The 2025 Common Senses Festival was an incredible celebration of connection, inclusion, and creativity, which included:

35 Days **52** Events
Over 8,996 Attendees **28** Partners

Across 2022 and 2025, the festivals opened up new space for collaboration and conversation, drawing the Omaha community closer to the individuals and families whose lives are shaped by disability.

What began in 2022, grew stronger in 2025. With firmer infrastructure and a commitment that now runs year-round, the festival set its sights further: to root the arts in accessibility, to build lasting partnerships with local artists, and to keep its programming responsive to the community it serves. This year, we aim to carry that work further: strengthening the bonds within our community and affirming that every way of experiencing the world has a place here.

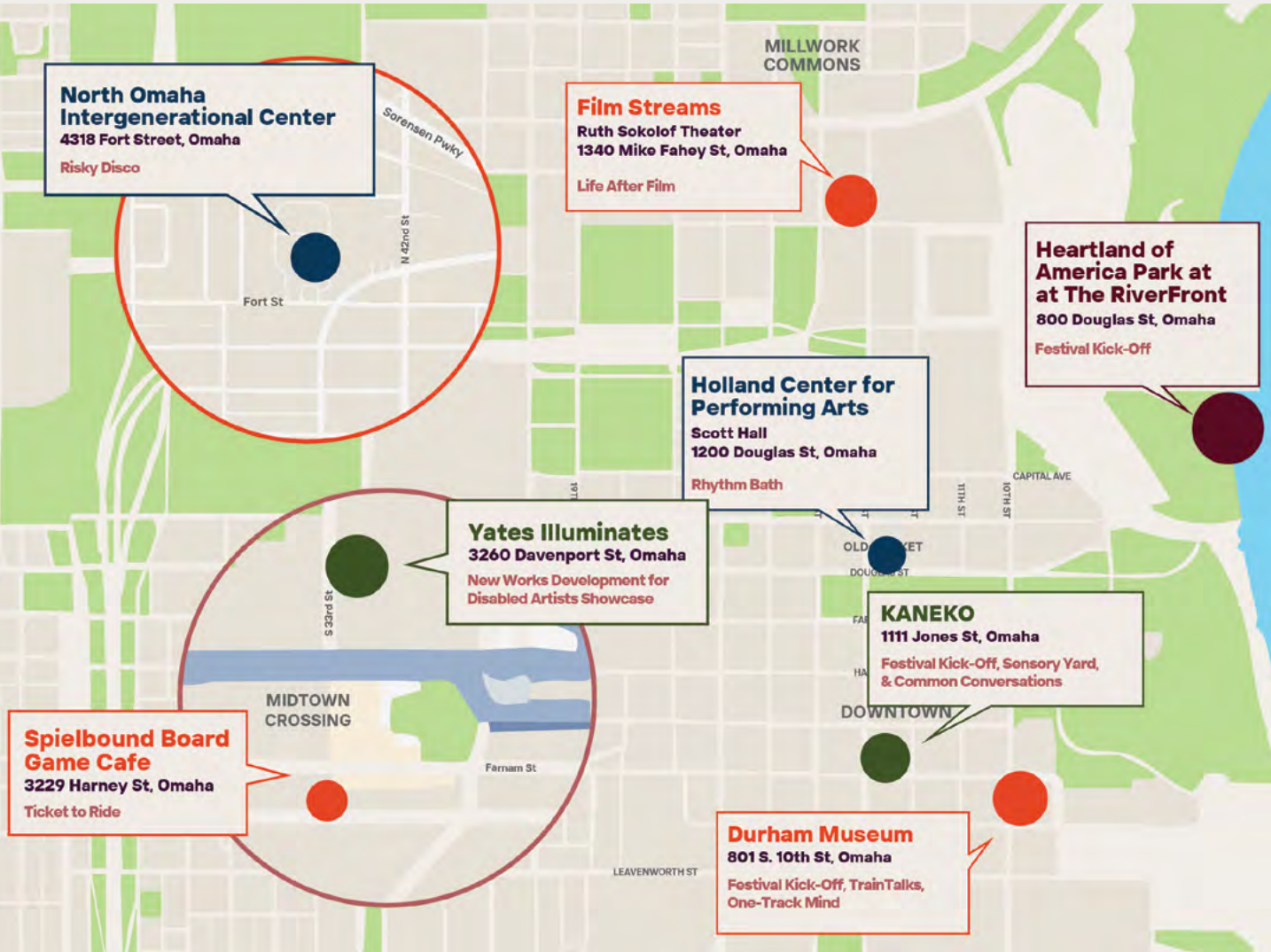
Last year showed what happens when every voice is taken seriously. This year, we go further; a festival, and a community, where everyone is valued for exactly who they are.

Festival Tracks

Performing Arts

Common Senses 2026’s headliner, **Rhythm Bath**, makes its Omaha premiere at the **Holland Center**, presented in partnership with **Omaha Performing Arts**. Created by choreographer **Susan Marshall** and Tony Award-winning set designer **Mimi Lien**, this innovative dance-installation offers a paradigm shift in theater-going. Back by popular demand after selling out every performance in 2025, **Risky Disco** returns with **Risky Disco on Wheels**, built around this year’s theme of movement.

Science

This year’s Science offering explores what becomes possible when innovation begins with access. **The Sensory Yard** blends art, accessibility, and occupational therapy in a groundbreaking modular installation at the **KANEKO**, where audiences will journey through a series of thoughtfully designed sensory spaces.

Film

Once again partnering with **Film Streams**, Common Senses will present films featuring themes and artists connected to the 2026 festival programming. This year’s lineup includes **Life After**, the Sundance-winning documentary from disabled filmmaker **Reid Davenport**. The film will feature a select screening followed by a panel discussion for the keynote film, inviting audience members to interact with the film’s creators.

Common Conversations

Common Conversations, the discourse arm of Common Senses, includes the festival’s keynote address, which will be delivered by **Alex Green**, author of **A Perfect Turmoil: Walter E. Fernald and the Struggle to Care for America’s Disabled**. Common Conversations also features a panel discussion with leaders of **MASS Design Group**. As part of the 2026 festival, they will workshop their new endeavor, the **Monument Project**: imagining, and ultimately creating, a national monument recognizing the lives lost at state-run institutions in the United States.

Preferred Interests

In partnership with the **Durham Museum**, Common Senses will invite train enthusiasts to experience various aspects of trains, including engines, schedules, and model trains. Celebrated autistic photographer **Blair Bunting** will showcase his train photography and speak about his two preferred interests: trains and photography.

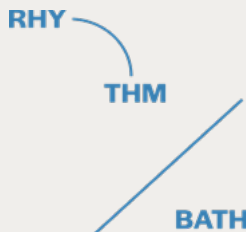

Rhythm Bath

Description

This dance-installation offers a paradigm shift in theater-going, in which the audience is free to roam right through the dance. Enter a transporting space of rhythmic music and movement, floating fabric, and glimmering light, where there is no “right” way to be. Sit, lounge, stand, walk, roll on wheeled chairs—move as you need to, come and go as you please. Experience being in the midst of movement happening all around you as the dancing adjusts to wherever you are.

Rhythm Bath by Studio Susan Marshall is what it sounds like: a chance to be surrounded by rhythm—visual, aural, and kinesthetic. Our brains are wired to entrain with rhythm, and to link to others’ movements through a neurological process called interpersonal synchrony. Over the course of Rhythm Bath, the movement and music shifts from a pulsing, almost dance party rhythm to one of oceanic calm. Viewers can relax and soak it in quietly, or follow the action and be energized by the surrounding movement.

Susan Marshall *Choreographer*

Choreographer Susan Marshall has collaborated with visual artists, scientists, composers, and music ensembles on theater productions and gallery installations. As the parent of a son with autism and as a member of a community of families of neurodiverse individuals, Marshall is excited by the increasing access for viewers and participants in the arts and is pleased to be a part of this movement to expand access to cultural events. Among other honors, Marshall is the recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship, Guggenheim Fellowship, and New York Dance and Performance “Bessie” Awards. Her company has performed around the world, and her work is in the repertoire of major dance companies. Marshall is a professor and the Director of Dance at Princeton University.



Mimi Lien *Set Designer*

Mimi Lien is a designer of sets/environments for theater, dance, and opera. Selected work includes *Natasha, Pierre and The Great Comet of 1812* (Broadway, Tony Award), *Sweeney Todd* (Broadway), *Antony & Cleopatra* and *Grounded* (Metropolitan Opera), *Parsifal* (Bayreuther Festspiele). Her large-scale public installations include *The GREEN* (Lincoln Center), *PARADE* (The Bentway, Toronto), and *MODEL HOME* (Without Walls Festival, San Diego). Mimi is a recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship, TONY Award, Drama Desk, Lucille Lortel, Outer Critics Circle, American Theatre Wing Hewes Design Award, OBIE Award for sustained excellence. Mimi is a co-founder of the Brooklyn performance space, JACK.



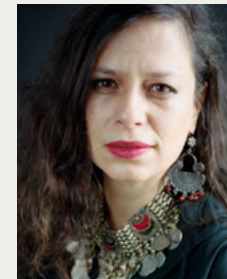
Jeanette Oi-Suk Yew *Lighting Designer*

Jeanette Oi-Suk Yew is an award-winning designer for theater, dance, opera, musicals, music performances, and large-scale immersive installations. The New York Times has described her designs as “clever” and “inventive,” and her dance work as having the “vibrant richness of a Caravaggio painted in neon.” Recent dance credits include *Rhythm Bath* with Susan Marshall, *The March* with Tendayi Kuumba, *Annie-B Parson*, and *Donna Uchizono*, *Wicked Bodies* with Liz Lerman, and *Chasing Magic* with Ayodele Casel. She was Company XIV’s lighting designer from 2014 to 2019. Jeanette is a 2026 USA Fellow and Arts Professor and Head of Lighting Design Training at NYU Tisch Drama.



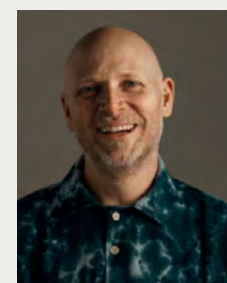
Christopher Wong *Lighting Assistant*

Her designs have been seen at BAM, Public Theater, LCT3, Signature Theater, Playwrights Horizons, Soho Rep, The Kitchen, The Joyce Theater, Arena Stage, Hartford Stage, Wilma Theater, Detroit Opera, The Industry LA; Alice Tully Hall/ Lincoln Center; Minnesota Opera; Glimmerglass Festival; Portland Opera; Pittsburgh Opera; Prototype NY; National Sawdust; REDCAT; BAM; Wolf Trap Opera; NY Philharmonic; and internationally. Botez teaches at David Geffen School of Drama at Yale.



Jason Treuting *Co-Composer*

A founding member of Sō Percussion, composer/percussionist Jason Treuting has performed worldwide. His compositions, noted for their compelling rhythmic language and evocative expressivity, have been performed by Shara Nova, the JACK Quartet, TIGUE, Susan Marshall and Company, and others, at the Lincoln Center Festival, the Barbican, Walker Art Center, National Sawdust, Fast Forward Austin, Kadence Arts Boston, Chatterbird, the Brooklyn Academy of Music’s Next Wave Festival and elsewhere. Treuting explores and composes music in collaboration with artists including laptop artist/composer Cenk Ergun; guitarist Grey McMurray; and guitarist/composer Steve Mackey.



Dan Trueman *Co-Composer*

Dan Trueman is a musician: a composer, a fiddler, a collaborator, a teacher, a developer of new instruments. Pervading all of his work is a deep curiosity about the creative process, the relationships between musicians and musical instruments/machines, and a desire to discover new music through these relationships that would be previously unimaginable. Dan’s work has been recognized by fellowships, grants, commissions, and awards from the Guggenheim Foundation, the Barlow Endowment, the Bessies, the American Composers Forum, the MacArthur Foundation, the American Council of Learned Societies, among others. Dan is a Professor and Chair of the Music Department at Princeton.



Tony Crawford *Production Manager*

Tony Crawford is a production manager and technical director in dance and performing arts; select experiences include: Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival (Operations and Production Manager); Cedar Lake Contemporary Ballet (Technical Director); Twyla Tharp Diamond Jubilee Tour (Production Stage Manager); New York City Ballet (Assistant Technical Director); Brooklyn Academy of Music (Production Coordinator). John Flak is a theatre artist with an extensive background in Stage and Production Management. Lila Hurwitz supports artists of all kinds with management, fundraising, communications, and more. Clients include dance artists Susan Marshall, Bebe Miller, Rosy Simas, Kathy Westwater, and others. She is a co-founder of Motion State Arts in Providence, RI, and co-founded Dance Art Group, producers of the Seattle Festival of Dance Improvisation for 18 years. Lisa Sonneborn (she/her) is Director, Media Arts and Culture (MAC) for the Institute on Disabilities, Temple University CEHD. Her work has engaged communities locally, nationally, and internationally in conversations around the lived experience of disability, the preservation of disability history, and cultural access. As MAC director, Lisa leads teams of artists, people with disabilities, and families through the development and implementation of multi-layered cultural programming. Rohan Bhargava *Dancer*

Rohan Bhargava, originally from New Delhi, India, holds his BFA in Dance from NYU Tisch. As Founder & Artistic Director of Rovaco Dance Company, he produces multidisciplinary productions at the intersection of Indianness and queerness. Rohan was awarded a CUNY Dance Initiative Residency from LaGuardia Performing Arts Center in 2017, he received the 2020 Jadin Wong Fellowship in Dance from Asian American Arts Alliance, and he was featured in Dance Magazine's "25 to Watch" in 2021. Rohan currently teaches for Mark Morris Dance Center and Notes in Motion, and he is the Programs Manager for Mare Nostrum Elements' Emerging Choreographer Series.



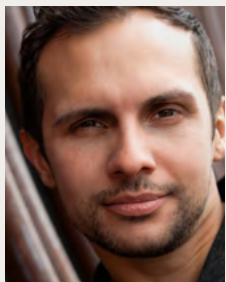
Ching-I Chang *Dancer*

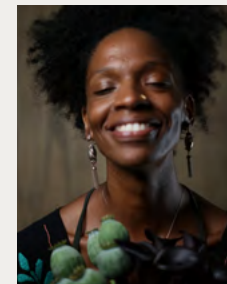
Nico Gonzales *Dancer*

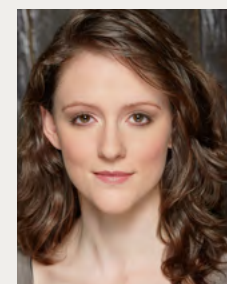
Paul Hamilton *Dancer*

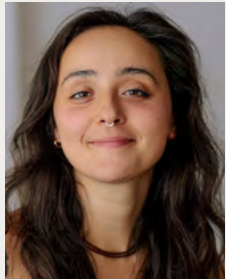
Courtney Henry *Dancer*

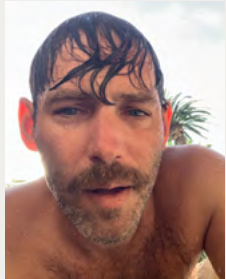
Bryn Elizabeth Luna *Dancer*

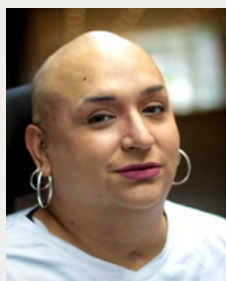
Katy Kepler *Co-Founder*

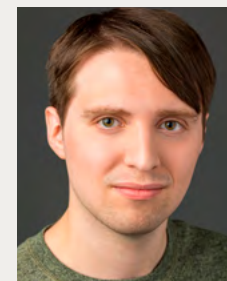
Karma LiLoLa *Teaching Artist*

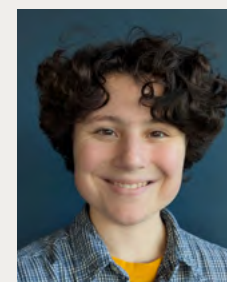
Zoella Sneed *Teaching Artist*

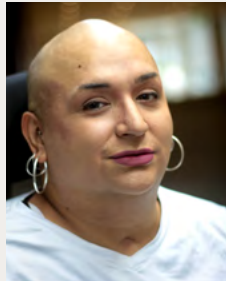

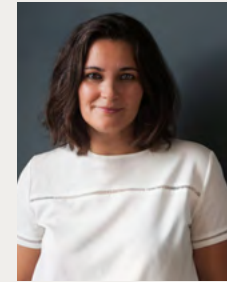
Kevin Lawler *Artistic Director of GPTC/Coach*

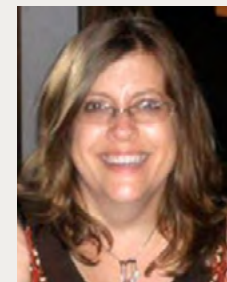
Rachel Adams *Coach*

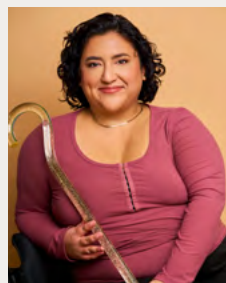
crabrangucci *Coach*

Description

A gripping personal investigation that exposes the tangled web of moral dilemmas and profit motives surrounding assisted dying. In an unfolding matter of life and death, disabled filmmaker Reid Davenport uncovers shocking abuses of power as he amplifies the voices of the disability community and raises the alarm about the “right to die”.

LIFE AFTER brings together the missing voices of the disability community in the ongoing debate about assisted dying. Disabled people continue to face premature death—whether through the horrific case of Michael Hickson, who was left to die by a Texas hospital, or the heart-wrenching choice of Jerika Bolen, a Wisconsin teen who received support from her community to end her life. Davenport’s exploration takes him to Canada, where regulations surrounding Medical Aid in Dying (MAID) have been expanded to allow disabled individuals unprecedented access—even when their deaths are not reasonably foreseeable. In Ontario, Davenport meets Michal Kaliszan, a disabled computer programmer who once considered MAID as his only option to avoid entering an institution.

Reid Davenport Director

Reid makes documentaries about disability from an overtly political perspective. Reid’s first two feature films, *Life After* (2025) and *I Didn’t See You There* (2022), both premiered and won awards at the Sundance Film Festival. *Life After* won a Special Jury Award and *I Didn’t See You There* won the Directing Award. *Life After* was a *New York Times* Critic’s Pick. Richard Brody of *The New Yorker* said *Life After* was “among the most surprising, insightful, moving, and politically far-reaching documentaries I’ve seen in a long while,” while *Variety* called it “engrossing, moving, and most importantly, confrontational.” *Life After* premiered on PBS’s syndicated series *Independent Lens* in November 2025 and currently has a 100% rating on Rotten Tomatoes.

I Didn’t See You There won the True Than Fiction Award at the 2023 Independent Spirit Awards and was nominated for Best Documentary at the 2022 Gotham Awards. It was broadcast nationally on PBS’s syndicated series *POV*. Nick Allen of *Roger Ebert* described *I Didn’t See You There* as “first-person poetry in captivating motion, expressed with a singular, assured artistic voice,” while *Vox* called it a “must-see.”

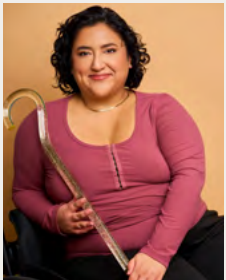
Therman Statum *Speaker*

Therman Statum is a sculptor, glass artist, painter, and arts advocate recognized as a pioneer of the contemporary glass movement. Known for life-size glass ladders, chairs, tables, box-like paintings, and small-scale houses, he joins glass plates with adhesive, transforming sandblasted surfaces into vibrant canvases. His work combines influences from Abstract Expressionism and Minimalism with blown glass and found objects. Born in Winter Haven, Florida, in 1953, Statum grew up in Washington, D.C. After studying ceramics at RISD, an experimental glassblowing session with Dale Chihuly inspired his lifelong commitment to glass. He attended Pilchuck Glass School, earned his BFA from RISD in 1974, and later studied at Pratt Institute. His work has been exhibited internationally and installed in prominent public institutions nationwide.



Erin Lunsford *Speaker*

Erin Lunsford is a visual arts teacher and longtime department chair at Westside High School, where she has taught for 20 years. A 2023 recipient of the Schrager Distinguished Teaching Award, Lunsford is known for her innovative, inclusive and student-centered approach to arts education. She was a critical founder of Westside’s Arts For Me program, empowering students of all abilities to explore and create art. The program has become a model for adaptive art programs nationwide. 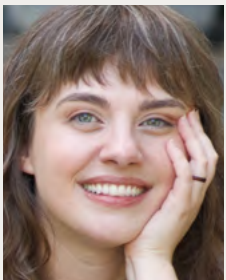

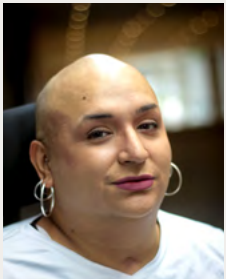

Alex Green *Keynote Speaker*

Alex Green teaches political communications at Harvard Kennedy School and is a visiting fellow at the Harvard Law School Project on Disability and a visiting scholar at Brandeis University Lurie Institute for Disability Policy. He has piloted a nationally recognized disability history curriculum for high school students, developed and taught the first graduate disability policy course offered at the University of Massachusetts Amherst School of Public Policy, and is the author of legislation to create a first-of-its-kind, disability-led human rights commission to investigate the history of state institutions for disabled people in Massachusetts. He lives outside of Boston. *A Perfect Turmoil: Walter E. Fernald and the Struggle to Care for America's Disabled* is his first book.

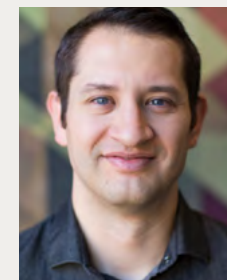
Nicki Pombier *Speaker*

Nicki Pombier is a writer, oral historian, and public artist working at the intersection of disability, language, and place. Her memoir-in-progress, *Mother Tongue*, traces how her son's disabilities refracted her understanding of language, history, and belonging. Across writing, oral history projects, and public history collaborations, she explores voice beyond speech and the intimate politics of care. Nicki's scholarship has been recognized by the Oral History Association and The New School. From 2020–2025, she taught at Columbia University's Oral History Master of Arts program, where she co-developed *Serious Play*, expanding oral history through movement, memory, and performance. She is the founding editor of *Underwater New York* and a longtime collaborator with Temple University's Institute on Disabilities.



Jha D Amazi *Speaker*

Jha D Amazi believes that the narratives upheld in our public realm should be expanded to represent, honor, and celebrate the experiences, histories, and cultures of people who have been historically denied representation in our memorial landscape. As a Principal at MASS, Jha D leads the Public Memory and Memorials Lab, engaging communities to design projects such as the Emmett Till & Mamie Till-Mobley National Monument Project (Chicago, IL), the Gun Violence Memorial Project (Chicago, IL; Washington D.C.; Boston, MA; Detroit, MI), and the Sugar Land 95 Cemetery Revitalization Project (Sugar Land, TX). Beyond her contributions at MASS, Jha D is a spoken word artist, event producer, and SpaceMaker for the LGBTQ+ communities of color. In 2023, she was appointed to the Governor's Advisory Council on Black Empowerment by Massachusetts Governor Maura Healey. Jha D graduated with honors from Northeastern University (B.S. Arch) and the University of Pennsylvania (M. Arch I). Prior to joining MASS, she worked as a Designer at Sasaki and taught studio at the Boston Architectural College.



Jeffery Mansfield *Speaker*

Jeffery's personal journey as a deaf individual since birth has inspired him to create spaces that uplift the lived experience and cultural memory of the Deaf community. Jeffrey is a Principal at MASS, where he leads the Landscape Studio with Sierra Bainbridge. He has contributed to the management and design of commemorative spaces for marginalized communities, including *The Precursors—We Are Texas* East Mall and the Louise B. Miller Pathways and Gardens in Washington, D.C. As the Director of MASS's Deaf Space and Disability Justice Lab, Jeffrey is currently studying the formation of Deaf and Disability spaces as expressions of cultural resistance. Jeffrey received the Ford and Andrew W. Mellon Foundation's Disability Futures fellowship and was a John W. Kluge Fellow at the Library of Congress. He has taught design studios at the University of California Berkeley, the University of Michigan, and the Harvard Graduate School of Design. He co-authored *The Architecture of Health*, which was published by the Cooper Hewitt, Smithsonian Design Museum. Jeffrey holds a Master of Architecture from the Harvard Graduate School of Design and a Bachelor of Architecture from Princeton University.



Regina Chen *Speaker*

Regina Chen sees design as a catalyst for restoration. She brings a multidisciplinary background in architecture, engineering, planning, and research to understand how the built environment can transform the legacies of inequity into opportunities for abundance. At MASS, Regina serves as a Senior Principal and Managing Director of Process and Learning. Since 2013, Regina has fostered a culture of learning and mutuality both at MASS and in the field at large, developing processes that champion accountability and push the bounds of design excellence. Her diverse body of work, spanning community engagement, research, narrative development, and process design, is marked by the capacity for deep listening and for guiding partners towards asking the questions that drive meaningful impact. As the Principal-in-Charge of the Restorative Justice Design Lab and the Gun Violence Memorial Project, Regina maintains a deep commitment to community engagement and creating space for truth-telling, healing, and collective action. Regina studied Civil Engineering and Architecture at Princeton University, and received her Master in Urban Planning from the Harvard Graduate School of Design.



Morgan O'Hara *Speaker*

Morgan O'Hara is a cultural historian of the built environment. She has worked at MASS since 2018, where she supports the Public Memory and Memorials Lab through research, engagement, and interpretation. Her backgrounds in cultural anthropology, public history, and collaborative design have informed her approach to socio-spatial research to develop human-centered histories of built spaces and infrastructure. For the Fringe Cities project, Morgan conducted longitudinal analyses of small cities in the United States that participated in mid-century urban renewal, and while at the Hudson Valley Office, she was embedded in the public engagement work necessary to craft meaningful community design solutions in Poughkeepsie. Her passion lies in elevating creative and community-driven expressions of lesser-known histories in public space. Morgan studied anthropology at Reed College, graduated from Columbia with a Masters in Historic Preservation, and intermittently co-teaches Studio II in Historic Preservation at Columbia GSAPP.

Blair Bunting *Photographer*

Blair Bunting is an American photographer whose work explores portraiture, aviation, the automobile, and the relationship between light and storytelling. Over the past two decades, he has photographed many of the world's most recognizable athletes, celebrities and cultural figures while creating award-winning campaigns for leading brands around the world.

Known for his cinematic approach to lighting, Bunting is the only photographer to have been sponsored by three major camera manufacturers—Nikon, Hasselblad, and Canon. He is also recognized for completing the world's first commercial photo shoot at the edge of space, a project that pushed both the technical and creative boundaries of the medium.

When the pandemic brought commercial productions to a standstill, Bunting turned his attention to the railways of the American West. What began as a way to stay sharp behind the camera evolved into a long-term body of work, using passing trains as an opportunity to study light, weather, timing, and composition with the same discipline he brings to commissioned assignments.

His work has been recognized by Communication Arts, Lürzer's Archive, Graphis, and the William Randolph Hearst Foundation, as well as receiving an Emmy nomination. Whether photographing a world-renowned public figure or a solitary freight train crossing the desert, Bunting's work is united by a fascination with light and the stories it reveals.
