QUIET STRENGTH AND DETERMINATION

THE TRIUMPH OF MS. DAVIS

When Ms. Davis arrived at The Salvation Army's Center of Hope, she brought more than just her things—she also carried the weight of doing everything right and still losing everything. At 46 years old and a mother of four, Ms. Davis came to the shelter with her children, looking for help.

Her journey there wasn't the result of one sudden crisis, but the slow, relentless pressure of rising rent, reduced work hours, and growing grocery bills. Despite her relentless effort—stretching every dollar, postponing bills, and exhausting every option to make ends meet—everything fell apart.

"She did everything she could to stay afloat," said Melissa Burgess, Shelter Director at the Center of Hope. "But when the bottom finally dropped out, she made the most courageous choice of all—she walked through our doors with her children."

Ms. Davis stayed at the shelter for 151 days. During that time, she made the most of every opportunity, enrolling in life skills workshops, asking questions, and quietly rebuilding her life. She began saving money, paying down old debts, and leaning into the community that warmly embraced her.

"She didn't complain—she built," Burgess added. "That quiet determination is what set her apart."

Her youngest son, James—a soft-spoken boy with special needs—was also struggling. He had fallen behind in school and was nearly silent during his first weeks at the shelter. Through Project HOPE, a tutoring partnership with local universities, James began receiving daily academic support. At first, he was hesitant, but over time, he began to trust his tutors. His grades improved, and his confidence grew. This fall, James will start high school on time.

Beyond the classroom, James found a sense of belonging at The Salvation Army Ken Carlson Red Shield Youth Center. He's now a regular visitor, smiling, laughing, and engaging with friends—joyful signs of the burden lifting.



Ms. Davis recently moved into a home of her own—no longer just a shared room, or a temporary shelter, but a place where she and her family can begin again. The Salvation Army celebrated her success by providing a basket of household goods and food to stock the pantry until her benefits began.

Now, when she and James walk into the Red Shield Youth Center, they do so with smiles – more confident and more prepared. For Ms. Davis, hope has taken root—and it all started with 151 days, a safe space, and a community of people who believed in her.

Maria Thompson Gets It Done

When 34-year-old Maria Thompson walked into the offices of The Salvation Army of Greater Winston-Salem, she wasn't looking for a handout – she was looking for a lifeline. Two months earlier, her car broke down and, without reliable transportation, Maria lost her job. What followed was a slow slide into despair.

Despite her efforts to apply for work, take the bus when she could, and lean on friends for rides, her savings quickly dried up and she fell behind on her rent.

When Maria came to us, it was with a quiet determination in her voice. "I just started a new job," she told Social Services Case Manager Kiara Penn. "But I don't get paid until the end of the month." It was a story Penn had heard before, but it was no less heartbreaking.

"Maria reminded me that people don't always fall behind because they're reckless," Penn said. "Sometimes, it's one unexpected problem—like a car repair—that triggers everything else to fall apart."

Penn helped verify Maria's employment and guided her through the application for emergency rent assistance. She also contacted Maria's landlord to advocate on her behalf and connected her to a local support program offering transportation vouchers and food assistance.

The turnaround was immediate. As Maria left the office, she smiled for the first time in a while. "She looked at me and said, 'I feel like I can breathe again," Penn recalled. "That's the power of just showing up for people. A little help at the right moment can keep someone from falling off the edge."

The Salvation Army of Greater Winston-Salem serves hundreds of individuals like Maria each month, offering emergency relief to those teetering on the edge of homelessness.

"Our goal is to restore dignity and stability," Penn said. "We're not just handing out checks—we're walking alongside people while they rebuild."

For Maria, that gesture of help meant hope and a new beginning.

Increase the number of young people who receive a world-class learning experience and ensure success is within the reach of every young person who enters our doors. ON A MISSION FOR TEENS

Our youth center has a new name, but the same heart and mission behind it. We are proud to introduce the Ken Carlson Red Shield Youth Center, a name that reflects both our legacy and our future. Formerly know as the Boys & Girls Club, the center has returned to its original identity, reaffirming our commitment to providing faith-based, community-focused youth programming rooted in The Salvation Army's values. While the name may be new to some, everything our families have come to love and rely on remains the same.

In addition, we have opened a new Teen Center to serve as a safe haven and resource hub for Winston-Salem youth ages 13-18, funded by the City of Winston-Salem's ARPA grant and supported by the Taco Bell Foundation, Twin City Kiwanis, and the Reynolds American Foundation.

Programs at the Teen Center emphasize education, job readiness, and mental health. This includes a unique 14-week workforce development program that helps prepare teens for life beyond high school. Our summer mentorship program empowers teens to guide the younger children, sharing their skills and wisdom. Our Teen Center also partners with licensed therapists from the Mental Health Association in Forsyth County to provide teens in need with access to trained professionals.

All of these programs and resources serve to support our primary goal at the Red Shield Youth Center, to keep local youth engaged in safe, structured activities that foster personal growth, resilience, and social responsibility.

Since the Galveston, Texas Hurricane of 1900, The Salvation Army has been on the scene meeting needs following virtually every U.S. disaster.

Hurricane Helene

The Salvation Army was among the first to respond to the affected areas and was able to provide critical assistance to survivors and their families. As with every disaster relief effort, our initial response to Helene was to provide food, drinks, emotional and spiritual support to every survivor in our care. As the critical phase of the disaster abated, we remained in the area, continuing to provide much needed assistance to those in need. The generous support for our hurting neighbors given by The Salvation Army's Greater Winston-Salem Area donors totaled \$104,149, making it possible for us to provide this critical assistance to our neighbors.

A LIFE OF SERVICE AND STRENGTH

Velma Hinton's Legacy With The Salvation Army

At 97 years old, Velma Hinton remains a beacon of strength, faith, and community spirit at The Salvation Army Senior Center in Winston-Salem. Known for her warmth, wisdom, and resilience, Velma's life has been deeply intertwined with The Salvation Army for decades.

Velma first connected with the organization during her 14 years of service as a cook at The Salvation Army in Raleigh, where she prepared meals for the homeless, prisoners, and members of the advisory board. "The Lord led me there," she recalled, sharing how a moment of faith inspired her to apply for the position that would become a cornerstone of her life's work. Despite never attending culinary school, she mastered her craft by learning from her mother and grandmother, both professional cooks, and went on to prepare meals for clients and community leaders in Raleigh.

Since joining the Winston-Salem Senior Center around 2016, Velma has brought the same spirit of service to her fellow seniors. She quickly became more than a participant—she became a spiritual leader, counselor, and source of comfort and inspiration. Whether leading devotionals, answering questions, or offering encouragement, she is known affectionately as the center's pastor.

Her passion for life is contagious. At 93, she picked up volleyball for the first time and quickly became a crowd favorite, inspiring others with her enthusiasm and agility. Even after surviving a stroke, Velma remained a symbol of perseverance and faith. "They thought I was gone," she said, "but the Lord said, 'Not yet. You still have work to do."

In April, the center honored Velma's 97th birthday with a full celebration and a plaque presented by Major Andrew Wiley. The party was filled with laughter, music, and testimonies of the impact she has made on so many lives.

Velma says the center gives her a reason to get out and connect. "It gives me an outlet," she said. "We laugh, we love, and we look out for each other. That's what makes it special."



To those unfamiliar with the center, Velma has just one message: "Come on and enjoy it! Whether it's volleyball, devotionals, or just a good lunch, there's something here for everyone."




