Loved to the End John 13:1-38

It was just before the Passover Festival. Jesus knew that the hour had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ² The evening meal was in progress, and the devil had already prompted Judas, the son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus. ³ Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; ⁴ so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. ⁵ After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him - John 13:1-5

TALK IT OVER

What stood out most in the message to you regarding something that you learned, challenged you, or that you disagreed with? And, in what ways can you see these truths being lived out in your relationships and life this week?

Reread John 13:1. Before you discuss any further, what is impactful to you about focusing on John's description of Jesus: "he loved them to the end (eis telos)"?

Read through all of John 13, noting some personal observations from the chapter. Share at least one with the group.

Reflect on Jesus' extreme demonstration of servitude. What strikes you about this foot-washing scene? Have you ever participated in a foot-washing ceremony? If so, what was that like for you? If not, would you be open to participating in one after seeing John 13?

Consider both Peter and Judas here. Are there ways that you can identify with either of them? What questions or additional thoughts do you have about what transpired for them?

In what ways have you struggled to comprehend, receive, or live in response to Christ's love?

Reread John 13:34-35. Why do you think Jesus called it a new commandment? In what ways do modern followers of Jesus struggle with this commandment?

Where do you see Christ calling/inviting you to participate in his mission?
