W HILE I was a staff writer in a motion-picture studio, I met brilliant author who was also a arming, courteous gentleman. We orked together on several stories, and came good friends.

One afternoon, a third writer in the sudio invited the staff to her house or tea. Cocktails were served instead if tea, and soon the party became boistrous and noisy. As a nondrinker, I was bored and somewhat disgusted by a entics of my usually serious col-

leagues, and I looked around for my friend to take me home. I found him—at the bar. Under the influence of alcohol, he was an entirely different person, rude instead of courteous, vulgar instead of charming.

I found out later that he had "sworn off and been on the wagon" during the time I had known him. After the party, I was warned that once he started drinking, he would be unreliable. For a few days he made a sincere effort to concentrate on the story we were

At this time I had not yet begun the study of Truth and had no idea of how to help him. My repeated attempts to reason with him, to point out how drink was wrecking his life and work, had no effect.

After the final break with pictures he was smart enough to realize that something drastic had to be done. In talking over the situation with me, he said hopelessly: "I honestly try to break the drink habit, but it's no use. In every generation of my family there

has been one drunkard, and I'm it for this generation."


That gave me a clue. Without knowledge of spiritual healing I could only think of psychology. I realized that the trouble was mental and recommended his consulting a psychologist or a psychoanalyst. He went to a well-known psychoanalyst. The result seemed to justify my faith. "I'm on the wagon," my friend said. "I know now that my trouble was in believing that I was foreordained to drink because of my family history. That's a lot of apple sauce. If you have will power, you can throw false ideas out of your mind; and once out of your mind, the rest is easy."

His "cure" lasted six months. I know now what I did not know then, that the use of personal will power alone is not enough; that it will not eradicate a negative habit permanently unless a positive force is substituted in its place.

My friend sincerely wanted to break himself of the drink habit and get back his position as a writer. He tried spiritualism, and he took several of the so-called "physical cures," but nothing lasted more than a month or two. Each experiment gave him new hope, and a new depth of depression when it proved worthless. Meanwhile he was going downhill physically, mentally, and professionally.

I had to leave for the East just then. Expecting to be gone three months,

working on together, but as it progressed, he would get to work later and later each day until finally he did not come in at all.

The studio had put up with his uncertain habits because of the originality of his ideas and the vividness of his imagination. But there came a time when he was so completely unreliable that he could not be depended upon to turn in any work. The last straw was when he disappeared in the middle of a story without letting anyone know where he had gone. News of this sort travels quickly in the picture business, so when two months later he returned from Mexico no one trusted him enough to give him a job.

I stayed four years. During this time I had a serious problem of my own that seemed impossible of solution. I was fortunate enough to meet a woman who introduced me to the Unity teachings, and I learned from her how to work and pray spiritually. My first demonstration of the power of God came in the form of a revelation showing how to solve my problem.

Like all beginners, I was eager to help others, and I wished I could pass on to my friend the Truth that I was so earnestly studying. Although he had written, "I am on the wagon and have not touched a drop for months," I did not believe him, because he had said the same thing so often when it was not true. I wanted to write him that God was the only power that could really cure him, but as I expected to go home shortly, I decided that personal talks would be more convincing than letters.

He came to see me almost immediately after my return to the West Coast. His eyes were bright and alert, his step was firm, his whole manner self-confident and assured. "I have my old job back with the Blank Studio," he told me. "I had a hard time convincing them that I had stopped drinking for good. I even offered to work for nothing until I could prove I was permanently cured."

He turned and looked me straight in the eye. "I am cured, Clara. I'll never touch another drop as long as I live."

I asked what had happened; and the story I shall give you is exactly as he told it to me.

"I was brought up by a stern, bigoted father," he said. "He constantly threatened me by saying that God sees everything I do and would punish me if I was bad. To my boyish imagination God became a fearful person whom I first dreaded, then hated.

"About six months ago, a plainly dressed man whom I had never seen before came to my door and walked in. I had been drinking and with my usual drunken profanity I ordered him out. Instead of leaving he walked past me into the room, which was in a state

of disorder and filth. Without a word, he began to straighten things up. I tried again to swear him out. He just turned and looked at me. There was something about his eyes that made me feel humble and ashamed.

"Who are you and what do you want?' I shouted.

"Who I am does not matter. I've come to help you. Just relax in that big chair until I get this place clean. Then we will have dinner."

"I was so dumbfounded by the quiet way he gave me orders that I did what he asked. Before I knew it I was asleep. When I woke up I was cold sober. The room was cleaned and a table was set for two before the fire.

"He made me eat the simple meal he had prepared. Then he began to talk. His story was not unlike my own. He had been a drunkard and nothing had cured him until he learned that God was not a power for punishment and vengeance but a God of beneficence, ever ready to help humans in trouble. He told me that God was the only answer to my trouble, that God promises help for every need and always keeps His promises. Then he asked me to repeat the 91st Psalm with him out loud.

"It had been years since I had thought of that psalm or of any other part of the Bible, but it came back to me. I can't describe the effect of peace that came over me as I said those beautiful words: 'He shall call upon me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and honour him.'

"We talked far into the night. I knew then for a certainty that God would be the only answer to my trouble.

"Every day for a month, that man came and worked and prayed with me He taught me that I was a perfect and spiritual child of God, free from false appetites; and that I desired only the good that God has prepared for all of His children. The exact words of my denial were 'I am not in bondage to any physical habit'; and the affirmation was 'The Spirit of God is the only presence and the only power in my life. I am free, as Spirit is free.' Suddenly, as though it had never existed my thirst for drink was gone. I have never even wanted a drink since then."

"Who was the man?" I asked.
"That's the miracle," he answered.
"I never found out. When later I asked him again, he said simply that he was a messenger from God."

"I know God sent him to me in my great need. Every day of my life I gwe thanks to God for him."

This happened ten years ago, and my friend has never touched any kind of alcoholic drink since. His cure by the power of God was a miracle no less awe-inspiring than the miracles of Jesus. Whoever his visitor was, he was unquestionably an embodiment of the Christ Spirit sent to help a human being in distress.

The story comes back to me when ever I see unrestricted social drinking Many physicians say that a smal amount of alcohol does no harm to the system; and a number of ministers of the gospel offer no objections to minimulate the great danger with alcohol, as also with cigarettes and narcotics of any kind, is that they are habit-forming. One drink offered lightly may start someone on the road to habit that no human agent can break

Man is apt to overrate the streng of his personal will power. He was drink and smoke socially "to relax or take a sleeping powder "to quiet nerves," confident that he could never become a slave to the habit. Yet also

We all, I think, have known some reson addicted mildly to the use of alcohol or narcotics. Perhaps we have heard him say: "I can stop any time want to, but why should I? Smoking so a sin. Neither is drinking. There are plenty of references to wine-drinking in the Bible." True; but there are many more injunctions against drinking of any kind.

There is a direct command from the ord to Aaron in Leviticus. "Do not rink wine nor strong drink, thou, nor by sons with thee, when ye go into the obernacle of the congregation."

Isaiah warns: "They also have erred hrough wine, and through strong rink are out of the way... they err n vision, they stumble in judgment." In Proverbs we find: "Wine is a nocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not vise."

Paul preaches against wine in many laces. In I Corinthians he says: "For e that eateth and drinketh unworthily, ateth and drinketh damnation to imself, not discerning the Lord's ody." And in Ephesians he says: "Be ot drunk with wine, wherein is exess; but be filled with the Spirit." In Romans Paul brings out two other ides of the question of drinking. "It is ood neither . . . to drink wine, nor ny thing whereby thy brother stumleth, or is offended, or is made weak." Offering one "harmless little drink" ocially may be the cause of making a nother stumble or grow weak, and it therefore a dangerous thing to do. he other point brought out by Paul is he secret self-condemnation that often flicts acoholics or narcotics users. We now the ill effects of holding in conciousness any thoughts of condemnaon or shame; and if something we o makes us feel guilty, we must learn stop doing it. "Hast thou faith? ave it to thyself before God. Happy he that condemneth not himself in hat thing which he alloweth."

If we need help to break any habit hat we secretly believe is not good, et us start with a denial. "I am not bondage to any physical appetite."

Let us affirm: "The power of God, ever active in me, gives me strength to thimph over all temptation. I am,

therefore I can, therefore I will."

Let us "stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage."

Let us constantly express gratitude: "Thanks be unto God, who always leadeth us in triumph."

+ Who Made You the Judge?

REMEMBER that one who passes judgment on his fellow men assumes a very grave responsibility, for Jesus has warned us about passing judgment in these ringing words: "Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure you mete, it shall be measured unto you."

It is easy to pass biased judgment on others when we judge by appearances and do not know all the facts of the case. We ourselves should not like to be judged without having an opportunity first to present our side. Judging by appearances, a squirmy little angleworm that digs in our garden may seem to be destroying our crop; but when we investigate we find that he is really helping us to improve the condition of our soil.

The man who disagrees with us on some matters, and criticizes us, may in fact impart information that we need to consider. We should not be angry with him for frank criticism, but we should thank him down in our heart, if not audibly, and accept his words with open mind, for he might be one of the means chosen by God to improve us. It is not always the words that are pleasant to hear that help us most. When you are criticized use what you find helpful in the words and forget what is not, but do not forget to thank the critic even though he may have hurt your feelings.

When you give thanks it helps you. for thanksgiving opens the way for new good to come to you. A thankful attitude prepares the way for more pleasant relations with other people. Bitter disagreements drive away your good and lessen your opportunity for success. Jesus recommended that we agree with our adversary quickly. But someone may say that Jesus did not agree with Satan, who tempted Him in the wilderness. Jesus did not contend with Satan, but accepted his challenge as an opportunity to develop His spiritual strength. He did not berate Satan's personal character for making tempting suggestions, but He did not accept those suggestions. He

strengthened His power to do good by using it to overcome Satan's evil suggestions. He overcame evil with good.

Even Jesus did not accept the challenge to judge men. In the 12th chapter of Luke this incident is related: "And one out of the multitude said unto him, Teacher, bid my brother divide the inheritance with me. But he said unto him, Man, who made me a judge or a divider over you? And he said unto them, Take heed, and keep yourselves from all covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abun-

dance of the things which he possesseth."

Each person must ultimately accept the responsibility of making his own decisions. We must all decide, each one for himself, whether we will follow God or Mammon.

A wise man always asks God to help him with his important decisions. Solomon asked God for wisdom to perform the duties of a king, and when God gave him wisdom He added also riches and honor.

Riches and honor are associates of wisdom, and they are useless when separated from wisdom. Good judge ment, which is righteous judgment, founded upon wisdom and love. In or der to make a just decision we must understand all sides of a proposition and our decision must be tempered by love. It is more important to have love and harmony in your life than certain material things that cause contention Therefore a decision concerning material possessions should never be allowed to stir up discord. If a person who has to make a decision remember this he need not be afraid to make righteous, harmonious choice. What happens inside a man's character is more important than what happens to his worldly goods.

Recently there appeared a short account of a decision made by a judge somewhere in the United States. It was a masterful decision, it seems to me solving a very ordinary but difficult problem. It seems that two brothers who happened to be Scotsmen, had in herited an estate consisting of various properties, both real and personal. judge was appointed to see that a fair and honest division of the property was made between the two men. He happened to be a man of unusual prattical wisdom, a modern Solomon, would seem, and this is the way solved the problem: First, he appoint ed one of the brothers to divide property equally into two parts as thought fair, and the other brother was given the first choice of these The masterfulness of this decision prevented petty controversy, and com pelled the two men to decide up a division that would be just and the to both of them. If we do not make a fair plan we may eventually have to suffer the conseouences of our greed. "Inasmuch as ve did it unto one of these my brethen, even these least, ye did it unto me," said Jesus. He meant that what you do to your fellow man you do to he Son of God; so if you give him ove, praise, and justice you lift up the son of God in yourself. When you are ruel and unjust you crucify the Son of God in yourself.

"Vengeance is mine . . . saith the Lord," and because God is love, the tleansing vengeance will be wrought by love and not by hate. Therefore it does not behoove anyone to take vengeance into his own hands and by violence punish those who offend him. Put the offender in God's hands and et Him burn out the dross with the fire of love. Be fair, honest, loving, and kind and thus become unified with God's love in action.

That believers in God should do nore than pray for all whose circumtances commend them to the compasion of mankind goes without saying. They must do more if their prayers ne to avail anything. Unless we folow up our prayers with action that is onsistent with our prayers not much ood is accomplished. The good neighor is more than the well-wisher; he the active doer of good, the one who stands ready to lend a hand when is needed. The editor of "Topics of he Times" in the New York Times iscusses the church's opportunity toay in terms of practical Christianity meet a world-wide need. We quote he Times:

Criticism of a church or a religion is an ditorial step fraught with hazard. Yet one may perhaps, as a church member, venture ome reflections on the opportunity that eckons to organized religion of all faiths oday to take a more energetic hand in the world's diverse troubles.

It must be admitted at the outset that ministers, rabbis and priests differ on the extent to which they should pass outside the purely spiritual in their addresses from the pulpit or in the programs they suggest for congregational action. Nevertheless, when due allowance is made for this justified difference of opinion, there are several tractical problems facing our people today a which churches and synagogues might rell act with more initiative than many of them are showing.

We offer this comment by way of appeal and invitation to action, rather than as inticism, in a time when need for leader-the and resolute action exists to a point where many thinking people view our condition with concern.

Our official leaders are beset with probems so grave that they seem not fully equal their task. One possible reaction to this tate of things is to criticize these public officials for incompetence, inaction and ack of courage. But such criticism, essenial and helpful as it may be, does not fully neet the bill when great causes are meanting is widespread, and the church, if it would, could do something about it.

not laid down some specific pattern by which every man, woman and child will save food so that someone else, abroad, shall not starve.

We ask if this is a cause in which the church can legitimately concern itself. Or perhaps we should ask, rather, is this not a cause in which the church must concern itself.

We wonder whether any sermon preached today can conscientiously omit a stirring appeal for the self-sacrifice that this country should be making, and isn't. We submit that no prayer offered can rightly fail to ask the strength and the will to abstain so that a distant brother may eat. We suggest that if Washington continues to fail to lay down a program of self-denial, our churches should be proposing one among themselves that rests on the principle of the Golden Rule.

The churches and their members have not ignored the problem of hunger abroad; it has probably been mentioned in every church in the land. But have they faced up to their full moral obligation of meeting this suffering of millions of human beings and of taking a position of strong leadership in their communities?

Some weeks ago it was suggested—and this newspaper editorially and in its columns on veterans' affairs took a part in the movement—that if each of the 250,000 churches in this country provided, through its members, a home or rooms for four returned veterans, a million of these men would be supplied with shelter in their time of great need.

Religious leaders discussed this idea of a "share your home with a veteran" program with President Truman, who supported it. We should be happy if we could report that the churches in great numbers put themselves enthusiastically behind this plan, that it spread like wildfire over the country, and was generally effective. We do not

know why, but this did not take place. The idea was sound. The response was what may be called spotty, at best. Some good was done. It was not nearly enough.

These are immediate, practical steps that churches can take, and they cry out for heart and hand to help. We need, still stronger than it can now be heard, the voice of the church in the fight for racial and religious tolerance and against the hatred and discrimination that exist all around us.

These are burdens of responsibility for social action that do not and should not rest on churches alone. They weigh heavily upon all of us in this critical hour in world history. But they are causes that should appeal most forcefully to men and women who profess the good will for all that is a part of true religion. We who are laymen of the church, in one creed or another, await a leadership that puts the church nearer the battle line in this urgent hour.

4. Hear, O Israel: Jehovah our God is one Jehovah:

Lesson Interpretation

How do we place words upon the heart?

By holding them in mind and meditating upon them, probing their full meaning, until they become impressed upon the subconsciousness. The heart is the center of our deepest feelings.

What words are worthy of holding

this supreme position?

Words of Truth, embodying the law of life.

What is the primary truth of life? The unity of Being, namely our unity with the Supreme Being through aspiration and faith. "Jehovah our God is one Jehovah: and thou shalt love Jehovah."

Besides the full strength of the heart and soul what else is required of us in the keeping of the first commandment?

All our resources. This includes the weight of our influence over our children as well as our example to them and definite teaching of Truth to them, since they are our direct responsibility. In addition it includes the strength of our character and our daily living so as to express our character truly.

Should the commandment to write the words of the law upon the doorposts and upon the gates, as well as to bind them as a sign upon the hand and for frontlets between the eyes, be taken literally?

This part of the commandment is entirely metaphysical. We understand by it that our mind is to be pervaded by the thought of God until that thought irradiates our whole life.

What makes the fulfilling of the moral and divine law easy for us?

The Spirit of the Christ within us or the love of Truth and the consciousness of the good. "I [the Christ] came not to destroy, but to fulfil."

What irrevocability is indicated in

the words "Till heaven and earth pass away, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass away from the law, till all things be accomplished"?

The inescapable nature of Truth of which our own nature is compounded. We must come to a full knowledge of Truth and to a faithful expression of it in life before we can fulfill our divine destiny.

Who is the "least in the kingdom of heaven"?

He who, out of the clearer understanding that he gains by keeping the divine law, makes the smallest contribution to the good of all and the progress of all.

What qualification do the majority of persons lack for entering into ever nal life?

Willingness to give up the temporal and the personal for the enduring and the spiritual. Since no one can have both at the same time, each must choose for himself.
