JUSTIFICATION: It is the judicial act of God, by which he pardons <u>all the sins</u> of those who believe in Christ, and accepts them as <u>righteous</u> in the eyes of the law.

- The act of justification is to be viewed not primarily in terms of <u>Law</u> but in terms of <u>covenant</u>.
- The essential argument of Paul in Galatians is that justification has from the <u>time of Abraham</u> been <u>through</u> <u>faith</u> in the God who keeps His covenant (and never by the Law). Genesis 15:6
- Justification is an <u>instantaneous legal act</u> of God in which he thinks of our sins as <u>forgiven</u> and as Christ's righteousness <u>belonging</u> to us. Romans 8:1-4

Why Justification Matters

- 1. Justification is something completely <u>undeserved</u>. It is not an <u>achievement</u>.
- 2. God declares that we have no penalty to pay for sin in the <u>past</u>, <u>present</u>, <u>or future</u>.
- 3. God's act of justification does not change according to our experiences or actions. It's <u>immutable</u>.
- 4. We are justified because of God's <u>unmerited favor His</u> grace.
