As we reflect on the past year, we are filled with deep gratitude for the unwavering support, generosity, and commitment of our donors and partners. In a year marked by economic uncertainty, your belief in our mission sustained and empowered our efforts to meet human needs in His name without discrimination.

Thousands of our neighbors across North Texas continued to face the impact of inflation, housing insecurity, and barriers to stability and self-sufficiency. But thanks to your support, The Salvation Army of North Texas remained a steadfast source of hope for individuals, families, and our most vulnerable neighbors experiencing hardship.

Throughout 2024, we provided safe shelter to 1,300 people each night through our six shelters and senior living centers. We helped keep people in their homes through essential rental and utility assistance. We supported families every step of the way as they worked to establish a permanent home through our comprehensive case management.

Our recovery programs continued to offer Christ-centered, compassionate care to those overcoming addiction, fleeing domestic violence, or struggling with mental health challenges. We met individuals at their point of crisis, serving their physical, emotional, and spiritual needs with dignity and love.

Through our 12 drive-thru and curbside food pantries, we distributed thousands of nutritious meals each week, ensuring no one in our community went without basic necessities. As the largest provider of inclement weather services in North Texas, we offered shelter, financial assistance, and critical

supplies during extreme heat and cold, protecting the most vulnerable from life-threatening conditions.

We remained committed to shaping the next generation through year-round educational and character-building programs for children and youth, empowering them with the tools to grow, thrive, and lead with purpose.

As the largest social services provider in North Texas, we have continued to adapt our approach to meet the evolving needs of every community we serve across Dallas, Tarrant, Ellis, Denton, Collin, and Rockwall counties. In the pages that follow, you will see how your support enabled us to respond to needs with compassion, love, and impact to enact meaningful change.

Our goal to alleviate poverty, combat addiction, and end homelessness is more urgent than ever. We remain on the front lines, working every day to ensure our neighbors have food on the table, a roof over their heads, and the resources they need to build a better future.

2024 brought unprecedented challenges for all of North Texas. Thousands struggled to put food on the table, keep up with rent and mortgage payments, and afford household expenses and essentials.

Families are living in survival mode, balancing already tight budgets to make room for things such as child care and high transportation costs.

As North Texans continued to struggle with the impacts of inflation, rising costs, and changes in vital government assistance, The Salvation Army of North Texas worked tirelessly to provide help and hope in every pocket of the region. Throughout 2024, during times of increased hardship, we saw a vast rise in requests for our services, with many of our neighbors who never imagined they'd be asking for help finding themselves on the brink of distress and in need of assistance. Many of our locations operated at and over capacity for most of the year. But we responded stronger than ever.

CLIENT SPOTLIGHTS

The Salvation Army provides hope and help to all who are hungry, and hurting — no matter who they are, where they are, or how they arrived. For many clients, a meal or warm bed is just the beginning of their journey to stability and self-sufficiency. Your generosity has powered countless stories of transformation across North Texas.

EMMA

From her earliest memories, Emma knew pain. At 13 months old, her father took her away from her mother — and she didn't see her again until she was 9 years old. While in her father's care, she was sexually abused by her brother. With the hope of escaping her reality, Emma found herself on the run from the ages of 16 to 18. The streets were unkind to her. She trusted the wrong people, and before she knew it, she found herself in prostitution.

When she was 17, she met the father of her child. After a year and a half into their relationship, their love became manipulative and abusive, and he told her to leave. Emma decided to reach out to her Unbound worker, who helps women who have experienced sex trafficking. She brought Emma to the family shelter of The Salvation Army for assistance. That was the spark that changed everything.

Her life has completely turned around. "I'm not depressed; I'm very happy and — I have not felt that way in so long," said Emma. She now has her daughter in day care and is in possession of both their birth certificates and Social Security cards.

Her second chance at life is just beginning. She's progressing with the help of The Salvation Army, which is there for her whenever she needs it.



"I'm just very excited to give my daughter the life that she deserves and the life that I always wanted as a child," said Emma. "Without The Salvation Army, I feel like I would either be in prison or dead."

As she reflected on her life and the trials she has been through, she believes all of it was a test from God. Now, with her new outlook on life and the help of The Salvation Army of North Texas, she is excited to find her purpose and see what life has in store for her. Like so many others, Emma is taking the time to complete The Salvation Army's program. She no longer fears the threat of anyone harming her and can finally live her life.

GREG

Greg’s troubled childhood and past trauma led to unresolved anger inside of him. As a young adult, after an unfortunate incident — which he today recognizes as one of the biggest mistakes of his life — he was sentenced to prison. After being released, he turned to drugs, leading to a string of consequences that eventually caused him to lose his job and become homeless.

Eventually, Greg found himself at what he calls his rock bottom. One night, out of extreme hunger, Greg had no choice but to dig through the nearest dumpster in search of food. When he heard a voice behind him, he thought he was in trouble. But to his surprise, he turned around to a warm, friendly face. It was Major Maldonado, who leads The Salvation Army’s Oak Cliff Corps Community Center.

“This is The Salvation Army,” Major Maldonado said. “Do you believe I can help you?”

In that moment, Greg recalls he truly hated himself for the past decisions he had made — so much so that he had considered taking his own life. His first thought was to push Major Maldonado away. But in his eyes, he saw a glimmer of hope. So, he told the major he was willing to change.

Through the support of The Salvation Army’s Oak Cliff staff and the programs that are made possible by your kindness, Greg was able to start anew.



“I believe if it wasn’t for The Salvation Army, I would still be in the streets, lost,” Greg said. “If you happen to stumble across it, like I did, it’s meant for a reason.”

Today, Greg is living a sober life. He has a stable income and has found housing. He has found a renewed sense of faith through The Salvation Army’s ministry. And most importantly, he has the support system he needs.

“As long as I can stay focused on this mission,” Greg said, “I believe I’ll be all right.”

Today, Greg frequently visits the Oak Cliff Corps Community Center to volunteer and counsel those who are in similar situations to the one he was once in. His life has been transformed by the resources The Salvation Army was able to provide him with, resources funded by your generosity.

“If you need help, The Salvation Army can help you,” Greg said. “I do anything and everything to help out, just to show my appreciation.”

JOSEFA

Josefa’s story began in North Texas many years ago. As a mother to nine and a grandmother to three, she wouldn’t be where she is today without the help of her family at The Salvation Army.

While pregnant with one of her sons, the doctors told her she needed an emergency C-section to have an early birth. Following the procedure, her son was immediately transported to Dallas while Josefa prayed, “Lord, please save my son.”

Weeks passed, and life became increasingly more difficult for Josefa and her family. Becasue her husband couldn’t work, and they couldn’t pay the bills, the family didn’t have enough money to buy food — but that didn’t stop Josefa. “You keep fighting for your kids,” Josefa said. “You keep saying, ‘Son, you’re hungry? Let’s go get something.’ ‘Oh, we can’t pay for that? We’re going to ask for help.’” She did everything to ensure her children would not go without.

One day, Josefa came across a flyer for a Thanksgiving meal at The Salvation Army, which she then realized was not just a Thanksgiving meal — it was a church, a family, and a place to call home.

“They were amazing — every single major, lieutenant, and captain; they’re all amazing here at The Salvation Army,” shared Josefa.

When she felt as if there were no other options, Josefa found hope at The Salvation Army and continues to be involved not only as a client but also as a volunteer.

On Wednesdays, Josefa and her family enjoy the family night while her kids run and have music classes, and she and her husband participate in women’s and men’s Bible studies. During the holiday season, Josefa enjoys assisting with Angel Tree applications — a program close to her heart, as her children received gifts from the Angel Tree as well.

“I love doing Angel Tree applications; it’s so beautiful to see all the kids that come for the gifts, and to see their smiling faces reminds me of how I saw my kids when they got their presents from the Angel Tree,” said Josefa.

Today, Josefa loves giving back in any way she can to The Salvation Army so she can be the light to somebody else, as the officers were to her. When she thinks of The Salvation Army, she thinks of a family willing to love, hug, pray, and provide essential resources to those going through hardships.

MAJORS DWAYNE & MARION DURHAM

For Majors Dwayne and Marion Durham, their roles as officers in The Salvation Army are not just a job. It's their calling and purpose in life.

Throughout their nearly three decades of service to The Salvation Army, Majors Durhams count witnessing the positive difference God makes in people's lives through the work of the Army as the most rewarding aspect of their roles.

For Major Dwayne, his impact boils down to empowerment. Each and every day, thanks to the resources provided by The Salvation Army, he is instrumental in empowering people to be the best version of themselves that God created and intended for them to be and fulfill the calling that God has placed on their lives.

He recounts a time when he saw empowerment at work firsthand:

A few years ago, Major Dwayne encountered a man stealing money from the donation bin located on The Salvation Army's property, donations that were meant to support The Salvation Army's mission of ministering to men with addictions in a residential recovery program.

Over time, he began to attend Sunday Bible study and worship service and even helped keep the outside of the property cleared of fallen branches and storm debris.

Soon, the man was helping to lead the same shower program he was partaking in, a role he took great pride in. Major Dwayne attributes this transformation to treating others with true compassion and love. Because he and staff members

took the time to understand the man's story, he has now found belonging and community at The Salvation Army.

For Major Marion, following the leading of The Holy Spirit has made her journey with The Salvation Army an incredibly rewarding experience. Though the work isn't always easy, the eternal benefits are worth the struggle. And her impact radiates across every person that she meets.

She remembers a story that represents her service:

An older veteran visited The Salvation Army seeking assistance as he was about to become homeless. He had boarded with a single pastor who had suddenly died and needed to now find affordable housing. He was living temporarily in a hotel, but soon was going to run out of money, and his car was stolen.

Major Marion and the case management team were able to work with a landlord they knew to find him a place to live and with the VA to get him passes with local public transportation. He now attends Majors Durham's worship services and is a faithful attendee. The Salvation Army helped keep him from being homeless and gave him a church home.

When asked what she'd want others to understand about The Salvation Army, Major Marion said, "I want people to know that our mission is reaching people who have no hope. Whether it's a practical need, like paying for medication, or a spiritual need, we are an Army committed to the salvation of the lost."

CAPTAINS ARMANDO & MAYELA ACOSTA

In May 2001, Armando Acosta walked into The Salvation Army in El Paso with his family. Reeling from the effects of divorce, he traveled alone with his three young daughters — ages 2, 4, and 6 — carrying more than just their small hands.

He carried the weight of brokenness.

Armando's life and marriage had been shattered by addiction, infidelity, abuse, and failed dreams. Once a firefighter, he had seen the inside of jail cells, burned bridges with people, and he had committed drug-related crimes in desperation. He had questioned God and his "unfairness."

He had struggled with the thought of ending it all.

But there, at The Salvation Army's Corps Community Center, he found something he didn't expect that he hadn't yet crossed paths with: hope.

Through The Salvation Army's men's program in El Paso, Armando received not just practical help but spiritual healing. Once dismissed and disregarded as a book he'd never seek out or find answers in, the Bible became the road map that guided him to redemption.

His focus shifted from survival to transformation. His desperation turned into ambition. His infidelity and abuse turned into nurture and care. His suicidal thoughts were replaced with the inspiration for a new life that awaited him in eternity.

Anchored in faith, he began to believe in a new purpose for his life.

In 2003, Armando met Mayela. Her life story mirrored his: years of drinking, partying, and carefree decision-making. Their paths crossed when she also found Christ and began attending church around the corner from where Armando worked. Fate brought them together through family connections, but at a deeper level, through prayer — Mayela's church had been praying for Armando and his girls.

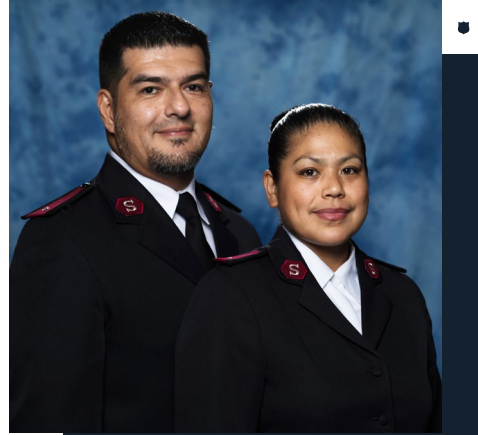
Mayela and Armando married in 2005, and not long after, received their shared calling to serve with The Salvation Army.

Today, you know them as Captains Armando and Mayela Acosta, leaders of the Northside Corps Community Center in Fort Worth.

Whether handing out more than 300 food boxes a week when the world shut down, seeing God give someone a second chance at life, or meeting someone at the doors of The Salvation Army with the same defeated look Armando says he once wore, Captains Acosta serve because they remember how it feels to be in need.

To Captain Armando, serving is not just about providing meals, clothing, or shelter. It is about showing others they are not alone. Because that's what The Salvation Army gave him all those years ago. A place to begin again.

"We are not perfect. We are human. We make mistakes," Captain Armando said. "If there's one thing that I can say for sure about my peers in The Salvation Army, it is that our hearts serve God so that our hands can help people in need."



PROGRAMS OVERVIEW

With a steadfast focus on serving those combatting poverty, homelessness, and addiction, we have a diverse range of programs that cater to both the physical and social well-being of those in need.



We **provide shelter, connect people to housing, and offer financial assistance** to keep countless families from being evicted.



We give compassionate, Christ-centered care to **people who are working to overcome substance use disorder, seeking refuge from domestic violence, or struggling with mental illness.**



Our out-of-school-time programs supply enriching educational experiences to children and youth throughout the region, giving them a **safe place to learn, play, and grow.**



We've **feed thousands of families through our food pantries**, where our neighbors can receive nutritious, shelf-stable grocery items.



We offer a wide range of assessments, courses, vocational training, and hiring events across our Corps Community Centers, which enhances clients' well-being and **fosters their independence through job readiness and life skills classes.**



We **provide holistic care to hundreds of individuals per week**, offering spiritual growth opportunities through worship services, Bible study, and fellowship groups for adults, as well as music classes and character-building activities.



We are one of the **first agencies to respond when disaster strikes.** Our service extends beyond just meals and clean-up kits, encompassing counseling and emotional support for those affected.



We have become a **sole-source provider of inclement weather shelter** in many North Texas communities, keeping people safe when faced with freezing temperatures or the scorching heat.



We understand the challenges faced by families with insufficient income, especially during the holiday season. That's why our Christmas Assistance programs are designed to **make Christmas morning brighter for those unable to provide gifts for their children.** Through the generosity of compassionate individuals, we provide gifts to around 40,000 children, youth, and seniors in need.





The Salvation Army of North Texas offers a compassionate and comprehensive approach to addressing homelessness across the region. With nearly 7,000 North Texans currently homeless — and more than 200,000 at risk of becoming homeless — the organization steps in to meet both immediate needs and long-term challenges. Through emergency and transitional shelters, The Salvation Army provides critical relief for individuals and families in crisis. We offer hot meals, warm beds, and a safe place to rest across North Texas during extreme weather conditions. Our social services centers in Dallas and Fort Worth go beyond basic shelter, equipping clients with educational, vocational, and counseling services that foster long-term self-sufficiency.

IN 2024 ALONE, WE PROVIDED MORE THAN 205,616 NIGHTS OF SHELTER, REFLECTING OUR UNWAVERING COMMITMENT TO BUILDING A PATH FORWARD FOR THOSE FACING HOUSING INSECURITY.

At the heart of our long-term solutions is the Home Sweet Home program, which helps prevent homelessness by providing financial education, case management, and housing assistance to at-risk families. Additionally, The Salvation Army offers targeted support through specialized programs such as SAVE (Veterans Enrichment Program), which provides permanent housing and wraparound services for chronically homeless veterans, and senior housing options that create a secure and welcoming environment for low-income older adults. Our Mobile Outreach program further extends support to individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness, offering meals, casework, and access to health and recovery resources. Together, these efforts reflect The Salvation Army's deep empathy and holistic approach to restoring hope, stability, and dignity across North Texas.

In an effort to raise vital funds for year-round support, Red Kettles made their daily appearances across North Texas, and notable elected officials participated in a Mayoral Challenge to raise community awareness of how necessary donations are, especially during the holidays.

In response to below-freezing temperatures and icy precipitation, we launched our overnight warming shelters across the region, offering a place to sleep, a warm meal, coats, and emotional and spiritual care to our vulnerable neighbors.

In an effort to raise awareness around our programs and services, community relations teams produced and shared Easter volunteer activities and events, as well as educated North Texans on ways to get involved during a time of giving back and recognizing rebirth in Lent.



MAY 2024 FASHION SHOW & LUNCHEON

Our Dallas Women's Auxiliary hosted its annual Fashion Show & Luncheon, featuring designer labels generously donated from local coveted closets and boutiques. Shelle Sills was recognized as the Honorary Luncheon Chair, and Kathie King was honored with the 2024 Margot Perot Service Award.



JUNE 2024 HEAT RELIEF EVENT

To combat heat exposure ahead of the extreme Texas summer temperatures, we teamed up with heat relief partners Reliant and the Dallas Cowboys to open indoor cooling stations and distribute much-needed supplies such as fans, water bottles, and nutrition bars across the region.



JUNE 2024 DONUT DAY

Donut Day is celebrated each year on the first Friday of June to honor The Salvation Army's "Donut Lassies." To celebrate, we delivered donuts to veterans, first responders, and city officials across the region.

AUGUST 2024 LEWISVILLE RENOVATION CELEBRATION

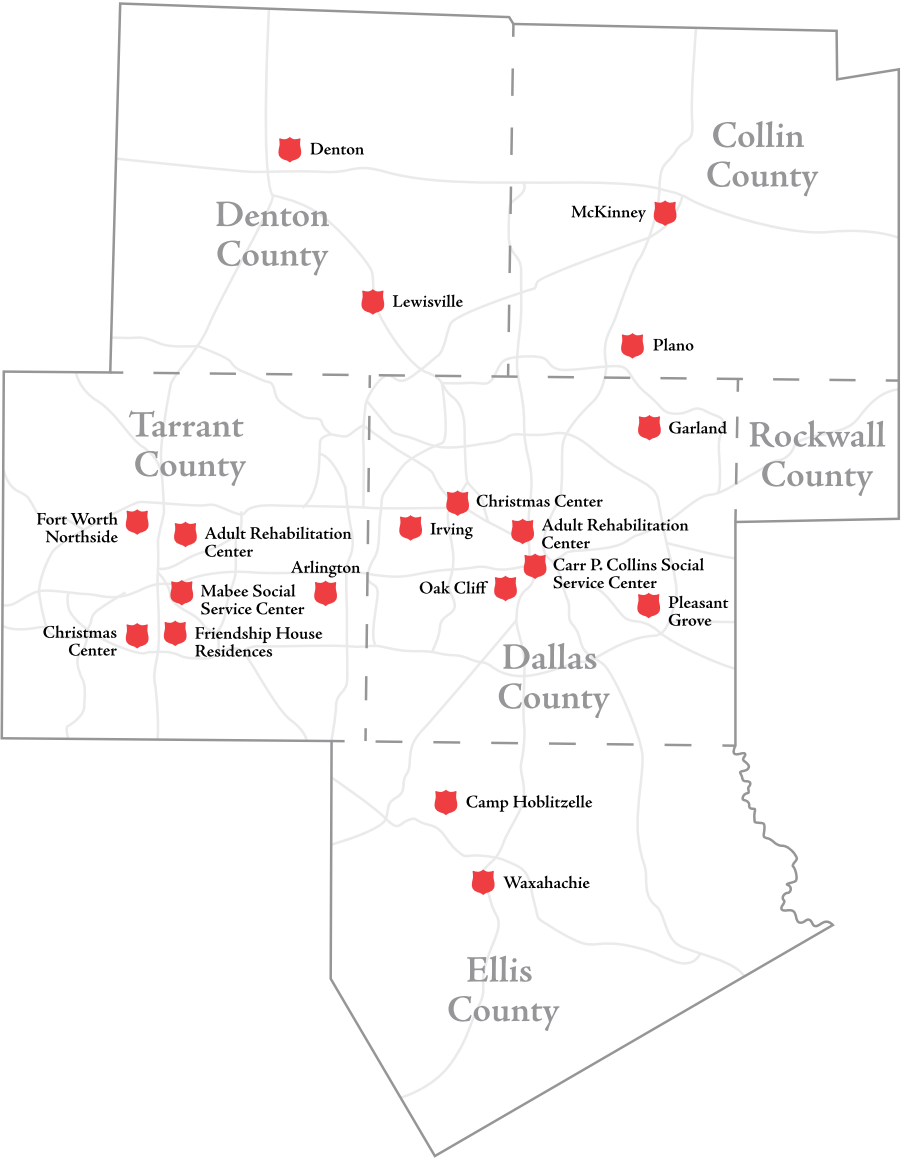
