AMATEUR RADIO IN EMERGENCIES

Speakers: Ralph Brandt, Chairperson, SCTF Amateur Radio Working Group

Description: Amateur radio can provide significant operational communication capabilities to

both emergency and disaster situations. This workshop will provide an overview of the ARWG, including its operational capabilities, case studies where support has been provided, Amateur Puerto Rico development, a demonstration of both

data and message transmission, and Q&A.

BAD GUYS, BENCHMARKS AND BRIEFINGS

Description: This workshop is a fast paced look at new and emerging hazards and new

approaches to tactically work safe and maintain acute situational awareness when responding to such an event. Topics of discussion will range from "normal" day-to-day response operations, to current threats including illicit drug labs,

This workshop will put students in the "Hot Seat" and will be focused upon three areas: (1) Utilizing Recognized Prime Decision-Making skills; (2) application of risk-based response processes and eliminating the normalization of deviance; and (3) tools for the student toolbox that can be used to develop local SOP's and incident briefing protocols that can be used to ensure the delivery of a safe and effective response.

CORPORATE RISK FROM ACTIVIST AND EXTREMIST GROUPS

Speaker: John Sancenito, President, INA

Description: Activist groups target organizations in an attempt to influence their policies,

activities, or business decisions. While most groups use peaceful protests as a way of voicing their opinions, others resort to criminal activity to influence corporate decisions. No company is exempt from their focus or beyond their reach. Companies are often targeted because of their industry, environmental impact, or a perceived business relationship with a company who is the focus of

their campaign.

Social media has created a platform for these groups to organize activities, recruit new members and influence public opinion. Statistics will be used to show the increasing influence of activist groups and the risk they pose to corporations. Case studies will be used to show how activist groups organize, rally, and gather information on corporations they target. The insider threat posed by activists seeking employment with targeted companies will also be discussed.

Practical methods of managing risk from activist groups will be discussed. Legal strategies such as injunctions, civil action, local ordinance and criminal statutes will also be examined.

DEMYSTIFYING THE OPERATIONAL RESPONSE TO SYNTHETIC OPIOIDS, INCLUDING FENTANYL AND FENTANYL ANALOGS

Description: Synthetic opioids, including fentanyl and fentanyl analogs, are quickly becoming

the most common high hazard response. However, there are many ways that the overall risk can be managed. Recognizing and understanding the threat is critical to determining the appropriate response. Using the known facts about fentanyl and its analogs (such as solubility, toxicity, degradation pathways, and others), operational response protocols will be presented for detection, identification, protection from, decontamination, and destruction of fentanyl-based materials. These simple response protocols and resultant example operational guidelines will assist responders in safely and effectively responding

to this high hazard threat.

FIRE EXPOSURE STUDIES AND COMMUNITY MONITORING

Speaker: Christine Baxter, Ph.D., CEO – Emergency Response TIPS, LLC

Description:

Data collected from a variety of simulated fires and fire activities, including search and rescue, extinguishment, and overhaul, have shown that toxic combustion byproducts can be deposited onto protective clothing, penetrate the clothing, and be absorbed onto the skin. Post-fire procedures that reduce the exposure of fire fighters to toxic products of combustion are extremely important to overall exposure reduction. Recommended procedures involve turnout gear removal, isolation and cleaning of PPE; and, equipment cleaning and decontamination. After the fire, a variety of decontamination methods can be applied to reduce the overall risk. New decision support tools will be demonstrated to highlight levels of exposure and to identify appropriate decontamination and PPE laundering guidance. Finally, methods for monitoring community exposures will be addressed.

Description: Over the last several years there has been a nationwide push to legalize both the

recreational and medical use of marijuana. This new addition to the American pastime has created a new set of uncontrollable factors for both law enforcement and fire service personnel, including access, entanglement, high voltage and chemical hazards. In addition, booby traps have become increasingly more common at illegal grow operations. An unrealized consequence is the increased use of Butane Hash Oil. The processes, hazards and case studies covered during this workshop are designed to increase the situational awareness of responders. This workshop was originally developed to show historical data and decision-making processes used by the citizens of Colorado, lawmakers and

ultimately the Federal government.

PREPARING YOUR DISPATCHERS FOR ACTIVE VIOLENCE (Invited)

Speaker: Wayne Freeman, South Carolina Active Shooter & CCTA Program Manager

Description: Telecommunications is often overlooked as a critical resource during active

shooter incidents. This three-hour workshop addresses including dispatchers in every facet of improving your response and recovery. Topics will include: basic training for dispatchers, integrating telecommunications into tabletops and exercises, addressing training through grants, reunification and recovery efforts that affect your communications center, and preparing your employees for the aftermath of a violent event. This session is not just for dispatchers! Active shooter instructors from any response discipline should consider attending this session as instructor material is presented, allowing you to get your agency dispatch center involved in improving your tactical operations at the site. Workshop materials includes insights provided by Sandy Hook personnel, Aurora Theater Shooting telecommunicators, and other national incidents. Dispatchers, fire, EMS, law enforcement, and managers are encouraged to attend this session.

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PROTESTORS AND PROTESTOR DEVICES

Description: In recent years there has been an increasing use of protestor devices designed

to disrupt normal operations and activities, and create liability and extrication challenges for property / facility owners and the emergency response community. This session will review protest situations and scenarios, legal considerations,

RESPONSE TO EMERGING THREATS

ROADWAY INCIDENT SAFETY – A 2018 UPDATE

Description: The subject of Traffic Incident Management (TIM) and Responder Safety at

roadway incidents has received significant attention in the last few years. The Federal Highway Administration developed and distributed the SHRP 2 TIM & Responder Safety training program nationwide for multi-discipline audiences. Moreover laws exist in every state in the country, as standards and regulations have been developed to support roadway incident safety strategies and tactics. By all accounts we should be seeing fewer incidents, injuries and fatalities from struck-by-vehicle incidents involving emergency responders. But, we're not! Incidents are occurring with increased frequency and 2017 saw more Fire/EMS personnel struck and killed than we have seen in years. What else needs to be done to show real improvement? This session will explore what has been accomplished to date and more importantly, what still needs to be done to protect

emergency personnel at roadway incidents of all kinds.

During the past year, many new boards have been developed and added to the SCTF WebEOC system. The session will also provide users who have not yet used the boards, knowledge needed to put them to use. This session will be of interest to WebEOC users within the SCTF region as well as people outside the region or from State Agencies who would like to learn more about the range of boards (applications) that are available for managing incidents and other county / SCTF activities in the region. New or updated boards to be reviewed include: Checklist Board, SitRep Board, Asset Manager Board, School Status Board, Medical Aid Stations Board, Traffic Control Points Board, Damage Assessment Board, Road Closure Board, York County CARE Board, Shelters Board. Also, possibly covered will be a POD Board, and Battle Rhythm / Operations Tempo Board and the SCTF Incident log and new link to PEMA using WebEOC Fusion.

SPECIAL EVENT PLANNING FOR SMALL AND MEDIUM SIZED DEPARTMENTS

Description:

A local emergency manager, fire or police officer may be tasked to prepare for a local planned public event within their jurisdiction. The small / medium sized community will have to prepare to ensure community safety and consider potential contingent events that may occur within or due to the special event. This workshop will provide tools and ideas from the first-timer to the experienced Incident Commander with the planning process leading towards the development of an Incident Support Plan (ISP). Suggested processes for determining responsibilities, liabilities and legal requirements will also be discussed.

THE NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION SAFETY BOARD (NTSB) IS SHOWING UP AT YOUR INCIDENT...NOW WHAT?

This session will provide case studies of recent accidents and will provide information on what local government and public safety agencies can expect when an accident investigation team arrives on-scene. 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UAV'S IN THE SOUTH CENTRAL TASK FORCE: A PANEL DISCUSSION

Description: The use of small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (sUAS) in the public safety

community is growing exponentially. With the proliferation of sUAS into mainstream operations across multiple disciplines, public safety agencies at all levels of government are looking to harness the tremendous capabilities of sUAS to support their respective operations. Since sUAS operations require specific policies and procedures to support their use, appropriate equipment, and trained operators, the cost for each agency to stand up their own internal capability is prohibitive, especially for agencies which don't envision using sUAS on a regular basis. The SCTF UAV Working Group is looking at the development of a regional program to leverage state and local resources and develop standard training and operational policies. This panel will consist of Working Group members, as well as representatives from surrounding jurisdictions and organizations with existing programs, and will focus on existing programs and the

Working Group's progress to date.

UPDATE ON SOUTH CENTRAL PA MASS CASUALTY INCIDENT (MCI) PLAN REVISION

Description: A joint Working Group consisting of representatives from the Emergency Health

Services Federation (EHSF), the South Central PA Healthcare Coalition and SCTF will provide an update on the revision process to the Regional MCI Plan. In the first quarter 2018, the Joint Working Group will be holding public meetings and appear at other regional meetings to get stakeholder input into the MCI planning process. The goal of the Working Group is to have the revised MCI Plan

released by July 1, 2018.

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WEAPONS IN THE WORKPLACE AND DEALING WITH HOSTILE INTERACTIONS
