
Organizational Awards Parade







Military Training Division

The mission of the Military Training Division is to provide the foundation of Air Force knowledge and military skills necessary to succeed in the Academy environment and as a newly commissioned officer upon graduation.

Military training consists of two complimentary programs: Summer Programs and Professional Military Training (PMT). Military training begins with Basic Cadet Training

(BCT) the first summer.

Following BCT, Fourth class Professional Military Training concentrates upon developing an appreciation for the qualities of a professional officer, particularly the need for building individual professional values.

Third class summer focuses upon Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Escape (SERE) training, conducted on the Academy and in the nearby Rocky Mountains.

Cadets also experience CONUS Field Trip, making short visits to two Air Force Bases to gain an understanding of their operational missions.

Third class PMT concentrates on the transition from being a follower

to becoming a leader.

Second class summer affords cadets the chance to apply leadership skills as they lead the BCT and SERE programs. Second class cadets also participate in Operation Air Force where they receive three weeks of hands-on training at operational bases throughout the world. PMT

during the second class year concentrates on developing the leadership and supervisory skill needed in a military organization.

First class summer consists of a wide variety of opportunities including pilot indoctrination training, scientific research programs, and additional senior leadership experience directing the BCT and SERE pro-

First class PMT focuses on the cadet's ability to provide previously learned leadership and management principles while providing the cadets with the practical knowledge they will need upon graduation for entry into the Air Force.

Military Studies Division

The mission of the Military Studies Division is to build within each cadet a foundation of professional knowledge and warfighting concepts necessary to make the decisions which will be required of them as future Air Force officers. Since its inception in 1980, the Professional Military Studies (PMS) curriculum has evolved into one of the most interesting and demanding areas of study at the Air Force Academy.

PMS courses were developed to educate airpower professionals, and a key part of that education focuses on heritage, warfighting and officership. The Division teaches four core courses, one for each academic year of cadet's tenure at the Air Force Academy. Courses include instruction in Air Force heritage, military professionalism, weapons

technology, airpower employment, military theory and doctrine, and threat analysis.





The first week included orientaon, map reading and terrain navigaon. Cadets become familiar with the RC 70 radio and encoding messages. here was physical training usually every morning but cadet spirit kept it bearable!

The second week included basic mountain skills along with patrolling skills training. We learned to belay, make a rope bridge and a rope ladder. We were issued M-16s and had a chance to qualify on the firing range. The highlight of the 2nd week was the automatic weapons range. There the Cadets fired .50 calibre machine

guns, M-60 machine guns, M-16s (automatic) and M-203 grenade launchers.

The third week we got a helicopter assault on an area approximately 4 miles south. We then learned ambushing techniques and had frequent firefights. Some cadets got rides in M-60 tanks and everyone participated in mechanized infantry tactics.

EDITOR'S NOTE: In August, 1983, Talon Editor, John Hilbing, interviewed Brig. Gen. Ervin Rokke, Dean of Faculty. These are excerpts from that interview.

TALON: Sir, what are your perceptions of some of the changes that have taken place since you graduated from

the Air Force Academy?

GENERAL ROKKE: I think the major change is the size of the cadet wing. I don't recall excatly how many were here, but I would guess that it was on the order of a thousand cadets. Now we have 4,500. And that shift in size has made it more difficult to maintain a sense of community. Certainly not impossible, but I think it is more difficult now for you to know all of your classmates. I knew all my classmates — there were only 298 of us who graduated. Not only did we know our classmates, but we knew the names in many cases and were certainly familiar with the faces of nearly everyone in the wing. We could do that when there were only a thousand. So, because of that dramatic increase in size, maintaining a sense of community is more difficult.

Another difference has to do with the opportunities that are available to cadets today — far more than when I was here. For example, my opportunity to participate in airmanship programs was limited to a two or three week period one summer when members of my class went to various pilot training bases where we were each allowed eight or nine hours in a T-37. As I recall, we also received one ride in a T-33 and one ride in a F-102 on a field trip. That was the entire airmanship program for my class. Now, of course, you have T-41, powered sailplane, parachute programs, and such. And I think that's good. It provides cadets today with more opportunities — pleasant opportunities I would say — than what we had back then.

The curriculum has also changed. Classroom contact hours, for example, have declined substantially — indeed, they have declined by over 30 percent for graduates today relative to those who graduated in 1970. That decrease in contact time was necessitated by the advent of programs such as T-41. In order to make room for the T-41 program, we had to cut back in the classroom. And I support that decision. I think it is important that the Academy provides hands-on airmanship opportunities and I see the T-41 program as filling that need. Despite these changes, however, the essence of the Air Force Academy — its purpose — and similar programs has remained unchanged. The fact that cadets are here to become Air Force officers is precisely the same as it was back then. The cadet honor system also is a fundamental that we have today, and it's one that we had when I was here.

TALON: General, you have emphasized both academics and military development. Do you also feel that athletics

are important?

★: I certainly do. I'm a product of this institution. Even though I'm not a prize athlete, I did carry away useful skills in several athletic activities which have helped me remain physically fit. Sooner or later, if you don't care for yourself physically, you adversely affect everything you do not only as an Air Force officer but as a member of society. So I consider the athletic program at the Air Force Academy very important.

Also I think it's important to win our share of intercollegiate contests. The institution gains, for example, when we have a football season like we had last year. Going to a bowl game gives us good publicity and means that we are in a better position to attract high quality cadets.

TALON: Sir, what advice would you give to cadets who do happen to fall into academic difficulty?



*: First of all, only about seven or eight percent of our cadets leave because of academic deficiencies. My own feeling is that virtually all cadets who are successful is entering the Academy could make it through academically. In fact, I have yet to come on more than one or two cases where I felt the cadet simply didn't have the academic ability to graduate. So I encourage cadets who think they might be headed for academic difficulty to make contact with the instructors right away.

Don't wait until the hole that you have dug is so deep that it would take virtually "A" work to bail you out by the end of the semester. When you first sense a problem, that's the time to go in and sit down with the instructor. All of the instructors are in every day. There should be no problem in gaining access to an instructor — if there is, I want to hear

about it

"I think it is more difficult now for you to know all of your classmates."

Explain to your instructor that things are not going well in the course and that you need help. In addition to seeing your instructor, make sure you ask yourself the question, "Am I studying in this course?" If you are having trouble in a particular course and have spent less than 30 minutes preparation for each class, an obvious answer to the problem might be in budgeting your study time. For some cadets, it's very effective to work out a schedule where you designate what time will be spent studying, what time will be spent having fun, etc. You'll be amazed at how much time there is in a week.

My experience here also suggests that most courses are structured in such a fashion that they build on concepts. Accordingly, if you drop a few building blocks along the way, that will adversely affect you throughout the remainder of the course. So that's why I say don't wait until you have blown a series of tests. As soon as you sense a difficulty go to your instructor.

TALON: Sir, are there any changes expected in terms of educational opportunities available after graduation?

*: I think the current Air Force program for advanced degrees is a very liberal program. I don't know precisely what percentage of my class have master's degrees but I think it's over 60 percent and I think about 15 percent of my class have doctorates. That reflects, in my judgment, an Air Froce that is interested in advanced degrees and in improving the educational qualifications of its officer corps. I have no reason to anticipate that this situation, which I consider to be very good, will change. There is a question, of course, concerning whether cadets should go to graduate school immediately after graduation. My personal feeling is that a cadet is well advised to pursue a line assignment first. I say that for a couple of reasons. First of all, I think that it's important for an officer to serve his or her junior years in a

line organization. That gives them, in my judgment, a very important foundation for the rest of their Air Force careers. That's really what I was talking about when I said that my most valuable assignment was my first assignment as a lieutenant and junior captain in a squadron in Japan.

There's a more pragmatic reason as well. That first operational assignment gives the Air Force an opportunity to look an individual over and decide whether he or she is an individual on whom the Air Force wants to spend a substantial amount of money for an advanced degree. If the answer is ves. fine. If the answer is no, the officer involved may be disappointed, but the Air Force hasn't wasted taxpayers' money.

Let me conclude by saying that there are some graduate school opportunities which I consider to be exceptions to the rule. One obvious program is the Rhodes Scholarship. Take a look at what our Rhodes Scholar graduates have done, and you will find that they have made very substantial contributions to the Air Force. And, indeed, we as an institution gain from the favorable publicity we get when our cadets win Rhodes scholarships, just as we do when our football team wins bowl games. We also have several other national-recognized, very competitive scholarship programs which cadets are eligible for. What all this means is that about 20-25 of our graduates win prestigious scholarships and go immediately to graduate school each year. And I think that's about the right number.

TALON: Sir, would you care to comment on the new Cadet Accountability System?

★: The reason we have shifted to the new CAS system quite simply is that the old CAS system didn't work. With the old CAS system, we had created a rather large bureaucracy to answer a rather simple question: Why is the cadet not in class? Unbelievably, the system didn't work — we didn't know whether cadets were in class with the other system, to say nothing of an equitable system for dealing with those who intentionally skipped class.

The fundamental issue really has little to do with the CAS system. The fundamental issue is whether we have compulsory class attendance. This institution has answered that question in the affirmative. Therefore, I would submit that this institution is responsible for a monitoring system that enforces its decision. And that system should be as simple as possible. The problem with the old system was that it was too complex.

What really happened was that it would sometimes take three weeks to a month before the CAS clerk found out that a particular cadet missed a class. At that point, the cadet couldn't remember why. The new system cuts through all the bureaucracy. It simply has the instructor, when a cadet is not in class, put a circle in his book. When the cadet comes to class next, the instructor asks for a USAFA Form 78. On that form the instructor is told by the cadet whether the cadet's absence was authorized or not. Hopefully, 99 percent of those absences will be authorized. On rare occasions, cadets will cut a class - it's clearly laid out. I'm hoping that this new, rather simple, system is one that will

It is, of course, a system that requires an application of good judgment and common sense. I don't want the system to be perceived as a hassle for the great majority of cadets who attend classes as they should. Conversely, if those few cadets who decide that they want to skip a class consider this to be a hassle, I say great. That's exactly what I want. My own prediction is that we will find a very small number of cadets who are penalized by virture of the new system. Cadets are too smart to play games with a system that ac-

TALON: Sir, in closing, what advice would you give to cadets as they become junior officers in the Air Force?

★: To all cadets here I would say extract whatever you can make the most of your experience at the Air Force Academy. This really is a first-rate institution. I'm speaking

not only of our academic program, but of our military training program and our athletic program. All things considered, there is no undergraduate institution in the United States that I would consider better than the United States Air Force Academy. As you look toward your career in the Air Force, there is bound to be a certain amount of uncertainty, and indeed, a certain amount of fear about the future. But experience suggests that while such uncertainty is understandable, it should be sprinkled with a heavy dose of optimism.

The Air Force is a challenging organization. It's an organization which has a very important mission. It knows how to perform that mission very well, and it needs the best people it can get. When it gets good people, it makes use of those people.

So I would say to cadets who are looking toward graduation, make sure you absorb what is offered at the Air Force Academy. As you look toward the future, look with an open mind and a spirit of optimism. There are many challenges out there with your names on them. All you need to do is gain that commission, grab those challenges and the rewards will come!

*AERONAUTICS: Do You






ASTRONAUTICS:




BEHAVIORAL SCIENCE




CHEMISTRY:

SCIENCE THROUGH A MICROSCOPE

The Department of Chemistry, under the leadership of Col. Harvey W. Schiller, provides a rigorous curriculum for cadets in the field of chemistry. In addition to the two semester core course taken by all cadets during their fourth class year, the department provides two academic programs for cadets desiring to major in chemistry; the general chemistry major, and the American Chemical Society accredited program of instruction. Both offer fundamental knowledge in analytical, inorganic, organic, physical and biological chemistry. The Chemistry Club, one of several cadet enrichment programs sponsored by the department, offers unique learning experiences to all cadets interested in the chemical sciences.

Paramount in all courses is the emphasis of the scientific method for problem solving, to prepare each cadet for his or her future leadership positions as an officer in the United States Air Force. A strong emphasis on current applications and issues of chemical technology in the Air Force also provides each cadet an awareness and appreciation for our complex environment, where "easy solutions are seldom found."

The Department is composed of 28 faculty members and six staff personnel. All the faculty members are active duty Air Force officers with the exception of visiting professor, Dr. Charles N. Robinson.



COUNSELING CENTER



OHM ON THE RANGE WITH ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING

The benefits of electrical engineering are so much a part of our daily lives, that we often take them for granted. Many people use a myriad of electronic devices without understanding how or why they work. The Department of Electrical Engineering provides the tools for understanding this modern technology by providing all cadets with an introduction to the principles of electrical engineering through the core program. In addition, majors conduct indepth studies within the department's four divisions: Computers, Communications, Circuits and Systems and Applications.

The electrical engineering core curriculum consists of two courses plus an honors version of each course. The first course, in the area of digital electronics, begins with simple "AND" and "OR" logic gates operating on Boolean ones and zeros. This course then progresses to larger devices such as adders and selectors and then integrates these devices to form a working digital computer. Throughout the course, the engineering approach to circuit and system design is stressed.

The systems approach to design is continued in the second core course which concentrates on analog signals and the systems required to process them. Both time and frequency domain analysis methods are presented. The concepts taught are used to discuss new technology and electronic systems currently being used in the Air Force. Together, the two core courses present the cadets with the fundamental electrical engineering concepts needed by future officers. For the electrical engineering major, however, a deeper understanding is needed.

The computer division provides electrical engineering majors with an opportunity to study the design of digital systems, including microcomputer based systems. The division offers a three course, laboratory-intensive, digital design sequence. The first course is an advanced hardware oriented course which emphasizes the use of medium complexity digital devices in the design of digital systems. The second course focuses on software design for microcomputer based systems which, for example, can be used to control robots, stepper motors and other operations. The third course covers the hardware design of microprocessor systems and requires knowledge and lab techniques learned in the preceeding courses.

The communications division offers other opportunities to electrical engineering majors. Imagine, over the empty desert, a lone airplane approaches a small dome-topped bunker. Suddenly, an infrared laser beam emerges from the dome to probe the sky for the aircraft. Instantly the plane responds with an eerie green laser light focused on the building below. Very quickly the two lasers lock onto one another, narrowing to thin shafts of light and begin transmitting a billion pieces of data every second.

This optical communication link is just one of many explored in the communications division. The cadet is introduced to both analog and digital communication as well as the various modulation and detection methods. In addition, many examples of communication systems are developed to illustrate system concepts and characteristics. The communications division leads the way into the information eye needed for the present and future Air Force.

The courses presented in the circuits and systems division are required by all electrical engineering majors. The main purpose of these courses is to provide the cadet with the fundamental knowledge needed to be used in more advanced electrical engineering specialities like communications, applications and computers. The first topics discussed include circuit elements, circuit analysis, operational amplifiers and the use of laplace transforms as an analysis tool.

Another course introduces solid state physics and leads into the study of diodes, transistors and field effect devices. Modeling of devices and circuit analysis techniques are stressed throughout the study of device applications to include the interface of intergrated circuits and descrete devices.

Other topics include signal representation, Fourier series, laplace transforms and other signal analysis techniques. This division also begins the formal electrical engineering laboratory program. This program includes the practical applications of electronic test equipment, electronic measurements and the design, construction and evaluation of various circuits and systems used in future Air Force research and development.

The applications division has just begun a new and exciting program in instrumentation and robotics. The three courses in this area will cover advanced electronics, instrumentation systems and the fundamentals of electronics. Robots will serve as laboratory testbeds for these courses. The new courses will emphasize Air Force applications such as smart weapon systems.

The division recently acquired two robots in support of these courses and cadets are welcome to see the robots in operation. Courses within the division are designed to give the EE major a deeper understanding of their engineering discipline and a view of the latest technology in the Air

Force.

Outside the purely academic sphere, many EE majors are members of the Electronics Club. Guided by President ClC Steve Wacker, the club hosted a dinner in the fall with Col. Royer, the new head of the department, as a guest speaker.

Another extracurricular activity is the Cadet Summer Research Program. Last summer, EE majors worked on research projects at Air Force bases throughout the continental United States and in Hawaii and Germany. Three cadet research projects of particular interest were studies in voice synthesis, radiation hardening testing of computer chips and the development of an interface to connect an F-16 radar computer to an instrumentation computer. The experience gained from this program will certainly be put to good use in the future by the research participants.

Electrical and electronic devices will be with us in increasing numbers in the future and a good understanding of the principles behind these devices will be a tremendous advantage to any Air Force officer. At the Air Force Academy the organization dedicated to providing this understanding to future Air Force officers is the EE department.





ENGINEERING MECHANICS

The Department of Engineering Mechanics supports the mission of the Academy by providing cadets with a strong background in mechanics and materials. The department does this by providing all cadets with a core course in mechanics and materials in engineering design, and offering cadets a choice of two majors: Engineering Mechanics and Engineering Science.

In addition to teaching, the department spends numerous hours insuring cadets are receiving and will continue to receive quality education from the courses taught. Research work the department conducts is one way to insure such quality education. The departmental research helps maintain technical currency and provides professional development opportunities for both the faculty members and cadets.

In addition to academic contact with cadets, the department interacts with cadets on a squadron level by being the squadron participant for the 39th Cadet Squadron. Other non-classroom contacts with cadets include the Mech Club, sponsored by the department but run by cadets. The Mech Club is a student section of the American Society of Mechnical Engineers (ASME) and is composed primarily

of cadets majoring in an engineering division major.

Club activities, such as field trips, offer cadets the opportunity to see how principles and concepts presented in their academic courses are actually used in Air Force applications. Cadets also have a chance to interact with their peers from other service academies as well as civilian colleges or universities. The Regional ASME Student Conference, which was held at the Academy last April, provided such an opportunity. During the conference, several cadets from the department presented technical papers as part of the "Old Guard Contest." That is a contest in which students present results of research work they have performed.

In coming semesters, the Department of Engineering Mechanics will continue its efforts to improve the quality of instruction it offers and to improve the cadets' ability to translate concepts and principles taught in class to actual applications in the Air Force.

During their Air Force Career, cadets will use and manage various weapons and support systems. Giving cadets an understanding of how these systems are designed and what makes them work is truly a worthwhile mission.

In addition, "Icarus" (literary magazine), forensics (debating team), and Bluebards (drama club) - all sponsored by the department - provide other paths for growth of the human spirit.



FOREIGN LANGUAGE

In the growing complexity of today's world, it is ever more important that the people of various nations develop an appreciation for each other: Their ideas, their cultures, their ways of life, and their languages. Communication is the key to understanding, and that is what the Foreign Language Department is all about.

This year more than 1,000 cadets received instruction in seven different languages, including three European languages and four strategic languages. And the instruction they received is not the dry booklearning that we all had in high school. The department is in the process of improving the program by making the material more practical and fun to learn. New emphasis is being placed on conversational skills and cultural familiarity, especially in the core courses, where these areas are traditionally neglected.

In addition, a number of officers in the department recently attended technical conferences, in conjunction with plans to develop new computer assisted foreign language programs. This is being done in coordination with other universities and keeps our department in its position among the finest foreign language programs in the nation.

One big plus on our side is that we have with us some native speakers of the languages we teach. Here at USAFA this year are a total of six exchange/liaison officers from foreign nations, four of whom are working directly with the department. These officers play a vital role, and contribute a great deal of academic and professional military expertise.

In spite of all this, there is no substitute for experience where foreign language is concerned. Our annual exchange with L'Ecole de l'Air, the French Air Force Academy, is in full swing, giving French and American cadets the opportunity to switch places for a full semester.

Five cadet "ambassadors" went to France this year, and the Academy received six young men in return. Those of us acquainted with our foreign contemporaries can vouch for the fact that they have a lot to offer in the way of perspective, as well as true friendship. In the spring, selections for next year's exchange will be made, with the combined efforts of the sciences and humanities departments contributing to their preparation.

Through the exchanges and the development of computer instruction, the Foreign Language Department is preparing cadets to become top-caliber officers with a deep awareness of our allies, their languages, politics and cultures.

*GEOGRAPHY: THE WORLD IN YOUR HANDS

A newspaper article recently brought home the point of our relative ignorance of the world. The title was, "Can We Find The Countries We Can Wipe Out?"

In this age of specialization, high tech, and complex weapon systems there seems to be a dearth of generalists. They are the people who can still see the entire forest in spite of the "specialized" trees. Geographers, due to the very nature of our discipline, are forced into the role of a generalist studying man and his impact on the earth, and vice versa.

The goal of the geography faculty is to instill an appreciation for the complex and dynamic structure of the world. The interconnections of cultures, languages, political systems, economies and physical environments are subtle, but powerful. As Air Force officers anticipating deployment anywhere in the world, an appreciation of other peoples, their environs, and their social conditions greatly enhances our ability to function outside our own borders. The courses taught by the Office of Instruction for Geography instill the awareness of differences throughout the world with a unique perspective gained by combining physical and social science.

The regional courses focus on specific areas of the world, while the methods courses create a framework for analyzing the patterns of man on earth, and what directions are possible given a culture and resources. A growing realization of our role throughout the world has prompted more attention on the world regional geography course. The course is especially valuable to future officers because of the fluid situation in world political and military commitments of the United States. Courses on Latin America, the USSR, The Far East, The Mid-East, and Western Europe provide an intensive treatment of the society and resources of the respective areas.



LIBARARY: KNOWLEDGE IS THE LOCK LEARNING IS THE KEY

The mission of the Academy's academic, community, medical, law and departmental libraries is to provide the best service possible to meet the library needs of the Academy community. To this end, the Library constantly strives to improve its capabilities. In January 1983, they completed a major expansion and refurbishing project of the "old" library by adding some 45,000 square feet of floor

space, 14,000 linear feet of shelf space, and seating for an additional 400 patrons. Now they are preparing to enter the computer age: The library plans to replace the automated circulation system, develop an online catalog (which should eventually incorporate all the 1.24 million entries in the current card catalog), and automate the acquistion and procession procedures.

The library has an excellent collection of books, magazines, technical reports and other materials housed on four floors at the north end of Fairchild Hall. The Library's 117,000 square feet of floor space house over 320,000 books, 2,200 magazine subscriptions and 400,000 technical reports. The staff of over 50 members is dedicated to meet the educational and recreational needs of the cadets, faculty and staff of the Academy.



Of special interest is the Col. Richard Gimbel Aeronautics Collection on the sixth floor. This world-famous collection of some 20,000 items covers about 5,000 years of man's desire to fly. Also on the sixth floor is the

Special Collections Division which houses the archival records of the Air Force Academy, oral histories, and personal papers of famous and distinguished military figures and aviation pioneers, and a collection on the art of falconry. A number of other items of exceptional artistic and military interest are displayed throughout the library.

In short, the Academic Library is the "hub" of the educational institution. With its vast treasure of knowledge and exceptional resources, the library is making a very significant contribution to the pursuit of excellence by future leaders.

MATH: THE NUMBERS GAME

It is often with horror that fourth class cadets find themselves trapped in the core math curriculum at USAFA. For many it is a first (some hope it to be the last) exposure to that strange four-letter world: calculus. But that's only the beginning of the many experiences of the math core: Turning in homework, in-class boardwork, and difficult GRs ("Sir, are you sure this GR is for this course?!")

Nevertheless, DFMS boasts the largest academic department at the Academy and is responsible for five core courses which provide cadets with skills needed in the remainder of the core curriculum. Sometimes with dismay, the technical major soon finds more advanced math skills to be essential and the Mathematics Department is prepared to meet their needs with a whole range of upperlevel courses.

The department offers two broad approaches to the potential math major: Operations Research and Mathematical Science.

The ops research majors learn how to utilize their math skills in a variety of non-technical management and economics applications. For those a bit more courageous there is the "applied math" track, suited to those interested in learning practical and theoretical math applications to the many technical fields, including computer science. engineering, physics, and chemistry.

There are also a few who have discovered that calculators don't solve every math problem. These are the so-called "purists" who find intrinsic beauty in the "art" of math, and who think of real numbers as merely a "special

But learning how to manipulate numbers and symbols is only one benefit derived from pursuing an OR or math major. Another is the ability to approach problem solving in a

Still another advantage, which has become a sort of catchword for the department, is flexibility. Coupled with the core engineering/science and management/economics curriculum the math major finds a broad range of graduate level studies open to him. For the Air Force, flexibility means the ability to accommodate a number of career fields and the capability to adapt as the technical needs of a modern Air Force continue to change in the future.



No other department has the peculiarities of the Math Department. Yes, this department is truly unique with its nass emphasis on graded home-work, retention tests, Form 0s, boardwork and the GRs that seem to have nothing to lo with the graded homework. Cadets become well acsustomed to these peculiarities during the five-course core equirement — all the way from freshman calculus to statistics. The Department of Mathematical Sciences is the largest academic department at the Academy. The cadet soon finds the math core courses essential for success in other courses such as chemistry, physics, aeronautics, and astronautics. Also higher lever math courses tend to aid other technical majors in their chosen field of study.



PHILOSOPHY AND FINE ARTS MAJOR, NO MAJOR?

We always thought that the prospects of a military career, a good education, the needs of the nation, no tuition, or the urging of a variety of well-intentioned relatives brought us to the Academy.

In the core ethics course, Philosophy 310, we find out that there was a deeper reason: our values. And it turns out that values insist on affecting our lives whether we like it or not. A major, a spouse, a lifestyle, a career field, and even a war, a battle, a target. We become part of all of these because of values. No wonder we are asked to go through the soul-searching and endless questioning involved in examining those values. Sure, it's "fuzzy" without any of the school solutions that would be so comfortable at final exam time. But that's what our most crucial life decisions are like, so there's every reason to expect that an ethics course must be the same.

Receiving special emphasis in the Department of philosophy and Fine Arts are moral issues of particular importance to the armed forces: professional ethics and morality and war. These issues are addressed as academic, educational issues in the core ethics course; but members of the department also address them as training or instruc-

tional issues by providing advisors and instructors for the variety of training we receive in military ethics and the Honor Code.

Besides the required ethics course, the department offers several other philosophy courses, including the always popular "Great Religions of the World."

The Fine Arts program would be the envy of just about any comparably sized educational institution in the country. In addition to the two appreciation courses — one in music and one in visual arts — there are the American Art and Music course and the always enjoyable Fine Arts Studio.



* PHYSICS: A Frontier in Space

Charged with the mission of teaching every cadet the basic concepts which govern the world around him, the Physics Department maintains active programs of instruction, research, and educational research. Every cadet must satisfy the requirements for three physics courses: Classical Mechanics and Thermodynamics in the sophomore year; Electricity, Magnetism and Optics in the junior year; and Modern Physics and Air Force Applications in the senior

The most dramatic development in the 83-84 school year has been the full implementation of a computer assisted testing program for fundamental concepts. During the semester, each of the 100 students in the sophomore and junior courses must master a number of tests given on the computer in a self paced, self scheduled mode, earning course points for completing them promptly and incentive points for passing them early. This program has enabled instructors to use more in-class time for demonstrating and discussing advanced concepts. Cadet performance on tests and course grades have improved significantly.

Beyond the core, our physics majors and faculty continue to do state-of-the-art research in lasers, electromagnetic theory, hydrodynamics, space physics, education, and computer aided instruction. A unique pulsed iodine laser and a variety of other lasers make our undergraduate laser lab one of the best in the country. Our observatory has a 24inch diameter telescope equipped with many peripheral devices. It is used by cadets in laboratory courses, the cadet Physics and Astronomy Club and faculty members for learning and research.

The class of 1984 will graduate the first cadets with a space physics major, developed to prepare cadets for future Air Force programs in space. The courses emphasize understanding of the basic physical principles which control the space environment and the consequent impacts on space operations.

Our traditional Physics and Engineering Physics programs continue to produce some of the Academy's best graduates. Our advanced classes in electromagnetic theory. quantum mechanics, laboratory techniques and thermodynamics prepare our majors well for flying, technical jobs, graduate school and or research in the Air Force. The contributations of physics majors to the Air Force mission have been and will continue to be impressive.



* COMPUTER SCIENCE

In July 1982, Computer Science separated from the combined Department of Astronautics and Computer Science with Col. Joseph Monroe as its first department head. The Computer Science Department, now in the basic Sciences Division, offers the core course, Introduction to Computer Science, (better known as Comp Sci 100) which teaches computer literacy, problem solving techniques and programming in the Pascal computer language. From this foundation, cadets who choose to major in computer science may plan their academic programs from the upper level courses which emphasize software, scientific applications, and management applications.

Department extracurricular activities were strong in the fall and spring semesters. In the fall of 1983, the department was involved in three charitable activities: Combined Federal Campaign and Operation Warm Heart. The department began 1984 by sponsoring the fifteenth Annual Computer Related Information Systems Symposium (CRISYS). This conference attracted computer and com-

munications personnel from throughout the Department of Defense and national industries. This year's topics featured Ada programming language, software management, security and networks. Col. Denis Brown, Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff for Information Systems at Headquarters USAF presented the CRISYS keynote address and Mr. Jim Bates of the AdAmAn Club was the guest speaker for the conference banquet. Other spring activities included an Introduction to Computer Science for the District 20 schools Talented and Gifted (TAG) student program as well as the continued support as sponsors for the 25th (Red Eye squadron.

Throughout the year, some faculty members are involved in local programs at Colorado Springs Christian University Colorado Technical College, Blair Junior College, Lewis Palmer High School, Cheyenne Mountain High School Coronado High School, Douglass Valley Elementary School and High Plains Elementary School.

Television playback carrels, 35mm slide projectors, audio cassette recorders, filmstrip previewers, overhead


slide materials, total television support capabilities, total photo lab and Training Devices support is available to produce instructionally oriented services.








ABOVE: Mike Kirby runs interference for Marty's advance.







On the way to the Commander in Chief's trophy this year, the Falcons handed Navy a 44-17 defeat on their home turf. In front of a record crowd of 34,257, Air Force befuddled Navy with a smorgasbord of flexbone finesse.

Marty Louthan launched the torpedo that sunk the Navy's armada. Marty scored on runs of 2,1,7, 22 and 5 yards as the Falcons won for the

first time at Navy-Marine Stadium. Marty's five touchdowns were also the most ever scored in a single game against Navy, breaking the old record of four set in 1963 by Penn State. Louthan's five scores equaled the Air Force record held by Ernie Jenning in 1969.

Marty carried 19 times for 91 yards and hit eight of 15 passes for 130 more. Halfback Mike Brown had 136 on just 10 carries, including a 74-yard burst, as Air Force amassed 510 total yards, 340 of that on the ground.

As Navy head coach Gary Tranquill put it, "We didn't make the big slap offensively and we didn't slow them down. That's what you call an old-fashioned kicking." The Air Force win evened the series with Navy at eight victories a piece.

At a glance it looks like a typical Falcon victory with the final outcome 37-25 over UTEP, but a deeper look will show it was far from typical.

With the Falcons ahead 24-11, quarterback Marty Louthan suffered a shoulder bruise on the end of a 20 yard run that put him out of the game late in the third period. Louthan left with four of seven passes for 118 yards and nine runs for 61 passes for 118 yards and nine runs for 61 yards.

Brian Knorr, the sophomore backup quarterback, stepped in. He shared the back up role with Bart Weiss. Knorr had carried one time in the season before coming in to relieve Louthan in the fourth quarter.

He rushed four times for 22 yards and collected two touchdowns in the process. This rescued the Falcons from the clutches of a UTEP rally.

The Miners had closed within six points with 14:01 left in the game before

points with 14:01 left in the game before Knorr ran in two unanswered touchdowns from 10 and 3 yards out.

Defensive end Charlie Heath was the defensive man of the game for the Falcons when he jarred the ball loose from fullback Vic Staglaino at the UTEP 10 and fell on the ball.

"That was the play of the game and actually won the game for us," said head coach Ken Hatfield.







Air Force, worn and weary from trading touchdowns with Utah, finally outran the clock and the Utes, 33-31. In the end the Falcon's one-two punch of Marty Louthan and John Kershner outdid Utah.

Louthan scored three touchdowns and rushed for 155 yards tying his career high. Kershner bulled for 113 yards on 20 carries and vaulted past Brian Bream at the all-time career rushes at the Academy with 2,321 yards.

But it took those heroics and more for the Falcons to hold off Utah. The Falcons raced to a 17-0 lead, tied 21-21 at half-time and finally regained the lead at 26-21 in the third period. And while the Falcons never trailed again, they never could relax as the teams played give and take the rest of the way

After Mike Brown's 22 yard touchdown run made it 33-24 with 11:52 left, things looked safe for the Falcons. But the Utes came back on a 24-yard scoring strike and it was 33-31 with 1:14 left. Falcon safety Greg Zolinger, though, pounced on the ensuing on-side kick and from there the Falcons ended matters by running out the clock.

Again the Falcon defense stretched but never broke

never broke.

"We may give up a lot but when it gets down there close to the end zone, we get tough. And we just know one of us will make the big play," said senior corner back Chuck Peterson.

Chuck made his share. In the third quarter with the Falcons clinging to a 26-24 lead, he nailed Utah's tailback with a vicious hit, forcing a fumble that A. J. Scott recovered at the Falcon 5. Then, with eight minutes left in the game and Utah threatening to take command, Peterson made a goal-line interception to thwart a Ute drive.





Before a stunned full house crowd of 59,075 spectators, the Falcons pulled off a victory over Notre Dame with the last play of the game. Defensive tackle Chris Funk swatted aside a 32 yard field goal chip shot by the fighting Irish placekicker to ensure the Falcon upset. It was the second blocked kick of the game for Chris and ranked highest among a game full of eventful plays.

Marty fired a 48 yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Mike Kirby with 10:19 to play to pull within six points of the Irish.

The Falcons took the lead at 23-22 with 1:35 left in the game when fullback John Kershner capped a 74 yard drive with a 1 yard plunge, his second score of the day. After Sean Pavlich shanked the extra point, the game was tied at 22-22. But a Notre Dame penalty gave the Falcons another chance.

This time Pavlich drilled it and the Falcons led 23-22. Notre Dame promptly came back behind their strong passing attack. In six plays the Irish were at the Falcon 14 with four seconds left. Some of the Notre Dame players already were hugging each other in anticipation of a last second win when Funk reached up to shake down their thunder with one hand.

"It felt just great when that ball hit my hand," Funk said. "My first thought was 'we win!' My next thought was that it was the first time I ever wanted to cry in a football game."

"I can't explain it," said John Kershner. "I've never had a feeling like this. We'd seen comebacks happen too much to give up. This team . . . this is definitely the biggest. Nothing else matches this. I just don't know what to say. Someone was watching over us."

say. Someone was watching over us."

Tackle John Weigand and guard Scott Wachenheim, both seniors, were pictures of quiet satisfaction in the noisy Falcon locker room. No wild jumping around and screaming here. Just the sneaky grins of players who knew they'd pulled off something special.

For the second consecutive year the Falcon laid sole claim to the Commander in Chief's trophy. In an impressive fashion in front of 47,032 spectators, fourth largest in Falcon Stadium history, the Falcons' offense rolled up a recordsetting 469 yards on the ground and came away with a resounding 41-20 win over Army.

Quarterback Marty Louthan dazzled the Black Knights with his wishbone wizardy. He rushed for 142 yards on 20 carries, including touchdown runs of 4, 38, and 2 yards. Halfback Jody Simmons added 133 on 17 carries and fullback John Kershner picked up 79 more.


Air Force's 469 rushing yards broke the previous record of 464 set against Colorado State in 1965. Along the way, the Falcons set a record for rushing first downs with 28.


Yet, it wasn't until late in the third quarter that Air Force could savor its victory. Until then the Army traded blows with the highly favored Falcons. The Falcons led 21-17 at halftime but Army opened the second half with a 47-yard field goal and it was 21-20. Then Louthan pushed the Falcons along with a 38-yard touchdown run to make it 28-20.

After Louthan's 38 yard scamper things went sour for the Knights.





When it rains it Pours

In the second post season action of major importance in as many years the Falcons took it to the University of Mississippi.

A crowd of 41,274 braved monsoon-like conditions and watched as the Falcons, the country's 16th-ranked team, edged the scrappy Rebels, 9-3, behind Sean Pavlich's three field goals. Sean whipsaved boots of 44, 39, and 27 yards through the uprights, while Ole Miss could manage only a single 46 yard field goal.

The win raised the Falcons' season mark to 10-2, best in the Academy's history and closed the books on a two season odyssey that brought the Falcons national respect.

"It just couldn't have ended any better for us," said cornerback Chuck Petersen, who emerged as a solid player in his senior season. "Sure, we dreamed about a game like this. We were ready for it."

For senior linebacker Tom Stanbury, a starter for almost all of his last three seasons, the finale tasted especially sweet. He spent much of Saturday night helping to hold down senior tailback Buford McGee, the Rebels' best weapon.

But like all the others, Stanbury succeeded in never allowing Ole Miss to break the one long play it needed to grasp control of the game.

"We weren't about to let this one slip away," said Stanbury. "Everyone did their jobs and stuck together. We had always stuck together. We had always talked about having to win one for the offense. Of course, we always wanted the offense to do well. But it's nice to be able to pay them back a little bit for all they've done the last two years."

Senior defensive end Charlie Heath, who started in every Air Force game of his four-year career, admitted feeling exactly the same way. Heath also said that during the fourth quarter, when Ole Miss was battling furiously to make a comeback, the defense had a few "meetings" in the huddles.

"Whenever there was a TV timeout, we would just look at each other and talk about how we had come such a long way to get this far," said Heath. "We weren't about to let it slip away from us."

Offensively Marty Louthan led Air Force with 67 yards on 25 carries and hit six of seven passes for 71 yards. Mike Brown finished with 91 yards on 12 carries and John Kershner carried 15 times for 58 yards. As it was, the Falcon offense did its job everywhere but on the scoreboard.


Against a gambling Ole Miss defense that severely hampered Falcon's triple option, the offense of the Falcons was still able to amass 277 yards rushing and 348 yards overall. Most importantly, though, the Falcons controlled the ball for 37 minutes and 13 seconds to only 22:47 for Mississippi — a whopping 15 minute advantage. All in all, it turned out to be a glorious night for coach Ken Hatfield and 23 seniors who finished their Falcon football career.





LEFT: Marty prepares to pass despite the weather. **ABOVE:** Mark Melcher gets the once over to get the mud out of his eye.



Seniors Cheryl DeVita and Linda Samuelson were selected to the coaches' All America team. DeVita was also selected to the Academic All America second team.






ABOVE: Freshman John McCaffrey sets the pace followed closely by freshman Mike Canavan.








Fencers Finish on High Note



With eight teams finishing in the top 15 nationally, Air Force Academy athletic teams continued to excell against some of the best competition in the nation.

Over 800 athletes on 41 intercollegiate teams competed in 586 contests and came up with a winning average of 68.0 per cent.

During the 1983-84 school year, Falcon varsity athletes competed in 503 contests, winning 346, losing 151 and tying 7 for a 69.4 percentage.

The overall program that included junior varsity teams completed the year with 395 wins, 184 losses and seven ties.

Four teams were undefeated during the season — women's cross country, women's indoor track and women's and men's golf.

Several teams placed high nationally. Pistol was second in both air and standard pistol and was third in free competition at the nationals. Women's volleyball was third in the nation among Division II schools while the women's gymnastics team was sixth in Division II. Women's cross country placed eighth nationally at the Division II level and women's swimming was 11th at the Division II championship meet.

Football brought national recognition to the Academy for the second-straight year, winning the Independence Bowl and winding up ranked 13th in the nation. Water Polo was 14th in the National Coaches' Poll. Although not a varsity sport, boxing won its fourth national title in the last five years. Seven boxers advanced to the finals with two winning national titles.

Regional or league titles were claimed by women's cross country, soccer, men's golf, rifle, women's outdoor track, pistol, lacrosse, women's swimming and women's volleyball.

Several athletes received honors from the Western Athletic Conference. Rob Eamon won the conference javelin championship in outdoor track while 11 athletes were named to the All-WAC football teams. Named to the first team were John Kershner, Scott Wachenheim, Sean Pavlich, Chris Funk and Greg Zolinger while Marty Louthan, Mike Brown, Don Oberdieck, Mark Melcher, Mike Kirby and Charlie Heath were named to the second team. Dan Rojas won an indoor track title in the 880-yard run.

In its 28 years of varsity athletic competition, Air Force has won 5,392 contests, lost 2,686 and tied 67, for an overall percentage of 66.6.

Besides the special functions, Arnold Hall frequently has informal dances in the disco lounge and a large television screen in Richter Lounge for large audience viewing.





A civilian coach joined the team early in August. Coach Bob Von Derau arrived highly qualified as a former national and world champion skydiver. 
Guest speakers included Captain Coombs, from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Houston.

This year the Physics club took on a whole new look. Now called the Physics/Astronomy club they incorporated the members and activities from both of the old clubs. 
The organization conducts monthly meetings, occasional parties, and

As another year slips by, the Bull-dawgs have enjoyed an absence of internal conflict to make this about our best year here.






AOC - Maj Buzz Shiely
