A Closer Look at Our Impact

Feeding Our Neighbors Who Are Hungry

Food insecurity has only gotten worse since the pandemic began and more families have turned to us for the first time. When demand for emergency food spiked (March 16 – Sept. 13, 2020), we responded:


- 510,000 meals provided twice the number compared to the same 6-month period the prior year.
- + 13,156 individuals sought our help for the first time almost 1 of 3 served.

Housing Families Without a Home

On any given night, up to 350 clients (of which some 25% are children) are housed and cared for by a staff of approximately 120. Our staff has worked on the front lines every day during the pandemic, providing quality care, love, and hope to all Harbor Light clients.

Providing Hope and Assistance At Christmas

Our community partners and volunteers went above and beyond to help us collect and distribute toys to 4,636 children. Additionally, more than 1,900 families received food to enjoy as a Christmas meal when picking up their children's toys. Over 9,000 toys were collected from over 60 local and national corporate partners.
