Ministry Can Be Hazardous...

A call to ministry is a high and holy one, but it can also be hazardous. Consider these statistics from the Spring 2014 issue of *Leadership Journal*:

80% of pastors are discouraged in their role as Pastors

40% of pastors seriously considered leaving the pastorate in the past 3 months

50% of pastors say they are unable to meet the demands of their job and are so discouraged that they would leave the ministry if they could, but have no other way of making a living

For every 20 pastors who go into ministry, only one retires from the ministry

45% of pastors say they experienced depression or burn-out to the extent that they need to take a leave of absence

Of 1050 pastors surveyed by the Schaeffer Institute, everyone of them-100%- has a close associate or friend from seminary who had left the ministry because of burnout, conflict in their church, or from a moral failure

70% of pastors say they do not have a single close friend, and the same percentage say they have lower self-esteem than when they entered the ministry

Denominational health insurance agencies report that medical costs for clergy are higher than the average professional group

These statistics may come as a shock to many readers. Clergy members who have or are experiencing some of the stated difficulties may think that the statistics are understated. Unfortunately, the following statement is sad but true, **“The church is the only army that shoots its wounded.”**

October has been designated as Clergy Appreciation Month. A resource guide is available online from Focus on the Family to aid in planning activities and congregational responses for the purpose of expressing honor, support and affirmation to pastors/staff and their families. The association can also make that guide available to churches.
