## Defending NCAA Champions Return Eight Starters From Last Year's Record-Setting Team

**T**hirty seconds. That's about how long Wake Forest field hockey coach Jennifer Averill got to enjoy the Demon Deacons' 2002 NCAA championship.

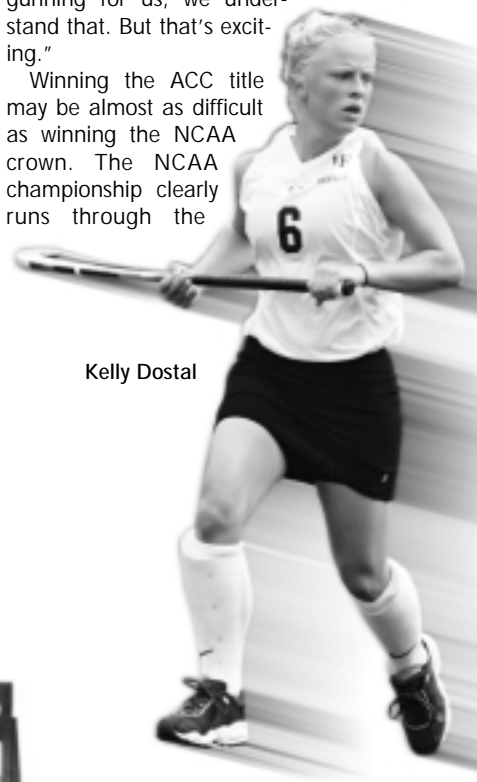
"When it appeared we were going to win, I looked at (assistant coach) Neil (Macmillan) and said that I wish that time could just stand still. You get to enjoy things like that for only a short time."

Wake Forest's 2-0 win over Penn State in the NCAA finals on Nov. 24, 2002 was an historical one for Averill, the Deacons and the WFU athletics program. The victory over the Nittany Lions clinched Wake Forest's first national championship of any kind since 1986 and the first ever by a Demon Deacon women's team.

Truth be told, Averill, her staff and players enjoyed the fruits of the NCAA crown all summer. Still, Averill is a highly-competitive coach. In the back of her mind has been the "R" word -- repeat.

"We have the talent to get back to the Final Four," said Averill, who enters her 12th season at Wake. "I'm usually more conservative in pre-season statements about my team, but I believe that. Certainly, it will be difficult. People will be gunning for us, we understand that. But that's exciting."

Winning the ACC title may be almost as difficult as winning the NCAA crown. The NCAA championship clearly runs through the

ACC. An ACC team has appeared in the national finals in nine out of the last 10 years.

"We can't concern ourselves with the postseason," Averill said. "We have to take care of business in the regular season. The ACC is so strong in hockey that if you can win the league, then you are capable of winning a national championship. That's how much respect I have for the other teams in the league."

"Right now, we're only thinking about Iowa (the season opener)."

It wouldn't be far off to say that Wake Forest dominated field hockey in 2002. The Deacons, in fact, haven't allowed a goal since an ACC Tournament semifinal win over Duke on Nov. 9, 2002 -- a streak of 346 minutes that Wake has shutout opponents. The Deacons haven't lost a game since Sept. 8, 2002 at James Madison -- a current streak of 19 consecutive victories.

"I think that we will always be an attacking team, although last year's statistics may not show that," Averill said.

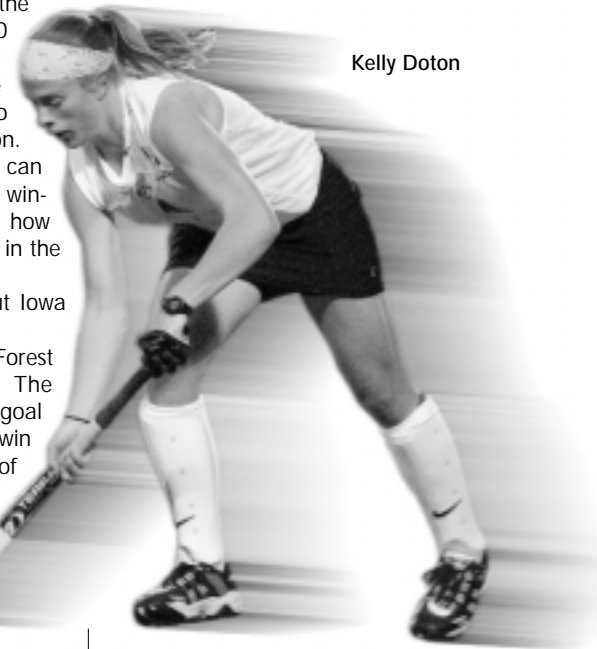
Wake Forest outscored opponents by an average of 3.72 to 0.68 goals per game in 2002. The staggering statistic last season was shots per game. Wake averaged 19.5 compared to just 5.2 for opponents.

Gone from last year's powerful team are five letterwinners, including three starters. The Deacons will miss first team All-American Heather Aughinbaugh, Wake's second-leading scorer (36 points) in 2002, Maria Whitehead, another starter who is now the head coach at Saint Louis University at the ripe age of 22, and defender Lynn Shenk, who played in all 22 games.

Despite the losses, Averill signed a talented six-player recruiting class to join 12 returning letterwinners, including eight returning starters.

Headlining the list of returnees is senior Kelly Doton, a first team All-American and the ACC Player of the Year in 2002. Doton took 62 shots, scored 31 goals and established herself as one of the best amateur players in the nation.

"Kelly Doton, I believe, is the best player in college field hockey -- hands down," Averill said. "I thought she was the best college player last season. She is just a tremendous player and she's surround-

ed by an outstanding supporting cast."

The supporting cast includes three more All-American candidates -- senior Lucy Shaw and juniors Kelly Dostal and Claire Laubach.

Averill raves about all three.

"Lucy is a great player, but she has tremendous balance," Averill said. "She understands the significance of athletics, but she also has perspective on how small athletics is in life. I do know that when she steps on the field, she is a great competitor."

"Claire Laubach is a great athlete -- perhaps the toughest athlete on the field. Kelly Dostal, as long as she can remain healthy, is a scoring machine. She is a tremendous attacking player."

It was on defense, however, that Wake Forest was

so impressive a year ago. Consider that the Deacons became just the second team to go through the NCAA Tournament without allowing a goal. Wake, in fact, is the first team to achieve that feat since the tournament expanded to four rounds.

Senior goalkeeper Katie Ridd, Wake's last line of defense, deserves a lot of that credit. In the Deacons' final nine games of the 2002 season, Ridd allowed just two goals.

"Katie Ridd came up huge for us when we needed it last season," Averill said. "Of course, Lucy (Shaw), Kelly (Doton) and Claire (Laubach) don't allow opponents to get the ball to her very often. But when they did, Katie came up big for us many times.

"Claire Laubach, Lucy Shaw, Kelly Doton and Katie Ridd -- that's a great backfield. They are all great athletes and they all have an understanding of the game. Not everyone has that."

Five other returnees played in all 22 games last year, giving the Deacons a wealth of experience across the board. Senior Emily Ruth, junior Claire Lawhon and sophomores Kelly Wood, Maeke Boreel and Ariel Meyers will all bolster the Wake lineup.

Ruth, a 5-7 forward, brings a strong work ethic to the Deacs.

"She (Ruth) has worked so hard the last three years to see significant playing time," Averill said. "She's certainly one of the most fit players we have. Get her the ball in the circle and she's one strong attacker."

Averill is equally excited about a foursome of sophomores -- Wood, Boreel, Meyers and Martha Ferger.

"Wood and Boreel gave us tremendous depth last year. They played like veterans as freshmen. Even more is expected of them this year.

"Meyers

was a sleeper last season. When she didn't start, she came off the bench and made things happen. She was a spark. I think she's going to catch a lot of people's eyes this season."

Adding to the optimism in the Wake Forest camp is a group of six highly-touted freshmen.

Among the group of rookies are twins Haley and Tracey Scott, who come to Winston-Salem from Rancho Santa Fe, Cal. Midfielder Lauren Crandall is coming off an impressive summer. Kristina Gagliardi comes in as the back-up to Ridd at goalkeeper. Kristi Harshman and Jamie Whitten will compete for immediate playing time.

"This may be the most talented overall group of freshmen that we've had," Averill said. "However, they are still freshmen and don't have that experience."

The 2003 schedule is a difficult one. Four previous NCAA champions -- Michigan, Maryland, North Carolina and Iowa -- are on the Demon Deacon schedule. Wake opens the season in Ann Arbor, Mich. against Iowa on Aug. 31. The next day, the Deacons play Michigan in a battle of the 2002 and 2001 national champions.

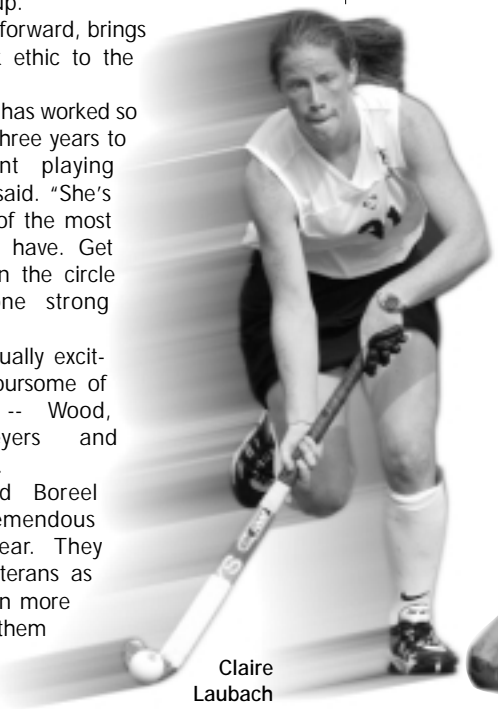

chance to compete for another championship."

Averill took on the Wake Forest job in 1992. That was the year that Wake Forest left the Deep South Association and joined the ACC, adding scholarships for field hockey players and upping the level of competition immensely. Since then, Averill has built the program to what it is today, cracking the top 25 for the

player. She is currently a member of the reserve assistant staff for the United States National Team as well as the Under-23 and Under-16 teams. From 2000 to 2002, she played for Southern Charm, the United Summer League champions.

**H**ead coach Jennifer Averill enters her 12th season at Wake Forest and 15th overall in 2003, after an historic 2002 campaign that featured the squad's first ever ACC Championship and culminated with the first NCAA Championship in team history.

The Deacons lost two of their first three games last season, but then ripped off 19 straight victories en route to the ACC and NCAA Championships. The Deacs also finished the season riding a 23-game home winning streak, the longest in team history. Wake has not lost at Kentner Stadium since October 14, 2000. By season's end, Averill had run her record to 134-83-3 at Wake Forest and 154-115-6 overall. Her success in 2002 earned her honors as ACC Coach of the Year, Division I South Region Coach of the Year and Division I National Coach of the Year.

In the past four seasons, Averill has led the Demon Deacons to their first four NCAA Tournament appearances since field hockey began at Wake in 1971. In each of the past three seasons, the Deacs have marched all the way to the semifinals of the NCAA championship, a run that was capped off by winning the national championship in 2002. Averill realizes the challenges her squad faces in trying to maintain such a high level of success.

"Last year was incredible for us," she says. "But before we can set the goal of matching that success, we have to prove to ourselves that that's a realistic goal. We have six freshmen coming in and we'll look to them to make an impact, but one of the great things about last year was the way so many different players stepped in and contributed. We need that to happen again this year if we want the

first time in 1994, when the Deacons were ranked 20th at season's end. Her squads have appeared in the national top 25 every year since, reaching the number one spot for the first time in 2001.

Last season, Wake Forest hosted the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive year. Wake rolled past California, 8-0, in the first round and then defeated Duke, 2-0, to send the squad to its third consecutive NCAA Semifinals, where the Deacs blanked Michigan State, 3-0. In the championship game, the Deacons defeated Penn State by a 2-0 count.

Over the past four years, Averill's teams have compiled an outstanding 72-15 record, including a 9-3 mark in the NCAA Tournament. In 1999, Averill led the team to its first-ever ACC Tournament final, en route to the squad's first NCAA Tournament. She was named ACC Coach of the Year that season, as well as NFHCA South Region Coach of the Year.

Averill's success as a coach is not surprising, for in her playing days she was one of the nation's premier players. Averill was a four-time All-American at Northwestern and in her senior year of 1987, she was awarded the Honda Broderick Award as the nation's best field hockey player.

Also in 1987, Averill won the Big Ten's Medal of Honor for academic excellence and the Jesse Owens Award as the conference's best athlete. In 1989, Averill was honored by Northwestern as the university's Female Athlete of the Decade for the 1980s.

Averill competed in two Final Fours as a Wildcat and from 1983 to 1987, played on the U.S. National Team. She was inducted into the Northwestern Hall of Fame in September of 1996.

Averill began her coaching career with a short tenure as an assistant at Dartmouth before accepting the head coaching job at Bucknell. She remained there until 1991, when she led the Bison to their first .500 season in seven years and was named Patriot League Coach of the Year.

Averill remains active in field hockey outside of Wake Forest, as both a coach and

**N**eil Macmillan enters his fifth season as assistant coach under Jennifer Averill in 2003. He is in charge of goalkeepers and he will assist with the outfield and the backfield. Macmillan will also continue to diagram the team's penalty corners. Off the field, he assists with recruiting, scheduling, game film review and manages the team's travel plans.

In 1996, Macmillan earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from England's University of Loughborough, where he was the goalkeeper for their 1994-95 national championship squad, as well as for their runner-up team the following season. Macmillan began his coaching career at the Stamford School in England, where he served as the Under-18 coach for three seasons, also teaching mathematics, before coming to Wake Forest. In addition to his responsibilities at Wake Forest, Macmillan is an assistant coach of the USFHA Summer league team, Southern Charm, which has won four straight league championships and looks to continue that success in 2002.

Macmillan's playing resume is full as well. From 1982 to 1992, he played for Havant Hockey club in his hometown of Havant, England. In both 1991

and 1992, his team won the national championship and competed in the European Club Championships. His team won the title at the European Cup Winner's Cup in 1991, and in 1992, he was a goalkeeper on the European Club Championship squad. In the 1992-93 season, Macmillan played in Australia as a member of Gippsland, which won the state championship. Macmillan then returned to England to attend the University of Loughborough.

Macmillan has minded the net for such teams as the Midlands Universities and Beeston Hockey Club, a National League Division I English team. In the three seasons before coming to Wake Forest, Macmillan played for St. Albans Hockey Club, also a member of the National League Division I.

1st Season at Wake Forest**

**L**auren Mazziotto, a former All-American and assistant coach at Ohio University, begins her first year as assistant field hockey coach at Wake Forest.

Mazziotto began her coaching career in 2002 as an assistant coach at Ohio, where she helped guide the Bobcats to a 12-10 record.

An outstanding player at Ohio from 1998-2001, Mazziotto was a two-time West Region All-American Selection (2000 & 2001), a first team All-MAC selection (2000 & 2001), a two-time All-MAC 2nd team selection (1998 and 1999) and was named 3rd team NFHCA All-American after the 2001 season.

As a co-captain her senior year, she was an integral part in leading Ohio to a MAC regular season and conference tournament championship. She led the team and the conference in assists in 2001 with a total of 14. It was the fifth highest total in the nation.

For the past three years, Mazziotto has also been a part of the United States Under-23 team. She has toured with the U.S. team to Germany, competed in the 2002 Pan-Am Indoor Tournament and

recently competed in South Africa. In February, Mazziotto was named to the prestigious United States Field Hockey National Team.

Mazziotto is a native of Sewell, NJ and graduated from Ohio with a degree in Communications Systems Management in 2002.



# ADMINISTRATION



**DR. THOMAS K. HEARN, JR.**

**University President**

Incoming students at Wake Forest University quickly learn that their university motto, Pro Humanitate (in Service to Humanity), is more than an ideal; it is a guiding principle for daily campus activity and a closely held belief of the university's president, Thomas K. Hearn, Jr.

"The Wake Forest motto is no longer a human ideal," Hearn has told new students. "It is a mandate -- a practical imperative -- for living in a world now comprised of a single human community on an ever-smaller planet."

Hearn's allegiance to "the good of humanity" has placed him among the top 50 college and university presidents who demonstrate a personal commitment to character development, as recognized by the John Templeton Foundation. Wake Forest is also listed in the top 100 college and universities in The Templeton Guide, a compilation of colleges and universities.



**RON WELLMAN**

**Director of Athletics**

Ron Wellman, who has elevated Wake Forest University athletics to its highest level ever and committed to preparing the program for greater success in the future, enters his 12th year as director of athletics.

Wellman, who was officially named athletic director in October of 1992, is only the fifth man to assume the top position in the athletic department at Wake Forest during the modern era of intercollegiate sports, following Pat Preston, Jim Weaver, Bill Gibson and Dr. Gene Hooks, WFU's athletic director from 1964 through 1992.

Since taking over control of WFU Athletics, Wellman has seen Deacon athletic teams rise to national prominence in several sports while perennially competing for Atlantic Coast Conference championships. The 2002-03 academic year - a banner year by any definition - is evidence.

In the fall of 2002, the Deacon field hockey team, making its third consecutive trip to the Final Four, earned the first team NCAA championship ever by a Wake Forest women's team. The football team produced its second straight winning season by beating Oregon in the Seattle Bowl. Men's soccer coach Jay Vidovich and women's cross country coach Annie Bennett both earned ACC Coach of the Year honors after leading their teams to remarkable seasons.

In March, second-year Deacon men's basketball coach Skip Prosser guided Wake Forest to the regular season ACC title. Unranked in all the preseason polls, the Deacons won the regular season crown outright for the first time in more than 40 years. Along the way, Prosser was named ACC Coach of the Year and senior Josh Howard became the first unanimous selection for ACC Player of the Year since NC State's David Thompson in 1975.

In the spring, the men's golf team was ranked among the nation's top five teams all season, the women's golf team hosted an NCAA regional and the men's tennis team earned an NCAA Tournament bid. All told, 10 Wake Forest teams participated in NCAA postseason play, three teams won ACC regular season titles, four coaches were named ACC Coach of the Year, 10 teams were ranked in the top 10 nationally during their respective seasons and nine student-athletes were named first team All-American.

Also in the spring, Wellman signed football coach Jim Grobe and Prosser to long-term contract extensions. In June, Wellman received the prestigious honor as the Division IA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year from the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Off the playing fields, Wellman has spearheaded an effort for the overall development of the student-athlete. He asks his coaches to stress academics and Wellman has instituted programs to assist and develop student-ath-

letes away from competition such as the annual Academic Excellence Banquet, a campus-wide affair which honors those student-athletes who have achieved in the classroom.

Another obvious sign of the progress Wake Forest has made - and is continuing to make - under Wellman's leadership is the ambitious facility improvement program that the athletic department has undertaken.

The most recent construction project was that of new office and meeting space for the Deacon football team and staff. There are on-going projects at Lawrence Joel Coliseum, home of the Wake Forest basketball teams, including a new state-of-the-art locker room facility.

WFU varsity coaches have modern and spacious offices, all housed near to their teams' practice facilities, dressing areas and academic counseling center. Spry Stadium, WFU's campus soccer facility, provides the school with one of the finest practice and competition arenas for that sport in the country. The varsity tennis teams and entire Winston-Salem community benefit from a state-of-the-art Indoor Tennis Center that is located less than a mile from campus.

And, of course, there is the spectacular Bridger Field House at Groves Stadium, which provides support to every varsity team as well as the athletic department administration and entire university with its many services.

The Kenneth D. Miller Center, which opened its doors in September, 2001, provides additional space for the Student-Athlete Services and CHAMPS programs, as well as a new state-of-the-art basketball practice facility.

The dean of ACC athletic directors, Wellman has also taken an active role on the national level. Wellman serves on the NCAA Division I Management Council. Recently he served as chairman of the NCAA Baseball Committee and directed the implementation of a new and expanded national tournament format, creating significant interest in that event. Wellman also serves as vice-president of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

Born in Celina, Ohio, he earned his undergraduate degree from Bowling Green State University, where he was a pitcher on the varsity baseball team.

Wellman began devoting his energies to athletic administration fulltime in 1986 when he was named athletic director at Mankato State (MN) University. He spent 12 months with that program, then in July of 1987 accepted the athletic directorship at Illinois State. Among his accomplishments at ISU were facility development and the Academic Excellence Banquet concept which he brought to Wake Forest.

Wellman and his wife Linda have three daughters -- Angie, who works for ESPN Regional in Charlotte, Nicole, a student in the Wake Forest University Medical School; and Melissa, a graduate student in the Wake Forest University counselor education program.



**BARBARA WALKER**

**Senior Associate Athletic Director/SWA**

Barbara Walker joined the Wake Forest staff in 1999 as associate athletics director for Olympic sports and senior woman administrator. She was promoted to senior associate director in the spring of 2001 while retaining her duties as senior woman administrator. Walker oversees 13 of Wake Forest's 16 varsity sports.

Compliance, operations, sports medicine, student-athlete services and strength and conditioning also report to her.

Walker served three years on the NCAA Women's Soccer Committee, two of those years as Chair. She also currently serves on the NACDA Executive Board.

Prior to Wake Forest, Walker spent two years at the University of Texas as associate athletic director for compliance and men's student services. She also spent eight years at the University of Oregon as senior associate athletic director, overseeing 14 sports, academic support, compliance, athletic training, the equipment room and weight room.

Walker served eight years as an assistant athletic director at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. She earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1978 and a master's in education in 1981 from Central Missouri State.

Dwight Lewis enters his third year at Wake Forest as associate athletic director for student services. He oversees Wake Forest's extensive academic counseling program.

Lewis came to WFU from the University of Oregon, where he served as director of academic support since 1996. Prior to Oregon, he worked as the coordinator of the student internship program at Chico State (CA) from 1994-96 and as outreach counselor at Chico State from 1990-92. ## Deacons Win 19 Straight To Close Out Record-Setting, NCAA Championship Season

The 2002 field hockey season was one of the most successful in the history of Wake Forest sports.

The Deacons won 19 straight games on their way to the first NCAA Championship in team history. The national championship was also the first ever by a Wake Forest women's team and the fourth in school history. The Deacs also collected the first ACC Championship in the history of

the program and had the opportunity to host an exhibition game with the United States National Team.

Wake competed in the NCAA Tournament for the fourth straight year and made it to the semifinals for the third year in a row. The Demon Deacons were undefeated at Kentner Stadium for the second consecutive year, ending the season on a 23-game home winning streak, the longest in school history. The squad has not lost a game on its home turf since falling to North Carolina in overtime on October 14, 2000.

The Deacs ended the season with five straight shutouts, four of them in the NCAA Tournament, making them the second team ever to win the tournament without allowing a goal and the first since the tournament was expanded to four rounds. Dating back to the semifinals of the ACC Tournament, Wake Forest has not allowed a goal in 384 game minutes.

The team finished with a 20-2 record (4-0 ACC), running its record over the past four seasons to 72-15.

The Deacons boasted five All-ACC players and three All-Americans. Junior midfielder Kelly Doton was honored as the ACC Player of the Year and head coach Jennifer Averill was named ACC Coach of the Year. She was also honored by the NFHCA as Division I South Region Coach of the Year and Division I National Coach of the Year.

Wake Forest overcame a sluggish start to produce its best season ever. The Deacons lost two of their first three games including a 1-0 season-opening loss against Iowa and a 2-1 upset at James Madison.

Wake rebounded from the 1-2 start to beat five nationally-ranked teams in its next six games including wins over No. 1-ranked Maryland, No.

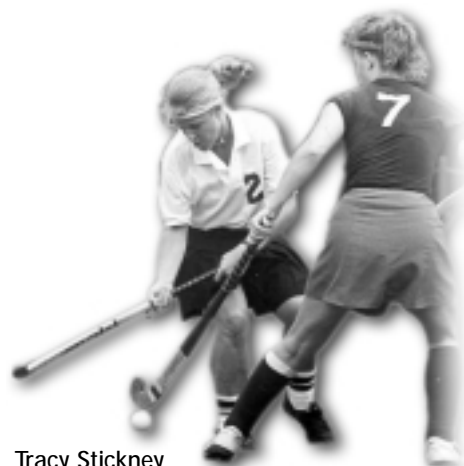
