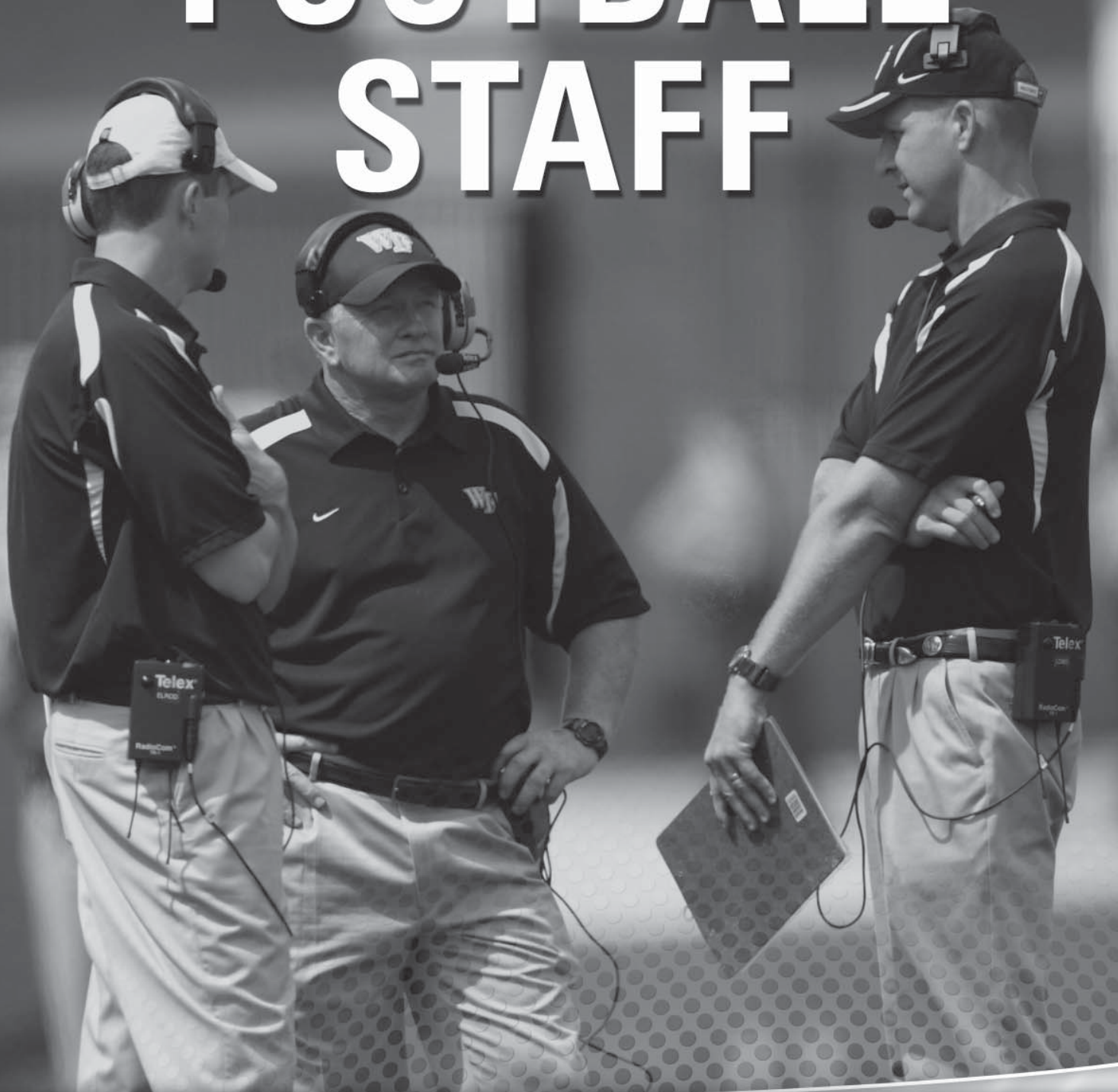

Wake Forest head football coach Jim Grobe is in the midst of piloting the Demon Deacons through the most successful period in school history.

After seven seasons at the helm, Grobe has built a football program that has been to back-to-back bowl games and proven itself to be an annual contender for the Atlantic Coast Conference championship.

In 2007, Grobe led the Deacons to a 9-4 record including a 24-10 win over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. Combined with last year's 11-3 record, Wake Forest has won 20 games in the last two seasons. Only 18 members of the NCAA's Football Bowl Subdivision have won 20 or more games since the start of the 2006 season. Among the nine wins in 2007 were victories over North Carolina, NC State and Duke. Never before had Wake Forest swept the Big Four series in consecutive seasons. And never before had Wake won as many as 20 games in just two seasons.

Wake Forest was successful in 2007 because of an efficient offense and an opportunistic defense. The Deacons led the nation in non-offensive touchdowns, scoring on six interception returns, two fumble returns, a kickoff return and a punt return. Wake's eight defensive touchdowns were also the most of any FBS team in the country. Offensively, the Deacons set a school record for the most points scored in a season and tied the school mark with 44 touchdowns.

Wake Forest's success in 2007 was not limited to the field. The Deacons had their first Academic All-America football player in many years when offensive tackle Louis Frazier was named to the first team.

During his first seven seasons at Wake, Grobe has set numerous milestones that were never previously achieved by a Deacon football coach. Grobe has taken the Deacons to back-to-back bowl games for the first time in school history. He is the only coach to take Wake Forest to three bowl games in a career. And, with a 46-39 record in seven seasons with the Deacons, he is the first coach in over 50 years to have a career mark of seven games over .500.

The success of the Deacons in 2007 came as no surprise to those who have watched Grobe build the Wake Forest program from the ground up. In his first five years on the job, Grobe was busy building respectability. In the last two years, he has been busy chasing championships.

The 2006 season was one to remember for all Wake Forest fans. Grobe led Wake Forest to its second-ever ACC Championship and its first since 1970. The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division title after being picked to finish last by the league's media in the preseason. The 11 wins posted by the 2006 team set a school record as Wake was the most improved team in the nation, following a 4-7 record in 2005. The Deacs were ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks in 2006, the longest streak in school

history and beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959 while posting their first win over N.C. State in Raleigh since 1984. Grobe's hard work was rewarded by his unanimous selection as the ACC Coach of the Year. He was selected as the National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBSsportsline.com.

Grobe was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC. He inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990's.

Football observers have recognized Grobe's efforts in transforming Wake Forest into one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national level.

The levels of excitement and expectation surrounding Demon Deacon football have reached unprecedented heights. That is a tribute to Grobe and his staff who believe the best is yet to come.

Grobe, 56, has gained a national reputation as a builder of programs.

In seven seasons, Grobe's teams have won 46 contests, earned three bowl berths and won an ACC Championship.

That is particularly impressive given the recent ACC expansion that introduced three nationally-prominent programs to the league.

Even with the rising level of play in the conference, making the ACC arguably the nation's best football league, Wake Forest has become even more competitive and successful.

Football observers have already recognized Grobe's efforts in transforming Wake into one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national basis.

"Ever since Jim Grobe arrived in Winston-Salem, this program has been soaring upward," ESPN's Ron Franklin said.

Long before Wake Forest's breakout season in 2006, the Deacons had performed very well against in-state opponents. Since Grobe's arrival, Wake Forest has defeated every Division I opponent in the state, including a 5-0 mark against East Carolina, 7-0 vs. Duke, 4-2 vs. North Carolina, 4-3 vs. NC State, plus victories against I-AA Appalachian State and North Carolina A&T. In all, Grobe's Deacons are 22-5 against in-state teams.

In short, Grobe has put Wake Forest in position to be extremely competitive in one of America's best football leagues, the ACC, for many years to come.

Grobe owns a 46-39 record after seven years at Wake Forest, 79-72-1 in 13 overall seasons as a head coach. Before Grobe arrived at WFU, the Deacons went a combined 26-63 in eight previous years.

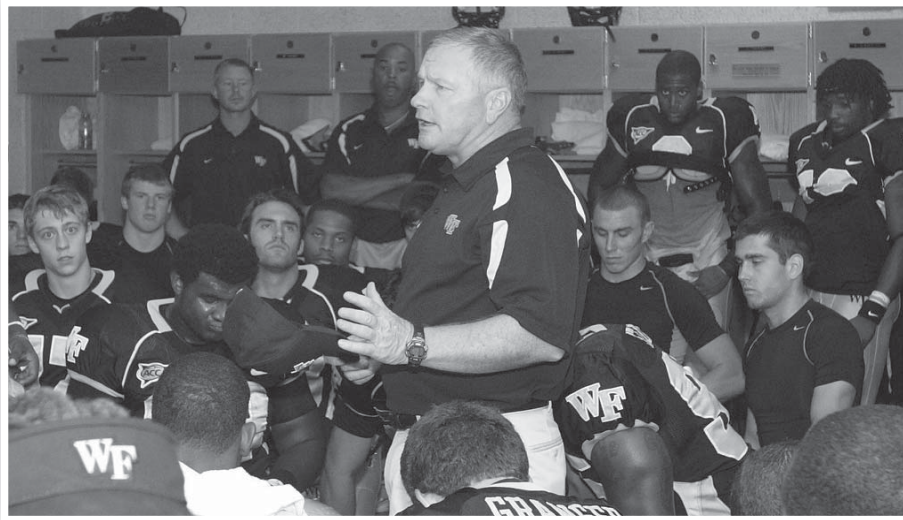

The 2006 ACC Championship season was certainly a magical one, but it was years in the making.

Grobe began his Wake Forest tenure in impressive fashion, orchestrating one of the greatest turnarounds in program history. While laying the foundation for future gridiron success, he led his first squad to a bowl-eligible 6-5 record after Wake Forest went 2-9 the previous season.

The Deacons won road games at East Carolina, Duke, Virginia and North Carolina en route to posting WFU's second winning season since 1992.

The win over Virginia, Grobe's alma mater, was Wake Forest's first over the Cavaliers since 1983. The 32-31 win at North Carolina came after the Deacons trailed the Tar Heels 24-0 at halftime.

A win over Northern Illinois in the 2001 season finale secured the winning season and made Wake Forest eligible for a bowl berth. Grobe became just the eighth rookie head coach at WFU to post a winning record in his first year.

All five losses in 2001 came to bowl-bound teams. In three of those losses - vs. Maryland, NC State and Clemson

- the Deacs had the ball with good field position and with a chance to tie or take the lead late in the game.

The 2001 Deacon team averaged 221.6 yards rushing per game - an increase of over 70 yards per game from the previous season. The Deacons led the ACC in rushing, edging out BCS-bound Maryland for first place and averaged 401.6 yards of total offense per game.

In his second campaign, he guided the Deacs to a 38-17 victory in the Seattle Bowl in front of a national television audience against an Oregon team loaded with NFL talent and that was once ranked as high as sixth in the country.

Grobe became just the second coach in Wake Forest history, joining John Mackovic, to lead the Deacons to a bowl appearance in his second season at the helm.

Impressive road wins over Purdue and Georgia Tech, in addition to a 31-0 shutout of rival North Carolina, highlighted the 2002 regular season campaign. The year was capped off with the victory over Oregon in Seattle to give WFU its second straight winning season for the first time since the 1987-88 seasons.

Once again, Wake Forest led the ACC in rushing (241.2 ypg) and also averaged a league-high 408.1 yards of total offense per game in 2002. It marked the first time WFU led the ACC in total offense since 1979.

In what many termed a rebuilding year, Grobe got the 2003 edition of Deacon football off to an exciting 2-0 start, with a road win at Boston College and a home victory over 11th-ranked NC State, his first win over a ranked opponent at Wake Forest. That led to another career first for Grobe, as the Deacs themselves earned a national ranking the following week.

Grobe reached another milestone in the 2003 season, recording his 50th career victory with a 42-13 win at Duke.

In 2004, the Deacons fielded a very young team that competed hard each week and captured the imagination of Deacon fans, as the single season attendance record was broken for the third straight year.

Wake knocked off bowl-bound BC for the second straight season. The Deacons posted a three-game winning streak in September, its first such streak since 1992.

Wake Forest seemed to be on the verge of bursting onto the national scene each week, as the Deacons were tied or leading in nine of the 11 games. The Deacons had a chance to knock off eventual ACC Champion Virginia Tech and fifth-ranked Florida State at BB&T Field, but lost both games by a combined 10 points. Against a treacherous schedule in the newly-expanded ACC, Wake Forest posted a 4-7 record.

Five Deacons earned All-ACC honors, including first team selections Chris Barclay and Ryan Plackemeier.

The 2005 Deacs had 26 freshmen and sophomores in the two-deep roster. Wake Forest showed flashes of brilliance with victories against NC State and Clemson, but could not overcome inexperience and a slow start, finishing 4-7.

For the fourth time in five seasons, the Deacons led the ACC in rushing.

Individually, Barclay led the ACC in rushing during the regular season for a third straight year, becoming the first player in the long history of the league to accomplish that feat. In doing so, he broke the school's all-time rushing record and was chosen as the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Deacon player to do that in 26 years.

Plackemeier earned consensus All-America honors and won the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter. Josh Gattis was a second-team All-ACC pick.

The magical ACC Championship season of 2006 was well-chronicled. Redshirt freshman quarterback Riley Skinner, who stepped into the starting role during week two, became the ACC's Rookie of the Year and a second team All-ACC pick.

Seniors Josh Gattis and Steve Vallos, junior Jon Abbate and Steve Justice and sophomore Sam Swank were all first team All-ACC selections. Seniors Patrick Ghee and Jyles Tucker were honorable mention.

Grobe was the unanimous choice by the media as the ACC Coach of the Year. He was selected as the National Coach of the Year by his peers, the American Football Coaches Association, in addition to the Bobby Dodd Foundation and the Associated Press.

When asked about his accomplishments or his coaching style, Grobe deflects his success to his players and to his coaching staff who he frequently refers to as, "the best coaching staff in America."

Grobe wasted no time in assembling his staff after he was hired at Wake Forest on Dec. 11, 2000. He brought eight assistants with him from Ohio, five of whom enter their seventh season at Wake Forest.

For most of the staff, their loyalty to Grobe and each other pre-dates their days in Winston-Salem or even Athens. It's a brand of loyalty and stability rarely seen in college football.

Assistant head coach Billy Mitchell has coached alongside Grobe since 1984 at Air Force. A few years later, they successfully recruited a high school player named Steed Lobotzke who eventually earned two letters and took a job as a graduate assistant at the Academy. Today, he is Wake Forest's offensive coordinator.

Recruiting coordinator Ray McCartney and defensive ends coach Keith Henry both joined Grobe's staff at Ohio in 1995 and have served alongside him ever since.

Brad Lambert came to Wake Forest from Georgia in 2001 when Brian Knorr, the only Ohio assistant who did not accompany Grobe to Winston-Salem, was promoted to head coach of the Bobcats.

Wake Forest's two newest coaching additions, Knorr and Steve Russ, both have long ties to Grobe. Knorr was a quarterback at Air Force while Grobe was coaching the Falcon linebackers. Russ was a standout linebacker with Grobe as his position coach.

Since Grobe arrived at Wake Forest in 2001, only four assistant coaches have left. Troy Calhoun, Wake Forest's two-year offensive coordinator, left and is now the head coach at the Air Force Academy. Wake's seven-year defensive coordinator, Dean Hood, became the head coach at Eastern Kentucky following the 2007 season. Quarterbacks coach Jeff Mullen was named the offensive

coordinator at West Virginia upon the hiring of Bill Stewart in 2008.

Since arriving at Wake Forest, Grobe has hired Tom Elrod, a former Deacon quarterback who served as a graduate assistant during Grobe's first season in 2001. Tim Billings joined the staff prior to the 2006 season. The former head coach at Southeast Missouri State, Billings spent 10 years at Marshall and overlapped during that time with Lambert.

Grobe came to Wake Forest after turning a struggling Ohio University program into a contender for the Mid-American Conference championship.

In the 10 seasons before Grobe left his assistant's position at the Air Force Academy to become Ohio University's head coach, the Bobcats won 17 games. In the six years under Grobe, they won 33 and finished with winning records in the Mid-American Conference five straight seasons.

Grobe coached at Ohio for six years (1995-2000). After taking over the reigns of a program that went 0-11 and was ranked last among Division I-A programs in 1994, Grobe led the Bobcats to a cumulative six-year record of 33-33-1.

A 1975 University of Virginia graduate, Grobe gained valuable experience as an assistant to Fisher DeBerry at the Air Force Academy prior to going to Ohio. He served as linebackers coach from 1984 to 1994, during which time the Falcons produced a record of 84-50 and appeared in seven bowl games.

"I was fortunate to play for and coach with some outstanding people," Grobe said. "Everything I know I learned from someone else. Qualities like hard work, loyalty, discipline and toughness are things we take pride in at Wake Forest.

"At the same time, I don't think any team or staff has more fun playing or coaching than our guys."

In 2000, Grobe's final season with the Bobcats, Ohio posted impressive victories over bowl teams Minnesota and Marshall and closed the season by winning five of its last six games. Statistically, the Bobcats ranked in the top 30 nationally in 2000 in rushing offense (323.0 ypg), 18th in fewest turnovers lost (18), 20th in scoring defense (18.9 ppg), 25th in total offense (418.1 ypg) and 30th in scoring offense (31.18 ppg). The Bobcats also ranked high nationally in two special teams categories - fourth in net punting (39.7 ypp) and 39th in punting returns (11.95 ypr). Grobe's team produced the best fourth down conversion numbers in the MAC.

"We see nothing but good things happening for our program," director of athletics Ron Wellman said at Grobe's hiring. "Jim Grobe is a good fit for Wake Forest in what he believes about the academic process and the importance of education and graduating his players."

Grobe also worked previously as an assistant coach at Marshall (1979-83) for head coach Sonny Randle and at Emory & Henry (1978) for head coach Jerry Kirk. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Virginia, in 1975 after talking head coach Sonny Randle into hiring him as a graduate assistant.

One year later, he was head coach at Liberty High School in Bedford, Va., from 1976-77.

As a player at Virginia in 1973 under coach Don Lawrence and 1974 under Randle, Grobe played middle guard (1973) and linebacker (1974). He was a two-year starter and was named Academic All-ACC.

Before enrolling at Virginia, Grobe played under coach Hank Norton for two seasons at Ferrum (VA) Junior College, where he played linebacker on the undefeated Coastal Conference championship team. Grobe earned the Catlin Citizenship Award and the Big Green Award. In the fall of 2002, Grobe was inducted into the Ferrum College Hall of Fame.

"I don't know if there's anybody who loves the game more than I do," Grobe said. "I'd still rather be playing. The players don't get it, but I tell them that all the time. I'm just a big kid who can't play anymore."

Grobe was born on Feb. 17, 1952. A native of Huntington, W.Va., Grobe earned his undergraduate degree (B.S.) in education from Virginia in 1975 and earned a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Virginia in 1978.

Grobe and his wife, Holly, have two sons, Matt and Ben. Matt is a 1995 Marshall graduate who is the Head Golf Professional at DragonRidge Country Club in Las Vegas. He and his wife, Melanie, have a daughter, Mackenzie (10), and a son, Cameron (6).

Ben graduated from Ohio University in 2002 with a degree in health care administration. He currently resides in Charlotte and works for Sun Life Financial.

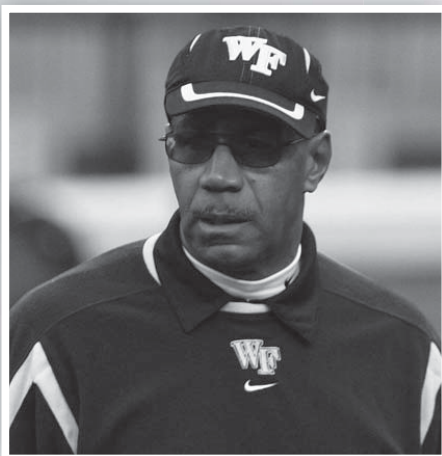

BILLY MITCHELL

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH RUNNING BACKS/KICKERS

8th Year
East Carolina, 1972

Veteran football coach Billy Mitchell enters his 27th year in the profession and will start his 23rd season alongside Jim Grobe this fall.

After working together for nine years at Air Force and six more at Ohio University, Grobe brought the veteran aide with him to Winston-Salem in 2000 to serve as assistant head coach, running backs coach and kickers coach for the Demon Deacons.

In the seven years since Mitchell's arrival, Wake Forest has posted six of the top eight rushing seasons in school history, with 2,438 rushing yards in 2001, 3,135 in 2002, 2,439 in 2003, 2,239 in 2004, 2,173 in 2005 and 2,099 in 2006. Wake Forest also broke the school record for rushing touchdowns in his first two seasons, with 33 such scores during the 2002 campaign.

In 2007, Mitchell coached the Atlantic Coast Conference's Rookie of the Year in tailback Josh Adams. Adams set school records for the most rushing attempts, rushing yards and rushing touchdowns by a redshirt freshman during the 2007 season. Adams rushed for 100 or more yards three times during his redshirt freshman season.

Adams is the latest running back prodigy to receive tutelage from Mitchell. At Wake Forest, Mitchell has guided the careers of Chris Barclay and Tarence Williams, two of the most productive backs in school history.

Barclay was the 2005 ACC Player of the Year, the first Deacon running back to accomplish that feat since Brian Piccolo, and a three-time All-ACC selection.



Barclay left Wake Forest as the school's all-time leading rusher (4,032 yards) and scorer (40 touchdowns). He ended his career as the ACC's fifth-leading all-time rusher, seventh in rushing touchdowns and ninth in total touchdowns. Barclay is the only player in ACC history to lead the league in rushing during the regular season for three straight years.

As a senior, Barclay carried 218 times for 1,127 yards and 10 touchdowns. Barclay led the ACC in rushing yards, rushing attempts and all-purpose yards (1,508).

In 2006, Mitchell had the daunting task of seemingly finding a new running back each week. Preseason first team All-ACC pick Micah Andrews suffered a season-ending knee injury in week three. Back-ups Kevin Harris and Kenneth Moore also missed major time with injuries of their own.

Despite the required "by-committee" approach, Deacon rushers combined for almost 2,100 yards, the eighth-most in school history. Three separate Deacons — Andrews, Moore and De'Angelo Bryant — each posted 100-yard rushing games.

Mitchell also hand-picks and coaches Wake Forest's kicking specialists.

He has guided the careers of punter Ryan Plackemeier, the 2005 Ray Guy Award winner and consensus first team All-American, and Sam Swank, a 2006 first team All-American placekicker and 2006 Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

Swank will enter his senior season in 2008 as Wake Forest's all-time scoring leader with 289 points. He has converted 60 of 76 field goal tries and is perfect on 106 career PAT attempts. Swank was a Lou Groza Award semifinalist in 2005, the only freshman in the country to join that list. As a sophomore, Swank broke 11 school records and tied the NCAA record for most 50-yard field goals in a single game when he booted three in a key win at NC State. Swank, the only player in the country to be named to the Ray Guy and Lou Groza semifinalist lists in 2006, was voted by his teammates as Wake Forest's MVP.

As a senior, Plackemeier led the nation in both net punting and average per punt. He finished his career as a three-time All-ACC first team selection and the NCAA's all-time leading punter among those with 200 career attempts. A seventh-round draft pick in 2006, Plackemeier is a member of the Seattle Seahawks.

During Mitchell's tenure at Ohio, the Bobcats posted the top five rushing seasons in school history. The program's success in its ground game was capped by a school-record 3,553 total rushing yards in 2000 and a rushing average which ranked second nationally (323.0 yards per game). Mitchell guided the career of Ohio tailback Steveland Hookfin, who was a three-time All-Mid-American Conference selection.

Mitchell also coached Ohio University punter Dave Zastudil to numerous awards, including Freshman All-

America honors, 1999 MAC Special Teams Player of the Year and two appearances on the All-MAC first team (1999, 2000). Zastudil finished seventh in the nation in 2000 with an average of 44.34 yards per punt. A fourth-round NFL draft pick, Zastudil has punted for the Baltimore Ravens and now the Cleveland Browns.

Prior to arriving at Ohio, Mitchell spent a second stint as an assistant at the Air Force Academy for nine years (1986-94). He had also held the position of assistant coach at the Academy from 1979-1983. He served in various capacities at the Academy, coaching running backs, defensive line, special teams, kickers and the junior varsity squad.

During his tenure with the Falcons, Mitchell coached in seven bowl games. He also was the academic liaison to the dean and the military liaison to the commandant.

Mitchell lettered three seasons at wing back and defensive back for East Carolina and was named the team's Most Valuable Player in 1971. He also earned four letters as a member of the Pirates' track team.

Mitchell earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from East Carolina in 1972 and a master's degree in management and supervision, personnel management, from Central Michigan in 1978.

Mitchell and his wife, Nellie, have two sons, Brienne and Wrienne, and a daughter, Tarienne.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR LINEBACKERS

8th Year
Kansas State, 1987

Brad Lambert starts his eighth season with the Demon Deacons and his first as defensive coordinator. Wake Forest's linebacker coach for the past six years, Lambert was promoted to defensive coordinator prior to spring practice in 2008.

Lambert will take over a defense that ranked 27th in the nation in total defense in 2007, limiting foes to 340.4 yards per game. It marked the second-best defensive effort in the seven years of the Jim Grobe era. The Deacon defenders held opponents to 109.4 rushing yards per game, the fourth-best effort in school history.

In 2008, the Deacons will return nine defensive starters including All-ACC selections Alphonso Smith at cornerback and Aaron Curry at linebacker. Wake Forest led the nation in defensive touchdowns in 2007, scoring on six interception returns and two fumble returns.

As Wake's linebacker coach, Lambert will welcome back all three starters and six lettermen. Curry, Stanley Arnoux and Chantz McClinic will form the nucleus of what could be one of the top linebacking corps in the country.

The productivity of Lambert's linebackers were a key reason why Wake Forest limited its 2006 opponents to just 15.4 points per game to rank second in the ACC and 12th

nationally. The Deacon defense was stingy against the run, giving up just 105.8 rushing yards per game, the third-best mark in Wake Forest history.

Lambert's brightest star was Jon Abbate who earned first team All-ACC and honorable mention All-America status. Abbate became only the third player in ACC history to lead his team in tackles as a freshman, sophomore and a junior. Abbate also became the first Deacon to forego his senior season for the NFL Draft. He is currently a member of the Houston Texans.

Under Lambert's guidance, some of the program's most exciting young talent began to emerge. A trio of redshirt freshmen, including Curry and Arnoux, showed a great deal of promise in 2005.

Curry, in particular, took the ACC by storm. His 7.5 tackles for loss ranked among the top freshmen nationally. He earned second team Freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Despite having only one senior linebacker, Wake Forest limited opposing rushing attack to just 133.5 yards per game. That equaled the fifth-best rushing defense in Wake Forest history.

In 2004, Lambert coached Abbate to honorable mention All-ACC honors and runner-up for ACC Rookie of the Year. Brad White ranked second on the team with 7.5 tackles for loss.

Lambert guided the inside linebackers during his first season with the Deacons. Wake Forest's starting inside linebackers in 2001, Marquis Hopkins and Kellen Brantley, finished the season as the team's top two tacklers.

While the rest of the football staff moved south from Athens, Ohio, to Wake Forest in 2001, Lambert headed north from Athens, Ga. to accept the position of coaching the Deacon linebackers. Lambert served as an assistant coach at the University of Georgia for the previous five seasons.

Lambert held a variety of roles within Georgia's defensive system over his five seasons with the Bulldogs. In 2000, he coached the secondary after working with the linebackers, special teams and defensive ends in previous seasons.

Lambert guided cornerback Tim Wansley to All-Southeastern Conference honors after he led the league in interceptions in 2000. That season the Bulldog defense broke a school record for interceptions for touchdowns. In 1999, Lambert coached two All-SEC linebackers -- Kendrell Bell and Orantes Grant.

UGA went to four straight postseason bowl games -- winning all four -- during Lambert's stint at Georgia.

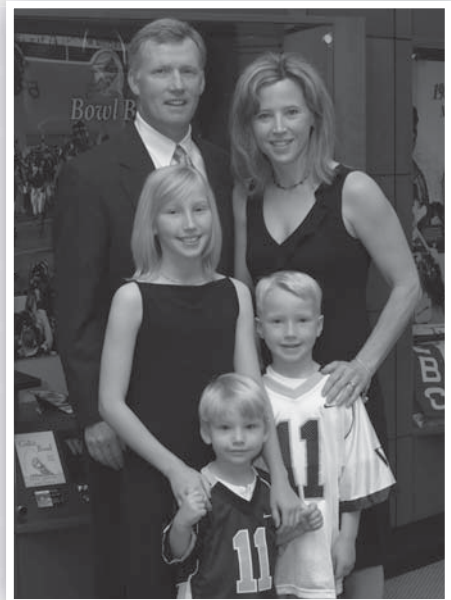

Steed Lobotzke enters his eighth year at Wake Forest and his sixth season as the Demon Deacons' offensive coordinator in 2008. He also tutors the offensive line.

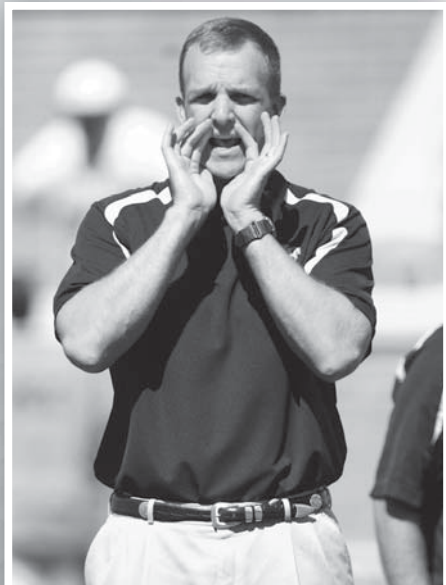
Since his arrival at Wake Forest, the Deacons have gained a reputation of having an unconventional offensive attack that is difficult to contain. The results justify the reputation.

Over the last two seasons, Wake Forest has gone 20-7 and earned a pair of bowl bids. The Deacons are one of just 18 teams in Division I to have won 20 or more games over the last two years.

As offensive coordinator, Coach Lobo has presided over an offense that has produced three of the top six total offense outputs in school history. Wake Forest's 4,425 yards of total offense in 2007 marked the second-best offensive season in school history. Quarterback Riley Skinner led the nation in completion percentage at 72.4 and running back Josh Adams was named the ACC's Rookie of the Year.

As the Deacs' offensive line coach, Lobo helped shape center Steve Justice into an NFL draft choice in 2008 and the runner-up for the Rimington Trophy, given annually to the nation's top college center.

Over the last seven years, Wake Forest has led the ACC in rushing four times, scored 169 rushing touchdowns and gained 16,413 yards on the ground — more than 193 yards per game.



The Wake Forest offensive line has been instrumental in helping the Deacons rank first or second in the ACC and rank among the top 20 nationally in rushing during five of the last seven seasons. The line has also ranked first or second in the league in fewest sacks given up four times during that span.

Wake Forest's rushing totals in 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006 all rank among the top eight season rushing totals in school history.

In his five seasons as offensive coordinator, Wake Forest has posted four of the top 11 seasons in school history in terms of offensive production.

Last year, Wake Forest was equally effective on the ground as well as through the air. The Deacons compiled 4,425 yards of total offense, the second-highest total in school history. Wake's 71.2 team completion percentage was a school record and ranked second in the nation behind only Texas Tech's 71.3.

In 2005, Lobotzke's offense showcased the talent of running back Chris Barclay. The senior was named ACC Offensive Player of the Year and ACC Player of the Year. Barclay was the school's first player of the year since 1979. He graduated as Wake Forest's all-time leading rusher and statistical leader in seven major categories.

A Deacon offensive lineman has earned All-ACC honors every year under Lobotzke's watch.

He has sent six offensive linemen to the NFL, including Michael Collins (Baltimore), Blake Henry (Atlanta), Tyson Clabo (Atlanta, Denver and San Diego), Blake Lingruen (Detroit) and Steve Vallos (Seattle). Justice was a sixth round pick of the Indianapolis Colts in 2008.

Justice had one of the most remarkable seasons of any Deacon blocker. Along with being the runner-up for the Rimington Trophy, he earned the ACC's Jacobs Blocking Trophy, was a consensus All-America selection as well as a first team All-ACC performer.

Lobotzke was named coordinator in February of 2003 following the departure of Troy Calhoun to the NFL.

Lobotzke came to Wake Forest along with head coach Jim Grobe after serving under Grobe the previous four years at Ohio University.

During Lobotzke's four seasons with Ohio, the offensive line paved the way for four of the top five rushing seasons in school history. The 2000 squad finished the year ranked second nationally in rushing offense (323.0 yards per game), leading the Mid-American Conference in rushing for the fifth straight year, and shattering the school record with 3,553 total rushing yards.

Ohio's national ranking in rushing offense in 2000 marked the fourth straight year the Bobcats finished among the top 10 in Division I-A.

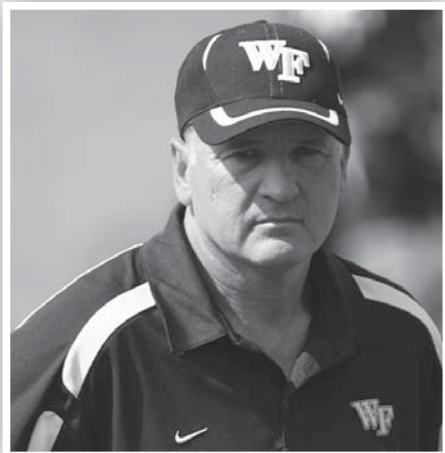
He earned second team All-Western Athletic Conference honors as a junior and was named to the first team as a senior before being invited to play in the East-West Shrine Football Classic.

Tim Billings begins his third year on the coaching staff at Wake Forest and his first season with the defensive backs. Billings oversaw the Wake Forest wide receivers during the 2006 and 2007 seasons.

In his two years with the receivers, Billings' impact was readily apparent in the much-improved Deacon receiving corps. In 2007, he tutored Kenneth Moore who caught a school and ACC record 98 passes. Moore earned first team All-ACC honors and was the MVP of Wake's 24-10 win over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl before being selected in the fifth round of the NFL Draft in 2008.

Upon his arrival in 2006, Billings instilled a hard-nosed mentality among all of his receivers and seniors Willie Idlette and Nate Morton proved to be reliable targets. Both signed NFL contracts following the season.

Billings was responsible for one of the key decisions of Wake Forest's 2006 ACC Championships campaign. It was his selfless idea to move Moore, the team's leading receiver at the time, to tailback following a rash of injuries at that position.



Billings came to the Demon Deacons as a 23-year veteran of college football with experience as a head coach, coordinator and position coach on both sides of the ball.

As an assistant coach at Missouri, Oklahoma and Marshall, Billings was a part of three national championships, five conference titles, six bowl games and six I-AA playoff teams.

Most recently, Billings was the head coach at Southeast Missouri State in Cape Girardeau, Mo. for six years, posting a 25-43 record.

In 2002, Billings guided SEMO to an 8-4 record, which represented the program's best record since 1969.

That season, he was named the Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year and the American Football Coaches Association Region 3 Coach of the Year.

Before taking over at Southeast Missouri, Billings spent 10 seasons as an assistant coach at Marshall from 1990-99 where he coached alongside Brad Lambert and against Jim Grobe and Ohio University in the Mid-American Conference.

During his 10 years in Huntington, Marshall was the winningest program in college football, compiling a record of 114-25.

Billings served as the Thundering Herd's defensive coordinator during his last year in Huntington. In 1999, his final season with Marshall, the Herd completed a 13-0 season and finished the year ranked 10th nationally.

That defense ranked second in Division I in scoring defense, allowing just 10.5 points per game. Marshall's defense also ranked third against the pass, 11th against the rush and seventh in total defense.

The Herd won Mid-American Conference titles in each of Billings' final three seasons at Marshall.

Prior to taking on that responsibility, Billings worked primarily with Thundering Herd special teams. Herd special teams led the nation in kickoff returns in 1991 and in net punting in 1994 and 1996. Randy Moss, now an NFL All-Pro receiver, led the nation in kickoff returns in 1996.

Marshall won the NCAA I-AA national championship in 1991 and 1996.

Billings began his college coaching career as a Missouri graduate assistant under Warren Powers in 1983 and 1984. The 1984 Tigers played in the Holiday Bowl.

He moved on to Oklahoma as an graduate assistant coach under Barry Switzer for the 1985 and 1986 season. The Sooners played in the Orange Bowl in both 1985 and 1986, winning the national championship in 1985.

Billings returned to Missouri for the 1987-89 seasons under Woody Widenhofer.

His 10-year stint at Marshall followed, serving under Jim Donnan for six seasons and Bob Pruett for four seasons.

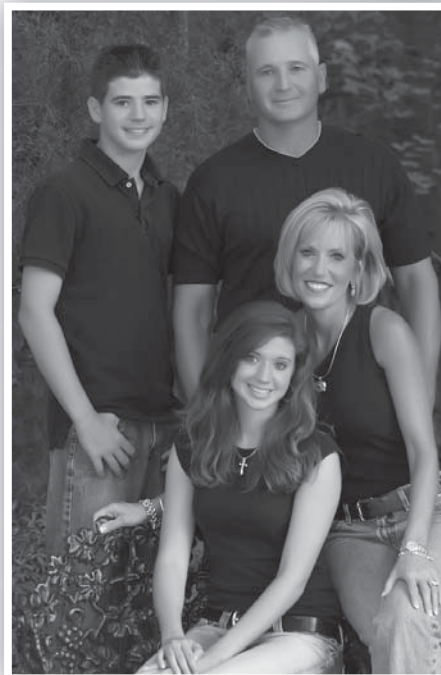

Wake Forest graduate Tom Elrod begins his sixth season as an assistant coach with the Demon Deacons. After five years of overseeing the fullbacks and tight ends, Elrod will mentor the quarterbacks in 2008.

The only Wake Forest graduate on the coaching staff, Elrod first came to Winston-Salem in the fall of 1993 as a quarterback, graduated in 1997 and served as a graduate assistant from 1999-2001.

After a year as the offensive line coach at Wofford, Elrod returned to his alma mater in February 2003.

For the last six years, Elrod has been responsible for the Deacon punt team but will hand-off that duty to Steve Russ in 2008. Wake Forest has had just one punt blocked (vs. Florida State - Oct. 11, 2007) since 2004, a span of 223 total punts.

In 2007, Elrod's tight ends and fullbacks played a vital role in Wake Forest's 9-4 season and victory over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. Tight end John Tereshinski, a free agent signee with the San Diego Chargers following the season, finished his career with 60 receptions, the fifth-

most ever by a Deacon tight end. Elrod's fullbacks opened holes along the offensive line that allowed tailback Josh Adams to rush for 953 yards and earn ACC Freshman of the Year honors.

In 2006, Elrod's punt unit helped the Deacons win the field position battle almost every week. Wake Forest ranked second in the ACC in net punting and ninth nationally.

That season also saw the continued reliability of tight ends Zac Selmon and Tereshinski and fullback Rich Belton and the development of freshman Mike Rinfrette.

Those four players combined for 41 receptions and 437 receiving yards. Belton was the team's top short-yardage threat. He rushed for three touchdowns and carried for 18 first downs.

In 2005, Elrod was instrumental in the development of two young position groups. The young quartet of Belton, a freshman; Damon McWhite, a junior; and sophomores Selmon and Tereshinski combined for 29 percent of the team's receiving touchdowns and 23 percent of the team's receptions.

On the ground, the Deacon offense led the ACC in rushing, averaging 197 yards per game.

Elrod's punt coverage unit led the nation in punting average (47.0) and net punting (41.4).

When McWhite went down with a season-ending knee injury in 2004, Elrod helped successfully convert former offensive lineman Dan Callahan to the position.

In his first season as an assistant coach at Wake Forest in 2003, Elrod's punt coverage unit ranked second in the ACC with a net average of 38.3. Fullback Nick Burney ranked fourth on the team with four rushing touchdowns.

In 2002, Elrod helped guide the Wofford Terriers to a 9-3 record and second-place finish in the Southern Conference. Wofford ranked second nationally in Division I-AA in rushing (342.2 yards per game), and four offensive linemen earned all-conference honors under Elrod's tutelage.

Prior to his stint at Wofford, Elrod spent three seasons as a graduate assistant for the Deacons (1999-2001) while earning his

Entering his eighth season as a Demon Deacon assistant coach is North Carolina native Keith Henry.

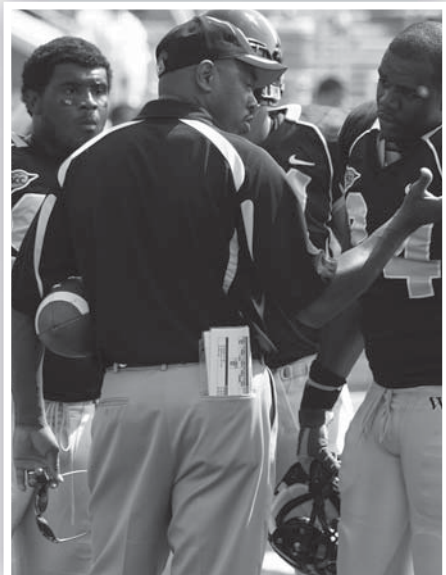
Henry is in his fifth season coaching the defensive ends after coaching the cornerbacks the previous two seasons and guiding the outside linebackers in 2001.

During the 2007 campaign, Henry aided in the development of defensive end Jeremy Thompson. Thompson finished his career with 20.5 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks. He was the first Deacon taken in the 2008 NFL Draft, selected by the Green Bay Packers with the third pick in the fourth round.

Henry also helped mold end Matt Robinson, the winner of the Atlantic Coast Conference's Brian Piccolo Award. Robinson overcame numerous knee and ankle injuries to become a stalwart along the Deacon defensive front. He was granted a sixth year of eligibility and will return for the 2008 season.

Two of Henry's 2006 seniors, Bryan Andrews (Cincinnati Bengals) and Jyles Tucker (San Diego Chargers) signed NFL contracts following the FedEx Orange Bowl. Tucker earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week award with the Chargers in 2007.

In 2006, Henry had a blend of young and veteran talent that combined for 19.5 tackles for loss and 13 sacks. Henry's group was a key reason that Wake Forest allowed



just 105.8 rushing yards per game, the third-best mark in Wake Forest history.

In 2005, Henry tutored a young, but talented group of defensive ends, headlined by sophomore starters Robinson and Thompson and supported by Andrews, a junior, and freshmen Anthony Davis and Antonio Wilson.

Despite their youth and relative inexperience, they helped Wake Forest limit opposing rushing attacks to just 133.5 yards per game. That equaled the fourth-best rushing defense in Wake Forest history.

Henry initially served as Wake Forest's cornerbacks coach. Wake Forest's starting cornerbacks in 2002, Eric King and Daryl Shaw, were responsible for 10 of the Deacons' 33 opponent takeaways, including three interceptions apiece. In 2003, King earned first-team All-ACC honors and was voted WFU's team MVP.

Prior to coming to WFU, Henry spent six seasons working with Jim Grobe at Ohio University, where he served as outside linebackers coach for four seasons (1997-2000) and receivers coach for two years (1995-96). During his stint in Athens, he guided several Bobcat players to postseason honors, as linebacker Matt Weikert earned second team All-MAC recognition in 2000 after leading Ohio in tackles for loss (16) and sacks. In 1998, Rahim Slaise was a first-team All-MAC selection and Leigh Barbour earned second-team honors. The previous season, Andre Jackson was a second-team All-MAC honoree under Henry's tutelage.

Prior to Ohio, Henry worked for three years at nearby North Carolina A&T in Greensboro, coaching linebackers, receivers and defensive backs for the Aggie football team in addition to serving as head coach of the baseball squad. In his second year as baseball coach, North Carolina A&T won the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference tournament, and Henry was named the league's Coach of the Year.

Henry spent the 1991 campaign as the defensive backs coach at Charleston Southern University, after serving as a graduate assistant for one and a half years at Gardner-Webb in Boiling Springs, N.C.

Henry entered the coaching ranks on the high school level, coaching the defensive backs at Bandys (NC) High School in 1989.

Henry also played professionally for two seasons in the Arena League, with the Albany Firebirds during the 1990 season and the Charlotte Rage in 1991.

Henry enjoyed a stellar collegiate career as a free safety at Catawba, earning All-America honors three-times and making four appearances on the All-South Atlantic Conference first team.

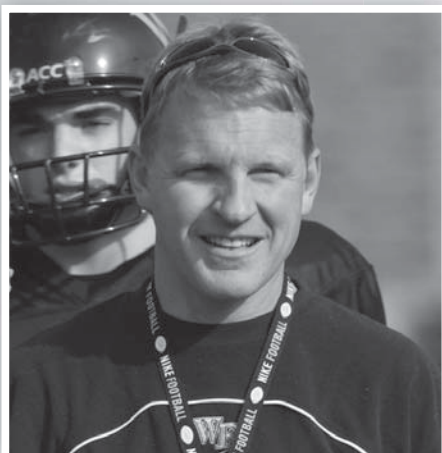
He tied the school record with 20 interceptions and set a Catawba mark with 398 total tackles.

Brian Knorr, who has previously coached alongside Jim Grobe for nine years, will begin his first season at Wake Forest in 2008.

Knorr joined the Demon Deacon staff after working for the past three years at the Air Force Academy where he worked with the strong safeties and outside linebackers in 2005 and 2006 while tutoring the inside linebackers in 2007.

"We're delighted to have Brian Knorr and his family join us at Wake Forest," said Grobe. "He has great experience as a coach and as a recruiter. His background should make for a very smooth transition."

Knorr will coach the Demon Deacon wide receivers. He will work with a group that includes returning lettermen Chip Brinkman, D.J. Boldin and Jordan Williams. The group will try to fill the void left by the graduation of Kenneth Moore, a fifth round draft choice of the Detroit Lions in 2008. Moore set the school and ACC record with 98 receptions in 2007.

Knorr, a 1986 graduate of the Air Force Academy with a degree in management, was a three-year letterman at quarterback for the Falcons. Air Force won 30 games during his three varsity years, marking the most successful three-year run in school history.

Following graduation, Knorr served his tour of duty in the Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio, where he earned his master's in business administration

from the University of Dayton in 1991. He returned to the Academy as a captain in 1992 where he joined the coaching staff as the assistant offensive line coach, junior varsity head coach and administrative assistant to the head coach.

Knorr left the Academy in 1995 to join Grobe and become the inside linebackers coach at Ohio University, where he led Ohio's resurgence on the defensive front. While at Ohio, the Bobcat defense was ranked in the top five in the Mid-American Conference in scoring, rushing and total defense each year. The 2000 Ohio defense was one of only five squads in the nation to hold opponents to less than 30 points in every contest. Knorr tutored five different players that earned first team all-conference honors. In 1999, Grobe promoted Knorr to defensive coordinator.

In 2000, Knorr became the first Air Force Academy graduate to become a head football coach at the Division I level when he was named to succeed Grobe as head coach at Ohio. During Knorr's tenure as head coach, he coordinated the special teams to include a punt team that led the NCAA in punting in 2001. Ohio's punter, Dave Zastudil, earned All-America honors and went on to play with the Cleveland Browns. Knorr also coached seven players who would eventually play in the National Football League.

The Bobcats were 11-35 during Knorr's four seasons as head coach, including a 4-7 mark with a win at Kentucky in 2004.

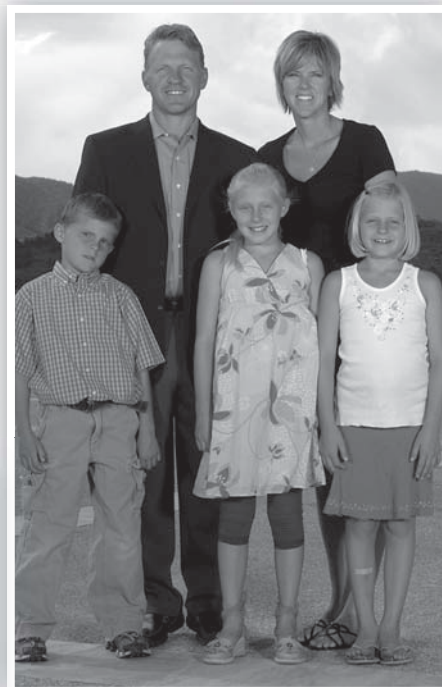

During his nine years at Ohio, as both an assistant and head coach, the Bobcat defense posted the top eight team season totals in tackles for loss in school history.

After four seasons at Ohio, Knorr returned to the Air Force Academy where he coached under Fisher DeBerry in 2005-06 and Troy Calhoun in 2007. In 2005, Knorr was nominated by the Academy for the NCAA Assistant Coach of the Year award.

Knorr was born on Dec. 20, 1963 and is a native of Shawnee Mission, Kan. He and his wife Julie, a native of Fort Wayne, Ind., have a daughter Katie and twins Reagan and Brett.

RECRUITING COORDINATOR DEFENSIVE TACKLES

Ray McCartney begins his eighth season at Wake Forest and his 14th year alongside head coach Jim Grobe. McCartney is Wake Forest's recruiting coordinator and defensive tackles coach.

In 2007, McCartney's defensive tackles were the first line of defense for a unit that allowed just 109.4 rushing yards per game, the fourth-best mark in Wake Forest history. Only one opposing player was able to rush for 100 yards against the Deacons.

The starters on that front line were senior Zach Stukes, and sophomores Boo Robinson and John Russell. Robinson and Russell each return in 2008.

In 2006, McCartney's defensive front helped the Deacons hold opponents to just 105.8 yards per game and four 100-yard rushers. In 2005, the defensive tackles helped limit opponents to just 133.5 yards per game.

Prior to the 2004 season, the Deacons shifted from a 3-3-5 defensive alignment to a more traditional 4-3. At the same time, McCartney narrowed his focus to tackles after coaching the entire line for three years.

The results were a success as the Deacs allowed fewer rushing yards, passing yards and total points than in the previous season despite operating with a youthful defensive line.

In 2003, McCartney met the challenge of building a new defensive line. With all three starters graduating off the 2002 Seattle Bowl squad, Jerome Nichols emerged as an up-and-coming all-star candidate as a junior, leading Wake Forest in tackles for loss (11).

In 2002, Calvin Pace broke the school record for career tackles for loss and was named a first team All-American, WFU's first such honoree in 10 seasons. He was also named

the ACC Defensive Player of the Year by The Sporting News.

McCartney coached Montique Sharpe to honorable mention all-conference honors in 2002.

In 2001, two of McCartney's three starting defensive linemen were named to the All-ACC team — senior defensive end Nate Bolling and Pace.

Seven of the graduates McCartney has coached since coming to Wake Forest have signed NFL contracts. Pace was a first-round draft selection (18th overall pick) of Arizona, Sharpe played for Kansas City, Bolling has spent time with the Baltimore Ravens and in NFL Europe, Nichols signed with Washington and Roderick Stephen was with the St. Louis Rams.

McCartney is well-known for his tireless recruiting efforts. Evidence of his work has already been realized, as McCartney has spearheaded the staff's recruiting efforts in the last seven signing classes.

Wake's 2008 recruiting class consisted of 17 prospects including eight from Florida. Wake Forest's 2006 ACC Championship and appearance in the FedEx Orange Bowl have helped to contribute to the Deacons' recruiting success in the Sunshine State. Wake Forest also remains a strong presence in North Carolina, having signed eight natives in the last two years. Greensboro's Kenny Okoro, from Dudley High School, highlighted Wake's signees from the Old North State in 2008.

The Deacons were particularly pleased to sign six in-state players in 2007, all of whom rated highly nationally, including Josh Adams, the 10th-rated running back in the nation; Alex Frye, the 50th-ranked safety; Dennis Godfrey, the 43rd-rated tight end; Tripp Russell, the 88th-ranked defensive end; Marshall Williams, the 142nd-rated wide receiver; and Matt Woodlief, the 41st-best linebacker prospect in America.

Thirteen of the 15 players that Wake Forest signed were ranked in the top 100 at their position by scouting services on a national level. The class was rated 55th nationally by ESPN.com, Wake Forest's best class in recent memory.

In 2005, Wake Forest inked 22 prep standouts including top in-state products Chris DeGeare, Brandon Ghee, Dominique Midgett and Mike Rinfrette, all of whom were ranked among the state's top 25 players.

In 2004, McCartney helped sign Jeremy Thompson from Charlotte who was a fourth round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers four years later. The Deacons also signed four of the top players out of Florida including Stanley Arnoux of Glades Day High School and a trio of players from Pahokee: D.J. Boldin, Alphonso Smith and Antonio Wilson.

McCartney served as Ohio's recruiting coordinator for six seasons and coached the outside linebackers for two years and the defensive line for four.

At BSU, McCartney helped guide the Cardinals to two MAC titles and two bowl appearances. At BGSU, McCartney helped the 1985 Falcons to an undefeated season (11-0), the MAC championship and the California Bowl.

McCartney also coached at Wittenberg (OH) University for three years. He helped the Tigers win a conference crown in 1988 and advance to the second round of the Division III national playoffs.

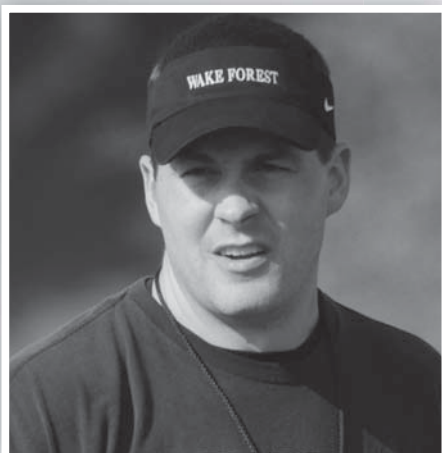

Steve Russ will begin his first season on the Wake Forest staff as the tight ends and fullbacks coach. He replaces Tom Elrod who moved over to coach the quarterbacks this season.

Russ, like all of Wake Forest's coaching staff, has a long history with Jim Grobe. Russ was an All-Western Athletic Conference linebacker for Grobe at the Air Force Academy in 1994 and helped lead the Falcons to a pair of Liberty Bowl appearances, including a 38-15 win over Mississippi State in the 1991 Liberty Bowl.

While playing at Air Force, Russ earned second team All-WAC honors in 1994 and was selected to play in both the Blue-Gray All-Star game and the East-West Shrine game following his senior season. The recipient of the Air Force's Brian Bullard Award in 1994, Russ was a seventh round draft pick of the Denver Broncos in the 1995 National Football League Draft.

Russ spent four seasons with the Broncos and was a part of Denver's 1997 and 1998 Super Bowl Championship teams. Under the direction of head coach Mike Shanahan and defensive coordinator Greg Robinson, the Broncos' defense was spectacular during the 1998 playoffs. Denver shut out

the Miami Dolphins and held the New York Jets to a single touchdown before shutting out the Atlanta Falcons for three quarters in Super Bowl XXXIII.

Russ began his coaching career in 1995 as a graduate assistant strength coach at the Air Force Academy before leaving for training camp with the Broncos.

He returned to coaching in 2001, joining the staff at Ohio University as the outside linebackers coach. Brian Knorr was serving as Ohio's head coach at the time. Russ became the inside linebackers coach in 2001 and added the responsibility of coordinating special teams in 2004.

While with the Bobcats, Russ coached linebacker Matt Muncy who would go on to earn All-Mid-American Conference honors as a senior. The Bobcat defense ranked 22nd in the nation in total defense in 2004 and led the Mid-American Conference in net punting, kickoff coverage and pass defense that year.

Russ became the linebackers coach at Syracuse in 2005, re-joining head coach Greg Robinson who had served as Russ' defensive coordinator with the Broncos.

The Orange led the Big East in net punting in both 2005 and in 2006. Syracuse tied for 22nd in the nation in turnovers

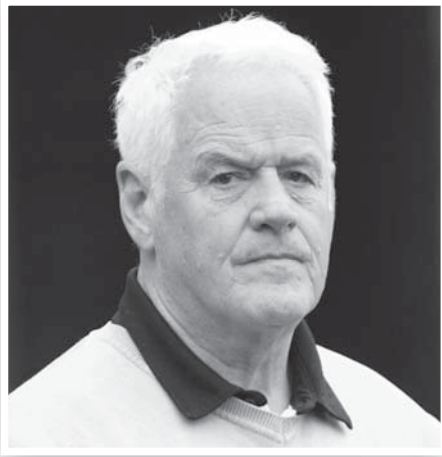

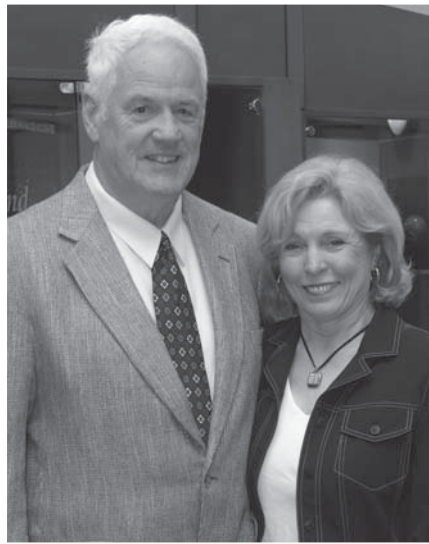

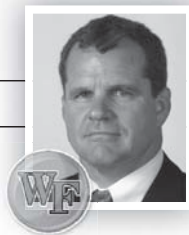

Dr. Nathan O. Hatch is in his fourth year as president of Wake Forest University. A nationally respected historian, Dr. Hatch was provost of the University of Notre Dame when he was selected as Wake Forest's 13th president in 2005.

His first three years have been characterized by an intense period of getting to know Wake Forest: its faculty, students and alumni, which has helped to frame a set of impressions, as well as identify both opportunities and challenges. In the past year he has initiated a comprehensive strategic planning process to guide Wake Forest's future. The planning process, which is expected to be completed this fall, encompasses all schools and departments on the Reynolda Campus.

"This is an exciting time for Wake Forest," he says. "Our new plan will build upon existing strengths and identify areas where we need to improve, through defining strategies, setting priorities, and developing tactics to reach our goals. We have a rare opportunity to integrate an undergraduate liberal arts tradition with the vitality of a research university."

Throughout his academic career, Dr. Hatch has been drawn to challenges that involve people and building organizations. "I am thoroughly an academic and have cherished administrative work not as different than teaching and scholarship but as an opportunity to build an organization in which academic life can flourish," he says.

"Although I had been at Notre Dame a long time, I had never been satisfied going around the same track too many times. I spent a considerable number of years in teaching and scholarship. Then I turned my attention to helping build a liberal arts college and then advancing graduate education and research. Finally, I oversaw the entire academic enterprise for nine years as provost. In each of these tasks, I had a set of defined challenges that I could throw myself into fulfilling. I wanted the organization to improve in noticeable ways and to think strategically and move from one point to another."

Since coming to Wake Forest, Dr. Hatch has created a Presidential Trust for Faculty Excellence to support faculty professorships and research. Building a community of faculty and students and sustaining the teacher-scholar ideal must remain the University's highest priorities, he says.

Often described as affable, approachable and a lively conversationalist, Dr. Hatch has established a strong rapport with students. He made an early impression when he arrived at his student-sponsored Inaugural Ball on the back of a motorcycle driven by the Demon Deacon.

He and his wife, Julie, a former public school teacher, have three children: Gregg, a 1997 graduate of Notre Dame,

is a hospital administrator in Seattle, WA; David, a 2000 Notre Dame graduate, received an MBA degree from Duke University in 2007 and is working in Charlotte, NC; and Beth is a 2007 graduate of Notre Dame. The Hatches also have two grandchildren.

Dr. Hatch grew up in Columbia, S.C., where his father was a Presbyterian minister. A graduate of Wheaton College in Illinois, he received his master's and doctoral degrees from Washington University in St. Louis and held post-doctoral fellowships at Harvard and Johns Hopkins universities. He joined the faculty at Notre Dame in 1975 and was named director of graduate programs in history in 1980.

Over the next twenty-five years, he amassed a strong record of directing undergraduate, graduate and professional programs at Notre Dame. He served as associate dean of the College of Arts and Letters from 1983 until 1988 and then acting dean for one year. He was appointed vice president for graduate studies and research in 1989. He was named provost, the university's second highest-ranking position, in 1996; a Presbyterian, he was the first Protestant to ever serve in that position at Notre Dame. He also held an appointment as the Andrew V. Tackes Professor of History.

He is regularly cited as one of the most influential scholars in the study of the history of religion in America. He received national acclaim for his 1989 book, "The Democratization of American Christianity," in which he examines how the rise of religious groups in the early 19th century helped shape American culture and foster democracy. The book was chosen in a survey of 2,000 historians and sociologists as one of the two most important books in the study of American religion. He is also the author or editor of seven other books on religion.

From 2000 to 2006, he served on the National Council on the Humanities, the advisory board for the National Endowment for the Humanities. He currently is on the board of directors of the American Council on Education and is chair of the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification. He is also a member of the Business Higher Education Forum and a trustee of the Fuller Theological Seminary.

Dr. Hatch was named president of Wake Forest in January 2005 and took office on July 1, 2005, succeeding Thomas K. Hearn Jr., who retired after serving as president for 22 years.

Dr. Richard Carmichael was appointed Wake Forest's Faculty Athletic representative in July of 2003. He succeeded Dr. Ed Wilson, who retired following over 50 years of service to the school, including 15 seasons as the Faculty Athletic Representative.

Dr. Carmichael brings longtime Wake Forest ties to the post as well. A 1964 graduate of the University with a degree in mathematics, he was previously Chair of the Department of Mathematics, a post he held from 1988 until 2005.

Born March 13, 1942 in High Point, N.C., Carmichael graduated from High Point High in 1960 and attended Wake Forest on a basketball scholarship. Playing under legendary coach Bones McKinney, Carmichael helped the Demon Deacons reach the Final Four in 1962, the only Wake Forest team to ever do so. Carmichael played three seasons, from 1962-64, accumulating 584 career points and 340 rebounds.

After graduating from Wake Forest, Carmichael went to graduate school at Duke University, where he received his master's degree in 1966 and his Ph.D. in mathematics

in 1968. From there Carmichael took his first job as an assistant professor, teaching mathematics at Virginia Tech. In 1971, after three years in Blacksburg, Carmichael returned to his alma mater and is now professor of mathematics.

Carmichael has held visiting positions at UC-Davis, Iowa State and New Mexico State throughout his career and has earned appointed or elected professional positions in the Mathematical Association of America and the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics. He has served on numerous committees at Wake Forest. Carmichael has also published numerous mathematical works, including two books.

Carmichael is currently a member of the NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Awards, Benefits and Financial Aid Cabinet.

An avid sports fan and devout follower of Demon Deacon athletics, Carmichael also enjoys helping the Wake Forest athletic media relations department in keeping statistics at home football and basketball games -- a service he has provided since 1980.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

16th Year
Bowling Green, 1970

Ron Wellman, who has elevated Wake Forest athletics to its highest level ever and is committed to preparing the program for even greater success in the future, is in his 16th year as director of athletics.

Wellman, who was named athletic director in October of 1992, is only the fifth man to assume the top position in the athletic department at Wake Forest during the modern era of intercollegiate sports, following Pat Preston, Jim Weaver, Bill Gibson and Dr. Gene Hooks, Wake Forest's athletic director from 1964 through 1992.

Since taking control of Wake Forest Athletics, Wellman has seen Demon Deacon athletic teams rise to national prominence in several sports while perennially competing for ACC championships. Wake's success in recent years has epitomized how Deacon teams are competing on a national level across the athletics board.

Wellman's efforts in leading this rise to prominence have not gone unnoticed. In 2007-08, Wellman was honored by two organizations. Street & Smith's SportsBusiness Journal named him College Athletic Director of the Year. The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) selected Wellman as its AstroTurf AD of the Year for the Southeast Region.

In 2007-08, Wellman guided WFU through an especially trying, yet rewarding, year. His leadership ability was never more evident than in the days following the passing of head basketball coach Skip Prosser in July, 2007. It was Wellman's ability to bring together a grieving athletic department that helped the Deacons continue to move forward.

Through the hiring of Dino Gaudio as Prosser's successor, to overseeing a 9-4 football season and Wake's Meineke Car Care Bowl victory over Connecticut to the men's soccer program's first-ever national championship, Wellman was consistently at the forefront of Wake Forest's success over the last year.

In the fall of 2007, the Wake Forest men's soccer team defeated Ohio State in the College Cup to win its first national championship. The football team is in the midst of its most successful stretch in school history, winning 20 games over the past two seasons and earning a pair of bowl bids which includes a 24-10 win over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl in 2007.

The Deacon field hockey team made its eighth consecutive appearance in the Final Four, while the women's soccer team earned an NCAA Tournament bid for the 12th consecutive season. Both the men's and women's tennis teams made the NCAA Tournament to highlight Wake Forest's spring season.

Last year's accomplishments come on the heels of unprecedented success across the board in 2006-07. Wake Forest finished 23rd in the NACDA Director's Cup, the highest finish ever for the Deacons.

Off the playing fields, Wellman has spearheaded an effort to enhance the overall development of the student-athlete. He asks his coaches to stress academics and he has instituted programs to assist and develop student-athletes away from competition such as the annual Academic Excellence

Banquet, a campus-wide affair which honors those student-athletes who have achieved in the classroom.

Another obvious sign of the progress Wake Forest has made — and is continuing to make — under Wellman's leadership is the ambitious facility improvement program that the athletic department has undertaken.

The football stadium, BB&T Field, continues to receive multiple phases of cosmetic and structural changes. Prior to the start of the 2006 season, a brick façade was added to the interior of the stands, and a new state-of-the-art Field-Turf surface was installed.

In January, 2007, after an aggressive fund-raising campaign, coupled with generous donations of supporters, the 35-plus year-old press box was imploded and construction on the new, spacious Deacon Tower began. Deacon Tower will provide a number of premium seating options, accommodations for the media as well as a main entry point for the stadium when it opens prior to the 2008 season.

The dean of all ACC athletic directors, Wellman has taken an active role on the national level. Wellman previously served on the NCAA Division I Management Council and served as chairman in 2005-06. Recently he served as chairman of the NCAA Baseball Committee and directed the implementation of a new and expanded national tournament format, creating significant interest in that event. Wellman also serves as president of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

He is also a member of the NCAA Diversity Leadership Strategic Planning Committee and chairs the NCAA Baseball Academic Enhancement Committee. Wellman is a on the TriStone Community Bank Board of Directors.

Wellman was honored by NACDA as the AstroTurf AD of the Year for the Southeast Region in 2002-03.

Born in Celina, Ohio, he earned his undergraduate degree from Bowling Green State University, where he was a pitcher on the baseball team.

After receiving a master's from Bowling Green, he joined the faculty and coaching staff at Elmhurst (IL) College in 1971, serving as head baseball coach, assistant basketball and football coach and associate professor of health and physical education.

He compiled a 210-136 record as head baseball coach before leaving to become the head baseball coach at Northwestern. In five seasons with the Wildcats, Wellman's teams posted a 180-97 record and 15 players signed professional contracts. Among those moving to the Major Leagues was Joe Girardi, an Academic All-America catcher who became the manager of the New York Yankees in 2007.

Wellman and his wife Linda have three daughters — Angie, who works for ING and is married to Tim Lynde, a WFU alumnus and former basketball manager who is with International Sports Properties in Winston-Salem; Nicole, a pediatrician, and her husband, a former captain of WFU's men's soccer team Kevin Rice, who live in Winston-Salem; and Melissa, a teacher, and her husband, Ben Norman, who live in Greensboro. There are seven Wake Forest degrees between the Wellman's daughters and their husbands.

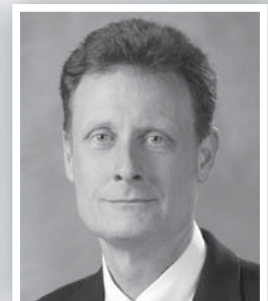

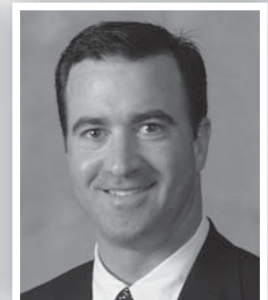
