no epidemic of any kind can have power over us if we build up and keep up our spiritual defenses.

Acceptance of the false belief that it is the fate of the human race to catch cold has its roots deep in the subconscious. Ever since I can remember, I have heard anxious mothers say to their children: "Put on your rubbers, dear; you'll catch cold." Or "Don't sit in that draft; you'll catch cold." Even mothers who have studied Truth do this sort of thing without realizing that they are planting a fear in the child's mind that will be difficult to eradicate later on.

Once we are faced with the actual symptoms of a cold, a running nose, sneezing, a sore throat and so forth, we make our second mistake by trying to find out when and where we got it. For example, the first time I called on my friend she said: "I've been thinking and thinking, and I can't figure out how I got this cold. I must have sat in a draft somewhere, or maybe I wasn't dressed warmly enough at

the club dance Saturday night."

I explained to her that her "thinking and thinking" of the cold—in other words, dwelling in thought on a negative condition—accentuated the physical manifestation. Students of Truth know that the first requisite of spiritual healing is a mind cleansed of negation. Yet we still think and talk about the physical reasons for a cold, and fret over its duration. We are afraid, as my friend was, that we shall not be well enough to do the things we planned for today or tomorrow, or next week.

Doctors admit that they do not know the cause of colds and that they have not yet discovered an effective cure. The best they can do is to give a palliative for bodily aches and pains, and a prophylactic spray for the nose and throat. They prescribe warmth, and a cessation of activity until "the cold has run its course."

There is an old saying that "man's extremity is God's opportunity." We

Where Is Your Work Done?

N HIS allegory "The Water Ba-L bies' Kingsley tells of the lad Tom, the "water baby," being sent on a quest that was to take him out of babyhood and prepare him for manhood. He traveled the world around under the seas, and at length came up to visit Mother Carey up at the North Pole. She was the great "sea mother," who made all the creatures of the deep, the tiniest fish and the great whales. Tom expected to find her very busy, rushing about in a frenzy of activity. But instead he saw a great majestic woman wrapped in misty robes and sitting upon a rocky throne. She was not moving or speaking at all. She sat with her head resting on her hand, her deep gray eyes fixed upon immeasurable distance, and from the foot of her throne the newly made sea creatures swam out in a never-ending stream.

We feel that Kingsley, poet and artist, saw truly. The world's creative work is not done by feverish effort, amid rush and noise and confusion. It is done in the peace, strength, and

silence of another sphere.

Now let no one who has read thus far say: "This is not for me; the author is writing of poets and artists, and mine is common everyday work in the busy world's market place." No, here we are going to consider the truth about all work, for all work sincerely done is creative, whether it is building a house, cooking a meal, planting a garden, teaching a child, or any one of the hundreds of other things we do to further God's order in the world, and incidentally to earn our daily bread.

So whatever your work, take time to meditate now and to ask, "Where is my work done?" Soon we realize that it is not done in the activity that occupies hand and mind in the working hours. It is done in the silent, invisible realm of Spirit. Unless our work is done there before we begin the outer activity in the manifest world it is inefficiently done.

Even in the most limited material sense our work is done before we begin our outer activity. How does the good houskeeper set those excellent meals on the table? Not by rushing into the kitchen and taking whatever is at hand to the dining table. She plans her meals in the morning when she outlines her day's activities. She knows what is to go on the table, how to cook, what must be ordered from the markets. So when she goes to the kitchen she works without haste and confusion. Every step falls in its ordained place.

No farmer takes a bag of seed and goes out to broadcast them haphazardly in the spring. No, his garden was made during those cold, snowy February days when he seemed to be sitting idle. He considered rotation of crops, what fertilizer he would need, what new crop should be tried this year, what old one that did not do well in his soil last year should be

given up.

Every commercial establishment has its policy and its plan of action for every employee. Every school has its courses laid out, and has selected the teachers who are best fitted for them.

The same rule holds for individuals. Everyone must do his work in the silent, invisible realm if he hopes to accomplish anything in the visible that

is worth considering. That silent place where the world's real work is done! We have caught glimpses of it now and then, and have thought wistfully what a great thing it would be if we could enter freely whenever we would. But again we hold back. "That is for the great souls, the spiritual minded, the initiates; ordinary folks like me cannot enter." But Jesus Christ did not think so. He knew the silent place as no one else on earth has yet come to know it. He expected common men to enter it, He bade them enter it, He told them how. When He gave His directions He was speaking to an ordinary crowd gathered from the highways and byways and grouped about Him, a wandering roadside preacher. He told them first about the states of mind that were anterooms to the creative silence: humility, mercy, purity, steadfastness. He warned them that they must replace hate with the sort of love that extends even to enemies. He bade them have perfection as their ideal and goal. Then He taught them to pray, for

there is no way to the inner sh except through prayer. Then He s in effect: "Go into the closet, shut the door, and your Father meet you there. You can speak to H in secret, and if you wait He will swer you."

That is all there is to it. It is very mysterious or complicated. all have seen cases where a man or woman who has unsuccessfully tried every human way out of a difficulty in final desperation turns to God. Whatever the trouble may have been—domestic, financial, or physical—the power of God worked the miracle of healing. Thousands of letters to Unity from all over the world testify to the truth that God heals where all else has failed. We who have faith in God power and use it have had personal demonstrations of healing. We turn to God in every extremity. But do we turn to Him in every little need?

The fact that usually a cold is annoying rather than serious may account for our failure to use the power of Truth against it. But since yielding to any negative condition, however minor, hinders spiritual progress, is it not time that we turn to God to free us once and for all time from bond-

age to this false idea?

Medical scientists will tell you that nature is the true healer of disease. The life inherent in every organic form is the power that performs the actual healing, whether it be the formation of a clot to seal a wound, the knitting together of a broken bone, or the elimination of invading bacteria by the action of the white blood corpuscles. In the very air we breathe, in the many things we touch are the spores or minute bacteria that wait for a chance to work us mischief. It may be through a scratch in the skin or through irritation of a tender membrane, but always these parasites are waiting to attack and invade us. And here we see the miracle-working deense that God has given us, the white ells called leucocytes. Present at all imes in our blood in enormous numpers, they have the power to fight off he would-be invaders. If we keep hem healthy and give them a chance function normally, they do the work healing. Our duty then is to keep em healthy by keeping mind and ody in perfect condition.

One of the first things we learn in Iruth is that our thinking directly flects our body. We know that optinistic thoughts keep the body healthy whereas thoughts of worry, anger, or car lower our vitality. We know that lisease attacks more quickly when vi-

tality is low and the bars of resistance let down. Thus every time we allow worry about drafts or wet feet or any other supposed cause of colds to dwell in our consciousness, every time we are afraid of catching cold because someone else has one, we are lowering our mental and physical resistance by impressing a negative idea on mind and body.

If we want to be immune to colds, we must start with the belief that we are a manifestation of the highest form of God life on earth, and that it is our spiritual duty to keep the body perfect. In the First Epistle to the Corinthians Paul said: "Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? . . . therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." And in answer to the question "What is man, that thou art mindful of him?" the Psalmist said: "Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of thy hands; thou hast put all things under his feet."

To glorify God by constant perfection of the body temple we must assume our God-given dominion over body and mind. We must learn to cast out not only every negative thought but also every alien form of life that seeks to invade the body. What chance does a germ so tiny it can only be seen through a microscope have against our great life force if we consciously and continuously unite ourselves with God life?

There are two things to do if we wish to keep ourselves so healthy that the cold bacteria can never gain power over us. The first and most important is the achievement and maintenance of a habitually optimistic frame of mind. Any physician will tell you that the state of a patient's morale invariably helps or hinders the course of his illness, that the patient with hope and faith has a far greater chance for recovery than the one who is hopeless and afraid.

In the matter of warding off colds, we must get rid of both conscious and subconscious fears. We must deny the race fear of colds in order to eliminate it from the subconsciousness, and we must cultivate the habit of thinking affirmatively of our own perfect God life. As Daily Word expressed it in a recent issue: "Teach your mind to think healthy thoughts instead of sick thoughts by constantly repeating Truth statements." Thus we build up spiritual strength with which to resist any attempted invasion of the body by bacteria.

The second way to prevent a cold is to build up physical resistance by exposure to God's good sunshine and air. "For the breath of life is in the sunlight, and the hand of life is in the wind." Sunshine and fresh air provide a gateway to health, a defensive wall against disease.

Because I know that getting a cold is not a necessary evil that must be endured, but a result of faulty thinking, and because I believe with all my heart and soul that man is monarch over his mind, I have evolved a method of spiritual work that for the most part has kept me free of colds, even during an epidemic. I impress on my subconsciousness a denial of the race fear of colds. "I have no fear of catching cold. No false race idea can have power over my God-filled consciousness. No germ can invade my God-filled body temple."

+ Sacrificing the Ram

REMEMBER that love is the power that holds the universe together. All love emanates from God and it continues ever to abide in Him. Love cannot be separated from God.

When an individual attempts to separate his love from God's love, thinking that he can employ love in a selfish, personal way, he finds that his portion of love seems to lack something vital. It seems to be deficient in substance and power. Love separated from its divine source cannot function.

As branches cut from the vine cannot bear fruit, so love separated from God withers away. We cut our love off from God love when we turn it toward mere material things and forget about God. By keeping God in mind as the source of love we renew the power of our love.

Abraham of old loved his son Isaac better than he loved any one or any thing in the world. He was so devoted to the boy that he almost forgot to love God. Without realizing it he was separating his love from the true vine of love. He was in danger of losing his contact with the very power that

gave him his beloved Isaac.

The strange Bible story of a devoted father commanded by a friendly God to give his only son as a burnt offering is an allegory that illustrates a very deep and subtle truth. The story states that when God commanded Abraham to make the sacrifice Abraham obediently made ready at once to follow instructions without argument. Abraham therefore took wood for fuel and a knife to slay his son, and journeyed with the boy to a distant mountain.

When they arrived Abraham built an altar, laid the wood on it, bound his son, and was about to strike the knife into his heart when his hand was stayed by the voice of God's angel, who warned him not to kill the lad. Looking around, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. He then sacrificed the ram instead of his son Isaac.

Many of us, when we have received a tangible answer to prayer, become so engrossed in the thing we have been given that we forget to continue to pray. The test of our love for God comes after we achieve success, for we may then become so wrapped up in God's gifts that we forget the Giver. To avoid being cut off from the source of supply by our ignorant worship of a material thing we need to make a sacrifice. By giving up our most loved possession we restore our unity with God and actually lose nothing.

When we make up our mind to give up something dear to us we find that it is not necessary to lose anything that is good for us to have. We do not need to sacrifice good things; we need to sacrifice our unwise devotion to them. What we must sacrifice is our undue attachment to material things. We must burn up or purify the ram that represents personal willfullness, but we do not need to part with the child Isaac, who represents the true joy that comes from the right use of the good things that God has provided for us.

It is not necessary for us to give up the joy of life or the joy of the use of any good thing that God has given to us when we sacrifice the ram of personal willfullness. This selfish animal trait in us causes us to think that we can enjoy the fruits of love independent of God.

If our solicitous attention becomes centered upon a loved one we must be careful that we do not forget God's share of our love. If we forget we may become overwhelmed by the magnitude of our responsibilities concerning the dear one. We may try to pray for him but our personal sympathy, which we are pleased to call love, blinds our spiritual vision to the capacity of God's love to aid us. Our personal feelings of fear and worry seem to sever our connection with God's love and we feel that we are alone in our great struggle.

The odds against us in this material strife are overwhelming, and we are too weak to cope with them personally. At this point we may be forced to abandon our human efforts and place the loved one and all his affairs in God's hands. Such a decision may seem at the time to be a sacrifice of the

loved one. But when we have actual decided wholeheartedly to place hi in God's hands and to cease our medling, come what may, something supprising happens.

We realize that we have sacrifice the selfish human ram in our owmind, that our loved one is safe as secure in God's loving care, and the he has become more delightful to

The High Watch

A Love Offering

He who can read and write inhabits a boundless universe compared with the unfortunate who can do neither of these things. Dr. Frank C. Laubach, whose "Each one teach one" movement has emancipated many thousands of illiterates, has written a book, "The Silent Billion Speak," which was reviewed some months ago in the Presbyterian Survey by H. Kerr Taylor, Educational Secretary of Foreign Missions for the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The extracts from Doctor Laubach's book that appeared in Mr. Taylor's article reveal how great a gift the literate may make to the illiterate at the cost of little more than a moderate outlay of time and patience. We quote the Survey:

Three out of five of the human race cannot read or write. In Asia and Africa alone over a billion people are illiterate, nine persons out of every ten—half the human race. This cold type cannot tell you what that means. You think it is a pity they cannot read, but the real tragedy is that they have no voice in public affairs, they never vote, they are never represented in any conference, they are the silent victims, he forgotten men, driven like animals, nutely submitting in every age before and since the pyramids were built. It is a human weakness not to become aware of suffering inless we hear a cry. The illiterate majority of the human race does not know how to make its cry reach us, and we never dream now these millions suffer.

The most bruised people on this planet, he naked, the hungry, the fallen among hieves, the sick, the imprisoned in mind a soul, are the twelve hundred million lliterates, three fifths of the human race. At least a billion are virtual slaves. India

.. had over three hundred and forty nillions of illiterates at the time the 1941 ensus was taken, 88 per cent of her peole; and almost every illiterate is in debt all is life—and his children and his children's hildren after him. He does not know how nuch his debt is or whether the interest is orrect. The moneylender takes all he can ake and still keep his victim alive. . . .

The curve of literacy, which has been learly stationary in Asia and Africa and lussia for centuries, has turned upward ecently, especially in the past twenty years. I hundred million more adults read today han twenty years ago. If that curve follows is present trend, within fifty years, we shall ave five hundred million new readers tepping out of the silent ranks of illiteracy is speak for the first time. This is not only acting news. It is the most stupendous, he most arresting, and it may be the most

ominous fact on this planet. Nothing can

It will be wonderful, or terrifying, depending upon whether these vast multitudes awaken with their hearts full of Christ's love or with their hearts full of hate. They will bless or blast the world. That is why the church must step to the front and take a leading share in the mighty upsurge of the sunken half.

We must not only help them rise but we must also put reading in their hands, the right kind of reading; and that is a stag-

gering task. . . .

A billion people now illiterate will be reaching out with hungry minds for something to read. Will they be fed with the message of Christ or with atheism? Will they read love or hate? Whatsoever is sown in their minds, the world will reap. And what will happen when these hundreds of millions shall speak "after the silence of the centuries"? . . .

Teaching illiterates is proving to be a wonderful way to bring people to Christ. If you sit down beside an illiterate as your equal, your heart overflowing with love for him, and with a prayer on your lips that you may help him to a new vision; if you never frown nor criticize, but look pleased and surprised, and praise him for his progress, a thousand silver threads wind about his heart and yours. You are the first educated man who ever looked at him except to swindle him, and he will be so mystified by your unusual kindness that he is likely to stop and ask: "How do you expect to get paid for this? I have no money." Then you have your chance to say:

"I do not want any pay. I have learned this from Jesus. He spent all His time helping people free of charge. From the moment He awoke in the morning until He closed His eyes at night, He was looking around asking whom He could teach, or heal, or encourage, or defend, or save. I think that is a beautiful way to live. If we were all like Jesus, this world would be a paradise. So I thought I would try helping people just because I love them. And I have discovered the secret of happiness! When I am teaching you, it makes my heart sing. When I have finished teaching you, I want you to go and teach your neighbors. Don't take any money for it, and your heart will sing! Brother, we have found the secret of happiness.'

He goes out and teaches others, his heart sings, and he learns to love Jesus. The only irresistible gospel is love in action—helping people where they are in desperate need. If we serve the illiterates and then tell them the gospel after we have won their hearts, they will believe in Christ because they believe in us.
