## GRADUATION AT THE U.S. MILITARY ACADEMY Class of 2014

The United States Military Academy Class of 2014 will graduate and be commissioned on 28 May 2014. Those graduating this Wednesday represent approximately 81% of the cadets who entered West Point almost four years ago.

The President of the United States, Barack Obama is the graduation speaker.

There are 1,064 cadets that will receive their diplomas this Wednesday. Among them will be 11 foreign nationals. The class also includes 186 women, 74 African Americans, 72 Asian/Pacific Islanders, 80 Hispanics and 13 Native Americans. There are 121 members of the class that attended the United States Military Academy Preparatory School (109 men and 12 women). This class also has 11 combat veterans (11 men 0 women).

The 11 foreign national cadets represent Colombia, Costa Rica, Democratic Republic of Congo, Georgia, Jordan, Qatar, Republic of Korea, Rwanda, Thailand and Tunisia. They will return to those nations for service.

Almost all of the graduating cadets will be commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the U.S. Army. However, three cadets will be commissioned in the Air Force, two cadets will be commissioned in the Navy and one cadet will be commissioned in the Marines.

The Class of 2014 has 89 cadets who are sons or daughters of U.S. Military Academy graduates. Eleven of these cadets have both a father and mother that are graduates.

The Class Motto is "Forever One Team".

The First Captain is Cadet Lindsey Danilack, Montville, New Jersey.

The Class President is Cadet Jeffrey Ferebee, Primm Springs, Tennessee.

The highest cumulative Academic Quality Point Average (Valedictorian) was earned by Cadet Erin A. Mauldin, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The highest cumulative Cadet Performance Score (overall) was earned by Cadet Louis S. Tobergte, Hebron, Kentucky.

The highest cumulative Military Program Score was earned by Cadet Alexander G. Canacci, Culver, Indiana.

The highest cumulative Physical Program Score was earned by Cadet Tyler J. Rauenzahn, Schuylkill Haven, Pennsylvania.

This year, there are 56 Superintendent's Award for Excellence recipients (cadets who are in the top 5% of the class based on the Cadet Award Score (CAS)), and 168 Superintendent's Award for Achievement recipients (next 15% of the class based on CAS). There are also 135 Gold Star recipients (cadets who achieved a Year or Cumulative Academic Grade Point Average of 3.67 or higher).

Of the Honor Graduates, 3% are female. Females are also 27% of the Superintendent's Award Winners for Excellence, 23% of the Superintendent's Award Winners for Achievement, and 21% of the Gold Star winners. Women make up 17% of the graduating class.

This year's graduating class has 192 (18%) graduates that have committed to additional service obligations and thereby gained significant control over key aspects of their careers. Through their dedication to service in the Regular Army, these officers secured either the branch of their choice or their initial permanent duty station of choice.

The Class of 2014 has cadets graduating from all 50 states. The top 4 are California (93), Texas (92), New York (70), and Virginia (56).

This is West Point's 216<sup>th</sup> graduating class and the 35<sup>th</sup> class to graduate women. (There were no classes that graduated in 1810 or 1816 and there were 2 graduating classes each in 1861, 1917, 1918, 1922, and 1943).
