




WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?



The Man Who Wouldn't Give Up Freedom, Lance P. Sijan.

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In today's world we take almost everything for granted; the air we breath, the food we eat, and the place where we live. We expect these things to always be ours and we often fail to appreciate them. Our country has blessed us with many freedoms, freedoms which no other nation in the world can possibly equal. Unfortunately, for many of us, the only time that we realize what we have is when there is the possibility of losing our freedom. Some men, however—men of courage—are not willing to give up their freedom at any cost—even death. This is the story of such a man, Lance P. Sijan.

On the ninth of November 1967. Captain Lance Sijan was flying an F-4C aircraft on a mission near Vinh, North Vietnam. During the mission, Captain Sijan's aircraft was hit by enemy ground fire and he was forced to eject. For more than six weeks he was able to evade capture but his freedom was very costly. During this time, he suffered multiple and serious injuries of the left leg, a mangled right hand, a brain concussion, and severe lacerations; he was without food, suffering from shock and a weight loss to the point where every bone in his body showed through his skin.

On Christmas Day 1967, Captain Sijan was finally captured by North Vietnamese soldiers and taken to a holding point. At a time when only one soldier was guarding him, Captain Sijan, in his emaciated and crippled condition, overpowered the soldier, knocked him unconscious, and escaped into the jungle to be free once more. He traveled a distance of about two kilometers before he was apprehended and returned as a prisoner of war. Captain Sijan was taken from the holding camp to

another enroute camp near Vinh where he was kept in solitary confinement. On two different occasions Captain Sijan was interrogated by his captors. Despite torture, Captain Sijan successfully distracted and misled the interrogator—sticking to name, rank, and serial number.

On 6 January 1968, the Vietnamese commander detailed Lieutenant Colonel Robert Craner, another American captive, to care for Captain Sijan. At no time was Captain Sijan able to stand or even sit erectly without assistance. The next day, 7 January 1968, they embarked on the punishing truck ride to Hanoi, during which Colonel Craner believed that Captain Sijan was about to die or already had; however, each time Sijan regained consciousness and said that he was doing all right. He never complained about the unmerciful battering he was taking from the truck ride. During the ride, Captain Sijan mentioned the subject of escape many times, stating he was ready to give it another try.

In the Vegas section of Hoa Lo, his weakness continued as his wounds were unattended. He was only able to partake of a few spoons of food each day and only then with the help of a fellow prisoner. Captain Sijan requested help only to put his body in a sitting position in order to exercise his muscles to recondition himself for another escape attempt which he was eagerly anticipating. This act was particularly painful as both hipbones protruded through his skin; he had dragged himself through the jungle backwards on his hips because his broken left leg could not support his weight. Due to his extreme weakness, the adverse living conditions, the inadequate diet and insufficient clothing, Captain Sijan contracted Pneumonia on 18 January 1968. He was unable to lie down as he was continually strangled by the fluids in his air passage. Captain Lance Sijan was removed from his cell on the night of 21 January 1968 and died at Hoa Lo, as reported by his captors. Lance Sijan's battle for freedom had finally ended.

Although suffering from extreme shock, starvation, and grievous injury, Captain Sijan escaped from his captors without aid, steadfastly resisted his interrogators, never complained about his physical condition, and thought only of his next opportunity to escape. The dedication to duty and country exemplified by Captain Lance Sijan represented conspicuous heroism and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty and merits recognition through award of the Medal of Honor.

Freedom, to Lance Sijan, was more than just an abstract concept. It was something which he could feel and live for. He never gave up hope even though he was in a hopeless situation. And he never gave up his freedom or let it be taken away.

SPECIAL NOTE: On May 31st, 1976, the "New Dorm" was renamed Sijan Hall in the memory of his first USAFA Graduate to receive the medal of honor.

THE COMMANDANT OF CADETS

General Beck was born January 21, 1929, at Gilbert Arizona, and was graduated from Phoenix Union High School in June 1947. He studied for two years at Arizona State University in Tempe, and then entered the United States Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. He was graduated from West Point in June 1954 with a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission as an Air Force second lieutenant. He was awarded a Master of Science degree in Public Administration from George Washington University in 1964. He completed the Air Command and Staff College in July 1964 and the National War College in June 1971.

After graduation from West Point in June 1954, General Beck completed pilot training at Webb Air Force Base, Texas, in August 1955. Assigned to duty with the Strategic Air Command, he served at Forbes Air Force Base, Kansas, until June 1957. Following training in KC-135 aircraft, he served at Loring AFB, Maine, as a crew commander and squadron operations officer until August 1963.

After attending the Air Command and Staff College, General Beck was assigned to the United States Air Force Academy where he served on the Commandant's staff as an Air Officer Commanding and later as the Executive for Honor and Ethics. In July 1968 General Beck moved to Cannon AFB, N.M., and later that same year to Hurlburt Field, Florida, where he trained for duty in Vietnam as a forward air controller (FAC).

In Vietnam General Beck served as the Operations Officer, 20th Tactical Air Support Squadron. In this position he was responsible for managing both FAC and Air Liaison Officer resources supporting all ground forces of the U.S. Army and the Army of the Republic of Vietnam.

After returning to the United States in 1970 General Beck has held many command positions. He has served as Vice Commander of the 410th Bomb Wing, Commander, 19th Bomb Wing, Commander, 310th Strategic Wing, and the Commander of the 2nd Bomb Wing. Before returning to the Academy General Beck was assigned to the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. There he was Commander, Detachment 800, U.S. Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps, and professor and Head of Aerospace studies.

A command pilot with 4,000 flying hours, General Beck flew a total of 114 combat missions in Southeast Asia in OV-10, B-52 and KC-135 aircraft. His military decorations and awards include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster, the Presidential Unit Citation with one oak leaf cluster and the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award.

General Beck is married to the former Betsy Jean Frost of Newburgh, N.Y. They have two sons, Daniel W. and Hal E., and a daughter, Leslie. The Beck's have lived at the Academy since the General's appointment as Commandant of Cadets in August 1975.

Navigation

Along with the new planes, the Navigation Division also changed name. This former Navigation Department is now the Department of Aviation Science.


The Navigation courses at the Academy are both fun and rewarding. Navigation students learn the techniques of dead reckoning, radar, celestial, and inertial navigation. One gets a feeling of accomplishment at the completion of a successful mission. In addition to the academic side of the program, students get an appreciation of flying and a better understanding of what it is like to be in a regular operational unit. For these reasons, Navigation courses are among the most sought after courses at the Academy.

Soaring

In the thin air of a Colorado sky a metal bird circles lazily. Under the billowy white of a cumulus cloud it spirals higher and higher toward the cloud's base. The metal bird is a sailplane, and it is riding the thermal updraft that is forming the cloud. Soaring pilots, flying motorless aircraft, must depend on this naturally uplifted air to stay airborne for long periods of time. It requires a special degree of skill to find these invisible updrafts, a degree of skill not found in any other form of flying.

The soaring program at the Academy began in the summer of 1967. Twenty-one members of the class of 1969 were selected to participate in a Navigation/Soaring summer program. This program, in five weeks of training, gave the cadets half a day in class studying Navigation 470 and half a day at the Academy Airfield learning to soar. The cadets flew with officers from the Academy who were soaring instructors. Five of the students were awarded their Private Pilot's certificate.

From its somewhat meager beginning, the soaring program has evolved into one of the most motivational and enjoyable programs at the Academy. This past summer approximately 150 thirdclassmen went through soaring training and received their Pilot's license.


The soaring program, however, did not end with the start of the academic year. In many ways it was just a beginning. The twenty instructors in the program were kept busy throughout the year giving orientation rides to the fourth class. The flights, lasting about twenty minutes, always passed too quickly. In those few short minutes you get a feeling of complete freedom. It is as if you were a bird, free to go wherever the wind might take you. After a soft landing the ride is complete and the plane is prepared for yet another flight.

This year saw many new changes to the soaring program. After receiving a new coat of red, white, and blue paint, the planes were set for the bicentennial year. The soaring program, under the leadership of C1C Mike Byron, participated in the Black Forest Glider Meet. The newly formed team met stiff competition and failed to place, however.

Perhaps the biggest change the program saw this year was the training of ATO's which was accomplished during the late Winter and early Spring months. The ATO's entered the program enthusiastically but unfortunately the weather did not accommodate their eagerness. Finally, the weather proved cooperative and,

in June, 2d Lt. Beth Goolsby became one of the first Air Force women to solo in a sailplane.





Parachuting

This year the Academy had one of the best parachute teams in its history. Composed of first and second classmen, the team traveled around the country participating in meets and demonstrations. They participated in fifteen meets and demonstrations in all. Their hard work and efforts were well rewarded as the team captured first place honors in the Collegiate National Meet, making our team the best collegiate parachute team in the country. The jump team, headed by Joe Wysocki, also had the opportunity to travel to Florida this year to compete in the Military Jumpfest '76 parachute meet. Although there were no team awards given, USAFA performed well and individual members of the team were among the better jumpers in the competition.

Not all of the parachute program is fun and glory.

For every competitive jump there are literally dozens of practice jumps. It takes many hours of hard work to finally prepare for a meet. Parachute team members spend virtually every afternoon and every weekend down at the "loft" perfecting their skills.

In addition to the competition, members of the jump team instruct the basic freefall parachute course, AM 490. After ground and tower training, students get the opportunity to make seven freefall jumps. It is a frightening experience to sit in the door of a plane and feel the wind blow in your face. After a few jumps, however, the novice student gains confidence in himself and the apprehension associated with parachuting lessens. At the completion of the program the student is awarded his well deserved "badge of courage".

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Underwater Demolition Training

Underwater Demolition Training—the name sounds formidable—but then, so is the program. Coronado Naval Amphibious Base in San Diego, California is the location for this three week summer program. During this course, cadets learn the basics of scuba diving and naval launch and pick up techniques over water.

Competition for this much sought after program begins at the Academy around March of every year. Applicants take a rigorous physical test composed of swimming, pullups, pushups, sit ups, squat thrusts and a one mile run. Those who score highest by swimming and running in the least amount of time, as well as completing the greatest number of exercises are selected for the approximately 40 slots. But the best—or hardest part is yet to come—when the new "Roger Ramjets" (as they're affectionately called by the Naval personnel at Coronado) finally arrive in San Diego.

The dormitories are located right on the beach—not more than 75 yards from the sometimes icy waters of the Pacific Ocean. The next three weeks are going to be a blur of sand, water, and pain. The cadets train in this Navy program with approximately five midshipmen from the Naval Academy at Annapolis. The cadets and midshipmen receive basically a course that is an abbreviation of the Navy's extensive and demanding training for "frogmen"—SEALS as they're known in the

Navy. Graduates of this SEAL training are the instructors for the UDT program, and they demand no more from anyone else than what they themselves are prepared to give—and that is considerable.

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A typical day for a UDT student begins at about 0600 with a short ½ mile jog to and from breakfast. Then an hour or two of physical conditioning—comprised of the most excruciating and deviously designed exercises that are topped off by at least a two mile run along the beach. After this, the real training begins: classroom lectures, practical applications with scuba equipment, and most importantly dives off the Pacific Coast. The days pass quickly, but soon, confidence cautiously appears, tans are commonplace, and the cadets have swum on the bottom of the Pacific and returned to the relative safety and security of dry land—mission completed.

Upon graduation from the Underwater Demolition Training, the cadet receives a card from the National Association of Underwater Instructors that certifies he has completed a course in underwater scuba diving, and enables him to obtain scuba equipment wherever it's available. But the graduates of UDT have received much more than just this card—they have a justifiable pride in completing this demanding and satisfying program.



Parasailing

During this past summer visitors to the Academy had the opportunity to see an unusual sight, a truck pulling a parachute. Parasailing, a relatively new program at the Academy, was conducted during the summer months at the Academy airfield. All members of the class of '79 had the opportunity to participate in parasailing as a part of their basic training.

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
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




Drill And Parades

The Cadet Honor Guard

The Cadet Honor Guard is the newest competitive activity in the Cadet Wing. Composed entirely of Fourthclassmen, the Honor Guard participated in two intercollegiate drill meets in the Spring of 1976. The results were impressive. In the first meet in which it participated, The Governor of Arizona Invitational Drill Meet, the team took a first place in exhibition and a fourth place overall. One month later in the Lone Star Invitational Drill Meet, the Honor Guard once again put on a superlative performance. They placed third in basic drill and received first place in both exhibition and overall performance.

From his routine announcements, to his commander's calls, Jack J. Catton was one of the most visable, energetic, and communicative Wing Commanders at USAFA.

Born in Spokane, Washington, Jack traveled extensively as he grew up, living in such places as Nebraska, California, Georgia, Florida, and Illinois. The son of an Air Force Officer, Jack has always known the military life. Over his four years at the Academy Jack has always given of himself and shared his experiences with others. He is often outspoken and always interesting.

Looking back on his cadet years, and this past year in particular, Jack's philosophy has been that the Air Force Academy has two basic missions. First, to teach discipline, especially under the unique kind of pressure cadets have experienced as fourthclassmen, and, Jack feels, we may experience again in a cockpit environ-

ment. The second mission which Jack sees is the teaching of leadership through practical experience. This is accomplished during the time as an upperclassman.

In describing his year as Wing Commander, Jack feels the Academy has made great strides towards a freer reign, where cadets themselves were tasked with the responsibility of running the wing. The method he tried to use to accomplish this goal was simply a policy of "more responsibility to more cadets." The problem Jack saw this year with this idea is that every cadet mus "tow the line," and some have taken advantage of the new situation. However, these few were the exception to the rule, and Jack feels the Academy has made and will continue to make great strides in perfecting this ideal.



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The future of the Academy, according to Jack, lies in letting cadets have the time they need to use the tools of leadership they are given. The problem for the cadet in the past has been balancing academic and military obligations. The solution, Jack believes, is having a specific time set aside each day for the conduct of squadron business.

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He feels cadets are capable of accomplishing both academics and military without hurting either.

On the subject of freedom, Jack is outspoken. He

sees the military's role in our society as "providing a viable defense of the freedoms we've cherished for 200 years." And he continues, "For me freedom is everything." As far as sacrificing personal freedoms in the military environment, Jack says "You may give externals—your time, choice of location, time with your family, but these are little things compared to the much more important freedoms such as personal morals or convictions which you save." And Jack concludes emphatically, "It's worth it."

Prepares For Women

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"Women at the Air Force Academy" is no longer a topic for debate in either the halls of Congress or the halls of the cadet dormitories. The idea has been a reality since President Ford made it law in October 1975 and women have been a part of our community since the January 1976 arrival of fifteen women Air Training

Officers (ATO's).

Women have been a part of our heritage as long as there has been anything to call heritage. The second chief of the French Air Service was a woman. Marie Armant Blanchard was named to that position in 1804 by Napoleon. Madame Blanchard commanded the emperor's balloon force, the largest in the world at that time. In our aviation heritage, an American woman, Aida de Acosta, soloed in France, in a powered aircraft the summer before the Wright brothers. The year 1911 saw both the certification of the first military pilot, Lt. Benjamin D. Foulois, and the licensing of the first American woman pilot, Harriet Quimby.

World War II saw the service of a group of women who are, in a historical sense, the predecessors of our women cadets, just like the Air Force aviation cadets of the same period were the forebearers of the Academy's twenty all-male classes. The Women's Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) came into being in 1942 under the direction of Jacqueline Cochran. These women underwent training similar to that of the Air Force Cadets of that era. Their training took place at Avenger Field in Sweetwater, Texas. After graduation, WASPs towed targets, ferried bombers and fighters, and performed other non-combat flying duties. Many WASPs ended up flying as many as sixteen different types of aircraft and

background of heritage. Their heritage is that of women in aviation and the military as well as the heritage which we have always regarded as our own. The train-





The fifteen ATOs were hand-picked from a number of volunteers among women officers in the Air Force. At the time they reported to the Academy in January, their length of service ranged from two and a half years to just a few weeks. All but one were second lieutenants. Commissioned from ROTC and OTS, ATOs had served in such diverse career fields as maintenance, air traffic control, computers, and information.

The ATOs have a heritage that is unique. The term "Air Training Officer" was coined in 1954 to identify the young Air Force Officers who served as surrogate upperclassmen for the first three classes at the Academy. These officers were also from varied backgrounds which included such schools as The Citadel, Virginia Military Institute, and the United States Military Academy at West Point.



The basis of the ATO program is to provide a professional role model for our women cadets. ATOs will also conduct training in areas and at times that male cadets are not available. In order to assume the role of upperclasswomen, ATOs began an intensive training program designed to familiarize them with cadet life

and the operations of the Wing.

The first phase of ATO training was a simulated BCT/Fourth Class year conducted by a cadet cadre. During this phase, ATOs were required to project themselves into the role of the basic cadet/fourthclassman. They learned, participated in physical training, performed basic details, followed decorum in Mitchell Hall and attended heritage lectures. There were morning runs as often as the January weather permitted. The training was also punctuated with the same types of anecdotes that evolve from BCT each summer. This first phase of training was a leadership laboratory for the First and Secondclassmen involved. It took a special type of professional performance in dealing with "trainees" who were women and already officers.









The next phase of ATO training consisted of Wing Operation. ATOs attended military studies classes with First, Second and Thirdclassmen, and took courses in airmanship and navigation. Their physical training continued with various sports activities. The ATOs also drilled. They ran their unit with a make-list adapted for the special situation, and positions rotated every two weeks. During this period, the ATOs also participated in a "shadow" program that allowed each of them to observe a flight commander or a squadron commander as he performed his daily duties. This program also gave them a chance to get acquainted with cadets in the squadrons. ATOs ate on squadron tables and attended squadron meetings.

In their last phase of training, the ATOs accomplished the field portion of Jacks Valley. There they went through the confidence course as well as extensive training in other areas. After completing Jacks Valley, the ATOs began SERE. Their SERE training included all of the academics, the Code of Conduct Laboratory, the static camp and the trek. After June Week, the ATOs took first period leave before returning to the Academy to greet the class of 1980.

Over 1100 women applied for the estimated 150 places in the class of '80. This means that those selected truly are among the finest college age women in America today. They will find the ATOs and the Wing well prepared for their training.

The signers of the Declaration of Independence knew, as few people do, the tremendous cost of freedom. When they affixed their signatures to the Declaration, they understood that defending and maintaining freedom was no easy task. There were no guarantees that any of their exertions would be rewarded, that their efforts would succeed. Similarly, when we graduate from USAFA, we are promised little but a chance to serve and to defend—to the death if necessary—the freedom which we have grown to love and honor. The Class of 1976 and the staff of Polaris salute our fellow Academy graduates who pledged and gave their lives in freedom's defense.





























Aeronautical Engineering

The Aeronautical Engineering major provides cadets with a background in an area of obvious relevance to the Air Force. Pilots, navigators, missile launch control officers, and aircraft and missile maintenance officers all deal daily with aeronautical engineering principles. A cadet in the Aeronautical Engineering major learns fundamental engineering by studying aircraft and jet engine performance and design. The major is a sequence of courses in which cadets may emphasize aircraft flight mechanics, propulsion, aerodynamics or structures. The principles learned have wide applicability to the Air Force and to society. Optional courses put cadets on a par with graduates from the leading engineering schools in the country.

The Aeronautical Engineering major is diversified and challenging. It is designed to emphasize the total Academy program, and it gives an officer a solid foundation upon which to build an Air Force career. And contrary to pepular belief, $A_e \times r_o = Total\ Drag$.

Astronautics And Computer Science

Of all the research projects done by the Astro department, two in particular highlighted this year. One of these was the development of an air-to-air combat simulator using a T-38 cockpit outfitted with a GT-40 display system as a Heads-Up Display. They are also assisting in the development of the Global Positioning Satellite system by performing portions of an independent satellite stability and control analysis. In classroom-oriented work, Astro majors launched their four foot model rockets to heights of over 5000 feet and speeds over Mach 2.

In the Comp Sci field, cadets on Comp Sci 495, in conjunction with NASA, designed a 3-D graphics display which measured the human body pressure of astronauts. Comp Sci majors also visited the FAA installation at Longmont to view their five IBM 360 systems, and various IBM guest lecturers spoke on future designs in computer architecture.





Behavioral Sciences And Leadership


The major in Behavioral Sciences provides the cadet with a facility for understanding human behavior, the capacity of handling human problems throughout his career as an Air Force officer, and the basis for his continuing development as a military leader. This year, many of the cadets majoring in this field worked with the children at Pine Valley Elementary School having learning problems. They worked with the Environmental Protection Agency in studying the effects of noise on people, and also built a T-41 simulator to see if they could psychologically determine how well individual cadets would be able to do the T-41 program. One of the more interesting 499 studies was a study on Kurlian photography—pictures of the energy radiating from your fingertips.



Chemistry and Physiology



the many problems that are faced by the chemist today.


The Chemistry major provides fundamental knowledge in analytical, inorganic, organic and physical chemistry. Each cadet is allowed to select one or two of these areas for advanced study. The Chemistry major emphasizes the use of laboratory methods for reinforcement of lecture material and individual research projects. Each cadet walks away from this department with a good background in chemistry and he is prepared for a junior officer position in research, development, or graduate training in chemistry, chemical engineering, or medical school. Besides, if he should ever find himself out of fuel in the middle of no where, he can quickly throw together some earth, fire, and water to get his F-4 back home.

The Life Science major is designed to provide the cadet with the basic concepts necessary to understanding the body's functions. It emphasizes the use of laboratory methods not only for reinforcement of lecture material but also for individual research projects. The Life Science major is intended for the student whose abilities and interests lie in the area of life science and its application to the aerospace mission of the Air Force. The Premed program and the immediate medical training upon graduation option have been discontinued. This program was last offered to the Class of 1977.

Civil Engineering,

Mechanics, and Materials

There are three majors offered by the Department of Civil Engineering, Mechanics, and Materials: Civil Engineering, Engineering Mechanics, and Engineering Sciences. These areas of study provide a well balanced program stressing the fundamentals common to many areas of engineering.

The Civil Engineering majors took part again this year in the annual concrete canoe contest at the University of Kansas. All of the schools involved did just what the name of the contest implies-they designed, built, and raced a concrete canoe. This year Texas A&M was the overall winner, but the Academy did take first place in design. Some new and unique courses are also introduced this year. One, CE 495, given in the fall, was a solar energy course where the cadets, along with some EE majors, built and experimented with a solar house. Then during the spring, a number of cadets continued their research with this solar house in their individual 499 courses and saw how this concept could or could not meet our future energy needs. The year ended with C1C Steve Heinz receiving the American Society of Civil Engineers award for being the outstanding CE graduate.

Besides the many theoretical and analytical courses, Mech majors can "get their hands dirty" in a number of interesting lab courses. In Mech 495 this year, the cadets built a 1929 Mercedes-Benz Gazelle replica out of fiberglass. They've built other cars in this course over the years, too—notably two Bradley GT's. In Mech 356, the metallurgy course, the annual final project is to make professionally molded, hardened, and tempered knife out of a car spring. One of the more popular courses among both Mech and non-Mech majors is Mech 395, Automotive Analysis. Here, cadets, in a very practical course, learn the theory behind the internal combustion engine and the nuts-and-bolts of the engine and the car itself.

Non-USAF Personnel







Economics, Geography and

Management

The highlight of the year for the Department of Economics, Geography and Management was the presentation of the 1975 "Modeling" award of the Department of Defense Economic Analysis Council to Major John S. Brush of the economics department. During his spare-time in 1974-75, Major Brush developed a mathematical model to predict inflation in the United States and Western Europe. Compared to the other inflationpredicting models developed over the years by all of the experts in the economic world, Major Brush's model is much simpler and is described as "deadly accurate." With this achievement, Major Brush has done more than receive an award, he has made a lasting impact for himself and the Academy in the world of economics. An economic colleague of Major Brush's predicts that, with his contribution, Major Brush will become one of the more well-known economists in the next few years.

This year the Geography side of the house has emphasized a number of field trips where cadets could apply their learned analytical concepts to real world situations. The 50 members of Geog 242 took a field trip to the Cripple Creek area where each cadet studied one aspect of the community (e.g. education, health, government). They then compiled their findings to create a very comprehensive geographic profile of Cripple Creek. Geog 495 went to Denver to conduct a similar study, while Geog 372 took its annual trip down to the Pueblo steel mill.



Electrical Engineering

Over the years the EE department has done a lot of work in support of the space program. For the Skylab program, the department developed a leg plethsmograph which measures the astronauts' blood pulses in their zero-G environment by measuring changes in their leg volume. The department also developed an EKG-triggered X-ray device which X-rayed the Apollo-Soyuz astronauts' hearts at specific instances in their heartbeat. This device determined whether there was any degeneration of their heart muscle after extended periods in a zero-G state. Last summer Lt. Col. Carroll went aboard the USS New Orleans to monitor the instrument during the Apollo splashdown. Back on earth, C1C Rich Lurhs built a large talking dog to help inhibited children. This large, stuffed animal is equipped with a transmitter-receiver unit which allows young children to openly express themselves away from adults.






Foreign Languages

In order to enrich its educational program, the Department of Foreign Languages always has a number of foreign exchange officers on the faculty who serve two year terms here. 

Focus On Freedom:

Academy Assembly Discusses Women's Roles

During the period 10 through 14 March, 1976, the United States Air Force Academy hosted and co-sponsored the Eighteenth USAF Academy Assembly. The participants considered the topic, "Women and the American Economy: A Bicentennial Appraisal." The Assembly consisted of plenary addresses, panel discussions by leading authorities in the field, and student round-table sessions devoted to consideration of the topic. Each year, the Cadet Wing, in conjunction with the Department of Political Science and Philosophy, hosts the USAF Academy Assembly. Approximately 90 undergraduates from 70 colleges and universities throughout the country gather for five days to consider a specific issue. Experts on each year's topic come to the Academy to speak to the student delegates or to participate in panel discussions. The students themselves conduct round-table sessions under the chairmanship of a knowledgeable senior participant. The interchange of ideas among the cadets, student visitors, and senior participants leads to the formulation of a final report on each year's topic. The student delegates prepare the report with the assistance of a Final Report Editor. The report is disseminated widely to governmental and academic institutions with interest in the Assembly topic. The USAF Academy Assembly is affiliated with and partially financed by The American Assembly which was founded by Dwight D. Eisenhower at Columbia University in 1950. The American Assembly has co-sponsored and supported each USAF Academy Assembly since 1959. Discussions produce fresh insights into the Assembly topic for use by students, academicians, and policy makers. The cadets and their guests leave the Assembly with new friends, new ideas, and in-depth knowledge of a current U.S. policy issue.














In the two core Law courses, the Department's goals are to familiarize the cadets with the Americal legal system, how freedom is protected through law and the principles of contracts and property. However, recent developments may open up such opportunities to future classes at the Academy.






The Mathematics Department is the largest in the USAFA faculty. In the core curriculum, each cadet takes courses in analytic geometry, single and multivariable calculus, introduction to vectors, matrix algebra, series, differential equations, probability and statistics. The core courses provide analytical and computational skills needed for engineering and science at the Academy as well as math knowledge essential for a career in our technologically oriented Air Force.

The Major in Mathematics is designed to provide a thorough background for analyzing and solving the complex, technical operational and management problems in today's modern Air Force. Sequences in analysis, applied math, and operations research provide breadth of training in fundamentals. Application of fundamentals is stressed through elective courses in other disciplines. This program provides excellent preparation for graduate work in mathematics, the physical sciences, engineering, and operations research. Fields in the Air Force open to Mathematics majors include technology research and systems development in the Air Force Systems Command, studies and analysis at the Air Staff, and operations analysis or scientific programming at any staff.

Physics



The two core courses in Physics develop the principles of Newton's Laws, sound, electricity, optics, and nuclear physics. Other courses in Physics include Laboratory Techniques, Statistical Physics, Electromagnetic Theory, and Quantum Mechanics. For someone interested in applied physics, there are Atmospheric Science courses. The major in Physics provides an excellent background for a wide range of technical assignments within the Air Force, particularly in the field of research and development. It also provides a sound basis for graduate work in physics, related applied sciences and a wide variety of engineering science disciplines.

The three required courses in Political Science cover the American Political System, the International Political System, and Defense Policy. Advance courses look at these topics in depth. The American Political System is covered from every angle, and politics of various nations are studied in detail.

The two required Philosophy courses cover moral philosophy, social philosophy, the philosophy of religion, and the philosophy of science. Students interested in this field can go on to study such topics as Philosophical Analysis, Symbolic Logic, Great Religions, and Ethics.

The major in International Affairs is designed to develop Air Force officers with comprehensive understanding of contemporary political problems and issues. Particularly suited to this major are careers in operations and command duties, plans, attache duty, and military assistance.




Directorate Of Instructional Technology

The Directorate of Instructional Technology is designed to aid cadets in learning and instructors in teaching. Freshman are required to take a one hour course to bolster their typing and reading skills. In addition to this, a short course teaching the proper use of various forms of audio-visual equipment is offered. However, when most cadets hear DFIT they think of the "Self-Help Room." Here cadets can make visual aids, signs, projects, and posters for classroom or squadron use. In addition to the "Self-Help Room", DFIT offers an extensive film and slide library. These films and slides are available for academic and military training purposes. The films range from historical documentaries to "Lucy Comes to the Academy." Some other functions of the Directorate of Instructional Technology include photography and filmmaking. The photography department processes film for nearly every office within the Academy, and some of the photos in this book were taken by DFIT. In the film-making branch DFIT makes and shows films for all of the departments in Fairchild Hall. They show films over television monitors by means of video-tape. As you can see the Directorate of Instructional Technology is involved in a wide variety of fields. Try to imagine what our classes would be like without video-tapes, television and films. The Library

The Library's book collection covers all fields of human activity. It is designed to support the academic curricular areas, and advanced research. The collection is arranged according to the Library of Congress Classification system and is shelved in open stacks for direct patron access. Books on a variety of subjects not directly related to the curriculum, including recreational reading, are also available. The Library receives over 2,000 general magazines, including professional journals, military periodicals, and foreign language publications to support curricular and recreational reading needs of the cadets, faculty, and staff. The current periodicals area on the east end of the fifth floor houses over 1,000 journals. In addition to this, the Library receives a selected list of newspapers, both United States and foreign. The Library is also a selective depository of U. S. Government Documents, and subscribes to most of the official record series of United Nations Documents. The microfilm reading room has military and aviation periodicals, complete files of the New York Times (from 1851) and London Times (from 1785), and other newspapers and books on microfilm.






Focus On Freedom: Col Malham Wakin

"Our television tubes glow with the images of Americans in high places introducing the ideals on which the nation was founded. Newspapers and magazines expose the crooked cop, the venal politician, the industrialist giving bribes, the lunatic with a gun-the appalling flakiness is all around us. Too often forgotten in our dismay are the country's strengths. One to take pride in is the host of dedicated men and women from grade to graduate school who are America's teachers. In 3,004 colleges and universities across the land, some 654,000 of them are preparing young Americans for productive and rewarding lives. As the fall term begins, PEOPLE has singled out 12 professors whom their students and their peers salute for excellence. Overlooked are some of greater fame or scholarly achievement, and countless others as worthy. Differing in age, in experience and in the subjects they teach, the 12 have only this crucial achievement in common: they reach their students. Because of these great teachers, some student's lives will be forever changed, and all of them will be better.

Col. Malham Wakin challenges his Air Force Academy students with a quote from H. G. Wells: The professional military mind is by necessity an inferior and unimaginative mind. Wakin, 44, has spent more than 16 years trying to prove Wells wrong. The Academy's first philosophy professor, he has built a nine-man department that teaches









courses in existentialism and Buddhism. (Wakin has also guided five daughters since his wife died in early 1974.)

Reared in Oneonta, N.Y., he graduated from Notre Dame in 1952, then did graduate work in education. He served as a navigator with an air rescue squadron in California before taking his Ph.D. at USC in 1959. Though he did a Vietnam tour in 1968 and wrote a Defense Department handbook-"The Viet Cong Political Infrastructure"-back at the Academy he brought in antiwar advocates as guest lecturers and introduced a course called "Morality of War." Says an admiring colleague, Colonel Wakin's personality and philosophy are summed up in a statement by Socrates: The unexamined life is not worth living."


Cadet "Skills Used For Spirit





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Composed of 100 men (no women, yet) from all over the United States, the Drum and Bugle Corps has gained national recognition as a musical representative of the Cadet Wing since its establishment in August, 1971. 



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


Honor/Ethics: Integrity





Extensive BCT Honor Instruction resulted in the Fourthclass having a better understanding of the Code than in past years. 



Competition And Freedom

New Director Of Athletics

Colonel John J. Clune became the Director of Athletics at the U.S. Air Force Academy Nov. 4, 1975.

Colonel Clune was born in Jersey City, N.J., Oct. 29, 1932. He is the son of Mrs. Martha V. Clune

of 367A New York Ave., Jersey City.

Colonel Clune was graduated from St. Peters High School in 1950 where he was named New Jersey All State in basketball. He received an appointment to the Naval Academy and was graduated in 1954 with a bachelor's degree in general engineering. He completed Squadron Officer's School at Maxwell AFB, Ala., in April 1959 and received his master's degree in electrical engineering from the University of Southern California in June 1964. He completed the Armed Forces Staff College in 1969 and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in 1972.

While at Annapolis Colonel Clune received basketball All America honors and still holds the single season and career scoring records there.

Colonel Clune entered the Air Force following graduation from Annapolis. His initial assignments included several years in administration and missile operations and maintenance. He served in Germany and Saudi Arabia from 1955-57 and returned to the United States as a missile officer instructor.

In July 1964 Colonel Clune was assigned as an electrical engineer with the Computer Division, Electronics Systems Division, Air Force Systems Command (AFSC), Hanscom Field, Mass. He was assigned to the Air Force Academy in July 1965 as an air officer commanding and junior varsity basketball coach.

Colonel Clune was assigned in April 1970 as Chief of AFSC's Electronics and Equipment Division, Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio. In June 1972, he became Chief of the Logistics Engineering Branch, Headquarters, U.S. Air Force, at the Pentagon. He was again assigned to the Air Force Academy in August 1975 as assistant athletic director.

Colonel Clune is rated a senior missileman. Among his military decorations are two Meritorious Service Medals and the Air Force Commendation Medal.

He and his wife, Patricia, reside on the Academy with their four children; Cathleen, 15, John, 13, Michael, 11, and Timothy, 9.



The Falcons, looking to end a five game losing streak, opened their 1975 football campaign against the University of Arkansas Razorbacks. Up against what Coach Ben Martin called the "- quickest team we've ever played," USAFA could not quite put together a scoring drive. The Razorbacks, on the other hand, had no trouble as they amassed 501 yards rushing and a formidable score.


Air Force got a slow start against the nationally ranked Razorbacks but did put together some good offensive drives in the second half to wind up with 213 yards rushing. Junior tailback Ken Wood once again led the team in rushing with 78 yards, most of it coming on a 50 yard scamper, the longest of his career. Reserve tailback Scott Bream gained 43 yards on seven carries while the Falcons' offensive leader was senior quarterback Mike Worden with 90 yards, 37 rushing and 53 passing.

Defensively, senior rover Ray Wild led the Falcons with nine tackles while junior linebacker Mark Kenney intercepted a pass. The Falcons suffered another defensive loss when senior reserve linebacker Tim Hass was sidelined for the remainder of the season with a knee injury.

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
Falcons Face Off . . . Cyclones

The Falcons traveled to Ames, Iowa to help the Iowa State Cyclones dedicate their new stadium. Trying to open their season with a win, the Cyclones pushed and shoved against a tough Falcon defense for two touchdowns and a 14-0 score. But the Falcon offense was not to be denied when, with six seconds remaining in the first period, Dave Lawson strode onto the field and proceeded to break the NCAA major college field goal record for distance with a 62 yard field goal. Fullback Scott Bream livened up an otherwise dull and fumble-plagued second half for both teams when he slashed through the Iowa State defensive line for a 60 yard gain, setting up a fourth quarter Air Force touchdown run by Ken Wood. This was the Falcons' first touchdown in eleven quarters of play. But despite this last minute excitement, the Cyclones managed to hold on for a 17-12 victory.

The Falcons came up with an inspired effort against U.C.L.A., trailing 13-3 at the half before rallying for 17 points in the third period. Offensively, the Falcons had their best effort so far this season presenting a very balanced attack in gaining 175 yards rushing and 162 yards passing. Of note was senior middle guard and linebacker Dave Lawson who kicked two more field goals, 38 and 58 yards, to boost his career total to 42, thus tying the NCAA record in that category. Additionally, tailback Ken Wood and quarterback Mike Worden each had 45 yards rushing while quarterback Rob Shaw paced the passing with 10 completions in 15 attempts for 87 yards and a touchdown (a seven yard pass to senior split end Frank Cox). The top pass receiver was flanker Craig Adams with five catches for 55 yards.


Defensively, senior rover Ray Wild was one of the top performers with eight tackles and a pass interception that he returned 36 yards for a touchdown. Junior linebacker Mark Kenney led the Falcons with 14 tackles while junior cornerback Jim Miller had 13 tackles and a pass interception.

All in all it was a great effort on the part of the underdog Falcons who fought valiantly throughout the game only to see UCLA come from behind and tie them 20-20.





Navy Downs Air Force 17-0



The afternoon was an unproductive nightmare as the Middies came up with the big plays offensively when it counted, and they came on stronger defensively as the game rolled on—allowing the Falcons only four yards total offense in the second half!

The Falcon's winless streak was extended to nine games and Air Force's zero ''total'' on the scoreboard gave Navy the distinction of handing Air Force its first shutout in 17 service-academy games. The game officials even helped the Navy cause by awarding them a free non-chargeable touchdown on a pass that clearly hit the turf in front of the receiver in the end zone early in the fourth quarter.







Junior tailback Dave Reiner was the top runner with 66 yards on 14 carries in addition to two pass receptions for 28 yards.




The Falcons finally put it all together this week as they whipped the Black Knights from Hudson High, 33-3. After spotting the Army offense three points early in the first period, the Falcon defense stiffened and did not allow another score all afternoon. By the end of the game the Air Force defense had recovered two fumbles and intercepted a couple of passes. One of those interceptions, by Jim Miller, led directly to an Air Force touchdown.

The Falcon offense was not to be outdone, however, as they scored on five of their first six possessions of the football. Throughout the afternoon the offense showed great balance by rushing for 176 yards and passing for 132 yards. All American Dave Lawson had another of his common record setting afternoons as he broke the NCAA record for career points scored by kicking that was previously held by Bill McClard of the University of Arkansas. Mike Worden also had a fine day, completing 12 of 14 passes for 88 yards and no interceptions. Rob Shaw backed him up well by completing six of twelve passes for 44 yards. Running back Dave Reiner was also a standout as he rushed for 55 yards and a touchdown.








Bad News Bears Visit Academy

With the Rose Bowl in their sights, the California Bears, led by Joe Roth, came to Falcon Stadium to take on Air Force in front of 35,770 Falcon fans. Bringing with them a national ranking of 16th, the Bears got on the scoreboard when their quarterback Roth hit Wesley Walker on a third down play for a 34 yard touchdown pass. After Breech's 51 yard field goal, which made the score 10-0, the Falcons put together their first successful drive of the contest with Ken Wood taking a 10 yard strike from Mike Worden and plunging over for the score. A 32 yard sprint by Muncie down the sidelines and a 63 yard pass to Walker, again, made the score 24-7 at the half. The Falcons matched the Bear's play in the second half with each team tallying a touchdown apiece-Tom Newton ramming in from the one for the Bears in the third quarter, and freshman Jeff Forster taking one in from the four in the fourth quarter after a Rosebush-to-Hoog 71 yard pass play. Although Dave Lawson was short on a 70 yard field goal attempt later in the game, Air Force defense did not allow anymore California scoring as they caught Roth behind the line four times, the most the Bear quarterback has been sacked this season. The final score left the Falcons behind again, however, putting their season record at a 2-7-1.


A Long Season Ends-Wyoming 24 Air Force 10

To add insult to injury, two Air Force turnovers were converted into Wyoming touchdowns.

That helped give Wild the Academy career tackle record of 337, breaking the mark of 331 set by Jim Morris during the 1971, 1972 and 1973 seasons.

Dave Lawson added four points to the game with his toe, bringing his career point total by placekicking to 231 and his career field goal total to 51. Both of these are national collegiate (major college) career records.

So despite the gloomy ending, the season did have its standouts. There are enough underclassmen on the squad to give plenty of promise for improved fortunes during the 1976 season, and to them we wish the best of luck.






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

After the tremendous performance of the 74-75 Air Force hockey team which posted a 24-5-1 record, everyone expected a lot from the team again this year. Returning to lead the team this year were captain Chuck Pribyl and Doug Liebbrand at defense, Dave Spannbauer in goal, and forwards Kevin Pedersen, Chuck Delich and Gary Batinich. Overall, the Falcons had a young team with four freshmen and numerous JV players getting a chance to perform. Youth did not hold them back as the Falcons posted a 16-10 record for the year.

Highlights for the year include an opening two game sweep over Lake Forest, 8-2 and 5-3. Over the Thanksgiving holidays the team took third place in the Utica Invitational Tournament by beating highly regarded Pennsylvania 7-5 after bowing to Colgate. At the Christmas break the Falcons held an impressive 8-2 record. The Icers played their most exciting series of the season at home against Bowdoin College, last years small college champions. Bowdoin won the first game 5-3, but the Falcons came back to win a squeaker the second night, 2-1. After that tough series, Air Force traveled to West Point and in the first game couldn't get their scoring unleashed and fell 3-0. On Saturday, revenge came sweetly as the Falcons showed the greatness of airpower by bombarding the "Grunts", 9-2. Returning home, Air Force defended its right to the Royal Military College's traveling trophy by beating them 6-2 and 4-3. Since the trophy's beginning the Royal Military College has never wrested it from the Falcon's talons. Air Force wound up its fourth winning season in five years by trouncing Chicago State 13-6 and

Chuck Pribyl and Kevin Pedersen finished their Falcon hockey careers with successful seasons. Pribyl had 35 points and led the team in penalties with 27 for a 68 minute total. Pedersen was second in goals scored with 25 and 39 total points.



Chuck-Delich led the team offensively and by the season's end had tied or broken nine school records. These included; most goals-44, most points-79, and most hat tricks-9. Ten of Delich's goals came while the team was shorthanded.




Dave Spannbauer provided the winning edge in goal for the Falcons. With an inexperienced defense the team had to rely on him throughout the season to






The 1975-76 Basketball season saw the Falcons compile a 16-9 record which is the best in 14 years and stands as the third best in Academy history. The team again ranked as one of the nation's finest defensive teams. The style of play of this year's team was more wide-open than past year's and brought many exciting moments to the fans. The team was guided through the season by the experience of the four senior members: the team captain Greg Schneider, Mike Sevier, Rick Schoenlein, and Jeff Steig. Schneider, known primarily for his defense, and Sevier, whose reputation for aggressive play near the basket was well-known, completed their fourth varsity season. They are the first players in Academy history to have received four varsity letters. Schoenlein's intense hustle and fine outside shooting pulled the team through many rough spots. Over the summer, Steig developed the finest hook shot this side of Kareem Abdul Jabbar and added a new dimension to the Falcon's inside game.


With this predominance of youth and the great experience they gained this year, this team has the potential to develop into the finest team in Academy history in the next few years.





Winning seasons have become a habit for Falcon Wrestling Teams. This year's team finished with a 7-6 record, following a 10-1-1 record in '75. The schedule for the '76 season was much tougher than in the past, but the Falcons came up with some important and pleasing victories. Air Force avenged its only loss of the '75 season by crushing Auburn 27-14. The two closest rivals, Colorado School of Mines and Colorado State University, were defeated 32-10 and 23-17 respectively.


Individually, the team was filled with talented eniors. The top individual was Steve Campbell, who completed the season with a 17-2 record and the most leam points. 

Rifle And Pistol Squads Blast Foes

In the nationwide Intercollegiate Sectionals, the pistol team placed second in the International course of fire, missing first place by 56 points out of 2700. In the conventional course of fire, the team missed first place by 18 points out of 1200 and won fifth. The overall finish was third in the nation.

Two team members were selected as All Americans: C1C Bob Kleinhaus of Rebel Eleven and C2C Joe Zahoibsky of 32 CSQ. Joe missed the national championship by four points in the conventional course of fire and eleven points in the international course of fire. Both were All Americans last year.

In addition, pistol team coach Bobby J. Tiner, represented the United States in the CISM (Council International Sports Military) Championships in June, shooting against teams from the armed forces of 35 other nations, including the Warsaw Pact. Tiner won a silver medal at the competition.

Coached by MSgt Dave Iverson and captained by Bruce Lambert, this year's team finished with an impressive 23-2 record despite problems with the indoor range which plagued the team all year. Senior Paul Sutliff captured the honor of Most Valuable Rifleman for the Academy with a 275 match average, as well as being named the Colorado-Wyoming Conference Champion. Lambert finished a close second in the conference with a 274 average. The other two members of the first team were junior Sammy Herchak (273) and either Jerry Armstrong (268) or sophomore Tom Morton (268).




WYOMING (106-34): Mike McGinnis threw 53'9%' in the shot, 1/2" off the school record.



This year, with another undefeated swimming season, the class of 1976 became the first class in the history of the Academy to finish an undefeated dual swimming meet career. The consecutive victories now number 43, and in addition, the consecutive home victories reached 60 as the team has been undefeated at home for nine years.


The addition of an exceptionally strong freshman class has helped the team immeasurably. The closest meet of the season was against Texas Tech, where team captain Jim Hogue, though extremely ill with the flu, came on strong enough to win his events. With the help of a 1-2 finish in diving by Jim Hertley and Blake Bourland, USAFA won the meet 58-55. The victory over CU two weeks later was especially satisfying for the team. Colorado is an archrival for the Academy, and the swimmers were ready for them. The 84-29 victory proved it.

The year was a real winner; out of 78 events this season, the team won 69 and lost only 9, while our freestyle relay remained undefeated for the fourth straight year.

The season ended on another positive note: at the National Independent Conference Meet, eleven school records were broken, 10 by freshmen and one by a sophomore. Distance freestyler Frank Snyder broke 4 school records, breaststroker Joey Hackbarth broke 3, Steve Halvorsen, Rob Seamster and Doug Poorman each broke one school record. The Medley relay record was also broken to practically clean the record board. Ted Needhand and Craig Moore also put in a good effort by swimming their personal bests.

With the recruiting effort for 1980 going well, and the return of a strong class of 1979, the team's future looks bright and more records are sure to be set in seasons to come. As an interesting note, Tom Martin and Jim Hogue are the first swimmers in Academy history to have finished all four years without being in a losing

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

This year's Falcon fencers started with six returning lettermen. Returning in foil were John Williams, Rick Spott and Stu Alexander. For the epeé team, Rory Childress and Tom Young came back to help out the team, and for the sabre team Mark Whalen, the '75-'76 team captain, was the lone returnee.

Practice started in early September for the Falcons with Coach Nick Toth conducting the daily sessions. Stretching, lunging, running and shadow fencing intermixed with personal lessons from "Coach", was the workout schedule through late January when the first meet, an away trip to the East, kicked the season off. After the trip the Falcons came away with a 18-9 win over Stevens and two close losses, 13-14 to Rutgers and 12-15 to Army.

In February, Air Force met Colorado University twice and upped their record to 3-2 with a 21-6 victory and a forfeit. The big meet of the year was in Los

Angeles at the Western Intercollegiate Championships. The team traveled with the six returning lettermen, Rob Sarnoski in epeé, and Joe McLaughlin and Bob Grove in sabre to fill out the nine man squad. The first of the three day meet saw the foil team take third place with John Williams going undefeated and thereby making the individual finals where he took fifth place. The second day saw the epeé team capture a second place. Rory Childress and Rob Sarnoski both made the individual finals and placed seventh and ninth respectively. On the last day the sabre team tried to defend its 1975 title but came out second by two bouts. Joe McLaughlin and Mark Whalen made the finals and placed fifth and eighth respectively. Through the effort of each fencer, the 1976 Air Force team took first place overall and captured the Western Intercollegiate Fencing Crown.






Steve Roginson makes the throw against Denver.







For the second-straight year, Air Force's golf team has gone undefeated in dual meet competition, and likewise has captured medalist honors in the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Golf Association (RMIGA) series of tournaments.

The Falcons completed their dual season by defeating Southern Colorado 9½-8½, Denver 13½-4½ and Colorado College 16½-1½. The wins enabled Air Force to complete a perfect 16-0 dual season and also extended the Falcons' dual win streak to 28 straight dating back to 1974. Air Force won its last two matches of the 1974 season, then posted a 10-0 record in 1975.

In the season overall team standings, Air Force placed second with 177.5 points, five behind champion Southern Colorado's total of 182.5.

Air Force team captain Jeff Sogard placed first in individual average for the nine tournaments with a 75.44. In 1975 tournaments, Air Force's Chip Diehl was the low medalist with 74.9.




The lowest individual round of the season was a 69 by Sogard in the third RMIGA tournament played at the Broadmoor Country Club in Colorado Springs.





Water Polo







Team handball, the soccer game played like basketball, until three steps are taken (?), proved to be as confusing as ever with rules that rival the IRS 1040 form.


Soccer, where the allied cadets from South America add a touch of Pelé to the game, had a great season this year. Teams seemed much better prepared for action and most games went smoothly.








Wing Spirit Boosts USAFA Athletic Teams








USAFA Honors First Academy Medal Of Honor Recipient



What Lies Ahead?







Capt. John Parker April 19, 1775 Lexington, Mass.

Shortly before midnight, 700 British redcoats, the elite of the Boston garrison, embarked on their historic march to Concord. They were assigned to seize and destroy the rebels' cache of munitions. King George of England was determined to snuff the fermenting revolt in the Colonies.

Before the British had even left their barracks, word of their "secret" mission had begun to spread across the land, thanks to two hard-riding couriers, William Dawes and Paul Revere.

Captain John Parker was one of the people alerted by Paul Revere in his mad midnight gallop. Parker summoned his drummer boy and ordered him to sound the alarm to his brave band of militiamen foresworn to "march at a minute's

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Seventy Minutemen came running and formed into two ragged lines beside the road to Concord to await the redcoats. Parker faced his patriotic hornets in homespun and barked, "Don't fire unless fired upon; but if they mean to have a war, let it begin here!"

the surprise of the Crown, the "uncouth, undisciplined peasants" finally won. On February 4, 1783, Britain formally announced cessation of hostilities.

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
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
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
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
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
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














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
