DEAR RANCH SORTERS,

As we make our final push toward the 2026 Cinch RSNC World Finals XIX, the spring run of events has been outstanding across the country. Contestant numbers, payouts, and competition all continue to show the strength and momentum of ranch sorting heading into Fort Worth.

RSNC REGIONALS SPRING RECAP

Northeast Regional Super Sort:

April 17-19

Keystone Horse Center in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania

2026 Payout: \$96,367

Competition was tremendous throughout the weekend. In the US Rider #5 Gold Shootout, Wyatt Erb and Christy Hayes captured the title by sorting 15 head across three rounds in a tough class. Cowboy Mariano and Alyson Oliveira topped the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout, taking home more than \$7,500. The Northeast continues to grow rapidly—we're excited to build toward the Northeast Circuit Finals at Garwood Arena this August.

South Central Regional Super Sort: May 1-3

Extraco Event Center in Waco, Texas

2026 Payout: \$207,553

Even with 1,800 teams, the footing held up exceptionally well, the cattle were outstanding, and the event still wrapped up in time for dinner each night. An even bigger highlight came in the #5 Gold Shootout when David Harbers and Don Lamont made a spectacular short-go run to edge out Dan Spradley and Jax Manuel by one cow in the final run of the show.

North Central Regional Super Sort: May 16-17

The Ranch Events Complex in Loveland, Colorado

2026 Payout: \$78,000

In the #9 Gold Shootout, Amy Hutchins and her draw partner Mike Narachi—returning from injury—claimed the championship with 29 head, narrowly besting Mark Rasmussen and Michelle Freiheit (28 head). Sidney Rasmussen had an exceptional weekend, securing both first and second in the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout. Her win came with Gage Moore, who traveled from Georgia to deliver a perfect 30-head run.

WORLD FINALS XIX UPDATES

Ready to make ranch sorting history

All six sorting pens will be held inside air-conditioned arenas: three in the John Justin Arena and three in the historic Will Rogers Coliseum. This means more pen-to-pen consistency,

relief from the Texas heat, and elevated competition in two of Fort Worth's premier Western venues.

Reservations are in, and projections put us on pace to surpass the \$1 million payout mark for the second consecutive year—the largest in ranch sorting history.

THE PRODUCER BEHIND THE PEN:

HOW ELAINE JACKSON BUILT OPPORTUNITIES FOR RANCH SORTERS

After a rain-soaked trip to Texas unexpectedly launched her into producing RSNC events, Elaine Jackson built a reputation for creating welcoming, fair and competitive opportunities for ranch sorters across the Midwest.

For Elaine Jackson, producing ranch sorting events was never part of a carefully mapped-out career plan. It started with a love for horses, years spent in the cutting industry and one frustrating weekend that forced her to create an opportunity instead of waiting for one to appear.

Since then, Jackson has become a familiar face in the ranch sorting community, balancing producing, secretarial work, horse sales and competition while helping create an environment where beginners and experienced riders alike can feel welcome. Whether she's organizing cattle, setting up pens or encouraging first-time sorters, Jackson has built her events around fairness, hard work and giving people a place to compete.

THE RAINOUT THAT LAUNCHED A PRODUCING CAREER

On Mother's Day weekend in 2015, Jackson loaded up her horse trailer and drove from her home in Galatia, Illinois, to Texas with one goal in mind: qualify for the 2016 RSNC World Finals.

Jackson, who came from a cutting background, was determined to work cattle in Texas at the World Finals.

"We drove all night," she said. "I was going to an AQHA cutting on Friday night and then, on Saturday, to the sorting at Laura and Tommy Roberson's. We were waiting to get into our hotel room on Friday afternoon and they called and said, 'We have to cancel the sorting.'"

Needless to say, Jackson was shocked and upset, but the 11 inches of rain that came down in one night put a halt to her plans. She was determined to qualify for her first World Finals, but there weren't any shows within 10 hours of her home in Illinois.

Her solution: Call the RSNC office and figure out how to put on her own show to qualify.

“That Memorial Day weekend, I already had a jackpot sorting scheduled for Saturday and a Round Robin scheduled for Sunday,” Jackson recalled. “I said, ‘I’ll just do RSNC on Monday.’ I ran 650 teams in my barn by myself in three days in one pen.”

She also seized her qualification and went on to earn her first RSNC World Championship, capturing the title in the #13 Mixed Handicap.

Ten years later, in a full circle moment, Jackson emerged on top of the 2025 Cinch RSNC World Finals in the Justin Insurance #10 Masters class with partner Bill Womack, earning her second World Championship.

HORSES, HARDSHIP AND FINDING HER PLACE IN THE CATTLE INDUSTRY

Long before she became known as an RSNC producer, Jackson grew up with horses on her family’s crop farm in Missouri.

There, her love for horses started early. Jackson remembers being dropped off at her local saddle club as a child just so she could sit and watch the annual cutting, dreaming of the day she’d have her own horse to compete on.

When she was 8, Jackson got her first Quarter Horse—a mare that wasn’t yet broke. After getting the horse trained, one horse-man told her the mare looked like a cutting horse, planting the seed for what would eventually become a lifelong involvement in the industry.

When Jackson was 29, though, she broke her back in a car accident and wasn’t sure she would walk again. The experience shifted her perspective and motivated her to finally pursue the discipline she had dreamed about since childhood.

“When I got healed up, I said, ‘I am buying a cutting horse,’” she said.

That determination became a defining characteristic throughout Jackson’s career. Alongside her husband, Rick, who trains and judges cutting horses, Jackson built a life around the horse industry through competition, secretarial work, horse sales and, eventually, ranch sorting.

Sorting became a natural extension of the cutting horse world for Jackson and her family. Over the years, they’ve helped introduce cutters to sorting and sorters to cutting, creating crossover opportunities for riders and horses alike.

For Jackson, the two disciplines complement each other well, both mentally and physically. Because the sport is timed instead of judged, riders can focus on reacting naturally and gaining more experience in the saddle.

BUILDING SHOWS FOR THE EVERYDAY SORTER

Having produced ranch sortings and other shows since the early 2010s, Jackson built a reputation for running organized, fair, and welcoming events — something she believes is critical to growing the sport. That reputation comes as no surprise given her range: secretarial cuttings, showing horses, and helping clients buy and sell have long made juggling multiple roles second nature.

“I don’t know how to just do one thing,” she said. “I don’t know how to just go to a sorting and not do anything but ride. I think I’m being lazy if that’s all I have to do is worry about me riding my horse.”

For Jackson, producing events means constantly planning ahead. But she believes the people attending the events matter even more.

“The biggest challenge is knowing that you’re never going to make everybody happy, but you’re trying to make as many people happy as you can,” she said, emphasizing the importance of consistency and fairness inside the sorting pen.

Her approach has helped create an environment where riders of all skill levels feel welcome, especially beginners.

“My husband and I really think about the little guy,” Jackson said. “You can’t lose sight of the beginners—you’ve got to give them a place to go and a place to feel competitive.”

LOOKING DOWN THE ROAD

In 2026, Jackson’s schedule remains as busy as ever.

Kismet may have played a role in Jackson capturing her World Championship titles exactly 10 years apart, but she has no plans of slowing down anytime soon and is taking aim for the Cinch RSNC World Finals XIX.

Jackson’s daughter, Hannah, is also keeping the family on the road as she chases an NCHA Novice Non Pro cutting world championship.

For Jackson, staying involved in the industry has never been about slowing down — it’s about continuing to create opportunities for riders, horses and the next generation of competitors. 🐾

The inaugural Dixie National Super Sort brought ranch sorting's finest to Jackson, Mississippi, Feb. 19-21, 2026, for a weekend that paid out \$95,098—including \$10,000 in added money—and marked a milestone moment for the sport. Before the Gold Shootout final rounds, the Top 10 qualifiers in each class were introduced on the arena floor of the Dixie National Rodeo, the biggest PRCA rodeo east of the Mississippi, for a celebratory welcome to a state hosting its first-ever RSNC Super Sort. When the competition resumed, two teams made the most of the moment.

CINCH #13 GOLD SHOOTOUT: HARPER GRACE PIERCE, JOEL LESH OUT-PERFORM THE PACK

At the first-ever Cinch RSNC Dixie National Super Sort, top sorters Harper Grace Pierce and Joel Lesh made clean runs to clinch the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout title.

Victory was claimed by the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout team of Harper Grace Pierce and Joel Lesh at the inaugural Cinch RSNC Dixie National Super Sort in Jackson, Mississippi, Feb. 19-21, 2026, where the team sorted a perfect 30 head over three rounds in 157.28 seconds to earn \$6,716.

Pierce, from Williamson, Georgia, rode her trusted partner “Spyder,” the 2013 gelding Smooth Spyder Rey by Smooth As A Cat out of Margaret Rey. The horse has been a consistent performer for Pierce in major sorting events and once again proved dependable in high-pressure rounds that landed Pierce at the top of the game.

“Just to do our best and not push them too hard, and just do whatever comes to us,” Pierce said of her plan that helped secure both the win with Lesh and a second-place finish with Logan Wolfe in the class.

Lesh, of Stillwater, Oklahoma, was aboard his 2020 mare Hot Baloo (Lil Catbaloo x Hotstuff An Then Sum), known as “Kahlua.” The mare has become one of Lesh’s top mounts in



the sorting pen and has already helped him claim major wins, including the Championship at the recent Cowtown Showdown benefit, both alongside partner Tanner Keith.

With a solid mount beneath him and a good eye for cattle, Lesh was poised to succeed.

“The cows kind of give you what they had and they just were soft, so we just kind of went to them,” Lesh said. “I knew going first, as long as nothing was really shooting out with them being run the first day, they’d be a little calm to start and then they livened up after about team three, which is normal.”

PROFESSIONAL'S CHOICE #9 GOLD SHOOTOUT: RANDY MOORE, ELLA SNYDER SEAL THE DEAL AT THE DIXIE NATIONAL

Moore and Snyder proved patience and consistency pays off with a win worth nearly \$6,000.

After several almost-victories over the years, Randy Moore and Ella Snyder finally broke through with a major win, topping the Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout at the Dixie National Super Sort. The pair sorted 30 head over three rounds in 156.58 seconds to claim the championship and \$5,832.

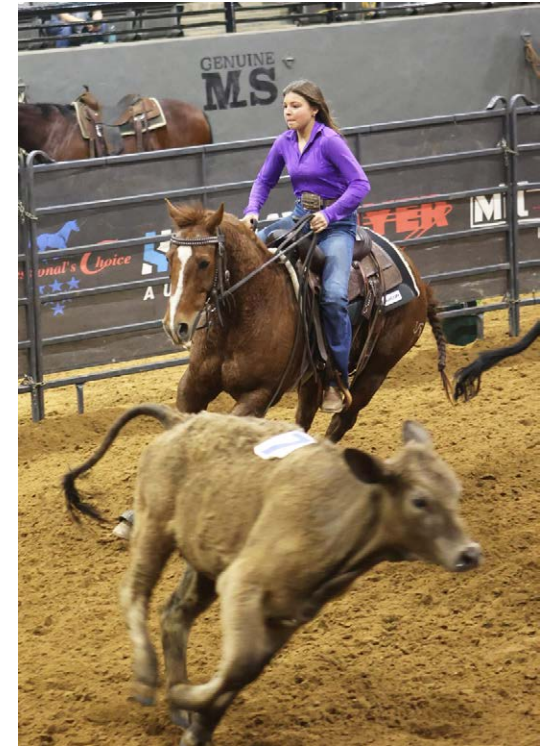
The win was a product of the strong partnership built over time. Moore, of Yatesville, Georgia, and Snyder, from Fayetteville, Tennessee, have teamed up often in the sorting pen, consistently advancing through rounds but previously falling just short of the top spot.

“We’ve just always rode good together,” Moore said. “We just clicked. We’ve always done good making it back to the second go, third go, but we’ve never been able to seal the bill... So, this was a really good one.”

Success in the Gold Shootout classes runs in the Moore family. At the Southeast Regional Super Sort earlier this season, Moore’s son, Gage, captured the Open Gold Shootout championship in Perry, Georgia, alongside partner Tanner Sperle. The Dixie National win marks another major milestone for the family in the sorting pen, and Snyder was equally excited to seize such a high-reward championship with her partner.

“We’ve been working for this for a while,” she added. “So, getting a big win like this, it’s nice. And it’s always good to ride with one of our good friends.” 🐾

The San Antonio Super Sort hit all the marks in 2026. The event is a favorite for ranch sorters and the livestock show committee, who contributed a \$10,000 youth scholarship, bringing this year's added money to \$25,000. Between the added money and the event's popularity, the Gold Shootout winners' checks saw remarkable growth, too, with the Cinch #13 increasing by 25% and the Professional's Choice #9 blowing up by more than 185% year-over-year!

CINCH #13 GOLD SHOOTOUT: TUCKER FIELD, TANNER KEITH SORT CLEAN TO WIN \$8K+ IN SAN ANTONIO

As the only team to sort clean through every round, Field and Keith rode their consistency all the way to the championship.

Tucker Field and Tanner Keith delivered a flawless performance to win the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout at the San Antonio Super Sort, sorting 40 head in 219.93 seconds over four rounds to claim the championship and \$8,230.

The duo, who chose to ride together as a pick team, relied on consistency and smart cattle work to separate themselves from the field. By the time they completed a clean 10-head run in the final round, the win was effectively secured.

"We just took what they gave us," Keith said. "We were just lucky and got good draws and stayed consistent all the way through and got 10 each round. We had it locked down after we ran the 10 head around the top 10. There was no catching us."

Keith, of Austinville, Virginia, was aboard his trusted 2018 gelding Metal Rebel, "Lucky" (Metallic Rebel x Aristocrats Rose). The gelding has become Keith's go-to mount in big classes and previously carried him to victory at the Cowtown Showdown benefit alongside partner Joel Lesh.

Field, from Granbury, Texas, rode Rio Rojo River Cat (Little Dulces Rey x A Smooth Closer), a seasoned sorting horse



who also serves as a dependable partner for everyday ranch work. The gelding's experience and cow sense proved valuable in the high-pressure shootout format.

PROFESSIONAL'S CHOICE #9 GOLD SHOOTOUT: ADDY HALL, SCOTT HENDERSON TEAM UP FOR \$7K VICTORY

Understanding each other's strengths helped Hall and Henderson secure their championship.

Addy Hall and Scott Henderson turned teamwork and trust into a championship performance at the San Antonio Super Sort, winning the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout after sorting 17 head in 150.97 seconds across three rounds. The pair earned \$7,092 for the victory.

Hall, of Peyton, Texas, and Henderson, from Caldwell, Texas, leaned on a simple but effective strategy that played to their strengths inside the sorting pen. Hall handled the herd while Henderson managed the gate, a division of responsibilities that helped the team stay smooth and efficient through each round.

"She's excellent in the herd," Henderson said of Hall. "And I'm okay in the gate, so, we just ranch handed it."

Hall sees the win as a key component to her growth in the sport.

"Getting this win really means a lot to me because it helped me become a more confident rider, and believe in myself and my abilities," she explained. "It especially helped me learn to trust in my partner, my horse, and myself."

Hall also credited Henderson's steady presence in the pen for helping the run come together.

"Riding with Scott was amazing," she said about her sorting partner. "I felt very confident with him in the gate and loved being on his team. He was always kind and encouraging and was a great partner. I hope we get to ride again in the future and hopefully keep winning."

Hall rode her grandfather's horse, Tuff Little Dottie (Woody Be Tuff x Smart Spare Tari), known around the sorting pen as "Dottie." The dependable mare has developed a reputation for being a natural cattle horse.

"She is an amazing sorting horse and handles cattle very well," Hall said. "She always gives her best when she rides and is an all-around amazing horse. My favorite thing about her is how smooth she sorts. When you get into the herd, she does exactly what you tell her and always delivers." 🐾

The Houston Super Sort paid out \$24,000 more to ranch sorters in 2026 than it did in 2025 with Gold Shootout champions seeing the biggest gains in checks paid. Payton Brzymialkiewicz and Jamie Simon took the Professional's Choice #9 with a synchronized gate strategy, while Cheyenne Koesters and Bodee Kruger finally broke through in the Cinch #13 after years of near-misses.

PROFESSIONAL'S CHOICE #9 GOLD SHOOTOUT: PAYTON BRZYMIALKIEWICZ, JAMIE SIMON CLAIM \$7.8K

A smooth, strategic run turned into a \$7,814 championship performance at the 2026 Houston Super Sort.

Payton Brzymialkiewicz of Waller, Texas, and Jamie Simon from Lafayette, Louisiana, teamed up to win the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout at the Houston Super Sort, sorting 28 head in three rounds in 163.32 seconds to earn \$7,814.

The draw team relied on a simple strategy and reliable equine partners to secure the win in one of the event's most competitive classes.

"Payton wanted to stay in the gate and have me in the herd," Simon explained their game plan. "Funny thing is that I had the very same thought, and that gave me added confidence. We worked from the top and sent cows clean to the hole."

The plan paid off as the duo stayed smooth and effi-

cient through each round, proving their partnership despite coming together quickly as a draw team.

"Watching Payton all of these years, I knew I was in good hands and was pumped about my draw," Simon said. "She and I synced right away. I knew I had a few bobbles in Rounds 1 and 2. She went through it with me, and I'm so glad she took the time to do it."

Brzymialkiewicz also appreciated how well the team communicated throughout the class.

"Riding with my partner was good; she listened to everything that I was telling her," she noted.

Strong horses underneath both riders helped anchor the winning performance. Brzymialkiewicz rode a 2019 sorrel mare, One Amazing Cat (Just Simply Amazing x Bad Little Peppy Cat), owned by Tony Field.

"This win means a lot to me because, not only did I win the class with an amazing person, but the horse that I used was Tony Field's, and I'm so thankful to call him family," Brzymialkiewicz said. "She might be little, but she can cover some ground!"

Cheyenne Koesters of Arlington, Texas, and Bodee Kruger from Lake Lillian, Minnesota, captured the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout title at the Houston Super Sort after sorting 30 head in three rounds in 165.90 seconds to earn \$7,794.

Although Kruger has won big in Gold Shootout competition before—like when he notably secured the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout championship and a record-breaking \$34,000 payday at the 2025 Cinch RSNC World Finals—for Koesters, the victory marked a long-sought achievement after coming close in Gold Shootout classes in the past.

"I have been trying to win one of these Gold Shootouts for a while," Koesters said. "I've been in the top 10s, but not enough to where I can win it. I'm so happy that I won it at Houston. It's one of my favorite shows."

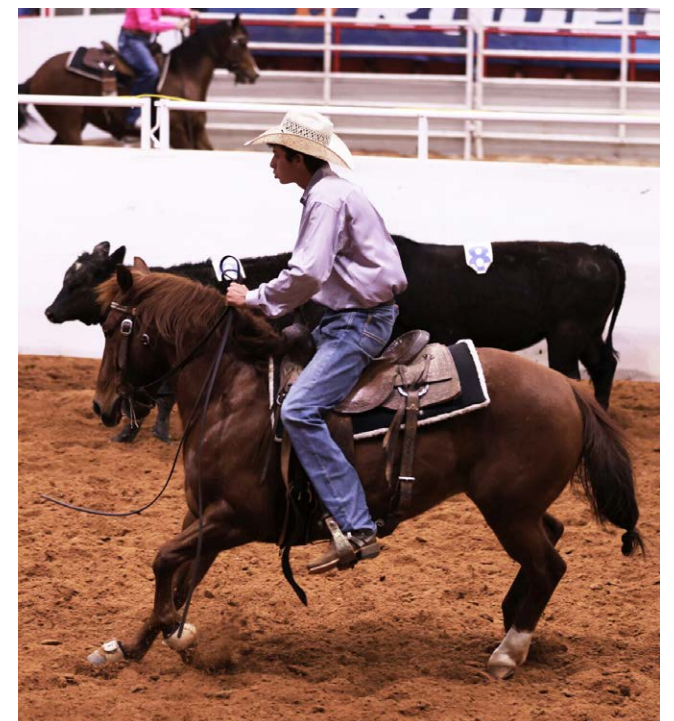
The duo entered the final round with a clear strategy: Keep things simple and aim for a clean run.

"Being the second draw laid us out perfectly," Koesters explained. "We got a decently nice layout, so that helped out a lot, and Bodee and I were really in sync."

Even though the two riders don't get to compete together frequently due to distance, their familiarity with each other's riding style helped the partnership come together when it mattered most.

"We ride together sometimes," Koesters said. "We rode at Las Vegas a couple years ago, and we were super close to winning that class, but it just didn't work out the way we planned it to."

Dan Davis and Chris Morris used sharp cattle reads, standout horses and a proven partnership to capture the win.

Dan Davis of Gouverneur, New York, and Chris Morris of Culpeper, Virginia, teamed up to win the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout at the 2026 Northeast Regional Super Sort on April 17 at the Keystone Horse Center in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania. The pair sorted 28 head over three rounds in 161.23 seconds to claim the championship and earn \$5,684 at the annual Cinch RSNC event.

With a challenging set of cattle throughout the weekend, smart strategy and clean execution proved critical. For Davis and Morris, years of riding experience and a lifetime of working cattle helped give them an edge in one of the event's toughest classes.

"I know cattle, and then obviously it takes a good horse, too, to be able to do the job," Davis said. "I say it's 50% horse and 50% the person knowing how to read cattle and get the job done."

That combination of horsemanship and cattle sense showed throughout the finals, but strong horsepower also played a major role.

Davis rode his 2017 mare, Cats Babyrey (High Brow CD x Scooters Rey), known around the barn as "Dolly." Though she had never worked cattle before joining Davis' program, she quickly found her calling in the sorting pen.

"She doesn't look cowy, but, when you go into the pen, she just flips the switch on," Davis said.

Morris relied on his 2017 gelding, I Gots The Blues (Cat Man Blue x I Gots The Remedy), nicknamed "Blue," who delivered a standout performance when it mattered most.

"He's definitely one of my top picks in my string," Morris said. "He's reined cow horse trained, but he's probably the best horse I've ever had in my life. He's so powerful you feel like you're riding five horses."

That power came in handy against cattle that gave competitors few easy opportunities. Knowing they needed a plan going into the final round, Davis and Morris leaned on familiarity and trust built from previous rides together.

"We ride so much alike, we kind of knew who could hold the gate or who would go in the herd," Morris said. "We knew we were good."

They sorted 25 head in 210.01 seconds to earn \$7,510.

Mariano and Oliveira, who are each competing in their first year with RSNC, carried that momentum through the remainder of the event, adding several more top 10 finishes to their list of weekend accomplishments.

Mariano also closed out the weekend as the third-highest regional point earner in the #3-4 Division, capping a successful showing at one of the Northeast's premier ranch sorting events. As with all Cinch RSNC members who competed at the Northeast Regional Super Sort, Mariano and Oliveira are one show closer to satisfying the five-show requirement to qualify and compete for the \$10,000 Northeast Circuit Bonus at the Cinch RSNC Northeast Circuit Finals in Columbiana, Ohio, Aug. 21-23, 2026.



US RIDER #5 GOLD SHOOTOUT: WYATT ERB, CHRISTY HAYES HANG ON FOR GOLD SHOOTOUT GLORY

Wyatt Erb and Christy Hayes teamed up for their first major Gold Shootout win with a standout finals run against a tough herd.

Wyatt Erb and Christy Hayes captured their first major Cinch RSNC Gold Shootout championship in the US Rider #5 Gold Shootout at the 2026 Northeast Regional Super Sort, winning \$2,988 on April 19 at the Keystone Horse Center in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania. The pair sorted 15 head in 154.19 seconds to secure the victory.

For Erb, 16, from Beverly, Ohio, the win nearly never happened. He initially had no plan to sign up for the class, and it took some encouragement—and a borrowed horse—to get him back in the pen, but the last-minute decision paid off in a big way.

"We ride together as friends, but we never competed together before until this past weekend, and we did great together," Hayes said of her reluctant partner.

The US Rider #5 Gold Shootout featured one of the most challenging herds of the weekend, with many teams striking out in the early rounds. As the last draw in the finals, Erb and Hayes entered with a simple game plan: stay smooth, ride their run and get a time on the board.

"The cows were tough all weekend," said Hayes, who hails from Dawson, Pennsylvania. "But I just told [Wyatt], 'Let's just ride like normal. Let's just get five and quit.' And it worked out."

Their calm approach proved to be the winning formula, as well as the horsepower they brought in the pen with them.

Hayes made a key switch before the finals. After riding her 2019 mare, Whisstlin Dixie (Hashtags x Hisstereya), through the first two rounds, she felt a change was needed and climbed aboard Rebella Bella (Metallic Rebel x Lizzabella) for the championship round.

FROM 1ST OUT TO 1ST PLACE: JESSIE AND LOGAN WOLFE WIN WACO'S PRIEFERT OPEN GOLD SHOOTOUT
Wellington, Colorado's Logan and Jessie Wolfe won the Priefert Open Gold Shootout and \$4,720 at the 2026 Cinch RSNC South Central Regional Super Sort in Waco, Texas, sorting 27 head in 140.53 seconds across three rounds of ranch sorting competition.

Logan and Jessie Wolfe of Wellington, Colorado, claimed the Priefert Open Gold Shootout title at the Cinch RSNC South Central Regional Super Sort—one of the RSNC's marquee events—in Waco, Texas, May 1–3, sorting 27 head in 140.53 seconds across three rounds to earn \$4,720.

Sorting on two of their own seasoned horses against a tough set of cattle, the husband-and-wife team were the only pair to sort 20 head through the first two rounds, then came back as high call in the final round to make it count.

The win was a first for the couple since the birth of their first son, McCall, in January and marked Jessie's recent return to the sorting pen and a warm welcome for the latest addition to the Cinch RSNC family.

Spicy Cattle, Sharp Minds

Consistently, the cattle at the South Central Regional Super Sort were reported as tough, making for a great few days of ranch sorting.

"We had a really good group of cattle and it's getting harder and harder nowadays to find cattle that aren't used up or too soft," said Logan, who serves as the event director for Cinch RSNC when he's not competing and is on the front lines of event production throughout the country. "Our cattle supplier did a great job bringing us some fresh cattle that were challenging. A lot of people really enjoy the challenging part of our sport instead of the horse race when possible. So it adds a whole other level of finesse to the game where you have to really slow down, use your mind and be precise."

Jessie echoed the assessment.

"The cattle were tough," she said. "They were a lot like our World Finals cattle: big and strong, and you can't really make a lot of mistakes."

With a good read on the herd, the Wolfes went to work.

CINCH #13 GOLD SHOOTOUT PAYS NEARLY \$10K TO YOUNG GUN TUCKER FIELD AND TOP GUN JOEL LESH

Tucker Field is finding his rhythm and, with Joel Lesh providing support, the two netted a \$9,686 payday at the 2026 Cinch RSNC South Central Regional Super Sort.

Tucker Field and Joel Lesh claimed one of the largest payouts at the 2026 South Central Regional Super Sort in Waco, Texas, stopping the clock in 204.74 seconds with 39 head sorted to win the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout. Their effort paid \$9,682.

The win was one of many for both men.

Field won the Laredo Conversions #10 with Brea Vardas for another \$3,480, while Lesh added wins in the #14 Ranch Hand with Arielle Weeast for \$1,884 and the Ride TV Western Heritage All Levels with Larry Newport for \$2,238.

But it was their runs together in the high-stakes Cinch #13 Gold Shootout that proved the most lucrative. Field, 16, has been sorting for nearly 10 years, but is only now beginning to find his rhythm.

"I've been riding our gelding 'Big Boy,' and he's really been stepping it up in the sorting world," Field said. "Since Houston, he's really been doing awesome in it and helping me."

Big Boy, a paternal grandson of Dual Rey with Smooth As A Cat on the bottom side, is more than a sorting horse for the Field family. He helps doctor yearlings and served as Field's ranch rodeo mount at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in March.

That outside experience showed up in the sorting pen. In a class where cattle management mattered, Field said Big Boy's ability to help him stay smooth through the herd played a major role in the win. It also aligned with what Field has been focusing on in his own riding.

"Last year I wasn't very good, and I've just been trying to work on getting better," Field said. "Last year I would just blow through the herd, and they'd scatter everywhere. I've been trying to work on being a lot smoother, and Big Boy really helps me out. He's the main reason I am where I am."

In Waco, Field said, he was confident stepping into the herd knowing one of the industry's best was behind him.

Lesh, who has known Field since he was a beginning sorter, manned the gate and said the team entered the final run in a strong position and adjusted their strategy to fit the cattle.

"We were in the driver's seat coming in," Lesh said. "We just took it easy on them first three or four cows, and then they started lining up and we sped it up from there."

Lesh leaned on his favorite mare, "Kahlua," to help keep things together as the cattle became more stirred up. Instead of forcing the action, the pair stayed patient and waited for the run to come together naturally.

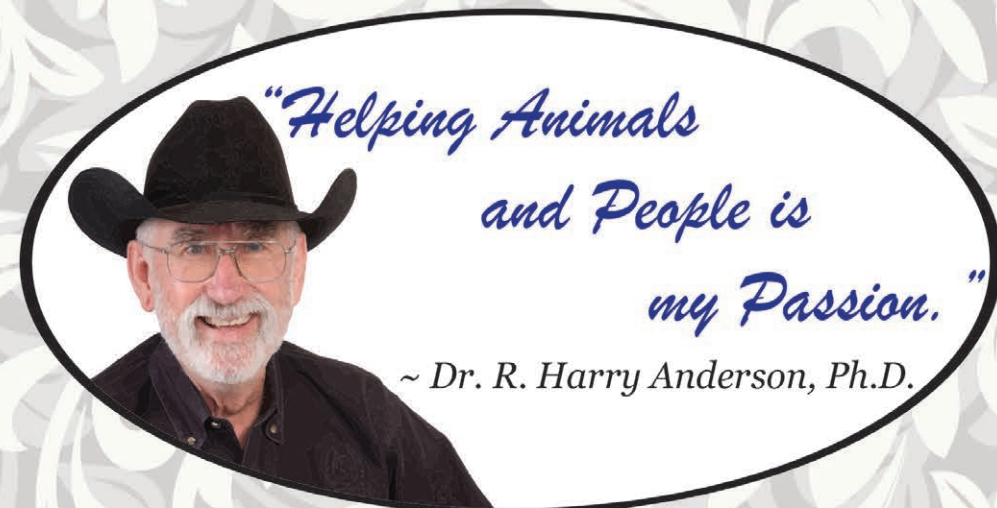
STEVE CAWTHON, BREA VARDAS CAP FAIRYTALE WEEKEND WITH PROFESSIONAL'S CHOICE #9 GOLD SHOOTOUT WIN, WORTH \$11K

Steve Cawthon and Brea Vardas came together cash in \$11,254 at the South Central Regional Super Sort and now have plans to continue their partnership at the Cinch RSNC World Finals XIX in Fort Worth, Texas.

Steve Cawthon and Brea Vardas capitalized on patience, horse-power and a little luck to claim the biggest single-class payout of the Cinch RSNC South Central Regional Super Sort in Waco, Texas, May 1-3, winning the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout in 215.36 seconds with 35 head sorted for \$11,254.

The win capped a standout weekend for both competitors. For Cawthon, it added another chapter to a career that has stretched across three decades in the sorting pen alongside his wife, Shelby. For Vardas, it reinforced that she belongs among the sport's rising contenders.

But the story behind the win started long before the pair ever entered the pen for their #9 victory.

Cawthon rode Poncho, registered as Downvalleycat, a gelding he purchased from Tim Field, and the horse's appearance in Waco nearly did not happen at all. Earlier this year, Poncho underwent emergency colic surgery after veterinarians discovered a massive enterolith roughly the size of a cantaloupe lodged inside him.

"We were very fortunate that he survived it," Cawthon, from Hillsboro, Texas, said. "It was a tough deal."

The stone reportedly weighed around 15 pounds and had likely been forming for months before finally causing a blockage. Poncho spent time recovering at the Texas Equine Hospital near Texas A&M under the care of Dr. Hanes and Dr. Canada. In all, his healing spanned 4 months.

Cawthon said the gelding's return to competition was handled carefully, with constant veterinary guidance and limited runs as the horse rebuilt his stamina. Waco marked Poncho's fourth event back.

"We followed all the rules and did everything the doctor told us," Cawthon said. "Everything went textbook."

Even so, Poncho made the most of his limited work. Cawthon only entered him in the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout, where the gelding's calm demeanor and strong mind helped anchor the team through increasingly difficult cattle.

That steady presence paired well with Vardas, a 26-year-old from Campbell, Texas, who came into ranch sorting after first competing in cutting and reined cow horse. While she loved the other disciplines, she said the faster pace of sorting suited her personality better.

"I wasn't having to wait for things to make the move," Vardas said. "I could actually make the move and make things happen."

DAVID HARBERS, DON LAMONT CLINCH US RIDER #5 GOLD SHOOTOUT SORTING VICTORY WORTH NEARLY \$4K AND IMMEASURABLE CONFIDENCE

David Harbers and Don Lamont are locked in on ranch sorting together thanks to their Waco win in the US Rider #5 Gold Shootout.

David Harbers and Don Lamont turned luck and talent into a US Rider #5 Gold Shootout victory at the Cinch RSNC South Central Regional Super Sort, sorting 23 head across three rounds in 166.63 seconds to earn \$3,990.

It was the win that almost wasn't. Harbers, from Simon-ton, Texas, had been seriously considering stepping away from ranch sorting, and as their final, Gold Shootout run unfolded, it wasn't looking great.

According to Lamont, from Albany, Texas, the pair reached the halfway point with only three or four cattle sorted, putting the pressure on to make something happen without



blowing the herd apart. Then, the cattle suddenly flooded toward the gate.

"All of a sudden, I went after a cow and they all came to the gate," Lamont said.

Harbers, working the gate on his blue roan mare, "Charlie," suddenly found himself trying to turn nearly the entire herd while Lamont worked back and forth inside.

As the clock wound down, the remaining cattle began lining up, allowing Lamont and Harbers to sort off the winning 10 head.

"It was like all of them lined up perfectly," Lamont said. "It was a lot of luck, for sure."

For Harbers, the win represents far more than a paycheck. After more than a decade in ranch sorting, the competitor admitted he had reached a point where the sport no longer felt fun. His son, who originally helped pull the family into the RSNC world, had moved on to veterinary school at Texas A&M, and the dry spell that followed slowly drained Harbers' confidence.

"I was at the point I was ready to give up," Harbers said.

Then came Charlie. Registered as Silver Dove Time, the 6-year-old mare is sired by One Fabulous Time and taps into a few foundational cutting horses on the bottom.

Named after Kelly McGillis' character in the original Top Gun movie, Charlie reignited Harbers' excitement almost immediately after he bought her several months ago. He hauled the mare to the Cinch RSNC San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Super Sort for just her second time in the sorting pen, where Tommy Roberson quickly noticed her natural ability.

"Tommy looked at me and said, 'Holy smokes, you need to send this horse off to a trainer, and I don't care if it's me,'" Harbers recalled. "I tossed him the reins and said, 'Then you [train her and] take her to the Worlds.'"

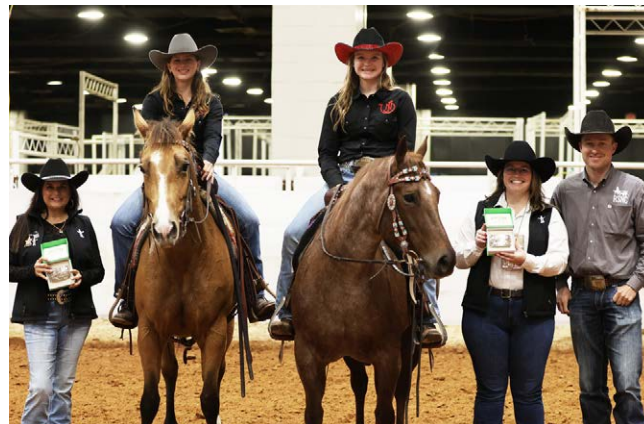
