonal?

Thelma: One of the programs ran for over a year. There was an individual who privately funded it. It cost \$125 a week for one half hour and it ran Sunday mornings, 9:00 to 9:30. Only a few have been seasonal such as one on the heart, encouraging people to give blood. I did it right around Christmas time, the greatest gift you can give is the gift of life.

Carolyn: Have you thought about airing the same programs on another station?

Thelma: Well, I like doing everything live. If I had my way I'd be on radio all the time, but now we're involved in a move. After we get moved, I want to go back to broadcasting. . .number one, to advertise that we've moved. Since being off the air, people still say, "I heard you on the radio."

Carolyn: There is a residual effect. The Church of the Latter Day Saints is back on the air and people think they've been on consistently. What kinds of positive results did you see from your broadcasting?

Thelma: My primary thing was to educate and I think radio was a very valuable tool, because a lot of people know about Unity in a more positive way. So the education process was very effective.

Carolyn: If you were speaking to other ministers, what would you say works the best for you in broadcasting the message of Unity?

Thelma: Utilizing drive time and 10-second ads work best. During drive time you get a lot of people going to work. They're in a hurry, yet they still receive a positive message. Even though the 10-seconds isn't very long, I'd say drive time, both morning and afternoon, and 30- or 60-seconds would be the ideal.

Carolyn: When you air 30- or 60-seconds, do you record your own message?

Thelma: Yes, I use the script material from the Association and just make it my own. I get feedback on what seems to help people. For example, "Try Unity." When it was used in my opening and closing, I received positive feedback. I try to keep messages nonreligious, but yet every uplifting and empowering. I use a lot of different types of radio scripts and I hand pick each one.

Carolyn: What size is your congregation?

Thelma: About 50. We have over 500 on the mailing list.

Carolyn: What about your Sunday school?

Thelma: We have a lot of little children attending, but we don't have many in Y.O.U.

Carolyn: Are your radio messages primarily targeted to adults?

Thelma: Yes, both families and singles. One day I was trying on a suit and I asked the sales lady if she would hold it in layaway for me. I gave her my card and she said, "Oh, I listen to you every Sunday morning." This is the kind of response I have received.

Carolyn: What recommendations do you have regarding other types of broadcasting?

Thelma: I had a video program on a cable station when I was in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I enjoyed it but it was so much work because you had to train your own people. Radio seems like the easiest. You don't have to be so worried about the visual; you can just give a positive message.

Carolyn: Many ministers are now being

Thelma: I would do what I did before. I like the interview process. I always had a theme and opened with a positive thought. I feel with the interview process you can bring in so many things, and you connect with so many people in the community. I feel this is the most powerful. You can share the principles without being "religious." I'll say, "Oh by the way, folks, you still have time to get out of bed and get to church this morning." And I add, "If you don't have a church home, come join us at Unity."

Carolyn: The interview recorded with John Templeton that you shared with our department is excellent. I applaud your broadcast outreach and the creative ways you share Unity with the people of Memphis.


The Association of Unity Churches welcomes everyone to the 1992 Unity People's Convention.

Fund Raising... How Do We Begin?

Within our ministries, active planning of creative ways to generate needed resources is vital. The following is a page taken from our Development Manual. This manual is now available for a love offering from our Association. Order yours today!

I. To insure a constant flow of resources within our ministries, it is important to realize the truth of these words:

MANAGEABILITY
leads to
CREDIBILITY
which increases
ACCOUNTABILITY
which insures
FUNDABILITY
which results in
VIABILITY!

- II. Without good management, which incudes an active and involved Board of Trustees and a highly motivated staff, the credibility of the organization is in doubt. Donors require accountability and responsible management when making substantial gifts.
- III. Begin with the Board. At your next meeting, ask members to list three things they enjoy about serving. Then have them list three things that challenge their serving on the Board. Discuss these thoughts and seek ways to turn the "challenges" into enjoyable activities. Allow staff and volunteers to do a similar exercise.
- IV. Develop a job description for service on the Board. Make nominees aware of this job description. Insure their willingness to fulfill their duties--including fund raising--if they are elected to serve.
- V. Seek ways to develop a high public image. Unity no longer desires to "be the best kept secret in town." Let's find ways to let others know who and what we are.
- VI. Insure financial accountability to your donors. Exquisite stewardship is an absolute requirement. How do you report to your donors? How often? Do you speak in the layperson's language? Consider simple cash flow statements to communicate clearly the monies that have come in and the funds that have been spent. Include this statement in each monthly newsletter.
- VII. Have a PLAN in place that confirms the vision of the ministry for the next three to five years. Don't be so locked into this plan that you cannot vary when the timing is right. However, know that the plan is a common focus of your Board and staff, and it reflects the agreed upon vision of your congregants.
- VIII. Let your mission be contagious to all who hear it! Put it in your newsletter, your Sunday bulletins, major printed materials. Live from your mission! It will guide the programs you present and the goals you set--if you allow it to do so.
- IX. Regularly evaluate the entire focus of the ministry. Look at programs, classes, and activities through the lens of your mission and the response of your congregants.
- X. Begin to create a clear Case Statement of who and what you are--and why the work you are doing will make a difference in the world. From this Case Statement, create the financial statements that will provide your Development Team with the information it requires to generate these funds.
- XI. Remember, planning gifts us with efficiency, economy, and effectiveness. A formula from the Templeton Institute for Excellence in Religious Non-Profits states: Efficiency + Economy + Effectiveness = Excellence = Increased fundability!
- XII. Begin now to plan a viable Development Program for your ministry. If we can help in any way, please call us at (816) 524-7414, ext. 355.

Access to Information

In serving, a big part of what we do is process information. Wouldn't you agree, one of the most enjoyable as well as frustrating things we can undertake is the preparation prior to giving a service? It doesn't matter what kind of service, hours of research, refining and finishing go into Christmas, Easter, weddings, and memorial services. On a scale of 1 to 10, the time given to preparation of information will always rank among the highest for those who serve the public as we do.

Most of us also agree that a good file of previous research material is worth its weight in gold. More specifically, a file full of Unity material on any subject we are looking into is worth its weight in diamonds. As we grow in experience we learn to see the big picture, how the service fits into our ministry and how the various component parts make up the whole. Yet developing all of these components takes time and most of the services come at an already busy time for us.

A few years ago a task force put together a wealth of material with the thought of developing a new Special Services manual. For many reasons the project was put on the shelf and recently I acquired this very large and impressive file of information. In addition to the task force information, the class of '92 shared a wealth of information as did Jack and Pat Barker, minister in Cincinnati, Ohio. Some of my own research has been included and we're off to creating a Unity research resource library.

Perhaps you, too, have been reinventing the wheel for years and there are many different ways you have presented any one of our regular services. Would you please

share it so we can all benefit? The file will be available to all of us as food for thought. This file is in hard copy form and expanding rapidly. There is a desire and need to have it put into a computer for even easier access. At the very least you will have a wonderful resource of Unity material available to you. To be able to receive a disk full of excellent research would be even better. We need to begin by creating the file to satisfy the needs of those I have already spoken to. As the idea grows, so will the means to meet the expanded need.

Inviting Children to Church

The January/February, 1992, issue of Alban Institute has an article written by Roy M. Oswald entitled, "How Do You Make Your Church More Inviting?" The focus of the article is on encouraging children to invite friends to church. Oswald said, "Children have not yet developed inhibitions about sharing their religious beliefs and activities with their friends." It has been my experience as an educator that if given the right incentives and support, children will surprise you with the zeal and enthusiasm they will generate as they invite peers to their Sunday school programs.

It would be wise to understand the dynamics of encouraging more children to attend. The Sunday school and the teachers need to be prepared for the sudden increase in growth. Oswald continued to say, "This plan will probably fail if it meets with an inflexible response from your Sunday school's normal routine. For the plan to succeed, your entire Youth Education Department will need to want to increase the number of children attending your church functions by 15% to 30% with all the implications of such an influx." I would recommend that the church consider specific needs they will encoun-

ter with the increase of children to ensure that this be a positive experience for all involved.

Oswald reinforced this when he said, "Your Sunday school teachers will need to plan ways to help children who are new to their classes feel welcome and involved. If you can attract thirty to one hundred new children (depending upon your church size) over the course of six months but not retain them, this is a reflection of the Sunday school's ability to hold the interest and commitment of children. Your entire Sunday school faculty may need six months of preparation to work through ways to make their classes more welcoming, more fun to experience, more effective in communicating the good news of your faith in a way that draws forth the commitment of visiting children."

This task of creating innovative Children's Education programs will be much easier to do in Unity come this June. The Year of the Child Project will produce a new manual designed to assist you in envisioning and planning your youth ministry entitled, "New Directions In Spiritual Education For Children and Youth." This manual will be available at the People's Convention in Chicago in June.

The article written by Oswald goes on to discuss some "what if's."

He said, "What if your Sunday school began to plan a special Sunday every month--each Sunday focused on a different religious theme, yet every Sunday having the familiar celebrative atmosphere? Children would attend their regular classes on the Sundays, but their classtime would be shortened to make room for a festive time with cake and

punch, plus special music in which the various classes could participate. In larger congregations, these festive events would gather together classes in broad age groupings. Possibly each class could take turns acting out a modern version of some Biblical theme or story for no more than five minutes. I would suggest repeating one that the children could get to know well and sing with gusto. Possibly you could enhance the festive quality of this singing time by having the children accompany the music with drums, noise makers, and rhythm instruments."

1993--The Year of the Child--should be an excellent time to implement such plans. In fact, another item that will be available from the Year of the Child Project is a packet with twelve months of ideas that you can use to celebrate the children during 1993. There will be minilessons for ministers to use from the platform, intergenerational activities, suggestions for music, activities, children's blessings, and many more ideas that will be focused on monthly themes.

Mr. Oswald tells us, "You will need to invite the creativity of your Sunday school faculty as you begin to think how to make this ten- to fifteen-minute period a time more action-oriented, more fast-moving, more participative. It wouldn't be a bad idea for each teacher to ask the children in their classes what would make Sunday School a more exciting place for them." (This would be a wonderful thing to send on to me at the Association of Unity Churches and these ideas could be compiled and shared through the Year of the Child Newsletter.)

Mr. Oswald continued, "And what if these monthly celebrations consistently

included an emphasis on encouraging the children to invite their friends to these special times? Once they had gotten familiar with the fun, surprise, serendipity, and music of these monthly celebrations they would be more highly motivated to invite their friends."

We need to ask our children about their ideas on how to make their Sunday school experience more exciting. Mr. Oswald said, "I am convinced that the creativity and ingenuity of the children in our churches will bowl us over if given half a chance. They simply need to know that we are willing to try out some of their ideas. We can't make our Sunday school a more exciting place to be for our children without their wanting to invite their friends to attend with them. When there is energy and excitement at church, children rarely keep it to themselves. They begin to talk about it with their friends, and their friends will naturally become curious and ready to respond to an invitation to attend some Sunday."

If you are a minister, you may be wondering, "Why in heaven's name would you want to increase your attendance of children?" For the simple reason that it is a way to increase your adult attendance as well!

Mr. Oswald addresses this when he said, "What if you really did have a jump in attendance in your Sunday school, and some of these children began attendance on a regular basis? You would then have before you the challenge of engaging their parents in your congregation."

And, "What if your Children's Education Committee really did take on the task of holding adult forums on topics of real interest to parents, like these:

Kids and drugs

Talking to your child about sex

How to nurture honesty in your child

Rituals that build family cohesiveness

Biblical passages parents and children can enjoy together

Teaching children to pray

What values are television teaching my children?

Where is your congregation in making plans for your Year of the Child Activities? In the last issue of CONTACT I wrote about "Ten Steps to a Successful Year of the Child." Here is a checklist to see if you are on target. If not, it is a chance to begin your planning!

- 1. Select a chairperson
- 2. Form Education Committee
- 3. Write a Vision Statement

The author continued, "Even if you are not able to significantly engage the parents of the children who are attending your Sunday school, a series of adult forums is bound to engage your regular members in some important issues. It will help convince your adult members to invite their children to class while they are at it."

A final "what if" by Mr. Oswald. He said, "Yes, what if you really did build some extra energy in your Sunday school? It is bound to have a ripple effect on your entire congregation. The point is, we need to start somewhere, building some excitement in some part of our church life if we want to grow numerically. Starting with your Sunday school will probably produce more pay-off than starting with any other aspect of your congregation."

In agreement with what I have read about the statistics on church growth, Mr. Oswald stated, "One clear learning that came out of our research is that children bring their parents to church. It is usually upon the birth of their first child that parents who have not been affiliated with a congregation begin to think of church again. Out of a concern that their child have the best religious and moral upbringing, they begin to re-evaluate their lack of involvement in a local congregation. This is one reason why a growing church makes sure that its nursery is the most attractive room in the building, and that the nursery is always attended by qualified and caring people. After nursery comes the Sunday School. These days, parents approach their church affiliation like consumers. They will be looking for the local church that they feel offers their children the best possible Sunday school experience."

There is no room for doubt in my mind that the commitment of the Association of Unity Churches to move forward with the next stages of development of our "Living Curriculum" is on the right track toward a Sunday school experience of excellence to which families will respond!

INTERGENERATIONAL EDUCATION MINISTRY

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Do you want to live long and prosper? Be a lifelong learner. Learning will not only enrich the years you have left, it will add to them. However, your success will depend upon linking yourself to excellent teachers. Mark Hopkins was an outstanding educator in the last century, and it was said that "education consists of Mark Hopkins on one end of a log and a pupil on the other." Take away the skilled teacher and the learner is just a bump on a log!

Do you want the church to continue into the twenty-first century as a vital institution? It will only if the children and youth now in our congregations learn to value Unity teachings and heritage. How will this happen? Only if there are teachers who *know* and *love* Unity.

Our excellence in teaching can make all the difference to us as individuals, to our church, and to our society. What makes teaching a job and a challenge? What is excellence in teaching? Reflect upon the teachers who have had a profound influence in your life; you will find that they had three characteristics in common.

First of all, they were crazy about their subjects"crazy" as in, "Will you look at John? He sure is crazy
about Mary." Excellent teachers of textiles are wild about
weaving; excellent teachers of mathematics are nutty
about numbers; excellent teachers of ornithology are
obsessed with observing Orioles. You've got to be passionate about your subject to be an effective teacher.

To be crazy about a subject does not mean that you think yours is the only subject content that matters. It does mean, however, that you think that everything about your subject--no matter how small or insignificant--matters. Do you remember how it felt when you were first in love and got a letter from your significant other? You read and re-read every word. The use of a semicolon was thrilling (an ordinary person would have used a comma). And if the letter closed with "All my love," it was as if the heavens had opened and the Divine Voice had spoken a benediction!

To be similarly obsessed with every detail of a particular area of knowledge or skill is what it means to be crazy about a subject--and this is one of the essentials of a fine teacher.

Which teachers were a major influence in your life? They don't have to be public school teachers or choir directors or college professors. They might be church school teachers, a Scout leader, a piano teacher.

One of the best teachers in Monroe, Wisconsin, in the 1940's and 50's was Della Stauffacher--The Butterfly Lady. Although she had been forced to quit school at fourteen to help her father in a country store, she was an expert in the field of moths and butterflies. With her living room as her classroom, she taught several generations of children how to collect, classify, and enjoy butterflies.

In teaching, love matters more than money. You cannot be an excellent teacher unless you are passionate about your subject--whether you are paid a lot, a little, or nothing at all. The volunteer, the amateur, can be as good as any professional. The word amateur means lover; it is love that matters above all in teachings.

You cannot be an excellent teacher unless you are passionate about your subject.

Again, when you think about the teachers who made a great impact on your life, you will discover a second characteristic: They were not afraid to be loved. They let us know them pretty much as they were-warts and all, wonders and all. They allowed themselves to be part of the curriculum. They risked our anger by disciplining us; they praised us when we did well. They were not ashamed to present themselves to us as real human beings, whom one could choose either to love or to hate.

In 1938 Johnny Powers returned to his hometown of Titusville, Pennsylvania, to become the music teacher in the high school and to organize a marching band. No one on the school board thought it a bit odd that a man who was lame in one leg could teach kids how to march! No one

bothered to ask how a band might be clothed when there was no money in the budget for uniforms. No one counted up the number of kids who could play instruments (had they done so they would have discovered enough for a string quartet with a piano accompaniment). The high school principal didn't think music important enough to offer academic credit, so the band practiced after school.

Within three years Johnny Powers had his marching band--in uniform and with a drum majorette who could strut and twirl! It was like something straight out of "The Music Man," but there was no magic in it, nor any slick talk or sting operation. The kids simply loved Johnny Powers. He invited small groups of them to come together to learn to play on borrowed instruments. When the kids came to school forty-five minutes before class to rehearse, there was Johnny. Lame leg and all, he got out on the football field and paced off the formations. On Saturday Johnny got into his old Ford and helped cart band members to outof-town football games. Johnny did not have charisma; he was not charming in the accepted sense; he wasn't even a great musical interpreter. Even so, Johnny Powers taught a whole generation of kids in that small town to play instruments, to march proudly, and to think well of themselves. The secret? He was not afraid to get close to the kids, and they loved him for it!

Good teachers are not afraid to be loved; they dare to show both their best and worst sides to their pupils. Behind that lies an important truth about teaching and learning: much of learning is imitation. We learn because we want to be like our parents, or professor, or piano teacher! It is the most natural thing in the world for children to love their teacher; it is an unnatural teacher, a poor teacher, whom children do not love.

Don't misunderstand! Not being afraid to be loved is not the same thing as trying to make pupils like you. The movie, "Stand and Deliver," is based on a true story. It is about a Hispanic computer expert who quit his job to teach math in a high school in a barrio in East Los Angeles. He enabled Hispanic kids not only to learn calculus, but to get high marks on the college entrance exams. And he did not do it by being Mr. Nice Guy! He did not waste time trying to make the kids like him; he did not have time for that! Still, he was not afraid to be loved, to praise and reprove, and to show warmth and anger. Jamie--that was his first name--let himself be an essential part of the curriculum.

We teachers in the church have a natural advantage. Who are we? We are those whom Christ has set free to be our human selves. We do not have to pretend to a goodness or graciousness or patience that we do not have. We do not have to put on a teaching face, or learn a teaching voice, or acquire teaching manners. We may dare to be ourselves; we need not be afraid to be loved, because we know ourselves to be loved extravagantly, without reservations, without our first being required to make ourselves lovable!

Third, excellence in teaching is marked by telling stories. If you reflect upon those teachers who left a great impression on you, certainly you can remember some of the stories that they told--not the jokes told to break the tension, but the stories that captured in a few words the essence of a process, a concept, an event; the kind of stories that are windows, letting light through a solid wall; the kind of stories that keep on teaching long after the storyteller has left the scene.

Paul Lehmann was a young instructor in Christian Ethics at Princeton Seminary in the late 1940's and early '50s. He was a difficult and obtuse lecturer whose intellectual brilliance was blinding to his students. What saved Dr. Lehmann were the occasional stories he would tell, and it was these stories that made all the difference. When his former students get together, they can remember and tell his stories and admit to using his stories in their teaching and in their preaching. The stories have kept on teaching, as good stories will.

By way of illustration, here is one of Dr. Lehmann's stories:

There was an elderly German pastor who had a long career of success in youth work. Young people liked and trusted him. They came to him with their questions, and they tried to live out the truths he taught them. The old man smoked a pipe--in fact, he was seldom without it. One day, as he was puffing on his pipe in his study, a young man asked to see him. The young man, who was about sixteen, was obviously struggling with a serious spiritual problem. "Pastor," he said, "I've gone round and round about this. Help me."

"What is it?" asked the old man.

"Pastor, I'm of the age when most of my friends are taking up smoking. Should I smoke?"

And without hesitation, the old pastor said, "Of course not!"

The young man looked with some confusion at the pastor, whose head was wreathed in pipe smoke. "But sir, you smoke."

"Ah yes, my son, but I never asked the question."

Why do we associate excellence in teaching with the telling of stories? Well, if you want to teach someone anything, the most effective way is via storytelling. Suppose you wanted to teach people how to repair their own automobiles. The first and most important step would be to tell a story: what happens to the gasoline that goes from the pump into the tank? Until your learners know that story, how would they ever know how to repair a carburetor or replace sparkplugs or fix a distributor? An effective teacher is an effective storyteller.

The joy and the challenge of teaching is three-fold: it is allowing oneself to be crazy about a subject; it is having the courage to let oneself be loved; and it is cultivating the art of telling stories.

Teach on!

Are you interested in motivating others to learn and to become involved in the world? Four channels to learning, based on Carl Jung's ideas on consciousness, affect motivation; we can use this knowledge to increase our student's motivation for learning and involvement.

Four Channels to Learning

Sensation: All external information flows into persons through one or more of the senses: taste, touch, smell, sight, and hearing.

They provide us with the first message of outside or external experience. They are the first sources of awareness,

They remain only concrete or specific facts, however, unless we are able to internalize them as thoughts or feelings. The sound of running water comes to us through the sense of hearing, but we may not even be aware of the sound unless it is unusual, such as the sound of water in an unheated basement. When we begin to ask why it's running and what its possible effects might be, we enter the realm of thought.

Thought: Thought as a source of awareness is the capacity to compare, generalize, differentiate, abstract, and specify. It is assisted by prior experience and memory. This source of awareness is analytical; it thrives on rationality and logical order and quite likely arises from the need we have to make sense or give meaning to what happens to us.

Thought is the primary organizing function of the human psyche. It takes sensory information and organizes it into meaningful relationships. For example, thought-added to the sound of running water and the sensation of freezing temperatures--may produce the conclusion that the pipes have burst in the basement. Thought gives meaning to sensory information.

Emotions: Feelings may be evoked by either sensory information or thought. Emotions cannot be adequately described because they are not part of the external, objective world but rather our internal, subjective world.

We are often aware when others experience feelings similar to our own, particularly if the feelings are in situations of danger, violence, sexual attraction, or love. But since feelings are subjective, we cannot be certain of another's feelings unless that person attempts to describe them to us. If the sound of running water signaled the filling of the swimming pool, for example, one person might feel joy and anticipation where another might feel distress at the thought of paying the water bill.

Teacher's, Want to Motivate Your Students?

Four channels to learning based on Carl Jung's ideas on consciousness.

Intuition: Intuition is the fourth source of awareness. It is the antithesis of analysis. Analysis compares, contrasts, examines to find meaning; intuition is the direct knowledge of meaning. Intuition is the direct knowledge of meaning apart from analysis or sensation. Symbols often trigger a response at the intuitive level. The use of water as a symbol of baptism is an example.

Intuition is an insight into the events of life apart from the process of casual connection or reasoning. Sometimes it is a new understand-

ing or meaning that comes from a fresh perspective on a problem. For example, a theory may be based on intuition (a new gestalt or meaning), but later be proved true or false analytically. Some intuitive meanings may never be proven (life is meaningful; I have a purpose; God cares for me), but they are nonetheless understandings that shape behavior

Effects on Motivation

Each level of consciousness can affect our motivation, increasing or decreasing it. The thinking level affects motivation in two ways:

Logical discord motivates us to seek consistency or cognitive balance. For example, when we see a ship "sink" into the horizon of the ocean we know from experience or other data that the ship has not gone below the surface of the sea. Experiencing discordant facts motivates us to explain them by some kind of logic or theory. We attempt to make experience fit a balanced scheme.

A need to make sense out of situations that have no apparent meaning also motivates individuals. When dad gets angry at the dinner table, mom and the kids may guess, "He must have had a bad day at the office," or "Dad hates macaroni and cheese."

People not only attribute meanings to human actions, but also to God's action. Some believe that the experience of trouble is punishment for past deeds or the experience of success is a reward for faithfulness. Because we are motivated to make sense out of what is happening, we seek answers or meanings to explain what is.

Emotions also affect motivation. I want to have a warm, close personal relationship with someone, so I ask that person to my home for dinner. You are afraid of

failure, so you don't attempt a course in chemistry. A man cares deeply about his newborn child, so he keeps the child warm, feeds him regularly, and changes his messy clothing.

Not only logic and emotions but also our senses shape desires. The taste of a juicy hot hamburger motivates me to the lunch table when I'm doing an interesting job. The experience of a beautiful waterfall or cool, shimmering lake will entice me to drive hours from my home for that sensual pleasure.

Intuition also affects motivation. Many of us are attracted and excited by some form of adventure, a new idea, or opportunity for self-fulfillment. We are pulled onward by a dream or hope or faith that is beyond logic, something that has value and importance to us just because it is and it calls us to be and do more than we are now.

For some of us that call may be a mountain to climb, for others an organization to build, or a broken body to repair. These goals are the ones that push beyond survival and logic and give another dimension of meaning and purpose to life.

The intuitive dimension further includes an openness to and an appreciation of what is--just because it is--and does not have to assign meaning or reason to it. It is nonjudgmental awareness and openness to experience.

Implications for Teaching and Learning

The extent to which the various channels of inducting information are called into play will increase the probability of motivation and/or commitment. We learn through our senses; the more senses employed, the greater the learning and motivation.

For example, if I am told about the poverty of a neighbor in a sermon, I will be less likely to do anything about it than I would if I were told about it and saw the sunken eyes and swollen bellies with my own eyes and heard the pained groans of a hungry person with my own ears.

If my emotions were also called into play, my motivation would increase even more. This is my friend who is suffering; I am angry about what causes poverty; I am afriad this might happen to me.

Intuition could add even more power to the urge (motivation) to help. My intuitive sense could confirm that God has called me to be responsive to this person's needs or that I could be particularly helpful in this situation.

In other words, as the number of channels employed increases (from one to two or three or four), the likelihood of my motivation increasingly will grow. However, if

some channels are bringing positive motivation and others negative motivation, my interest in pursuing a particular matter may be neutralized. For example, a student might be attracted by a particular subject matter (the thought channel) but turned off (the emotion channel) by the teacher.

As a Sunday school leader or teacher, then, consider designing your work to tap as many of the four channels of absorbing information as possible. Certainly, you should use lectures, reading, and discussion; these help the participants use the logical parts of their brains.

Also encourage persons to share and explore their feelings with one another. As well as being a channel for learning, emotions can set up blocks to learning-especially for retaining learning--if they are not recognized and dealt with.

Direct sensory experience can also be a part of your teaching design. Experience-based learning techniques (exedacs--as we call it in our Unity teacher training program) help participants use their senses to enable them to grasp more fully what is going on. Experience-based learning also increases skill and confidence in living out the behaviors we believe to be useful and important.

Finally, you may want to build into your teaching design opportunities for the students to explore and develop the intuitive parts of themselves. Meditation is one good means for doing this. In meditation the key is listening: listening to yourself and listening to God. Through meditation, new insights and understandings of the learning experience may emerge.

Understanding the four channels to learning is a powerful tool for teachers and leaders in the Sunday school. With that knowledge you can motivate others to learn and to become involved in practicing the teachings of Unity.

Helping Your Singles in Their Search for Significance

Values Clarification Exercise

Sydney Simon, in his book, *Getting Unstuck: Working Through Your Barriers* (pages 29-30), has developed a values clarification strategy that many single adults have found helpful in defining significance. Here is how to use this exercise:

- 1. Have your singles draw a straight line from right to left. On the far left, they are to write the year of their birth. On the far right, they are to write the year they "plan to die." (Simon noted, "It is not a random, casual choice of words to use the phrase 'plan to die' because at some subtle level we do indeed plan our deaths--by the way we plan our living.")
- Have your singles address the following key questions that need to be confronted in determining one's significance. (This can be done by journaling alone or it can be done in small discussion groups.)
 - A. What do I want to do with the life I have left to live?
 - B. What do I want to experience?
 - C. What do I want to witness?
 - D. What do I want to learn?
 - E. What do I want to be part of?
 - F. What do I want to change, shape, leave better than I found it?
 - G. What do I want to do with the rest of my life?

Harold says: "I use this exercise almost every weekend when I'm speaking, and it is interesting to watch people's reactions. I encourage people to answer the questions now but I also suggest that they take this home and mull it over. Then come back to it in a week, two weeks, a month or six months from now, and answer again the same questions."

"Talk About Your Heroes" Night

According to Harold, "Our heroes are often an excellent barometer to help gauge our values and what we think is significant in life. I think it's very important to constantly ask our single adults who their heroes are, who they admire? In discussing our heroes, it challenges us to reflect on what qualities and characteristics are really important in life."

Here are some suggestion for how to have an effective "hero night."

1. Ask your singles to make a list of their heroes or the more significant people in their life. (One possible way to do this is by category--vocational hero, relational hero, spiritual hero, etc.)

- 2. Discuss in small groups why each person listed is a hero. Try to identify the specifics of that person's life or achievements that cause you to see them as a hero, that cause you to admire them.
- 3. Discuss what the difference is between being a hero, a celebrity, and a famous.
- 4. Discuss the question: If I were to ever be someone's hero, what would be the reason why? What are my qualities that are most likely to be admired?
- 5. Discuss the question: What would I need to change about my values and priorities to become more like the people I most admire?

Harold concludes, "Encourage your singles to be in a small group. A small group is a place where a person is free to verbalize their ambiguities about success and significance."

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

When A Healer Needs Healing: Ministers Under Stress

One year ago on Sunday morning, April 14th, newspaper readers across the nation opened up PARADE Magazine to find an article about the heavy toll stress is taking on clergy. Alban Senior Consultant Roy Oswald and Referral Consultant Luther Kramer were interviewed and quoted in the article. At the end of the final paragraph Alban's address was given as a resource for further information. Staff members Julie King and David Sharpe coordinated the Alban response. Here is their story of what happened and how it affected our understanding of clergy stress.

Within 24 hours of the publication of the article "When A Healer Needs Healing: Ministers Under Stress," our entire Alban staff was mobilized to respond to an onslaught of telephone calls and letters. In the next eight weeks, 1,300 people called or wrote us. One year later, letters are still coming in! We were overwhelmed--not only by the volume of the response but by the personal pain con-

veyed in so many of the letters from clergy who had suffered in silence for years. Here is an example:

Though my faith is stronger than ever, and though my calling is no less diminished, the intense pressures and sense of loneliness brought to bear on me as a longtime pastor sometimes give way to thoughts of leaving it all. . . I suppose the best description of my feelings is the fact that often one feels as if no one in the world could possibly understand how you feel as a minister/pastor. I often remind myself that I have been called to listen to them and try to offer some guidance to those in need, and yet, often I find myself in need of support and advice, and no one seems to be there to listen.

There were also letters from clergy spouses and other family members:

My father is a minister suffering from severe burnout. Our family has been coping with this for years, and it has been eating away at us for far too long. My parents' marriage has been severely damaged. I think we all need help. But where to go?

And letters from lay leaders like this

We have a new pastor, our fifth in 17 years. I've watched our pastors burn out. When our Pastor Search Committee dissolved this time, the chairman quipped, 'Now it's's time to form a Pastor Care Committee!' I think that's a great idea, and that's exactly what I want to do.

Long after the avalanche of inquiries, we continued to discuss what we had learned from this experience. Three key themes emerged:

• Those who wrote felt isolated and unclear about what to do--unable to de-

fine the boundaries between their professional and personal lives--unclear about ownership of problems--ill-equipped to deal with their own and others' unrealistic expectations.

- The need to deny or conceal severe problems had kept many of our correspondents away from readily available independent and confidential pastoral counseling resources, and few were using peer support groups as a back-up for themselves and their families.
- Although hundreds of laypeople wrote to us asking "What can I do to support my pastor?" it was evident that few congregations had processes in place for mutual review and renegotiation of roles and expectations.

Late in 1991 we had an opportunity to add to our understanding of clergy needs in four anecdotal personal surveys of clergy from metropolitan Washington, D.C., and Philadelphia. These pastors came from small, medium, and large congregations and ranged from recent seminary graduates to pending retirees.

As expected, the typical clergy stress of juggling the demands of church administration, pastoral care, and spiritual development was high on their list of concerns, but new stressors were emerging in the world with which their parishioners were struggling: the breakdown and/or redefinition of the family unit, greater ethnic diversity, unemployment, and increased substance abuse. And they named stresses arising from shifts in the church system. Many told us that the homogeneous congregation of old had disappeared. This transformation had been difficult and stressful particularly when significant changes of congregational size had occurred.

An issue they described as particularly critical was pastoral care. With spreadout congregants, clergy were using more time and travel to accomplish less. In

particular, visiting hospital patients and nursing home residents in so many different and widely spread institutions had become a major problem.

"I wasn't trained to be a CEO," was another comment. Some of our interviewees felt ill-equipped to provide direction for increasingly complex administrative, legal, and building management decisions. At the same time, societal changes were limiting the quality and amount of volunteer assistance. These clergy did talk about motivating parishioners to understand their commitment and call as more than Sunday service involvement. Those surveyed firmly believed that if they could stimulate a spiritual awakening in their congregations, it would lead to a more involved laity, a better definition of mission, and a foundation of growth. Our interviewees desperately wanted to find ways in which their own spiritual resources might be replenished, but we heard them say that tending to their own spiritual and emotional needs took a back seat to other pressures. Some of them said that continuing education events were the only way they could take time off.

The response to the PARADE article and our clergy meetings in Washington, D.C., and Philadelphia affected our staff deeply and have made an impact on decisions about Institute programs and services. As we completed a strategic plan to undergird Alban's research capacity, we highlighted several areas for study: (1) the ability of church structures to respond to conflict and transition; (2) ways to prepare people for the clergy role and to assist clergy in managing stress; and (3) ways lay boards sustain supportive ministries. . . .

These are important plans for coming years. For now, we can point to important resources currently, or soon-to-be, available.

A New Look at Strategic Planning

During the past year in working with ministers and their boards in the field and with the Association Board of Trustees, I have evolved a highly participatory strategic planning model. I am very excited about this particular model and want to share it with you. It appears to work! The model is based upon my belief of inviting the participation by as many people as possible in creating a shared vision. As a reminder, the definition of a shared vision is a statement of the desired future state of the ministry at all levels of operations. Participation by many people in the planning process can serve as an energy source in the life of a ministry almost immediately and insures the implementation and ultimately the financial support of the overall plan.

The model is designed to examine the values, mission, internal strengths and weaknesses of a ministry, to conduct an external audit of opportunities and barriers, to chart a course of action for the future through the visioning process. Visioning involves listening to the dreams, needs and goals of many constituent groups within the congregation, the minister, staff, committees, volunteers, and board. In some instances perceptions of the role of the church in the community is examined.

Because planning committees involve the minister, key staff, board, and congregation members who are volunteers, I believe the process should be personally and spiritually rewarding and exciting. Research supports an increase in productivity in environments where people enjoy working together.


With these thoughts in mind, I would like to explain the strategic planning model diagram (shown on page 6). References to "the consultant" in the material is the role I have assumed. Some of the Unity churches have consultants and planners who have agreed to facilitate and guide the planning process after they have been part of one of my planning workshops in the field. They become "the consultant" for their own church and I have served as a resource person to them.

Phase I -- Planning to Plan

This phase addresses the question, "What should be done and by whom?" Keys to success in this phase are setting the ground rules or group norms for working together as a planning committee. Early agreement should be reached on the desired outcomes for our work and a commitment by individuals, the group, and the consultant concerning areas of responsibility. If there is any conflict between the group members it is important it be resolved prior to moving into Phase II.

I recommend developing a "briefing binder" for the Committee members so they will have key reference documents, previous planning meeting summaries,

focus group results, etc., available as we work through the process. It is continually updated with additional information.

Also during this phase a work schedule is developed for the duration of the planning process. This may include one half-day work session per month or a couple of two- or three-hour sessions per month. Setting the meeting schedule in advance is recommended, people can get the dates on their calendars for the duration of the planning process. It also lets them know there is a beginning and ending date to their work.

Phase II -- Data Collection and Assessment

During this phase we examine the ministry through an internal audit and an external audit. The internal audit includes the history of the ministry, the strengths and weaknesses, attendance and giving data, previous planning documents, etc. We are conducting an assessment of what has gone on and what is currently going on in the day-to-day life of the church. The external audit examines the opportunities and challenges in the local community as well as projected social, economic, cultural and technological trends for the 1990's.

Sometimes members of the Committee are given readings or other documents and asked to report what they learned to the larger group. This allows for a great deal of relevant material to be reviewed. It is during this phase I propose the consultant facilitate a series of focus groups. The specific questions to be asked are usually written by the Committee and focus (pun intended!) on getting perceptions of the core values, mission, strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and vision of the ministry. These focus groups are the initial stage of input, early "buy-in" and support by the congregation.

In some instances, key leaders in the civic and business community are interviewed individually by the consultant or at a luncheon sponsored by the ministry, to gain their perceptions about the church and its role in the community.

Phase III -- Analysis, Writing of the Plan, Validation

Once Phase II has been completed the Committee does an in-depth analysis of the data, focus group results, and other documentation. The intended outcome of this phase is to write a draft set of core values, draft mission statement and draft vision statement. Note that the use of "draft" document is important when asking people for feedback. The congregation is invited to validate the Committee's draft documents through a second series of focus group meetings.

Because these focus groups have a different format from the first series mentioned above, all Committee members are asked to co-facilitate these groups with the consultant. Training is provided on how to do this to insure maximum participation and feedback from participants. It is during these focus groups each participant is asked to write two or three goals for the next three years. It is important to note the participants generate a listing of goals--not the planning committee. It has been my experience this process invites another level of participation, "buy-in" and increasing commitment by the congregation or stakeholder groups. Because they are the ones proposing the goals and they have an ownership stake in seeing them accomplished.

The members of the planning committee have the responsibility to analyze and prioritize all of the information from the focus groups. The final draft of the plan includes the core values, mission, vision, and goals from this information.

Phase IV -- Implementation

Prior to moving into full implementation of the plan, the final "draft" document is sent to the board for review, additional recommendations if needed and/or approval. Once approved the strategic planning document is made available to the congregation. They have been actively involved in the planning process and need to be enrolled in the implementation as quickly as possible.

Two major tasks are accomplished at

that phase. One, the consultant collaborates and facilitates the training sessions on writing action plans or annual operational plans for the minister, staff, board, committees and other stakeholder groups, for example, the Sunday school teachers, etc.

The writing of action plans becomes an ongoing process each year of the plan. For some ministries there is an annual review of the plan during their minister/ board retreat followed by the development of yearly operational plans supporting the strategic direction of the church.

The second task the Committee needs to accomplish is to write evaluation criteria and strategies to monitor the plan, monthly, quarterly, or annually. This process is implemented in Phase V.

Phase V -- Evaluation

Evaluation and monitoring of the strategic plan is considered an ongoing process. Mid-course corrections and monthly discussions by minister, staff, and board are important to implementation and continuous improvement in the overall operations of the ministry. It has been my experience that clarity of mission and vision assist in the decision making process. Ideally the strategic plan is an agenda item at every board meeting and early in the meeting to insure implementation is moving successfully or changes need to be discussed and made.

The amount of time needed to complete a strategic plan varies with the size of the ministry, belief in the value of planning, the commitment of the board and planning committee to getting the job completed.

Without question those ministries that have undertaken planning are more focused on who they are, know what kind of ministry they would like to become and are moving toward that direction.

PLACEMENT REVIEW

A good part of my day is often spent in communicating with board members of open churches and with ministers.

Many of the church boards and even ministers are not familiar with the Placement Policies and Procedures approved by the Association's Board of Trustees. Since this is the time of year when a great deal of activity in the placement process unfolds, I thought this review of policy could be helpful.

Following is the process to be followed by both ministers and the boards of churches seeking new ministerial leadership.

One of the major services of the Association of Unity Churches is to assist its ministries in the orderly succession of leadership. Over the years, policies have been developed which have proven effective. The purpose of this published information is to acquaint all concerned with these policies, that they may aid in facilitating an orderly change of leadership. Many steps are involved in the normal placement procedure and they normally take place in the following manner:

1. A call is placed to the Association office to the Director of Placement by the minister who is leaving or from the president of the board, indicating that an opening has occurred.

- 2. At this time, the caller is invited to prepare a short paragraph (150-200 words) giving general facts about the church or center, including such information as average attendance, size of Sunday school, seating facilities, number of employees in addition to the minister, whether or not the building is owned, and any other relevant facts. This information will be used to announce the opening in the next Minister's Letter.
- 3. The Minister's Letter is issued every other month and is sent to all active ministers and to all open churches and centers. The Minister's Letter will serve as notice to the ministers that a vacancy has occurred, and will also advise the boards of the manner in which we are presenting their opening. If the board members prefer to have the listing changed, they can then direct either the board president or secretary to notify the Association office of the changes they wish to have made.
- 4. A Church Vacancy Form is sent to each church or center seeking a new minister. This form should be completed and returned to our office as soon as possible, with a copy of the bylaws and the most recent financial statement. We will then list the ministry as open in our Minister's Letter. Such information will give us a clear picture of the ministry, and will enable us to provide accurate background to those ministers who express an interest in applying for this opening. Resumes will not be sent until the completed Church Vacancy Information has been received in the Association office.
- 5. A number of sources may be involved in assembling a list of candidates. Members of the congregation may suggest prospects to the board, and these names may be relayed to us as possibilities. Also, on receipt of the Minister's Letter, various ministers in the field may request additional information from our office and express an interest in the opening. Association policy states that all

open church boards work through this approved placement process. To bypass this office could result in employing a minister not in good standing. A minister, too, is required to work through the Association Placement Office. For a minister to bypass the approved placement process could result in the minister being placed by the Executive Committee "not in good standing status."

- 6. If a minister indicates that s/he would like to make formal application for an available ministry, s/he will be sent a possible resume form. Ministers will prepare an updated resume and forward to the Association office. Upon receipt, we will reproduce the forms and send them to the ministry which is seeking new leadership. Ministries are informed that all resumes are to come through the Association office.
- 7. The Board of Directors of the open church will review the resumes and will select three or four (maximum) for further consideration. Often telephone interviews are scheduled which help to narrow down the number invited to actually visit. Much can be learned from a one-to-one telephone conversation. The process should be handled as rapidly as possible for the best interests of both the candidates and the open ministry. Usually the candidates will be invited to speak on successive Sundays, beginning on the earliest convenient date. The cost involved for transportation and accommodations for the ministerial candidate to visit is the church's financial responsibility. While it is not required that a love offering be presented to the candidate, it is greatly appreciated by each one.

As soon as the list of prospective candidates has been selected, the board will call the candidates to work out a mutually agreeable time for the visit and also advise the Association office of their choices.

- 8. After the candidates have all been heard and the prayer work has been done by all those concerned, a decision is made by the board. When the agreement is reached on the succession of leadership, the board is encouraged to submit a letter of confirmation containing the details of the agreement to the new minister, and to the Association office.
- 9. The Board of Directors will notify all other candidates of the choice that has been made
- 10. The next Minister's Letter will indicate the finalized placement.
- 11. The church or center will accept the responsibility for the cost of moving its new minister, his/her family and household goods to the new location, including reimbursement of minister's gas mileage and expenses for trip to new location. Should the minister choose to leave a ministry before two full years of service, it is the minister's responsibility to reimburse the ministry's percentage based on his/her length of service.

We recognize, in creating a placement structure of this kind, that it is not the Placement Committee, nor the minister/applicant, nor the Board of Directors of a ministry that bears the responsibility for the placement. All placement in the Unity movement occurs through the activity of Spirit, based upon the consciousness of all concerned.

Media Update

Recent Information from Religious Broadcasting Magazine on LPTV (Low Power Television)

LPTV is being called Local Power because it gives power to the given locality to cover community issues and events. From the Community Broadcasters Association; "When Congress and the Federal Communications Commission established the low-power television service to audiences that did not receive such service, new opportunities opened up for small business people and minority groups to own and operate television facilities."

To date, there are over 2,100 licenses or construction permits granted for low-power television stations. Some churches already have rooms available for studio offices. Low-power TV runs 18 to 24 hours a day. Programmers for these stations are seeking programs which appeal to their local community. Content includes children's, sports, home improvement, educational and often college credit courses are aired.

Find out more about LPTV in your area. This could provide an excellent opportunity for airing Unity classes and Sunday morning services in your community!

Preliminary Results of the April '92 Broadcast Survey:

Of the respondents currently using broadcasting, 25 percent are using radio; 20 percent of respondents have previously used radio; 5 percent are using television or cable.

Twenty-five percent utilize one-hour programs, 25 percent use 30-minute programs, 12 percent are 15-minute programs, 12 percent use 5-minute programs and 25 percent of the ministries use one-minute broadcast messages.

The most popular themes are: 1) Non-resistance; 2) Prosperity; 3) Love; and 4) Oneness.

With all respondents, equal value is placed on both increasing church attendance and tithing a message to the community.

The predominant age group that ministries seek through their communications plan is 35-55 years old.

Of those responding, the average size of the congregation on a given Sunday is 220 (from 700 to 30 in range).



We often hear that in Unity we teach spiritual principles that transform lives. In 36 years of being involved with Unity churches and centers. I have been blessed to witness dramatic transformations unlike any others in the setting we know as Youth of Unity.

As a former Y.O.U.er myself, I remember my teenage years as a time of trying to sort out what I believed. I knew I wanted to believe passionately in something, and I went through a time of trying on belief systems like trying on new clothes; from wild to prudish. Now I am a Y.O.U. sponsor and mother of a seventeen year old Y.O.U.er. I am watching her go through some of the same feelings and passions. What I loved then is what I love now about Y.O.U. It provides the unconditional loving space to grow into your authentic self. It's a privilege to not only watch my children transform, but to watch countless other Y.O.U.ers come out of their cocoons and spread their wings and fly. Growth and spiritual unfoldment is such a wonder!

The first time I saw Brian and James (not their real names), they arrived at a regional retreat. Both were scared fourteen-year-old's. One oversized, the other under-tall (as he liked to call himself), both expressed their fear in opposite ways. Brian reminded me of one of those giant sweet farm boys and turned out to be so shy we could never get more than one word at a time from him, usually "yes" or "no." James, on the other hand, was leather jacket clad and covered his self-consciousness with being loud and boisterous. Like at the Saturday night dance, I physically placed myself between James, clenched fists and all, and another young male Y.O.U.er, all the while expounding the virtues of non-violent methods of conflict resolution. Through four years of Y.O.U. rallies, retreats, and leadership training, I watched as both scared boys transformed into calm, poised, self-assured, Christ-centered young men. Both were elected regional officers. The final rally the two of them led was one of the best weekends I have ever experienced.

All About Me! Something Fun to Try With Your Child.

Each child's self-concept is made of his or her strengths, fears, likes, dislikes, happy moments, traumatic events, and so on. As children gain fuller pictures of themselves, they gain more confidence in their abilities and they feel better about themselves--they are building good self-concepts.



One way to help a child learn about their uniqueness is to have their own treasure box of memories. Buy, construct, or use a box you have that the child finds exciting. Tin boxes from popcorn or fancy boxes found in antique stores are fun. Help the child gather objects that are meaningful to them or that tell something about their interests, hobbies, and talents. Also, objects that represent significant events in their life--their first baby shoes, a picture of their first experience with a newborn brother or sister, a picture of a deceased pet. seashells from a trip to the sea, etc.

From time to time spend quiet time going through the box with the child. Use the objects as a time for them to share their uniqueness with family members. Different siblings will have their own unique collection. Be sure to add things as time goes on.

Partners in Ministry a network of spouses of ministers

The following letter was sent to me by a great supporter of Partners in Ministry, Don McKee of Kerrville, Texas. The letter touches a lot of what we face as partners, and I thank Don for submitting it, and for wanting to share with all of us.

"Recently, I've noticed a similarity in achurch congregation (that portion which collectively thinks it knows what is right in operating a church) and the national press corps (that portion, almost all of it, which thinks it knows how to run a country, a state, a city and/or all other people's families).

"The latter gives us the news, 'reporting' in a 'but/however' fashion. The first of the news story is given in the old time, 5-w's method, then the 'but' or 'however' comes in after the last 'w' with a three-toone or as many as five-to-one-negativeinterview-tag to complete the story.

"A minister gets 'I love you's' more frequently from the congregation than from his/her partner, although with some different meanings, implied and stated. From the congregation, the 'I love you' is often followed with a 'but' and a negative thought tagged on or a change is 'suggested.' Such as, 'I love you, but I wish you'd wear a different color.' 'I love you, but you should. . .,' and a 'suggestion' is given with a how-to operate a portion of the church; or, 'I love you, however you really shouldn't smoke,' or 'you really shouldn't make personal remarks during the lesson,' or. . . well, you add your own 'but/howevers.'

"That's where a Partner in Ministry can be a real partner in life and living.

"If you are a full-time Partner in Ministry, the 'I love you. . .but/howevers. . ." are not reserved just for the minister. The thought is that a partner probably has the inside track to the thoughts and actions of the minister. (Most of us partners, though, know that ain't necessarily so.)

"The other appearance is that the member of the congregation knows more about operating a church than a minister OR the partner--ain't necessarily so. That member may be a manger of a large, successful business. That member may be an entrepreneur who has the Midas-touch in the material world. That member may be successful in many stations of life. However (I take literary license to use the word), that member usually has yet to understand that church is not a business, but (see above) there is a business to a church.

"A year after our church was pioneered/opened, four members of the original church family of fourteen presented a list of some 50 items they would like to have changed. These items ran the gamut from where I sat after finishing my duties as platform chairman to describing what my wife should wear on Sundays. BUT, THEY LOVED US.'

"After almost fourteen years, our church congregation still has members with 'suggestions' to make.

"Over the years we have, more or less, stuck to our guns, those sling-shots that shoot pellets of Spiritual love while carrying Spiritual lessons at the same time.

"The above-mentioned four-some are no longer with us. My wife wears a robe on Sundays. I still sit on the platform during the lesson. AND the church has grown, has prospered, and is still selfsustaining.

"Being a Partner in Ministry is a great joy; however, it is sometimes necessary for us to go within ourselves--as we teach--and to search and seek and find the True Meaning of the Congregations 'Buts' and 'Howevers.' "

Agreement reached with Swaggart Ministries

The IRS has reached an agreement with the Jimmy Swaggart Ministries concerning the church's involvement in political campaigns, reports the Association Press.

The ministry is a tax exempt religious organization. In 1986, Mr. Swaggart appeared with fellow tele-evangelist Pat Robertson and offered his support for Mr. Robertson's presidential campaign. The next month, Swaggart's newsletter contained an article written by Mr. Swaggart proclaiming the Ministries' support for Mr. Robertson.

The tax code prohibits exempt organizations from participating or intervening in political campaigns for or against any candidate. Officials of exempt organizations may take part in political campaigns on an individual basis but any endorsement by a minister at a public function or in an organizational publication constitutes an endorsement by the tax exempt organization.

Swaggart accepted the finding by the IRS and consented to the agreement which requires the ministry to set up a special compliance committee to ensure that no financial resources, personnel, or other facilities of the organization will be used in future campaigns.

In explaining why the IRS chose not to revoke the ministries' exemption, Marcus Owens of the IRS said, "Our goal is not to put folks out of business. We are interested in getting the organization to comply and in getting a message out to other charities that there is a downside to intervening in a campaign."

Teaching Is An Art

Teaching is an art, not a precise science that can be analyzed and pursued in the same way that one would carry on work in a laboratory. Teaching can be defined as an art for a number of reasons.

In the first place, good teaching depends to some extent on native talent. Certain people have a keen interest in and love of teaching, just as others have a love of music or painting. We all know persons with a natural bent toward teaching-they are artists in the sense that they have been given singular gifts.

Like any other art, however, teaching is also a matter of development and learning through *practice*. A good musician has to learn the tones of the scale, then practice them; a good painter has to learn about colors, textures, design, and perspective, then use this knowledge repeatedly. So it is with teachers: we can identify the key elements in the act of teaching, but we need to practice them to develop our ability at the art. It takes patience, a love of the process, and a clear vision of the desired outcome, to overcome any tedium involved in the development of skills needed for the expression of the art.

Teaching can also be considered an art in that it arises from the inner person, just as music and painting come from deep within the artist. Love of Truth, love of people, and the urge to share by expressing oneself more fully are ingredients in the art of teaching. It would be difficult to imagine an effective teacher who did not care about truth, about other persons, and about self-expression.

Teaching is an art because there is no limit to the creativity that is possible in this field of endeavor. Musicians have only a certain number of notes to work with, but they have an infinite number of possibilities for creating new melodies. Artists have only the colors of the spec-

trum, but they can find innumerable subtle uses of them. Teachers may cover the same material from year to year, but we are always seeing new ways to approach it, new questions to be pursued. Wherever teachers and students are together, creativity can thrive.

Another reason for defining teaching as an art is the fact that the *results* of our efforts are always *unique*. We can perfect a technique of teaching, but it will vary with the students we have. We can select carefully from curricular resources, but they will be perceived in new forms and fashions in different times and places.

Finally, teachers, like artists, are always learners. They talk with other practitioners of their art to find out what is new in the field. They listen for ideas. They read voraciously to find helpful suggestions. They do not hesitate to share freely with other teachers any ideas they have discovered to be of value.

What specific forms of assistance can we suggest that will enable church teachers to catch a new vision? Let us consider several possibilities:

First, we need *many models to follow*. Most beginning teachers tend to teach in the manner they themselves were taught. From the dim recesses of the mind, they call up the techniques and approaches they experienced in their own youth. These are sometimes valuable, but we need more than memory upon which to draw. We need to see effective teaching in action. Just as a music student listens to recordings of other artists; just as a painter visits galleries to see other painters' works, so the teacher needs to be in situations in which he or she can see HOW teaching is done by skilled persons in the field. Whenever possible, we need to locate the classrooms where creative teaching is occurring and invite beginning teachers to visit, to see for themselves, these models of effectiveness.

Second, we need training events that go beyond mere talk about the act of teaching. Indeed, participants must practice the skills involved. The continuing education of teachers should include a sincere effort to link discussion of teaching with demonstration and practice that involve real students in actual classroom situations. Evaluation in these settings leads to the ability to do self-evaluation on a recurring basis. Self-evaluation usually leads to self-improvement.

Third, we need to *share resources* by means of the printed page, the taped word, and in every other way we can. Communication keeps the art alive, causing people to question old practices, to try new approaches, and to generate enthusiasm.

Fourth, we must be aware that teachers as artists thrive on appreciation. How long has it been since you yourself expressed thanks to a teacher who meant a great deal to you or who taught you something valuable? Why not phone that person today, write a letter or make a personal visit? It would be a way of saying, "Thanks for being the artist you are!"

A final note: Teachers, who are the backbone of the whole educational system, have something special to contribute to our churches and to our society as a whole. A predominant issue in education today is whether our schools and classrooms will merely follow a drift, giving the stamp of approval to whatever comes along, or whether they will offer new light, leading people to solve problems, to pursue what is right and good, and to bring about

peaceful change for the better. For Unity, this issue has the answer --Jesus Christ is our Teacher. He came to lead, to show us a new Way of Life. He said, over and over again, "You have heard..., but I say to you...." He pointed the way to a different future. Our commitment is to be involved with Him in squarely facing the future. We choose to be Christ's artists, doing our best wherever we are.

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


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THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER



Edie Skalitzky Unity Church in the Rockies Colorado Springs, Colorado

Last year I was given a couple of books written by Henri J. M. Nouwen, a priest and Catholic theologian. The titles of the books are In the Name of Jesus and Wounded Healer. They have profoundly touched me and I am often drawn back to them not only for inspiration but for the challenge they offer. The ideas in his books cause me to continue to evaluate exactly how I truly desire to interact with people in general, and specifically with people in my ministry.

Henri Nouwen in his book, In the Name of Jesus, writes, "Somehow we have come to believe that good leadership requires a safe distance from those we are called to lead." He then goes on to describe how vital it is that we NOT keep a safe distance from others, but that we share our lives--our hopes and dreams, our joys and sorrows, our courage and our fear.

When I first came into the ministry in the 1970's, and for many years thereafter, I kept a safe distance from the people in the church, and this attitude, I now see, carried over into my relationships outside the church as well. During those years there was a nagging, persistent sense that something major was missing in my life and in my ministry of serving others. From this present vantage point, I know that what was lacking was a feeling of being really connected or at one with those I desired to love and serve. In counseling, in public speaking, in informal gatherings, my life and its challenges and processes were guarded, and if shared, were within a pretty positive framework of reference. Rarely did anyone know of my loneliness or pain for there was a part to play--the ministerial role. I don't mean to imply here that we spill our guts all the time either, but that we become more willing to share honestly our own pain and process of inner healing and transformation.

It is so easy to fall into the trap of role playing and mask wearing whether we be minister, spouse, licensed teacher, parent, or worker in whatever field of endeavor. We have been taught and have accepted that we are to act, speak, and be according to each role's dictates. But all too often we live out the prescribed role and forget the role of the heart.

At the South Central Unity Family Retreat in July, one of the speakers, Foster McClellan said that, "we just don't love each other enough." He said this in connection with what could help to turn the world and its people around. That evening and the next day, a number of people talked about how deeply that one statement of Foster's had impacted them. It also was another reminder for me to be aware of keeping my heart open in wisdom to whomever I am with in whatever context it appears, whether at the market, dentist office, while driving, in counseling, or giving a Sunday message, etc.

What might I mean by saying, "keeping my heart open"? In part, I mean that I desire to be with others as equals, as peers, that when I am with someone/ anyone, we are both wounded and both with healing capacities. We are both capable of suffering and we are both capable of healing. My woundedness can evoke your healer and your woundedness can evoke my healer, and then we two healers can collaborate. Another way of saying it is, "The Christ in me greets the Christ in you and we are one."

Attempting to live life this way has changed dramatically the way I interact with others and how they interact with me. Others see me as human, with human ups and downs (not on a pedestal knowing all the whys and wherefores of life), and, therefore, they feel freer and safer to relate their humanness and challenges. As a result, we are more open to being in the Christ consciousness together, which heals and makes us whole.

Releasing some of the masks we have been wearing does make us more vulnerable and open to analysis and criticism. Yet, we each know that when we have let down some of our barriers, what also can occur is a depth of love and healing that is wondrous beyond words.

My thanks to Henri Nouwen who reminds us that a whole new model of living, as well as leadership, is called for in the world today; a model that is based on the servant-leader-equality-oneness idea demonstrated by Jesus Christ whom we seek to follow.



Do you know someone who "practices" law? Not long ago, I still at least smiled broadly, if not laughed, upon hearing that a physician "practiced" medicine or an attorney "practiced" law.

Sometimes I mused aloud and sometimes silently, but almost always I asked, "How long does one have to "practice" a profession before one is proficient?" Then July 22nd came, the anniversary of my beginning to work in Silent Unity, and suddenly I realized I've been 'practicing' ministry for 35 years, and no end in sight.

Since ministry is a process that cannot be fixed in time or space or measured with precision, no one can do ministry perfectly. At least, I've not yet heard anyone make the claim that they could. It seems then that we are all "practicing" ministry.

I hear increasing numbers of care givers, particularly you, my minister/colleagues, giving themselves and one another permission to "color outside the lines." A sign I could post outside the door of my life: "Please pardon my dust and the inconvenience; my life (and my ministry) is under reconstruction."

Although I have been asked to "manage" the organization called our Association of Unity Churches on a day-to-day basis, my "ministry" is that of serving you, my colleagues, and thereby serving your ministry. I constantly seek to do both better and in the practicing, I sometimes "color outside the lines."

In such an effort, I recently learned of Hyler Bracey et al's book, *Managing* From The Heart; I purchased the twopart audio cassette based on the book.* It's really "good stuff" for both managers and ministers. And since all ministers are managers, of volunteers as well as paid staff, and managers of relationships with those to whom they minister, Bracey's work seems especially appropriate.

The audio cassette takes the form of an allegory throughout. A fictional manager is allowed to relive his life based on the five management (ministry) principles being championed. The five principles form the acronym, "heart."

- H car and understand me. (When people feel they have been listened to and understood, they will be ready to hear what the manager [minister] has to say.)
- E ven if you disagree, please don't make me wrong. (People resent having their self-worth questioned. If they don't get mad, they get even.)
- A cknowledge the greatness within me. (Everyone has the potential for growth. They tend to respond positively when that potential is recognized.)
- R emember to look for my loving intentions. (Recognize positive motivations.)
- T ell me the truth with compassion. (Talk to people respectfully, not about them disdainfully.)

HEART. I guess my life's sign might read: ". . .my life and my ministry are under PERPETUAL reconstruction."

invited Joyce Kramer, John Salunek, and me to share in the celebration as Unity Church was recognized as a full status church. John Salunek, minister of Unity Church of Christ in Philadelphia, employed Michael upon his graduation and ordination in 1990 as assistant minister. One of Michael's responsibilities was serving the church in Wilmington. The group had seven persons attending at the time. With the nurturing from John and Betsy Salunek and the board of Unity Church of Christ, and Michael's loving, caring leadership, the church grew and was able to move forward in achieving full status church recognition. The church now has 50 members. Michael and key leaders from Unity Church - Prayer & Practical Christianity were able to move out of a hotel and rent a building. The feeling of a goal accomplished at the special occasion in May was rewarding. The members attending were excited and enthusiastic about hanging the wings presented by the sponsoring church, along with the plaque from the Association of Unity Churches, recognizing them as a member of the Association. The feeling of dedication and commitment of everyone present was easily felt and, of course, Michael now serves this church full time.

Sometimes we as ministers and congregants believe that bigger churches and more people attending are better and more successful than the average-sized church. What is important, however, is that all of us are serving God through serving humankind. The love and commitment each one has to learning the principles and practicing and applying them in daily living transforms the success of a church. Churches with 50, 100, 200, or 1,000 in attendance can all be equally successful if the persons attending are experiencing transformation and are growing spiritually.

It is important to set goals for the church, implementing them, setting more goals, and again striving for the accomplishment of these new goals. It is also important for ministers and congregants to believe in and feel the success of their church right where it is in attendance Some churches may never break the 200 barrier, but these churches are still meeting and filling a need. If the minister and congregants want to grow they need to accept and give thanks for where the church is right now. They need to trust the activity of Spirit always working through each individual involved and through the church activities and functions. Spirit moving through each and every one will propel the church forward and will bring forth the achievements desired.

Recently, I talked with Michael Mullen and asked if he had any words of wisdom to share. He said, "The most important thing to remember is the building of consciousness. And, the building of consciousness happens by building a strong foundation through remaining Christcentered and by teaching basic Unity principles and teachings."

Remember: The key element in a successful church is people experiencing transformation, learning and being better equipped to deal with and grow through the bumps and challenges on life's everunfolding journey.

God bless you, pioneers, ministers, teachers, lay leaders, as we expand our Unity movement by spreading the message of Unity and Truth.

DEVELOPMENT OFFICE NEWS



Shay St. John Director of Development

"Let us realize that Unity, as an institution, exists in two worlds: the world of Spirit in which we perform our principal services of healing and teaching and for which no charge can ever be made, and the material world in which we must deal with business entities, banks, vendors, and money. Unity's genius lies not in 'never asking for money,' but in a sane, loving, daring attempt to balance the needs of these two worlds for mankind's betterment." These words from Charles R. Fillmore, written in December, 1965, are the clearest expression of the work ahead for all of us in the arena of fund raising.

Our Development Department is creating a well-rounded program to insure the financial future of your Association of Unity churches and provide a workable pattern for use within our Unity field ministries. This is a pioneering venture in which we affirm that "sane, loving, daring attempt" to find the balance between prayerfully affirming, "God is our Source," and walking in our Way-Shower's footsteps who taught us, "Ask, and ye shall receive."

Some have questioned the various "campaigns" in which we are involved. The following overview outlines the various projects created within our Development Department, the purpose and the

goals each holds, and the specific ways funds are received. Each program is a model for use within our field ministries, and we have materials available to any group who requests them.

1. Our Capital Campaign is the first project undertaken by our Development Department. By definition, a capital campaign generates funds for a specific one-time project that has a beginning and an end point. Normally, capital campaigns are building projects. This was our initial focus.

However, this campaign shifted focus as we remained responsive to the guidance of God. Rather than building a \$5.5 million building, we purchased and remodeled a wonderful office space that will satisfy our needs for many years.

Critical to our mission of service is creation of quality teaching materials for our children, youth, and families. Therefore, a marriage of two very specific projects into our "Caring NOW!" campaign allows both goals to be fulfilled at a significantly lower cost.

"Caring NOW!" has a goal of \$4,000,000 over a four-year period. This will provide \$2,500,000 for curriculum development and \$1,500,000 to pay for and maintain our building.

Gifts may be specifically designated to our building costs or curriculum development. We encourage the vision of the importance of both projects, and gifts to "Caring NOW!" will bring both dreams into fulfillment.

2. STARlight is our Annual Fund. Its focus is on funding for the day-to-day operation of our Association of Unity Churches. Because we are a global organization, STARlight is operated almost solely as a mail campaign, inviting individuals to join our STARlight Team.

Our goal is a minimum of 500 individual donors contributing at least \$500 annually. In addition, we celebrate gifts of any size. All donations insure quality services to our field ministries.

Twenty-five percent (25%) of all STARlight funds goes to a designated project. This project is selected by our Resource Development Committee, recommended to our Board of Trustees, and

approved or revised by our Board.

For 1991-92, 25% of STARlight funds was designated to help international ministries and/or ministers.

For 1992-93, 25% of STARlight funds benefits our Year of the Child project.

Julic Montague is our Annual Fund coordinator. She delights in talking with you about the importance of an Annual Fund!

3. Planned Giving completes the development picture. This is an area in which much work is yet to be done. We have prepared an excellent wills brochure that is ready to be placed in our churches.

In addition, our Pooled Income Fund is an exciting way for donors to earn lifetime income on an irrevocable gift that may be designated to both the Unity church of their choice and your Association of Unity Churches. This Pooled Income Fund is especially attractive to donors with appreciated assets who would like to donate stock and receive appreciable tax benefits.

Deborah Turner-Bey is our Planned Giving and Grants Officer. She is available to answer your questions in either area.

- 4. Special projects create one-time opportunities for donors to benefit specific needs. Our Tree of Life sculpture is our International Youth of Unity service project for the next three years. Engraving allows donors to honor loved ones and/or affirms a spiritual message on a permanent sculpture at our World Headquarters Building.
- 5. Memorial gifts are received through our Celebration of Life Chapel Fund. Gifts sent in honor of loved ones who have made their transition are inscribed in a permanent record book within our chapel. Donated funds are then allocated by our Board of Trustees for special projects.

Life insurance is personal property and as such has value, is transferable, and can be given as a charitable gift. Many of us have experienced changes in the circumstances under which life insurance policies were purchased, rendering them "obsolete." If you would like to support the STARlight Annual Fund, Caring NOW! Capital Campaign, or make a general love offering to our Association, check your life insurance policies. Compare your coverage with present needs. Then consider how your life insurance can be used to help you meet current, more appropriate goals.

Several options are available to you in making a gift of insurance.

▲ You can name our Association of Unity Churches and/or your local Unity church as beneficiaries of a policy you own in one of the following ways.

- a) As co-beneficiary, primary, secondary, or final beneficiary.
- b) As remainder beneficiary of an insurance policy settlement agreement.
- ▲ You can assign your annual dividends to the Association as a way to make regular gifts of tax-free income which may be deducted on your income tax return.

Utilizing Focus Groups in the Planning Process

In my CONTACT article, "A New Look At Strategic Planning" (Aug./Sept. issue), I included the concept of using focus groups in the planning model. In addition to the article, my consultations and training sessions in the field have resulted in a great interest and many questions about the use and value of focus groups.

In this article, I would like to explore the use of focus groups in gathering insight and information about a ministry. In his book, Quality Management in the Nonprofit World, Larry Kennedy makes a strong, but very practical case for implementing quality management through an organization. I believe this begins with planning. I would like to share one of his quotes that I believe supports the idea of focus groups.

One of the things that will become clear to you as you embrace these concepts (quality management) is the need to be aware of your environment. The attitudes, ideas, and philosophies of those around you must be clearly understood.

Your staff, volunteers, contributors, and clients all have valuable insight into the processes of your organization that can provide the critical adjustments you want to achieve.

Focus groups can be used in two different ways. First in the data collection and assessment phase of planning. This is the more traditional way of gathering perceptions or information about the ministry by asking a series of open-ended, yet "focused" questions about the church or center. For example, one question might be, "How is this church (or center) distinct or unique from other churches in our community."

The second way I have been using focus groups was described in the analysis, writing the plan, and validation phase. During this phase the congregation and staff are asked to give feedback or validate the draft documents such as the core values and mission and vision statement from the planning efforts of the strategic planning committee. By the time many you read this article, I hope you will have gone through this feedback or validation process at your regional meetings.

Kennedy makes an interesting statement, "Remember: ask, listen, think, and then do." This is sound advice for those ministers and boards wanting to grow, change, and continually improve the ministry.

Focus Groups

The use of focus groups have been part of market research for several years. These groups are used to gain insights and directional data. According to Jeffrey Davidson in The Marketing Source Book For Small Business, their primary effectiveness is in evaluating the attitudes and underlying beliefs held by respondents and identifying the key issues that must be dealt with.

One of the great values of focus groups is to take advantage of group dynamics and getting the participants to react to and build upon one another's ideas. Keeping in mind that all responses are "correct" because these are the individual's perceptions or experiences.

Regis McKenna in his book, The Regis Touch, states that focus groups can provide a type of qualitative information where potential customers directly express their ideas and opinions. It relies on an intuitive approach where decision makers look for patterns, trends, and connections. For some people relying on intuition instead of theories and numbers is viewed as "soft." There are those who believe if it can't be measured it isn't

I believe the qualitative information gathered during focus groups is valid. It is another form of knowledge. The key is to be sure you are interviewing or talking to the right people. In a church you have the "right" people. They include present congregation, those attending the classes and workshops, the volunteers, and former members or attendees if they are willing to participate.

Facilitator/Interviewer. To be effective, a focus group needs an experienced, trained facilitator or interviewer. This individual must have a good understanding of group dynamics and a knowledge of the subject matter or the organi-

Having worked with several ministries over the past year, I know there are many congregation members with excellent experience and skills in facilitating focus groups. Other churches have access to trained facilitators/interviewers in their communities. As always, I am willing to assist all ministries in a variety of ways should you be interested in learning more about conducting focus groups in your church.

When possible it is a good idea to have the same facilitator conduct the series of focus groups. This person has the opportunity to hear the "words" and the "music" from a variety of people within the church. By listening with their "third ear" to a variety of people and their comments they begin to get a real sense of the ministry--how people are feeling--and know when to probe a little more when the "words and music" do not appear to match or when the participants' comments are not clear.

Structure. A focus group usually consists of eight to twelve people and runs two to three hours. Ideally it is held in pleasant surroundings with some refreshments. It is important to make the environment inviting and informal, While the environment is important, it is not intended to be a challenge to the focus group process. I remember a dedicated

group of Unity ministers and licensed teachers meeting in a very pleasant room at Asilomar near Pebble Beach in California. The roaring fire, hot coffee, and fresh rolls seemed to get this group going strong at 7:00 a.m.

In working with one church client recently, the issue of the board being present vs. not being present during the focus group became a major challenge. Some members of the board wanted to be there to "hear" what members of the congregation had to say, while others believed their presence would inhibit the comments and free-flowing discussion. While wishing to respect these differing viewpoints, my experience supports not having board members present during focus groups. There are several reasons for this. As stated above, the presence of board members often does inhibit the discussion; sometimes board members will react verbally or nonverbally to the comments being made which is not appropriate nor helpful. For some board members it is particularly frustrating to hear responses that appear to be the direct opposite from the information given to a congregation by the minister or board. There is a tendency to want to jump into the discussion and "correct" the person. Yet we must remember we are asking people to share their perceptions--which in their mind are right.

In addition, when a board member observes only one focus group they get a very limited view of what eight or twelve congregation members are thinking and feeling. If the board is serving as the planning committee, they will receive a summary report of all focus groups and spend a great deal of time reading, analyzing, and utilizing the data from the focus groups. When there is a separate planning committee consisting of board and congregation members, which I highly encourage, I make sure the board receives a separate summary of the focus groups so they are kept informed. Ultimately the key decision makers will see the information.

As part of the strategic planning process, I always make sure that the minister(s), board and/or planning committee are a focus group. Their perceptions and insights are important. By par-

ticipating in a focus group it helps them understand and, hopefully, appreciate the process.

It is interesting to note that traditionally people are paid to participate in focus groups. This has NOT been the custom in the churches or when I was conducting focus groups for the Association. I wonder what would happen if we did the reverse and ask people to make a love offering? Just an idea--not a recommendation.

Now that you know a little about focus groups--why they are useful, something about the structure--let's look at the types of questions that may be asked.

Focus Group Questions

The facilitator/interviewer usually begins with a broad open-ended question such as the one mentioned above or, "Who or what first brought or attracted you to the church? Why did you keep coming back?"

Free and easy discussion is encouraged hoping the group dynamics will bring out feelings, thoughts, and actions of participants. One of the key tasks of the

facilitator is to keep the discussion "focused" by keeping the comments on the question or topic and making sure everyone in the group is involved in the discussion.

There are many ways to record the discussion or comments: flipchart, audio tape recordings, or video tape recordings; some groups I have worked with provided a person to take notes, providing additional information. Whichever process is used is up to the individual church, the facilitator, and their financial resources. When I was conducting the first round of focus groups in the fall of 1991 with field ministers and licensed teachers. I found recording the information on a flipchart (often many, many pages) was effective and easy to transcribe for analysis and study by the Board of Trustees. This method provided the anonymity desired by many participants.

Listed below are a series of questions that could be used in a ministry. The more questions asked the more data that is generated and available for study and use in planning.

Proposed Focus Group Questions

- 1. Who or what first brought or attracted you to (insert name of church or center)? Why did you return or keep coming back?
- 2. What is your perception of the mission of our church?
- 3. What do you believe to be the strengths of our church?
- 4. What are some of the weaknesses or challenges facing our church that concern you the most?
- 5. Should we enlarge our array of services, programs, classes, etc.? In what areas and how do you see this being funded?
- 6. What are you willing to do to assist the ministry in providing current or additional programs and activities?
- 7. What is your perception of what the minister, board of directors, and lay leaders do in the ministry?
- 8. Describe our church three to five years from now. What will it look like, who will be here, what types of activities will be going on, etc.

Analyzing and Using The Data

Dealing with all of the information or data resulting from focus groups can appear to be an overwhelming task for planning committees and boards. I have even talked with a few facilitators and consultants who have had brief feelings of being overwhelmed with focus group data. Organizing the responses from all the focus groups by question is most effective and efficient. The planning committee reads the entire focus groups summary and has an opportunity to ask clarifying questions of the facilitator and/or consultant. Depending upon the length of the summary or number of responses and the size of the planning committee, I usually break the committee down into smaller working groups to give them more time to really study and react to the information.

To assist the small work groups, I recommend using the questions at right. (My special thanks to Susan Everson at McRel Educational Labs for her input into these forms.)

Conclusion

To some this may seem like a lot of work and effort to get the answers to a few questions that could be done with "pencil and paper" type questionnaires. I agree that organizing and conducting focus groups is a lot of work. It is also exciting, stimulating, invites greater participation and connecting by congregation members, and generates a wide range of perceptions.

Written surveys do provide quantitative and qualitative information for planning committees. There have been instances when I have recommended their use with congregations. While the response rate is often less than desired, there are ways to increase this through additional mailings and telephone reminders.

My recent experiences with focus groups has been extremely productive and informative. (It is also fun!) I encourage you as the minister, board member, or leader of a church or center to consider using focus groups as part of your planning process. 
As a special highlight of the Year of the Child celebration we encourage all ministers to bring their Youth Education Directors to conference in 1993.

A group of 36 adult and teen Unity members from all over the United States and Canada traveled to Russia to help establish Youth of Unity (Y.O.U.) in that country. This group was led by The Reverend David McArthur, Ray Wiggins (International Education Services Consultant, on staff at your Association of Unity Churches) and Regional Consultants Judy Lewis, Jackie Green, and Duncan Lewis.

The purpose of this trip was to provide leadership training and resources to adults and teens in Russia, helping them establish and strengthen YOUTH OF SPIRITUAL UNITY RUSSIA. A twoday seminar was conducted in Moscow with representatives from Spiritual Unity (the first Unity ministry in Russia). The seminar was in three sections: adults who wished to learn how to start and lead Y.O.U. chapters met with Ray and a team of Y.O.U. sponsors; Russian teens met with Y.O.U'ers from the United States and Canada; and another group of adults met with David to learn the basic Unity teachings and organization. On the closing day, Ray presented a plaque recognizing the official formation of Youth of Spiritual Unity in Moscow to representatives of that group.

The second leg of the trip took our travelers to the city of Ekaterinburg in the Ural Mountains. There they met with representatives of Spiritual Unity, the city's religious organization director and the mayor of the city. The first meeting was formal, followed by a very businesslike discussion of Unity and Y.O.U. while our teens did joy songs and spiritual dancing with Russian teens. The second night they had a less formal program with music, a lesson by David McArthur, meditation by Alexandra Zykova (2nd-year ministerial student) and an exchange of gifts. During this program a document was signed by representatives of Spiritual Unity and Youth of Unity International officially establishing Youth of Spiritual Unity Ekaterinburg. This was done even before the Unity Church of Ekaterinburg is officially registered there as a church, which should be completed shortly.

Your reaction to your child's report card--does it help or hurt? by Judi Venturini Year of the Child Coordinator

School has started and it is never too soon to think about report cards! Getting a report card can be a time of celebration or a time of stress and conflict! Self-esteem is closely related to success in school and the higher our esteem, the more success we will experience.

A failing grade can lower our esteem almost faster than anything else I have experienced. Think back to a time when you were challenged in school. I remember geometry my sophomore year of high school. I was an "A" student until then. That "D-" glared out on my report card. I almost ran away from home that day rather than face the humiliation and terror of showing it to my parents.

How can we support our children with their grades at the very beginning and increase esteem?

1) Never confuse the value you place on your child with the grade he/she receives on their report card. They need support and encourage-

ment. Try asking how they feel about their grades and how they would like to improve themselves. Then make a plan for how they can meet their goals. Ask how you can support them to help them succeed.

2) Look at alternative ways to study. Facts that have to be memorized can be recorded on a tape player with Adagio music in the background. This is called a "superlearning tape." The child can listen to the tape just before going to bed or in the car when traveling.

For spelling words, try making the list on large butcher paper and placing from a clothesline hung at the foot of the bed. The child will look up from the pillow, thus bypassing their feelings. (Most children study with the eyes down and this puts the person into their feeling nature.) Larger words can be divided in color-coded syllables. This is a visual clue.

3) Instead of pointing out their errors, point out what they did well. I am convinced that if more teachers highlighted what was correct with yellow highlighter, instead of marking what is incorrect with red marker, children would retain more. (Yellow increases intelligence and red brings up feelings of power and authority.)

God bless our children throughout this school year!

event in over 70 years in Red Square on July 4--a celebration of independence and ending the evening with our group singing the Unity Peace Song.

*Being the first Americans to be housed in a facility that had previously only been used for members of the Young Communist elite.

*Being the first to ever set foot on a Soviet military base and to fly by charter military jet.

*Being the first to sing the Peace Song while straddling the border of Europe and Asia.

Ekaterinburg has only been open to visitors for a year and a half, so they were among the first Americans to visit that city.

Upon his return, Ray Wiggins commented, "Beyond measure is the bond established. Truly a heart connection occurred. It is vital to them and to the Unity movement for us to remain connected in heart, in prayer, and in person. It is my goal to return with another leadership team in 1993." In a recent letter to Ray from the Russian Y.O.U'ers came these comments about the visit: ". . .thank you for coming here. . .I became to look on the world another eyes. . . I thought much about Unity and I decided that Unity is the best organization for me, because here I may be sincere and free. Thank you, for you wake up my feelings. . .Yesterday we met and decided to try to make our Unity the best organization for the youth. . . we hope we meet with you again and again."

The International Youth of Unity Service Project, TREE OF LIFE, will help support this type of important Youth of Unity International activity. Isn't it a delight to discover something that is simple, elegant, and works too?

Recently I came across three very simple techniques that are so full of common sense it makes them truly elegant. This is because they adapt to countless situations we encounter in our day-to-day ministries as well as the simple living of life. One technique deals with conflict resolutions, another with managing a meeting, and the third deals with selling a product or idea. (In ministry this is counseling, giving a talk, or teaching a class.)

Conflict Resolutions

In the book, *Building Productive Teams* (families, staffs, committees, etc.), Glenn Varney offers this outstandingly simple framework for conflict resolutions:

Bring the parties together and interview each in turn, as the others listen, asking the following questions:

- 1. What is the problem as you perceive it?
- 2. What does the other person do that contributes to the problem?
- 3. What do you want or need from the other person?
- 4. What do you do that contributes to the problem?
- 5. What first step can you take to resolve the problem?

After the questioning, the parties enter a discussion to arrive at a mutual understanding of the problem and to reach agreement on steps to resolve the problem.

The process works best if you:

 Allow the parties to vent blame--to get hostility out of their systems.

- Encourage each one of them to admit partial responsibility for the problem.
- Wind up with some sort of quid pro quo agreement that you specify and put in writing.

Managing A Meeting

Haven't we all found ourselves leaving a meeting where we knew for certain only one or two or maybe even none of the relevant issues were dealt with--either time ran out or the participants wore out!

Certainly not every meeting will avail itself to this technique but even if just a few do, it will be well worth keeping it in mind. In his book, *Interacting In Groups: Theory and Practice*, Donald W. Klopf offers these five simple steps to meeting management:

- 1. The person leading the meeting introduces the idea of the problem census and asks for responses.
- 2. The members briefly propose the problems or issues they want to talk about. (Controversial topics can be presented to the group leader in writing, rather than from the floor.)
- Each topic is listed on a chalkboard or tablet on an easel.
- 4. By a vote, usually a show of hands, the members prioritize the issues.
- 5. Each issue is discussed in order until time is up. Leftovers can be addressed at the next meeting.

Selling A Product or Idea

Neil Rackham in his book, *SPIN Selling* offers an easily adaptable framework to help us stay on track in many counseling situations. His technique focuses upon four kinds of questions: *Situation Questions, Problem Questions, Implication Questions*, and *Need-payoff Questions*. The questions I will offer use the framework but focuses on counseling in the ministry. Keep in mind our attitude or the thoughts we hold about our clients have as much to do with how effectively we communicate as do any of the techniques we may learn and use.

- 1. Situation Questions: This is simply data gathering.
 - How long has this been going on?
 - What specifically do you see yourself dealing with?
 - What brought you here today?

2. Problem Questions:

- What is this situation preventing you from doing?
- Could you tell me more about how this situation is affecting your life?
 Continued...

- What is the hardest part to deal with?
 Help people define the problem and it will begin to come into perspective.
- **3. Implication Questions:** These questions help the person explore the problems *effects* and *consequences*. This creates energy for change that can be focused for positive outcomes.
 - How will this situation affect your future?
 - How is this situation affecting those around you?
 - Can you tell me more about how this situation has affected the quality of your life?
- 4. Needs-payoff Questions: These questions focus the individual's energies and begin the personal involvement in resolving the situation.
 - If this situation were to be improved by 10%, what would be the effect? (Some problems are resolved in stages.)
 - If a reasonable solution could be reached, how would this affect your life? (This helps one to move beyond the problem.)
 - If you could have all the help you wanted in resolving this situation, what kind of help would you ask for? (This helps in gathering resources.)

Needs-payoff questions have a strong relationship to success. Rackham has found that the top performers ask more than 10 times as many of these questions as do average sales people. In one way we, too, are sales persons; we sell people on their ability to resolve situations in their lives.

Certainly none of these techniques is applicable in every situation. Yet, if one of these techniques helps you in just one situation, isn't it worth the time it took you to read this article? More often than not knowing the Christ within our counselees will provide the atmosphere in which positive resolution can occur. These questions provide a framework for the time we spend together.



A Book Review

The Spiritual Athlete: a primer for the inner life compiled & edited by Ray Berry

The Spiritual Athlete, compiled and edited by Ray Berry and illustrated by his son Niclas (Joshua Press. Olema, California \$14.95), is about fire--burning passion and con-



suming spirit. It portrays the fiery lives of 22 truth-seekers ranging through most of the major religious denominations of the world--Hinduism, Buddhism, Sufism, Christianity, Judaism, Taoism, and even Roman philosophy (Plotinus). But it seems that religion, or at least the literature of religion, is a fairly chauvinistic discipline. As Ray searched for his representative holy people, he noticed that they were mostly men. (Though eight of the chapters were written by a woman, short-story writer Nancy Pope Mayorga.) To remedy this inequity he sat down and wrote four more chapters, each describing the life of a woman with a burning soul.

These women are not your everyday Mother Theresas. For example, there was Rabi'a, a slave in Basra. "There was a fire in the desert at Basra in the eighth century; it burned for almost 90 years and illumined the way for many others." This fire was Rabi'a, a Sufi woman "on fire with love." Another slave, this one a black 19th century American, became "Soujourner Truth." As one can see from her picture on the cover her inner strength was formidable. Perhaps the first woman's rights activist in this country, she was so outspoken that people were afraid to let her talk. Another formidable woman is "Peace Pilgrim," the wandering nun who walked North America "like a leaf blown in the wind" until she was 73 years old.

The Spiritual Athlete dresses out its characters with flesh and bone. These are not easy aesthetes, but difficult humans struggling with doubt, temptation, and fear.

Thoreau is here, too. The American hero of action versus inaction, the wilderness refugee, the pioneer of simple living and high thinking who made his habitat, Walden pond, the habitat of the American psyche.

Karma = Balance

Karma often gets a lot of bad press in Unity circles. I believe this is because the Western mind is not conditioned to absorb the Eastern concept. Karma is a matter of consciousness. Although it has been defined as "cause and effect," in the Absolute, there is no duality; cause and effect are one. There is only on presence and one power, God the Good. The idea that Karma is shaped by our actions is only partially true since what we do is determined by what we think. It is often thought that if in one life we were someone who put out people's eyes we would have to spend another lifetime blind. On the other hand, we might invent the Braille system!

Like blowing up a balloon, consciousness is an expanding sphere of light, attracting experiences to us which will provide opportunities for growth. Until we gain insight and understanding in a given situation we need to repeat the lessons. Once we have grasped a Divine Idea, we move on to the next "grade" and to new experiences designed to assist us in our continuing process of development.

Karma is all too often thought of as crime and punishment, when, in fact, it is a delicate balance. In the Aramaic language one of the words for religion is DINA which means balance. Whatever we sow, we reap. Jesus taught that the law of vengeance (an eye for an eye...) was to be replaced by the law of love (grace). The Aramaic word for grace means loving kindness. In that respect, the Law is grace. The loving kindness of Spirit has given us immutable Law upon which we can rely completely. If it were not so, the resultant chaos would be hell, indeed.

Many people speak of paying our Karmic debts and neglect to mention that there are also Karmic credits. Our awareness is the sum of everything we have ever thought, felt, been and done. This, then, is the influence that may be carried over from past lives. Whatever we do, whatever we learn, whatever growth we attain results in feedback from the Universe which neither approves nor condemns; it simply reflects. Guilt about the past is inappropriate and totally unproductive.

"Transcending" Karma does not mean that we can circumvent the manifestation of, or avoid responsibility for, our deeds. The law cannot break itself. But remember, the Law is Love. Henry Drummond, in his beautiful exposition on the thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians, tells us that if only we loved enough we could not even think of committing the destructive acts forbidden by the Ten Commandments. We transcend Karma and the effects of past mistakes when our conscious awareness is in harmony with our true spiritual nature. Then our every motive and expressing bring only the highest good to ourselves and others.

Forgiveness, like prayer, is for us to learn; God does not need to forgive because God does not condemn. The sun shines and the rain falls on the just and the unjust alike. God never sees us as anything but the perfect expression of the Divine Idea that we were created. When Jesus prayed, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do," he was setting an example for a people whose culture for centuries had been one of revenge and "even exchanges." It was necessary for his followers to hear those words from their beloved teacher so that they would not seek to avenge his death and so that they could be free of the bonds of hatred and vengeance. Jesus knew full well that God did not need to be instructed to forgive the perpetrators of his crucifixion. Had he not told his disciples to be perfect as the Father in Heaven is perfect? That word perfect in Aramaic means all inclusive. When we practice unconditional love for all our fellows we will be in a state of grace, perfect in our consciousness, balanced in all areas of our lives.

Teaching For Reflective Thinking

As a student of the Unity way of life for almost twenty years and a teacher of children and of teachers for over twice that many years, I have come to understand that Unity has much to offer the children.

However, we must not make the mistake of using traditional teaching techniques which have produced the dilemma of our current educational system. We must acknowledge that all true learning is a spiritual process in which each individual learns to nourish the "God seed" within them as Mr. Fillmore describes it. Buckminster Fuller says that every child is a potential genius and is innately programmed to comprehend the Universal Principles of the Universal Mind.

For each child to nurture his/her spiritual nature and to learn to develop his/her talents to the fullest requires learning reflective thinking. I use the term "reflective thinking" as a comprehensive term in order to avoid the limitations of ritualistic definitions often associated with such powerful reflective techniques as prayer, meditation, etc. I use reflective thinking in the same sense that we were advised in the Bible to "pray without ceasing," that is, a way to stay constantly in touch with the creative Source within each of us. Learning to think reflectively is a process of learning constantly to check our life situation with the "God Seed" within us to sense if there is spiritual enlightenment or a sense of disharmony.

Reflective thinking is a process of the mind--not just the brain. Buckminster Fuller says that the brain is the physical "control room," while the mind is the spiritual

So the question becomes: "How do we help children tap into that creative, spiritual energy within each of them?" As David Elkind reminds us in his article in the *Holistic Education Journal*, Spring, 1992, the traditional school's educational philosophy is primarily that of "filling the pail." What we need to embrace is an education philosophy of "lighting the flame." This requires that the child reflect on his/her educational experiences; not just regurgitate information or worse yet, perform an activity that she/he has no motivation to engage in. The latter results in learning to dislike this particular activity. Many of our children have learned to dislike learning--to dislike school, even Sunday school.

There are, indeed, teaching techniques which cause a child to be reflective and which allow a child to choose to approach new learning situations from his/her spiritual/creative center. Back in the '60s there was considerable interest in teaching for creativity by persons who recognized the need to access the deeper nature of the mind. Most of this was sparked by E. Paul Torrance at the University of Minnesota.

The following arc Torrance's five cardinal principles for inspiring creative thinking:

- 1. Treat all questions with respect.
- 2. Be respectful of imaginative, unusual ideas.
- 3. Show children their ideas have value.
- 4. Give opportunities for practice or experimentation.
- 5. Encourage self-initiated learning.

Some specific teaching techniques which Torrance discusses in his book are presented here briefly:

Brainstorming--This is spontaneous, free-wheeling reaction to an idea by a group of persons where all ideas are accepted and recorded. This is followed by combining some of the ideas and improving on them.

Props and Starters—This technique involves the use of an interesting conversion piece: a stuffed animal, a huga-world, an unusual piece of clothing, a toy, flowers, an unusual collection of items, etc., as a focus for presenting an idea for discussion. A starter for reflective thinking is to use an open-ended question. For example: What would happen if _______?

Another idea is to ask children to arrange a group of pictures so that they tell a story and ask them to share their story.

Developing Originality--Ask children to report unusual incidents which have special meaning to them. Encourage humor. Humor provides a healthy way to look at problems.

Developing Sensitivity--Tape recorders can be used to record spontaneous conversations. As children listen to the playback, ask them if they can think of a more constructive way of communicating the same ideas.

Developing Curiosity—Asking questions and guessing games stimulate reflection.

Play Techniques

Play is the natural, reflective way children learn. Volumes have been written on children's play as learning. There are many play techniques such as "free play" in which children explore their environment freely. Children need more time to just play in the sand at the beach or take something apart and put it back together again. Then there is dramatic play where children act out a story from their point of view. Role play is still another technique which allows children to act out a problem situation spontaneously.

Fannie Shaftel, as a professor at Stanford University, created a technique which she called Sociodramatic Play. Children use real or make-believe props to play real life roles in spontaneous interaction. Since time immemorial children have played house, grocery store, etc. The idea is for the teacher to listen to the children's language and observe behaviors during the spontaneous play. After the playing, the teacher can bring the group together to reflect on the samples of language and behavior.

Storytelling and Children's Literature

Jesus gave us the model for reflective storytelling with the parables, perhaps we need to create some modern parables.

In the preface to his book, *From Wonder to Wisdom*, Charles A. Smith of Kansas State University says that "for a story to work its magic in reaching a child's mind it must entertain, not through the front door of logic, but through the back door of intuition and feeling." He groups stories into topics such as "courage," "friends," "loss and grief," "learning kindness," "awareness," "solving problems," and "self-esteem."

A story helps a child reflect on the quality of his/her life experiences. She/He deals with the essence of life--the spiritual nature of humanity.

Teacher As Resource

The teacher's roles in encouraging reflective thinking in children is to help children bring to a conscious level the results of their actions and as they grow older, to articulate these actions. A primary question is, as stated earlier, "What would happen if...?" The idea is to allow children to explore human experiences in a safe and loving environment and to learn access to their spiritual nature for guidance. The teacher's role is to interact with children in such a way that she/he sparks a sense of discovery in each child. Each child needs to discover universal Truths for him/herself through his/her life experiences. Through this process she/he learns to make choices more and more in harmony with all life.

Spiritual Techniques

We will, of course, teach our children to access their spiritual nature through rituals of prayer, meditation, affirmations, etc. These are powerful reflective techniques. What we, as teachers and parents, need to be aware of is that these spiritual experiences should be presented as a natural, reflective way to talk to God and to listen to God about everything in their lives. Children should be encouraged to access their spiritual Source from their own felt needs.

When an adult leads children in prayer, affirmations, or meditations, the words should be words that have special meaning to these children.

Most of all, spiritual teaching techniques must not create a gap between one's spirituality and one's everyday life. We need to teach children practical Christianity. We must help children to constantly operate from their spiritual center--at special times and in their everyday lives.

Summary

As the people of our nation look for ways to move out of our educational dilemma, I am suggesting that Unity already has established a universal paradigm for looking beyond our limited "left brain" traditional education system. This approach is based on nurturing the innate spiritual nature of the child through reflective thinking.

There are many teaching techniques which we can utilize and continue to develop such as meditation techniques, teaching for creativity, a wide range of play techniques, and the use of literature that appeals to the issues of life experience. The role of the teacher is to "light the flame" of eternal Truth within each child.

As Unity approaches the celebration of the Year of the Child and the development of a new curriculum, there is an opportunity to provide quality leadership in the solution of our education dilemma and a tremendous gift to the next generation.

Rites of Passage by John Cook

I stood encircled by the six leaders of our three clans. We were in turn encircled by the 31 young men and women of the three clans, one tribe. Expectant eyes, trusting faces, confident young bodies all waiting. Wearing my medicine wheel shirt, carrying the talking stick, I clutched my medicine pouch briefly, feeling the familiar reassuring shapes therein. What would I say? Only God knew

A breath. A silent prayer: "Here I am God...use me."
I began...

"All the clans--the Hawks, the Turtles, the Ravens--are gathered here for an ending. . . and a beginning."

"You Hawks. Your color is red." Taking a fresh fingerfull of red paint from the bowl Jane carried I marked her and then Steve, one red slash each to the right cheek. "Red is the color of the East, of the rising sun, of new light, of inspiration."

"You Turtles, your color is green." And I marked Rik and Mary Joyce from the bowl she carried. "Green is the color of the South, of new growth, of summer."

"You Ravens, your color is purple." Terry and Sherry received their purple marks. "Purple is the color of nobility, leadership, wisdom." Pointing to my medicine wheel. "I have placed the Raven at the North, the point of Wisdom."

Then I moved my finger to the figure of the black buffalo that marked West on my medicine wheel. "I am the only one among us who wears the emblem of the Buffalo clan. The Buffalo is a symbol of all the abundance that God provides for us. Black is the color of the West, of night, of darkness, of introspection. Today I am not a member of any one clan, but of all your clans. I ask the leaders of the clans to mark me as I have marked them, each with their own color." One leader from each clan touched my face with a paint-filled finger. Then all six rejoined their groups in the large circle.

I held up a piece of paper. "In the way of the West we will recognize each of your achievements here this week, on the challenge course and in all your activities, by giving you one of these certificates." Holding up a soft deerskin pouch, "In here I have clear quartz crystals, one for each of you, like the one I carry in my medicine pouch." My hand covered the small deerskin pouch, pressing it against my heart. It felt right.

I waited for the Hawks to circle around me within the larger circle. Steve and Jane went around the small circle, marking each Hawk with a dab of red paint. I handed out

their certificates, then held up the pouch of crystals. Taking one out I said to them: "Crystals have a special relationship to energy. Your energy and the energy within these crystals will know each other. Reach in without looking and know that the right crystal will attract your hand." They began taking out crystals, one by one around the circle as I continued, "Crystals are unique and beautiful. These crystals are perfect at one end, rough at the other. Each one is a miracle of time and place. Until they were removed from their origin, these crystals were still growing, getting more and more perfect with the passage of time. Each of you is like one of these crystals. Just as God is still growing these crystals, making them more perfect, He is still growing you. This week has been part of your process of growing."

When the Ravens gathered around me with Sherry and Terry touching their cheeks with Purple, I told them, "These marks will wash off but we have marked you with a mark that will never wash off." A murmur went through the circle as I continued, "You may forget this camp, these people, this marking, but you will remain marked by what you've done here. Always."

When the Turtles received their green marks from Rik and Mary Joyce, I continued, "The crystal transforms light into a rainbow. Each of you, touched by the light of God, casts a rainbow. At certain angles, the crystal appears dark. I can no longer see through it. I cannot see its rainbow. The crystal has not changed so much as my point of view has changed. When I turn it until a new facet is exposed, suddenly it blazes brilliantly again and I see a new and different rainbow. As you move from childhood toward full maturity, you are like the crystal, turning new facets to face those around you."

I continued to speak to them of crystals. How their nature is to be perfect. How their roughness, their brokenness masks this inner perfection.

When everyone had their crystal and the pouch came back to me, I reached into the soft deerskin, feeling the remaining crystals. As one came into my hand I said, "This crystal," holding it up for all to see, "which has touched all your crystals," fighting back the tears, "this one is mine." I clenched it in my hand. I could say no more. It was done.

Unitreat began Friday night, two days before the Uniteens arrived on Sunday afternoon. All the counselors gathered together to meet one another, some for the first time, and to make last minute changes to the plan. Returning counselors taught the others the games and warm-up activities that help the Uniteens get to know one

another. We discussed last year's camp and planned how to avoid mistakes and repeat successes.

In less than two days we had to prepare to cope with 30 Uniteens, coming from churches from Beaverton, Oregon, (south of Portland) to Everett, Washington, (north of Seattle). We were expecting 21 girls, ages 11 to 13, and 9 boys, ages 10 to 14.

Saturday morning, the counselors met in the meadow to begin the challenge course. Over the next six hours we got to know one another by facing a series of increasingly difficult challenges. These were fun, sometimes wacky, sometimes very serious activities, all rich with the possibility of learning about yourself and your team. In this short time, these eight relative strangers became a solid team. They learned to trust one another, to support and be supported, to accept and work with their own and one anothers strengths and weaknesses.

Toward the end of the day, I asked for a check-in. Everyone was in high spirits--self confidence and energy were both high.

Knowing what was coming next, my own energy was flagging. As I led the group to The Wall, I could feel the change in their energy level. Fourteen feet high, with no steps, ropes, handholds, no way over but by working together effectively, The Wall was all too real (and familiar) in its intimidating effect upon the group. The only way across is through real commitment, real energy, real trust, and real risk. It is hard work.

I asked for another check-in. Self-doubt and low energy: "I'm too small/short/overweight/out of shape." "I don't know if I can make it." "I didn't think it would be so hard." Serious discussion began. As each individual evaluated his/her own commitment, and shared feelings with the group, a plan emerged. Everyone committed to helping those who were sure they wanted to try. As momentum developed, even those who were frightened at the prospect made it over. "We made it!!!" Exhilaration, joy, pride, and boundless confidence left no room in the group for doubt. We knew there was nothing we couldn't accomplish together. We were ready for the kids.

The next day the kids arrived and we began with clan assignments, games, crafts, and agreements. Everything unfolded smoothly. All problems that came up were handled by the Uniteens in nightly family meetings. They decided that a positive consequence for everyone keeping the agreements was for the counselors to set tables and wash dishes for breakfast every morning. There was much groaning and complaining among the counselors, but they got up early and did their chores. Several counselors were heard to have encouraged some of the Uniteens to break an agreement, just a teeny one, but the Uniteens held firm for the whole week. I personally washed thousands of

dishes I'm sure. On Monday and Tuesday, some kids went to the challenge course while others made masks, drums, prayer sticks, and medicine pouches. We played large group games on Monday night, had skits on Tuesday night, and a talent show and dance on Wednesday night. Wednesday morning the whole tribe gathered to do community service work for Camp Cispus. Wednesday afternoon optional activities included hiking, swimming, crafts, and climbing on a rock climbers' wall. Thursday morning was final cleanup, then gather for a closing ceremony. Awards for completing the challenge course were handed out along with acknowledgment of the changes we all felt within us. Tears and smiles, hugs and waves, exchange of addresses, and it was over...until next year!

HELP!!! Lessons, fund raising, rallies, conference, medical releases, etc.. What's a Y.O.U. Sponsor to do? In every Y.O.U. Chapter, there is a great deal to be done, but teenagers want to separate from their parents. It does not mean parents have to be left out. Here is one chapter's experience. I imagine our Y.O.U. is no different than many others. After two years we have a core group of six that attend regularly and ten to twelve on the roll. Being a newer Y.O.U. group all of our members are still under 16. But it is clear that they wish to separate from their parents. So during the first year we carried out our Y.O.U. program independent of parents, except for family activities such as picnics, etc. In the first 18 months we held three fund raisers and raised about \$1,500 to help pay for rallies and other events. We also enjoyed the support of our congregation and minister. As we finished our second year, three members were eligible to attend Conference '92 along with a sponsor, which required more money. We turned to the parents. Last April we had a potluck for parents, and anyone else interested in Y.O.U. Eighteen people came and expressed a great deal of interest in our group. After the meal, we had a short discussion of the teenage years that quickly became a discussion of clothes, manners, styles, etc. The evening was highlighted by our minister sharing that her daughter arrived at church one Sunday with her hair dyed purple. This set the group at ease. The group went on to decide:

- * They wanted a support group to share experiences.
- * They wanted to be involved with the Y.O.U.ers while recognizing the Y.O.U.ers need to separate.
- * They were willing to do the fund raising with the involvement of the Y.O.U.ers, and valued the community building that accompanies the fund raisers.
- * They named a president and agreed to meet every two months as an informal group.
- * They took over the next fund raising event.
- * OF most importance, they valued the Unity lessons for the Y.O.U.ers more than fund raising, and recognized the time conflict that both needs created for the Y.O.U.

With the support of the parents, the next fund raiser, an after church lunch and cake and pie auction, was a great success. The parents took care of the logistics, the Y.O.U.ers ran the event and I, the sponsor, collected \$500 for our conference registration. Our second group meeting of parents was held June 5th, as an ice cream social. We shared the Stop-Focus-Choose lesson from our Official Rally and let them play the Oh Skit game from the rally. The parents group decided to:

- * Hold a bazaar in September.
- * Explore a fireworks booth for 1993.
- * Set up a family day with a local restaurant on the last Sunday of the month for the next three months. We will receive 25% of the money spent for the Y.O.U.
- * Do a fund raising lunch before the next Sunday afternoon seminar speaker.

While our experience with a parents group is new, it can be said that they enjoy being involved in a way that supports the Y.O.U. but still leaves the program to the Y.O.U.ers. In addition, we have made space for fathers, grandparents and even a single non-parent, who also became a sponsor, to support our Y.O.U. As our Y.O.U.ers reach their later teen years, 16-17-18, they will, even more than now, take over the Y.O.U. planning, logistics and leadership roles. At that time the contributions of their parents will still be welcome and appreciated by the Y.O.U.ers and sponsors.

Five Characteristics of A Spiritual Educator

Have you ever wondered how so many people find themselves as spiritual educators in youth ministry? Who are these people who take care of our children and what inspires them? If I asked for characteristics of a spiritual educator, I am certain at least a hundred could be listed: patient, caring, creative, dedicated, and so on. While these are most certainly true, five characteristics seem to make up the foundation of service for children's spiritual educators.

Commitment -

Every act of service has some degree of commitment involved, and youth ministry is no different. A commitment to children may seem like simply a given for a spiritual educator, yet this single commitment requires a plethora of commitments to support it. A commitment to Truth principles and to the teachings of Jesus Christ and a commitment for personal spiritual growth are essential, for as spiritual educators, we teach our own consciousness which is ever unfolding.

For me, my commitment to our children evolved from my commitment to Truth principles. Having grown up in Unity, I had first-hand experience of the blessings Unity offered me as a child. I never had to "unlearn" devils or sins or damnation in the literal sense; my God has always been of love and omnipotence. My commitment is to our children's growth in Truth, in freedom.

Heart Message -

In various workshops I have facilitated with children's spiritual educators, I encourage them to get in touch with their heart's message—the strong desire within for the children to know whatever this message may be. One heart message may be that each one of us has the abilities needed to do or to be anything we want. One spiritual educator

who learned as a child a more traditional religious belief system had the heart message of "forgiveness without the guilt." My message is simply "I am a precious child of God, and so are you, and you, and you!

Our message is our centering Truth which we share with the children in joy, with confidence and through experience.

Information Seekers -

Spiritual educators seek to be knowledgeable concerning self, their lesson plans and the teachings therein, and the age group with which they work. As stated before, we teach our own consciousness, and spiritual educators are always learning about and awakening to Truth. Our children learn best by modeled behavior; and as we learn to live Truth better each day, we teach this Truth by demonstration as well as by our words.

Spiritual educators seek information for their lesson plans: the format, the content, the teaching style. We strive to involve every type of learner in the learning processleft brain, right brain, visual, auditory, and kinesthetic. We prepare our lessons so that we are comfortable enough with the content that we can be flexible and sensitive toward the children's attention spans and responses to activities.

Spiritual educators seek information about our class' age group so we may find or create age-appropriate activities to which our children can relate.

Love —

The most apparent characteristic of spiritual educators is love. We love our children with acceptance, with discipline, with integrity, with joy. Jesus said, "In all your getting, get understanding." Our children may not always remember the words to the affirmation or to the Bible story, but they do remember the welcoming smiles, the safety of self-expression, the forgiving hug. The children get the love--and spiritual educators have lots of love to give!

Difference-

What keeps spiritual educators coming back for more? The truth that we are making a difference in our children's lives. If we can give an abused child one hour of safety, we have made a difference. If one child learns that God is omnipresent, we have made a difference. If one child sings a song, prays a prayer, hugs a friend, or smiles a little, we have made a difference. Does this sound presumptuous? Next Sunday check out your children's spiritual education department; see the children now and watch them grow. There is a difference. You will also find true these five characteristics of spiritual educators in youth ministry:

Commitment

Heart Message

Love

How many times have you heard an adult proclaim, "What is wrong with the children of today?" This has probably been echoed throughout the entire existence of humankind. I say there is nothing wrong--except lack of love. We are all seeking to know love and any human problem is probably traced to the perception of lack of love. Lack of love is deadly and will kill. Not too long ago it was discovered that institutionalized mentally retarded youngsters actually died from not being loved.

I believe that every human being desires that all children have the opportunity to be raised in homes that are loving, nurturing and joy-filled. All children deserve to be held in high esteem and loved unconditionally. And I believe this is the intention every parent has within the heart; but somehow we have fallen short of this! However, this is not an impossible task. Every desire within our hearts is a seed planted by God and in time this seed will grow into full bloom. Next year, 1993, is our opportunity to bring this dream closer to being fulfilled.

I believe that we need to create a firm foundation for this to happen. Metaphysically, we know that four is the number that represents a firm foundation. Therefore, here are four steps to take to create the foundation that will support this vision. 1) We must make peace within ourselves; 2) we must be expressions of peace to our families and friends--our significant others; 3) when we accomplish this, it will be a natural desire to extend this into our communities; 4) finally, this love and peace will be reflected into our world.

Peace Within Ourselves:

Every time we create a peaceful environment within our own hearts, we prepare the "soul" or soil to support the seeds of divine ideas implanted within. Also, we need to weed out the negative beliefs and ideas that have choked out the seedlings of love and joy that have sprouted and are trying to express themselves in our lives. We create this environment through the forgiving power of love.

As adults, we have to enter into the hero's journey to do this. Just like the fairy tales we listened to as children, we must make our way through the forest of tangled vines and thorns that keep us from finding the castle where our "princess is being held captive." Metaphysically, our heart is represented by the castle and the princess is our divine feminine or the receptive, loving part of ourselves. The prince or knight is the divine masculine or our thinking natures. The swords that cut away the vines and thorns that keep us from the "castle" are the law of mind action and the power of our affirmative word. When the masculine and feminine are brought together and reunited once again, love is reawakened in us and joy will be the natural result of this union.

But don't forget about the dragon! The dragon represents fear. The fear that keeps us from taking the hero's journey. But it is in facing the dragon and going past the fear that we find the love we seek. Then, and only then, will we know true peace.

Peace With Our Families and Friends:

When we make peace within ourselves, we become mirrors of the Christ in our families and friends. We will hold them in consciousness in a new way. Through the eyes of new understanding, we will create a new self-fulfilling prophecy that will empower others to know love and express joy in their lives.

John Bradshaw's work with healing the family is probably the most well-known work in this area. In John's first video series called "Bradshaw and the Family," he uses a mobile that demonstrates how a dysfunctional family operates. It can stay in balance only as long as everyone plays his/her role. When one member decides to leave that role, the entire mobile or family cannot stay in balance. At the end of the series John shows a second mobile. When a piece of that mobile was removed, the entire mobile stayed in balance. When one of us chooses

to live in peace and harmony and be an expression of wholeness, such a person becomes a positive influence for change and the possibility of healthy family relationships. Then we can interrelate and function independently, yet be interdependent.

Jesus, our Master Teacher, taught us that the sins of our family are traced down at least four generations. When we make a choice for wholeness, we make it for all generations. When we make a stand for love, peace, and joy, we make it for all of humankind.

Peace Throughout Our Communities:

This breakthrough in consciousness will snowball into our communities. As we learn how to communicate and cooperate within our family units, we will learn how to be more cooperative with all of our "brothers and sisters" and communication barriers will come down. As we become more self-accepting and more accepting of our family and friends, the greater our understanding and acceptance will be for the greater community. A natural desire to serve within our community will emerge. We will lose a sense of personal power and come to understand how to use authentic power. We will find unity in community.

Peace Throughout Our World:

Just as a pebble thrown in a pond will ripple out, so will this movement of peace and love extend to the entire world. We cannot create anything for ourselves of lasting value, unless we want this for people of every color, race, and ethnic origin. This is the birthright of all of God's children.

Happy is the man who finds wisdom,
and the man who gets understanding,
for the gain from it is better than
gain from silver
and its profit better than gold.
She is more precious than jewels,
and nothing you desire can compare with her.
Long life is in her right hand;
in her left hand are riches and honor.
Her ways are ways of pleasantness,
and all her paths are peace.

She is a tree of life to those who lay hold on her; those who hold her fast are called happy.

-- Proverbs 3:13-18

Our Unity movement has a wonderful opportunity to contribute to lasting peace for all people. The Year of the

Child, 1993, is a time to strengthen our families through surrendering ourselves to love. Let's open our hearts to bring lasting peace in our lives, so that our families are strengthened and joy-filled.

Jesus promised us peace. He said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27). Let the Christ within you show you the way to fulfill this promise.

The Year of the Child Program Pack--"Rainbows of Peace Global Awareness Program" has been mailed to you. This program will provide activities that will increase awareness of creating peace within ourselves, our families and friends, our communities, and our world. As we move through the year, let us join together in the vision of global world peace. But let us never lose sight that peace begins in our own hearts.

THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER



Edie Skalitzky Unity Church in the Rockies Colorado Springs, Colorado

The realization of each of us being God's Beloved, created whole and perfect is for sure, for all of us, one of the most important truths we have come to believe in and from which we live our lives. Our prayers, visualizations, and affirmations reflect our belief that we are meant to be happy, healthy, prosperous, and successful. Classes and workshops abound to help us open doorways to a more abundant life and to heal those perceptions which have kept us in the prison of limitation.

Having said the above, let us also explore some recent experiments done by a unique organization called Spindrift. You may have heard about their research and have found their findings very thought provoking and maybe even in a way disturbing. Some of the research concerned the effectiveness of directed and non-directed prayer. The Spindrift tests showed that both methods worked but unequivocally the non-directed technique frequently yielded results twice as great as the directed approach.

There is a distinct difference between these two forms of prayer. Directed prayer usually includes visualization, guided imagery, or specific thoughts used to help create a particular end result such as a cancer cure, pain going away, or prosperity made manifest. Non-directed prayer on the other hand does not use these

strategies and the prayer stays within a more open-ended consciousness, holding no specific outcome in mind. In essence it is an approach which singly says as Jesus did, "Father, into Thy hands I commend my Spirit," or holding the idea of "Thy will be done."

The experiments which the Spindrift organization conducted on rye seeds, soybeans, and other biological systems which had been stressed in some way, proved over and over that the non-directed prayer resulted in more germination and healthier plants. This non-directed form of prayer, demonstrated a trusting by the person praying that the "norm" or "what's best" or the "Thy will be done" approach would do the work in the best way possible, and this proved to be so.

What these findings confirmed for me was something which had been stirring within me and pushing me in how I was being led to pray. It had become increasingly difficult for me to pray for someone, including myself, to be healed of a physical challenge, financial lack or seeming inharmony. What feels like spiritual integrity to me is to know, ask, and see myself or someone else as being healed at a soul level of whatever has brought forth the particular challenge. It feels inappropriate for me to affirm for someone's

physical healing when I do not yet have the ability, as Jesus did, to look into a person's soul and know what is best for that soul's evolution at that time. I no longer wanted to pray simply for someone's outer conditions to change when maybe the soul is choosing some incredibly valuable lesson through the experiences which are before him or her. So prayer for myself and others has become a prayer for soul healing and divine illumination. For if the soul is brought back into harmony, love, and peace, then the soul will choose and manifest in the outer from its new understanding. Somehow my part is to hold the vision, the high watch, with the person for whom I pray, trusting the Christ in him/her to do the work as he/she surrenders to it.

This form of prayer has not always been easy for me nor for others who use it, because we have believed we know what the "spiritual norm" should be in health, wholeness, abundance, etc. Yet, the trusting of the holy process in our lives, and in the lives of those for whom we pray, appears to produce the most profound and long range, beneficial evolutionary changes.

May you have a joyous Christmas and a New Year filled with Divine Revelation and loving support.


"What's for breakfast?" said Pooh.

2. Give appreciated stocks and other non-cash assets for extra tax savings.

You can enjoy even greater tax benefits from making a gift of stocks, bonds, or other securities including mutual funds, than you would from an equivalent gift of cash. Generally, a charitable income tax deduction is allowed for the full value of the securities in the year they are given when they have been held at least one year. And since there is no sale involved when this type of asset is given, capital gains tax is not a consideration. Thanks to these two benefits working together, giving securities may result in an after-tax cost as much as 40% below a comparable gift of cash.

3. Sell depreciated securities and give the proceeds.

If you have securities that have dropped in value, by selling them and giving the cash proceeds as a charitable gift you may be able to take a capital loss on your tax return, as well as a deduction for the cash gift.

4. Give at the right time.

Gifts made in person or postmarked by December 31 are deductible on your 1992 federal income tax return. Check with your financial or tax advisor to determine how the form and timing of your charitable gift to our Association of Unity Churches can make year-end giving a special blessing!

Using Focus Groups for Feedback and Validation

In the October/November issue of CONTACT, I described, in great detail, the use of focus groups in gathering the initial data for a strategic plan. A listing of stimulus questions was presented as well as a worksheet that could be used to analyze the raw data from the focus groups. I appreciate the interest this article has generated in the field to date. Many ministers have indicated an interest in using focus groups as part of their planning process as they believe the methodology presented in the article will help them.

This article will develop, again in great detail, ways to effectively utilize focus groups in giving feedback on the planning efforts of the board or strategic planning committee. I believe "going out and back" at least two times to the people you serve in a ministry is essential to enroll them in the planning process, to insure that they have a stake in the future of the ministry and more specifically in the implementation of the plan.

Let's fast forward a typical strategic planning process. We will assume the planning committee has conducted the initial focus groups, analyzed the data as described in the October/November issue of CONTACT and has developed a series of draft documents that include: draft core values, a draft mission statement and a draft vision statement. The operative word here is DRAFT. Those of you who have done strategic planning know this takes a long time and is a very demanding and exacting task--it does not happen in just a few committee meetings.

For the second time the congregation is invited and encouraged to be active participants in the strategic planning process at an all congregation meeting. At this two to two and a half hour meeting they are asked to review these draft documents and give feedback to the planning committee.

Let me describe the strategic planning efforts at Pat and Jack Barker's church in Cincinnati, Ohio. The ministers and members of the Visioning Committee had worked for several weeks on their draft core values, mission, and vision statements. I had the privilege of serving as their consultant to facilitate a board orientation, planning session, and congregation meeting. On Friday night and Saturday morning the ministers, board members, key staff, and I reviewed the documents and "fine tuned" them for presentation at a congregation meeting to be held on Sunday.

Prior to this weekend a great deal of PR had been done to insure a high level of participation by the congregation. This included notices in the newsletter, the Sunday bulletins, and announcements from the platform for several weeks. Oh yes, I forgot, a large poster greeted me upon my arrival in the vestibule. Pat's lesson on Sunday was about visioning, and she once again invited all the congregation at both services to be participants in charting the future of the ministry. The youth group organized and provided a luncheon immediately after services to lend their support to the effort.

The meeting format was large group/ small group process. The larger group was brought together at the beginning for prayer and meditation, introductory remarks on how the small group processing would be structured, the intended outcomes of the meeting, and again at the end of the work session to get their feedback on the overall experience, to express our thanks and appreciation, and to give the closing prayer.

The congregation was divided into small groups of 10 to 12 people in order to get as many people as possible involved in the discussions. The board members served as the facilitators of these small groups. I developed a facilitator's outline and conducted a training session with the board members to insure consistency in the small group process. My role then was timekeeper and to facilitate the feedback from each of the small groups to the larger groups.

How did it work? I would say great! The Visioning Committee at New Thought Unity Center in Cincinnati is currently in the process of conducting a survey to fine-tune the outcome of the visioning meeting.

Having set the stage for you, I would like to go into greater detail on the flow of a two-hour feedback/validation session. At the beginning of the session all participants need to receive a copy of the draft core values, mission statement and vision statement, as well as the response form. Having begun the session with a prayer and short meditation, the small group facilitators read the draft core values and ask the group to respond to the question, "Does this list reflect your view? Explain." He or she records the various responses of the group to this question. Then asks the question, "What changes would you make, if any (additions, deletions, modification)?"

This often results in lively and very thoughtful discussions. All other comments offered by the group are recorded under "Other comments." At the end of 10 to 12 minutes, the facilitators briefly (read what they recorded from their group) report out to the larger group. This gives everyone the opportunity to hear the dis-

cussion from all the groups and note where there is alignment or divergent opinions.

Next the draft mission statement is reviewed and discussed. I remind the participants that a mission answers the question, "What business are we in or about?" Again the small group facilitators read the draft mission and ask their group participants to respond to two questions. "What are the strengths of this draft? Does it reflect your view? Explain." and "What changes would you make, if any (additions, deletions, modifications)?" and record "Other comments" made by the group members. This discussion period is approximately ten to twelve minutes and then the reporting out process mentioned above begins.

By now there is usually a great deal of energy and enthusiasm being generated by the participants and we are ready to look at the draft vision statement. Prior to reading the draft vision, sometimes I will ask the minister to do a brief meditation on visioning. Then I review the definition of a vision statement (it is a statement that describes our desired ideal future state as a church or center). The amount of time allowed for this small group work session is approximately 22-25 minutes. Vision statements are longer and invite more discussion. As before, the facilitators read the draft vision and begin the discussion by asking the questions, "What are the strengths of this draft?" "Does it reflect your view? Explain." "What changes would you make, if any (additions, deletions, modifications)?" and "Other comments." Once again the reporting out process gives everyone the opportunity to hear how the other small groups respond to the vision. I believe the members of the church or center need to become owners or stakeholders of the vision. Without ownership there is little commitment or interest in making the vision become a reality.



church. The large group is brought back together and I ask for any comments or feedback from the participants: what they liked about the large group/small group process, what they would like to see done differently next time, and any other thoughts they would like to share relative to the future of the ministry. Following this, each participant is asked to write his or her three priority goals for the next three years for the ministry. I asked that they take time and reflect on the draft core values, mission, and vision statements that had been discussed prior to writing their goals. These goals will be collected for analysis and prioritizing by the planning committee and/or board. At the end of two hours, well maybe a few minutes over, the congregation members are

thanked and ready for closing prayer.

Once again the planning committee has its work cut out for it. During their next series of meetings they will review the results of the feedback/validation meeting to finalize the core values, mission statement, vision statement, and determine the priority goals for the next three years. Once this is done they begin the process of writing action plans to achieve the goals.

As we move into this traditional season of Christmas and the beginning of a new year, I cannot help but reflect on this past year of 1992. It has been a truly growing and learning year for me. It has been a year in which I have had to face challenges that I have never faced before.

As many of you know by now, Shay's daughter Debbie made her transition in September of this year. I was not Debbie's real father but she called me Dad, and I had the privilege of giving her away at her wedding. My process in dealing with the month leading up to her transition is what I am going to share with you, and in this brief sharing, I hope it will help someone who may have to face a similar challenge.

When the doctor called to tell Shay that the cancer had moved into Debbie's lungs and she had at most six to nine weeks to live, I felt a very deep sense of compassion and caring for Debbie. What I discovered, as the process unfolded, was that these feelings were more for Shay than Debbie. It was much easier to talk about caring for Debbie than to express how I felt about my spouse. I kept trying to say to myself, "How would you feel if it were one of your kids?" What I realized was that I could not possibly know that because it wasn't one of "my" kids.

We were with Debbie two weeks before she made her transition and I watched all the emotion and feelings of a mother saying good-bye to her daughter. It was this process that brought me to the realization that my feelings were really for Shav as much as for Debbie. Our lives were on hold for a month or more. Everything we did revolved around Debbie's day-to-day condition. I found myself getting angry and hurt that our lives were being controlled by this event. I had to tell Shay this and that seemed to hurt all the more. How could I tell her what I was feeling. After all, her daughter was dying. When I told her, my eyes were full of tears and my voice was a little shaky, but I told her that I loved her and that I loved Debbie. I said that it was Debbie who was dying, not us, and that we had to get on with our lives.

I came to the realize just how much I cared for and loved Shay, and how very deep my commitment to our relationship is. I discovered that all of this was part of my own grieving process and that holding it back was making it worse. I had to let the tears flow and to express my feelings to Shay. I had to communicate. The longer I held back the worse I felt, and even my positive Unity teachings could not help if I did not communicate. How often in our lives when we look back at some challenge we have had, do we not say to ourselves, "If I had only said something,

it could have worked out better"?

Shay and I cried together, laughed together, and renewed our commitment to God, to ourselves, and to our relationship. I thank God for Debbie. I thank God for the gifts she brought me in her life, and I thank God for the gift she brought me in her transition. I love you, Debbie; God speed, and thank you for being my daughter

I would like to thank all of you for your support for Shay and me through this challenge. We truly could feel your love and prayers with us. I would especially like to thank Glenn Mosley, Executive Director of our Association of Unity Churches, for his incredible caring and absolute support of Shay through this year-long process. Thank you to all the staff at our Association of Unity Churches. I love all of you. Thank you to Frank Giudici, chairperson of Biblical Studies and Skills at Unity School for Religious Studies, for giving me a better understanding of grief.

I wish all of you a very joy-filled Christmas and a new year filled with the miracles of God.

What's Working for Me

An interview by Linda Beard, Assistant Radio/Media coordinator, with Dean Leutscher from the Unity Church of Practical Christianity, Grand Rapids, Michigan, where Nat and Suzanne Cross are ministers. Dean also works with Unity Church of Peace in Grand Rapids where Jim Ashby and Ann Haveman-Ashby are ministers.

Linda:

Dean, you are one of our Communication Committee Network Members. How long have you worked with your church in this capacity?

Dean:

I made the first status report and recommendations to the Board on May 14th of this year.

Linda:

What media are you using in your outreach?

Dean:

We are using WLHT FM radio. It is the Number One adult contemporary format in the market with a husband and wife "morning team." We are on the air Monday and Friday mornings at 7:35 a.m. with one :60-second spot. We're using 100 of the spots in the "You Can Make A Difference" series (from the Association's Radio/Media Department) and rotating six different tags (church identification, phone number, etc.).

Linda:

What results have you seen?

Dean:

We have three goals for the radio ministry. The first is to reach out to the community with Truth principles. Number two is to create awareness of Unity in metro Grand Rapids. And the third one is to increase attendance and membership. I believe we are achieving these goals with every spot we air. I know we are making an impact. We are reaching out to the community and sharing ideas with them. We are definitely creating an awareness in Grand Rapids and now that there are two churches, it's even more important. One of our tags refers to "these ideas being brought to you by the Unity churches (plural) in Grand Rapids."

I've heard a lot of very good feedback from people within the church. I was very heartened a couple of weeks ago to be introduced to a young couple who said they were there for the first time because they heard it on the radio. And they are coming back.

Linda:

Do you ask visitors how they learned about Unity?

Dean:

We haven't asked visitors yet, because our radio broadcasting is so new. In the future we will use surveys to ask that question. We are now asking people calling for the first time how they heard about Unity.

Linda:

What are some of your recommendations regarding broadcasting?

Dean:

I believe that you should not put your spot particularly on a religious station. I think it's best to run a schedule on a station where people are really listening to the format. In your area, if it's a country western station, consider it. We picked the station we felt was best, and they

offered a very good rate.

Linda:

Is your church interested in television broadcasting?

Dean:

We have considered public access, but that takes a fair amount of time and money to do it right. It can be a detriment if it's not done professionally. I don't think our church is in a position to do that yet. We're currently focusing on supporting our radio schedule.

Linda:

How did you prepare to apply for the Templeton Grant?

Dean:

In May I put a plan together for our Board and asked them to commit to my recommendation for a \$10,000 budget. I needed to know that the Board was committed to the radio ministry with or without the Templeton Grant money. I proposed a one-year schedule and a one-year budget. They said: "No, we think it's important that we committo three years!" We then applied for the June '92 grant.

Linda:

When this plan was completed and approved by the Board, how did you share it with your congregation?

Dean:

The initial announcement came when we heard that we had received the Templeton Grant. We now give regular announcements and updates from the pulpit. We also encourage people to sponsor the spots. I shared our specific goals and that the Board was committed to a broadcasting ministry. I let the congregation know that they were going to be a very important part in keeping the program on the air and that I would be announcing details of the sponsorship program in the coming weeks.

Linda:

What kind of feedback did you get from the congregation?

Dean:

They were very pleased. Many said they had hoped something would happen, that we needed to "get off the hill," so to speak. (Our church sits on a little hill.) They felt we needed to "let the light shine"; that we've been too quiet. There are still some people who think of Unity as a cult. We sometimes face that misconception. Creating an awareness of Unity in metropolitan Grand Rapids was a very important goal. The "You Can Make A Difference" spots really helped, because some of them use Biblical references, but not too "heavy-handedly." We are letting people know that Unity is a Christian organization.

Linda:

And because your congregation keeps current with your broadcast program, you have continual feedback?

Dean:

Yes. To help support this program, I designed a very nice display board where congregants can see the names of sponsors. It's the "1993 Sponsors Board" and the dates of the 103 Mondays and Fridays are up there. As people sponsor these dates, their names go up on the board.

Linda:

What does it cost to sponsor?

Dean:

Ninety-five dollars per spot and with a couple of months into the program we now have 20 percent sponsored. We want to have the board filled by the end of the year. Also, every week there is an insert in the bulletin for people to fill out for sponsorships. We let them know how many sponsorships are filled. The sponsor board is very visible, and when they first commit, we add their names immediately.

Some sponsor a radio message in honor of someone else, for their birthday or anniversary. One couple sponsored a spot in honor of another couple who had started a study group in a small town north of Grand Rapids. The honoree came up to me one day so delighted, so honored. I make up note cards on the PC showing the honorees' names and the date they are honored, and these are given to

whoever wants them. As a sponsor they also receive a cassette with 50 of the messages on it. If two or more spots are sponsored, they receive two cassettes with all 100 spots on them.

We also use the newsletter every month to promote sponsorships. Beginning in January, Sunday bulletins and monthly newsletters will list the sponsors for the month and week.

Linda:

You've been on the air for about seven weeks now. What are you planning for the fall of '92 and '93?

Dean:

This schedule is going to go just as it is indefinitely. We intend to run the 100 "You Can Make A Difference" spots and rotate them equally. It will be a year before listeners hear the same spot a second time. Hopefully we will increase our budget and add other radio stations. *Consistency* is important. In fact, one of the tags says, "These ideas are brought to you every Monday and Friday at this time by the Unity churches in Grand Rapids. Come grow with us in Unity." *People in*

our church have made a point of listening every Monday and Friday on their way to work.

Linda:

You have implemented some very creative ideas, Dean, and you have done a wonderful job in Grand Rapids.

Dean:

I think it is very important that Unity start letting people know who we are. We are not going to grow unless we do. I know there is an opposite philosophy in Unity. . .that people will find us when they are ready. But I believe you can let people know who you are and where you are without proselytizing. By using the "You Can Make A Difference" spots, we are achieving our goals.



Unity Responds to Hurricane Andrew!

How did you feel as you watched the news of Hurricane Andrew's devastation in Florida? It moved many Unity church members to immediate action. Here, in the office of your Association of Unity Churches, a group of staff members was expressing how much we wanted to do something. "It's hard to watch the suffering of Andrew's victims and not feel frustrated that we can't help somehow," said one staff member. "Why can't we help?" another responded. "Let's all donate clothing, food, and supplies and ship them to Florida.'

As the words "Yes, let's do it" resounded through our office, the universe moved to make it happen. Within a few hours, we found a trucking company that donated its services to move the supplies to Florida. One ministerial student's spouse mentioned the project to him and word quickly spread. A few ministerial students began to organize other students as well as Unity Village staff. Within three days, the lobby of the new Association World Headquarters building held a truckload of supplies, ready to go. On Friday, United Van Lines people picked up our "CARE" package. When an idea is right, God

goes before us and prepares the way.

Joel, board vice president of Unity of Atlanta, Georgia, was also watching the news about Andrew and had an idea. He phoned his Unity minister, Albert Wingate, to enlist his help with the fulfillment of his plan. "Al was so patient with me. If Unity ever starts sainting people, Al should be made a Saint," Joel told me by phone. The idea was to call the local Unity church closest to Homestead, Florida, and get a wish list. The following Sunday, Joel and Al would share this list with the Atlanta congregation. If the congregation responded, they would rent a truck and drive the needed supplies to Florida personally. When it was time to go, Joel shared with me, "I rented too small a truck. Our board president volunteered his van and we still had to rent an additional trailer to move it all down there." Al Wingate drove the truck and Joel drove the van. Bill Cameron, minister of Miami Unity on the Bay, was there when they arrived with a group of volunteers to help unload. At one point, Bill unloaded a couple of jugs of bottled water. The giver had taken a felt-tip marker and written

Bedtime Rituals

Bedtime rituals are different in every home. However, ask any parent: when the ritual is broken, bedtime can be anything but serene! I remember reading Mother Goose to my children every night. Sometimes when I was extra tired I would try to turn two pages at once, only to have my children playfully remind me that I skipped a page. Children like the structure and the bonding that occurs during these moments.

I believe that the more independent children become, the more there is a need to touch base with our children. Bedtime stories can turn into bedtime meditations and bedside chats. It is important to set aside time to communicate with our children, even our teenagers. For example, when things get tense or hectic in our home, we like to do massage or sometimes I try to sneak in the "old draw on the back" game. I can feel the shift in energy as my teenagers relax.

Teenagers are sometimes a little harder to keep open to this time of sharing. In a article in the Summer, 1992, issue of Joyful Child Journal, Joyce Vissell suggests sitting quietly on the bedside of your resistant teenager. "Even the most defiant of teenagers regain a sweetness in their countenance after they fall asleep. It will be easier at these times to feel your love for your child," says Joyce. She goes on to suggest that parents can whisper affirming words of love and support to their older children. It seems that parents who have tried this have seen "miraculous" changes in their relationship with their teenagers. As the teen is more open, the parent may progress to sharing some time together before bed.

As parents of younger children, you can set a foundation for nightly ritual in your home that can expand and change as the years go by. Meditation and visualization with children will enable children to have a more peaceful night. There are many side benefits also. Your child will show improved concentration and more vivid imagination. This will help them to express their creative potential and joy will be a natural outcome.

Recently, I found an excellent book that will benefit parents and teachers. Starbright

by Maureen Garth is a book of simple meditations and visualizations to help children sleep peacefully, awaken creativity, develop concentration, and learn to quiet themselves. Maureen's colorful and textual vocabulary paints wonderful, imaginative scenes that will delight your children, as well as the child in you. Through visualization, you can take your child on a journey through a tree, to a visit with a Panda, or onto becoming a fairy. This beautiful book is available from Harper, a division of Harper Collins Publishers, San Francisco, California.

I know that every parent dreams of the day that bedtime routines will fade away into a beautiful memory. After reading this inspiring book, I realize that I want to find new ways to spend those special moments with my teenagers. Maybe I have been too hasty. Maybe I can lead them on an imaginary journey! I can't wait to see their reactions! Oh well, Sweet Dreams!

Questions, Questions

More and more I am finding that we have become separated from other religious denominations. Suppose we agree that our separation from other denominations was founded on good reason, logic, and for the highest of motives. Yet, today I am realizing that main line denominations are asking many of the same questions we are seeking answers to as well. Perhaps the questions are as old as time and we must seek new answers for our time.

Recently I was introduced to two new books that provide yet another answer to the question, "What kind of church will meet the needs of our people?" Though we may express our basic teachings in different ways, the research and insights gained in reading these two books can greatly benefit our thinking and influence our direction.

The first book was reviewed by Roy W. Pneuman, Senior Consultant for the Alban Institute, Inc. You will enjoy the review--and the book even more.

Rebuilding the Congregation--A Church Development Plan for a New Millennium by Arlin Rothauge (Cambridge: Cowley Publications, 1990, \$14.95).

"These three lectures recorded at the Episcopal Divinity School, Cambridge, Massachusetts, in May of 1990

supply a rationale for the decline of mainline denominations in the past three decades, propose a paradigmatic shift in church development, and suggest two approaches to enable congregations of all sizes to make the shift.

"Rothauge argues convincingly that the church has experienced three valid and accepted models or paradigms in its history: the apostolic, the imperial, and the denominational. The denominational paradigm which rose out of nationality and ethnic origin is and has been in decline. The new fourth paradigmatic candidate is the missionary church wherein the people are the missionaries and the mission is at home.

"In order to enable the shift from the denominational to the missionary paradigm, he proposes two strategies. The first, he calls parallel development, which involves maintaining and ministering to both the group in the church bringing new life and the group conserving the old. The second, which he names new unit development, involves the formation and multiplication of small groups to further outreach and the sense of community.

"This is stimulating material. Rothauge's explanation of mainline denominational decline is compelling and free from the blame and guilt inherent in most other such analyses. The major value of these lectures is, however, a series of "how-to's" with accompanying rationale that any pastor concerned about growth and development will find practical and useful."


I send you love for when you need it.



To Be A Teacher

One of the most influential people in our community is the teacher, whether in the church or the public school. The teacher has the power to redirect a life and bring about change. As I think about the people who have greatly influenced my life, I have to go back to my teachers. They made a difference!

Within the church, teaching is a ministry, a talent, a special calling. It is something the church has historically depended upon as a source of power to bring change and redirection to life. This is exactly what happened in Jesus' life. His teaching produced change that influenced behavior, producing a community that affected history. First and foremost he was a teacher. His disciples called him "Rabbi," which means Teacher (John 1:38).

In Unity, Jesus is understood by us to be our Way-Shower. To those of us who teach in Unity he is also the Master Teacher. In Matthew's account, Jesus' public ministry begins with the words, "he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down his disciples came to him. And he opened his mouth and taught them" Matt. 5:1-2.

Jesus taught more than he preached. He was skillful and successful because first, he knew his subject: "He taught them as one who had authority" Matt. 7:29. Second, he went to his students, dealing with their interests and concerns.

The geographic location of Jesus' teaching brought him to the people. He taught them on a hillside, beside a well, at the foot of a sycamore tree, standing outside the temple observing the worshipers, at the beach, on a boat, in a house, and beside a pool.

His teaching also reached his hearers on an emotional level and seemed to be the most effective when he dealt with issues and events that were of the greatest importance

to them. He confronted the people amid their debate over taxes, upon the death of a child or friend, in the discussion about offering and giving, in the quarreling over church and state, in the confrontation with an angry crowd about capital punishment, and in the discussion about greatness and power. Jesus' teaching reached people at the pressure points of their lives--money, sex, and power.

Above all, Jesus' hearers understood him. They came to him because he spoke to their condition. He used phrases and illustrations they understood. When Jesus talked about salt losing its taste and being thrown out and trodden under foot, the masses clearly understood him. It was the common practice of the day to throw out the useless salt into the pathway to keep down the weeds. The masses understood him when he talked about birds of the air, flowers of the field, seeds, farmers, crops, soil, sheep and shepherds, and money and taxes. His skillful use of the parable presented to his hearers a vivid story that was easy to recall, thus making it possible to apply the lesson to a life situation.

Jesus' teaching made a difference in people's lives. His concern was not necessarily to convey information or knowledge, but to bring change in human behavior that was necessary for one to express the inner Christ presence.

Today, when I think about the good teachers I know they all seem to have several characteristics in common:

Good teachers personify their message. They teach what they are. They not only teach truth, they live it.

Good teachers make learning exciting, creating an atmosphere of enthusiasm.

Good teachers teach people, not materials.

Good teachers are open, receptive, and responsive to the leadership of Spirit. They practice prayer and meditation. The Spirit is their teacher.

Good teachers love people.

Both the thrill and challenge of teaching is for the teacher to realize that the student learns not only from the lesson but also from the teacher's demonstration of Truth. Keep teaching!

Certification of Spiritual Educators Program Begins

Now it is possible for a minister, licensed teacher, youth education director, children's teacher or Uniteen/Y.O.U. sponsor to become certified in their area of emphasis. An information/application brochure has been mailed to all ministries and to youth education directors in the Fall issue of The Year of the Child packet. Additional copies are available from your Association's education department.

One becomes "certified" upon completion of several requirements. Though different for each age group or work area emphasis, these requirements have in common some basic continuing education courses, some years of experience in designated area of emphasis, samples of one's work, letters of recommendation (one from one's minister) and attendance at a week-long intensive.

Our first "intensive" is scheduled for June 19-25, 1993, at Unity Village. It immediately follows the Ministers' Conference of 1993 held in Kansas City. The hope is that ministers will bring their youth education directors with them to the Conference and that they will remain the extra week to attend the "intensive." The Certification Intensive will not be offered again until 1995. A candidate may attend the "intensive" at the beginning, middle, or end of their efforts to fulfill the requirements for certification.



INTERGENERATIONAL EDUCATION MINISTRY

Successful Program, Successful Uniteens

"You're just a babysitter."

By subtle prosecution, how many times has someone plastered this label on you? Probably the answer is "plenty."

It is demeaning, but could it be true? Think about it. Babies need babysitters because they cannot take care of themselves. Does your Uniteen program treat junior highers as if they cannot take care of themselves?

Junior high programs that promote adult dependency --not self-reliance--are rightly labeled "babysitter services." This is why we need to guide students toward self-discipline and responsible decision-making. Our job is to facilitate the growth of confident, capable young people. We are not called to merely "contain" or "occupy" our kids. We are called to prepare them for a life of tough choices and wise decisions.

Respected sociologist and psychologist H. Stephen Glenn has done groundbreaking research into developing "self-reliant" young people. He has isolated several perceptions and skills that self-reliant people have. Here is how you can use Glenn's insights to nurture self-discipline in your Uniteens:

1. Help the Uniteens see themselves as capable people.

Young people in high school are working to develop an identity; but Uniteens are working on self-esteem and simply need to know they are competent. They are looking for something--anything--in which they may excel and utilize their natural strengths.

This is why Uniteen programs that build self-reliant young people offer them abundant opportunities for success. As Uniteens experience success in your activities, they will grow in their confidence. Therefore. . .

*Program for involvement. Challenge Uniteens to get involved in every aspect of the class. Let them lead meditations, teach a Bible story, close in prayer, approach visitors, and plan activities.

*Programfor experience. Give Uniteens a chance to do things for people. Take them on regular service project experiences--raking lawns for the elderly in your community, helping at a soup kitchen, or collecting canned goods for a food pantry.

2. Help Uniteens develop their relational abilities

Junior high programs that do not focus on relationships are simply school. Relational ministry means young people are developing significant ties to adults and peers. Do your Uniteens feel they are developing essential relationships in your group? Do they relate with adult helpers as more than casual acquaintances? When they go home, do they have a better understanding of how to talk with their parents or siblings?

*Make sure your Uniteen program encourages junior higher/adult relationships. Recruit a diverse adult leadership team. Then develop a structure for building relationships between young people and adults. Ask each leader to spend time with three Uniteens a month, perhaps taking time before a Sunday lesson. Make sure your plan is designed for face-to-face contact.

*Stress strong peer relationships. Plan activities that allow Uniteens to practice building one another up. Do a group-building exercise at every meeting. Plan for interaction times that go beyond surface issues.

*Remember to include families in your programming. In addition to teaching about family relationships, give the Uniteens and their parents opportunities to open lines of communication and create memories. Plan family nights with fun and serious components. Offer a family retreat (one night keeps the cost down).

3. Help Uniteens understand that their choices can change their lives.

Self-reliance does not mean separation from GOD; but as Uniteens learn about their oneness with GOD, they need to practice responsible decision-making. We need to help them understand that they--as children of GOD--are responsible for their own decisions and the outcomes therein.

*Give Uniteens the chance to exercise their decisionmaking muscles in your group. Offer a variety of programming and expect the Uniteens to choose their involvement. Provide opportunities for Uniteens to learn how to set priorities.

4. Help Uniteens understand emotions and learn from experiences.

It is often difficult for junior highers to identify what they feel and to pinpoint "life lessons." But these skills are no less important for them to develop. Young people's emotions can resemble a teeter-totter: One minute Jessica is bouncing off the walls with excitement; the next minute she is in the depths of despair.

*Plan activities that will help your Uniteens experience and understand their emotions. Allow emotions to have a place in your group. Excitement, anger, disappointment, fear, anticipation, joy, doubt, sadness, and pride should all be normal by-products of your lesson plans. Encourage Uniteens to examine these feelings by asking them judgment-free questions such as, "How did you feel when you...?" Why did you feel that way? How is that feeling like...? How does this experience relate to emotions you feel every day?"

Uniteen leaders are not babysitters when we are purposeful about our programming. We are successful when we help even one junior higher to feel successful!

It Worked For Us!


