

Rituals in Unity Ministries

"Will you perform a divorce ceremony for my husband and me?" It was Jane Doe on the telephone about fifteen minutes after leaving my office with husband John Doe. They had been in marriage-clarification counseling with me for eight weeks.

I agreed. Collectively they had six children (two were with each other). The children, three parents, and a handful of siblings and friends experienced and "celebrated" a public acknowledgment of a divorce that took place emotionally several months before counseling began, the same as marriages take place emotionally prior to public recognition ceremonies, and a few days after the legal decree.

The above happened in one of my field ministries; it was the only divorce ceremony I was asked to do-and it was a great success. The couple were happier with each other afterwards than some of the couples I married.

Sometimes people ask for rites of passage which don't exist, or at least, are very uncommon. If we can help them create an experience that will be helpful, it is an enriching experience for us and for our fellow travelers on the path, and I believe we need to do it.

Boys of sixteen may drive recklessly.

defying death. They may be killed; if they are, survivors mourn the death of a child. Even if they live, they must settle for acknowledging they have gone from boyhood to manhood in silence, or at most by telling a few close friends, because they cannot celebrate openly with family that they escaped death from reckless driving.

Young girls, married or not, often want to be women before their time. Motherhood is often used as a measuring stick of womanhood. Family and friends may celebrate the birth of a baby, but there's not much celebration over premature motherhood, married or not.

We can support both individuals (in my personal definition an individual is a family of one), and 1990's families (double or single parent, blended or nuclear) not only with less potentially harmful self-created rituals, but with rituals that can and do enrich the individuals, the families, and the culture.

I believe in having Junior Membership in a church at age 12 or 13. Age specific youth education is good and necessary. In order not to perpetuate separation of youth from adults, there needs to be a specific course of study, including Unity history, teachings, and meaning of traditions (Christmas, Candlelighting, Easter Flower Service, Bowl Burning, Spiritual Communion, christenings, adult baptisms, weddings, and recommitment wedding ceremonies, Celebration For the Life Of ... [funeral] Service, etc.) (Because the church is a legal corporation, Junior Membership can be at 12 or 13, and allows voting rights at age 18. It is also appropriate to seek reconfirmation that continuing church membership after age 18 is a personal decision on the part of the young person and not only the continuation of a parental decision.)

Ancient wedding rituals formalized the rights of those who gave away the bride (usually father in behalf of her family) and the one who took the bride and dowry (groom). Modern weddings still symbolize giving and receiving of perhaps a more enriching nature: pledging love and willingness to support one another's self-hood.

In antiquity, burial rites, tombstones, and other markers were often intended to settle accounts "between the dead and the

living." Caskets were built by the family and/or friends, graves were dug by them and grave markers were carved in stone by them. No matter how much one pays for a contemporary casket, a grave-digger, or a marker, the benefit of healing grief attending one "doing the work" is lost. We in ministry need to help grieving happen healthily through person-specific eulogies, classes, workshops, and grief-counseling. And we need help. Teach those of the congregation who are willing to do the same type of support work.

The divorce ceremony I spoke of early on was simple. The brief "lesson" was derived from interviews with the couple and the commitment statements followed in reverse fashion wedding vows.

"Do you John Doe commit, from this day forward, to lovingly support the personal growth of Jane Doe and to hold her in esteem and to value her as a friend?" "I do." (Then pose the question to Jane Doe.)

To assist Unity ministries with rites of passage and traditions, Gay and David Williamson of Detroit, Michigan, have created an alternative ministry around their new book, *Transformative Rituals* - Celebrations for Personal Growth.

Gay and David are available to you and your ministry. I, for one, am grateful. Rituals condense the many voices of individual feelings, social guidelines, ideals, and common sense into life-enriching events. You may want to invite the Williamsons to your ministry. They are mid-wifing a new period of rites of passage for the Unity movement.

Developing new churches is vital to the Association and the Unity movement. It will help to spread the powerful message Unity has to offer. Jim Schrotel, minister of Unity Pyramid Chapel of Light in Santa Maria, California, has written an article on the importance of expansion. Jimis a true pioneering minister. He pioneered a new church in Tyler, Texas, as a licensed teacher. He served this ministry throughout his two years in ministerial school and brought this pioneer group to full-time church status. The following is Jim's article:

Quoting from Frank Pounders' chair letter of October 7, 1992, to members of the Association's Expansion Committee we read, "It is strongly indicated that, for the foreseeable future each ministerial class will rely upon pioneering for placement of one or several ordinands. How will the pioneering sites be selected and by whom? What level of support can or should the Association provide and for how long?"

As a grateful beneficiary of Frank's own expansion efforts (pioneering one of the over one dozen churches under his wing) and as a current member of the Expansion Committee, I have been given a rare glimpse of the enormity of the challenge Frank describes.

There is no doubt in my mind that every member of our Association is committed to bring the Christ teachings of Unity to all who are ready to receive them. But how? That is the question. Researcher George Barner complicates the equation when he tells us "more than 80 percent of all church growth is transfer growth--people moving from one church to another instead of unchurched people coming to church." What if a Unity student (or family) moved where there was no Unity church?

There are a number of factors to consider when one looks at the broad spectrum of pioneering a church.

No. 1:

Identifying areas of expansion opportunity is required. This can be done by inviting those groups and pockets of individuals desiring Unity teachings (through our print, mail, and electronic media) to respond. Regional boards may also select target areas of opportunity within their region in which to focus expansion efforts.

No. 2:

However, authenticity and honesty are necessary for individual churches to admit they either do, or do not, support expansion in their area. It is fruitless to concentrate expansion activities where they are not wanted. It would simplify things wonderfully if individual churches would identify their boundaries. No conflict or confrontation need occur in the expansion process when sincere communication is shared in Truth.

No. 3:

In an effort to avoid possible conflict or confrontation, the Association's Expansion Committee has received approval from the Board of Trustees on the following loosely-paraphrased policies and procedures as follows:

Those who plan to start a Unity group contact the Association Director of Expansion with a written proposal of the ministry planned. The Director of Expansion writes all ministries within a 20 mile radius. Based on feedback from the ministries, the Director of Edu-

cation and the Regional Representative determine if a new church should be found.

No. 4:

In order to better prepare new ministers for pioneering, the Expansion Committee is preparing a syllabus or course of instruction outline. Then Unity ministers with "hands on pioneering experience" can teach interested second-year MEP students as an elective within the acceptable policies and guidelines of Unity School.

Although the activities of the Expansion Committee certainly furnish a nourishing environment for pioneering to take place, they are not the most active ingredients. Neither is money. As always, our teaching is God first, and all else follows:

The successful pioneers I've had the privilege to know did not let time, distance, or money keep them from bringing Unity to those who thirsted for it. Quite often, they started with just three or four dedicated people and had to travel hours to serve them. Sometimes they had to shake the dust off their feet where groups wouldn't grow.

Universally, they had a "spiritual coach," a Unity minister, who believed in what they were doing in consciousness. No money was exchanged, but support and counseling were always there for the asking.

There is evidence that having pioneering experts like Interim Ministry Specialists within the Association would have merit. As with the Interim Specialists, these should be Unity ministers and not outside consultants. There are those among our own ministers who can teach us how to handle expansion activities successfully.

No. 5:

Finally, cognizance needs to be made that we are graduating some ministers who need placement. Few would argue See EXPANSION on page 5, col. 3

Donor Accountability Now IRS Requirement

President Clinton has signed into law the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993 Code Sec. 170(F)(8). As of January 1, 1994, all donations of \$250 or more must have substantiation from the nonprofit organization receiving the funds. This receipt must be in the donor's hands prior to the time taxes are to be filed. Cancelled checks will no longer constitute proof of donations.

In addition, donations of \$75 or more that yielded tangible benefit to the donor must have a value placed on that benefit. The deductible donation is then the difference between the benefit's value and the monies received. For example, if you have a fund raising dinner and tickets are \$75, the deductible donation will be the difference between the value of the meal (perhaps \$30) and \$75 (yielding a donation of \$45). Your tickets, thank you's, and year-end accounting must show a \$45, not \$75, donation.

Another part of this law requires accurate descriptions of all "non-cash" gifts. Ministries are not required (nor do I recommend) placing a specific money value on these gifts. But "four bags of clothing" is no longer acceptable.

This law impacts every Unity ministry. Most Unity ministries are already in compliance. But for those who are not,

NOW is the time to get computer programs in place and prepare to meet these requirements,

My husband, Al Sears, is on the Computer Resource Committee. He shares good news with all ministries who are confused about which software programs to purchase. So many of these programs are expensive and complicated to learn. And you still have to "set them up." There is available an inexpensive and userfriendly option. It is a set of two programs: "Money Counts" and "Membership Plus." For less than \$100 for both programs, you can effectively meet most ministry needs for accounting and membership tracking. These programs are available through our Association or Parson's Technology. For more information, contact Susan Velasquez in our ordering department.

I encourage each ministry to move beyond the requirements of this Revenue Reconciliation Act. Donor accountability is a responsibility to joyously fulfill. Those who financially support our vision have a right to receive accurate and prompt thank you's. In addition, they have a right to know that we are using their gifts in responsible ways to fulfill the mission we serve. Regular updates to donors about the ways their gifts are making a difference in the work you are doing encourage continued and increased financial support.

As much as I resisted computer technology, I can now affirm the importance of its technology in this decade preceding the millennium. Our documentary work is so much easier with the aide of computers. Rather than impersonalize communications, computers make it increasingly easier to communicate with many more people on a very personal level.

And successful fund raising is based on communication-personal communication. Let's make a commitment in this new year of 1994 to be so clear, so personal, so responsible in these communications that we make our donors truly proud to be a vital part of our work--and at the same time stay two to three steps ahead of any IRS requirements!

PLANNED GIVING NEWS

Many of you are already aware that planned giving is an essential component for any charitable organization as we enter the new millennium. At the end of 1993 your Development Office was inundated by requests for the brochure What Your Year-End Gift Can Do For You--And Unity. We did two printings, distributed over 25,000 copies, and unfortunately had to turn down requests for approximately 10,000 more. I also received a great many calls from ministries requesting more materials on planned giving. All of this signals a hunger in our Unity movement for planned giving information.

In the field of development every trade journal contains article after article informing, teaching, and encouraging organizations to pursue this ever-expanding area. Within this article I will share some of the facts concerning the transfer of a generation's unprecedented wealth. I would also encourage you, as professionals, to examine some of the resources available to your ministry.

An expert in the field of demographics and psychographies, Judith Nichols, Ph.D., tells us there are four demographic divisions called cohorts. Demographics are the skeleton of a cohort and psychographies are its flesh. For the purpose of this article we will be talking about the first division, Civics. Civics were born between the years 1915 to 1939. They were babies of the Great Depression and approximately 32 million Americans fall into this category. World War II was the biggest event in

their lives; they are civic-minded and volunteer. Actually, the pattern of giving moderately during one's lifetime, but leaving large bequests to charity may be a product of the Great Depression, according to Paul F. Kling, director of planned giving at the University of Richmond. "They're always concerned that they may wake up tomorrow with nothing--and that colors their financial decision making."

Robert B. Avery and Michael S. Rendell of Cornell University have conducted a study which shows that Americans 50 and older will leave an estimated \$10.4 trillion over the next forty years. In continual dollars there will probably never be another generation that does as well. Many Americans would be more than happy to make charitable bequests to offset the estate taxes they face of 55 percent on assets above \$600,000 (1.2 million for married couples).

Why aren't these people coming forward in greater numbers? Quite frankly, many of them are unaware of the options open to them. Most lawyers are not well versed in the broad arena of planned giving. However, if a lawyer or a financial planner's client can suggest a few options they would like to pursue, these professionals will be happy to research the necessary steps.

A few more facts, men leave forty percent of their estates to family foundations. Women, however, leave four times as much to the arts and humanities. Among wealthy taxpayers, more than one-half of all single women and a third of all single men make charitable bequests--compared to only eight percent of married men and women. Many elderly donors may decrease or stop making gifts after their retirement because they do not have as much disposable income. However, they generally are able, and do, make larger gifts in their wills. Very often the people you want to stay in touch with are those who are steady givers, but have lapsed or decreased their giving.

As we enter 1994, your Development Office is here to assist you in all of your development programs. As an expert fund raiser, Judith Nichols tells us that ninety percent of all individuals surveyed said brochures play a role in their buying decisions. We have available a variety of brochures concerning planned giving, feel free to call our office for a complete

Insurance News

NWNL eliminates claim forms

Northwestern National Life Insurance Company (NWNL) has just made filing a claim for your health plan easier than ever. Beginning January 1, 1994, NWNL will no longer require employee statements (claim forms) for all health claims.

NWNL is making this change to eliminate unnecessary paperwork and simplify the claim process for you. This means you don't have to fill out and send in any form with your claims.

Most often, your doctor or hospital will send your bills directly to NWNL for payment. If you receive an itemized bill and plan to send it to NWNL for payment, you only need to provide a minimum of additional information.

Here's what you should include (write directly on the bill or on a separate sheet of paper stapled to the bill):

- Your name
- Your social security number
- Association group number (GLH-21970-3)

Send this information with the bill to your NWNL claim center for processing and payment (Northwestern National Life Insurance Company, Claims Center, 146 Industrial Park, Jackson, MN 56143-9511). The Nominating Committee-A Change Agent

"How can we find committed board members for our church?" A question frequently asked by ministers and board members. It seems that people have a variety of reasons for not wanting to serve on the board--they are too busy, don't care, don't want to get involved, think the term is too long. The list goes on and on. A paradigm shift for ministries facing this particular challenge might be to examine the role of the Nominating Committee. In doing so you may find new ideas and strategies to help find the committed board members already present in your congregation.

Most of you are familiar with the Association's recommended bylaws section dealing with the Nominating Committee process. In the event you might want a reminder; they are as follows:

Section 4.04

Board of Trustees-- Election.

(b)Nominating Committee. A Nominating Committee shall be formed at least three months prior to the annual membership meeting, and shall initiate a search for at least two qualified candidates for the Board of Trustees. The Committee shall consist of the senior

minister or co-ministers and three active members selected in the following manner:

- (1)At the annual membership meeting, the membership shall electone of its active members, and an alternate, to serve on the Nominating Committee for the next year's election.
- (2) The board shall elect one of its trustees.
- (3)Together with the minister(s), the above two committee members shall select a third committee member from the active membership who shall become chairperson of the Nominating Committee. In the event of unavailability to serve of the persons so elected, the board shall select a person from the active membership to fill the vacancy, other than a current board member.
- (c) **Nominating Procedure.** As the presiding officer of the annual membership meeting, the President shall:
- (1)Read Section 4.04 just prior to the call for nominations.
- (2) Call upon the chairperson of the Nominating Committee to present the committee's nominations.
- (3)Call for additional nominations from the floor. Nominees should never be chosen on the basis of a person's business success or financial resources alone. All nominees, no matter how nominated, must qualify in accordance with paragraph (a) of this Section.
- (d)Election. Votes shall be cast by ballot only if more than two nominations have been made. The two nominees receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected to the Board of Trustees. [NOTE: Ministries may consider the following option: the candidate receiving the next-largest total number of votes in the election shall be elected as "Alternate Trustee," to vote in any board meeting from which an elected trustee is absent.]

Many of the churches and centers have adopted and follow this section of the bylaws with success. However the bylaws are intended to give broad direction to the Nominating Committee.

An additional resource for Nominat-

ing Committees is included in the Association's *Policy Manual for a Unity Ministry* (you have received a complimentary copy), Section XII, has been designed to assist the Nominating Committee in its work. The reader is referred to pages XII-5 and XII-6 in the manual for a review of this information.

I am also excited about a new and extensive curriculum designed for Nominating Committees developed by The Robert K. Greenleaf Center in Indianapolis. The title is Nominating: Making Decisions for the Future, Nominating Committees as Change Agents. The authors, Anne B. Hoover and Barbara C. Bugg, believe "that the Nominating Committee is the single most important committee in an organization." And, further state, "yet, for all this importance, Nominating Committees are often a 'last minute' appointment. Members meet a few times to select individuals whose names are provided by board members, corporations or whose talents they respect or about which they have heard."

The resource focuses on "trust" and "hold in trust" and utilizes key elements of trustee education--history, mission, and vision.

In my consulting work with various ministries we often review the working of the Nominating Committee. I have heard about the frustrations of the committee getting started too late to do an effective job or of not having a clear understanding of the skills needed on the board.

Over the past several years I have recommended that the Nominating Committee begin meeting as soon as possible for the Annual Meeting. The goals of this initial meeting are to introduce the members to one another and discuss the gifts each brings to the nominating process, and to learn about their responsibilities and the importance the committee plays in the future direction of the ministry. This initial meeting will set the consciousness for future meetings.

The resource, Nominating: Making Decisions for the Future is based on a calendar year of twelve sessions which can easily be adapted for a committee that can only meet three or four times a year.

A very brief overview of the twelve

sections in the manual might spark your interest in examining the Nominating Committee process in your ministry and/ or purchasing the materials. The high-lighted text is the section title.

- 1. Committee orientation and introductions.
- Assessment of the organization and understanding of the mission, values, financial condition and vision.
- 3. *Envisioning an ideal board* with the talents, diversity, and styles to lead the organization into the future.
- Categorizing characteristics by interviewing key leaders and continue to add the characteristics needed in the leaders of tomorrow.
- Creating the ideal board worksheet by verifying the organization's leadership requirements and analyzing existing board members in terms of diversity and skills.
- Evaluating internal talent who meet established criteria or can be developed to meet the criteria. And, if allowed by bylaws, external candidates would be evaluated.
- 7. *Planning to recruit* by developing a process to educate potential board members about their role and increase their willingness to serve.
- Pinpointing candidates by establishing which individuals will be asked to serve and which will be alternates.
- Slating and wrapping up creates the slate of candidates in the required format for voting, documents the work of the committee, and adds potential candidates to a "skills bank."
- 10. Finishing business involves the preparing of information packets for candidates and interviewing outgoing leaders to gain information for new board members and next year's Nominating Committee.
- Celebrate! and recognize the commitment, dedication, and trust. This important ritual brings closure to the commission and responsibilities of the Nominating Committee.
- 12. A new generation of the leadership legacy needs a smooth transition in

leadership through orientation and continuing board development.

Each of the sections follows an instructional format of goals, personnel, materials needed, time required, desired results and a sample agenda. The one for Session Three, *Envisioning and Ideal Board* (page 31) is reproduced in Exhibit A. In addition, there are instructions for the Nominating Committee Chair and an extensive bibliography included in the

binder.

Although this material was designed for the nonprofit sector, many of the ideas and tools can easily be adapted to ministry. To further assist you in the nominating process, the Reverend Pat Barker and I will be presenting a workshop designed for ministers and Nominating Committees at Convention in June, 1994. The concepts and strategies can be applied to other committees and the board. We look forward to seeing you in June!

The Nominating Process

Goals

- ◆ To develop a preliminary working model for an "ideal" board of trustees.
- ◆ To develop an image of the ideal board and then establish a working model comprised of characteristics of that board, such as skills, diversity, and commitment to mission.

Personnel

- ◆ Executive director or another appointed person or staff member to serve as discussion leader for the brainstorming process.
- ◆ Nominating chair and members of the committee.

Materials needed

- ◆ Markers, easel and easel pad with large newsprint pads.
- ◆ Additional resources from bibliography.

Time

◆ Two hours.

Desired results

- ◆ Completion of preliminary working model of the ideal board.
- ◆ Establishing demographics of the ideal board.
- ◆ Developing an awareness of skills, expertise and the benefits of multiculturalism.

Sample agenda for a two-hour session

- ◆ Lecturette on the committee's mission. (Allow 15 minutes.)
- ♦ Visualizing the ideal board. (Allow 30 minutes.)

been thrilled by the positive response in a person's life, triggered by a word you didn't even realize you said? During counseling, is there any among you who has not experienced that special moment when the presence of the "true counselor" is felt and you sense the change that has taken place? Are these not nurturing experiences? How fortunate we are to be in a profession that provides such blessed moments. And yet, how important it is that we take time for ourselves so that we can even recognize the moment when it comes. How important that we provide the space wherein the creative spirit can do its enlightening, nurturing and restoring work within us!

The upcoming weeks provide special opportunities to remind ourselves of the importance of nurturing our souls through both reaching out and reaching in. Valentine's Day has always been a day devoted to expressing love to another. Then a couple of days after that is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. Though traditionally Lent has been thought of as a time of fasting or "giving up" something, it is a prime opportunity for us to take time to nurture our souls. We can do this by providing ourselves more space for quiet prayer and meditation. We can also do this as we empower, encourage, and nurture others. Evelyn Underhill tells of someone who asked a woman to pray for her and the woman's reply was: "I can't really pray for you, but I can come and boil your potatoes!" Underhill remarks, "There was a woman who really knew how to pray!"

How to nurture your soul? Reach in and reach out. Be fully present in the moment. If you think of it, reach out to fellow ministers or teachers with a phone call or a card or a kind word--or perhaps, even go boil their potatoes! Then, enjoy the nurturing feeling.

News Update from Spiritual Unity in Russia:



BROADCASTING THE UNITY MESSAGE

The first week of December, Linda Harbin-Beard and I had the opportunity to attend the North American Broadcast Section of the World Association for Christian Communication Convention in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. When I planned our trip I was very excited about the opportunity to meet over a hundred of our peers from over a dozen different Christian denominations and Christian broadcast entities. The workshops being offered seemed excellent as well. I had no idea, however, what a tremendous impact this meeting would have on me in so many different ways. It is my plan that in future CONTACT articles both Linda and I will be sharing some of the things we learned both from fellow Christian communicators and workshop presenters.

There are three items I would like to address in this issue because of timing and relevance to the work we are doing as Christian communicators in a world of secular over communication.

The first of these involves one of the most spiritually beautiful women broadcasters I have ever been blessed to meet, Ms. Pauline Webb.

Pauline Webb has spent much of her life as a broadcaster and leader in the ecumenical movement worldwide. Until her recent retirement she served as the Director of Religious Broadcasting for the domestic network of the BBC in London. During the convention we were blessed with two dynamic speeches by Pauline concerning, Meeting Challenges --Finding Solutions and Is There Spiritual Renewal through Media? Space does not permit me to share all the insights that

I received from these two addresses, but her spiritual depth, broadcasting experience on state radio in Great Britain, and her insightful thoughts on radio and the effective use of radio to bring the Gospel message were awesome. I will only say that she firmly believes, as I do, that the medium of radio is far and away the most effective medium we have to take the message of Jesus Christ to the world. She also firmly believes that we must take firm stands on Christian social issues or our voices will

eventually mean nothing to our listeners.

While attending the convention we had the opportunity to see two very special presentations of Christian oriented filming--one for TV and a premier of Steven Spielberg's newest movie. Schindler's List. Why is this important information from our department you might ask? Let me explain.

for TV movie pilot and the proposed first hour of a TV series of Catherine Marshall's book, Christy. Christy is a beautiful and moving story of a nineteen-year-old Christian girl who chose to serve God's call by teaching school in a small church in Appalachia in the early 1900's. It is a true story with a strong Christian theme. The pilot will have played in January already but all of us need to take time to see the series, and if you are as touched with it as I was, let people know about it. With all the "garbage" on prime time TV, it behooves all of us to come out and support this prime time series. The networks (Christy is on CBS) do not believe people will support this type of programming. A successful Christy will lead to other quality programming. It may be money to CBS, but it's Christian values on prime time for me, and that's worth a look by all

Schindler's List, the latest Steven Spielberg production, was one of the most powerful and moving movies I have ever seen. It is not another movie about the holocaust horrors only; it is a movie about life and death at a human level that will strike not only notes of horror but also awe in you. It is based on a true story of the German industrialist Oscar Schindler who was not a Jew, but helped over 1,200 Jews escape Poland and the death camps at great risk to himself. It is a Jewish story, but it has powerful Christian overtones in its message of the value of life, heritage, tradition and redemption. It was not made to achieve commercial success but I will predict that its message and its presentation will earn many Oscar nominations.

One final note. Our closing worship service on Friday, December 3rd, was centered around a beautiful two-person presentation of James Dillet Freeman's poem, I Am There. So not only has this beautiful spiritual prayer gone to the moon, it led the worship service for over 140 delegates at the World Association for Christian Communications Convention. I could not help but hear the words of our Peace Song singing in my heart as we all held hands and prayed The Lord's Prayer after the presentation of I Am There. Unity certainly played a role in

uniting all of us in Christian love.

LIGHT ON THE PATH

In the most seemingly insignificant incident there is a gift! . . .

Quite a few years ago I was sitting in church (in California) during the Sunday lesson and I silently asked, "Why am I here?" Immediately came the answer, "To give." After my initial surprise, I thought about it and said, "Okay." I began to send love, light, and other things as they came into my mind. I remember feeling my hands getting hot and tingling and holding them open in my lap as I gave thanks that the healing energy was going out and would be received by any and all that were receptive. It felt good. I have no idea how many weeks this went on; if, indeed, it continued past that day.

Then about 15 years ago while attending a large CEP class, my biggest concern, my ONLY concern was staying awake. I was digging my nails into the palms of my hands, anything and everything I could think of because I was on the front row and the instructor would often look my way. Finally I could handle it no longer and said (silently with intensity), "I need help!" Immediately came a flashback of sitting on the front row in that church as I heard the word GIVE. Well, let me tell you that I got all excited thinking, "Yes, I'm getting so much from so many;" and I began sending love, enthusiasm, energy, awareness, whatever came to mind.

The next day on my way to class, Frank Miller, a friend asked me why I was so happy (or excited--I don't recall the exact word). I replied that I was on my way to my "love class." He asked if I weren't going to the same class as he was and I said, "Yes, my LOVE class." Frank got me off to the side so no one could overhear and asked me what I was talking about 'cause it was BORING, boring! He acted like he thought I'd flipped. I shared with him what I was

doing and he really liked it. Said he was going to do it, too. I know that Frank shared with a couple other people, how many I don't know. What I DO know is it truly was exciting as we watched the instructor come alive. The material became interesting and the delivery improved almost constantly. The instructor we started with was not the same as the one we finished with. Even the attendees and the whole atmosphere changed and was charged up. It was awesome!

One of my close friends worked at USRS at the time. She knew something was going on with me and wanted to know what it was. Confidentially I shared with her what was happening. When I finished she said, "Trish, you are doing far more than you know." Swearing me to secrecy she then told me that this particular instructor was on probation. Unless VERY good evaluations were received the instructor would no longer teach there. WOW!

This could have been the end of the story, but. . . a couple years ago a CEP'er was getting ready to leave my office and began telling me about a class she had to attend, how awful it was and how much she dreaded it. The teacher was intimidating, among other things, and everyone was not liking the class. I found myself sharing the above with her. She said something to the effect that she was only one person, and even so maybe it could have worked if it was at the beginning rather than the end of the two weeks. A couple days later I heard someone call my name and there was the CEP'er rushing to reach me. She was so animated and bursting with excitement as she said, "I had to tell you. I just HAD to tell you what happened." After she had left my office, my story kept wandering in and out of her thoughts. Each time she became aware of it she would shrug it off. Finally (a little irritated) she asked herself, "What do I have to lose?" and decided to do it. IT WORKED! She said everyone was commenting on what happened to the teacher. It was great! We did a little more sharing and thanked each other with warm hugs.

So, for whatever it's worth--that's the story. I've seriously considered that the time in church when I asked, "Why am I here?" was ground-setting for the two events to come. And. . .just maybe the story has not yet been completed.

Not only can ONE person make a differenceeach ONE of us IS making a difference.

What kind of a difference am I making?

New staff position established for children and uniteens

Our Executive Director, Glenn Mosley, and Mick Dustin, Director of Education, are pleased to announce that your Executive Committee, at its September meetings, approved a staff position known as EDUCATION SERVICES ASSOCIATE FOR CHILDREN AND UNITEEN MINISTRIES.

The Reverend Judi Venturini, who served as our Year of the Child Coordinator through December 31, 1993, assumed the duties of this position January 1, 1994, in order to maintain the level of services your Association has given during our Year of the Child Project. Judi's focus will be in providing more material and better services for upper elementary and Uniteen kids. Linda Gower, your Education Services Assistant will focus her energy especially on programs and services related to prenatal, preschool, and early elementary age levels. Ray Wiggins will provide supervision of their work while continuing to resource and guide the ministries of Youth of Unity, Campus Ministry, Adults of Unity and our Spiritual Educator's Certification Program.

Many ministers have indicated that the increased education services to their churches, along with the quality of materials and services for children and teens, has been extremely helpful and most impressive. It is your Association's goal to provide you with quality materials, resources, and training in order for you to better serve children, teens and families. Your generous and consistent

financial support makes it possible for Ray, Judi, and Linda to serve you. Thank you.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION SERVICES NEWS



The legend of Saint Valentine says that during the time when the Romans ruled the known world, Emperor Claudius observed the reluctance of married men to answer the call to battle in distant sites. He reasoned that they did not want to go because they did not want to leave their wives and homes. So Claudius, putting the needs of state above all else, sought to eliminate that which thwarted the furtherance of what he felt was the "higher good" and he decreed that marriage must be banned. Meanwhile, the good Priest Valentine was grieved by this decree because he knew the empowering effect that committed love has on the spiritual journey of man. In secret, Valentine invited all who wanted to commit their love to one another to come to him by night and he heard their vows and blessed their holy union. As time passed, the Emperor heard of Valentine's activities and he condemned him to death. Though Valentine died a martyr, he remained a symbol of love and the holiday we celebrate today bears his name.

In our children's 12 Powers curriculum, we have always placed our study of the power of love during February to coincide with this celebration of Saint Valentine's Day. We present the children with concepts of the power of love, but how often have we really looked at the way love relates to our spiritual journey and to that journey in the lives of our children?

What do you suppose it was that Saint Valentine saw as enhancing one's spiritual journey through the commitment of love for another? How does this thing called love fit into our spiritual journey today? In Matthew 22:35-40. Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment was and he responded with, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

When I look at all of Jesus' teachings, I see this statement in the book of Matthew as the bottom line of everything he ever taught. He was telling us we need to:

 Love God
 Love each other
 Love ourselves If these are the greatest commandments, then perhaps I we need to beware of the importance that we sometimes place on our other beliefs, creeds, and personal dogmas. We need to assess if our emphasis on beliefs and creeds is out of line with the love that needs to be emphasized and committed to for reaching the Christ consciousness we are seeking. To me, the beliefs we hold beyond these bottom line love commandments are simply "spiritual fluff." Not fluff in the sense that they are frivolous, but fluff in the sense that that is

what makes us comfortable in understanding our humanness in relationship to God. As human beings, we have a need to explain why we are experiencing this state of being and our spiritual fluff (or beliefs) gives us the explanation our intellect demands. Spiritual fluff helps us survive the human condition but, according to Jesus, our love for God, love for others, and love for ourselves is the basic ingredient necessary in attaining Christ consciousness.

With children, the younger the child, the less the intellect has yet demanded an explanation of our existence. Without this demand, the less need there is for spiritual fluff and the closer they are to the pure essence of the three levels of love. That is why just being around a small child can give you a glimpse of that pure essence of love that Jesus was talking about. For myself, I find I suffer from "kid deprivation" if I go for a length of time without being around children. More than once, while traveling, I have gone into the local Sunday school and asked if I could help in a classroom, just so I could be around the kind of love that children exist in. Jesus said, "Truly I say to you, unless you change and become like little children, you shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven."

If you look at children's curriculum, you will see how beliefs, creeds and dogmas become increasingly less prevalent as you move down the scale to younger and younger children. At the very youngest levels, the essence of what we teach is simply love. If we believe what Jesus said about becoming as little children, it might behoove us to consider more closely the essence of love that we teach little children as the possible essence of what we teach the older children and perhaps even what we teach our adults.

Again, spiritual fluff has its place for comforting the intellect of adults. How we relate to our beliefs can become distorted, however, if we do not remember that each of us is a unique individualization of God, so our beliefs are also a unique expression of that relationship. The bottom-line of loving God, loving one another, and loving ourselves is something we can all share, but our fluff is uniquely individual.

This is not to say we shouldn't be interested in how others come into a right relationship with God. In fact, I often seek out those who are willing to share their beliefs with me. I find individual uniqueness fascinating and because I, too, am searching for the fluff that brings comfort to my life, I enjoy having others share their beliefs. I often try on their fluff to see if it fits for me, and sometimes it does, but most often it doesn't. Regardless of whether it fits for me or not, I always feel blessed when someone will share how they experience a oneness with the Source of their being. Through their sharing I feel I have just been allowed to see another aspect of God.

Just as Saint Valentine saw beyond what Claudius viewed as the "higher good," we need to remember that the bottom line is our commitment to the greatest commandment; to love God, to love one another, and to love ourselves, so we may enter into the kingdom of heaven as little children.

Early in October of 1993, five Unity churches in the Washington, D.C., area joined together in their first subregional church celebration. The churches that participated were: Unity Christ Church, Gaithersburg, Maryland; Unity Church of Light, Bowie, Maryland; Unity of Fairfax, Oakton, Virginia; Unity of Alexandria, Alexandria, Virginia; and Unity of Washington, D.C.

Children, teens, parents, spiritual educators, ministers, youth education directors, regional consultants, and uniteen and Y.O.U. sponsors came together on the afternoon of October 10, 1993, to celebrate their oneness. I was honored and privileged to participate in this event, and I want to share with you the highlights of that day.

Celebration was in the air. Children and adults joined to prepare the sanctuary. Everywhere you looked you saw groups rehearsing, sound systems being checked, food being neatly displayed and prepared, the people greeting each other with hugs and laughter. This joy scemed to override any feeling of anxiety that might have crept in, as with such events, there are glitches and changes. But we laid hold of and claimed "divine order and peace" and nothing stood in the way of each person having experienced more than anyone had anticipated. As one Y.O.U. sponsor put it, "I feel sorry for everyone who wasn't here!"


I believe what made this day so powerful was that everyone participated and shared their gifts and talents. The support of the ministers was a key factor. From Washington, D.C., Amalie Frank did an opening prayer and Sylvia Sumter welcomed the attendees. Dee Sweeney of Unity in Alexandria did a special blessing of the children. (As each child was blessed they walked down the aisle lined with adults holding balloon swords and were affirmed and loved.) Bill Wilson of Unity of Fairfax did a closing blessing and introduced Donna Marie Carey, a professional singer who closed the day with special music which delighted the child in all. I did a talk--"Weaving A Web of Oneness." But the main event was the children and teens!

Under the direction of Dave Groover, the children from all the churches performed two songs. They set the tone for coming together in oneness and got everyone involved. Each church had time to feature their children and their teens in some way. We had a variety of talent displayed that day. Everything from a stand up comic (watch out Arsenio Hall) to special music by the littlest angels. All of the performances were woven together by the performance of a very special clown who delighted the children with her jokes and tricks.

Myrtle Fillmore was even there! Dorothy Bishop, Eastern Region's Education Consultant to the Youth of

Unity, played Myrtle in a short skit with the children. During this time, we all silently stood to declare that the children were no longer our future, but our present!

All that had occurred the previous months in preparation by these churches to come together in unity and love made an opening for bonding and support to one another. It was a demonstration of unity in Unity. I was misty-eyed. I knew in my heart that a shift has happened for our Unity movement through this past year in all we have given to the children through the Year of the Child. My dream of unity in Unity was manifesting before my eyes.

If you would like to plan such an event here are some tips:

- 1) Plan far enough in advance. Six months or more is necessary to get full support.
- 2) The minister's support will make the difference in getting congregants to support it.
- 3) The Youth Education Director should be an important part of the planning, but his/her platter is usually very full already. A chairperson from within each congregation can do much of the legwork with a committee of people.
- 4) Use the gifts of your people. The more people who are involved with the creation of the event, the more support it will receive. Remember: This is not just a special day for children. It is a special day for the inner child of everyone.
- 5) Let your children be the stars. We need to make a time to let their lights shine.
- 6) Be flexible. You will find that there will be a lot of changes and unforeseen glitches. Keep your vision and try new ideas to work through these times.
- 7) Selling tickets beforehand may help people to make a commitment to being there. Many people who have good intentions to support the event can forget. I had many people tell me that week that they wanted to be there but had made other plans in the meantime.
- 8) Let God be the guiding light in all things.

Suzanne Lubkowski, Youth Education Director of Unity of Fairfax said, "I still get goose bumps when I think of that day. The most powerful moment was when we were asked to stand if we were committed to our children. Watching the people rise one by one will always live in my memory as one of the most powerful moments I have experienced."



THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Constant "whitewater" (churning rapids) is one way to describe a learning, growing, "in process" organization--like us--our Association of Unity Churches. We rarely begin anything new; we refine and shift and change and transform what already is. Let me share my view of some of our "in process-ness" with you. I hope this is of interest to you; it's about you and me.

"We've come a long way, baby" is an advertising slogan which alludes to societal progress. Since we are still relatively early in our year, 1994, let's take a brief look at how far our Association has come in recent years, where we are, and where we are going, at least in the near future. Like each of our churches, it is easier to measure our Association's progress in "tangibles" or retrospectively than to take a measurement of subjective criteria or futuristically. If someone asks, "How are things going?" about a given ministry, the one answering will likely say something like, "Our attendance increased by 100 people last year and we needed to add a second service." Tangible, objective.

Rarely do we hear in answer to the question, "How are things going?" about a given ministry, "We experience real joy in our prayer and worship services together," or "Our Unity community bonds together extremely well and they maintain a truly high consciousness." Intangible, subjective.

Let's look at both objective and subjective criteria regarding "How are things going with our Association?" In checking the answer, please keep in mind these are all "team efforts and that the word "team" does not have an "I" anywhere in it. The following are accomplishments we have all done together.

In 1959 (Unity Minister's Association days) there were 189 ministries and study groups. In June, 1966, as our Association was activated, there were 213 ministries and study groups; at the end of 1984, 444 ministries and study groups with attendance of approximately 55,000 on Sunday; at the end of 1993, 815 ministries and satellite ministries and approximately 90-100 informal study groups=915<> total ministries with attendance of over 110,000 per Sunday and mailing lists of 300,000+. In our Strategic Plans of late 1985, we set a goal with action steps, etc., of doubling the 1984 figure by 1994. We reached the 888 ministries, satellite ministries, and informal study groups in late 1992.

Many of the ministries referred to above have two or more ministers. In 1966, we had 469 ministers and 200<> licensed teachers, now 1,010 ministers and 736 licensed teachers.

In 1984, our donor base of 400+ was mostly ministries; in 1989 600+ ministries, foundations, regions, and individuals; as of December 31, 1993, our donor base consists of 910 ministries, foundations, regions, and individuals.

The 1984 total budget was \$588,443 and had a deficit of \$87,000. Our total budget for the current year is well over \$1,500,000 and our consolidated statement of income and expenses has not had a deficit since the 1984-85 fiscal year.

By the end of May this year, the mortgage on our building, worth nearly \$1,000,000 will be paid in full and Catherine Ponder will burn the mortgage at our convention in Washington, D.C., in June. Like all our efforts, this too, is the result of many people on the Association "team."

Major programs added in recent years: 1985-90--established Management Team to add stability to Association; 1986--creation of permanent Management Consult-

ant position, with funding; 1987--established Expansion Department; 1987--creation of Radio Media Department, with funding; 1989--began creation of a systematic study of Unity teachings with Unity School (U.M.A.C.); 1989--foundation funding granted to create Development Department; 1991--began two years of national and regional conference focus groups as foundation for our current strategic plan; 1993--co-published with Unity School a systematic study of Unity teachings entitled. The Quest (U.M.A.C.); 1993--developed our new Strategic Plan based on focus groups feedback (fifth Plan in nine years); 1994--first stages of a youth Living Curriculum forthcoming, June 1994 Convention (see Ray Wiggins' column in this issue of CONTACT for more details).

Considering the growth mode of the Unity movement, there will always be much ahead to do. Tangible, objective.

And now a glance through our twoway mirror at intangible accomplishments, our current status, and future intentions. The gossamery wings of consciousness, like more objective goals when in a growth mode, always leave much ahead to do. Intangible, subjective.

Since its beginning, our Association has been a product-development and service organization. We still are, and I would think we always will be. The focal points of the products (minister-teacher training manuals, graduate programs, youth curriculum, etc.) have changed like "whitewater" since 1966.

Services have changed, too. We have variously focused on ministerial placement, expansion, ministerial education (MEP), liaison, youth education trainings, radio/media support, fund raising training, church management and much more.

Currently it seems to me another very important ingredient is being reemphasized by us all. This is to support one another in love as members of our extended family. To professionally support one another-that's a service. To personally support one another-that's an expression of love. Intangible, subjective.

"A Most Valuable Resource"

One of our Unity ministers, Diane Sickler, currently serving Unity Church of Peace in St. Louis, Missouri, who was ordained in 1978, shares a view on "A Most Valuable Resource" for a Unity church. Thank you, Diane, for sharing.

Why do we have a church? We have a church so that we can get people together to celebrate and learn about their faith and to gather with persons of like mind for love and support. The most important functions of a church are worship (celebration), learning about God (classes), and fellowship. All the rest of what we do merely supports these most important aspects.

No one of these three aspects can be eliminated if a church is to grow and prosper. If we focus exclusively on worship, the church will die because while the spiritual good has been provided, the need for social context has been lost. If we only hold classes, the church is not a church, but a school. Schools, by their nature, are created to graduate persons into the greater life experience. Schools are always in need of new students and while new persons are always desired in a

church, there needs to be a continuity of membership for the church to be strong. Fellowship cannot be the entire focus for the group. A group that focuses on fellowship alone becomes a club.

In order to function as a worshipping, teaching, social community the church nceds worshipping, teaching, and social leadership. The social leadership often is discovered within the membership itself. Many persons know how to hold a potluck luncheon, or plan a party. Teachers are not so easily discovered. There are often persons in the group who desire to teach, but do not know how, or do not know the fundamentals of the subject of which they are to teach. Sometimes it works to have a teacher who is just discovering the material with his/her students, but more often than not this method of teaching only leads to confusion. Worship leaders are also not so easily found. While it is true that almost anyone can formulate and lead a worship service, it takes creativity and time to lead a worship service once a week. Many people have one good lesson/sermon which they can give; not so many have the ability to create and to present a lesson/sermon that is uplifting week after week after week. It is for this reason that the most important resource of any church is its minister.

The minister is trained in presenting a lesson/sermon on a weekly basis. The minister is someone with the talent and creativity to create a worship experience on a weekly basis. The minister is well grounded in the nuances of the faith and can spot potential problems before they become challenges in the spiritual unfoldment of the student.

Let us get our financial commitment to the ministry in perspective. Buildings, newsletters, computers, copy machines, tables, organs, hymnals, bookstores, nurseries, etc., all assist in holding worship, classes, and fellowship; but these things do not make the church. Are we spending money on things that keep us from having what we really need? Leadership in the form of a minister may seem to be

expensive when not viewed from the right perspective. A minister is a church's most valuable resource.

One of the services provided by the Association of Unity Churches to ministers and to member ministries of the Association is that of being a clearinghouse for the placement of ministers in member churches. Detailed information is sent to both ministers seeking placement and to the churches needing new ministerial leadership.

As the Director of Placement I am happy to answer questions for boards looking for a new minister as well as for ministers seeking a church. Please write or call the Association for assistance.

For your information: Ministerial candidates from the 1994 graduating class are now available for candidate speaking engagements.

A Donor Bill of Rights

To assure that philanthropy merits the respect and trust of the general public, and that donors and prospective donors can have full confidence in the not-for-profit organizations and causes they are asked to support, we declare that all donors have these rights.

I.

To be informed of the organization's mission, of the way the organization intends to use donated resources, and of its capacity to use donations effectively for their intended purposes.

II.

To be informed of the identity of those serving on the organization's governing board, and to expect the board to exercise prudent judgment in its stewardship responsibilities.

III.

To have access to the organization's most recent financial statements.

IV.

To be assured their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given.

V.

To receive appropriate acknowledgment and recognition.

PLANNED GIVING NEWS

The churches, centers, and study groups that make up our Association of Unity Churches have been blessed with a unique heritage. Our strength and our mission are to be found in our name: Unity. Each ministry has its own unique work to carry out, its own special way of blessing the community it serves. Your Association of Unity Churches knows it takes both human and financial resources to complete the tasks that are ours to do. Your ministry and your Association of Unity Churches can work together to assure the future and participate more fully in the life of our vital, growing movement.

In February we sent to each ministry Prosperity, our first newsletter in a series highlighting financial planning ideas--planned giving. Prosperity will be published quarterly by your Association as a service to our Unity ministries. It is a tool for ministries to utilize in developing their own planned giving program. Throughout the country today there are \$846 billion in CDs, \$3 trillion in pension plans, and \$8 trillion delayed in the probate system. Congregants can be educated in how to increase their income, offset and/or minimize capital gains when they sell long-term property, stocks, or assets. Congregants can realize tax benefits, and at the same time support the work of their Unity ministry. Being a good steward of God's abundance blesses both the ministry and the individual. Educating our congregants to the opportunities of planned giving opens new

channels for the flow of good to increase many times over.

I am frequently asked, "Who are potential planned giving donors?" The answer--people who are motivated to give to their ministry, who have money or other property to give if they desire, who can be visited on a friendly basis, and who have confidence in their ministry, their board, and their minister or spiritual leader. The following guidelines can help in identifying planned giving donors:

- 1. People who give often,
- 2. People who have given for a long time.
- 3. People who are older.
- 4. Childless couples.
- 5. Surviving spouses.

Ways to identify potential planned giving donors:

- 1. Inform your constituents though the use of:
 - a. Articles in your newsletter.

- b. Direct mail information to your constituents, such as *Prosperity* newsletter.
- c. Enclosures in thank you's and/or other mail.
- 2. Motivate respondents through:
 - a. The mail to better inform them.
 - b. The telephone to identify potential donors.
 - Group meetings such as wills clinics.
 - d. Personal contact.

It is deeply satisfying to stand on the threshold of the new millennium, all members of one body, carrying forward the work begun by Charles and Myrtle Fillmore over a century ago. Unity continues to be "a link in the great educational movement inaugurated by Jesus Christ." Expert Development Process

During the midyear meetings the Council of Committee Chairpersons met to review our Association's Strategic Plan. I had the privilege of facilitating this important meeting. One of the desired outcomes of the meeting was to assist committee chairpersons (and Association staff representing committee chairs) in understanding what our strategic plan was really saying. Once there was understanding and consensus, the chairpersons could share the process with their respective committees, thus helping determine the roles of their committees in the implementation and ongoing evaluation of the plan. To achieve this, I adapted a process tool designed by Susan Everson, Director of McREL, an educational laboratory based in Kansas City. It is called "The Expert Development Process."

A second outcome was for the committees to review their committee commission and responsibilities/functions in light of their understanding of the strategic plan. It would help the committees to clarify their roles, to avoid duplicating efforts, and to set goals for the next two years. A special thanks to all who attended and participated in The Expert Development Process.

According to Ms. Everson, The Expert Development Process can be used whenever "staff development time is limited and the information to be studied is in written form." She believes that it is a cooperative technique in which each member of a group becomes an "expert about a different topic which is then presented to other group members."

Overview

The Expert Development Process is a cooperative technique in which a member of the group is responsible to become an "expert" about a different part of our Association's Strategic Plan. It is then presented to other members of the group. This process works well for professional development, planning, and establishing a knowledge base for decision-making.

To organize for the process, a facilitator/leader divides the large group into "learning teams." The learning team can be heterogeneous or can be organized by roles (i.e., board members, staff, committees) or whatever grouping is appropriate. Each member of a learning team will volunteer to be responsible for a different part of the strategic plan such as values and mission, vision, or goals. Once the group structure is set, the process begins and includes the following phases:

- 1. A *study phase*. Each person on the "learning team" reads his/her materials.
- 2. A discussion phase. People from different learning teams who have read the same materials will have time together for reflection and dialogue. (This second group is called "expert teams.")
- 3. A teaching phase. Each learning team member has a short time to "teach" information about his/her part of the plan to other learning team members. (The first pairing of teams.)

Steps

To use The Expert Development Process, follow these steps:

- 1. Assign people to "learning teams." To be productive, the learning teams should have three to five members. Give members of the learning teams time to read the entire strategic plan and select the sections for which they will be responsible (i.e., values and mission, vision, or goals.) Each section should be studied by at least one member.
- 2. Organize "expert teams." Members of each learning team will leave their learning team to join others from different learning teams who have studied the same sections of the Plan (see step 1). Make sure that in addition to discussing the material for the purpose of understanding, these expert teams draw on their own expertise and judgments about what they have read. See if the expert teams can arrive at a consensus position regarding what is being said, and about the importance and value of the section. The "Expert Sheet" (see box on page 8) is used to record the discussion.
- 3. Teach the material. Expert team members return to their learning teams to present their section to the other team members. Information recorded on their Expert Sheet directs their presentations. Be sure to focus on the overall deliberations of the discussions--not just their own opinions. During this step each person acts as a reporter for what his/her expert team concluded. After each team member discusses the topics--their relationships, similarities, differences, etc.--the team contributes to the total decision-making process.

The Expert Development Process appeared to be successful in getting the committee chairpersons and staff to understand the strategic plan. It can be readily adapted to a variety of activities in a ministry where professional development, planning, and establishing a knowledge base for decision-making are needed.

two and one-half million people were listening to Charles Fillmore's Saturday night broadcast. If he were here today, do you suppose he would support our 1994 Public Service Announcement Campaign? I believe he would.

Over two years ago I sat with Carolyn Craft in her office as she explained the history of the Radio/Media Department and her plans for the future. On her bulletin board above her desk she had arranged a collage of pictures she enjoyed. One picture spoke to me and I can still see it in my mind. An African native sitting on the ground with a radio to his hear. . .listening. That picture and this department have become part of my own vision.

I believe in broadcasting and it is even more exciting to me today than it was two years ago. Broadcasting and media are a part of our daily lives, and affect us in subtle ways. Powerful businesses and corporations spend millions of dollars to speak to us through broadcasting. They can change our minds, create their own image in our thoughts, convince us to buy their products, entertain and amuse us, and present us with words and pictures of what they believe about the world. We in Unity also have the opportunity to use broadcasting, to share Truth principles

DOROTHY PIERSON

Dorothy Pierson, co-minister with her husband, Phillip, of Christ Unity Church of Sacramento, California, has a long and illustrious career in the Unity movement. Dorothy has served Unity ministries in Missouri, Canada, Hawaii, Washington, and California. For over fifty years, Dorothy has given her whole life to sharing the dynamic Unity message and has touched countless lives.

Dorothy is noted for her strong and dynamic teaching work. She has served, in the past, for many years on the Board of Trustees of the Association of Unity Churches and was President of the Association in 1972. Perhaps her greatest work has been her writings and poetry. She is known around the world for her poetry published frequently in *Daily Word*. She and her husband are regularly viewed on the popular television program THE BEST IS YET TO BE produced in Sacramento.

We honor Dorothy's years of dedication and leadership in the Unity movement.





Throughout a lifetime of writing, Marcus Bach has been extolled as an artist with words, a delightful storyteller, and a researcher extraordinary.

Recognized as a leading authority on the world's religions and intercultural relations, he holds a Ph.D. from the University of Iowa and four honorary degrees from other colleges. Augmenting his distinguished teaching career, Dr. Bach has immersed himself in the religions and cultures of the world. He has developed a vivid, highly emphatic understanding for the universal values inherent in both the ancient faiths and the religious movements of our day.

His extensive achievements have for years been listed in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA. As a prominent public speaker, he has served as a Martha Holden Jennings foundation lecturer and as a seminar leader under the auspices of THE FELLOWSHIP FOR SPIRITUAL UNDERSTANDING, of which he is founder and director.





Spiritual leader of the Tibetan people, Tenzin Gyatso, the XIV Dalai Lama, is widely recognized as an impeccable philosopher, teacher, master of Buddhism, and statesman. In 1959, in response to the Chinese occupation of Tibet, he and other great lamas led over 120,000 Tibetans to India, Nepal, Bhutan, and Sikkim in order to insure their survival and preserve their cultural heritage, including the banned practice of Buddhism.

The Dalai Lama, whose name means "Ocean of Wisdom," was born in 1935 to a peasant family in a small Tibetan village. When he was two years old, he was found by a delegation sent to find a successor to the XIII Dalai Lama, who had died three years earlier. His education, centering on Buddhist philosophy and religion, began at the age of four, and has involved the memorization and interpretation of thousands of pages of the most important Buddhist texts.

Since 1987, he has received the Albert Schweitzer Humanitarian Award, the Raoul Wallenberg Congressional Human Rights Award, as well as the world Management Council's Humanitarian Award.

The XIV Dalai Lama is greatly committed to the promotion of universal tolerance and compassion, and frequently participates in international dialogues on world peace. In 1989 he received the Nobel Peace Prize.

What is the Association of Unity Churches

The Association of Unity Churches is spiritually affiliated with Unity School of Christianity in that it embraces the teachings of the cofounders, Charles and Myrtle Fillmore. The two organizations are financially and organizationally separate; however, there are many areas where these two organizations work in cooperation with one another.

The Association's main thrust is the establishment of Unity churches. The Association is, however, an organization separate and distinct from Unity School and operates by its own bylaws and by Unity ministers as a vehicle for administering the affairs of Unity churches and ministers. The Association is a nonprofit organization supported entirely by freewill offerings. It is a worldwide organization made up of 640 ministries and 175 affiliated study groups. along with some 100 informal prayer groups. The day-to-day operation of the Association is handled by a staff of employees who work as a team, and an Executive Director. It is governed by a twenty-one person Board of Trustees which meets twice a year, in January and June.

Association of Unity Churches

I. M.A.T. is:

- A committee of the Association of Unity Churches.
- Comprised of Unity ministers and licensed teachers who have had specialized training for this team.
- Designed to offer education on substance abuse, co-dependency, work addiction, and other addictions.
- Designed to offer assistance to ministers impaired by substance abuse, co-dependency, work addiction, etc.
- Designed to offer assistance to the immediate family and to the Board of Trustees of impaired ministers. (See #V).

II. M.A.T. is:

- NOT a "detective" force or "S.W.A.T." team.
- NOT designed to offer financial aid toward treatment of any impaired minister.
- NOT a medical team.
- NOT a treatment center.

III. Why M.A.T.?

- Because the need to provide help to ministers in the field who are experiencing substance abuse, co-dependency, and other addictions can no longer be denied.
- Because providing top-quality support, education, and assistance to Unity ministers is essential to the success of the Unity movement.
- Because the health of our ministries is determined by the health of our ministers. M.A.T. provides assistance to ministers to help them improve their own health with regard to substance abuse and other addictions.

IV. Who May Use M.A.T.?

- A concerned and caring family member (spouse, child, or other) of a Unity minister who appears to be impaired.
- A Board president. (Under the process in V.)
- Another Unity minister. (Under the process in V.)
- A licensed Unity teacher. (Under the process in V.)

V. How to Use M.A.T.

- You may contact either your regional representative or the Education Director at the Association Headquarters (816-524-7414). The Education Director and the regional representative will confer with each other and decide if assistance by M.A.T. is warranted and to what degree.
- Subsequent action will be determined by the circumstances of the individual case.

PLEASE NOTE: It must be understood that the ATTITUDE of all parties is to be one of

CARING and CONCERN
for the welfare of the minister.
Punitiveness, judgmentalness and
condemnation have no place in M.A.T.

VI. When to Use M.A.T.

- After repeated incidents of the minister's obvious intoxication from alcohol or other drugs which interfere with or detract from church activities.
- When there is a clear pattern of the minister's deteriorating behavior and work quality.
- When there is clear evidence of the minister's deep depression and/or self-destructive behavior.

Update

A Living Curriculum

Our survey of Unity ministers last year showed us that our field ministries want us to move ahead with production of our new curriculum for children which is Bible based, centered on Unity teachings and written by Unity authors. Our Curriculum Review Task Force appointed last June made a major contribution to amassing the survey information and in helping us to make that information "bite-sized." We thank them.

Thanks also to a prime donation from Unity School of Christianity and other individual and church gifts we are responding to this expressed need. We have contracted with the Reverend Charlotte Carter and Ms. Mary Knight to coordinate the publication of Children On The Quest.

Children On The Quest is the first project of an

educational philosophy and process known as A Living Curriculum.

This first development phase will produce 48 complete lessons plans by June which will serve as a companion piece to The Quest and Adventures On The Quest written by Richard and Mary Alice Jafolla. Once completed, churches will be able to engage children and adults in a study of The Quest.

By June 1994, twelve (12) lessons will be in print, accompanied by a teacher training manual and a teacher training video. The other thirty-six (36) lessons will follow on a quarterly basis.

Phase two of developing A Living Curriculum calls for creating Teens On The Quest and Families On The Quest. These to be completed in 1995.

Development plans for Children On The Quest has involved some fifty contributions (to date) of original stories, and music from our ministers, licensed teachers, and spiritual education directors/teachers. A key element to its production is A Living Curriculum Writers Conference being held at Unity Village March 1-7, 1994, where nine proven Unity writers and three Association staff members, along with the Jafollas, will work in teams to create the material. Our Education Services Regional Consultants are involved in creating the training manual and video.

Field testing will be done by 28 of our churches which are diverse in size, location, and ethnic makeup. Each will receive, by random selection, three of the

twelve lessons to test.

A Curriculum Review Committee has been formed to provide supervision to this entire project. Ray Wiggins is our staff person responsible for on-site coordination.

Spirit is moving our Living Curriculum along with great sped and precision. All of the components necessary for its smooth completion are coming into place on a timely basis. We praise God for the love and dedication toward our ministry with children demonstrated by Unity School of Christianity, our churches, and individual donors for their generous financial support which is making this new curriculum a reality. Your contributions to the Association assure continuing progress in our Living Curriculum.

Another Look at Our Church's Welcome Mat

For ministers and friends and members of every congregation: "Describe a person whom you not only would, but do, make to feel welcome his/her first visit to your house of worship." As I do Board/Minister Roles and Responsibilities, periodically, I ask people to do just that.

The answers are wide-ranging, often including the statement that "We welcome everybody!" In asking a few more questions, we often discover that the descriptions given are of people who already attend. But even that is not a complete answer. The exercise is to describe a person whom you make to feel welcome when he/she first attends. Inevitably, we find discrimination with which some visitors are met.

One of the reasons I often include this exercise is because of an experience I had (which first made me aware) in a ministry which I served that we were practicing discrimination "unawares." One of my practices systematically in attempting to assimilate newcomers over the years was to interview each new person personally, accompanied by at least one volunteer from the major departments of the church. The idea was manifold: it allowed the new person to become acquainted with about a half dozen people and what they did in the church, it allowed those half dozen volunteers and me to become better acquainted with the newcomer, and it encouraged the newcomer to look at how he/she might want to become involved.

Later, I would ask for a follow up interview with me alone. In one such procedure a woman told me what a joyous, enthusiastic, welcome feeling she received from the congregation and the new members' support committee. A few days later, a man who was in the same spiritual baptism "class" as the woman, told me what a "cold fish" congregation and committee we had. He felt very unwelcome and said if it were not for the message which he had by now learned he needed and wanted so much, he would have already left membership. These two friends were reporting on the same congregation and largely, on the same committee members

One or two variables can be addressed: both individuals were of the same race as most of the congregation and most of the committee members. The congregation and committee were close to 50-50 in men and women. The woman felt welcomed by men and women; the man felt

unwelcomed by men and women.

Differences? Yes. The woman was upwardly mobile, educated, articulate, and finely groomed and dressed. The man may not have finished high school, was struggling economically and therefore, was not well dressed.

Welcoming only those who look like us, talk like us, think like us, etc., eventually will make us extremely segregated. The greater the variety we attract, the greater opportunity we have to reach out to the myriad people who are looking for a religious community or "family" to become a real part of.

The following brief list can be expanded "ad infinitum." Make copies and give two to at least key volunteers and new member assimilation committee members to rank order two different ways: first they should rank order for themselves 1) a top priority person to welcome, 2) a medium priority person to welcome,

"Take Up Your C.O.T. and Live Your Vision!

Timeless teachings with timely messages: these words describe so much of Scripture, especially the four Gospels. In the fifth chapter of John a brief encounter by Jesus with a paralytic by the pool of Bethesda provides an example of a timeless teaching with a timely message.

This pool was famous for its healing properties. Whoever was first into its waters after they were "troubled" would be healed of any disease or infirmity. For 38 years this man had lain by the pool, awaiting his healing. Rampant with excuses, he explained to Jesus that he could never be first, his friends had all abandoned him, and no one was there to help him.

Jesus listened patiently. He awaited the moment when the Christ connection with the man was strongest. At that precise moment, Jesus asked him: "Do you want to be healed?" The man's positive response, flowing from the Christ in him, led to Jesus' statement: "Rise, take up your bed and walk."

This simple parable is being constantly relived in our ministries. The pool represents the expansive vision so clearly seen by our ministers and Boards of Trustees. We walk around that pool, marvel at how beautiful it is, and lament the "fact" that we cannot yet enter into it, because. . . . Our excuses are valid: the funds are not there, the people are not enthused, the economy is down, volunteers are not ready. . . .

There comes a point when the Christ connection is made and the clear question is asked: "Do you really want to live this vision?" And from this Christed awareness, a positive response is affirmed. At that moment, the Christ speaks clearly: "Rise up, take up your C.O.T. and live that vision."

The C.O.T. is an acronym for living our vision. Its first and most important message is COMMUNICATION. Without communication our people cannot understand or be excited by our vision. How will this vision serve the mission of the ministry and make a difference in the lives of all who attend? What are the timelines for the fulfillment of this vision, and how much will it require in financial resources to bring this vision into form? Who are the dreamers of this dream, and what is their investment of time, talent, and treasure?

Every vision, every project, whether large or small, requires communication. This vital link is established in many ways. From newsletters to Sunday bulletins to special brochures and mailings, we put this vision in writing. But how else do we communicate?

Our enthusiasm, our actions, our celebrations of successes, our clear stewardship of spirit's resources, our thank you's, these are essential parts of communication. So, also, is our listening to the feedback of others.

As communication improves and our people realize the clarity of our vision, the second part of this acronym emerges, or OWNERSHIP. Now this vision is OUR vision. No longer is it just the minister or just the board holding this vision. WE are enrolled in its success.

And as that OWNERSHIP grows, so also does the TRUST. Ownership and trust flow naturally from clear communication. As that ownership and trust increase, funds become accessible to bring that vision into form.

Whether in our ministries, our families, our work, or our personal growth, this C.O.T. reveals a pattern for fulfillment that creates success. Whatever your dreams, the Christ is ready to work with you to make those dreams a reality.

and 3) those least likely to receive much (if any) efforts in welcoming. Then, on their second list, ask them to provide the same ranking of how, based on their observations of church members and attendees, they think others might function regarding welcoming.

After asking participants to decide who would receive welcome easily, not so easily, and probably not at all, bring them together to see if a consensus can be drawn. Likely some groups from descriptions above, No. 1 will be easy to agree upon. Go on to the No. 2, or "Medium" group. Begin with at least 3 to 5 descriptions to see if with a little work and effort, your leaders might be led to plan strategies for welcoming the medium category into your church. And of the No. 3 group, perhaps this is where the greatest ministry can take place. And it is not all one-sided either. Your church perhaps will not only welcome and give to those in the "not-so-welcomeable" category, but we might all be surprised how much folks in this group are willing and able to give back in talents, presence, and love.

But it takes intentional effort and planning on the part of the leadership as a whole to make our churches inviting and inclusive. Happy planning!

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To the Minister and Board of Trustees: CHURCH MANAGEMENT ISSUES

Ministry and Entrepreneurship

entrepreneur n. A person who organizes, operates, and assumes the risk for business ventures, (French, from Old French, from entreprendre, to undertake.)

-American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language

entrepreneur *n*. A person who organizes and manages a business undertaking, assuming the risk for the sake of profit.

-Webster's New World Dictionary

What images does the word entrepreneur evoke for you? A person willing to take risks, an independent spirit in pursuit of her or his passions and dreams, an adventurer, a dreamer, a visionary? Interest in entrepreneurship is high. One only has to read newspapers, business magazines and journals, or review the variety of college and university programs around the country, to see the level of interest in the topic.

In Kansas City, Missouri, The Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership was founded in 1992 as a division of The Kauffman Foundation. Reported to be one of the largest foundations in the United States, it was established by the late Ewing Kauffman, former owner of the Kansas City Royals and Chairman of Marion Merrell Dow, Inc.

The Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership has several initiatives. Among them are to stimulate entrepreneurial leadership in the nonprofit and for profit sectors, researching and teaching the skills and values needed for successful entrepreneurship, and introducing young people to the opportunities associated with entrepreneurship.

How does this fit with an article on church management, you ask? I believe that there are certain similarities between those ministers who are successful in "pioneering," or as I like to think of them --entrepreneurs in ministries. This article will focus on those qualities and attributes that appear to be common in successful entrepreneurs.

There are no stereotypical entrepreneurs. There are some attributes common in entrepreneurs, just as there are some common qualities or attributes found in successful ministers. What is exciting about these entrepreneurial attributes is that they can be learned. The research being done at the Kauffman Foundation will be increasingly helpful in this area. It is rare that an individual possesses all of the qualities. Knowing your qualities, attributes, and skills, as well as those you want to learn, can contribute to success as an entrepreneur.

I found the listing in The Entrepreneur's Road Map To Business Success, by Lyle Maul and Dianne Mayfield, to be a good summary of those qualities and attributes. If you are interested in seeing your "entrepreneurial frame of mind" take a few minutes to check off the qualities or attributes you currently possess and make note of those you might want to learn or increase.

□ Belief in the idea and in your-self.

For your idea to be successful you need to believe in it to the very core of your being. Successful ministry and entrepreneurship require careful and prayerful understanding of yourself and commitment to the pursuit of your idea. "Belief in your ability to successfully implement the business idea comes from understanding yourself, choosing ideas that are of interest and value to you, and independent thinking." If you truly believe there is a need for your idea or "product"--the Unity message--and you believe you are the person to implement meeting the need, you will have greater confidence and attract people to assist you and support your work.

☐ Keep sight of the big picture and keep it simple.

If you can keep the big picture of what your vision in ministry might be--transformation in people's lives, education and care of the children, healing--you are likely to be more successful. It is a good idea to share this vision with as many people as possible.

By keeping your organizational structure simple and your goals firmly in mind you are less likely to be overwhelmed by the vast number of details to be dealt with on a daily basis in a ministry or a business. Many ministers and board members know the challenges of cash flow problems and how this quickly diverts attention from the ministry's goals or bigger picture. An entrepreneur anticipates these and other challenges and knows how to seek resolution. Frequently ministers and boards spend too much time in dealing with details or micromanaging at the expense of the bigger picture. Please note I am not discounting cash flow problems as unimportant--I consider them of critical importance.

One of my current favorite authors, Stephen Covey, in his book Seven Habits of Highly Effective People, writes "Begin with the end in mind." (I highly recommend this book.)

☐ Creativity or thinking beyond the barriers of tradition.

Entrepreneurs are great at identifying and fulfilling a need or desire of people. Often this involves creativity or an approach that pushes the boundaries of conventionality. In many communities and towns in our country there is an unfulfilled market or desire for people who want to grow spiritually that is not being met. Ministers with an entrepreneurial mind-set can quickly see opportunities to creatively fill that need and do so. This is called fulfilling a market-nitch.

□ Flexibility in your planning.

This is a tough one-writing down your vision and goals for your business or ministry. Through the process of planning, everyone associated with the endeavor is involved in formulating key goals. Planning and replanning are important due to the many unforeseen events which you cannot totally control. Contingency plans are important because there are multiple strategies or ways to achieve your goals. Thinking and talking through the multiple strategies in advance can assist you in achieving your goals. Avoid "planning paralysis" and not taking action. Being flexible, not immobilized, in responding to needed changes within your environment will increase the probability of success.

☐ Optimism or a positive way of looking at things.

Entrepreneurs with an optimistic outlook are quick to see the learning opportunities in challenges. Because of flexibility in the planning mentioned above, they quickly realize there are multiple solutions, which have been previously discussed and planned for, to resolve obstacles or solve problems. Entrepreneurs are positive and self-confident in their

approach to life and business or ministry.

This attribute is easy for Unity people --right?

☐ Maintain a realistic perspective.

Being a realistic dreamer may sound like an oxymoron. Without the dreamers of the world many businesses and ideas would never have happened. Think for a moment about Myrtle and Charles Fillmore and what they have created from their beliefs, dreams, and visions. When we add a bit of realism to our goals and aspirations we are more likely to win more often than we lose and set realistic goals and timelines.

□ Communicate your ideas with commitment and enthusiasm.

Belief in oneself and one's ideas or vision is a key to successful communication. This is true at all stages of the development of an entrepreneurial endeavor. Knowing those you want to attract as "customers" or congregants or board members, having researched their needs and structuring your presentation, programs, or services to meet those needs is the key to success.

Learn to accept risks as part of achieving your goals.

The decision to become an entrepreneur involves risk --often big risks. Part of knowing yourself is to understand your level of tolerance for risk. At the various stages of our lives we have different levels of tolerance. Acknowledging failures-and there will be failures--as learning opportunities for future successes is an important truth and lesson to be learned. The survival rate for entrepreneurs increases with the number of years they stay in business. The first year about 90 percent of small businesses do not survive.

Learning how to anticipate some of the risks involved will help you in managing these important, high risk, early years.

☐ Persistence, perseverance, and focusing on your business.

This quality or attribute means holding a steady course for a period of time and not giving up on your idea or belief for a successful business or ministry. For many business endeavors it will take five years to become profitable. And yes, it is okay to have excess revenues in a ministry--the sooner the better. The need for good planning with realistic goals allows the entrepreneur to find workable solutions to challenges and to stay focused. All too frequently I have seen the solution to a problem in a ministry become THE problem. Persistence means trying numerous solutions until you find the one that works.

☐ Make a decision, plan, evaluate, and then--just do it--start the business.

While being a visionary is one important attribute, being a doer is critical to successful entrepreneurship. Just say yes --make a decision based upon good information and move ahead.

The journey will be exciting, rewarding, challenging, frustrating, and has the potential of impacting the lives of hundreds of people who come seeking your product--the Unity message.

I welcome your thoughts and ideas of entrepreneurship and ministry. Many of you have been very successful, have met the challenges, and succeeded. Ye shall know the Truth and the Truth shall set you free.

In this special HH celebrating significant awards presented this year, the recipients have all demonstrated a powerful exploration of Truth and have worked tirelessly on its behalf. Our Association of Unity Churches' Annual Conference is always a special time to honor those who have made great achievements in not only our Unity movement, but toward the betterment of all humankind. In May your Association's Executive Director, Glenn Mosley, attended and participated in the presentations of the Templeton Prize for Progress in Religion in Great Britain. When I saw the great pictures Glenn took of his trip, I asked if he would share his experiences with our HH readers. The following is my interview with him.

NS: Glenn, how did you become involved in the Templeton Prize for Progress in Religion selection and awards process?

GM: As you know, Nancy, Sir John Templeton is a great benefactor and supporter for our Association of Unity Churches and our Unity movement. In 1991, Sir John asked me to serve as a judge for the prize. This was my last year as a judge and I was honored to be on hand to welcome Lady Baroness Margaret Thatcher as an incoming judge.

NS: Could you elaborate for our readers the origination and purpose of the Templeton Prize?

GM: Sir John established the prize in 1972. He

created the prize to reward innovative religious thinkers because he wanted people to think of religion as dynamic and progressive, in the same way that you normally think of medicine and the sciences. Those considered for the prize must have done something original in any type of religion, something spiritual in nature--not humanitarian. Sir John supports many humanitarian efforts, but he wanted this prize to be reserved for those who have made breakthroughs in spiritual matters, to encourage others to study religion.

NS: I understand the prize exceeds the value of that presented to Nobel Prize laureates.

GM: Yes, it does. Sir John maintains that religious inquiry is at least as important as the study of any of the arts and sciences.

NS: Tell us about this year's winner.

GM: Michael Novak, who has devoted the past thirty years to the study of the impact of economics on religion, and vice-versa, was this year's winner. He has written over a half-dozen

Annual Awards

Each year at our Association's annual Conference special awards are made to some very special people. The following awards were presented this year.

The Charles and Myrtle Fillmore Awards were established to honor Unity ministers for their special contributions toward the work of Charles and Myrtle Fillmore.

For the Charles Fillmore Award a recipient must demonstrate dynamic leadership, have pioneered innovative programs and/or ministries, made achievements indicative of a visionary consciousness, and have published books, poetry, music, articles, or monographs of a spiritually uplifting nature, consistent with Unity's viewpoint. This year's award was presented to Amalie H. Frank, Unity minister from Washington, D.C. She has served ministries in Michigan, Indiana, and Maryland, this is especially noteworthy since she was ordained in 1976 at the young age of 65, after retiring from twenty years of teaching.

books and a myriad of pamphlets which have been published in many languages. Universities and various religious organizations have used his research in their own programs and studies. Michael studied as a priest, then became an economist, which led him to his great interest in the subject.

NS: Can you describe the presentation and ceremonies?

GM: The actual presentation of the prize was given in a private ceremony at Buckingham Palace by Prince Philip, husband of Queen Elizabeth of England. There was a reception for Michael on the same evening after the private ceremony at Cambridge Oxford University Club where dignitaries from both Eastern and Western hemispheres attended.

The next day there was a public ceremony at Westminster Abbey in London where hundreds were in attendance from both continents, representing government and various religious movements. Among those in the audience was Robert Schuller.

NS: How exciting! Did you have an opportunity to talk with Prince Philip or Lady Baroness Thatcher?

GM: I met and had an opportunity to talk with Prince Philip at the palace and I met and talked at some length with Lady Baroness Thatcher. When I talked with the Prince he asked me what I did and I told him I was a minister and was in administration. He asked me of what denomination. When I told him Unity, he asked me to talk about it a little bit and I did. I told him there were Unity ministries and study groups throughout Great Britain and specifically in England. He said, "Yes, I believe there is one here in central London somewhere close." And as a matter of fact, the Unity ministry under Ralph Seelig's leadership is actually on Buckingham Palace road, so he was familiar with the fact that there was a Unity ministry close by. I also told him that there was a ministry in South London and that there was a comprehensive prayer and publishing ministry in Maidenhead as well.

NS: What was the Prince like?

GM: The prince is a rather tall and stately man, charming, warm, very personable. He came around and not only shook hands with those in the private party of about a dozen, but spent some considerable time talking with each one of us. He made a couple of humorous observations which were in fact very amusing; he truly is an approachable person.

NS: What about Lady Baroness Thatcher?

GM: I had an opportunity, the day of the public ceremonies, to meet Lady Baroness Thatcher at Westminster and spend some time with her in the

Jerusalem Room, which is the "ready room" at Westminster Abbey. She, too, is really warm and personable. As a matter of fact, common protocol says that you do not offer to shake hands with royalty or people of State unless they offer to shake hands with you first. In both cases with Prince Philip and Lady Baroness, they did in fact offer their hands and, unlike my common practice of hugging strangers, I did again what protocol would dictate, and that was to give them full arms length. However, Lady Baroness didn't accept that. She took my hand and very firmly pulled me right up to her so that we were talking face to face for several minutes--only twelve inches or so apart! I was very pleasantly surprised because I had thought maybe she might not even shake hands, but in fact when she

pulled me to her she put her free hand on my arm. I observed her doing the same with several other persons in the room that she met that evening. It clearly is her practice.

NS: How did the Lady Baroness strike you in her current position as former Prime Minister?

GM: She is an extremely articulate woman, still very involved in affairs of State in England. She promises to still be an influential figure in the elections that will be taking place this year and next. During the week I was in London, current Prime Minister John Majors' party suffered serious losses at the election polls. His



own future is uncertain and while it seems unlikely
Lady Baroness will re-enter the picture for the position of Prime
Minister, she will surely be involved in the ultimate selection of whoever does
take the office.

NS: What a wonderful opportunity to have served as a judge for the Templeton Prize for Progress in Religion and to be present on this wonderful occasion. To change the subject, were you able to visit with our Unity ministries in Great Britain?

GM: While in London I spoke at the Sunday afternoon service at Unity in central London where Ralph Seelig is the minister. I had dinner with Ralph and his wife, Majorie that evening. Then on Monday I attended, and spoke to, a group of worshipers at Unity in South London where Harry Kudiabor is minister. I was treated to a wonderful potluck luncheon afterwards.

NS: I understand Harry's ministry is somewhat unique?

GM: Yes, I spent several hours after the luncheon talking with Harry about the type of work he is doing. His ministry is involved in caring for the aged, caring for deprived youth, as well as teaching the Truth message to people in general.

NS: Did you connect with any other Unity ministries?

GM: I talked with co-ministers of the Maidenhead, England, ministry, David and Doreen Davenport, by telephone. They had been on a long weekend retreat in the north of England from the time I arrived until I became involved in the Templeton activities. Therefore, I did not meet with them, but did spend considerable time discussing the development of the work in England as well as in Edinburgh, Scotland, and now the beginning phases of a ministry in Dublin, Ireland. And I visited Edinburgh and Dublin.

NS: Thank you for sharing this once-in-a-lifetime experience with our readers, Glenn.

GM: Thank you, it was my pleasure, Nancy.

The Myrtle Fillmore Award is presented to a minister who has demonstrated service through a consciousness of prayer, ministered in supporting roles such as counseling, prayer ministry, and non-Sunday oriented programs, exhibited a presence of love for and affirmation of the idea of the Christ, and demonstrated peaceful acceptance of self and others and resolution through prayer. The Myrtle Fillmore Award was presented to Richard D. Billings, minister of Oak Park, Illinois, for twenty-seven years. Ordained in 1966, Richard has served ministries in Detroit and Lansing, Michigan; and Toledo, Ohio. His thrust in the Unity movement is based on prayer and healing principles, and he is the author of the book, My Soul Remembers.

The Light of God Expressing Award, also given at the annual conference, is awarded to individuals who have made significant contributions toward the betterment of humankind. This year's recipients are Dorothy Pierson, Marcus Bach, and the Dalai Lama.

Dorothy Pierson is co-minister with her husband, Phillip, of Christ Unity Church in Sacramento, California. For over fifty years, she has given her life to sharing the Unity message and has touched countless lives. Her greatest work has been her writings and poetry, but she is also noted for her strong dynamic teaching, dedication, and leadership.

Marcus Bach, founder and director of the Fellowship For Spiritual Understanding, has devoted a lifetime of research and study to intercultural relations and world religions and is considered an authority on these topics. He has written 29 books and is an artist with words and a delightful storyteller.

His Holiness the XIV Dalai Lama, Tenzin Gyatso, is the spiritual leader of the Tibetan people and a leading proponent of human rights and world peace. His continuous efforts for peaceful negotiations and reconciliation have him recognition brought awards from many countries. In 1989 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his constructive and innovative proposals for solutions of international conflicts, human rights, and global environmental problems.

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

created and completed our exciting project--Unity's first Spanish radio messages! The pictures on page 9 tell the story better than words.

The first recording session was May 24, and Diana Mayo, Radio/Media Assistant, and I accompanied all our guests to Chapman Recording Studio. Dr. Oniel Cavanos V., spiritual leader of Unidad en Cristo in Cahuilia, Mexico, who produces radio and Spanish messages in Mexico, contributed his wonderful voice for the PSA's and the "You Can Make A Difference" spots. His wife, Socorro, and Elda. Marisa's mother, recorded the "Grandma" PSA and the "Mom" PSA.

On June 10, the voices of the "boy" and the "coach" were added and all the PSA's were completed. Both the PSA's and spots were introduced during the People's Convention in Alexandria, Virginia, this past June.

I want to add a special thank you to all the talented people in Mexico and the Kansas City area who contributed to these Spanish-speaking messages of Truth.

Over 340 radio stations in the United States are now broadcasting in Spanish, offering a new opportunity for Unity broadcasting and outreach. In an article from the April 11 issue of Broadcasting & Cable, it was stated, "Recognizing the growing importance of Spanish-language radio, the Southern California Broadcasters Association has joined with radio producers. . . to produce spots in Spanish ... the stations began running the Spanish-language spots last month." Spiritual Stimulation of the Brain in Infants

An infant is born with twice as many brain cells as an adult, but by age three, the brain starts eliminating unstimulated brain cells.

Infants have always fascinated me. Looking into their bright shiny eyes, I always wonder just what is going on in those tiny little heads of theirs. Scientists have known for decades that environment affects behavior, but only in recent years have they started to understand that the infant's brain is literally shaped by experience. We are also aware that human beings have memory from at least the first day of life (perhaps even while still in the womb), and that by as early as 20 months old, we have developed

a concept of what the world is all about and how we fit into it. My work with infants and toddlers leads me to believe studies that show how profoundly human beings are affected by their environment, but even I was surprised recently at the extent a human being is affected by very early exposure to proper stimuli.

In April I had the blessing of being able to spend the first week of my grandson's life with him in Houston. In only a week's time, I watched him go from a condition of appearing to be oblivious to the world around him at 22 hours old, to picking out his favorite song at three days old, to watching black and white objects at six days old. (Don't laugh at the "favorite song" bit. I'm not just a proud grandma; he really did stop whatever he was doing, including fussing, whenever I sang that particular song!)

While I was there, I read an article from the Wall Street Jour-

nal about research on early childhood development that talked about the profundity of environment on infants. The first sentence read, "New research on brain development suggests that any attempt to maximize intellectual growth must begin during the first three years of life."

The article went on to say that when an infant is born, it has billions of brain cells which, surprisingly, is twice as many as an adult has. During the first few months of life, connectors, or synapses, are formed between brain cells. These synapses are the structures that allow learning to occur. However, before these synapses can be used by the developing brain to process and analyze an experience, the synapses must be activated by actually having an experience. In other words, the more stimulus the infant receives by exposure to various sights, sounds, tastes, smells, and touch, the more synapses are activated to form neural pathways. These neural pathways can then be used for present and future learning.

For instance, based on this same body of research, the Robert Muller School in Arlington, Texas, created an infant program called *Balanced Beginnings* that, among other things, exposes infants to foreign language tapes on a daily basis. As the infants listen to the tapes, the brain is forming neural pathways that will facilitate learning that language when the child is older. Research indicates that the first *six months* of life is when a baby must

hear a foreign language if it is ever to speak the language without an accent.

The most significant part of the Wall Street Journal article was that it explained that researchers have discovered that by age three, the human brain is already in a process of maximizing its functioning efficiency by going through and eliminating "excess" cells and synapses; excess cells being those that have not been activated by exposure to stimulation. In other words, by age three, the ease of our learning capacity is already being set! Imagine, through lack of stimulation, an average adult winds up with only half the brain cells they were born with! I was astounded. I had no idea that as early as three years old, the brain would actually start eliminating cells that had not been stimulated.

The article stated that negative experiences can have lasting effects because they can actually

alter the organization of the brain. It said that studies have indicated that children as young as 18 months old have displayed cognitive deficits that may be irreversible due to negative experiences. The article cited other statistics and said the amount of evidence has persuaded Democratic Sen. Edward Kennedy to seek to expand the Head Start program to include children from infancy to age three (currently the age is three to five.)

This started me thinking; does this activation of neural pathways just apply to intellectual pursuits, or are other experiences included too? If other experiences are enhanced and internalized the same way, perhaps we should reevaluate our inclination to wait until we think children are "old enough" before we share our spiritual practices with them. How many times have we experienced a powerful meditation when we could actually feel the Spirit moving in the room? Yet how many times do we have our infants and toddlers present during our devotional time? If we are actually feeling these experiences, isn't it possible that our infants and toddlers would also feel them and perhaps be exposed to those sights, sounds and sensations that could create neural pathways to make spiritual experiences an instinctive part of their entire lives? Perhaps when these infants became adults, they would not have to struggle so hard to quiet their minds during meditation. Even better, perhaps the lives of these infants would be a living meditation; a life where they were constantly aware of the presence of God.

After I finished reading this article, I found I had the pleasure of having my six-day-old grandson to myself for

the evening while his parents went out to a movie. The thought of exposing infants to spiritual stimulation was still on my mind as I fed the baby and looked forward to my own nightly meditation. I often indulge myself in a moving meditation while chanting a mantra; that felt right for that night. With the baby fed and dry, I cradled him in my arms and let myself move into a space of peace as I began to vocalize those tones that create a resonance within me. At home, this spiritual practice often prompts my cat to break into a reverberating purr that can be heard all over the room. From the contented appearance on my grandson's face that night, I believe he would have been purring if he were a cat.

Did I truly "connect" with my grandson on a spiritual level that night? Were neural pathways really activated in his brain from that experience? Or did an overzealous grandmother just have a contented and "purring" grandson? I truthfully don't know, but from the research that is coming to light, I think those possibilities should be considered and explored. If this research has prompted a United States Senator to propose changes in the way infants and toddlers are being dealt with, perhaps we, as a spiritual community, need to reevaluated the benefits to humanity of allowing our infants and toddlers to be present during our devotion time. Why wait until a child's brain is already molded and set before we start exposing him/ her to the beauty of connecting with God. What a powerful gift that could be to our children. What a generation of spiritual giants we could help bring to this realm. What a gift to ourselves.

You will also have an opportunity to experience different cultures, visiting the present as well as the ancient mystical places such as Machu Picchu in Peru. Many are drawn to this place and there will be meditation and prayer time set aside each day to attune to our Oneness with Spirit in these sacred places. Truly this will be an adventure of healing and discovery.

THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Norman Vincent Peale once told a story about the time when he was to be the keynote speaker at a conference of 5,000 people. He had to travel all night to get there, and as he arrived at the hotel the next day, he was nervous, stressed out and tired, and as the day progressed his throat was getting tighter and tighter. By the middle of the afternoon he could hardly whisper, so he phoned the hotel doctor and said: "Would you please bring some medicine so you can spray my vocal chords. I'm suppose to speak for 5,000 people tonight and I'm afraid I won't be able even to whisper." The doctor arrived at Peale's room, sprayed his throat and gave him some medicine. Peale then told the doctor that he'd been thinking about his vocal chords all day. They just kept getting tighter and tighter, and he was nervous about speaking to the crowd of 5.000 people that evening. The doctor said, "Well I have another prescription-the one that will really make you well." "Well why didn't you give me that one first?" Peale asked, to which the doctor replied, "I didn't think I had to give it to you," "What do you mean?" Peale asked. And the physician answered, "Well, you're the one who taught me about the power of positive thinking. It's about taking your mind off your vocal chords and putting it on God." Peale said that the doctor's words were as if a bolt of lightening had hit him. He had spent the whole day focusing on the problem, thinking about what might happen if he couldn't speak, and wondering if he would be able to whisper loud enough. And the answer was, as he had written and taught, to take his mind off the problem and put it on God.

The prescription that always works for anything that we face, is to take our mind off the problem and put it on God or the highest good for all concerned. In your personal life and mine, in our churches/ centers/ministries, in our Unity movement, our Association, in all of life's expressions, the way out of limitation is to move into the mind space of possibility. Or, let's not get stuck in or spend time fixing or amending something that isn't working. Instead, let's dare to follow Stenhen Covey's suggestion--dare to climb the highest tree (putting our mind on God/the answer/possibility) so that we can get a clear vision of what is possible for us. Then we can move through the jungle of our momentary confusion headed toward our good.

During the June Conference business meetings, the Board of Trustees spoke of their commitment to "climb the highest tree" to get a clear vision of how to fulfill our Association's purpose which is to serve the needs of the member ministries. So it is that during each regional conference Barbara O'Hearne, Church Management Consultant for our Association, will be asking these four questions:

- 1. How can our Association better serve you and your ministry?
- 2. What does our Association need to
- 3. How can our Association best use our time and money?
- 4. How do we, as a service organization want/need to do business?

For us to individually and collectively answer these questions instead of critiquing how we are, is to use one of our basic teachings as our prescription for healing. See POSITIVE on page 3, col. 3

The 21st Century Is Now

If you listen to predictions of "doom sayers" about the economy of the world or about freedom efforts of the world, you will most likely hear that this third millennium that is upon us will be the beginning of the end. And I agree.

We are closing an era so that we may begin a new experience. We're going to go back much more than we have heretofore to the old form of Christianity; to the one that Jesus taught and not the one that was taught about him. What he taught was so vitally alive and it is still alive now.

When Jesus came back from Caesarea Philippi before the crucifixion, he knew people had been talking about him. In fact they were "murmuring." Some were happy about him, some weren't. Some thought of him as a renegade and others were impressed positively, but there was no one who had not been impacted by his presence and by what he taught.

Jesus knew he was being talked about, and he wanted to know what people thought. So he asked the disciples, "Whom do men say that I am?" And Peter was the spokesman for the group: "Some say you're Elijah or Jeremiah, or John the Baptist, or one of the other prophets." Actually, Jesus wanted to know

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what the disciples themselves thought. So he asked, "Whom say ye that I am?" In a flash of inspiration Peter replied back, "You're the Christ, the Son of the living God." And Jesus said, "Flesh and blood has not revealed this to you." Nobody told you that. "But my Father who is in heaven revealed that truth to you."

Now what comes next has been mistranslated because of a misplaced comma in the King James version of the Bible. Most of us still know the King James version; the old message is that Jesus said, "And I say also unto thee That thou art Peter." Why would Jesus tell Peter that he was Peter?

What Jesus said was, "And I say unto you that you are, Peter; the Son of the living Christ. And upon this rock I build my church." If anyone in the world knew that Peter was not a rock nor stable, it was Jesus. There was nothing stable about Peter: he later denied Jesus just as Jesus had predicted that Peter would. Before the trial, crucifixion and resurrection Jesus said, "You're going to deny me three times before the cock crows in the morning." And Peter did.

Let us return to Peter as a "Christ." Jesus told him, "Flesh and blood didn't tell you that, but my Father who is in heaven, and I say unto you that you are, Peter, also the Christ, the son of the living God, and upon this rock [not Peter!] but the rock that you are the Christ, the son of the living God, the premise, the

tenet, the philosophy, the belief, that conviction that I have that you are the Christ, the son of the living God--it's upon that that I build my church."

This paraphrased thought is paramount. "Peter, you are the Christ, the son of the living God, and upon that rock I build everything that I teach." Nothing else. That's the gift we have inherited; the model that we have a chance to lay down in this next century for our children, grandchildren, and so forth. We have an opportunity and the responsibility to lay down a model of the conviction that each of us is the Christ and that each whom we meet is a Christ.

It is a time of thanksgiving and joy. June brought into reality the burning of our mortgage (or more accurately, a facsimile of our mortgage). To each of you who made this possible, a sincere and loving thank youis sent forth from all of us at our Association.

How did this dream of a debt-free building come into fulfillment? A review of steps taken and acknowledgment of the many individuals and ministries who were part of its expression feels in order. Thank you, co-creators of this wonderful space in which we are able to serve you!

The dream began, as most dreams do, long ago--back in the mid-1980's. A request for land to build our home was made to Unity School by our Board of Trust-

Unity School's positive response to that request gifted us with beautiful land adjacent to Unity Village. Thank you, Unity School, for planting that first seed so deeply in our hearts!

Creation of a Development Department and exploration of potential architectural designs opened this decade of the 90's. Thank you to the Templeton Foundation for its vision of the importance of this development work. Your belief in us is "teaching us to fish" and great good is expressing, the harvest of which will continue long into the future.

Two very active committees, our Capital Campaign Committee and our Architectural Review Committee, continued planting seeds for this new home. But little did we know how those seeds would grow. Thank you to those ministers who dared to say "Yes" to this opportunity to serve!

In January, 1991, it became clear to our Architectural Review Committee that a different direction was necessary. "Look at Resolution Trust properties," it recommended. An unexpected harvest of good revealed itself. Our two-story office building, only 3.2 miles from Unity Village, was available at less than one fifth of the cost required to build. A thank you to each of these committee members is definitely

Overwhelming enthusiasm from our Board of Trustees and field ministries opened the way for an offer on this property. But the down payment was yet to be attained. Many ministries and individuals had already given of their time and treasure prior to this building's discovery. Most of those funds had been used to create an architectural design and explore the feasibility of this project.

"Ask," our Way-Shower reminds us, "and ye shall receive." We asked. But the closing date on the property was arriving much more rapidly than the funds. One donor's response to our letter inviting support was, "How much do you need?" In my hesitancy to ask too much, I responded to this request with lots of "flowers" and few "facts."

Again the question was asked, "How much do you need?" This time I answered clearly and simply: \$150,000. Two days later the check arrived. Thank you, Catherine Ponder, for opening the way for us to take the giant step needed to move us into our new home!

In November, 1991, we moved into our headquarters! How wonderful it felt to be able to stretch out, to have walls rather than partitions. Financial support for this building increased. However, expenses also increased. The possibility of lowering or clearing the mortgage seemed remote. A sincere and loving thank you to each of you who supported this project during this time!

To Revoke or Not to Revoke, That is the Question

Just when you thought you might know the difference between a Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust and a Charitable Lead Trust comes the question, "Are these trusts revocable or not?" In this case the answer is "not." How does a donor decide whether to choose a revocable or irrevocable plan for their assets? Or, how do you as a minister or board member provide the correct information for your congregants?

First, you can't be expected to have all the technical knowledge about planned giving in your memory banks. But if you follow this column in CONTACT, request all available information from your Association, and seek out the professional planners in your congregation, I guarantee that you'll raise your comfort level about charitable gift planning.

They say that "a little knowledge is dangerous," so it is wise not to give advice or make decisions based simply on what you read in CONTACT. Offer your congregants information, enlighten them on your ministries needs, and then refer them to their CPA, bank trust officer, lawyer, or a reliable professional you trust. Your Association Development Department can help you with referrals concerning annuities and trusts.

Ah, but I do stray from our original question--To revoke or not to revoke? The

answer is fairly simple, keep the donor's needs at the forefront of the discussion and the answer will be provided.

Let's look at revocable options first. The most popular type of revocable plan is called a Revocable Living Trust. Its main purpose is to pass property or assets outside of the probate process. The beneficiary will generally receive assets much faster than by a will. The advantages to the donor are avoiding probate, retaining trusteeship or the ability to screen a trustee's effectiveness, and the ability to change the estate plan, establishing a flexible, convenient way of managing assets in the event of incapacity. A trust, unlike a will, is not a public document and it establishes a donor's privacy. There is no federal gift or tax deduction because the giver retains the power to revoke. However, the assets which are included in a federal estate tax at the donor's transition are offset by the passing of the assets to a charitable organization.

Revocable Living Trusts may be funded with securities such as, stocks, mutual funds, and bonds or cash accounts such as cash management accounts. A trust can be created with leases, mortgages, agreements, or land contracts. Real estate in the form of a residence, farm, or commercial property. However, titles to property must be signed over to the trustee and if real property is involved the trust may need to be recorded. This would negate the privacy of the trust agreement.

Other revocable plans are life insurance and annuities, retirement plans, wills, life estate agreements, and certificates of deposit either paid on death or in trust for.

The profile of congregants who prefer revocable plans are persons who are committed to your ministry, wish to retain control of their properties during their lifetimes, are also intent on avoiding probate. Most trusts are never revoked.

Irrevocable plans are a bit more complicated, but basically fall into three categories, charitable gift annuities, unitrusts and annuity trusts. Each of these make it possible to assist in family income needs for the life of the donor and/ or beneficiary, avoid capital gains, generate charitable income tax deductions,

allow favorable federal estate tax benefits, and preserve some income when all other assets have been used for health care and other expenses.

A charitable gift annuity is a gift a donor makes to a qualified charity in return for a contract or agreement to pay the donor and/or another annuitant an annual fixed amount for life. The rate of return is determined by The Committee on Gift Annuities which meets tri-annually to determine the rates so that at least 50 percent of the gift returns to the charity. The charitable deduction is determined from actuarial tables based upon the age(s) of the annuitant(s), the number of annuitants, and the CMFR (Charitable Midterm Federal Rate). A portion of the annuity is computer to be a taxexcluded return of principal. The annuity may be funded with appreciated property and may be deferred until at least one year after the annuity gift was made, this is an immediate annuity. A deferred payment gift annuity will allow a gift to be made now but payments are deferred to a later date and are paid for life.

A Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust provides for a donor to transfer property to a trustee subject to his or her right to receive a fixed percentage for as long as he or she lives. Whatever remains in the trust at the donor's transition becomes the property of the beneficiary institution. The Charitable Remainder Unitrust is similar except the income is a percentage of the fair market value of the property transferred which is determined annually.

The Charitable Lead or Income Trust is the reverse or mirror image of the charitable remainder trust. The qualified charity receives the income interest of the property transferred to the trust and non-charitable beneficiaries (including the donor) receive the remaining principal after the specified period of time. The Charitable Lead Trust is generally used to exclude income from the donor's taxable income and/or to pass property to one's heirs at the least possible transfer tax cost. There are two forms, the charitable lead annuity trust and unitrust.

An important the question that is often raised by board of trustee members of a Unity church or a steering committee of an expansion group is what can be done to stimulate and bring forth church growth. In the book of Ephesians, chapter 3 verses 20 & 21, we read: "Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, to him be glory in the church." Then, too, Robert Logan in his book, Beyond Church Growth, states: "If we take seriously the message of Ephesians 3 here's the exciting news: our cup can never be too large to contain the blessing that God is able to pour upon us. The promise is that God is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine."

One way to enhance and help to stimulate and implement church growth is stable, harmonious teamwork and leadership by the board of trustees and minister, and I gladly share with you some ideas to contemplate and to use to encourage stable and harmonious ministerial/board team leadership. (Although these ideas are not new, a reminder to practice them can always be helpful.)

1. Prayer is the foundation of our Unity movement.

As you pray with your minister and board of trustees, see them surrounded in the love and light of Spirit; see them being willing, receptive instruments through which Spirit works as a support to congregants; see them holding a vision of growth and expansion that will inspire everyone seeking this good for their ministry.

We shape our tomorrow today. By supporting the minister and the board of trustees with faith, by having an expectation of good for the future; and by being forward looking in our thinking, we shape the future of our church now.

2. Respect is a vital part of teamwork.

Respect and honor your minister and his/her wisdom; remembering the minister is a trained professional. Respect and honor your board of trustee members and their expertise. Such respect does not necessarily mean that you have to agree with the minister/board all the time, but you can always have a respectful attitude toward the minister's leadership ability as well as the board's, and in turn you, your wisdom, your ideas, and your own involvement will be honored and respected.

3. Encourage your minister to take personal time.

Encourage your minister to take personal time for renewal, for vitality and good health, for family needs, for fun. A minister can best lead and build a healthy consciousness of ministry if his/her own health and vitality are maintained.

4. Demonstrate love for your minister.

Demonstrate love and express appreciation for the many ways a minister serves the congregation. Love shared is certain to be love returned. The minister will quickly recognize and appreciate the loving environment established by the board of trustees and the congregation. In turn a loved minister will surely love, care for, support the church and all involved through difficult times as well as through joyous times. The minister who feels loved and appreciated will go the extra mile to nurture and love the congregation and thus keep the people interested in being a happy, growing church community.

5. Make a commitment.

Make a strong and firm commitment

to your own indwelling Christ and be willing to faithfully and consistently share your own spiritual gifts. A healthy, thriving, growing ministry requires involvement by congregants. A balanced, wellfunctioning ministry can be compared to a three-legged stool that stands strong and balanced, and yet, if one leg is missing the stool does not function according to its purpose. The three legs of a ministry include the minister, the board of trustees, and the membership, with the minister serving as the team captain. As all work together beholding the Christ within everyone, a dynamic growing ministry evolves.

6. Communication.

Open, honest communication from the minister to the board of trustees and congregation, and from the board of trustees and the congregation to the minister is essential. Share with one another in open dialogue any and all frustrations and disagreements on issues as well as victories, joys, and spiritual growth.

A vital, healthy growing ministry will continue to unfold as each one--minister and congregant and board of trustee member--looks to the indwelling spirit of Christ for guidance and direction. Pray to be a greater spiritual light to all who search for a better life through honoring the Truth about themselves as loved children of God.

Meeting Management for Teams

In my work with ministers, board of trustee members, and lay leaders around the country the subject of productive meetings is frequently discussed. This topic includes board of trustee meetings, committee meetings, and task force meetings. People are quick to share their frustrations and concerns about the amount of time spent in meetings when measured against the amount of work accomplished.

Meetings are a fact of life. We all spend time in meetings whether it is in our business, professional, civic, volunteer, or church "lives." I believe these meetings can be interesting, productive, and rewarding if a few simple guidelines are studied and implemented. If this idea appeals to you, read on. . .

Many of you are currently engaged in (or hopefully will soon be) planning for the future of your ministry. Because of this, I will use a strategic planning committee or team as my example of how to have productive meetings. In previous CONTACT articles I have written about board meetings, agendas, the role of the board president, and how to take meeting minutes. The reader is encouraged to review those articles in addition to the ideas and tools presented here.

To set the stage, let's make some as-

sumptions about our newly formed strategic planning team.

Assumption 1

There are eight team or committee members, each one carefully chosen because of his/her expertise and experience in key areas (which might include, ministry management, financial, organizational development, adult/youth education, human resources, strategic planning, fund development, PR/marketing, etc.). In addition, these members are good Unity students and are committed to the ministry--they tithe!

Assumption 2

The minister is a voting and active member of the team (as is the board president). In addition to providing the minister's perspective to the planning process she/he has the important task of ensuring that the spiritual needs of the team are continually met.

Assumption 3

The committee has a written mission statement that delineates what they are to do. Everyone on the team understands this statement and supports it.

Assumption 4

There is a strategic planning process the board of trustees has given to the team. This document includes tasks and time-lines that are reasonable and doable. The team has the authority to adjust the planning process as needed.

Assumption 5

The board of trustees is kept informed

of the planning team's progress each month. The congregation has the opportunity to have an input into the planning process.

The First Meeting

The initial team meeting is critical to the success of the project. This meeting sets the tone for all future meetings. The appointed team leader (or committee chairperson) is responsible for several tasks being completed during this first meeting. He/she must make sure everyone is introduced and has the opportunity to learn about the other team members--team building. He/she must fully explain the mission of the team and the planning process including the proposed time-line. He/she must facilitate the establishing of group norms or how the team will work together during the life of the project.

To assist a team leader I would suggest the following general guidelines be introduced and adopted during this first meeting and used throughout the planning project.

General Meeting Guidelines

The general meeting guidelines include: having an agenda, a good facilitator, taking of meeting minutes, planning for future meetings, and evaluating the meetings. These are common sense guidelines. Yet, all too often they are not followed and people become frustrated

and dissatisfied when working on projects such as strategic planning, or any committee for that matter.

1. Develop and use an agenda.

The team member needs to receive a meeting packet three to five days in advance of the meeting. Included in this packet are an agenda, the previous meeting minutes, and any data or information that will be discussed or used during the upcoming meeting.

An agenda might look like the one in Exhibit A on page 7.

Another tool I like to use when formulating the agenda for a meeting is called the "Rule of Thirds." It can easily be used for short or long meetings. It is illustrated in Exhibit B above.

As a general rule committee or team meetings of our ministries are held in the evening after people have completed their working day. On occasion some of these meetings are held on Saturday morning. The "easing-in" with prayer, check-in, and reading the mission statement (and sometimes a meal) are important in terms of leaving the day's activities behind and gearing up for a period of major discussion, decision-making, and productivity. Of equal importance, is the "easing out" or deceleration and coming together again in prayer. This helps the team leave the meeting on a positive note, especially if there has been intense discussion and/ or strong differences of opinion during the meeting.

2. A skilled facilitator

Ideally the chair of the committee or team leader serves as the facilitator for the planning project. Some ministries may choose to hire an outside planner/ facilitator to lead the effort. The facilitator's job is to keep the discussion focused on the topic and within the time frame. She/he makes sure the team ground rules for working together are honored, such as attendance, one person at a time speaking, attacking the issues instead of people, etc. She/he must bring the meeting together at the end with a summary of what has taken place, planning the agenda for the next meeting, and facilitating an evaluation by the team.

3. A scribe for meeting minutes.

Without question productive meetings keep minutes. This job can be rotated among the team members. I once served on a board that rotated the taking of meeting minutes much to the delight of the board secretary. The designated scribe or minute taker was the last person to walk into the board meeting who constituted the quorum. Would you believe many board members arrived early for board meetings just to be sure they did not have to take minutes!

A short cut for minute taking is to print a copy of the agenda with additional blank space provided under each topic. During the meeting the main points raised, decisions made, tasks and responsibilities assumed are listed by name and completion date and are filled in under the appropriate section or topics on the agenda.

4. Prepare for the next meeting.

You will notice in Exhibit B that time is designated for drafting the agenda for the next meeting. By doing so each team member has an opportunity to input into the items and topics to be discussed at the next meeting.

The future agenda also includes the date, time, and location of the next meeting.

5. Evaluation of the meeting.

A useful tool that comes out of the quality movement is meeting evaluation. During the "easing out" phase the facilitator can ask the team members what has worked and what needs to be changed for the next meeting. He/she can write this on a flip chart or simply record the information in his/her notes for future referencing. This information is also included in the meeting minutes. The feedback provided by the team is studied and implemented as appropriate.


A process that I particularly like is to check with the team members or participants after each break to get feedback on how the process is working for them. This allows for immediate midcourse corrections as opposed to waiting for the evaluation to take place at the end of the meeting.

I believe that participating as a team or committee member should provide learning experiences that transfer to other parts of one's personal and/or professional life.

I encourage you as board members, team members, or committee members to think about these simple guidelines and implement them in your own ministry. They have withstood the test of time-meaning they work!

Let's Correspond!

Webster defines *correspond* as: "To communicate by letter, usually over a period of time." *Correspond* can also mean "to be in agreement and harmony, or to be similar or parallel in character."

I would like to correspond with you. The written word invites a closer look, a time for the reader to slow down and savor the ideas and thoughts of the writer. When I write for CONTACT, I write about my thoughts and ideas and my experiences and visions. When you read my words, you may feel like you know me, as though we are actually talking. You can learn a lot about a person by what he/she writes and by the words chosen. CONTACT is a type of one-way personal letter to you, one you can read at your own pace, or keep and reread if you wish.

How is correspondence different from a conversation? Daily, I have conversations (defined as an informal spoken exchange of thoughts and feelings). I talk face-to-face and by telephone. I have brief or long discussions, sometimes a blending of ideas and sometimes a discussion of differences. Conversations, especially by telephone, are an important part of my responsibilities as Radio/Media Coordinator. Several times during the year, I am able to meet the people behind the voices at meetings, retreats, during CEP classes and conventions. At the People's Conven-

"LALCHHUNGKUA," a congregation which consists of approximately 5,000 members."LALCHHUNGKUA" originated in 1979 when Thangluaia and others began to believe differently from their mainstream Christian brothers and sisters. As Thangluaia puts it, "We received a good teaching." When asked from where they received it, he says simply, "From God." Thangluaia and the others were expelled from their churches and decided to unite. His group hoped they were not the only ones in the world who believed this new way. In a search for those of like mind, Unity was discovered.

Dick Kumlaki has sacrificed much to become a Unity minister. To attend school, Dick quit his job as a newspaper editor and left his wife and daughter behind in Malawi. His government refused a Visa to the United States but did allow him to travel to the Unity Ministerial Training School in Nigeria. Dick is entering his final year, but times are hard. Without the regular financial support of Dick's job it has been very difficult for his family to survive. Unless we are able to increase our level of support, Dick may be forced to leave ministerial school.

Caring people are STARlight team members who make a difference in whether the people of Malawi and India hear our Unity message of Truth. STARlight is committed to the graduation of our first two international ministers in 1995. You can be part of the community which will make Thangluaia's and Dick's dream a reality.



The profile of congregants who see an advantage in irrevocable plans are also committed to your ministry. These individuals itemize deductions on their tax returns, have appreciated assets and wish to avoid capital gains tax.

Donors should look at plans according to their needs. The following plans are categorized according to the needs they fulfill:

Pay a fixed income:

revocable living trusts
life insurance and annuities
wills
retirement plans
life estate agreements
gift annuities
charitable remainder annuity trusts

Pay a flexible income:

revocable living trusts
life insurance
retirement plans
life estate agreements
charitable remainder unitrusts
pooled income funds

Plans that avoid capital gains tax:

wills
retirement plans
life insurance and annuities
life estate agreements
pooled income funds
charitable remainder annuity trusts
charitable remainder unitrusts

Plans that provide income tax deduc-

charitable remainder annuity trusts

charitable remainder unitrusts gift annuities life estate agreements life insurance premiums pooled income funds outright gifts

How to select the plan:

If a person doesn't have enough assets to give irrevocably use a will, life insurance, retirement plans, revocable living trust, totten trust, certificates of deposit.

If assets are appreciated, use a charitable remainder annuity trust, chari-

table remainder unitrust, pooled income fund, life estate agreement.

If funding with cash, use a gift annuity, charitable remainder annuity trust, charitable remainder unitrust, life estate agreement, revocable living trust.

If this information seems a bit overwhelming, don't worry, it is. It is intended to be a reference guide for you in the future (hopefully the near future). Now when a congregant calls upon you for guidance in the planned giving area you will have a frame of reference to guide them in that ultimate question--"to revoke or not to revoke?"

Women and Alcohol

- ◆ More than 60% of all American women drink alcohol.
- ◆ An estimated one-third to one-half of all American alcoholics are women.
- Several studies show that women are prescribed psychoactive (mood-altering) drugs more often than men, and women alcoholics appear to be at special risk for dual or multi-drug use and addiction.
- ◆ A recent Alcoholics Anonymous survey indicated 40% of female members were dually addicted to alcohol and other drugs, compared with 27% of male members.
- Because of different body structures (more fat, less body fluids), women show a higher Blood Alcohol Concentration than men of the same weight for the same amount of alcohol.
- Women alcoholics in treatment tend to require more initial recovery time than do men.
- Substances (drugs, alcohol, or nicotine) in the blood stream of an expectant mother will cross over in the same proportions into the blood stream of the fetus.
- Women remain with drinking husbands nine times as often as do husbands of drinking women.
- Studies on alcohol-related liver disease show that, compared to men, women alcoholics risk developing liver disease at an earlier age, after a shorter period of drinking, and presumably from a lower level of alcohol consumption.
- White women are more likely to drink than are black or Hispanic women. However, the drinkers from these three races are equally susceptible to drinking problems.
- Medications for birth control, estrogen, and other hormones tend to delay recovery from alcohol intoxication.
- Investigators have found a relationship between alcoholism and a high incidence of various gynecological/obstetrical problems, such as infertility, miscarriages, and hysterectomies.
- Daughters of alcoholic mothers may inherit a tendency toward alcoholism. Researchers have not established the same link between daughters and alcoholic fathers.
- ◆ Alcoholic women report that they are more likely to enter treatment programs that provide child care and counseling, support groups, therapy for battered women and incest victims, treatment for prescription drug addiction, job counseling, and medical and nutritional counseling for pregnant women. Women often cite the lack of these services as a reason for not entering treatment or for early termination of treatment.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Of Church Sizes and Salaries

"Act Your Size!," a monograph by Lyle Schaller in *The Clergy Journal* of a few years ago opens with a church council member protesting. He felt that his church was too small to accomplish the proposal just made by his minister. "That might be all right for the big churches, but we're not a big church."

Sometimes clergy, sometimes lay leaders, volunteers, and congregants assume a similar posture. They seem unaware of protestant worship attendance figures or even figures within their respective denominations. They often not only underestimate their relative size, but more importantly, their potential as collective change agents in their community. They may also underestimate their spirit-guided mission; i.e., that guidance of the Holy Spirit that placed them in the church business originally.

A Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, which has average worship attendance of 255 is in the top 20% of its denomination; a church of the Nazarene is in its top 20% with 120.

Available figures from Unity ministries reporting average worship attendance puts the top 20% congregation at 139. As a whole, the average worship attendance for American Protestantism is 159

Many of us have witnessed personally

and/or vicariously in the work of a colleague, the powerful impact a spirit-guided, God-centered, committed ministry with 159 people can have.

Whatever the numerical size of a congregation, in order to impact a community, its denomination, or itself, it must be God-inspired and committed to principle.

An essential tool in making a difference in following Spirit is the creation of an effective organization which utilizes the energy, time, and talents of as many committed people as are available.

It is also necessary to objectify the spiritual principles a group lives by insofar as possible so that what has already been accomplished truly is a launching pad for future development in terms of spiritual, financial, numerical, etc., growth. This takes leadership.

Although most churches acknowledge the need for ministerial leadership, there is a great variety of feelings about the church's responsibility to provide for them. Secular business practices of contracting with, and releasing professionals is much too prevalent in churches today. The practice is both painful and embarrassing to staff and congregation, and it also gives a negative image of the church and damages its ministry in the community.

Support and care of church staff should be in an atmosphere of love expressed in the greatest possible way. One of the biblical dictums supporting church staff members receiving an adequate salary was written by the Apostle Paul: Those officers of the church who fill their office well should be considered as deserving twice the salary they get, particularly those who labor in preaching and teaching. (I Timothy 5:17).

When a group is a church which needs not only to acquire but to maintain a professional staff of one or more ministers, they often need to reassess what they can/need to do in terms of salary.

Factors in determining cash compensation include: 1) Regional as well as national economic conditions; 2) Cost of living (inflation factors annually); 3) Budget and giving potential (may or may not be tied to congregation size); 4) Leadership responsibility; 5) Education and

experience; 6) Comparison with other professionals, and 7) Recognition of meritorious service.

While getting accurate financial information is not necessarily easy where churches are concerned, periodically we survey; we have attempted here to provide statistics, and details out of which those statistics come. The following numbers are based on Unity churches only, where sufficient response from Unity ministries allows for statistical analysis, and otherwise from Unity and non-Unity congregations of similar sizes in attendance, income, and locality.

More than half of our Unity ministries and many of the satellite ministries pay some of the various benefits. It needs to be the goal of each ministry to provide its minister(s) retirement fund contributions and health insurance, (incidentally, your Association has a health insurance plan and a very good retirement program) as well as earmarking a portion of the cash salary as "manse allowance." Numerous ministries provide a Social Security allowance (since for purposes of Social Security only, a minister is self-employed and pays his/her own taxes); ministries also need to provide regional and national conference/convention expenses and continuing education expenses, even though neither of these is considered part of the salary & benefits "package."

While a salary & benefits "package" is customary, it is important that cash salary be sufficient for the minister (and family) to live well. Rabbis are often paid in the range of the top 20% of the income of their Temple's members. (Example: Members' average income is \$150,000; Rabbi's range is \$135,000 to \$165,000. (Range is 10% above and 10% below the average.)

Now, breathe! Let's look at some purely Unity church figures to begin.

Thirty of the largest Unity ministries with 500 to 2800 in attendance: of salaries known among those 30 churches, 14 churches pay 19 ministers an average \$89,952 cash plus benefits (budgets between \$500,001 and \$1.7 million; 5 churches pay 2 ministers approximately the \$89,000+ average).

Crossing the Wilderness Takes Courage

Our faith in the work before us, both in our Association and in your ministry, is absolute. We step boldly forth, aligned with the courage of Spirit, to do that which is before us to do.

This work before us requires courage, doesn't it? When it comes to reaching out and enrolling congregants in the financial support vital to the fulfillment of the ministry's vision, such quality of courage is even more important.

COURAGE provides a seven step guide to success as we anchor congregants in partnership with the expression of our vision.

Cultivation is critical when seeking donor support. Just as seeds must be planted before the harvest can be gleaned, so must we build friendships and bond with potential visionaries who can make a real difference in the growth of the ministry.

Opportunity opens the door that allows us to share the vision before us. Timing is critical in almost everything we do. This is especially true when seeking donor support for major projects.

United vision will blend the passion and dreams of the donor with the work of your ministry. Seek to know those visionaries whose support-on all levels-will make your goals successful. What is the passion that drives them? How does your work fit into this passion?

Relationship grows as common connections are strengthened. What is the relationship of your projects' goals to the needs and desires of individuals you will invite into financial investment in these projects? A synergy of fulfillment allows both the ministry and the donor to feel the joys of success!

Ask and accept! No matter how well

you have done with the first four steps, this one cannot be skipped. Most people do not like to ask others for money. Yet money is that tool of Holy Spirit that is required for most of us to bring our visions into form. Invite your people to invest in the projects before you. Speak to the heart of each donor. Ask at an appropriate level. Remember, if you ask for too little, that's what you will get! Accept all gifts with joy and love, knowing that each gift expresses the courage and faith of the donor.

Gratitude follows naturally. Thank your donors in more ways than one. A letter within 48 hours of receipt of the gift is expected. Surprise your donors with additional forms of appreciation that create excitement and ownership of the ministry's vision.

Enrollment encourages the donor to participate on multiple levels in the growth of the ministry. Yes, treasure is important. So are time and talent. Network ways to get your donors serving, and ownership of the ministry is the harvest of good that awaits!

In this new year, step forth in courage and in prayer to do the work that is before you to do. Feel the support of all of us at our Association of Unity Churches. Whenever we can be of service to you, call or write!

Don't let the sound of impending chariots or the rush of waters deter you from your dreams. Step forth in COURAGE to live them, for these dreams come from the Christ. And with God, all things are possible!

I love you, I celebrate the Christ in you, and I affirm a new year of great good for you in 1995. May the worst day of this New Year be better than the best day of 1994!

Wallace Tooke Celebrates Fifty Years at First Church, Unity

On November 1, 1944, Wallace Tooke began leading a group of approximately twelve Unity students in Toledo, Ohio. He has been there ever since. Wallace, who will celebrate his seventy-eighth birthday on December 31st, began his Unity career on the prayer lines at Silent Unity. Working the night shift, Wallace was the only person in the phone room except for the occasional distractions of the custodian. Wallace remembers hearing Charles Fillmore say that people should quit after working four years on the prayer lines and move into something else in order to grow. After four years of service in Silent Unity, Wallace did quit.

Elsie Shaw, Director of Unity Field Ministries, guided Wallace to pioneer a Unity Church in Corpus Christi, Texas. Not yet an ordained minister (he was ordained in 1946), there was no financial assistance available for Wallace from the Unity home office. Starting from scratch, he began by placing ads in the newspaper to invite people to attend church. Three years later, Wallace was again guided by Elsie Shaw. This time to a study group in Toledo, Ohio. The congregation met in a bank building which charged \$50 per month rental. When the rent suddenly

doubled, the congregation moved to Viking Temple.

Before long, the congregation wanted their own building. A building fund was created and eventually yielded enough to build their church on Uptown Avenue. Attendance continued to rise. Soon an extension to the building was added to include more seating, classrooms, and office space.

Again, attendance rose until it became apparent that another move was necessary. Ten acres of land was purchased for \$60,000. This was to become their present church home which is now debt free.

Wallace was a voice for Unity on four radio stations for 15 years. The "Voice of Unity" program was broadcast for five minutes daily. "You and Your World" was a 15-minute program broadcast on Sundays.

In his earlier years of Sunday message preparation, Wallace said that Josephine (his wife) and Walter (his son) would leave the house so he could totally concentrate. One Sunday, he accidentally left his notes at home. He prayed, "Lord, put words in my mouth." After the worship service, he realized he had delivered the best message he had ever delivered. Ever since then, Wallace prepares for the Sunday message by meditating only. He no longer writes out any sermon notes. He doesn't even decide on a topic. His meditation time invokes a knowing that the Lord will speak through him those words which need to be heard.

Being a teacher is his favorite form of ministry, particularly answering questions from students. One of the highlights of his life was when he taught a men's class at Unity Village, and Charles Fillmore would sometimes come in to participate. His presence made Wallace nervous but he was also delighted to have his class so graced.

It was through Charles Fillmore that Wallace met Josephine Cooper, whom he married on May 26, 1945. Because Josephine was Catholic, some people shared with Wallace that such a marriage would not work. Wallace laughs at those warnings from the past. Fondly known as "Josie" by the church family, Josephine

has faithfully served with loving dedication in various areas of the church, including personnel director, bookstore manager, secretary, and wedding coordinator.

Josie's health has been failing in the past two years, so Wallace spends more time at home to care for her. Their son, Walter Tooke (also a Unity minister) joined First Church, Unity on September 1, 1994, as co-minister.

Wallace served on the Board of Trustces for Unity Ministers Association (predecessor to Association of Unity Churches) for nine years. He was also the regional representative for Unity in the Great Lakes Region, but admits he is now slowing down.

When asked to give advice on how to avoid burnout, Wallace said, "I don't understand burnout. I enjoy vacations (his last vacation was six years ago), but I've never experienced burnout on what I love to do. I can't imagine doing anything else but ministry."

His church congregation can't imagine it either. First Church, Unity celebrated Wallace's 50 years of leadership with a dinner in his honor. He was presented with a plaque, a collage of pictures taken throughout his 50 years of ministry, letters, a wishing well full of gifts, and 50 fifty dollar bills as an affirmation of their love and acknowledgment of wonderful years of a work well done.

Want To Survey Your Congregation? Here's How

Over the years many ministers and boards have written and administered congregational surveys. After the results were compiled, a great deal of time was spent analyzing and studying the implications. What does all of this mean?

Some of the surveys have been very simple with three or four questions about the perceived strengths, weaknesses, mission, and vision of the ministry; while others have been very lengthy and complex, asking a variety of questions as well as gathering demographic data from the respondents.

Successes in survey design, administration, analysis, and drawing conclusions about a ministry have ranged from being very helpful to feelings of frustration and a waste of time and money.

A survey is defined as "any effort in which information is gathered systematically from a sample of people by means of a questionnaire" (Zikmund & D'Amico). This sounds simple enough doesn't it? But do read on.

There are a variety of ways to gather survey information. These are personal, face-to-face interviews, or by telephone and mail.

Surveys collect "primary data" as information for a specific project, such as

answers to questions about the youth education program or attendance at classes. This is different from "secondary data" which is collected and assembled for some other purpose by someone else. An example might be census data developed for a ministry area or overall life-style date for different segments of the population.

A survey, if well planned and conducted, can be a cost-effective, quick, and accurate way to collect information you want and need about your ministry.

There is a downside to surveys. If they are not well-written (please remember there is an art and a science to doing this) or the conclusions come too late to be of any assistance, they are useless. The amount of data coming from a survey may overwhelm the board, minister, or a committee and they simply "shelve" the results and move on, lamenting that it was a "bad idea" after all.

Having defined a survey as systematically gathering information from a group of people by a questionnaire, what factors help in designing and administering a good survey?

Initially three questions needed to be answered. What information do we need; why do we need this information; and what questions deserve serious deliberations. Once these questions are answered additional decisions need to be made prior to actually writing the questionnaire.

First, you need to decide the way the survey will be conducted. Will it be during the Sunday service? This might mean it will take away time from your Sunday lesson, the minister, the number of announcements, or limit the platform person's time, or extend the length of the service. Will there be a larger rate of return if we conduct the survey during our annual meeting, by telephone, in a special all-congregation meeting, or in small groups? By answering the "what and why of what's going to be done with the information" questions mentioned above may help select the best method.

Second, you need to determine who is to be sampled. What is the target popula-

tion? If the subject of the survey is the children and youth programs perhaps only parents of children and youth are asked to complete the questionnaire. This sample is a "subset" of a larger population which is the congregation. A census is when all members of a group (i.e., the congregation) are included in the survey.

Sampling involves answering three questions: a) Who is to be sampled (the target population)? b) How big should the sample be? c) Who should be included in the sample?

Using conversational, simple, accurate, unbiased language is a goal in writing questionnaires. The writing of the questions is the art form of the process. Surveys can use open-ended questions or closed-end questions. Open-end questions allow respondent to answer in his or her own words. This is especially useful in an exploratory stage of researching or finding out how people think and not as a measure about how many people think a certain way. Closed-end questions provide answers that are easier to interpret and tabulate.

An array of open-ended and closedended questions with examples are illustrated in Exhibit A on page 6. As you can see not all examples would necessarily be appropriate to surveying congregations. They are illustrated to give you an introduction to the variety of questions available.

The sequencing of questions is more effective if the lead question creates interest at the beginning, leaving the difficult or personal question being asked toward the end. There needs to be a logical order to the questions.

Pretesting all questionnaires is part of the "science" of surveys. Taking time to "field test" the survey with a small number of people in the sample population can minimize errors and maximize the effectiveness of your questionnaire. In fact, if you are not willing or do not have the time to pretest your questionnaire, I strongly suggest NOT doing a survey. It probably will not be worth the time, effort, or money.

Good surveys deserve good "marketing." You want to make sure you get the desired level of response and participation by the congregation. Some ministries and organizations with whom I have worked have utilized a variety of very effective ways to get a survey completed and returned.

Early announcement of a forthcoming survey--the reasons why it is being conducted, and how it will be done such as mail survey, telephone, during the Sunday service, etc.--must be done. These announcements need to be over a period of time and in a variety of ways. In the Sunday bulletin, in the church or center newsletter, and from the platform are obvious ones. In addition, posters placed around the church havebeen used by some ministers and boards to introduce the activity. Let's take a look at some others.

One organization mailed postcards telling the membership that a major organizational survey was be mailed to them and asked for their participation. Ten days later the survey was mailed, with a self-addressed, stamped return envelope. Ten days after the mailing of the survey, another postcard was mailed reminding people to complete the survey if they had not, thanking them if they had, or asking the person to call the office if they wanted another one mailed to them. On occasion some do end up in the trash. This was a very effective process for this organization and they received a high rate of returned surveys.

If one of the goals of ministry is to help people in their daily living, it seems like a good idea to ask them what that "help" might look like. The information you receive can be of use in planning for the next six weeks, six months, year, or three years.

BROADCASTING THE UNITY MESSAGE

Is Anyone Listening?

How many times have you wondered, "Is anyone listening"? Do you ever ask yourself "Am I making a difference"? How can you tell if anyone is listening to your radio spots and messages? Is it possible for your broadcast to reach someone and make a difference in his/her life?

During the People's Convention earlier this year. I invited several ministers and guests to share their experiences at our Broadcasting Workshop, Richard Talley and Eileen Douglas, co-ministers at Unity of Santa Fe, explained how, with a small membership of under 40 persons and a very limited budget, they were able to begin a weekly radio program based on lessons from The Quest. They felt their radio program offering Unity principles would be an instrument for healing in their community. On The Ouest, which aired for the first time in January of this year, they invited congregants, prominent local residents, guests from other denominations and popular authors to discuss real life experiences, as well as doubts and questions. Eileen shared at our workshop that many times during the call-in portion of their radio talk show, she and Richard would talk to each other while waiting for listeners to call in, and each was silently wondering, "Is anyone listening out there?" She said they knew people were listening--based on the sales of Quest materials and attendance at their Quest classes. So they learned to trust that yes, someone is listening. At the end of

the workshop, Richard and Eileen both encouraged other ministries to take Unity into their communities saying "it's not as difficult or as scary as it may sound."

Last week, a letter from Richard and Eileen shared a powerful story. Last fall a man looking for a 12-step group stopped to listen to their Sunday Quest discussion group, decided to stay, and became a faithful member. This man, Alvino, is a past gang member who had been wounded and imprisoned before going into recovery for drugs and alcohol abuse. Now he devotes himself to bringing about equity for those in the Hispanic community and to reaching others, particularly teenagers, with his message of a better way to deal with conflict and alienation. Several months ago Richard and Eileen invited Alvino to be their guest on The Quest. Now he co-hosts almost every other week. It was Alvino's idea to invite a young ex-gang member, Luis, as a guest on the September 4th program to discuss Chapter 34 of The Quest: Relationships: Understanding and Being Understood. Then Alvino and Luis began exploring the possibility of starting a Quest group for gang members and young people in Santa Fc. These discussions led to hosting a gang truce where seven warlords from the three major gangs in Sante Fe met. The next week an open gang meeting was held in the community and over 200 gang members, the new chief of police and the mayor met. On their next Quest program, Phillip, a gang leader, and Luis were guests and the mayor called in and offered full City Hall support. Eileen reported, "There is a truce city wide now and although we are not playing an active part, we are holding the vision of supporting the young gang members spiritually and individually. And this past Sunday we started the Quest group with several gang members and their families attending." From a vision and dream of a radio show based on the Quest, Richard and Eileen have moved into a radio outreach that blesses and touches the entire Santa Fe area. In their letter, they share: "We think this is a unique opportunity for Unity to explore getting more involved in the issues of real life-to become practical Christianity in a very serious way." Congratulations to Richard, Eileen, Alvino, and Luis, and all the

Ideas For Getting Started!

Step One from "Ten Steps for Beginning a Broadcast Outreach"

When ministries are considering a broadcasting campaign, we are often asked "How do I begin?" Beginning a broadcast outreach can be an exciting step for your ministry, and can appear to be overwhelming at first. Forming a media committee or support group comprised of volunteers can be a first step. One of the next steps is to discuss your vision and goals for utilization of media. Decide on the focus for your outreach by asking some of the following questions--they will provide a starting point for gathering information for your campaign.

- Every ministry has a position which fills a need in the market. What is your ministry about? What is the community perception of your ministry? Is it what you want?
- 2. Who are you appealing to--your target audience (older adults, young adults, teens, families, singles)?
- 3. Are you building a "second congregation (listeners who may never attend church but who may tithe and respond by letter or phone)? Are you tithing to your community with your broadcast campaign?
- 4. What are your expectations from your broadcast outreach and how realistic are they? How will you measure your results? What are your short-term and longterm goals?

- 5. Do you have building goals, special retreats or classes or other activities you want to promote?
- 6. What seasons or months are most important to your ministry?
- 7. What should the media representatives hold in mind as you grow your business relationship?
- 8. What days during the week does the church receive the most phone inquiries?
- 9. What challenges (location, building, parking, teacher availability, etc.) does your ministry currently face?
- 10. What are the unique qualities about your ministry, your congregation?







Nothing has proved to be more exciting in my life than my participation in A Living Curriculum project. It has absolutely been a peak experience, to coin a phrase by Maslow, and provided so many epiphanies for me that I have stopped trying to keep up with the incredible insights that I have gained from the experience.

Some of my favorite expressions have become "WOW!"

- "What an incredible experience!" - "How totally celestine!" It never ceases to amaze me how Spirit moves so miraculously in all things, even though I know this is exactly how life is to be lived from moment to moment.

I love life so absolutely even though there are some physical manifestations in my life right now that are challenging. There are so many incredible gifts and blessings that have been bestowed on me as a result of my physical challenges and I bless every experience and thank each one of you who have given me so much prayer support. I could not have asked for a more profound life experience, nor could I have known a more supportive spiritual community from across the country.

Our Living Curriculum program has truly had a magnificent "wind beneath its wings." Holy Spirit has moved through it in its unique and mysterious way and raised it to such heights through the work of an incredible team of devoted, committed, and disciplined group of gifted writers, curriculum developers, editors, artists, and graphic designers, with much support from ministers, youth educators, spiritual educators, ministers, licensed teachers, field ministries, lay persons, children, and our own Association staff.

Story has continued to be at the heart of A Living Curriculum coupled with the spiritual principle of the Unity Truth teachings, and the students themselves are now realizing that

we are co-travelers--students and teachers--on this incredible journey.

To bring us up to date for this initial CONTACT article, I will recap a little of our journey. Part I of the *Children on the Quest* was given to each church at the 1994 People's Convention in Alexandria, Virginia, along with an Interactive Teaching Training Video and Workbook. Part II is available as of October 25, 1994, and can be obtained through the order department of our Association. As a service to field ministries, we will also be warehousing all of the children's books that are a part of any of the *Children on the Quest* programs. In other words, a field ministry can now call the order department and request not only the Curriculum Guide but also all of the books that are used in this guide. Parts III & IV will also be ready for distribution before the end of the year with the same warehousing arrangements.

There are two other projects that we have accomplished. One is the Writers' Conference for the next book *Teens on the Quest* which will be presented at the 1995 People's Convention, and the facilitator training piece of A Living Curriculum.

We have already trained approximately 20 members for the first Living Curriculum Facilitator Training Team. Some attended a five-day intensive facilitated by Dr. William Dols, Executive Director of the St. Louis Education Center, held July 31 through August 5, 1994, at Roslyn Conference Center in Virginia. Another group was trained at a five-day training workshop held at Unity Village November 7-11 for regional consultants and Association staff.

The focus of our training for facilitators is storytelling and student. There is an excellent article by Dr. Dols on "Story" in the Fall issue of *The Education Link*, published by our Association Education Department, if you would like more information on the storytelling process of a Living Curriculum. But of most importance, at the heart of curriculum is the student--for "to read the curriculum is to read the student." A Living Curriculum process is experienced-centered and designed to incorporate our Unity spiritual principles into everyday living. Students meet at the heart of every story.

The people on the team at this time are Judi Venturini, Linda Gower, Ray Wiggins, Mick Dustin, and Dorothy Genske from our Association office; Bob Fortner and Meridith Maahs, regional education services consultants for Youth of Unity; Sonja and Hal Milton, Unity ministers representing field ministries; and Kathy Kellogg, representing youth educators; Stephanie Harnack, Mary Grace Sorensen, Jerry Sharp, Penny Gruver, Jackie Green,

Dorothy Bishop, Judy Huffman, and Carol Gardner. These people are available to assist churches, regions, etc., in training, networking, coaching, and mentoring their youth educators and volunteers.

A Living Curriculum Facilitator Training Team with its mentors and coaches will then be available for consultation by telephone or by other arrangements region by region. All of this is offered to each region as options to their own programs. No region is obligated in any way to take advantage of these offerings. We are a team and we want to help you in each region facilitate A Living Curriculum and Children on the Quest into your churches, and to provide training, networking, coaching, and mentoring of youth educators and volunteers.

Although the territory is broad between 1 and 499 average Sunday attendance and \$0 to 500,000 annual budget, we can break it down further into usable information. Of the information provided and related to attendance size of 230 to 499, but with no budget information, there are 7 Unity ministries which also pay cash salaries of more than \$80,000 per year.

The balance of our figures are Unity and non-Unity churches of similar size, with budgets less than \$499,999 with most of the attendance reported between 110 and 210. In all cases, the figures quoted are cash salary, plus benefits.

The high salary reported for a senior (even though hc/ she may be the only minister on staff) minister was \$54,230 and the average was \$31,972. An associate minister high was \$40,260 and the average was \$22,012. The lowest figures reported in the senior and associate categories were \$13,888 and \$13,521, respectively. Both were the only ones reported at that rate, were rural, and considered part-time pastorates; however, they are part of the average.

We hope the above information may be useful as a resource for churches reviewing and updating professional staff compensation. Standards of churches may vary, but one which needs to characterize each of them is loving generosity toward their ministers and staff.
