
CONUS



















All pilot candidates at the Academy must complete the T-41 Airmanship course.

The Falcons broke into the polls via a 59-17 romp over the Rice Owls. Falcon quarterback Bart Weiss led Air Force to the win with three touchdowns and 172 yards rushing in 14 carries. He also completed five passes in seven attempts for 97 yards.

Weiss was named Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Week for his performance. Falcon fullback Johnnie Smith has his best day rushing for 133 yards in 11 carries, in the first half.


Halfback Kelly Pittman rushed 19 yards on five carries resulting in two touchdowns.

With the Falcon offensive unit running rampant (503 total yards), the defense just needed to play their own brand of football, and they did so very well.

The Falcon defensive unit held Rice to 390 total yards, with only 77 of that total on the ground. Rice threw for 354 yards, completing 23 of 48 passes, but most of those yards came on two long completions.

The Air Force Defensive unit also forced two interceptions and five quarterback sacks, in addition to a blocked punt. Cornerback Tom Rotello and linebacker Steve Sigler both picked off their second pass thefts of the year, while linebacker Kevin Martin gave the Falcons the ball on the Rice 20-yeard line with a blocked punt in the third quarter.

The play that put the game away and broke Rice's spirit took only nine seconds and came at the end of the first half. Falcon head coach Fisher DeBerry called a time-out with Rice in a punting situation to try to set up a return and a field goal try. Instead of a field goal try, Senior Scott Thomas returns the punt all the way for a touchdown and a commanding lead going into the second half.

Consider these AFA heroics:

The Falcon's wishbone finished with 225 rushing yards and 150 by passing.

Mark Simon, an emerging star, averaged 53.6 yards on three punts.

Tom Ruby, virtually an unknown quality, kicked field goals of 31 and 27 yards when drive stalled and easily handled five extra-point tries.


Bart Weiss, the first- team quarterback, completed five of six passes for 132 yards, including a 60- yard scoring strike to halfback Kelly Pittman.

Incredibly, the long TD put UTEP into a 14-0 hole less than seven minutes into the game.

The agony of not being able to win at War Memorial since 1970 ended for the Falcons.

The Falcons erased a bitter part of recent history by thrashing Wyoming, 49-7.

This was one score that told no lie. The Falcons were much to dominant for a Wyoming team that was coming off a 21 point loss at Baylor the week before.

Incredibly, Air Force rolled to its second consecutive 42 point rout before the fourth largest crowd in UW history.

Wyoming failed to capitalize after grabbing a 7-0 lead. From there, the Cowboys were bucked into oblivion. AFA quarterback Bart Weiss ran for a career-high three touchdowns and passed for another. Johnny Smith, the little bull at fullback, rushed 17 times for a gamehigh 80 yards.

AFA wide receiver Ken Carpenter caught five passes for 108 yards. And the Falcons' offensive line blew open several gaping holes that helped lead to an overwhelming 477-171 edge in total yards.


Late in the fourth quarter when Steve Sigler, a second-team safety from Houston, swiped a David Gosnell pass and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown.

Wyoming limped off with its worst defeat at home since a 52-3 loss to Arizona State in 1970.


In the second quarter, Wyoming recovered AFA fumbles at the Cowboys' 48-yard line, the Falcons' 46 and Cowboys' 32.

Falcons Notch Fourth Victory

The Falcons hit the University of New Mexico Lobos with a sneak bombing attack to notch a 49-12 Western Athletic Conference football victory. The game saw the Academy mix its powerful running attack with a few long yardage passes for 580 yards of offense. Air Force played another tough game defensively, taking the ball away three times and stopping the Lobos on three fourth-down conversion attempts.

With Air Force leading 7-3 in the first period, quarterback Bart Weiss threw a 58 yard scoring strike to Ken Carpenter, who had stopped behind the run-conscious Lobo defense. The pass opened up the running game for the Falcons and helped spark a 28-6 halftime lead. Carpenter finished the game with a career-high 156 yards on six receptions.

The next Falcon touchdown came on a nine-yard halfback pass from Randy Jones to tight end Hugh Brennan. The score was set up by a Weiss-to-Brennan bomb of 52 yards. Weiss left the game early in the fourth quarter after connecting on eight of 12 passes for 218 yards. He also rushed for 53 yards on 15 carries and scored one touchdown.


The Academy's success in the air battle was matched by the Falcon's well-run rushing attack which gained 340 yards. Kelly Pitman ran over New Mexico's defense 12 times for 126 yards and two touchdowns. One carry was a gamebreaking 62-yard sprint down the right sideline for a touchdown just before halftime.

Pittman credited his success to his teammates and in the backfield. "With those blocks, I was able to get to the crease and get some yards," he said.

Coach Fisher DeBerry sent in the Air Force reserves early in the fourth quarter with the score 42-6 and his second team offense and defense beat mostly New Mexico regulars 7-6. The back-up Air Force defenders stopped the Lobos on two tries to convert fourth-downs near the goal line.

Coach DeBerry was impressed with the total team effort and pride displayed by the Falcons. He attributed the team's passing efficiency to the blocking by the offensive line and the running backs. Of the defense, he was impressed with how the team controlled Lobo running back Willie Turral and kept the New Mexico score down.

CSU Gives Falcons "Run For Money"

Bartalo ran over, through and occasionally around the Falcon defense enroute to a 207-yard rushing performance on 47 carries. But even Superman couldn't do it alone, and Air Force survived its biggest scare yet, pulling out a 35-19 win over the Rams.

The win moved Air Force to No. 6 on the United Press International poll and No. 8 on the Associated Press poll. The Falcons retained a share of the Western Athletic Conference lead at 4-0 in league play, tied with Utah. Brigham Young is the only other unbeaten WAC team at 3-0. No team in the history of the conference has ever won the league title with more than one loss.

Air Force didn't win the CSU game until the fourth quarter, even though they had a lead from midway through the second quarter.

CSU had a 10-0 lead before Air Force ever had a chance to run an offensive play. The Rams drove to a field goal in its first possession, than a fumbled kick-off gave them the ball on Air Force's 22-yard line. Two runs for the touchdown put the Falcons in an early hole.

But Air Force bounced back with two first-half touchdowns to take a 14-13 half-time lead. The first score came on a 26-yard run by halfback Kelly Pittman, and the second on a 20-yard scoring strike from quarterback Bart Weiss to wide receiver Ken Carpenter. A 60-yard field goal on the first halfs final play cut the lead to one.


Air Force seemed to relax and play solid football after the intermission, instead of retaliation to the tactics of the CSU players. Both teams tried the physical intimidation route in the first half, and it showed in missed tackles and after the whistle activities for each team.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Falcons marched to a 21-13 lead early in the fourth quarter on a 10-yard run by halfback Randy Jones. Then the Falcon de-

fense watched helplessly as CSU quarterback Kelly Stouffer ran untouched into the end zone from 10 yards out after finding no open receivers to push the score to 21-19. Linebacker Pat Malackowski tipped a pass on the two-point conversion try and kept the slim lead.

Then the only unbeaten wishbone offense in the nation exploded. Air Force used just over a minute to march 80 yards on three plays for a 28-19 lead. The drive started when Weiss rambled 44 yards on a keeper, and was finished when fullback Johnnie Smith burst through the line for the final 30 yards and the end zone.

The Rams tried to make a comeback bid but CSU's quarterback Kelly Stouffer was intercepted on a desperation pass. The interception was the second of the game for Stouffer, who had thrown just two in the previous five games. It stopped any chance to knock off the nationally-ranked Falcons, one of only four teams in Division 1-A of the National Collegiate Athletic Association still untied and unbeaten.

Scott Thomas outraced Erroll Tucker, and the Air Force Academy wishbone outdueled Utah quarterback Larry Egger. So there was really nothing outlandish in Air Force's 37-

15 thumping of the Utes Saturday at Falcon Stadium.

Or was there?

The crowd was disappointingly outlandish. Only 32,269 - including officials of the Orange, Sugar, Fiesta, Bluebonnet and Citrus bowls - showed up on a comfortable day to watch the eighth ranked Falcons:

- Move to 8-0 overall.

- Surge all alone to the top of the Western Athletic Conference ladder at 5-0.

Claim their school-record 11th consecutive victory.
 Thomas, the Falcons' senior free safety, was brilliant. The
 AFA wishbone was too, when it didn't make mistakes.

And, not to be forgotten, it was Air Force's defense that checked Utah's high-scoring offense to only two touchdowns. The Utes entered the WAC showdown ranked sixth nationally in scoring at 35.9 points per game.

Air Force swiped three of Egger's passes, including two in the final 7:49 by junior cornerback Tom Rotello of Denver

that erased Utah scoring threats.

Thomas, though, loomed larger than any other player. He returned five punts for 61 yards, including a 32-yarder early in the second quarter, and took the opening kickoff of the second half 2 yards deep in his own end zone en route to scoring

his third touchdown of the year.

His clutch home run lifted Air Force to a 28-7 lead in a matter of seconds - seven, on the scoreboard clock - and the hole proved costly to the Utes. Thomas' heroics even over-shadowed a career-best day by Johnny Smith, the Falcons' backup fullback. Smith broke loose for 175 yards on only 14 carries and scored one touchdown, and led Air Force's rush to an overwhelming total of 451 yards on the ground.

Right behind were halfback Kelly Pittman, with 115 yards, and quarterback Bart Weiss, with 105. Pittman scored

three touchdowns.

It marked the first time in AFA history that three backs cracked the 100-yard barrier in the same game. Incredibly, the Falcons won by 22 points despite commit-

Incredibly, the Falcons won by 22 points despite committing four turnovers. They also gave up 415 total yards to the Egger led Utes.

"But dadgummit, we kept them out of the end zone except for two times. And I believe that's what a defense is for, to keep your opponent out of the end zone. Egger is as good as everybody said he was. He hurt us. But we always seemed like we were able to recover. Rotello's two interceptions helped us a great deal." said coach Fisher DeBerry.

"Air Force is an excellent team." Fassel said. "You have to play well to beat a team like that, and we just didn't make things happen when we needed to. We were not very good on special teams and we had a hard time stopping them early."

"We just didn't do a good job in all areas, which is what you have to do to beat a team like Air Force. You have to capitalize, and we didn't. It came down to the fact that they made the big plays. We didn't make them. Yes, this hurts.

Utah's mistakes

Egger was sacked four times. AFA linebacker Ty Hankamer had two of them, one of which resulted in a third quarter safety, the first of the Falcons' season.

Smith thundered early and often, and too many times the Utes were bruised outside by Weiss' option pitches.

Scott Thomas became just the fourth player in NCAA history to return a punt, interception and kickoff for touchdowns in the same season.

A year ago, when Utah handed Air Force a 28-17 defeat, Thomas fumbled the opening kickoff of the second half. The Utes took the turnover and scored.





Cornerback Tom Rotello nailed two pass thefts, returning one 30 yards for a

touchdown in the opening series of the second half for the the Aztecs. Rotello earned a fourth rank in the National Collegiate Athletic Association in interceptions with seven, while safety Scott Thomas and cornerback Dwan Wilson were in the top 40 with four and five thefts, respectively.

Falcons Suffer Only Loss

The Falcons shocked the defending national champions in the games's opening three minutes, jumping out to a 14-0 lead via two pass interceptions. Linebacker Pat Malackowski's pass theft gave the Falcon offense unit great field position for the opening score, a Weiss to halfback Randy Jones pass, then cornerback Tom Rotello stepped in front of a Robbie Bosco pass and sprinted 25 yards to the end zone.

Using a series of short passes, the Cougars marched downfield for a touchdown of their own. The 70-yard drive moved the score to 14-7. But the Falcon defense was far from done.

Cornerback Dwan Wilson set his receiver up perfectly and stepped in front of another Bosco pass, then hit the sidelines for a 58 yard touchdown interception. Up 21-7 at the half, and the defense having another great game, the Falcons seemed to be on the verge of a blowout.

Air Force took the second-half kickoff and punted after three plays. Mark Simon's 46-yard boot was gathered in by Vai Sikahema and he didn't stop until he hit the end zone 72 yards away. It was the first punt returned for a touchdown against the Falcons in their history. And it also signaled the turning point of the game.

BYU's mamoth defense shut down the Falcon flexbone through the second half until the game-ending drive with just over five minutes to play. And the Cougar offense came out of hibernation long enough to add two long touchdown passes to build a 28-21 lead.

The loss ended the nation's longest winning streak at 13 games. But coach Fisher DeBerry said "I guess we'll just have to start a new streak."

Air Force ended its regular season the same way it started, with an offense that did what it needed to do and did it well, and a defense that continually rose above and beyond the occasion.

Quarterback Bart Weiss became just the third collegiate football player at the Division 1 level to both run and pass for more than 1,000 yards in a season. He finished the Hawaii game with 46 yards rushing and 140 through the air. Totals for the season came out to 1,032 yards rushing and 1,449 yards passing.

But again, as it has so many times season, this one belonged to the defense.

The defense unit forced five turnovers from the Rainbows. Who had just two turnovers in his previous three games. Air Force covered two first half fumbles, and added three interceptions in the second half.



Weiss's 46 yards rushing led the Falcons. Fullback Johnny Smith had 45, Evans 44 and halfback Kelly Pittman 41. Thomas led the defense with 10 tackles, while Scott and Chandler had nine each.

Tyrone Jeffcoat had a 19-yard reception to add to Weiss' 9-15-1 performance. Bart's one interception gave him just four on the year. Brian Knorr replaced Weiss for several plays as he shook off crushing hits, and had one completion and one interception in two attempts.








The Falcon's halfback Greg Pshaniak scored the first touchdown of the game and Army began to wonder what hit them.

The Commander in Chief's Trophy symbolizes football supremacy among the nation's three major military academies. The 170-pound, three-sided trophy stands 2 1/2 feet tall and is engraved with the seal of each Academy. It also displays a sculptured model of the mascot of each school.

The trophy is presented annually to the service academy with the best won-lost record in inter-service football competition. The year in which the trophy is won is engraved on a plate on the appropriate Academy's side of the trophy.

Named in honor of the President as Commander in Chief of the U.S. Armed Forces, this rotating trophy is sponsored by the alumni associations of the three academies.

The idea for the establishment of an inter-service football trophy originated with the late General George B. Simler, commander of the Air Training Command

and a former Air Force Academy athletic director. General Simler proposed the idea to the Air Force Academy Association of Graduates in early 1972. The Association in turn proposed the project to the alumni associations of West Point and Annapolis. The idea caught on, and the 1972 season was chosen as the appropriate time to establish the tradition in-as-much as it marked the first year of round-robin competition in football between the academies.

Army captured the trophy that first year. Navy took possession of it in 1973 and held it through the 1976 season. Army regained the trophy in 1977 with victories over both Navy and Air Force. Navy won it back in 1978 and held it until 1982.

The Falcons defeated Army and Navy in 1982 and 1983 to claim possession of the trophy for the first time since it was established. The 1984 season saw the trophy return to the possession of the White Knights,

and the Falcons didn't like it.

Head Coach Fisher DeBerry challenged his team at the beginning of the 1985 season to win back the coveted Commander In Chief's Trophy. Things looked good for the Falcons as they defeated the highly touted Midshipmen in Annapolis and October 12 by a 24-7 margin.

The trophy wasn't theirs yet, however, because the Black Knights of Army were coming off an excellent 8-3-1 season and an appearance in the Cherry Bowl. Army invaded Falcon Stadium on November 9th. A sell-out crowd watched as the Falcons routed Army 45-7.

"Our number one goal always is to beat Army and Navy," said DeBerry in a recent interview. "Our second goal is to win the WAC."

In 1985 the Falcons regained possession of the Commander In Chief's Trophy and won a portion of the WAC title.

Falcons Have

Mark Simon repeatedly gave Texas swift kicks in the britches.

Pat Evans rumbled like he wanted to play the party role of Bevo, the longhorns' bigger-than-life mascot steer.

And on New Year's Eve, football purists everywhere lifted their crystal glasses to toast the heroics of the struggle between magnificent defensive emotions.

Air Force rode off into the Texas sunset with a 24-16 beating of the Longhorns in the 27th Bluebonnet Bowl game, and the victory long will be remembered as one of the most cherished in academy history.

In spite of Texas thoroughly derailing the AFA wishbone's outside attack and passing game, the Falcons won.

In spite of having to punt a Bluebonnet record 11 times, the Falcons won.

And in spite of Ken Carpenter's absence, the Falcons won. Carpenter, Air Force's standout senior wide receiver, left the game late in the second quarter and never returned after aggravating a foot injury.

Simon averaged a whopping 49.2 yards on the Falcons' 11 punts and single-handedly saved Air Force in a nightmarish second quarter.

Evans, Air Force's Junior fullback, scored the Falcons third touchdown of the game and rushed 18 times for a season high 129 yards.

They were enough to hold off a Texas team that finished 8-

Air Force closed a memorable 1985 with a school-record 12th win in 13 games. The Falcons' bowl triumph also was their fourth straight in as many years.

"I believe our true character came out in this game," said coach Fisher DeBerry, who pushed his career record to 20-5. "I'll say it again. This was one special group of Air Force players and one special group of Air Force seniors."

"Mark Simon continually bailed us out of trouble, and we kept plugging and plugging away. We believe in ourselves, perhaps more than any other team in the country believes in itself. This bunch will fight and scrap with you, and they're going to find a dadgum way to beat you. Today was no different."

It was halfback Greg Pshsniak and quarter back Bart Weiss, two AFA senior, who answered with 1-yard touchdown runs that gave the Falcons a 14-7 halftime lead.

Jeff Ward kicked three short-ranged second-half field goals for the Longhorns, the last coming with 7:34 remaining in the fourth quarter, but they weren't enough.

As it was, Evans broke loose on a 19-yard touchdown sprint late in the third quarter after AFA cornerback Tom Rotello intercepted Stafford.

And Air Force senior Tom Ruby hammered home a 40-yard field goal just 43 seconds from the finish to seal the Longhorns' fate.

"We got behind early," DeBerry said. "But the thing about it was, Texas executed that TD play of theirs really, really well. So we couldn't feel all that bad about it."

After Air Force's opening three possessions of the second quarter, they had minus-8 yards total offense for the quarter. Texas' defensive might was such that the Falcons' finished the 15-minute period with one first down, 26 total yards and three fumbles, none of which they lost.

"Just an incredible punting exhibition by that young man," De-Berry said. "We would have been in big trouble today without him around to bail us out."

"I believe we had a lot of MVPs out there today. But Mark Simon is as much an MVP as anybody we've got."

Air Force enjoyed a turnover free game, though Scott Thomas did fumble two Texas punts. Stafford was intercepted twice, and completed just nine passes for 88 yards.

AFA linebackers Terry Maki and Mike Chandler combined for 27 tackles. Chad Hennings, the Falcons' sophomore defensive tackle, added eight stops.

"Texas was as physical a team as we've played all year," DeBerry said. "Their defense is outstanding. Texas came after Bart and really did a job on him."

"But we held together, and that's what I'm most proud of. I don't know if it's possible for it to get any better than this."



Any successful major-college football team must possess one essential ingredient, experience. The more the better.

"There's no substitute in the world for game experience," says head coach Fisher DeBerry, echoing the conviction of countless thousand peers. "And the only way you can build it is to throw guys out there and let them learn for themselves."

Programs with winning traditions are the ones that are abe to replenish the annual vacancies caused by graduation. But even the established, successful college operations occasionally hit the jackpot.

At AFA, the good news began with a boring spring practice. That's right, boring. With 16 returning starters - six on offense, eight on defense and two from the kicking game - the Falcons had a strong nucleus. That number was strengthened by the large senior class, numbering 28 in all.

Before the year of 1985 ended, that special group would set some remarkable standards for future AFA teams to follow: 12 wins, most by any Division 1-A team in America and two more than any Air Force team ever before; a 12-1 record, including a fourth straight win over Notre Dame and the recapturing of the Commander in Chief's Trophy; a 24-16 victory over proud Texas at the Bluebonnet Bowl, the Falcons' fourth straight bowl conquest; and the No. 5 ranking in the final UPI poll.

Reaching all those lofty achievements was no accident, either. Not with the kind of experience, mixed with a sprinkling of gifted newcomers, that Air Force nurtured in every position area:

There was concern at the start on the offensive line bacause the three inside spots - center and both guards - would be first-year starters. Kraig Evenson and Dave Sutton gave Air Force a set of all-league caliber tackles, and Hugh Brennan also returned at tight end. But the line was a major concern going into spring practice.

In the end, though, that worry was unnecessary. Senior squadman Joe Jose and rugged junior Steve Hendrickson rapidly developed into capable guards, while senior Rusty Wilson emerged as the top center despite being only 6-0 and 225 pounds.

How successful were they? Well, Air Force's fullback tandem of Johnny Smith and Pat Evans combined for 1,214 yds, which means the holes were there up front. And the pass protection was good enough that passer Bart Weiss was sacked only a handful of times all season.

With Ken Carpenter back for his senior year, Air Force considered the wide receiver position as strong. With backup Eric Pharris adding the run-pass threat, too, that added to the weaponry. Pharris suffered a knee injury in August and barely played, but others merely stepped in to fill the gap.

Ron Bryant and Steve Allen proved effective blockers, and helped carry out the Falcon's messenger play-calling system. Tyrone Jeffcoat, a talented junior, began to burst forth late as a threat for next year.

But Carpenter was amazing. He caught 42 passes for 869 yds, an average of 20.7 yds per catch that nobody anywhere could match. He had three 100-yd days and caught a pass in evey game.

That opened up the tight end threat, and Brennan took advantage with 10 catches for 189 yds and two TDs.

There was no apprehension at any time about the core roles in the wishbone - quarterback and fullback. Weiss backed by Brian Knorr at the controls, with Smith and Evans at fullback, were proven stars.

Weiss was merely superlative, becoming only the third player in NCAA history to run and pass for more than 1,000 yds in the same season. He ran for 1,032 and threw for 1,449 while scoring 12 touchdowns, which added

up to the stunning honor of Western Athletic Conference Offensive player of the year. That also meant dethroning Brigham Young's Robbie Bosco as the all-WAC quarterback.

Smith and Evans banged away at opposing defenses until they broke through. Smith had 722 yds and Evans, had 492. But it was Evans who keyed the bowl win over Texas with 129 yds on 18 carries.

Air Force's halfbacks, not as explosive as in years past, still produced the big plays. Kelly Pittman, had an excellent senior season with 524 yds rushing, two 100 yd-days, a team-high 14 TDs and 12 catches

Randy Jones and Greg Pshsniak, provided more blocks than yards, but still cleared many paths for Weiss on the triple option.

Punter Mark Simon was expected to be dependable, as was fouryear kick-snapper Derek Brown. Nobody knew what to expect from the placekicking, but senior Tom Ruby won the job just before the season

Simon led the nation in punting with a 47.3 yd average and 20 kicks (out of 53) stopped inside the 20. Ruby set an AFA single-season record with 52-52 extra points, and he was 9 and 10 on field goals from inside 40 vds. Brown wound up his four years with only one faulty snap.

Along with the offensive front, the defensive line was a shaky area in the pre-season. But not because of talent, just experience. Everyone knew tackle John Ziegler would be steady, which he was. But starters, Steve Spewock at nose guard and Chad Hennings at the other tackle, were new to their positions.

That trio, plus nose guard Dick Clark, had much to do with the Falcons giving up only 108.9 rushing yds a game, and just eight TDs on the ground.

Spewock and Clark were ferocious inside, while Hennings (at 6-5 and 245, the only true pro-sized lineman in the program) showed he could be a dominant force in his final two years.

Terry Maki and Mike Chandler already were locked in as firstrate inside linebackers. Maki had 30 tackles against Notre Dame, earning him national player of the week honors, while Chandler was Mr. Steady despite his lack of size at 6-0 and 207 lbs.

"Chandler was the brains of our defense," said coordinator Burce Johnson. "And Maki is just an outstanding player, all over the field."

"Drop" backer Pat Malackowski was the team's spiritual leader while Ty Hankamer and Chuck Kinamon shared the "rush" position during the year.

The Falcons secondary pulled down 28 interceptions and produced six TDs (including one on A.J. Scott's blocked field goal return against Notre Dame).

Free safety Scott Thomas, became a consensus all-American. Cornerback Dwan Wilson wound up as the AFA career interceptions leader with 15, and he somehow was left off the all-league lists. Making that honor was the other cornerback, om Rotello, who led the team with eight interceptions. Scott, the strong safety for three years, was the hero against Notre Dame and also had two interceptions in his regular season finale at Hawaii.

When a nickel back was needed, backup safety Steve Sigler was always in the right place, especially when he returned an interception for a TD against Wyoming.

So the mixture of experience some position change and just a few surprises carried AFA to a 12-1 season - never to be forgotten at the Academy.

The book on Fisher DeBerry, football and otherwise, says he cares about his players at the Air Force Academy.

The night of October 11, 1985, in a hotel lobby near Annapolis, Maryland, a story about caring unfolded that the book never discussed.

Air Force was in town to play Navy the next day at Annapolis. Grant Morris, a third-team sophomore fullback from San Antonio, Texas, did not make the flight with the Falcons to the Baltimore-Washington airport.

He was home attending the funeral of a relative, and would fly in Friday night, October 11, to join the Falcons at their hotel

His flight was delayed, and delayed again. Past midnight, on the eve of a crucial Commander in Chief's Trophy game, DeBerry sat waiting in the hotel lobby

He had planned all along to personally meet Morris at the airport upon his arrival, and drive him back to the hotel.

The delayed flight never changed his mind.

"It's nothing, really," DeBerry said, while waiting

for a call that would tell him Morris' flight had arrived. "He'll need a ride, and I want to go get him."

It was close to 1 a.m. when the flight finally touched down. DeBerry drove off to greet his third-team fullback

"Fisher is a great human being," one Air Force staffer said that night. "And this is just one example that proves it."

This year, with DeBerry at the helm, Air Force won a share of its first-ever Western Athletic Conference championship.

The Falcons pocketed their fourth straight bowl bid after a 10-0 start, and De-Berry was named the WAC's Coach of the Year.

DeBerry also was named national Coach of the Year by the Walter Camp Foundation, and by his peers in The American Football Coaches Association. Not to mention the Bobby Dodd coach of the Year Award, given by the American Sportsmanship council and named after the legendary Georgia Tech coach Bobby Dodd.

The choice to select Fisher as head coach was one of the best the Academy has made as Col Clune stated.

"The Academy is not an easy place to coach. We're not here to build professional football players. We're here to build warriors and military leaders. The people we hire have to understand that."

'Nobody has a more sincere interest in you as a person than Coach De-Berry." said Bart Weiss. "He knows what it takes to be successful - namely, hard work - and he expects you to contribute that to the program.

"I can remember back to that team meeting when he was introduced to us as the new head coach. I was like everybody else in that I was hoping he'd succeed coach Hatfield. He just told us one thing." He said, 'Give it your best shot, and let's keep the momentum going.' He got the message across.

"He picked right up where Coach Hatfield left off. Nothing was lost in the transition, and I think much of that had to do with Coach DeBerry's commitment to the Air Force Academy. You won't find anybody who loves this place more. You also won't find anybody that puts in a longer day. He's demanding, but he's also a lot of fun to play for."

He's also loyal. When the Falcons were in the midst of Bluebonnet Bowl preparations, the University of Minnesota, looking to fill a vacancy created by the sudden departure of Lou Holtz to Notre Dame, came calling.

DeBerry listened and said thanks, but no thanks.

He's become as much a part of the Academy as the Cadet Chapel and

The Falcon Linksters played only in invitational matches during the spring season but carried a 12-1 dual record over from the fall. They finished sixth in the WAC Cahmpionships but won the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Golf Association title on the final day of play.

Four Falcon golfers made the RMIGFA first and second teams. Sophmore Glen Wiggy and senior Von Gardner took first-team honors, while senior Dave Wright and junior Jeff Cliatt made the second string.

Glen Wiggy was selected as the teams most valuable player and second overall in the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Golf Association standings with a 76.75 strong average.









The Lady Falcons' season was plagued with injuries, but senior Sue Wieland came on strong late in the season to qualify for the National Finals.



C3C Guerra was selected to represent Air Force at the NCAA Championships in foil along with C4C Shinberg in epee. Our two fencers made a remarkably storng team showing with only two team members. 


Women's Volleyball Finishes

After suffering through a losing streak and watching their record fall to 11-13, the Falcons won four consecutive games to finish the season at 15-13. It was the first winning season for the Falcons since 1978-79 when the team skated to a 18-12-1 record.

For the third consecutive year, senior Frank Daldine was the team point leader with 44 on 18 goals and 26 assists. Frank received a special award for his contribution to the Academy ice hockey program.

Frank completed his career as the eighth leading scorer in the Air Force hockey history. During his four year career as a varsity letterman, he was the leading scorer each year. His average of 1.57 goals per game this season placed him among the top 50 scorers nation wide.

Four year letterman Tim Hartie was given the team's most valuable player award. He was the 19th best scorer in Academy hockey history with 53 goals and 54 assists tallied in the 111 games he's played. The senior also served as Co-captain for the 1985-86 team.

His first season delivered an 8-20 record, the most losses ever at the academy. The team finished 2-14 in the Western Athletic Conference, but did defeat Brigham Young on the road in the first round of the league playoffs.

In his second season, the Falcons finished 10-19, 3-13 in the WAC. AFA again won in the WAC tourney's first round, only to fall in the quarterfinals, this time to top-seeded Wyoming.

While the improvement wasn't much, Minton at least could point to some steps forward.

The hopes for the 1985-86 season were spurred by the return of five seniors: Maurice "Mo" McDonald, Jim Gulsvig, Todd Beer, Byron Clay and Mike Edwards, who quit the team before the final game.

McDonald, the academy's No.6 all-time scorer and No.11 rebounder, led the team in scoring for the third straight season and was first in rebounding for the second time in three seasons. Beer led the WAC in assists. Gulsvig was a hard-working, consistent forward. Edwards (who started the first 19 games) and Clay lent stablility to the backcourt.

One sore spot, though, was AFA's fieldgoal shooting. In the league, Air Force hit 41 percent while allowing almost 50 percent.

Assistant coach Dan Kraft noted that the Falcons were No.1 in the WAC in rebound margin (an average


Although his 1986-87 squad will be without a senior, Minton is optimistic.


"We'll have some young players out there. I think they have some pretty good skills. They'll get better."






Lady Falcons Have Strong Showing

The Falcons closed their season with a fourth place showing in the WAC tournament and a 3-12 record.










Lacrosse Is Best in the West


Two Falcons were ranked nationally. Senior Joe Vasta in assists and total points and Junior goalie Ken Wessels in save percentage.











Judo Makes Good Showing

Led by the third place finish of Jody Vernlund in the women's 145-pound division, the Academy Judo Team made a good showing at the 24th National Collegiate Judo Championships at West Point.

Ken Tucker placed fourth in the men's 189-pound division, while Charles Reilly placed fifth in the men's 143-pound division.

Approximately 180 competitors from more than 40 colleges and universities fought for eight men's and women's individual weight category titles in the cadet gym at West Point. Perennial collegiate judo power San Jose State University beat out Fresno State University for the team championship based on points for individual placements.

This was the first time the Academy had entered a woman in the national collegiate competition. Women's judo has become more competitive recently since the International Olympic Committee has decided that women's judo will be added to the Olympic Games in 1992. Men's judo has been an Olympic sport since 1964.

Vernlund, who is in her second year as a member of the Cadet Judo Team, lost a hard-fought decision to Army's Stamm for the silver medal in her final match, and had to settle for a bronze medal finish.

Tucker, who defeated his first two opponents with throws, lost his final match by a pin to University of New Mexico's Kevin Orr to settle for fourth place.

Reilly won two matches handily with throws, but lost to San Jose State University's Tonra on points. Tonra went on to win the gold medal for the 143-pound division.

Air Force was represented at the Nationals also by Sean Moulton, Jeff Crow and Travis Tebbe. Each lost hard-fought matches on close decisions in the preliminary pools. Although Air Force has placed higher in the past, including Al Abangan's gold medal last year in the 156-pound division, this year's overall finish is the best ever by an Academy judo team.

During the Nationals, a special plaque was presented to former Olympian Paul Maruyama, who is the club officer-in-charge. Maruyama, the 1980 and 1984 Olympic judo coach and four-time national champion, was cited for his contributions to the sport as a competitor and as a coach.





Rugby Leave Tough Act To Follow

The men's Rugby Club finished 3rd in the National championships at Monterey, Ca. The squad lost the first round to East Coast region champions Dartmouth College 18-3 but came back in the consolation round and defeated Bowling Green for third place.

The road to the Final Four began last fall when the club won the Colorado State Championship and earned the right to represent Colorado in the regional competition. The other state champions present in Las Cruces were Texas A&M, the University of South Dakota, Kansas State University, the University of Missouri, Oklahoma University, New Mexico State University and the wild eard spot - the University of Colorado.

In the quarter-final match, Air Force defeated the University of South Dakota, 45-0. The semifinal match proved to be the hardest for Air Force, who narrowly defeated the University of Oklahoma, 10-6. In the other bracket, the University of Colorado defeated Texas A&M, and Kansas State-defeated the University of Missouri. In the semifinal match, Kansas State defeated the University of Colorado, 15-6, and earned the right to face Air Force in the final match.

Air Force coasted to a 24-9 victory which saw the cadets dominate Kansas State for the entire 80 minutes. Kansas State scored first on a penalty kick to take the lead, 3-0. That was their only score in the first half.

Air Force scored on two tries, and converted one to go into halftime with a 10-3 lead. The second half was all Air Force again as the fitness of the Air Force ruggers began to pay off. They scored on three more tries with one conversion and added a penalty kick to lead 24-3.

Kansas State scored with no time remaining and converted to make the final score 24-9.

Four members of the Air Force squad were selected as all-tournament players. C1C Ken Norris (Kneeling left) was selected as an all-tournament back. C1C Keith McCoy (standing right), C1C Rick Metzger (standing left) and C2C Rick Coveno (Kneeling right) were selected all all-tournament forwards. Rick Coveno was also picked as the most valuable forward of the tourney.

Five members of the Academy rugby team were invited to play for the Combined Services Under-23 Rugby Team.

Keith McCoy, Bruce Ellis, Rick Metzger, Rick Coveno and Scott Savoie played in the Battle of New Orleans. The team was composed of officers, enlisted men, cadets and midshipmen from all branches of the United States armed forces, all under the age of 23.

Ellis was nominated captain of the under-23 team, and all five Academy ruggers were invited to play in the under-23 match against the Dutch National Collegiate Team in Washington, D.C. in May.

McCoy and Metzger were also invited to play for the Combined Services Senior Team, which has no age limits and represents the American military on national and international levels.










Boxers Continue Winning

Football, Women's Swimming Pace 1986 Falcons

During the 1985-86 academic year, the Air Force Academy athletic teams continued to compete against some of the best teams in the nation.

Over 800 athletes on 31 intercollegiate teams competed in 539 contests for a winning average of 63.5 percent.

During the 1985-86 school year, Falcon varsity teams competed in 504 contests, winning 315, losing 187 and tying 2 for a 62.7 percentage. The overall program that included junior varsity athletes completed the year with 341 wins, 196 losses, and 2 ties.

Although the women's swimming team was the only undefeated team with a 21-0 record, many teams placed high in the nation.

Football again brought national recognition to the Academy for the fourth-straight year by winning the Bluebonnet Bowl. The Falcons were ranked fifth by United Press and eighth by the Associated Press in their final polls.

Soccer advanced to the NCAA Division I playoffs for the first time in Academy history, but fell to Southern Methodist 2-1 in a highly contested game. With its fine showing, soccer was ranked 17th in the nation.

Pistol took second place in both the free and standard competition and fifth in air at the nationals while women's golf finished sixth in the nation in Division II.

Women's swimming, always a strong contender, finished 11th in the nationals while women's cross country and men's water polo were each ranked 14th in their Division.

While boxing is not an intercollegiate sport, the Falcon team, under head coach Ed Weichers, won its sixth national championship in the past seven years.

Regional or league titles were claimed by women's outdoor track, pistol, rifle, lacrosse, soccer, men's golf and women's swimming.

In its 30 years of varsity athletic competition, Air Force has won 5,927 contests, lost 2,993 and tied 77 for an overall percentage of 66.3.

DEAN General Rokke, the Air Force Academy

e was graduated as president of his senior-high-school class. After one year at a civilian college, he entered the U.S. Air Force Academy. He was graduated as a second lieutenant in 1962. For the academic-year 1986, he was best known as brigadier general and Dean of Faculty at the Air Force Academy.

When Brig. Gen. Ervin J. Rokke, Dean of Faculty, was graduated from the Academy, he never expected to find himself back here as dean. He said, "That's not something you can plan on. I am dean because of a series of circumstances, which involved my being, I guess, in the right place at the right time. Indeed, when I was graduated, I had no intention of ever coming

During General Rokke's Air Force career, he returned to the Academy four times. He first returned in 1968 to become an instructor of international politics in the department of political science. Spending the summer of 1969 as a consultant with the Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research, he again returned to the Academy's political science department faculty and became chairman of instruction in July 1973.

Following these two assignments at the Academy, he had two more. In 1976 he returned as an assistant dean and permanent professor of political science and became head of the department in 1977. After one more assignment away from the Academy, he returned in 1982 and assumed his duties as dean in 1983.

General Rokke said he enjoyed every one of his assignments. He found being dean rewarding and enjoyed working with the cadets. He said, "I find them to be extremely attractive people. They're skeptical but not cynical. They're committed to what they are about here at the Academy. As a result, I attempt to involve myself directly with the cadets."

He footnoted this statement saying, "I also have a strong attachment to the U.S. Air Force. I consider what the Air Force is doing to be very important as far as the security of our country is concerned. Because of that commitment to the Air Force, I find it extremely rewarding to be personally involved in the program of developing future officers."

Cadets come to the Academy to further their education and become Air Force officers. General Rokke feels they should get more from the Academy than a collegelevel education. "This institution is here to prepare young men and women for the U.S. Air Force," he said. "Because of that, it is extremely important that development take place along what might be called several

"First of all, integrity is important. While an individual is here as a cadet, I think it is absolutely essential that they develop a sense of integrity that will remain with them throughout their Air Force career and throughout their lives.

I suppose related to integrity is the notion that while cadets are here, they learn how to contribute to society. In a broader sense, they need to learn to contribute themselves. If a cadet walks away from his or her circumstance, a cadet has failed to understand what the Air Force Academy is all about. We are hoping that cadets will realize that there is a fulfillment challenge in serving that goes beyond self improve-

Cadets are reminded of the word integrity every day as they walk across the terrazzo and see the honor code written out across the honor court in large silver letters.

Along with integrity, General Rokke feels there are a few more aspects to their development. He said, "It's important that cadets come to understand who they are and what they're about. They must get to know themselves better as well as learn about the Air Force and the kinds of academic disciplines we expose them to in the classroom.

"Social maturity is a third arena where our cadets will hopefully develop. I'm speaking primarily of their ability to get along and work with other people - in a sense, function effectively as team players. I don't care whether the team is an athletic team, squadron or a group working on an academic project. What's important is, the idea that in an Air Force career they will need to work with and through other people. They cannot remain solo acts.'

heading and why it is they are moving in that direction. I would hope that is a result of the exposure they have here to the Air Force even though I realize it is a limited exposure. However, I hope when they are graduated they understand something about the profession they have chosen."

He said, these changes do take place in the cadets. Most cadets come here right after graduation from high school. In virtually every case, they are very frightened and don't know what to expect as they stand out on the terrazzo waiting for their first haircut. In many cases, they are probably wondering why they even enrolled to Academy.

"Once the initial shock is over, I find they're very productive. I watch cadets over the years be transformed from those frightened individuals to young men and women who have a clear sense of direction and purpose. Perhaps, this is the major change I see in a graduating cadet, relative to the cadet who is standing out there on the terrazzo on the first day."

General Rokke seemed very devoted to his job as Dean of Faculty. The academicyear 1986 kept him and the faculty busy. Many changes were made to the curriculum

"This was the year we as a faculty looked at our curriculum and asked some hard questions," he said, "Like, are the courses we require of cadets the right courses? Is the number of courses we require of cadets in the context of the core curriculum the appropriate ones? Are there better ways to enhance the actual development of our cadets, curriculum-wise? As a result of that hard look at our curriculum, we indeed are in the midst of implementing several rather substantial changes which will be effective, in some cases, with the curriculum next fall.

"I would hope that they would look upon this year as having been a very enjoyable year at the Air Force Academy. That's the way I look upon it. This has been a good year regardless of what you consider. I don't care if you're looking at the athletic dimension, the military dimension or the academic program. I would hope they would consider it to have been a good year - especially considering the Academy's overall role mission. This was the year the Air Force Academy's faculty dealt with some hard issues relating to curriculum and made changes."

The academic-year 1986 will be remembered by many people. Especially

AERONAUTICS

he dream of most cadets when they begin their education at the Academy is to fly a fighter, but probably few cadets realize the effort that goes into the design and testing of air craft systems. This is the job of Air Force Aeronautical Engineers.

The Academy's Aeronautics Department graduates approximately 60 new officers a year with Bachelor of Science degrees in Aeronautical Engineering. It also provides an atmosphere where cadets can learn about the opportunities available to them after graduation including the roles and responsibilities of a professional officer in the Air Force.

All cadets are introduced to aeronautical engineering through two required courses. The first, Fundamentals of Aeronautics, presents the basics of aerodynamics (why an airplane flies) and flight me-

chanics (how an airplane flies). The second, Introductory Engineering Thermodynamics, deals with energy and how it can and cannot be used. This knowledge is then applied to the study of such topics as shock waves, jet engines, and ground, air, and space-based power cycles.

If a cadet has developed an interest, he or she can choose to pursue aeronautical engineering as a major. Students have a choice of four tracks (aerodynamics, propulsion, flight mechanics, and aircraft structures) to follow, but the emphasis is on providing a strong background in the fundamentals of each of the four tracks so that the students have a solid foundation for a variety of Air Force career paths and later graduate education.

No matter which track a cadet chooses he or she can expect to do hands-on work in the lab, work with computers to solve engineering problems, and learn the fine art of writing technical papers. The capstone course of the aero major however the design course (either aircraft or jet engine design). These courses challenge the student to develop the preliminary design of an aircraft or an aircraft power plant. The hours are

long but the satisfaction is high as each student's design begins to take shape. At the end of this course the student will have used knowledge from all of his major's courses and if care was taken in the design, should have a design that works.

Faculty members of the Aeronautical Engineering Department also do research in addition to instructing. Together with cadets, the faculty members work on projects of current interest using technical reports twice a year. Old research facilities are presently being refurbished and expanded at the same time as new facilities are being built. This last year saw the dedication of a new subsonic wind tunnel.

Graduating with an aeronautical engineering degree opens many doors. The new officer can go into research and development, systems acquisition, astronaut/mission specialist, or flight test (as a test pilot, navigator, or engineer). But regardless of what the graduate decides to do, the Air Force Academy's Aeronautic Department will have provided the Air Force with another quality officer capable of ensuring that the systems of tomorrow keep the qualitative edge we enjoy today.

ASTRONAUTICS

ith its participation in the Space Shuttle Program and the formation of Space Command, the Air Force's involvement in space research is obvious. Perhaps this is the reason the Air Force Academy is the only college in the United States that has an accredited undergraduate Astronautics (Astro) Engineering program.

Cadets graduated with an Astronautics Engineering degree get involved in many areas. Activities include designing or supervising design and development of ballistic missiles, space craft and other astronautical equipment. Likewise, they can conduct tests and analyze; recommend acceptance or non-acceptance of ballistic missiles, spacecraft and other related astronautical equipment.

The Astro department at the Academy also offers a Space Operations major, an interdisciplinary with primary emphasis on

science and engineering. Like the Astro major, this major gives future officers a solid framework for their Air Force space careers.

The Astro department contributes two courses to the core curriculum, Astro 332, Principles of Engineering, which gives cadets a basic understanding of space with military involvement and Engineering (Eng) 430, Engineering Systems Design.

Eng 430 provides cadets the opportunity to apply fundamental engineering concepts from the core engineering courses. Cadets build different structures that will be used for the particular needs of someone or something. They work together as a group, sometimes with a particular person to build exactly what they need. Often times this person is handicapped needing a special type wheelchair or other device. Once the cadets are finished with the project, they donate it to whomever needs it.

Among the various major courses the department offers, there is a design course, Astro 468, Aerospace Vehicle Systems Design. During the semester, cadets develop and apply systems engineering techniques to the design, construction and test of rocket systems and sub-systems.

Once they finish designing and building the rocket prototype, it's time for the systems test. With the supervising of instructors, cadets take their rockets to the firing range and launch them. Hopefully they'll take off and then be recovered. Built into the rocket is a parachute that should pop out after launching, bringing the rocket to a safe landing.

Finally, when a cadet is graduated from the Academy, he'll be able to use skills learned on problems never seen before, know the principles, then apply them. In the final analysis, the Air Force will be receiving a qualified Astronautical Engineer.





BIOLOGY

rom studying different kinds of bacteria to dissecting cats and occasionally eating an algae cookie, that's what the biology major is all about. If it grows lives or breathes, cadets take a look at it to understand the "life" of it.

Lectures and field trips go along with the lab work to help the cadets learn about biology. Through carefully planned programs of academic instruction, laboratory experience and individual research projects, cadets promote their natural scientific talents.

For the highly motivated cadet, biology 499 - independent study, offers advanced research and laboratory techniques beyond the regular courses.

Cadets who major in biology are the ones who like to know what makes things tick. A few of these cadets will go on to medical school while others will become various AFSCs such as: biomedical biology instructor teaching future cadets the basics of "life".

CHEMISTRY

Chemist is a professional who possesses an earned bachelor's or higher degree with a major in a chemical science from an accredited institution and who develops, applies, or communicates the principles of chemistry and exercises independent judgment and discretion in conceiving, planning, coordinating or executing chemical projects, or who has experince in so doing," as defined by the American Chemical Society.

All but very few cadets will be at least introduced to chemistry while at the Academy. Each cadet must complete or validate two semester introductory course.

Chemistry contributes two core courses to the curriculum. Chemistry 111 and 112, General Chemistry, cover the fundamental concepts of chemistry with additional emphasis on the application of chemical principles. The courses cover many topics, anywhere from chemical thermodynamics and gases laws to kinetics.

Students showing an exceptional aptitude in chemistry can enter Chemistry 111 and 112 Honors courses. Honors courses go into greater depths on fundamental concepts with added emphasis on special topics and lab applications.

Cadets finding they really enjoy this sort of research can go for the Chemistry Major. The department offers many electives that will prepare a future officer for various Air Force careers or for graduate school.

As every other department, Chemistry's objective is to produce well-rounded Air Force officers. However, their individual objectives are; to train the cadet to think scientifically (and logically), to impart to the cadet information which is of professional value, to prepare the cadet for later technical and scientific courses and to impart to the cadet information which is of cultural value.

Besides devoting their attention to students, the chemistry department's faculty gets involved in other activities such as; speaking at seminars, conducting "Citizen Workshops on Energy and the Environment" and giving Chemistry Magic Shows at local schools.

Additionally, the department brings in outside people. This year Professor Steven Thompson, from CSU, was brought in to work with the Chemistry faculty. He added many new innovative laboratory techniques to the department. Prof. Thompson is noted for his expertise in several areas. Among

them being internationally known as an expert on the color of flowers, he's also a legitimate fire-eater.

Whether or not a cadet majors in chemistry, the department strives to offer a balanced chemistry program. If a cadet does decide to major in this area, he will be graduated with all the recommendations required by the Committee on Professional Training of the American Chemical Society.



CIVIL ENGINEERING

lot of cadets come to the Academy for the challenge and excitement of becoming an Air Force officer. Some cadets want this challenge to go on even after they put on their gold bars four years later.

Those cadets who decide Civil Engineering to be their major are the ones who enjoy the challenge of planning, designing and constructing.

As part of the core curriculum, Civil Engineering teaches the first engineering course — Engineering 110. In this course the cadets tour all engineering labs and get a perspective of all the engineerings.

Cadets are taught the fundamentals, then put to work using them. One such project is, building a self-propelled balsa wood prototype XA-10. After they finish building it, they research, calculate and experiment with them. The objective is to drop a bomb onto an enemy gun emplacement. Following hours of hard work, the prototype is put to the final test. The cadets run them on a track hoping all their time and efforts pay off.

The department teaches many aspects of engineering to the cadets. One project the cadets get involved in is designing and building a cement canoe. After completing it, the fun has just begun. This is when they ask the question "Will cement really

float?" To find out, the Academy enters an annual cement canoe race against other area colleges.

Before anything can be built, it has to be designed. This year the department received a donation of computers along with hardware and software. Those helped cadets learn the technique of designing with a keyboard instead of pencil and paper. Mainly used for architectural design this year, the department plans on using it in other courses in the coming years.

Making it through four years of tough academics may be a challenge. However, those who become civil engineers will keep on facing the challenges in the outside world.



A cadet is required to take at least one



swer.

Officers with a degree in Economics contribute their knowledge to many fundamental economic problems the Air Force deals with daily. Scarce resources have to be allocated to the best use during peacetime and war. The Academy's Economic department strives toward preparing cadets for careers that best use economics tools.

They offer two courses to the core curriculum. Econ 221, Micro

Economics and Econ 222, Macro Economics. Econ 221, taken for a full semester, teaches cadets corporate economics that deal with levels of production and pricing concepts. Econ. 222, geared toward larger levels, teaches more about governmental and international policies.

In Econ 454, Soviet and Chinese Economic Policy, a majors course, takes an in depth look at both countries then compares and contrasts them. Cadets are then required to do reports both written and oral. This course may be considered a little different because most colleges don't combine the two countries under one course.

The department offers many more majors courses for cadets. Likewise, there are many career options for the economics major. Whichever career a cadet goes into it can be assured he'll be an asset to the Air Force mission.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING

ehind nearly every Air Force weapon system, be it gun, bomb, missile, or aircraft, stands a team of electrical engineers. Without those engineers the capabilities of our modern systems would still be a dream. And if it weren't for the Air Force Academy's Electrical Engineering Department, the Air Force would have fewer qualified engineers to design and build those advanced systems.

But graduating approximately 60 electrical engineers each year fulfills only one of the goals of the Electrical Engineering Department. The department aims particularly to produce professional officers with backgrounds appropriate to meet the challenging technical requirements of today's Air Force.

All cadets learn something about electrical engineering in two required courses. The first, Digital Signals and Systems, introduces the principles of logic design and microcomputers, while the second course, Signals and Systems, covers signal analysis and the operation of systems in fields such as communications and radar.

If these courses catch a cadet's interest, he or she can choose to pursue electrical engineering as a major. Students have a choice of subject tracks to follow. A fundamental sequence provides a solid foundation in all the basic areas of electrical engineering. More emphasis is given to specific subject areas in the communications, computer engineering, and instrumentation tracks.

All of the sequences offer extensive lab work to give cadets hand-on experience and an appreciation of the practical problems of design. During their final semester each electrical engineering major completes a significant design project, progressing from a statement of the problem to be solved to final construction, packaging, and testing.

Examples of recent cadet projects are a sensor system for a robot, spread spectrum communication system components, a suntracking solar panel, and an electronic competition parachute landing target with digital display. In many cases cadet projects are suggested and sponsored by operational Air Force organizations.

Faculty members of the Electrical Engineering Department are playing major roles in the Academy's Microcomputers in the Dormitories, (MID) Project. Projected to be one of the largest university computer network systems in existence, MID provides a computer for each cadet, and will

interconnect over 5000 users (both cadets and faculty).

Upon graduation, there are a variety of assignments available to electrical engineering students. Some are assigned to Air Force laboratories, where they conduct research contributing to the development of future systems. Others participate in test and evaluation programs, or technical support of operational Air Force systems. In any case, it's safe to say that without Air Force Academy electrical engineering graduates, the Air Force systems of tomorrow would be a longer time coming.

ENGINEERING MECHANICS

ngineering at the Academy gives cadets a large area to choose from. For those interested in the design of structures and selection of materials for use in aircraft space vehicles and other space structures, the Engineering Mechanics Department offers the majors needed for a bachelors degree in this area.

Giving cadets the engineering mechanics knowledge and up to date information is one of the objectives of the department. Likewise, the department is designed to provide engineers with a broad base of knowledge in fundamental engineering with depth in the areas of dynamics, aircraft structural analysis and design and materials engineering.

Students in this major get actively involved in space research. This year cadets with the help of instructors, built a space furnace to conduct meteorlogical experiments in space. The furnace will go up in the space shuttle, hopefully, sometime this year.

The Engineering Mechanics Department also oversees the Engineering Science major, the oldest major at the Academy and probably the most challenging. Why could it be considered the most challenging? This major encompasses all fundamentals of engineering.

Cadets in this major take a set of eight engineering courses from departments of Aeronautical Engineering, Astronautical Engineering, Electrical Engineering and, of course, Engineering Mechanics.

With the broad knowledge engineering science offers, it's no wonder that five of the eight Academy graduates in the NASA astronaut program are Engineering Science majors.

Another one of the department's highlights is a course they offer which may not be found at any other college. Mech 332, Aerospace Structural Design, teaches cadets state of the art design for use in space equipment. It falls under the Engineering Mechanics majors courses and may be taken as a second classman.

Finally, at the end of four academic years here, a cadet who is graduated with a bachelors degree in either one of the majors offered by this department, will surely give the Air Force a competent, well qualified engineer ready to go into one of many careers.





ENGLISH

he English Department offers to the core curriculum four courses to enhance cadets' communications skills, by familiarizing them with composition, speech and literature.

For English majors and others who wish to study human values and communications beyond the core curriculum, the department offers enrichment courses, said Capt. Mick Baker in a Falcon Flyer feature story.

Five new courses approved this year are Literary Criticism, Literature and Science, Organizational Communication, Seminar in a Literary Period and Seminar in a Literary Genre.

These courses serve to refine, sharpen and focus the reading, writing, speaking, listening and thinking skills developed in the core course, said Lt. Col. Perry D. Luckett, tenure professor and deputy for research and enrichment courses, in the same article.

The addition of those new courses Colonel Luckett said, "is but one aspect of things we must do over the next decade to improve our teaching and our preparation for teaching."

Along with the new courses, the department offers Blue Tube 330 Honors, which introduces cadets into the television world. The department also sponsors "Icarus" (literary magazine), forensics (debating team) and the drama club "Bluebards."

With the old courses, new courses and planning for the future, the department teaches future leaders how humans respond to the universe by writing, speaking, listening, reading and thinking.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES

pending time in the military also means associating with other countries. Among many other affairs, the Academy introduces cadets to customs, cultures, and languages of other countries.

As part of the core curriculum, cadets are required to take on a full year of foreign language. They have a choice of seven languages; French, German, Spanish, Chinese, Japanese, Arabic and Russian.

For cadets deciding they are interested in furthering their knowledge in a foreign language, they can take it as a minor. Presently the Foreign Language Department is the only minor available to cadets. Of course, cadets are still required to have a major beside the minor.

With times changing, so has the Foreign Languages Department. This is the first year for their interactive video disc system. As of now only the German Language is using it, however, the future will see many, if not all, other languages using this system.

The system uses laser discs that the faculty put together through research, then sent out to be pressed on the actual disc. Along with the discs there are monitors and head phones all set up at a station where cadets sit and learn.

It is believed this system helps cadets

learn more in less time. They can achieve scores of 70 percent in 40 percent less time. The system contains a lot of the boring concepts of the language that otherwise could have been taught in stand up lectures.

With the disc system, it is possible to search the lesson plan within split seconds, instead of having to wait for rewind and fast forward movements.

There are many more advantages to this system the department is trending toward, likewise, the department is looking for other ways to improve their teaching abilities and their abilities to see how a cadet is progressing.

It's important for cadets and other military personnel to learn as much as possible about foreign countries for the reason that foreign countries are a big part of military life.


Likewise, Doctor Steven B. Ross spoke on the subject of military tactics in the Napoleonics Era to the cadets taking the Napoleonics Tactics course.

LAW

eing in the leadership echelon of the U.S. Air Force requires a knowledge of law in a number of specific subjects. Maybe that's why it's only appropriate for an officer candidate get introduced to the subject of law during his schooling here at the Academy.

The Academy's Law Department provides cadets an in-depth look at various limited law topics so they can carry out their professional roles as officers and commanders in a top-most way. As a second Classman, a cadet is required to take Law 300, Introduction to Law. This course introduces them to judicial disciplines and legal

systems. It examines the court systems and basic concepts in property, contracts, torts and constitutional law.

During a cadet's last year as a student here, he must take Law 400, Law for Commanders. It concentrates more on Air Force legal systems such as, Military law, laws of war, criminal evidence, criminal law and personal estate planning.

Even though law isn't offered as a major up until this year, the department does offer advanced law courses for those cadets interested. Some of these advanced courses are helpful to the Political Science Major.

Qualified instructors for these courses are attorneys on active duty and members of the bar of one or more states. Likewise, members of the faculty serve as government counsel in courts martial and other different boards whenever possible.

While the department's faculty spends a significant amount of time providing legal advice to staff, faculty and cadets, they still find time to prepare course material and, most importantly, give actual instruction to cadets who will one day serve in the leadership echelon of the U.S. Air Force.

MANAGEMENT

hile there are many areas which an officer can spend his career, the management area shouldn't be overlooked. It's important for the Air Force to have management experts and critical thinkers who can be affective during peacetimes as well as uncertain, stressful times.

The Management Department at the Air Force Academy does its best at making available to cadets the best possible undergraduate program in business education.

In the core course, introduction to Management, cadets learn the principles and techniques of planning, organizing and controlling. If a student finds himself interested in this subject, he can go on to the advanced courses available. This is where cadets learn in depth what it takes to manage Air Force resources, whether it be money or materials.

To have students on-hands experience, some courses require cadets to do term projects. This year, one instructor divided his class into teams and arranged for them to work with managers of three Colorado Springs night clubs. The cadets did case studies on how well customers were served and whether or not service could be improved.

Likewise, the department brings in guest speakers to give students advice on various topics of investments. Jerry Bruni, a former management instructor here now a stockbroker in Denver, Co., was one speaker. Others included Dick Peace a diamond manager and another speaker from Smith Barney Inc., a national investment

agency.

Again, the department's faculty share a commitment to teaching the finest undergraduate management curriculum in the world that is appropriate to Air Force officer candidates. They teach a discipline with many different subdisciplines. While they are not financiers, operation researchers, corporate strategists or accountants, they do teach all those things and more but within a larger framework called the management process.

MATHEMATICAL SCIENCE

cadet has a tough decision to make when it comes time to pick a major. There's plenty for him to consider. For the ones wanting a major they'll be able to expand, the Mathematical Science major may be the one to choose.

Flexibility is the greatest strength of the math department. It provides the basics common in many areas. A cadet who majors in this area is able to pursue many Air Force career fields. Again, this major provides a strong foundation in the basics that an undergraduate needs, enabling him to seek a masters degree in a variety of areas.

As part of the core curriculum, Mathematical Science plays one of the largest roles. Considered the language of all science and engineering disciplines, it provides the basis for many of the other majors.

Classes here are taught mainly by lectures with some theory and problem solving. However, while taught basically the same as civilian colleges, the examples used here are inclined toward military applications.

Finally, upon graduation a cadet will have strongly enhanced his analytic thinking giving him the ability to formulate problems in disciplines he may not be familiar with

raphy. There were seven majors in the class of '86 and eighteen in the class of '87. However, the topics taught and the skills learned can play a large role in an officer's career. The members of the Geography Department point out that "an understanding of other places and cultures is vital, if we are to continue our role as world power." Many Geography majors become intelligence officers, targeting officers or politico-military affairs officers.

There have been no core courses in Geography since 1975. Many Geography courses serve as electives for other majors programs. The Geography major is focused in one of three areas: Physical geography, which deals with the environment; human geography, in which economics issues are studied; and regional geography, which can lead to area specialization.


This year cadets in Geography 382, Geographic Application of Imagery Analysis, participated in a project to make a map from data gathered by satellite. On July 27,

1985 the LANDSAT flew over coordinates specified by the Geography Department and collected digital information of the Academy Reservation. Cadets then used computer processing to create a video image from this information. This is a new technology which is beginning to be used more frequently by the Air Force.

The number of cadets in the major have been increasing since the early eight-

ies, as has been the number of cadets enrolled in the various courses offered by the department. In all, the Geography Department helps ensure that cadets graduate with a working knowledge of the complexities of not only the global regions but also the different nations and their people.

In the end, a full, reasoned, professional life based on solid human values is what it's all about, Arnie.




Mark Trudeau, '86 shapes wire into figures, creating a minature village.



PHYSICS

he past success of physicists in the defense area stems from the fact that physicists are generalists concerned with the basic laws of the universe. The military could take problems in any area to a physicist and the physicist could understand the problem and contribute to the solution," said physicist John L. McLucas, former Secretary of the Air Force and director of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The Physics department here does and will continue to do its best in giving the Air Force some of the best qualified physicists.

To graduate second lieutenants with as much knowledge as possible about the modern world and how physics relate to it, can be considered one of the Physics Department's objectives. Also, the Academy prepares a good physics background for those who prefer to continue their education at graduate school.

As part of the core curriculum, Physics offers three courses. One of these courses has two sides which to choose from. Physics 410 and 420 are considered the same. While 410 presents the non-technical side of physics, 420 is just the opposite.

For the majors, the department offers

three areas. The traditional major courses mainly prepare cadets for graduate school. Cadets taking the space physic courses learn more about space environment, solar atmosphere and other areas dealing with the space world. The third area available for cadets to study is engineering physics where they learn more in one field or specific applications.

In Newton's era, what we now call "Physics" was described as "Natural Philosophy" — a very apt description since the scope and purpose of physics is to make sense out of the behavior of the physical universe, man's natural environment.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

have you ever thought about what kind of officers spend their career in operations and command, as well as those who get involved in plans, intelligence, air attache duty and various other fields? Well, most likely these officers have a degree in Political Science.

Here at the Air Force Academy, the department of Political Science is designed to get cadets to think deeply about the profession they're entering and how it relates to politics. Hopefully, by accomplishing they'll produce better leaders.

Cadets get introduced to Political Sci-

ence in the four core courses directed by the department. The first core course, Poli Sci 200, introduction to Political Science, offers a survey of the evolution of Western political thought in order to explain the chief contemporary ideologies and forms of government. Poli Sci 201, American National Government, the second core course, builds on the concepts and ideas of Poli Sci 200. It endeavors to engender an understanding and appreciation of the political traditions and behavior of Americans and of the structure and function of our national governing institutions.


While these two courses deal with forms of governments, the next two courses deal with the relationship among nations and relationships among military policy, foreign policy, and national security policy.

Cadets that take a real interest in Political Science can take the advanced courses offered by the department. The advanced courses don't offer any real lab work, however, cadets do simulate politicking games. The games are designed to simulate international political systems. Cadets are forced to make decisions in crisis situations. Hopefully, the cadets will use the knowledge learned in classes to make these decisions.

Likewise, cadets get involved in the Air Force Academy Assembly the department sponsors every year. Delegates from various colleges and universities along with cadets and faculty members assemble at the Academy to join in discussions on matters of "vital public interests." This year, the 28th annual assembly held at the Academy, discussions were on "Easing East-West Tension in the Third World."



CADET LIBRARY

he cadet library is not just a place for doolies to sleep in between classes. The library has over 571,000 books, periodicals and government documents, most of which are entered into the computerized card catalogue. If you can't find what you're looking for in the computer, you may have to resort to digging through the conventional card catalogue. If all else fails, the library's excellent staff can guide you to the proper periodical or government document. Through an inter-library loan, a cadet can have access to even more material.

The library does not consist of books alone. The library has several Z-100 computers and word processing software, so cadets can use the computers to type flawless papers. The library also has a collection of records and tapes.











Lest We Forget

1985 marked the tenth anniversary of the fall of Saigon when the last Americans, combat troops and civilians were evacuated from Vietnam. Ceremonies were held at various times during the year at the Vietnam Memorial in Washington D.C. to commemorate the event. The memorial lists over 58,000 names, of those who are dead or missing, in chronological order from the first American killed in 1959 to the last one killed in 1975.

VIOLENCE AND TERRORISM

A Trans World Airlines jet with 145 passengers and 8 crew members was hijacked in Athens, Greece. Most of the hostages were released within days but the remaining 39 hostages were held 17 days. One American hostage was killed.



During an attempt to evict members of the radical group MOVE, Philadelphia police dropped a small bomb on the group's fortified rowhouse. The intent was to create an opening into which they could drop tear gas. Instead, a fire was started which destroyed about 60 houses.



NO END IN SIGHT



Four Palestinian terrorists hijacked the Italian Cruise liner Achille Lauro while on a Mediterranean cruise. One American was killed. After the ship was released the Egyptian government agreed to return the hijackers to the PLO. However, the hijackers were intercepted by American jets as they were flown out of Egypt and returned to Italy to stand trail.



On April 14, 1986, 24 F-111's from Lakenheath and 5 F-111's from upper Heyford launched and made their way to Libya. Aircraft from the carriers *Coral Sea* and *America* were also involved in the raid.

Two tragedies were the loss of one F-111 and its crew, Captain Paul F. Lorence and Captain Fernando L. Ribas-Dominicci, and the accidental bombing of a residential area which resulted in the deaths of several civilians.



"Try to make the world smaller for the terrorists." This was the goal President Reagan announced on April 7, 1986. The ensuing operation involved 150 warplanes and 60 tons of bombs.






Halley's Comet, last seen in 1910, was first sighted again by the Air Force Academy Observatory in October 1985. The observatory participates with other members of the International Halley Watch to help gain as much information as possible from the sightings of the comet that take place all over the world.

Pictures taken of the comet in various locations are combined to help reveal how the comet's tail develops and changes, and how the tail is affected by solar wind and by the sun's magnetic field. Since Halley's Comet is only visible once every 75 or 76 years, international cooperation is a key ingredient to its study and to our understanding.

Restored For Her 100th Birthday



This picture of the comet was taken by the Academy Observatory on a glass plate and was then digitized using a device in the Geography Department. The Seiler Vax computer was used to create psendo color to represent the comet's varying intensities.

The Statue of Liberty, a monument to freedom and the American way, is undergoing restoration with a planned completion date in July, 1986. The statue, a gift from the French, was dedicated in 1886. Since then it has stood as a welcoming sign to thousands of immigrants as they approached New York Harbor. Construction is to take place in the torch, crown, shoulder and stars. Also, the original exterior color will be reserved and a glass elevator will be installed. One of the biggest, if not the biggest, fourth of July celebrations is scheduled to take place at the statue to mark the completion of this monumental task.







The club is for any cadet who is interested in increasing his or her understanding of the purpose and responsibilities of the enlisted force.



Capt. Johnson, from the PMS department, talked about his experiences as an enlisted member that helped him to make the transition to the Officer Corps.




