



CHAMPION JUSTICE, LIGHT THE WAY TO FREEDOM



Human trafficking is a global crisis that often goes unseen around the world and here at home in Pennsylvania. **The LIGHT Project, Leading Individuals Gracefully out of Human Trafficking,** is dedicated to educating the public and providing vital support to survivors in Pittsburgh and The Salvation Army's surrounding 28-county Western Pennsylvania service area. The LIGHT Project serves all genders and helps survivors of both labor and sex trafficking.

The Salvation Army has historically been on the frontlines fighting human trafficking since the time of founders William and Catherine Booth in London, England – who advocated to raise the legal age of consent and the minimum age to work in factories. The Salvation Army has 40 anti-trafficking programs across the nation, including the LIGHT Project in Western Pennsylvania.

SAFE SHELTER, HOPE FOR THE FUTURE



The Salvation Army's Family Caring Center is a safe haven for families in times of crisis. This unique shelter serving the Pittsburgh area offers apartment-style living and allows all members of the family – men, women and children of all ages – to remain together in a secure environment.

The Family Caring Center has 18 individual rooms with a total of 85 beds, and the center offers residents three meals a day. The length of stay at the shelter is tailored to the needs of each family and The Salvation Army offers programming designed to help families get back on their feet. Children's activities are supervised while guardians attend classes in parenting, budgeting, resume-building and job skills. During the winter months, The Salvation Army also operates an overflow shelter within the Family Caring Center for single women, many of whom are in their older age, to ensure no one in our community is left out in the cold.

SOCIAL SERVICES, SPIRITUAL SUPPORT



The Salvation Army stands as a beacon of hope, loving and serving all unconditionally, even in the face of life's most daunting challenges. Deeply embedded in the communities we serve, The Salvation Army has community centers located across 28 counties in Western Pennsylvania—meaning help is always just a phone call or online message away. These centers are far more than just buildings; these churches offer vital lifelines, designed to directly address the unique and growing needs within each community. In communities where no permanent Salvation Army buildings exist, service unit extensions ensure everyone still has access to vital resources. In these areas, a dedicated committee of volunteers tailor projects to address local challenges.

The Salvation Army provides essential services like food pantries and warm community meals, fostering fellowship and making sure no one goes hungry. Crucially, when bills are due, our rent and utility assistance programs offer a critical safety net, helping families keep their homes and maintain essential services. Beyond material aid, dedicated pastors at these churches lead vibrant youth and adult ministries, nurturing spiritual growth and community bonds through weekly worship and fellowship, ensuring support for the whole person.

Members spend weeks and months meticulously organizing donations, ensuring each event is a seamless experience. This dedication is a testament to their unwavering commitment to the community.

Echelon seeks to mobilize the next generation for The Salvation Army by providing opportunities for young adults to engage with the organization through fellowship and networking, donations and fundraising, and service and volunteering. The Pittsburgh chapter has taken The Salvation Army Family Caring Center shelter under their wing, running back-to-school bashes for children staying at the shelter, hosting gatherings and meals for families and collecting and organizing stockings, gift baskets and more to ensure every holiday is special for families staying at the shelter, including Valentine's Day, Easter and Christmas.

HOPE ACROSS THE COUNTRY



National Salvation Army Week was declared by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1954, and since then it has served as an annual reminder of The Salvation Army's vast scope of services. In his speech, President Eisenhower said:

"Among Americans, The Salvation Army has long been a symbol of wholehearted dedication to the cause of human brotherhood. In time of war, the men and women of this organization have brought to those serving their country far from home, friendliness and warm concern. In the quieter days of peace, their work has been a constant reminder to us all that each of us is neighbor and kin to all Americans. Giving freely of themselves, the men and women of The Salvation Army have won the respect of us all."

In the seven decades since, The Salvation Army has continued to do the most good for local communities and broaden our services. The Salvation Army in Western Pennsylvania serves families and individuals across 28 counties.

The Salvation Army helped nearly **27 MILLION PEOPLE** in 2023 overcome poverty, addiction, and spiritual and economic hardships by preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ and meeting human needs in His name without discrimination in nearly every ZIP code.

By providing food, shelter, eviction prevention assistance, emergency disaster relief, rehabilitation, after-school and summer youth programs, spiritual enrichment, and more,

MORE THAN FUN, SUMMERS OF GROWTH



The Salvation Army provides kids with the opportunity to learn new skills, make friends and create lasting memories. For many campers, The Salvation Army provides their only chance of a summer vacation outside of their neighborhoods.

Each year since 1947, hundreds of children ages 6-12 from across Western Pennsylvania have the chance to attend a week at **The Salvation Army's Camp Allegheny**. Each week at Camp Allegheny is an immersive adventure, with exciting themes ranging from thrilling outdoor excursions and engaging STEM activities, to dynamic sports and enriching music and arts programs. The 110-acre camp, nestled along Slippery Rock Creek in Ellwood City, is proudly accredited by the American Camping Association. Activities include arts and crafts, swimming, river tubing and Christian education.

Along with the fun activities, trained counselors help children mature and grow, and campers learn new life skills and self-reliance. In addition to the transformative experience at Camp Allegheny, The Salvation Army extends its summer outreach through local Summer Day Camps and Vacation Bible School sessions, ensuring more children receive the invaluable gift of a joyful and enriching summer before returning to school.

One camper, moved by a production of Jesus Theater (a weekly Gospel presentation) approached Camp Allegheny Director Captain Larry Fulmer and told him the "heavy feelings" he had been carrying were now gone, and he couldn't wait until closing day to receive a Bible to take home from Camp!



At Summer Day Camp in the Homewood area of Pittsburgh, one 7-year-old camper had an issue controlling his temper and would have frequent outbursts. Local Captains Michael and Kevilyn Haynes talked with him and told him he had to use his words and control himself. He simply said, "I don't know how to do that." The men who volunteered to help with Day Camp all took turns teaching him tools to use when he got upset. In the three weeks at Day Camp, this young boy learned how to calm himself down, de-escalate and talk through his emotions.



EQUIP THE FRONTLINES



Every year, thousands of people are confronted with disasters. There are fires, floods, snowstorms, power outages and other emergencies that impact our communities to the core. When disaster strikes, The Salvation Army Emergency Disaster Services (EDS) answers.

The Salvation Army equips the frontlines, serving first responders and survivors with safe shelter, warm meals, clothing and clean-up kits, along with spiritual support. Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, the EDS team of staff and volunteers is on-call providing aid in times of crisis.

The Salvation Army began its emergency disaster work in Pittsburgh during the historically devastating 1936 flood and has continued those services ever since. EDS is a top-notch program for disaster preparedness and response that begins with the local community and extends throughout The Salvation Army's 28-county Western Pennsylvania service area. Long after first responders have left the scene, The Salvation Army is still there, helping the community with emotional support and meeting critical needs.



Each year, The Salvation Army provides back-to-school readiness programs for families in need across 28 counties in Western Pennsylvania. The Salvation Army is deeply committed to ensuring local students have the tools they need to succeed including backpacks, shoes, school supplies, hygiene kits, haircuts, vision and dental screenings and more.

Children raised in nurturing, stable homes create the foundation for emotional well-being, academic success, social responsibility and long-term productivity. Investing in children's early environments benefits not only the individual but the family and society. The Salvation Army's Pathway of Hope program is dedicated to supporting the entire family unit and breaking the cycle of generational poverty. Pathway of Hope is a case-managed program designed to support struggling families who are facing life barriers but are motivated to create lasting change. This strengths-based program empowers families to set goals and take actionable steps toward a brighter future. Families enrolled in Pathway of Hope meet regularly with a dedicated case manager to identify their strengths, set achievable goals, and develop a personalized plan for success. Through ongoing support and encouragement, families are connected to valuable resources and services within their community, helping to build a strong, reliable support network and achieve sustainable, long-term outcomes.

FEED IT FORWARD



No one should go hungry. The Salvation Army's feeding programs are a lifeline for families, offering not just sustenance but also hope and a sense of community support. They provide balanced meals that nourish children and adults alike, ensuring that nutritional needs are met despite financial hardships. At The Salvation Army, feeding programs provide a variety of food and basic needs for those seeking food assistance and help them regain household food security.

The Love in a Backpack program ensures children receive food support regularly across eight Salvation Army locations.

The Salvation Army's choice food pantries empower individuals and families by providing choice in food selection to meet their dietary needs and bring dignity to assistance programs. In Western Pennsylvania, the current choice pantry model services 16 locations and provides 100,421 grocery orders.

Emergency food pantries provide immediate food assistance to individuals and families facing crisis situations at every Salvation Army community center across 28 counties in Western Pennsylvania. Community meal sites (soup kitchens) foster community support and provide meals on a regular basis at 15 locations, with 178,975 meals served.

BUNDLE THEM UP



The Salvation Army and WTAE-TV proudly celebrate 40 years of the beloved project Bundle-Up program. For more than four decades, WTAE-TV's project Bundle-Up has provided NEW warm winter outerwear – including coats, hats, gloves, and boots – to children and adults over the age of 62 throughout Western Pennsylvania.

WTAE-TV's project Bundle-Up was created in 1986 by the late former Vice-President and General Manager Fred Barber, the late Chief Meteorologist Joe DeNardo and Salvation Army Lieutenant Colonel Robert A. Watson. The program is a joint venture of The Salvation Army of Western Pennsylvania and WTAE-TV, Pittsburgh's ABC affiliate.

For many participating children and seniors, the experience of WTAE-TV's project Bundle-Up is the first opportunity they have ever had to shop for something brand NEW for themselves. Dedicated corporate and community volunteers ensure that the experience is not just about receiving new items but also about creating meaningful, positive experiences that participants will remember for years to come. Highlights include surprise shopping trips with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Pittsburgh Penguins and talent from WTAE-TV. An annual telethon airs each December on WTAE-TV, and an annual online auction generates additional support for the program.



NOURISHMENT FOR NEIGHBORS



The Salvation Army provides a lifeline of hope and dignity to individuals and families facing hardship during the holiday season. Thousands of people had the opportunity to enjoy food and fellowship this past Thanksgiving and Christmas and The Salvation Army was blessed to partner with faithful volunteers who provide the hope of the holidays through hot meals and warm smiles.

Throughout the months of November and December, The Salvation Army community centers throughout all 28 counties of Western Pennsylvania operated as beacons of hope and served nourishing community meals in person and offered food for those in need to also take home. On both Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve, The Salvation Army in Allegheny County also continued a new tradition where volunteers rallied together to deliver more than 1,000 warm meals to the doors of isolated older adults living in low-income, high-rise buildings. Food was also distributed to families staying at The Salvation Army's Family Caring Center shelter, the Emergency Disaster Services feeding program for the unhoused and for those who have been displaced.

NEED KNOWS NO SEASON



The iconic Red Kettle Campaign powers The Salvation Army's vital services across 28 counties in Western Pennsylvania. Every donation stays local in the community it is given, directly funding feeding programs, rent and utility assistance, seasonal support, youth empowerment and spiritual programs that change lives all year long. This global tradition began humbly in 1891, when Salvation Army Captain Joseph McFee placed an iron kettle on a San Francisco street, simply asking passersby to "Keep the Pot Boiling" to fund a free Christmas dinner.

Each Christmas, The Salvation Army works to make the season bright for families and individuals in need throughout Western Pennsylvania. The Salvation Army Angel Tree program makes holiday wishes come true. Children create wish lists, gift tags appear in regional stores, and with the help of generous donors and dedicated volunteers, 100,000 gifts are distributed annually in Western Pennsylvania—all wrapped and ready for under the tree. The Salvation Army and Sheetz For the Kidz also make a huge impact on families. Nationally, Sheetz For the Kidz has contributed more than \$2.7 million in toys, clothing and other essentials for families.
