A FRIEND of mine who was a prisoner of war in Manila for over three years was the marvel of all who knew her, because she emerged from internment frail in body but more beautiful than she had ever been before and a tower of strength spiritually. A woman of superior intelligence and culture, she was forced to endure the hardship of prison life with no privacy whatever, being always under the eyes of the guards. Yet she

was able to commune with God, she said, at any time, whenever and wherever she chose.

She had been a student of Truth for many years previous to her imprisonment and had experienced God's protective and healing power over and over. She knew how to abide in His love, but no one could deny that this was the most powerful test she had ever had to meet. That she was able to meet it and come out serene and

triumphant was the result of her faith and understanding and the years she had spent previously in proving and putting into practice the teachings of Christ. They were her rod and staff in her time of need.


Her knowledge of Truth seemed to be the only consolation of her anxious relatives. "She knows Truth," her sister kept repeating. That gave her the strength to bear with patience the long years of silence between them. During her internment my friend was never at any time the victim of persecution or cruel treatment in the prison camp, because she never recognized the power of the enemy over her. She knew that because she was abiding in God nothing could harm her.

She resolved to obey the laws laid down by her captors, to "render . . . unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's." When the American planes began to fly again over the Philippines the prisoners who looked up at them were punished. My friend stood still wherever she happened to be and bowed her head, and lifted up her heart to God in praise and thanksgiving for the help she knew would come.

Wrote John, the beloved disciple, "If ye abide in me, and my words also abide in you, ask whatsoever ye will, and it shall be done unto you." When we abide in God's love we stand upon holy ground, and nothing can hurt us, for we are always under divine protection. We can be delivered from whatever it is that binds, a prison camp or a prison of our own making, when we stay in God's love. But as we must turn on the faucet if we wish the water to flow, so must we establish conscious contact with God if we are to reap the promised blessings. We have our part to do also.

"Act as if you were a success," an inspirational writer says. To act is to set in motion. When we act as if we are abiding in God we set into motion

the good we are seeking. We are not fooling ourselves, as the skeptic may surmise; we are not trying to hypnotize our mind into believing something false. We are simply laying hold of a fundamental truth. There never was a great work of any kind that was not first born in the mind of its creator and then acted upon or set into motion, whereupon the manifestation followed. If it had remained in the mind as an unfertile seed remains in the soil, nothing would have come of it, and the world would have been poorer.

I have seen the tragic, hopeless look in the eyes of one who in her despair confessed that she did not know which way to turn, it never occurring to her that she had only to turn within to God.

I have not always known God as I know Him now. I was not taught that He was interested in me as an individual or that He was at all concerned about my little personal problems. For me the Bible was a closed book. I did not know how to interpret the great Truths written there. When I began the study of Truth, I was amazed; for

It changed my whole life just as it has changed the lives of millions who have found the abiding love of Christ. I had not the faintest conception of what was in store for me when I began to learn of this new God who had been a stranger to me for so many

"God is love," wrote John. He knew the truth of that statement because he was one of the disciples of Christ. He walked and talked with Him and was a witness to those seeming miracles which Jesus performed in the name of love. John knew that in abiding in that love, through Jesus, he was resting in the very essence of Godhood, because Jesus said to him and to the others, "For all things that I have heard from my Father I have made known unto you." Jesus wished to share with them and with those to come, His own realization of the love that God bore for him, for He said, "Even as the Father hath loved me, I also have loved you; abide ye in my

According to tradition the apostle

John in his later days, when he no longer went about preaching the word of God, was carried daily into the market place in Ephesus. The people would gather around him to hear his message. It was always the same. "My little children, love one another: for love is of God." When a bolder one asked why he never told them any. thing else his answer was, in effect, that love is the sum and substance of the gospel, and when this is done all is done.

"There is no fear in love," John said. There cannot be if one trusts God wholly. I know one who was always afraid. She was afraid of the future, which did not belong to her anyway but to God. She could never let go of her worries and fears. She did not dare turn them over to God. much as she longed to be rid of them. So they multiplied and they limited her development and inhibited her life. Perfect love casteth out all fear, At first she took that statement with out much hope of help, but she was faithful to the silent hour. As she had been tenacious in clinging to her fears, so was she tenacious in this new desire to be free.

I have known strong-willed people who held stubbornly to their wrong beliefs, but when they did turn their faces to the light, they used the same determination to embrace the good. They became worderful students of Truth when their will had been directed into the right channels.

For a time nothing happened to show her that she was making progress, except in little things, but she was encouraged even by the little things and kept on strengthening her faith day by day. The time came when she experienced a great sorrow in the loss of a loved one and her whole life had to be readjusted. She faced the problem of living alone in a large house or going to a hotel or an apartment. This she did not wish to do, for she loved her home and garden. "Well, then," she said to herself, "I cannot live here and be afraid all the time." So she called upon her faith. Perfect love casteth out all fear. Soon she was able to go through the night without being afraid.

Then came another test when she was held up one dark night by two masked men. She stood still, and it seemed to her that a great protective power was all around her. She was

not conscious of praying, but only of a deep quietness within her. Then she saw the hand that held the gun waver and drop, then the sound of feet running away from her. "Of whom shall I be afraid" when I abide in God's

When we abide in God we have the right to appropriate all of His good if we believe—and we can—in His promises. They are not just beautiful, meaningless words strung together without reason or purpose. They are for us to use and to live by, as my friend in the prison camp used them to the glory of God. They have been proved time and time again by those who believed.

World War II is over but there seems to be unrest and insecurity throughout the world in spite of the fact that there is an abundance of money and material goods. We need a better understanding of Christ's doctrine of love, and we in turn have our part to play in serving as a channel for that love to flow outward to our fellow men regardless of race, creed, or color. We have found nowhere in the Bible that any distinction was ever made between us. We are all the children of God. Racial hatred and prejudice are apart from God. They are man-made.

There is never any shortage of God's love. We need not be afraid that in giving we shall deplete our resources or have less. Love grows and multiplies like the loaves and fishes. It shines like a candlelight in a dark and windless place, a light to light the world. We can share that love of God with our fellow men and the less fortunate peoples of the world. We need nothing else to live by, for love is truly the sum and substance of the gospel, of everything!

A Song unto the Lord By Christine Mabry

"OME on, Mother," called Margie. "It's time for us to sing." I hastily dried my hands and went into the living room where my three daughters were waiting at the piano for their usual evening of "singing songs unto the Lord."

"This one first," said my youngest, as she opened the book to "There Is Sunshine in My Soul Today."

After we had had about half an hour of singing the girls went to bed relaxed, happy, and quiet. But it wasn't always that way. I recall that before we began the song program the children seldom wanted to go to bed. Instead they wanted to play, listen to the radio, or enjoy a noisy game. Usually they became so stimulated it was a big task to quiet them. And sometimes (I dislike to admit it now) I would become irritated and cross, which led to more confusion and occasional tears.

After one such strenuous evening I said to myself, "Bedtime should be a happy time. What can I do to make it that way?" Then I remembered how lustily the youngsters sang in Sunday school, how they hummed or sang around the house while doing chores or getting ready for school. I decided upon a new approach. I sent a dollar to Unity in Kansas City and asked for the Unity Song Selections. The day the book arrived I was feeling depressed. The children were at school. Listlessly I opened the songbook and still listlessly began playing a few of my old favorites. In a little while I was having a wonderful time singing all by myself. My depressed feeling had vanished. I was on top of the world, happy, joyous, free from the worries that had assailed me. However it took a few more similar experiences to teach me that it was my "song unto the Lord" that had lifted me from the unhappiness that tried to engulf me.

That night after the dishes were done and the girls ready for some relaxation I remarked casually, "Suppose we do a little singing tonight before

you go to bed."
"Let's do it now," eagerly responded
my eldest. I brought out the songbook
while she opened the piano. I started
to play, the girls gathered around, and
before we knew it it was bedtime. We
had given a thorough workout to such
songs as "Truehearted, Wholeheart-

ed." "Keep the Heart Singing," "I Love to Tell the Story," and "Bringing in the Sheaves." They have good ringing tunes and we sang them with gusto.

Beginning that evening, and with few exceptions every evening since, the children "make a joyful noise," and the problem of getting them to bed quickly and quietly has been solved.

That's not all. I have learned that singing is another way to teach children to "come before his presence with thanksgiving." Also they just naturally want to use good words after learning "Wonderful Words of Life." I know that songs such as "More Like the Master" make vivid impressions upon young minds, and the striving to fulfill that ideal is reflected in their behavior. "The Prayer of Faith" is an old stand-by, and when that song is followed by "Sweet Hour of Prayer," prayer time means more and gives the children that secure feeling of being close to God as they cuddle down for sleep.

The singing my children are doing now will help them in later life too. They have already learned that "God Will Take Care of You" is not just a group of pretty words but a living, breathing fact, that "My Faith Looks Up to Thee" means exactly what it says, or that "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" is convincing proof they are never alone.

The money spent for the songbook is the best investment I ever made. It has given me as well as the children a firmer foundation in Truth. Now when an annoyance tries to get a foothold in my consciousness, before it has a chance to get any bigger I burst into song. It doesn't make any difference whether I am washing dishes or clothes, ironing, cooking, or cleaning house, when that bugaboo tries to make an appearance, I chase him away with a song while I continue my work. If I can't think of a song that fits my particular need, I sing "Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow." It never fails to work. After a few minutes of singing my fears vanish, my doubts flee, my heart is lifted, and I have the "Blessed Assurance" there is such a thing as "Wonderful Peace."

Things to Be Remembered

* Perfect Relaxation

REMEMBER that tensions and inhibitions in the mind disturb the body functions. They are opposed to good health because they interfere with the normal, free-flowing life of God through the body.

Relaxation of the mind frees the body from tensions and inhibitions and

thus promotes good health.

Man is normally relaxed in mind and body because he was created that way. After God had made him He pronounced him good, according to the Bible story of creation, which is an allegory portraying the original creative Mind at work.

It is man himself and not God who disturbs the perfect working of the machinery of a man's mind and body. It is man who causes tenseness and inhibition in his own mind, body, and affairs. When a man's mind functions normally, it is quick, alert, and accurate, and his body enjoys normal health and activity. Normal conditions are in perfect accord with God's wise plan. It is man himself that disrupts the workings of this good plan. It is man who throws the monkey wrench into the divinely built machinery of his body.

A man's own fear and worry thoughts are like sand dropped into the delicate gears of his body machinery, perhaps causing his heart to skip a beat or so, or his eliminative proc-

esses to be retarded.

The ideal man is the Christ. Call Him by any name you choose, but He is the perfect man that God created in the beginning. That man is the living pattern back of every individual. To the degree that this perfect-ideal man is permitted to have free expression in and through an individual to this degree will the individual become relaxed and normal in mind and body. To the degree that an individual ignores this ideal man and indulges in his own selfish thoughts and personal, willful practices will he become tense and unnatural.

In the Christ consciousness a man is free and normal. In personal consciousness he is in bondage to his own limited and ignorant devices. To sing correctly a person must learn to relax

his throat, jaws, and other physical parts that affect his vocal organs. This is first a mental process. One's voice must be free from all self-consciousness and tenseness in order to function properly. To write well and rapidly one's fingers and the muscles of one's forearm must be relaxed and free. To play golf the player's muscles and mind must be relaxed so that there can be co-ordination between them.

A person learning to drive an automobile usually clutches the steering wheel so tightly that his fingers become numb. He soon learns to relax however and as he relaxes he becomes a better driver.

The stomach must be relaxed in order to do its work properly. This is true of the heart also. Worry interferes with the digestion of food because it causes the mind and stomach to become tense. To think clearly one's mind must be relaxed. The man whose mind is paralyzed with fear cannot think of the right thing to do to save himself.

If a man were to begin relaxing every part of his mind and body in detail he would have a very great task before him, but when he realizes that there is one key that will unlock the tenseness of every part of his body he will be able to relax with less effort.

This key is Christ.

Let Christ, the perfect man, have His perfect way in you. You can easily put all your functions and organs through the freeing process by letting Christ assume the burdens of worry, fear, doubt, anger, and so forth that you have saddled upon your mind and body. Open the way for Christ to come into all the departments of your being and they will be freed from tension.

Jesus, the individual, said, "Not my will, but thine, be done," which is the attitude that each one of us must assume in order to relax thoroughly. For instance, when we meet a tough problem in our business affairs our first reaction is likely to cause us to become excited, angry, fearful, or disturbed. These blinding, weakening emotions can be avoided if we will become quiet and say silently, "The will of Christ is being done in me." Then our mind will

be set free to think clearly and constructively about the situation, and we shall thus be able to think out a war to meet the problem in a satisfactor manner. But if we let the human will have its way we shall run into all kinds of difficulties because our mind will not work clearly enough to see the right solution.

Today Christ in you is your hope of glory in every situation that arises in your life, whether it concerns your health, your happiness, or your association with others. The manifestation of Christ in a man will not make of him a goody-goody or a "holier-than-thou" person but will cause him to be a real natural, lovable, co-operative, neighborly individual who minds his own business and yet is ready to give friendly advice if called upon for it. But above all else he will express by thought, word, and deed the freedom of God's ideal man.

The normal life is the Christ life. One living the free Christ life brings peace and good will into the world about him. Those who are living according to the human, personal standard are adding to the confusion of the world. Christ is the light of the world, and He will help every man who calls upon Him to become also a glowing filament to light the world. When you let Christ have His perfect way in you you are the light of the world.

Let your light shine, and so be wise, happy, healthy, and prosperous.

Personnel at my husband's office were being moved from place to place with little notice, and the general feeling was one of dissatisfaction and resentment and worry. Never for a moment did I let myself become concerned about it. I had perfect confidence that if we were to be moved we should be allowed time to sell our home and buy one in our new location. One afternoon my husband told me that a suggestion of his had been approved at the office and in appreciation we had been granted all the time we needed to make the necessary preparations for our move and that we could move "whenever we were ready." It was hard for many people to understand how such an unprecedented favor could be granted, but I knew joyfully that all things work together for good for those who love the good.

We put our house on the market the day I received my first prosperity bank. In three days it was sold at exactly the price we asked and under satisfactory terms for

all concerned.

We were ordered to move to W-Before we set out we heard on every hand how impossible it would be to locate a house. I assured everyone that I thought it would be lots of fun looking, and I was sure we would have no difficulty in finding one. Every time I thought of the matter at all I thought, "It is in God's hands."

When I tried to picture our new home I could not quite decide what I did want. We knew that we needed four bedrooms and that an extra room on the first floor is a big convenience with three children, but for the amount we had to invest this

seemed a great deal to ask.
Finally I wrote a letter to God, following a suggestion in a WEEKLY UNITY article that had greatly appealed to me. Lesson Interpretation

Why are we warned especially gainst bearing false witness against neighbor?

A person may be untrue to himself without realizing that he is so, but he cannot be false to another in his heart without intention. Neither can he be true to himself so long as he does not

speak the truth to others or about others. He learns objective truth first, then subjective truth.

What besides true words is necessary to the telling of truth?

Our meaning and intention must match our words and be expressed by them. Otherwise insincerity robs our words of all truth, making them deceptive and hypocritical. "Fervent lips and a wicked heart" must be understood according to the intent of the speaker.

What reaction is experienced by the one who practices untruth and deception?

He experiences in himself the results of the falsity that he practices toward others.

"Whoso diggeth a pit shall fall therein;

And he that rolleth a stone, it shall return upon him."

How is the impulse to speak falsely overcome?

By developing love of the truth for its own sake, and such entire loyalty and devotion to the Christ that all fear of the personal consequences of speaking the truth disappears from mind.

Can truth be divorced from confidence and trust?

It cannot be, for it inevitably inspires both. Neither can confidence and trust survive falsity.

What is signified by Peter's denial of Jesus?

When faith in divine principle or the I AM (Christ) is not firmly grounded or is yet unstable, it may weaken under the pressure of adverse circumstances. Peter's denial of the Nazarene symbolizes immature faith that wavers in the face of human fears.

What is required to recall faith to its allegiance?

A word of Truth is sufficient. "Peter

remembered the word which Jesus had said . . . And he went out, and wept bitterly."

How does active love in the heart prevent such failures of faith?

Love holds in remembrance the truth that it is the mightiest power in life, and in the presence of such conscious power faith is strengthened to the point of holding firm.

To Be Held in the Silence

The Spirit of truth is the mainspring to my thoughts, words, and acts, and through it my life is held true and upright.

(The lesson for next Sunday is from Exod. 20:17; Prov. 11:23, 24; Luke 12:13-21.)

The moral law must be obeyed if man is to real ize his potentialities. Religion must make the nature of that law clear, and give to man the ideals for which he is ready to give himself. Thus man turns to revelation for his absolutes, and to research for the tools with which to rear the structure of his ideals. In Christ man finds the way, the truth, the life. In science he finds the means to walk in the way, to realize the truth, and to enrich the life. Ideals are meaningful for most men when beheld incarnate in other men.
